TOLL OF 4,000,000 RED TROOPS CLAIMED BY NAZIS

Jap Move In Thailand Seen As Threat To Singapore

ANTHONY EDEN LEADS DEBATE

British Foreign Secretary Declares Any Threat To Thailand Would Be of Immediate Interest To Britain And That Japanese Move Into Nation Would Comprise Threat To Singapore

London, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden declared in the House of Commons today that "anything which threatens the integrity or security of Thailand would be of immediate interest to Britain."

He said Britain was especially interested because a Japanese move into Thailand would be "threatening the security of Singapore."

"I hope," he added, "these words may yet be heeded."

Eden and Major Clement Atlee, government leader in Commons, spoke on all phases of the war from the Far East and the conflict in Russia to the battle of the Atlantic and United States aid. They plied hit for Prime Minister Churchill who was absent.

It was announced yesterday that the Prime Minister could not take part in the debate because, as Atlee said, he is too busy "with urgent matters connected with the war."

"Every fresh forward move on the part of Japan naturally has the result of bringing China and ourselves closer and closer together," said Eden. "The friendship and that collaboration with China will continue and I pray will grow."

Atlee praised Russia's "magnificent fight" which he said had completely foiled German expectations on a quick victory and caused a postponement, but not abandonment of plans for an invasion of the British Isles.

United States material aid is flowing to Britain in a stream it never approached in the world war he declared, and terrific blows have been dealt Axis naval forces and shipping.

Veto Over-riden

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The Senate over-ride today President Roosevelt's veto of a \$320,000,000 road program.

The vote was 57 to 19. A two-thirds majority in both houses is necessary to over-ride a veto. The veto now will be considered by the House.

Rendezvous

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Rumors were a dime a dozen today that President Roosevelt and Britain's Prime Minister Winston Churchill had a secret rendezvous, probably some place on the high seas.

The reports were characterized by varying details, a complete lack of substantiation, and official denials. But they refused to down.

To some, the flurry was reminiscent of the melodramatic pre-Munich stories that President Roosevelt intended to hold a mid-Atlantic parley with Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini in the Czechoslovakian crisis.

The commonest version of today's rumors had Mr. Roosevelt, Churchill, Prime Minister MacKenzie King and Harry L. Hopkins gathering for a momentous conference on the problems arising from the war and American aid to nations resisting the Axis.

The rendezvous was variously given. Some said it was at sea, others that it was in Canada. Iceland, Greenland and Newfoundland also figured as likely spots. The mention of Canada conjured up the picture of Churchill and Hopkins being ferried across the Atlantic by bomber for the meeting.

REDS GETTING U.S. SUPPLIES

Amount And Details Guarded As Military Secrets

Washington, August 6.—(AP)—The United States, it was learned today, has unfrozen "billions of dollars worth of Soviet orders in this country and presumably the flow of American supplies to the fighting Russians already has begun."

Amounts and details were undisclosed on the ground they were military secrets, but officials indicated they constituted an important beginning.

Carrying out the formal pledge this week to grant unlimited licenses and priority assistance on Russian orders, "upon the principles applicable to the orders of countries struggling against aggression," the government authorized the export of large amounts of materials long on order in this country.

How they were moving to Russia also was unrevealed, but the United States has promised "favorable consideration" to Russian requests for the extension of available American shipping facilities, presumably for transport across the Pacific to Vladivostok.

In addition, Russia was said to have eight to 10 vessels normally operating between American ports and Vladivostok.

Farmers Being Urged Convert Feeder Pigs

Raleigh, August 6.—Because of the favorable price situation expected this fall, E. V. Vestal, swine specialist of the N. C. State College Extension Service, today urged farmers to utilize their feed crops fully in converting feeder pigs into pork as quickly as possible.

After floundering near bottom for the past few years, hog prices have perked up in response to the national defense program and the lend-lease act providing supplies for the British.

Vestal explained that corn is too expensive to be fed alone and should be supplemented with a mixture of fish meal or tankage and cottonseed meal. The proteins should be mixed in equal proportions by weight.

"While the swine industry in North Carolina is small as compared with that of the corn belt states," Vestal said, "it furnishes a part of the food supply of every farm family, and the income from cash sales is of considerable importance."

Prices Continue Very Strong On Georgia-Florida Auction Centers As Tobacco Market Goes Into Second Day; Bulk Of Tobacco At Most Places Declared To Be Moving At About 25-Cent Level

Valdosta, Ga., Aug. 6.—(AP)—Bright leaf tobacco prices continued strong in the Georgia-Florida auction markets today, with indications of even better price averages than the 22-26 cents range established in the first sales.

At Moultrie, Sales Supervisor C. E. Isom pointed out the average of 22.35 cents established yesterday, when 519,002 pounds sold for \$116,012.79 was a gain of almost five cents a pound over the opening day average of 17.59 in 1940.

Bulk of second day sales in Pelham were moving around 25 cents, warehousemen said, a little better than the opening average of 23 cents set on 251,094 pounds which sold for \$57,695.17.

Robert Herring said so much leaf was on hand at Tifton for opening day that it would take two and a half days to sell it all. There the price range equalled the 23.36 of yesterday, when 698,856 pounds sold for \$162,575.98.

