FDR-CHURCHILL CONFER

Japan Believed To Have Been One of Principal Topics

OMITTED FROM DECLARATION

Things Left Unsaid In Churchill-Roosevelt Statement Regarded As Fully As Important As Declaration; Nippon Advance In South Asia Slowed Down With Rumors Of Historic Meeting

London, Aug. 14.—(AP) The United States is now pledged to the reconstruction of post-war Europe and the support of the Russian-British cause on every front, informed British sources said today in reviewing the jointly-issued Roosevelt-Churchill statement.

Things left unsaid in the statement are regarded as fully as important as those of the eight-point joint declaration.

Omission of reference to Japan "implies that Japan was one of the main points of discussion," a Japanese diplomat admitted.

A British informant said the meeting was at Mr. Roosevelt's invitation.

The Japanese source said that the tempo of the Japanese advance in South Asia was slowed down as a result of the historic meeting between the British and American leaders sped around the warring world.

The Roosevelt-Churchill conferences, which were attended by ranking officials and military naval and air experts of both countries, were reliably reported to have lasted at least two or three days.

Now there would be no surprise in London if a further announcement were made that Roosevelt and Churchill had sent personal assurances to Joseph Stalin and the Russian people that Britain and the United States will give the U. S. S. R. the fullest industrial co-operation in arming and supplying the Red army, air force and navy.

News of the meeting was broadcast by radio to Britain by Lord Privy Seal Clement Attlee, who has been acting as Churchill's deputy in his absence.

It was firmly believed by many competent observers that although the eight points, which they regarded as strongly reminiscent of Woodrow Wilson's famous 14 points in the first World War, dealt mainly with general phrases, the meeting was marked by adoption of a "down to brass tacks" attitude in dealing with the Japanese.

It is quite probable, according to these informants, that the two leaders agreed on:

1. The precise moment when the British and American governments would discard passive resistance for action against Japan.

2. Mutual use of British and American bases in the South Pacific.

3. A request to the Soviet Union to open a northern front with a Siberian Red army of 1,000,000 men if war should start in the South Pacific.

Japanese sources admitted ruefully that "all these are possibilities not necessarily probabilities."

Three Boys In County To Go To Boys State

The local post of the American Legion is defraying the expenses of two of the boys to the 15-day course, while the Forty and Eight will bear the expenses of the third.

First Load

The first load of the 1941 crop of tobacco to be brought to Greenville for the opening of the market on August 26, was placed on the floor of the McGowan warehouse here today by Squire Hooker of Craven county.

The opening of the market is practically two weeks off, but the warehouses already are prepared to start receiving the new crop and soon farmers are expected to start bringing the golden weed here in large quantities.

Nazis Say Reds Trapped; Reds Say Drive Smashed

SOVIETS CLAIM HEAVY LOSSES

Communist Party Organ Asserts German Offensive Smashed With Many German Divisions Having Been Annihilated; Indicates Fighting In Conflict Again Developing Into Isolated Actions

Moscow, Aug. 14.—(AP) The German offensive is being smashed, Pravda, Communist party organ, declared today in explanation for Soviet communiqué reports that there was no important change in the front.

Russian war dispatches indicated that fighting again was developing into isolated actions and that German armies, which spurred yesterday in the areas of Karkass, Staryaya Russa, Smolensk and Bel Tserkov again have been halted.

"Behind the modest Soviet reports," said Pravda, "lie great and serious events."

"No important changes occurred in the disposition of troops because the German offensive is being smashed by the mighty resistance of the Red army, exhausting the German forces."

"Simultaneously, however, very important changes are taking place in the composition of the German army."

"In the western direction, many German divisions already have been annihilated and only countless graves recall the existence of these divisions. Dozens of other divisions after several battles with the Red army, have lost nearly half, and others more than half, of their makeup."

Cards Needed By Tobacco Workers

Rocky Mount, Aug. 14.—With the beginning of the tobacco season close upon us, the Rocky Mount office of the Social Security board is making a special effort to assist both the employers and employees affected by the opening of the markets in meeting the requirements of the Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance program.

All tobacco workers are covered by the insurance provisions of the Act, and every person employed by tobacco concerns is required to have an account number and to report his number to his employer regardless of how short a time he may work or how little he may earn. Each employer, in turn, must report at the end of each calendar quarter the account number, the name, and all wages paid each such employee.

Any employer who may have experienced difficulty before in connection with securing and reporting account numbers is urged to communicate with the Rocky Mount field office of the Board. Full information and assistance with such problems will be gladly given.

WPA and Girl Scouts To Open Craft Shop

An out-door craft shop for all boys and girls of the city will be opened Monday, August 18, at the West Campus playground. The shop is to be sponsored by the WPA Recreational Project of the city and the Girl Scout organization.

The shop will be open from 10 to 12 a. m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Boys and girls may come at this time and work on simple handicrafts. The only charge will be the minimum cost for materials. Instruction will be given by trained leaders of the two organizations.

Plans are being made to continue the shop indoors this winter if it proves successful.

