NAZIS DEAL STAGGERING BLOWS TO REDS

COMPANY TOLD
MAKE DECISION
BY TOMORROW

Ultimatum Dispatched To Illinois Ammunition Plant

RECOGNITION OF UNION INVOLVED

North American Aviation Company Is Turned Back To Owners; Union Plans Test On WPA Workers

The Defense Mediation Board today set a time limit, 5 p. m., EST, tomorrow, for the management of Western Cartridge Company, Alton, Ill., to accept or reject the board's recommendation that it recognize the AFL Chemical Workers Union for its smokeless powder workers, and thus avert a strike set for next Sunday.

Ralph Eward, board secretary served this notice on John Olin, vice president of the firm, which holds about \$100,000,000 in defense orders for small arms ammunition. The board's recommendation was made Saturday.

The board has declared that the sole issue is whether the company shall recognize the AFL union as bargaining agent for some 550 employees in the Alton plant's smokeless powder division. There are 6,500 workers in all at the plant. The union was certified by the National Labor Relations Board, but the company has signified its intention of withholding recognition until the NLRB order has been appealed to the courts. An independent union representing other workers has waived its claim to jurisdiction over the smokeless powder division.

President Roosevelt turned back to the owners the North American Aviation Company plant at Inglewood, Calif., and the last remaining detachment of 1,500 soldiers was relieved from further duty after final settlement of the CIO-called strike there. The soldiers took over the plant June 9, and broke a strike.

In a strike which union leaders termed a national test on the use of WPA labor at sub-unit wages, the AFL Building Trades Council at St. Louis instructed between 1,500 and 2,000 workmen today to stay away from their jobs on a \$4,000,000 construction project at Jefferson barracks.

W.F. Owens to Attend Meeting In Charlotte

W. F. Owens of the local post office will leave tomorrow for Charlotte to attend a convention of the North and South Carolina Federation of Post Office Clerks. Mr. Owens is vice president of the North Carolina division.

The convention will get under way with a meeting of the executive committee, of which the local man is a member, tomorrow night. The sessions will continue through Friday and Saturday, upon conclusion of which Mr. Owens will leave for Carolina Beach to join his family for a vacation.

Banks Here To Close Two Days For Fourth

Officials of the three banks in Greenville announced today that the institutions would observe a July Fourth holiday both on Friday and Saturday of this week.

County offices also will be closed on both days, as will the Reflector and possibly numerous other offices.

326 Registered

A total of 326 Pitt county men who reached their 21st birthday between October 16—date of the first registration under the Selective Service program—and July 1 were registered by the two Pitt county boards yesterday.

In addition Board Number Two registered three who were supposed to have registered last October but failed to do so.

The registration was carried out by the staffs of the two boards.

The total registered yesterday was below estimates, it having been predicted that approximately 400 would be subject to registration.

COTTON STAMP PLAN STARTED

Merchants Are Advised How to Redeem Certificates

Merchants selling 100 per cent American grown, processed, and manufactured cotton products in Pitt county will shortly be in line for increased business from farmers participating in the Supplemental Cotton Program of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. In pointing this out, Mr. O. P. Matthews, chairman of the Cotton Industry Committee added that all merchants should be thoroughly familiar with the rules and regulations governing the operation of the Program before accepting or redeeming Cotton Stamps.

"All retail merchants handling new cotton products in Pitt county who have registered with, and received acknowledgment from the Surplus Marketing Administration, are eligible to take part in the program and benefit from this additional business," he said.

Mr. Matthews said that "After the merchant accepts the Cotton Stamps in the prescribed manner for 100 per cent American Cotton products, he pastes them on Stamp Cards supplied by the Surplus Marketing Administration. He then signs a statement on these cards that his store has accepted the stamps in accordance with the Government rules and regulations, and forwards them to the Surplus Marketing Administration for redemption. He should receive a United States Government check within a week in payment of his claim."

"Any merchant who misuses the stamps," cautioned Mr. Matthews, "will be in the unfortunate position of having made a false claim against the United States Treasury. This is a serious Federal violation which however, can be easily avoided by simply adhering to the regulations. The main thing is to accept Cotton Stamps from eligible farm participants only for new cotton products made entirely from new cotton that has been grown, processed, and manufactured in the United States."