At Nashville, Sales Supervisor Frank Park, Jr., reported a range up to 36 cents, with most second-day baskets going around 27 cents. At Baxley, Warehouseman Barnes reported the bulk of sales around 26 cents, with the top there today at 37 cents.

North State Fund Meeting Success

Two days ago, in reporting contributors to the Old North State fund from the Carolina Township district, several names were accidentally omitted. L. R. Whitchard, V. Carson, J. S. James, J. L. Corey, W. T. Warren, Brown Harrison, J. L. Perkins, and Julian Perkins should have been on the original list. Dr. T. G. Basnight who is chairman for this part of the county has completed his canvass with his quota being exceeded.

In Greenville, the dollars and cents figures are not yet available but Professor R. C. Deal says that he expects at least the minimum of \$650 to be in the treasurer's hands within a few days. Jake Hadley, Phil Goodson, Dr. A. M. Shultz, Mrs. Lee Hannah, George Gardner, and Dave Whitchard have finished with their collections and 18 others are expected to finish up in a day or two. Mr. Deal asks that people not contacted by one of the committeemen call him or any other local worker.

The Old North State fund is organized for the purpose of buying and equipping a Grumman amphibian airplane ambulance as a gift to the English people from the people of North Carolina. Communities in all parts of the State are working to raise the \$75,000 necessary to buy this "mercy plane." Pitt county's quota is \$1250.

PREPARE VOTE ON STRIKE BY R. R. WORKERS

Mail Ballots To Be Sent To 1,200,000 Employees

WAGE INCREASES FLATLY DENIED

Construction Work at Ohio Ordnance Plant Slowed Down By Strike Of AFL Carpenters Union

(By The Associated Press) Strike ballots were being prepared today for immediate transmittal to 1,200,000 railroad workers whose demands for wage increases have been rejected by the carriers.

Representatives of the five operating brotherhoods and 14 non-operating unions, meeting in Chicago, predicted that the result of the mail vote would be known in from a week to 30 days.

In rejecting the wage demands, the carriers conference committee, which has been meeting with the union men, declared the nation's railroads would be unable to pay the requested boosts, which the management estimated would total \$800,000,000 a year.

Members of the operating brotherhoods—engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen and switchmen—asked 30 per cent increases for 350,000 members. The other 14 unions sought raises of 30 to 34 cents an hour. The average scale of non-operating railroad employees was listed as 67.4 cents an hour. The lowest current wage among the operating men was said to be \$5.06 a day for switch tenders.

Construction work at the \$40,000,000 Plum Brook ordnance plant at Sandusky, Ohio, slowed toward a prospective week-end standstill as 675 American Federation of Labor carpenters prolonged their work stoppage, began Saturday as a result of a wage dispute with contractors. Nearly half of the 3,100 construction workers were made idle yesterday by the carpenters' absence, and an army spokesman predicted the work would have to be halted completely by the week-end unless the strike is settled. The carriers are asking a 25 cents increase in the hourly \$1.12 1-2 wage scale.

Aluminum Removed To Depot In Edenton

The large pile of aluminum collected in Pitt county under the round-up campaign headed by J. B. Kittrell, county chairman, was removed to Edenton today and was placed in the district depot there to be turned over to the federal government.

A large truck was practically filled by the metal.

Persons who have travelled throughout the state declared that the pile of metal collected here was as large or larger, in proportion to the size of the city, than any seen anywhere.

Starting off with a few pots and pans, the pile mounting to increase in size as public-spirited citizens continued to add their contributions up until late yesterday.

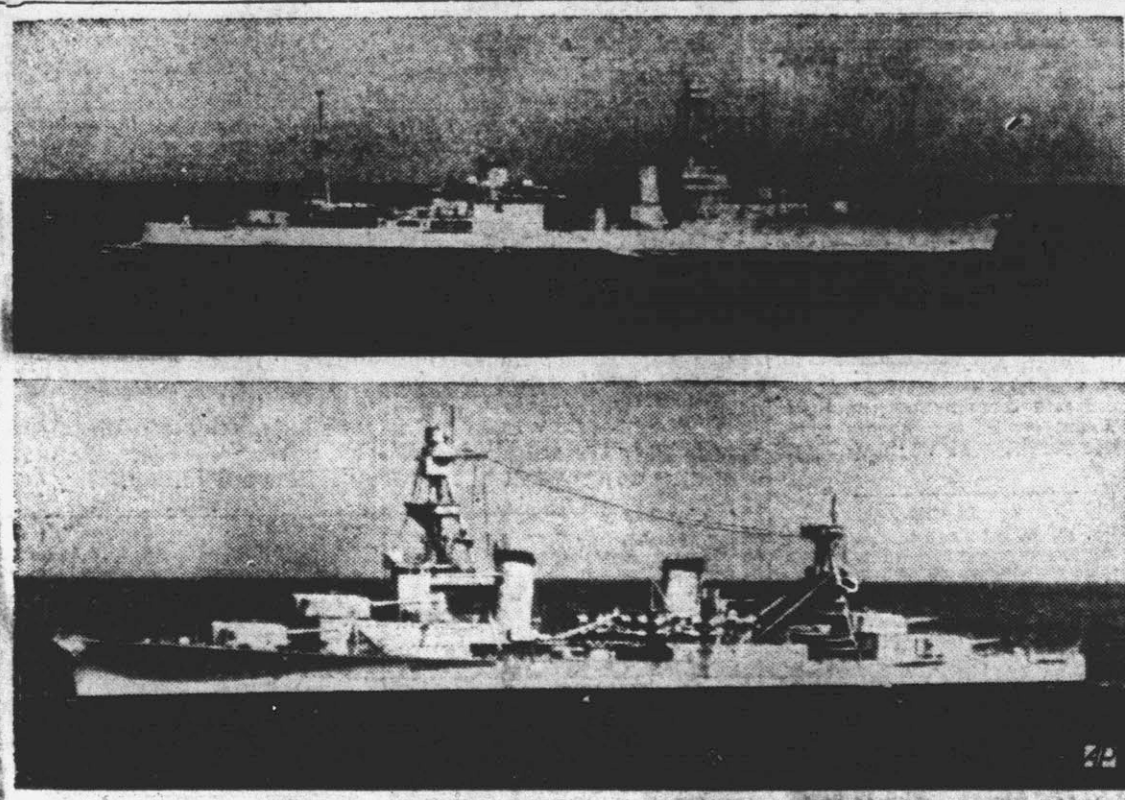
Marketing Regulations For Tobacco Announced