AXIS COMMENT IS DISCLOSED

Berlin Sees Joint Declaration As Propaganda

Berlin, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The first authorized German reaction to the war aim statement of President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill was that the whole declaration was a "propaganda bluff."

"Churchill and Roosevelt are unfortunate in their declaration being made at a time when every hour brings new reports of impressive successes for German arms in the Ukraine," one spokesman asserted.

Previously, there had been only DNB's brief, factual report that the United States President and British Prime Minister had met and issued their joint statement.

Rome, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Fascist circles said that the joint American-British declaration today would fail to run the Axis or Japan off their courses.

Fascists had suspected that Roosevelt and Churchill had agreed on a war plan before his announcement. The authoritative editor, Virginio Gayda, anticipating such an announcement, said that the American and British were "hatching new plots in the form of oratorical manifestations and stratagems to ward this or that part of the globe in the vain hope of halting or deviating the fatal course of the war."

The meeting, Gayda said in his Giornale d'Italia, was "proof of Anglo-Saxon worry, bewilderment and disorderly action." He noted that it took place at a time when the Russian situation was "critical" and when tension was growing worse between Japan and the United States and Britain.

"Whatever is said and done," said Gayda, "the war of the Axis like that of Japan, will continue straight ahead of its course."

"Dungeon" Vaults For Ballots. Canton, Ohio.—(AP)—Construction of "dungeon" vaults for the safe keeping of ballots and other election records is being completed in the basement of the Stark county court house and annex.

Access to the vaults will be through a trap door equipped with a special lock which may be opened only by the simultaneous operation of four keys. One key will be held by each of the four election board members.

PLANES POUND RUSSIAN SHIPS

Germany Declares Russian Forces Are Trapped In Southern Ukraine Attempting To Escape By Sea; Claims Forces Have Reached Sea Between Port of Odessa And Bug Estuary In Continuous Pursuit

Berlin, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Red army forces trapped in the southern Ukraine by the advance of the German army to the Black sea are preparing an attempt to escape by sea, the German high command reported today, and the Luftwaffe is pounding their transports anchored along the coast.

German and Rumanian forces have reached the sea between the great Soviet port of Odessa and the Bug estuary in a "continuous, relentless pursuit in the Ukraine," the war bulletin from Adolf Hitler's headquarters said.

Elsewhere on the eastern front, "operations are also continuing according to plans," said the communiqué.

A Finnish communiqué said in Helsinki, however, that on the northern flank, above Leningrad, Russian forces encircled in the Lake Ladoga area are trying to flee in boats from several lake ports.

"Thus, somewhat parallel situations exist at both ends of the front and a double 'Dunkergue' such as ended the great German campaign both in Flanders and in Greece" may be imminent.

German infantry was said steadily to be tightening its arc around Odessa and advancing steadily toward Nikolaev, 65 miles further east, after annihilating a strong rear guard covering retreating Red army fortresses.

15 Planes Burned At Winston-Salem

Winston-Salem, Aug. 14.—(AP)—A spectacular fire swept through a hangar here today at the airport and destroyed 15 planes at an estimated loss of \$50,000.

The fireproof hangar was not burned, but only three of the planes in it were saved. The fire had gained too much headway before it was discovered. Flames leaped high and smoked billowed. No one was injured.

The cause of the fire was not immediately known.

Tom Davis, vice-president and secretary of the Piedmont Aviation Company, placed the loss at \$50,000. All the 15 planes were damaged beyond repair.

The planes belonged to residents, the aviation company, and the civilian ground school here.

Wreck Last Night On Falkland Road

Paul Jones, Jr., and Charles Quinerly of Farmville received cuts and bruises in a head-on automobile collision on the Falkland highway last night, but neither sustained critical injuries, although their car was badly damaged.

Joe Taft, Negro, said by investigating patrolmen to have been the driver of the other car involved, is being held on a charge of driving drunk and also driving carelessly and recklessly. Taft and another Negro, Aram Lee Joyner, also received cuts and bruises, the latter being the more seriously injured.

Jones was cut on the head and knee, while Quinerly was cut about the face.

UNION AGREES TO RETURN TO DEFENSE WORK

To Resume Work At Curtis Wright Propeller Plant

WORK STOPPAGE CAUSES CONCERN

CIO Aluminum Workers Threaten To Go On Strike At Five Key Plants, Including One At Badin, North Carolina

(By The Associated Press) Striking AFL machinists voted unanimously today to go back to work at Curtis Wright's Caldwell propeller plant engaged on \$1,000,000 of defense orders.

War Department officials already had expressed grave concern over a sharp increase in work stoppages. As of last Tuesday, they said, 30 strikes were holding up production of army equipment, and 23,400 workers were idle, compared with an average of 14,000 idle since early June.

The CIO Aluminum Workers' Union told Secretary of Labor Perkins last night that 20,000 workers would strike at five key plants of the Aluminum Company of America (Alcoa) to support demands for elimination of north-south wage differentials, unless the government intervened in the dispute. No date was set for the projected walkout.