Producers should not come to the County Office for Cotton Stamps until they are notified.

Correction

Sticks By Statement Regarding Nazi Sea Menace

Washington, July 2.—(AP)—Secretary Knox flatly stated today that no American vessels on Atlantic patrols had engaged in convoying, had become involved in combat, had suffered any loss of life in their crews or any loss of equipment.

The question of patrol was raised at a press conference at which the navy chief also was interrogated about criticism in Congress of his demand this week that the United States seize on the present moment to sweep "the German menace" from the Atlantic.

Repeatedly, the secretary declined to reply to the criticisms or to say whether the speech in which he made the demands had presidential or cabinet approval.

At length, however, when asked whether it would "be fair to say that you are sticking by your guns on the speech," Knox boomed:

Senator Wheeler (D-Mont) said yesterday that Knox should be removed from office for making such a speech.

Russians Pleased With U.S. Attitude

Moscow, July 2.—(AP)—The Soviet government expressed satisfaction and gratitude to the United States today for recent American government statements of its stand on the Russian-German war.

S. A. Lozovsky, vice-commissioner of foreign affairs, acting as spokesman for the Kremlin, told a press conference that acknowledgment of declarations by President Roosevelt, Navy Secretary Frank Knox and Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles would be made both at Moscow and Washington.

City To Be Visited By Deputy Collector

WOULD RETAIN TEACHER LIST

Yelton Opposed To Reductions In Any School

Raleigh, July 2.—Any school officials or teachers who fear that the new executive secretary of the School Commission will adopt a hard-boiled attitude can calm down right away.

Nathan Yelton, successor to Lloyd Griffin as executive head of the business end of North Carolina's school system, speaks the same language and thinks very much like school folks. He ought to, having been a county superintendent for many years.

He hasn't settled yet in his new seat, but right off the bat he told your Raleigh reporter he is opposed to reducing the teaching staff of any Tar Heel school except where there is a very clear, cogent and convincing reason for so doing.

"In allotting teachers for the coming year, decreases in average daily attendance for 1940-41 due to epidemics should be heavily discounted," he said. "While it is true that there are many schools which would not rate an increase in number of teachers, it is obvious that no school has, under ordinary and normal circumstances been given more teachers than it should have had, or more than it will require this next year under normal circumstances."

The allocation of teachers will be the first serious problem before the new executive secretary. There are mathematical tables showing exactly how many teachers each school should have on the basis of last year's average daily attendance, but strict application of these formulae would result in unfair reductions in teacher force in many places, unless such things as unexpected and unlikely to repeat epidemics are taken into consideration and allowance for them made.

Youngsters who take advantage of the "Aluminum Matinee" to be held at the Pitt theatre Tuesday morning of next week will see a picture especially designed to appeal to boys and girls. Manager T. Y. Walker having announced today that he had secured "Cisco Kid and the Lady" starring Cesar Romero and Marjorie Weaver for the special showing.

Any child bringing one or more pieces of aluminumware will be admitted to the theatre. Aluminum collected will be turned over to the government through the Bundles for Britain organization here.

A nation-wide campaign is being conducted to collect old aluminum, a product vital to the manufacture of airplanes and one which faces a serious shortage in supply.

NIPPON POLICY BEING FORMED

May Seek To Maintain Both Soviet And Axis Ties

Tokyo, July 2.—(AP)—The Japanese government announced today that a "decision was being taken at an Imperial conference held this morning on important national policies to meet the current situation," but did not disclose immediately what course had been adopted.

The announcement was made after a cabinet conference at the imperial palace attended by Premier Prince Fumimaro Konoye, Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka and members of the high command. An authoritative outline of what some sources said may be regarded as Japan's course in international affairs, the diplomatic review today stressed efforts to settle the conflict with China, the strengthening of an East Asia sphere of co-prosperity, and observance of both Japan's Axis alliance and her neutrality pact with Soviet Russia.

Food Now Exempt From Sales Levy

J. C. Herring, deputy of the State Revenue Department who maintains an office in the State Patrol headquarters in the Municipal building here from 11:30 until 3:30 daily, except Mondays, today pointed out a major change in the sales tax law effective as of July 1.