Raleigh, August 6.—Flue-cured tobacco marketing regulations for the 1941-42 marketing year have been announced by Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard, and indicate only one major change from last year's regulations. It was announced today by David T. House, Pitt county tobacco farmer and member of the State AAA committee.

The change sets up a different method of handling non-warehouse sales of both leaf and scrap tobacco. Otherwise, the regulations are basically the same as last year.

Each sale of tobacco other than by warehouse auction sale is to be recorded on a "bill of non-warehouse sale," which is to be prepared by the buyer and the farmer at the time the leaf is sold, Mr. House said.

RAF BOMBERS FIND TARGETS

Encounter Bad Weather To And From Germany

London, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Dogged by bad flying weather on its way to and from western Germany, a large force of British bombers found clear skies over Mannheim, Frankfurt and Karlsruhe last night and unloaded explosives with conspicuous success, the Air Ministry said today.

Other bombers raided Aachen and Ostend during the night and a Beaufort plane of the coastal command was credited with scoring a pair of direct hits on a German supply ship at Mantes.

From these operations nine planes are missing, the Ministry said.

The Beaufort pilot was quoted by the Air Ministry as saying a dense pillar of smoke rose 150 feet above the supply ship, which he described as 400 feet long.

German planes were reported striking back at England by day.

Some raiders were said to have been sighted over the south coast after noon.

Rings and Pocketbook Pumped Up In Sand

Two rings and an empty pocketbook were pumped up at John G. Clark's sandpile on the Tar river the articles having been found yesterday by a colored woman, it was reported by L. P. Lawrence, who lives near the scene and often aids in the pumping operations.

One of the rings contained an Odd Fellows design, but it was not believed to have been such an expensive ring.

Negro Private And Military Officers Are Victims

Fayetteville, August 6.—(AP)—A gun battle aboard a private bus operating between Fayetteville and Fort Bragg early today left a white military policeman and a Negro soldier dead and another white military policeman seriously wounded.

The dead:

M. P. Sergeant Edwin L. Hargraves, 20, of Corsicana, Texas.

Private Ned Turman, 27, of Ashton, S. C., a Negro selectee attached to Battery C, 76th Coast Artillery.

Of the six injured in the affray M. P. Private First Class, Allen E. Katzman, 22, of Sheridan, Pa., was the most seriously hurt. He received shot wounds in the neck and back.

Col. C. D. B. Elliott, post commandant, announced he would appoint a board of inquiry immediately and that, meanwhile, he had instructed the military police to refrain from commenting on the shooting.

Detective Roy Godwin of the Fayetteville police department said that in a scuffle between Turman and Hargraves the latter was shot and killed.

Then, Godwin said, M. P. Sergeant Russell Owens, 25, of Hartley, Kas., came into the bus and shot Turman.

Some 25 to 30 Negroes, Godwin said, were aboard the bus, en route to Fort Bragg after abbreviated leaves. A number of shots rang out during the melee, Godwin said, and most of the wounded were hit accidentally.

Godwin said 500 or 600 persons gathered at the scene and immediately cancelled all leaves of Negro soldiers in the city and they were rounded up. The soldiers were paid Monday.

Additional Marts Provide Service

Washington, August 6.—(AP)—The Agriculture Department announced today that tobacco inspection service would operate this marketing season in 12 flue-cured markets in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia.

The department said the tobacco inspection service was favored in grower referendum by more than 78 per cent of tobacco growers voting as patrons of markets at Danville, Va.; Reidsville, Robersonville, Williamson, Tarboro and Fuquay Springs-Virginia, all North Carolina; Dillon, Loris and Timmonsville, all South Carolina; and Hahira, Metter and Statesboro, Georgia.

