Eastern Carolina Tobacco Markets To Open August 26

'41 Opening For Market Is Earlier

Georgia Markets To Open Auction Sales On August 5; Association President, Citing Possible Serious Shortage In Storage Space, Declares Survey Being Made In N. C. And Virginia

Norfolk, Va., June 27.—(AP)—The Tobacco Association of the United States, meeting at Virginia Beach, today unanimously adopted the report of its sales committee on the opening dates of the bright belt markets as follows:

Georgia, August 5; South Carolina and Border markets, August 12; Eastern North Carolina, August 26; Middle Belt, September 9; Old Belt, September 16; and Dark Virginia, December 8.

Virginia Beach, June 27.—(AP)—Fearing the possibility of a "serious shortage" of storage space for the 1941 tobacco crop, President J. W. Dunnington of the Tobacco Association of the United States told the organization's annual meeting today that a survey was being made of facilities in Virginia and North Carolina.

The survey was begun by W. D. Reed, in charge of the Richmond laboratory of the United States Department of Agriculture, on April 1 and the work has been continued by him since that time at intervals. Dunnington, Farmville, Va., tobaccoist, said that so far the storage space listed or available or buildings which could be converted includes good storage for about 240,000 hogsheads and other available space for 159,365 hogsheads. Details are to be released to tobacco companies cooperating with the Commodities Credit Corporation in the 1941 program, he added.

The speaker said it now appeared that the army base warehouses will become a part of the naval base at Norfolk and that they can not be used for further storage of tobacco. Or shipping, Dunnington said that never in the history of the association had "conditions been so chaotic as they have been during the past year. The number of ports to which our exports may go had been curtailed and even on the ships that have gone to these ports it has been more difficult to get room for tobacco than for many other commodities.

"What are called 'priority' lists have been established. This means that preference is given to certain commodities among which tobacco is not listed. Food, armaments, etc., are on the priority lists.

"Not only have shipping opportunities been greatly limited, but in addition all contracts covering freight rates to most ports except the Far East for a period of time have been cancelled and engagements are made at ships' rate at the time of sailing. Current rates vary all the way from \$1.35 per hundred pounds to South American ports to \$9.60 to Alexandria. All freight charges have been prepaid.

END OF STRIKE AT SHIPYARDS APPEARS NEAR

CIO Machinists Follow Action of AFL Employees

NEW YORK FACES TIEUP OF SUBWAY

CIO Transport Workers Expected To Go On Strike July 1 Unless Satisfactory Terms Reached

(By The Associated Press)
The machinists' strike which for 47 days delayed work on half a billion dollars worth of defense orders at 11 San Francisco bay shipyards, was all but settled today.

Six hundred CIO machinists voted last night to go back to work Monday, provided a separate agreement is signed before then. Early yesterday, 1,200 AFL machinists voted to return to their jobs under terms of a master contract covering all major west coast shipyards.

A mass meeting of CIO transport workers last night apparently moved New York City closer to the reality of a subway strike which would badly cripple the transportation lines of the nation's largest metropolis. Union officials declared 8,000 employees of the municipally-operated subway system voted last night to strike July 1 unless a satisfactory agreement was reached on their demands for a dollar a day wage raise and adjustments in working hours. Three other union mass meetings have been scheduled to reach the remainder of the 32,000 employees.

The City Board of Transportation issued orders to various subway officials to "get ready to put into action" plans already prepared to cope with the projected strike.

The Connecticut Labor Department called on federal conciliation officials for help in an attempt to settle a wage dispute at the American Brass Company, Waterbury. The concern, with 10,000 employees, holds large army and navy contracts. The CIO Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers union has been empowered to call a strike if necessary to enforce its demands for a wage increase of 10 cents an hour. The company has offered a four-cent boost. The current scale has not been made public.

Judges Appointed By Gov. Broughton

Raleigh, June 27.—(AP)—Governor Broughton today appointed Senator Jeff D. Johnson, Jr., of Clinton; Richard Dillard Dixon of Edenton; and Clarence E. Blackstock of Asheville, as Superior court special judges.

He also reappointed five of the six men now serving. They are: W. H. S. Burgwyn of Woodland; S. J. Ervin, Jr., of Morganton; Luther Hamilton of Morehead City; A. Hall Johnston of Asheville; and Hubert E. Olive of Lexington.

The sixth special judge, G. V. Cowper of Kinston, was not reappointed because he resigned recently on account of ill health.