The major change is the amendment extending exemptions to sales by retail merchants from 10 specified named articles of food to complete exemption for sales by retail merchants of all food and food products for human consumption.

The phrase food and food products, however, does not include malt or vinous beverages, soft or carbonated drinks, sodas or beverages such as ordinarily sold at drug stores.

Nor does the exemptions include prepared meals or food sold or served on or off the premises by restaurants, cafes, cafeterias, hotel dining rooms, drug stores or other places where prepared meals are sold or served.

Generally speaking, declared Mr. Herring, the exemption extends to all sales of food or food products sold by grocery stores.

Trophy Presented Local Lions Club

The Greenville Lions club was awarded a trophy at the recent state convention at Asheville for the best rounded activities program for the year by any club of less than 35 members.

Announcement of the award was made at last night's regular weekly meeting, at which the local delegates Withers Harvey, Frank Brown and George Wilkerson, made a report on the convention, which they described as a great success. Norman Trueblood of Hertford was named district governor for this area. The session was attended by approximately 500 Lions from all sections of the state.

U. S. Spending

Washington, July 2.—(AP)—The Treasury announced today it spent \$12,710,000,000, including \$6,948,000,000 for defense, in the last fiscal year. The expenditures were \$5,103,000,000 above income.

An official review of the fiscal year which ended Monday night showed huge increases in both expenditures and revenues over the preceding year, but made no mention of the program for the new year, which includes \$22,269,000,000 of anticipated spending as a result of the defense program.

USSR BELIEVED TO ANTICIPATE LONG CONFLICT

Anticipation Indicated By Move For Aid From U.S.

SOVIET ALREADY SHOPPING HERE

Many Believe Aid Will Be In Time If Reds Can Hold Out Until Fall Rains and Winter Weather

Washington, July 2.—(AP)—Soviet Russia indicated that it expected a long war today by proceeding with preliminary negotiations for the purchase of vital supplies in the United States.

Russia's decision to begin shopping here for such material that can be spared was looked upon by some in Washington as a Soviet expression of confidence that Russia, despite initial Nazi successes, would be able to halt Hitler's new blitzkrieg short of victory.

Informed officials here said that Russian representatives in this country are aware, with few exceptions, delivery on any purchases they make is bound to be long deferred. Because of this fact, they believe that the Russians were thinking in terms of a long-range program.

It was evident, these sources pointed out, that the excess supplies now available for Soviet purchase were too negligible to exert any tangible effect on the present tide of battle, and furthermore, it would take the materials too long to get to Russia.

If the Red army is able to stabilize the eastern front in time to take advantage of the fall rains and the Russian winter, some sources thought that American arms production might be able to supply help to the Soviet in a limited degree before spring offensive time in 1942.

AUTHOR FOUND DEAD IN HOTEL

Tar Heel In Mexico City On Guggenheim Fellowship

Mexico City, July 2.—(AP)—Here on a Guggenheim fellowship to write a book about life in the south, W. J. Cash, 40, recently an associate editor of the Charlotte, N. C., News, was found hanged last night in his hotel room.

He was author of the widely-read book "The Mind of the South."

He and Mrs. Cash, to whom he was wed last Christmas day, arrived here last month.

Plans were made today for the cremation of the body.

Ambassador and Mrs. Joseph Daniels immediately upon learning of Cash's death, extended personal condolence to the widow and offered her the hospitality of the embassy residence until she returns by airplane to Charlotte.

Reared in Cleveland county, N. C., Cash was educated at Wake Forest college and at Wofford college at Spartanburg, S. C. In 1923 he was an instructor in English in Georgetown college in Kentucky and later taught English and French at the Blurred school for boys at Hendersonville, N. C.

For a time in 1925 he was on the staff of the Chicago Post. The following year he worked on the Charlotte News, but left two years later and became editor of the Cleveland Press in Shelby, N. C. About 10 years ago he worked on the Baltimore Evening Sun.

Mrs. Cash said her husband had suffered from a nervous disorder as a result of the heavy strain of writing in the past few months before coming to Mexico.

Four Are Victims Of Hwy's Wreck

Warrenton, N. C., July 2.—(AP)—Four persons were killed and three others seriously injured when their automobile collided with a truck about a mile from here early today.