The department said a referendum would be held for three "one sucker" markets in Kentucky and Tennessee in September, and for 27 burley markets in Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, Indiana and Missouri early in October.

The tobacco inspection service now operates at 16 burley markets in Kentucky, Tennessee, Ohio, Virginia and West Virginia.

CONCERN FELT AT JAP MOVES

Nippon Intentions In Thailand Of Interest To U. S.

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull said today that Japanese intentions toward Thailand and the southwest Pacific area were a matter of increasing concern to the United States government.

This government has made clear, he told a press conference, its vital interests and opposition to any moves of conquest in the Pacific and elsewhere. This, he added, applies to Thailand.

Referring especially to indications that Japan already was demanding military concessions in that independent state, Secretary Hull said the government here viewed these with increasing concern.

He expressed the interest of the United States in the integrity and independence of Thailand by referring to previous statements of policy regarding the southwest Pacific.

A Japanese move into Thailand, Secretary Hull made clear, would be considered a step menacing American security and endangering American territory in the Pacific.

Picture Red Leadership As Befogged

Hitler's Headquarters Pictures In Detail Claimed Successes On Three Decisive Points; Russians Reported By Moscow However, To Be Resisting Nazi Thrusts On Entire 2,000-Mile Front

(By The Associated Press) Destruction of 4,000,000 Red army troops — killed, wounded and captured — was claimed by the Germans today, but in a rapid-fire series of bulletins the Nazi high command again made no specific report of new gains or capture of important cities, and the Russians said they were meeting the new German thrust in the Ukraine with smashing counter-attacks.

Dispatches from Moscow compared Soviet counter blows with those which hurled back the Nazis on the central Smolensk front guarding Moscow, last week.

Headed by a barrage of trumpets the Berlin radio proclaimed to the German people a vast new slaughter of Russia's army, with Adolf Hitler's field headquarters announcing the capture of 895,000 Russian prisoners and the destruction or capture of 13,145 armored cars and tanks, 10,388 guns and 9,682 planes.

DNB, the official German news agency, estimated the number of Soviet dead alone at 3,000,000.

Hitler's headquarters detailed at length what it described as lunges through the Soviet defense system at "three decisive points," south of the Pinsk marshes, in the Smolensk sector on the road to Moscow, and south of Lake Peipus below Leningrad.

The German war bulletin asserted that the bloody three-weeks-old battle of Smolensk had now ended victorious for Nazi invasion forces driving toward the Soviet capital.

In the south, the Nazi war review asserted that German, Hungarian and Slovak troops had smashed forward "to the gates of Kiev," capital of the Soviet Ukraine.

By contrast, Russia's Vice Foreign Commissar S. A. Lozovsky reported that "the process of disintegration of the German army has begun," and that Hitler's blitzkrieg legions cracked "when the period of easy victories ended and the period of heavy losses began."

In one of the longest communications of the 46-day-old war with Russia, the German high command declared that "successes have been achieved which are surpassing the most optimistic expectations."

"Conscious of their superiority, the German armed forces are ready to begin on a new theatre of war the fight which was initiated by a number of gigantic victories," the Fuehrer's headquarters said.

There was no indication of what was meant by "a new theatre of war" but presumably it signalled that a big push deeper into the U. S. R. was about to begin.

Despite the intensity of attacks on the Leningrad front, in the deep-driven Smolensk salient, and the twin thrusts into the Ukraine, the Red army declared it was holding firm and, in some sections, driving home counter-attacks.