The number of special judges was increased from six to eight during the last General Assembly.

NAVAL COURSE IS CONSIDERED

Reserve Officer To Hold Conferences Here Monday

Declaring that there are, no doubt, a great many young men at East Carolina Teachers College who are interested in Officers Training Corps of the Naval Reserve, Ensign C. L. Harris of Raleigh has announced that he will spend next Monday at the institution for the purpose of holding interviews and discussions relative to this class of Naval Reserve.

Ensign Harris's letter announcing that he would be here also contained a list of qualifications for enlistment.

In order to enlist the applicant must be a native-born, unmarried, male citizen of the United States not less than 20 and under 28 years of age, must meet physical requirements for enlistment, possess a college degree—seniors may file application 90 days prior to graduation.

Satisfactory completion of the prescribed course of instruction will qualify the Reserve Midshipman for a commission as ensign. Naval Reserve ensigns may request active duty in the fleet and, if conditions permit, will be ordered to active duty with full pay and allowances for such periods as the Secretary of the Navy may deem advisable. They also are subject to call in time of war or when, in the opinion of the President, an emergency exists, such as the one declared in effect September 8, 1939.

He was the son of the late Jesse and Susan E. Garrison Cannon of Ayden. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ida G. Cannon; four sons, Lee Edwards and C. L. Cannon, Jr., of Washington, D. C.; Shelton M. and Jesse Glenn Cannon of the home; one brother, J. D. Cannon of Ayden; and two sisters, Mrs. F. M. Kilpatrick of Ayden and Mrs. A. D. McFadyen of Washington, D. C. Reds Withdraw And Reform Military Operations

Moscow, June 27.—(AP)—Russian armies have fallen back to new positions on the Vilna and Baranowicz fronts after inflicting heavy losses on the German column driving toward Minsk, a communique said today.

The Russian forces, said a war bulletin issued by the Soviet information bureau, withdrew during the night and were "reformed for new military operations."

No indication was given of the depth of the retirement.

The communique also reported punishing raids by the Red air force on Bucharest, Ploesti and Constanta, the capital, oil industry center and chief port, respectively, of Rumania.

Throughout yesterday, it said, the Russian warplanes without cessation slashed at the Nazi tank columns operating in the direction of Vilna in which heavy losses were exacted of the armored units.

The communique, issued in addition to the usual early morning war report, said great destruction was caused by the bombing of Constanta.

No mention has yet been made in Russian communiques of a penetration beyond the Russian-occupied section of Poland and Lithuania into Russia proper.

The German drive in the Brody sector is considerably to the south and may be aimed at Kiev, capital of the Ukraine.

NO LET UP IN RAF ASSAULTS AGAINST NAZIS

Raid French Coast After Night Attack On Germany

VICTORY SCORED BY FREE FRENCH

Turkey To Permit Retreating French To Cross Territory; Raids Herald Russo-Finnish War

London, June 27.—(AP)—Formations of R.A.F. fighters carried out a one-hour raid over the German-occupied French coast today, following the 16th consecutive night bombing attack upon Germany. Explosions sounded through the light blue haze over Dover strait.

German anti-aircraft batteries apparently put up heavy barrages. The British fighters later sped back across the channel.

The great naval base at Kiel and the industrial cities of Cologne and Düsseldorf were principal objectives of the night attacks.

London, June 27.—(AP)—Free French troops advancing from occupied Damascus have seized Maaraba, just north of the Syrian capital, and pushed on 35 miles to the northeast, informed sources reported here today.

British troops striking toward Beirut from Damascus have been held up by French artillery fire about 12 miles west of Damascus.

At Merdjayoun, British and Vichy horse patrols were reported in constant touch with 120 Circassian horsemen said to have surrendered already.

Ankara, June 27.—(AP)—A high Turkish source said today that Turkey has granted permission for the evacuation across its territory of Vichy forces now fighting in Syria provided they travel as unarmed civilians.

It was expected, however, that only a fraction of the French army would be able to leave Syria because of a lack of transports, but belief was expressed that most of its officers would succeed in escaping capture by the British.

Helsinki, June 27.—(AP)—Finnish observers said today that devastation from the sky such as typified the Soviet-Russian winter invasion of 1939-40 had marked the outbreak of hostilities between Finland and Russia—officially acknowledged here last night.

Turku, on the southwest coast, was reported to be—as it was in the 1939-40 war—Finland's worst devastated city. More than 100 buildings were destroyed there and other property was damaged.