The sheriff's office here said all were Negroes.

One of the dead persons was identified by his driver's license as Cecil Ralph Bowe of New York city.

The three injured persons were taken to a hospital in Roanoke Rapids. One of them was tentatively identified as Carrie Hill of New York city. The other two were children, aged about 10 and 15.

The truck was only slightly damaged and the driver was not detained. The sheriff's clerk said the truck was from the Sandhills section of North Carolina and was carrying peaches to market.

High Command Reports Capture Of 100,000 Red Prisoners And "Immeasurable Booty"; In Contrast To German Claims Of Success, Moscow Declares Battle Raging On Main Front

Adolf Hitler's military juggernaut was declared to have dealt a bloody, staggering blow to Russia today with the smashing of "a large part" of Soviet armies trapped east of Bialystok—estimated at 400,000 troops—and the capture of 100,000 Red Army prisoners.

In addition, the German high command announced that "immense booty" taken in the battle included 400 tanks and 300 field cannon seized or destroyed.

Moscow, July 2.—(AP)—The Soviet Russian cabinet ordered general, compulsory training of civilians today for air and gas defense.

The order applied to all men between the ages of 16 and 60 and women from 18 to 50 years old.

Far to the north, Russia's ice-free Arctic port of Murmansk was reported to have been in German hands since yesterday, according to a Reuters dispatch from Stockholm.

While gigantic battles raged on land, the British radio reported that units of the Russian Black sea fleet shelled and destroyed the German-occupied naval base at Constanta, on the Rumanian coast.

The Berlin radio quoted the Nazi high command as saying that German troops had "smashed strong Soviet forces in the area of Kaniava and captured their entire arms and equipment, including 94 armored cars, 250 guns, 28 anti-aircraft guns, 81 tanks and 500 machineguns. The Germans claimed the capture of Korna, the capital of Sovietized Lithuania, on Sunday.

Russian troops were described as retreating on a wide front, suffering heavy casualties under the strafing of the Nazi Luftwaffe, while German and Finnish armies rolled across the USSR from Finland in a new drive toward Leningrad, Russia's second biggest city.

A German war bulletin asserted the Red armies were falling back east of Lwow, in former Poland, and east of German-captured Minsk, the capital of White Russia, and were retreating toward Estonia.

"Speaking of that song of mine," said Henry to Marie. "I've got some others. I used to write them during odd times. Maybe we can make some of them go over like the one you sang."

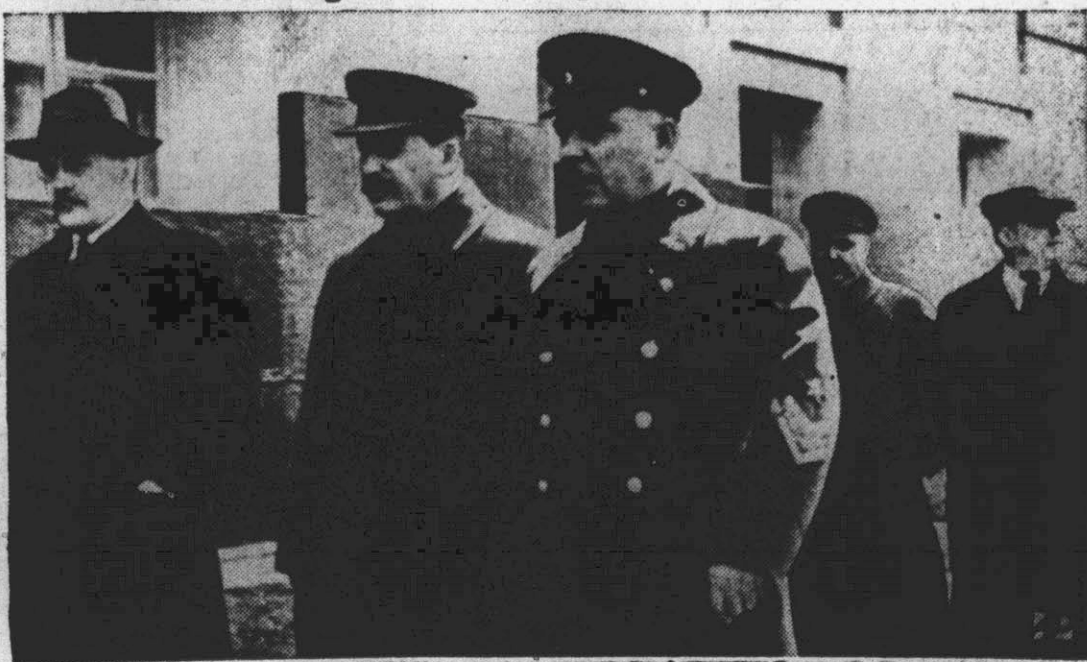
"We'll keep them in mind," said Marie. "I've got big plans for my radio career, and maybe some day I'll be coming to you for material."