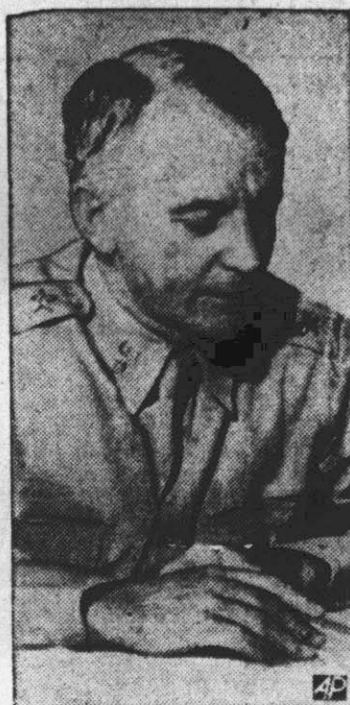

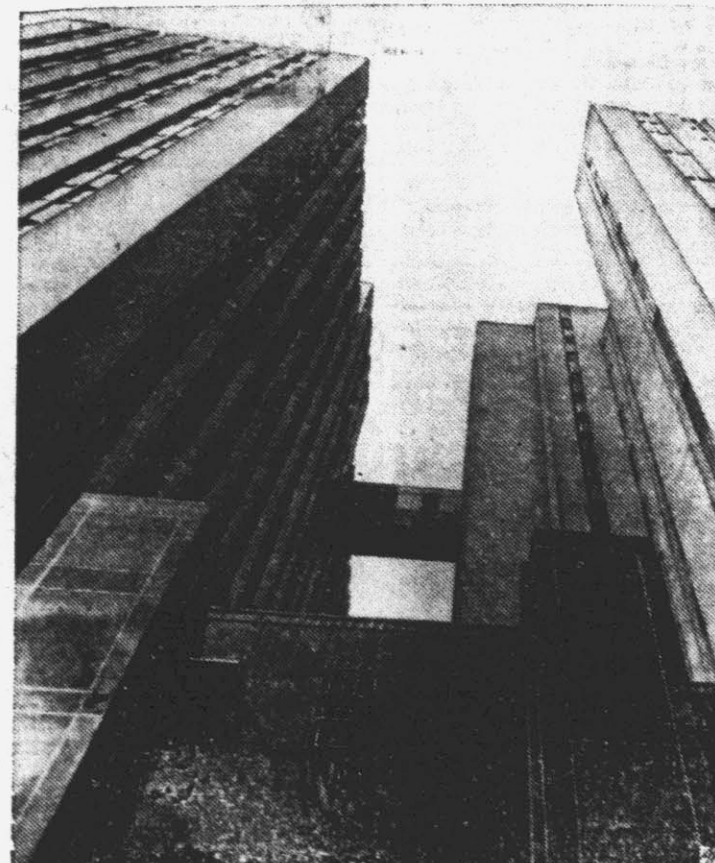

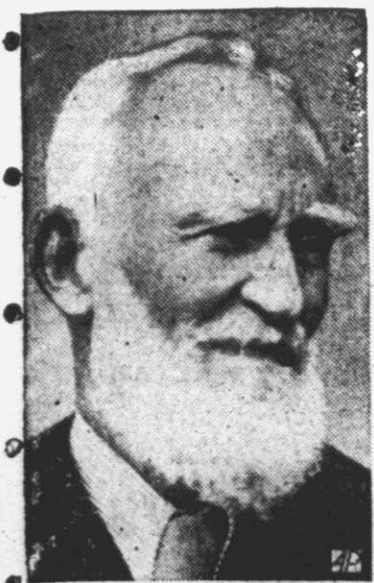

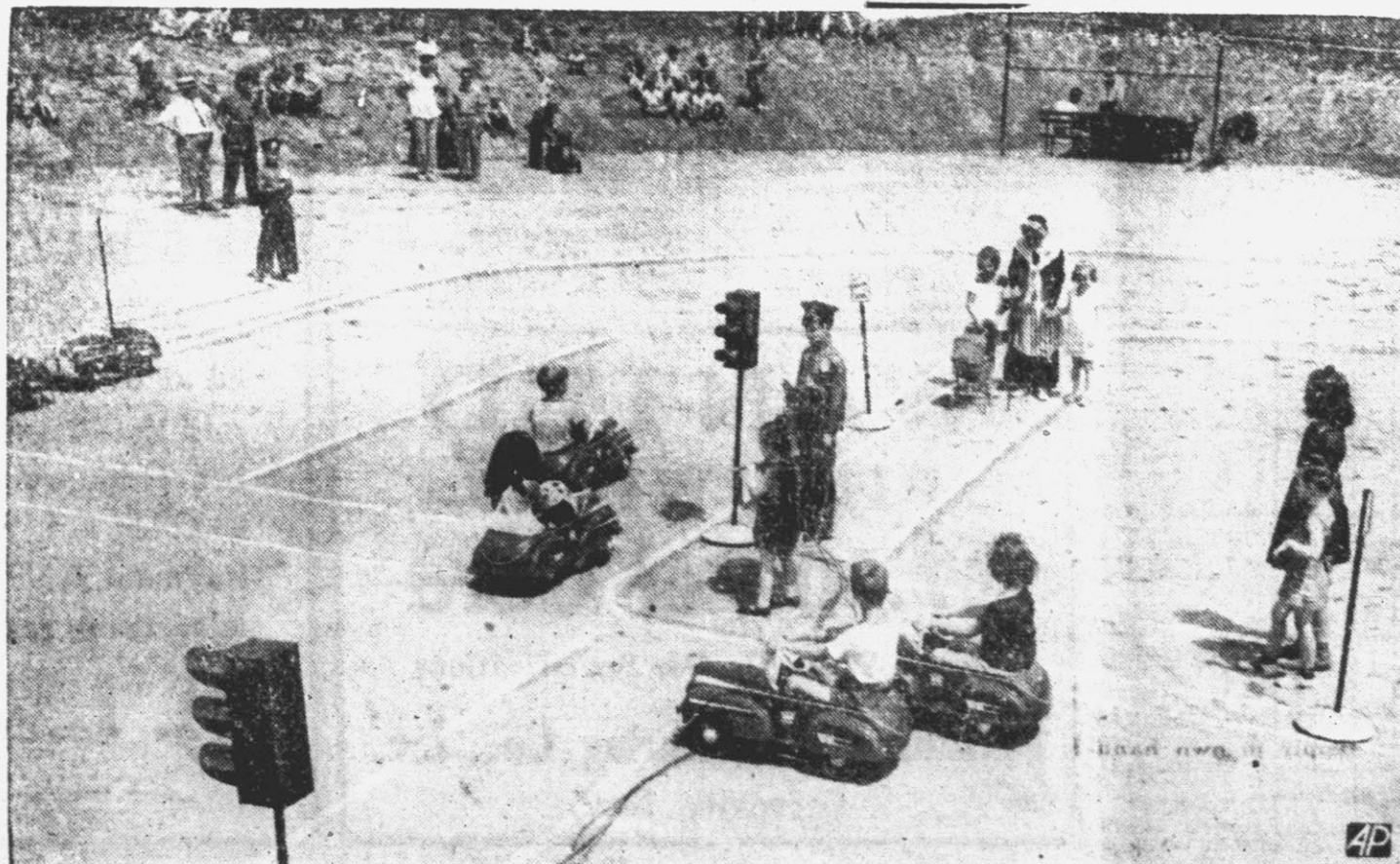

FOLLY OF CONCEIT.
Someone has said that self-con-
ceit is harder to cure than cancer.
That person who has no confidence
in himself flounders about in life
and gets nowhere, but the man who
has too much confidence in him-
self runs down every blind alley
he sees and ends his days in ridicu-
lous failure.

St. Paul, in writing to the Ro-
mans, urged them not to be wise
in their own conceits. He knew full
well that if they were, they would
be wise in nothing else. They
would live in the fool's paradise of
exaltation. They would sit on the
edge of the perennial spring of
knowledge and never have sense
enough to turn around and take a
drink. They would miss all the
teaching life affords because they
would forever be fascinated with
the echo of their own voices.

Conceit is selfishness operating
in the realm of opinion. It is the
gathering of the whole of life about
the core of self-esteem. The con-
ceited man puts himself at the cen-
ter of his own world, and no mat-
ter which way the planets are mov-
ing, he pretends to believe that
they are moving in an orbit around
him. "Seest thou a man wise in his
own conceit?" asked the writer of
the Book of Proverbs. "There is
more hope of a fool than of that
man." And good old Benjamin
Franklin, who looked deep into life

twinkle in it, once declared that he
who falls in love with himself will
have no rival.

ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

(Industrial News Review)

You don't have to be an
authority on international
power politics to figure out
why the Vichy government
invited Japan to occupy and
"protect" French Indo-
China. The Machiavellian
hand of Hitler can be clearly
seen in this potentially ex-
plosive move. The Vichy
government is completely a
pawn of the Axis. And Hit-
ler, who is now fighting the
two-front war which he al-
ways said he would avoid,
may profit materially from
trouble in the Pacific. So
long as the Japanese saber
rattlers remain in power and
pursue their imperial policy,
it will be necessary to keep
much of the American Navy
in the Pacific, and it will also
be necessary to divert much
of our Army and military
supplies to our Pacific pos-
sessions. It is altogether like-
ly that what Hitler would
like to see is a full-dress war
between Japan and the
United States, in order to
keep us from giving maxi-
mum aid to Britain.

This government's reaction
to Japan's move into
Indo-China was precisely
what was expected. We
have long been criticised for
permitting oil exports to the
Nipponese—and it is an
ironical fact that while we
have been giving our moral
support and some material
support to China, we have