(Turku would be a logical debarcation point for German troops sent to Finland.)

Like other youngsters, young Lewis for long has wanted to see Bob Feller, ace hurler for the Cleveland Indians, in action and now he has not only seen the baseball idol, but has seen him win.

Lewis has just returned from a trip to Cleveland made in company with only his 14-year-old sister and he has plenty to tell the youngsters of his community. He has plenty of attentive listeners, too.

\$1,000 Suit Brought Against Bottling Co.

A \$1,000 damage suit has been filed in Pitt Superior court by Minnie Harris against M. O. Minges trading as Pepsi Cola Bottling Company, charging that broken and cracked pieces of glass in a soft drink bottle which she bought and drank got in her mouth and stomach and caused her sharp pain.

The complaint alleges that the glass was still in the plaintiff's stomach and that she may later suffer from the effects.

The plaintiff is represented by J. W. H. Roberts, Greenville attorney.

Reds Fight Furiously To Crush Nazi Column

German Claims Regarding War Without Details

Berlin, June 27.—(AP)—The German army has been "victorious on all fronts" against Soviet Russia, the German high command declared today, but it still withheld all details of its reported progress in its vast, five-day-old struggle in the east.

The war bulletin promised, however, that the scope of "big decisions" won by Adolf Hitler's legions "will be made known shortly."

As Germans behind the lines rallied Continental Europe into a far-flung coalition behind what the Germans called a crusade against Communism, the war bulletin averred that its army struck against the Soviet just as the Red army was preparing an invasion of central Europe.

Other German sources claimed absolute German mastery in the air "on the eastern front" and DNB, official German news agency, said Russian raiders were kept out of the Reich yesterday even though some bombers tried to cross into East Prussia at an "extraordinary height."

ADOPT RECORD SPENDING BILL

Senate Approves \$10,384,821,624 Bill For Army

Washington, June 27.—(AP)—The Senate approved on a voice vote today the record-breaking \$10,384,821,624 army supply bill and sent it to the House for consideration of increases totalling \$558,312,132.

The Senate increase was accounted for largely in an amendment providing \$500,000,000 for the construction of new munitions plants.

The army measure, which clerks said was the largest single appropriation in history, was approved after an hour and 20 minutes of debate. Only a score of senators were on the floor.

The bill includes \$2,700,800,000 for the procurement of 12,856 planes and accessory equipment for the air corps.

Negro Bound Over On Robbery Count

John D. Foreman, Greenville Negro, was bound over to Superior court under bond of \$500 following a preliminary hearing in Municipal recorder's court this morning on charges of breaking, entering and larceny in connection with the recent robbery of Mrs. Annie Pittman's hemstitching shop on Evans street.

Three defendants were convicted of traffic law violations and each was ordered to pay \$5 to be applied on costs of court. The three were S. T. Porter, Jr., and Dan Satterfield, white, and Henry Forbes, colored. One defendant, William Robert Wilson, was convicted of failure to purchase a city auto tag and also was fined \$5.

Wiley Hines, colored, was acquitted of a charge of abandonment and non-support, but was convicted of assault on a female and was given a 30-day sentence, suspended upon payment of costs.

Acquittals were handed down in two other cases. They were Ben Green, colored, assault with a deadly weapon; Richard May and Elias May, colored, assault with a deadly weapon.

Other cases tried today were: Willis Hemby, drunk, 30 days, suspended upon good behavior for one year; James Coward, colored, driving drunk, 90 days, suspended upon payment of a \$50 fine and court costs, appeal to Superior court noted and bond set at \$200; John Greene, colored, whiskey, 60 days work on streets, suspended upon payment of \$25.

Seeking To Destroy Unit Advancing Across Plains Of Old Poland; Moscow Declares Russians Are Holding Invaders Elsewhere; Calls On Germany To Come Forth With Details Of Reported Gains

Moscow, June 27.—(AP) Unaccounted men and machines were locked today in a great battle on the plains of old Poland as the Red army fought furiously to destroy a German panzer column advancing toward Minsk, White Russian capital 160 miles inside the Soviet border.

Elsewhere on the war front extending from the Arctic to the Black Sea the Russians reported they were holding the Germans in check.

In the Luts sector of former Poland, 250 miles south of Minsk, the Russians declared a great tank battle had turned to their advantage after raging all day yesterday. Luts is about 60 miles inside Soviet territory, but the Russians did not indicate the actual depth of the German penetration.