HITLER AND RUSSIA

(Industrial News Review)

As one news commentator
put it, Stalin is the last and
most impressive example of the
utter folly of trying to
appease the one-time Vien-
nese house painter who has
become master of a contin-
ent. The Russians, obvious-
ly afraid, did everything in
their power to mollify the
Nazis. They signed a non-
aggression and collaboration
pact. They agreed to deliver
to Germany considerable
quantities of vital raw mate-
rials. According to reliable
writers, they permitted Ger-
man technicians to come into
Russian industry in an at-
tempt to speed up produc-
tion and transport. They did
nothing to prevent any of
Hitler's territorial acquisi-
tions. But all this was not
enough. And the oft-given
warnings of Winston Church-
ill at last came true—when
Hitler was ready he struck
at Russia, despite the pact,
despite all pledges of friend-
ship.

Hitler's spoken reasons
for war against the Soviet
are his usual ones—he
claimed that Russia had not
lived up to her agreements,
that Russian agents were
seeking the downfall of the
Reich, and that he was sim-
ply acting to save Europe
from the blight of Commun-
ism. No one believes that
these reasons amount to
more than an easy alibi for
the wanton breakage of an
other treaty. Russia has in
abundance what Hitler most
sorely lacks—grain, to feed
the German people; oil, to
propel the German war ma-

chine. And, on top of that, if
Russia could be destroyed as
a military power, Hitler
would no longer have to fear
attack from the East. He
could then concentrate all of
his weapons for the final as-
sault on the British Isles.

It is clear to anyone that
Hitler has taken a gigantic
gamble. Russia, as Napoleon
found out, has been the
graveyard of empire before.
It is a vast land, and much
of it is geographically and
climatically unfriendly. In
the Little Corporal's phrase,
"Empires die of indigestion."
And Russia is the biggest
bite that any conqueror
could attempt. Hitler cer-
tainly must have felt there
was no other solution to his
problems before deciding to
give the marching order to
his legions along the 1,500-
mile front that extends from
Narvik to the Carpathians.

From the military point of
view, you can find about any
opinion on the quality of the
Russian army, you want.
Russia gives out few figures
concerning the Red army.
However, it is generally be-
lieved that at least 12,000-
000 men have been given
military training and that,
fully mobilized, her regular
army, plus reserves, would
total 5,000,000 or more. Es-
timates place her air force
at 9,000 planes, though there
is doubt as to their quality.
It is known that she has gi-
gantic quantities of tanks,
motorized artillery and other
mechanical arms, but,
again, many think them of
poor quality by comparison
with the Nazis' tools of de-
struction. Of all the nations,
Russia and this country are
the nearest to being self-sus-
taining, so far as resources
are concerned. However,
Russian industry has been
notoriously inefficient, and
so she cannot make the most
of what she possesses.

Even so, she is a tremen-
dous antagonist for any pow-
er. And it is known that dur-
ing the last year Stalin has
been working feverishly to
overhaul his forces. The
morale-destroying political
commissars who were sta-
tioned with army units and
who had the power to over-
rule commanding officers,
have been largely abolished.
In truth, the Russian army
has been reorganized much
on the lines of capitalist arm-

ies. The poor Soviet transpor-
tation system may delay full
mobilization for a month or
more. But as time wears on,
and if Hitler is not able to
defeat Russia in a hurry, the
Germans should find this
campaign the most difficult
they have attempted.