also been supplying Japan
with most of the gasoline
that has made the war
against China possible. Pres-



ident Roosevelt, queried at a
press conference, said frank-
ly that the government had
permitted oil exports in the
belief that if we shut off
these vital supplies, Japan
would at once attempt to
seize Indo-China and other
rich areas, and so cause a
Pacific war of the first mag-
nitude. In other words, the
government was trying to
localize conflict. That policy
has now proven a failure. A
start toward an embargo on
all commerce with Japan
has been made, and Britain
and her possessions have fol-
lowed suit.

From now on, a Treasury
license will be needed to take
any Japanese assets out of
this country, or to send any-
thing of any kind to Japan.
As an AP dispatch said,
"The asset 'freezing' order
put the Treasury in a posi-
tion to turn the economic
screws on Japan. Just how
hard they will be applied
may depend on future events
in the Far East."

It is difficult to exagger-
ate the importance of the
economic whip we hold over
Hirohito's empire. Japan
buys the bulk of many vital
supplies from us. On top of
that, we have long been Ja-
pan's best customer. Most
experts believe that if Japan
loses the American market,
she will be in a desperate
economic position. So far as
we are concerned, our sales
to Japan are but a drop in
the bucket compared with
our total trade. We buy
nothing from Japan we can-
not do without. Mrs. Amer-
ica may have to forego silk
stockings in the future, and
use substitutes such as nylon,
but that can hardly be con-
sidered a great hardship.

From the purely military
point of view, Japan has
quite a job on her hands.
The war in China seems as
far from conclusion as ever,
and involves a tremendous
drain on Japanese resources—
men as well as materials.
Britain is no weakling in the
Far East, and the Churchill
government is taking as
tough a line with Japan now
as we are. In the event of
actual hostilities, full naval
collaboration between Eng-
land and the United States
will undoubtedly be imme-
diately effected. Some think
that this country should base
ships at the great Singapore

base now. There is little
doubt that Britain would
give enthusiastic permission
if the right to do this were
requested.

There is also talk to the
effect that Hitler may per-
suade Japan to attack Asi-
atic Russia. That too would
be a tough assignment. Rus-
sia is powerful in the East,
and the Japanese Army isn't
regarded too highly by the
military experts. However,
those who know the Japa-
nese character think it very
possible that the Nipponese
war lords may have finally
decided to shoot the works,
even if that eventually in-
volved national suicide, and
the reduction of Japan to
the status of a third-class
power.

yield?"