Along the Balkan end of the front, the Russians said their troops were successfully holding the Prut river boundary between Rumania and Soviet Bessarabia and had frustrated repeated German attempts to cross the stream.

These attempts were said to have cost the Nazis heavily. At one point, the Russians said, their artillery laid down a devastating fire which smashed three pontoon bridges the Germans were trying to lay across the Prut.

At another point Russian scouts were reported to have made a foray across the river, returning with prisoners and equipment.

(The Russian radio, in a broadcast heard today in New York, challenged Germany to come forth with the details of the great military successes it said the Nazis have been promising to disclose. The Germans have been dealing in generalities, the broadcast said, because there were "no miracles to be reported.")

The Russians said their warplanes had repeatedly bombed targets in Rumania yesterday, stabbing at Bucharest, the Black sea port of Constanta and setting great fires in oil fields.

Former Pitt Teacher Succumbs In Norfolk

Word has been received here of the death in a Norfolk hospital last night of Mrs. Bill Russ, formerly Miss Claudia Gower, who for several years taught school in Pitt county.

She taught for two years in the Chicod High school.

Funeral arrangements were not known here today.

Automobiles driven by Hallett Ward Willoughby of Greenville, Route Two, and B. L. Ross of Greenville were involved in a highway collision on the Washington highway at the intersection of the port terminal road shortly before 1 o'clock this afternoon. According to patrolman C. L. Teague, Ross was slowing down to turn into the terminal road when Willoughby crashed into the rear of his car. No one was seriously injured, but both cars were damaged. No arrests were made.

The gift becomes the means by
which we offer ourselves, and all
that we are, hope, and think to the
world around about us and to God
who made it. The "leitourgia," or
gift, becomes a sacred "liturgy" in
praise and adoration of the Most
High.

Washington Daybook

Washington—"Music—good
music—for a boomtown" should be
the title on any story today about
Hans Kindler, conductor of the
National Symphony Orchestra.

Holland-born Hans Kindler
adopted America. He wasn't run
out of anywhere by dictators or
lack of funds or conscription laws
or anything. He's "American by
choice," which gave him the right
to be a little shocked and stunned
and ashamed that the land of his
adoption had a great national cap-
it without a symphony orchestra.
That old theatrical saying about
there being three bad weeks in the
ater, "Easter week, Christmas
week and Washington," made him
blush and so when, in 1931, he was
doing a concert tour in Java, Su-
matra, Bali, and other South Sea
islands, was fed up with the pomp
and applause of these exotic lands
he turned his back on a great con-
cert, "ello career and came to
Washington.

Called Him Crazy
Folks told him he was crazy. We
were in the depths of a depression.
"When does one want music if it
is not when one is depressed?" an-
swered Kindler, and he had his
way. He estimated a \$35,000 box-
office take, raised \$45,000 in guar-
antees. At the end of his first de-
pression season he had netted
nearly \$100,000 and in a year when
gift-edged stocks couldn't pay half
of one per cent, the National Sym-
phony got a sweet little melon for
its backers.

I give you this background, be-
cause without it you can't under-
stand big, blondish Hans Kindler
and his "boomtown music" which is
now almost as much a part of the
Washington scene as the monu-
ment.

The Washington boom didn't
start with national defense. It be-
gan several years ago. Kindler saw
it coming. He saw government
workers pouring in by the hun-
dreds.

This is beginning to be a boom-
town, he said, and looking ahead
to trouble in Europe, he saw that
it would become even more so. He
started figuring. What happens to
men in a boomtown? They can gold
all day and at night they want to
spend some of it. What happens to
people in Washington in summer
time? They sweat in offices or at
home all day and at night they
want to get away from it all.

Estimates Were Modest
"I couldn't start a mile-long bar
—I didn't know that business. But
I could give them outdoor music
down by the water front, where it
would be cool, says Kindler.
The name "Water Gate" (origi-
nally given to that landing area
where foreign diplomats and other
world dignitaries could be greeted
with fitting ceremony) fascinated
Kindler. He went down to that
stretch of lawn that slopes from

town concert. Nearly 15,000 came.
Kindler gives them soloists like
glamorous Jessica Dragonette,
smoldering Elsie Houston, and
those soprano lovelies, Lucy Mon-
roe and Virginia Johnson. He also
gives them Beethoven, Brahms
Dvorak, Strauss, and Mozart.