Mr. Churchill's finely-
phrased speech of June 22
was of exceptional interest.
No statesman has been more
anti-communist—he has
fought the Soviet idea for 25
years. He said he would take
nothing back that he has
said before. But, he said, the
one aim of British policy now
is the complete destruction
of Nazism. Therefore, he
added, England regards Rus-
sia as an ally, and will give
her all possible aid.

That is likely to be the at-
titude of our government,
though it may not be ex-
pressed so frankly. Wash-
ington doesn't trust Moscow,
and high officials have said
lately that defense strikes
were communist-inspired.
However, Mr. Roosevelt's
policy, like Mr. Churchill's,
is the overthrow of Hitler-
ism. In that endeavor, any

ally is welcomed, especially
so powerful a one as Russia.

If Hitler subdues Russia,
he will have all he needs—
the blockade will no longer
be important, and he will
have taken a long step to-
ward mastery of Asia as well
as Europe. If Hitler loses in
Russia, he will be finished.
The fate of much of the
world may be decided in the
wheat fields of the Ukraine,
and the oil lands of the Car-
pathians.

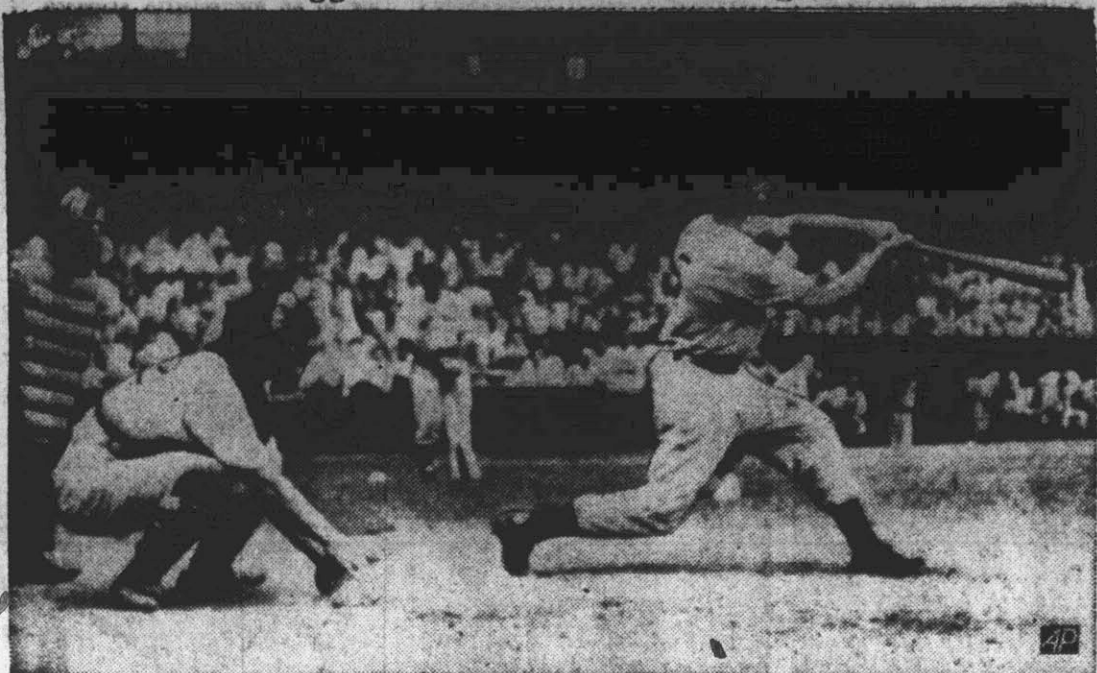

Raleigh, July 2.—He has personal problems enough to keep him occupied for perhaps a long, long time, but once he gets that wrinkle ironed out, Boddie Ward, the new Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, will likely give considerable attention to the setting up of a central records office for his department.

There is little doubt that this would be a step in the direction of economy and efficiency, as the present system of keeping the records of motor vehicles is definitely slipshod and even sloven.