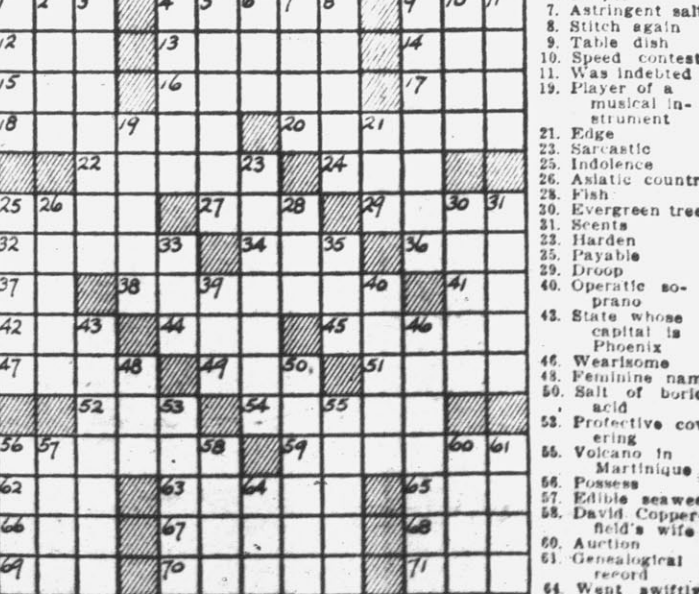

Raleigh, Aug. 6.—It seems that
those who thought Sheriff Victor
Meekins of Dare county was lucky
to get a \$300 a month job as sec-
retary of the Hatteras Seashore
Park Commission were very much
mistaken.

The Dare County Times, of
which Sheriff Meekins is himself
editor is authority for the state-
ment that Sheriff Meekins "has
agreed to give the work a part of
his time, and the commission has
set aside the sum of \$300 a month
for him to use in travel, steno-
graphic help, office expense, post-
age, telegrams, photographs, pub-
licity stories and entertainment in-
cident to carrying on the task of
furthering the project."

"The place will require consid-
erable travel, and should there be
anything left from carrying on a
project," continues the paper, "that
will be the reward of the sheriff."

Likewise, the fact that Sheriff
Meekins was a red-hot and ex-
tremely active Broughton supporter
in the 1940 primary must have
been purely coincidental, because
all the Times (Victor Meekins, edi-
tor) assures:

"The job comes, not from the

consideration of the men available

This And That
No official or completely accu-
rate estimate can be made of the
number of filling stations in North
Carolina affected by the Ickes or-
der for a "seven to seven" curfew
on gasoline sales; but the U. S.
Census figures for 1939 listed 1,762
filling stations in this state. Obvi-
ously most of them were small con-
cessions, operated by the proprietor
alone, because the stations are listed
as employing only 5,893 persons.

The census showed 7,394 proprie-

remains that they sold enough gaso-
line in North Carolina to yield
practically \$27,000,000 in taxes, at

lars short next summer.—Commis-
sioner of Revenue A. J. Maxwell

WHAT DOES IT TAKE?

We are among the large number of baseball fans who regard Frank Rodgers as one of the finest men in the Coastal Plain loop, besides being an excellent manager and a good player, and what happened at Guy Smith park last night when Frank lost his temper when a man was called out at first on a double play should not reflect against him so much as against one umpire Daniel.

To climax the whole affair, when Rodgers finally did return to the dugout he grabbed the water bucket and threw it, the water and dipper sprawling toward the first base line.