Everybody Goes
If you went there tonight, you
might see President Roosevelt and
a White House party. You would
see senators and diplomats and
dollar-a-year tycoons—and their
ladies. You would see local trades-
men trying to shush their kids and
keep them from strewing the pic-
nic boxes all over the lawn.

And if it's a night when there's
a guest conductor, you would see
him, genial Hans Kindler, moving
from place to place among the
throngs, listening not to the music
he knows by heart, but to the mur-
mur of the crowd and making men-

of wine, who will be called upon to
pay 5 cents a case on all wine dis-
tributed in North Carolina.

While the Tar Heel distributors
of beer contribute to their organi-
zation, principal prop is the money
put by nationally known brewers.

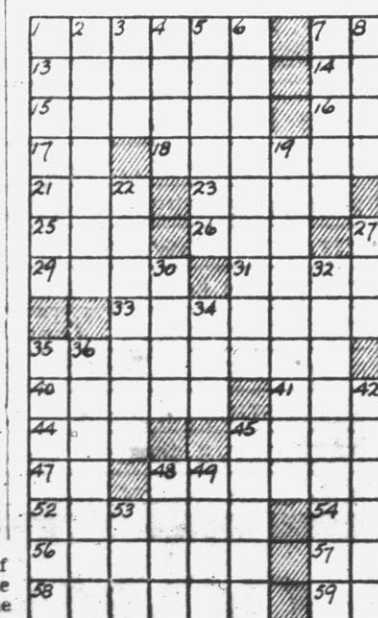

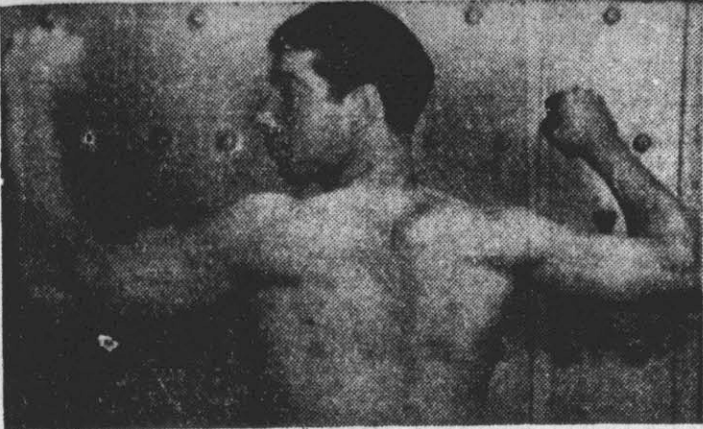

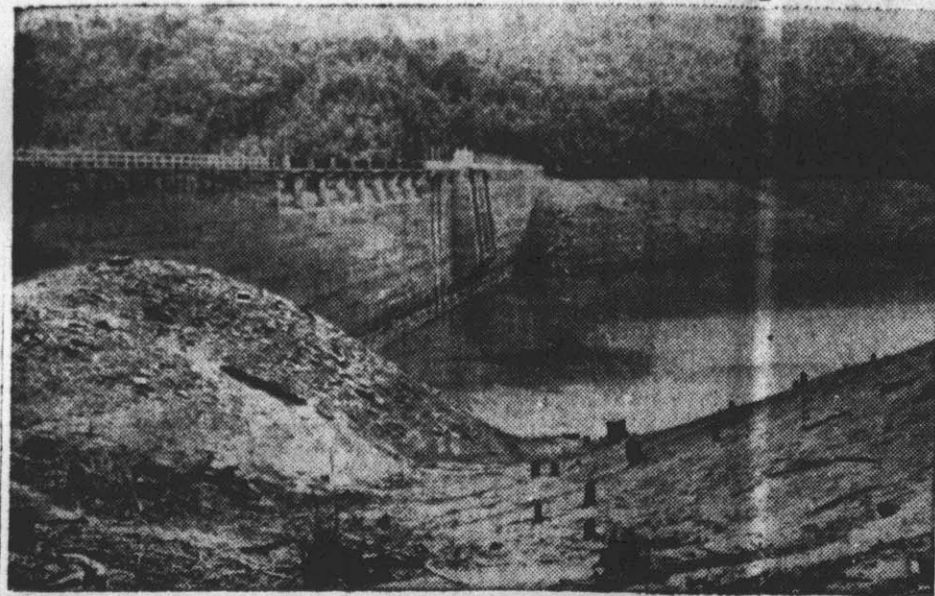