As things now stand it is always a matter of doubt where to go for what records, there are so many different places in which seemingly closely related records are kept. And it's very easy, too, to go to the wrong place. For instance it would seem the natural thing to expect to get records of arrests by highway patrolmen from the highway patrol headquarters, but you don't—these records are kept by the highway safety division. Again, the motor vehicle division, would seem

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the proper place to go hunting for a record of driver's licenses issued; but again you'd be wrong if you tried it. Those records, too, are kept by the safety division.

And so it goes, even so far that if you really want any detailed records about activities of the highway patrol's activities you would probably have to go, not to the office of Major John Armstrong, patrol commander, but to the headquarters of the captain east or west.

A central records office would solve all that, and it would seem that such an office could be operated more economically as well as more efficiently than the present scattered many.

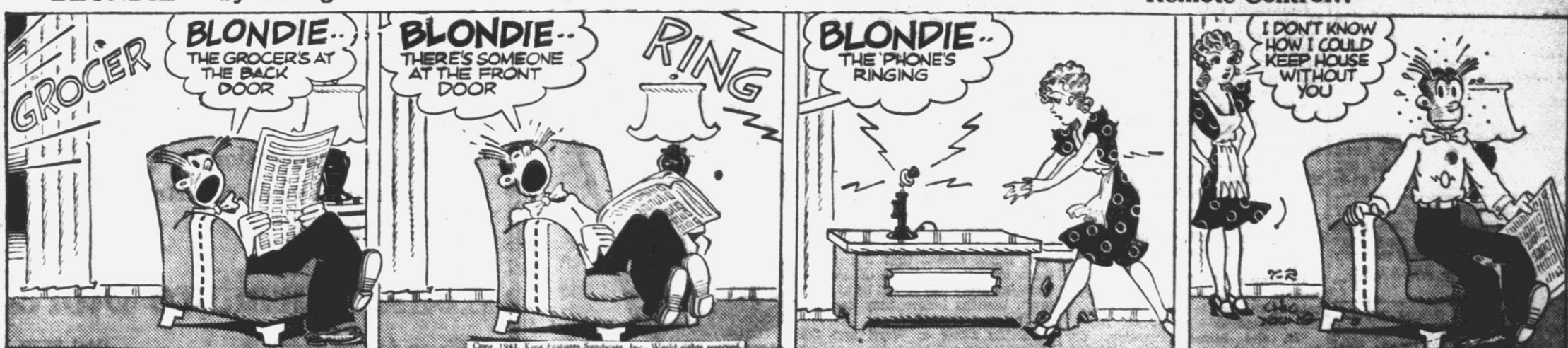

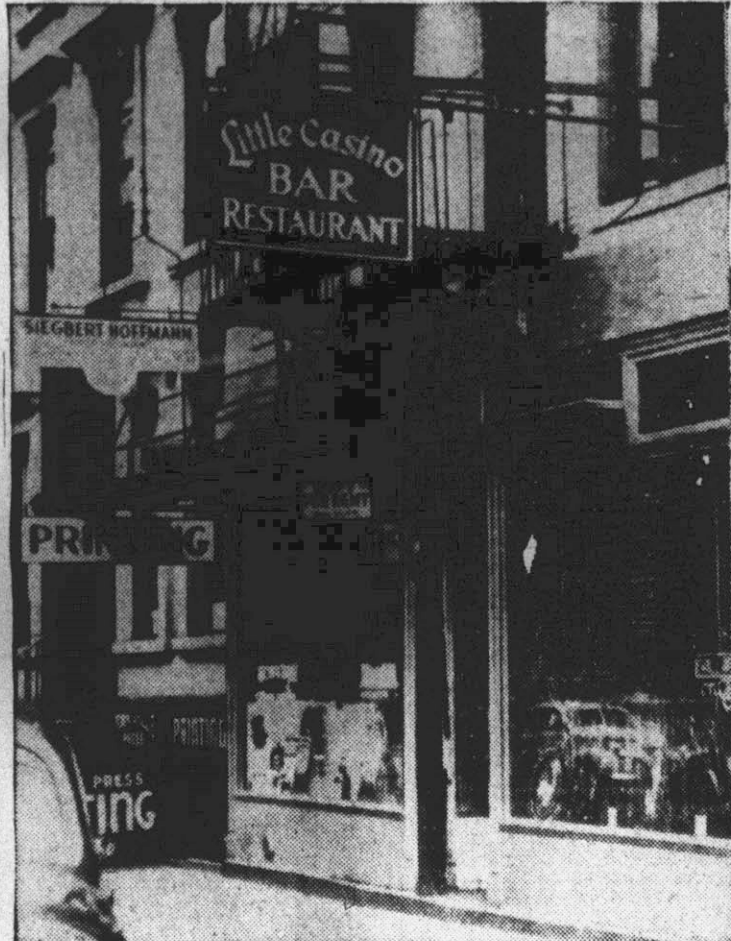
(Continued From Page One) The Black sea front was now becoming stabilized near the old Russian border.