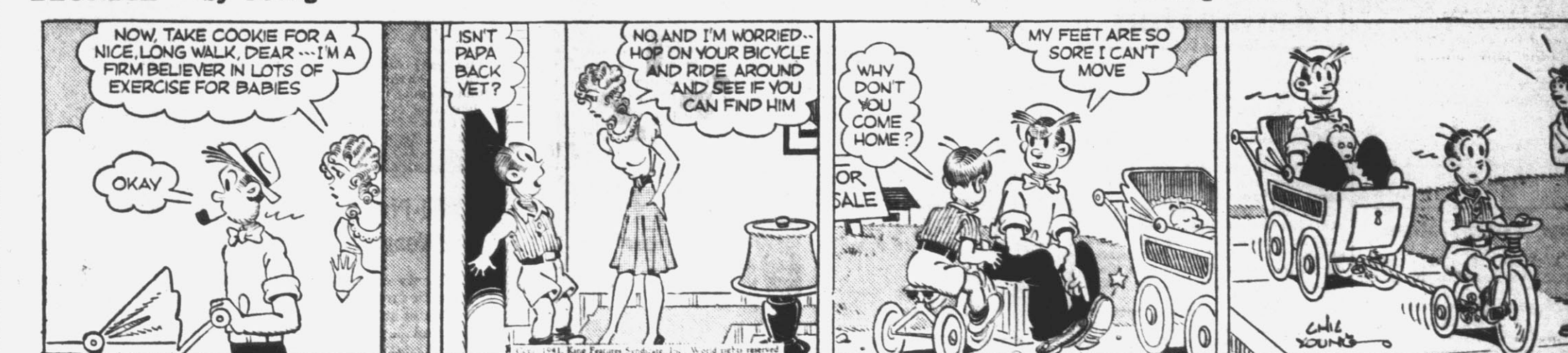

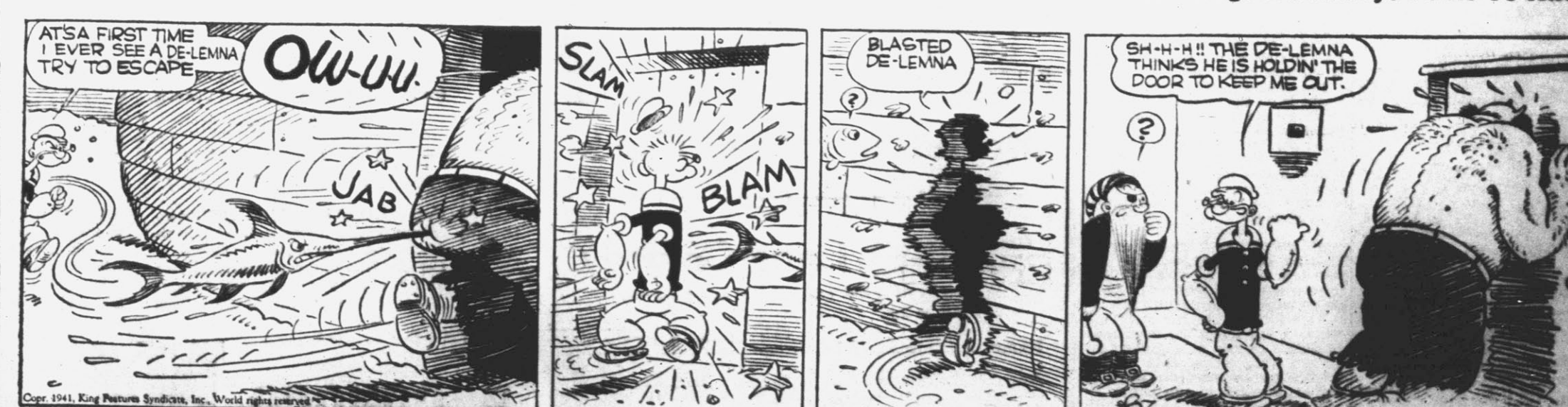

It is true that the post which will be assumed by the former Ohio State expert is an important one, carrying more than a little prestige. It is true that the salary is somewhat larger than that Dr. Salter has been drawing at State College by a few hundred dollars.

It is true that it looks simply like the act of a man offered a better job and taking it. But it is equally true that months ago Dr. Salter was offered this same post of soil chemist for the U. S. D. A., and that he turned it down and took the State College post instead. Wherefore, it is obvious that

something has occurred to change the Salter mind about the desirability and opportunities of the job here in Raleigh, as compared with the Washington place.

Which makes it appear that the Salter position here could not have been quite as pleasant and free from irritating incidents as appeared on the surface.

There is ample evidence that under the Salter regime relations between State College and the State Department of Agriculture became more harmonious and cooperative than in decades. Everywhere it was proclaimed that Dr. Salter was primarily responsible for the improved relations.

It seems, however, that not all the bitterness built up over a long period of time could be eliminated and completely forgotten.

There are well-considered stories, for instance, that Dr. Salter found it quite difficult to get along with Assistant Budget Director Bob Dayton. The experiment station director could not, as an example, understand why Mr. Dayton took the stand he did in this incident:

Dr. Salter secured the approval of Dean Harrelson of State College; Dr. Frank P. Graham, the U. N. C. president; and a special appropriation from the legislature for purchase of land to expand the McCullers station. When all details for acquisition of the land had been worked out, he presented the matter to Mr. Dayton, practically as an accomplished fact, and expecting a prompt and almost automatic approval from the budget boss. Instead, he was informed that it could not be done—the land couldn't be purchased. So there was Dr. Salter left with the bag to hold and faced with the job of undoing and explaining all he had previously done. He went to the college heads, and eventually to the attorney general. In the long run he was given authority to complete the McCullers

purchase; but the whole affair left a bad taste in his mouth. Then there is evidence that Dr. Salter from time to time ran into troubles left as hangovers from days before he came to Raleigh. An apparently authentic account of a Salter appearance before the special State College committee which has been working so hard to revamp and revise the school of agriculture depicts the Doctor as saying, in effect, that "the Dean is still czar," meaning that he had run into difficulties with Dean I. O. Schnau, who before Dr. Salter's appointment was acting director of the experiment station in addition to being Dean of Agriculture and head of the extension activities.

And so there is good reason to believe that Salter quit as much because he was fed up with his job here as because he particularly coveted the U. S. D. A. post—although the soil chemistry post is one in which he has long been particularly interested.

Be all that as it may, the appointment of Dr. L. D. Bayer, Salter's associate director and head of the agronomy division, indicates that there has been no weakening of the determination of Dr. Graham backed by Dean Harrelson and the special committee headed by Dr. Clarence Poe, to bring about a complete rejuvenation and rehabilitation of State College's agriculture school.