In contrast to German claims of success, the Soviet high command told of the battle still raging along the Murmansk-Minsk-Luck front.

"In the Minsk direction, our troops developed fighting activities last night after having destroyed advance tank units of the enemy," the Russian communique said.

On the south end of the 2,000-mile battlefield, along the Prut river sector, the Russians reported that "all attempts by Rumanian and German troops to penetrate into Bessarabian territory" were being routed.

Two Government Agencies Are Formerly Organized

Raleigh, July 2.—Governor J. Melville Broughton wasn't in town and for the very first time couldn't get himself right square in the middle of every photograph, but just the same there was considerable pomp, not to mention circumstances, as Claude C. Abernathy and Boddie Ward embarked formally upon organization of new governmental agencies, the while Nathan Yelton and A. L. Fletcher took over the direction of old existing units.

Ward beat the others to the draw by being sworn in as Commissioner of Motor Vehicles on Monday. Abernathy took his oath as new burial association commissioner Tuesday, as Fletcher became officially the chairman of the Unemployment Compensation Commission and Yelton moved from his fifth floor post as public assistance director to his new third story office as secretary of the School Commission.

Rather oddly the two who now face the task of setting up brand new organizations are brand new themselves at the job of being state executives, while the two who step into going, smooth-working machines are old hands themselves at the business of heading state departments.

Which is by no means to say that Ward and Abernathy, the new men, have not had govt. experience—the Nash county man having been so long a member of the House of Representatives that it's going to be difficult to know the lower chamber with out him; while Ward has been a member of the Highway Commission for several years, in addition to having been connected with Senator Simmons in the days of long ago.

Abernathy has been at work in an office on the first floor of the new Supreme Court building, the sure the Probation Commission vacated its very hottest, on the task of getting ready to supervise and control the 297 mutual burial associations having more than a million members and operating all over the state.

He points out that he (1) hasn't much office space and is crowded into one room and (2) hasn't enough money to set up the kind of organization he'd like to have—but these are completely typical complaints to be heard from every new state bureau. It seems they work on something of a seniority basis—the freshman organizations getting cramped quarters and small appropriations, the other unit receiving somewhat better treatment.

The burial association regulatory unit will start with two field auditors, which means that if each of them inspects the books of one association every day it will be at least seven months before they can get all the way around.

Passing along to Ward and the Motor Vehicle Commission, another really tough job is found to be laying wait for a man generally regarded

ed as fully competent to handle it. Here there must be almost a completely revamping of an existing but far from smooth-functioning machine. Ward is going slow and makes no bones about saying so. Yelton and Fletcher will not have the same task as the heads of new bureaus; but both are going to be confronted with a by no means easy problem—each must get into the swing of a new sort of activity.

Taking everything into account, it appears that the four new men are four good men who will fill their new posts with general satisfaction.

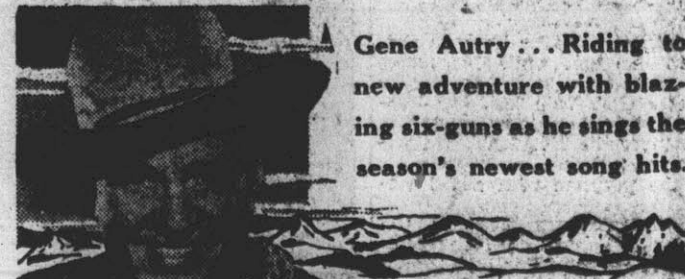
A Real Cleanup Welch, Okla.—(AP)—When the men of Welch were a little slow in pushing the civic clean-up project