Alcoa recently granted a blanket wage increase of 10 cents an hour, bringing the minimum scale at its Badin, N. C., and Alcoa, Tenn., plants to 55 cents, which the company said was as good or better than prevailing wages there. Alcoa workers at New Kensington, Pa., received a minimum of 73 cents an hour and those at Detroit, Mich., and Edgewater, N. J., 75 cents.

Confederations on the union's demands for elimination of the differentials recently ended without an agreement.

Another conference was scheduled in Washington today between Navy Secretary Knox and L. H. Kordorff, president of the Federal Shipbuilding and Drydock Company, on the latter's offer to turn the firm's strike-bound shipyard at Kearny, N. J., over to the Navy for immediate operation. Nearly half a billion dollars worth of Navy and merchant ship contracts is held up by the CIO-called strike.

26-Cent Averages Topped On Border

Florence, S. C., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Superior quality offerings continued to bring better prices on the 16 Carolina Border Belt tobacco markets today as the general average price paid for the flue-cured type weed exceeded 26 cents.

The better grades brought from 45 to 47 cents a pound on several markets today.

The prices on the third day of auctioneering of the 1941 Carolinas crop were a third higher than even the most optimistic grower had hoped for.

The United States Department of Agriculture reported today that prices yesterday on most grades were one to two cents higher than on the opening day.

Demand continued today to be particularly strong on cutters and the better quality lugs and primings. Rejection of sales by growers was negligible.

Much tobacco remained on the floor today after yesterday's full day's sales.

Garden Huckleberries. A sample of the garden huckleberries grown at the Pitt County Home was brought to the city today and left on display in the Reflector window. The berries, not considered good for eating as other berries, are used principally for making pies or preserving.

J. Hendrickson, Australian prospector, who had been searching for gold near Ingwood, Victoria, for 14 years, uncovered a 17-ounce nugget at a depth of only six inches.

Darlan Pledges French To Follow Petain Aims

VICE PREMIER OF JAPAN SHOT

Wounded In Chest And Jaw; In Serious Condition

Tokyo.—(By Telephone From New York), Aug. 14.—(AP)—Baron Hirofumi Hiranuma, 75-year-old vice-premier and minister without portfolio, was struck in the chest and jaw this morning by pistol bullets fired by a 33-year-old assassin. Hiranuma's condition was reported as serious.

Hiranuma has been regarded as a mainstay of the cabinet of Premier Prince Fumimaro Konoye and definitely a moderating influence.

Observers said, therefore, that the fact that such an attack should occur was not considered a good sign in a time of tense international relations.

There was no immediate report, however, on the motive of the baron's assailant.

The attacker, identified as Naohiko Nishiyama, 33, called at Hiranuma's home before 8 a. m., today and gained access under the pretext that he wished the vice-premier's autograph on a roll of parchment.

He pulled a pistol from the roll and fired three shots in all, authorities reported. The first missed, but the others struck Hiranuma in the jaw and chest.

Despite his age and his wounds, the vice-premier pursued the attacker out of the house and succeeded in catching him at the gate where, with the aid of the gatekeeper, Nishiyama was held until further help arrived.

Forty & Eight Meets In Monthly Session

The regular meeting of the local Voltaire, Forty and Eight, was held at Respass' place last night, at which time routine business and other matters were considered.

LEADERS MEET ON HIGH SEAS

Eight-Point Program Contained In Joint Declaration Issued After Problem Of Supply Munitions Examined In Full

Washington, Aug. 14.—(AP)—President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston Churchill of Great Britain, after a secret meeting at sea, joined in a declaration of general war aims today which voiced a determination to achieve "the final destruction of the Nazi tyranny."

A White House announcement embodying the eight-point joint declaration, said the two national leaders, with their high-ranking military chiefs, examined "the whole problem of the supply of munitions of war" for "those countries actively engaged in resisting aggression."

These covered the supply problems of the Soviet Union. Lord Beaverbrook, British Minister of Supply, is coming to Washington to discuss further details.

In several conferences, the announcement said, they "considered the dangers to world civilization arising from the policies of military domination by conquest upon which the Hitlerite government of Germany and other governments associated therewith have embarked."

The statement said they "made clear the stress (explained here as probably meaning steps) which their countries are respectively taking for their safety in the face of these dangers."

The joint declaration, constituting the most concrete war aims yet disclosed on the British side, set out "certain common principles in the national policies of their respective countries on which they base their hopes for a better world."

The President and Prime Minister declared their belief after their historic meeting at sea, that "after the final destruction of the Nazi tyranny" the disarmament of aggressor nations "is essential" pending the establishment of "a wider and permanent system of general security."

The eight points on which the President and Mr. Churchill agreed to "base their hopes for a better future for the world" were:

"First, their countries seek no aggrandizement, territorial or other;

"Second, they desire to see no territorial changes that do not accord with the freely expressed wishes of the peoples concerned;

"Third, they respect the right of all people to choose the form of government under which they will live; and they wish to see sovereign rights and self-government restored to those who have been forcibly deprived of them;

"Fourth, they will endeavor, with due respect for their existing obligations, to further the enjoyment by all states, great and small, victor or vanquished, of access of equal terms, to the trade and to the raw materials of the world which are needed

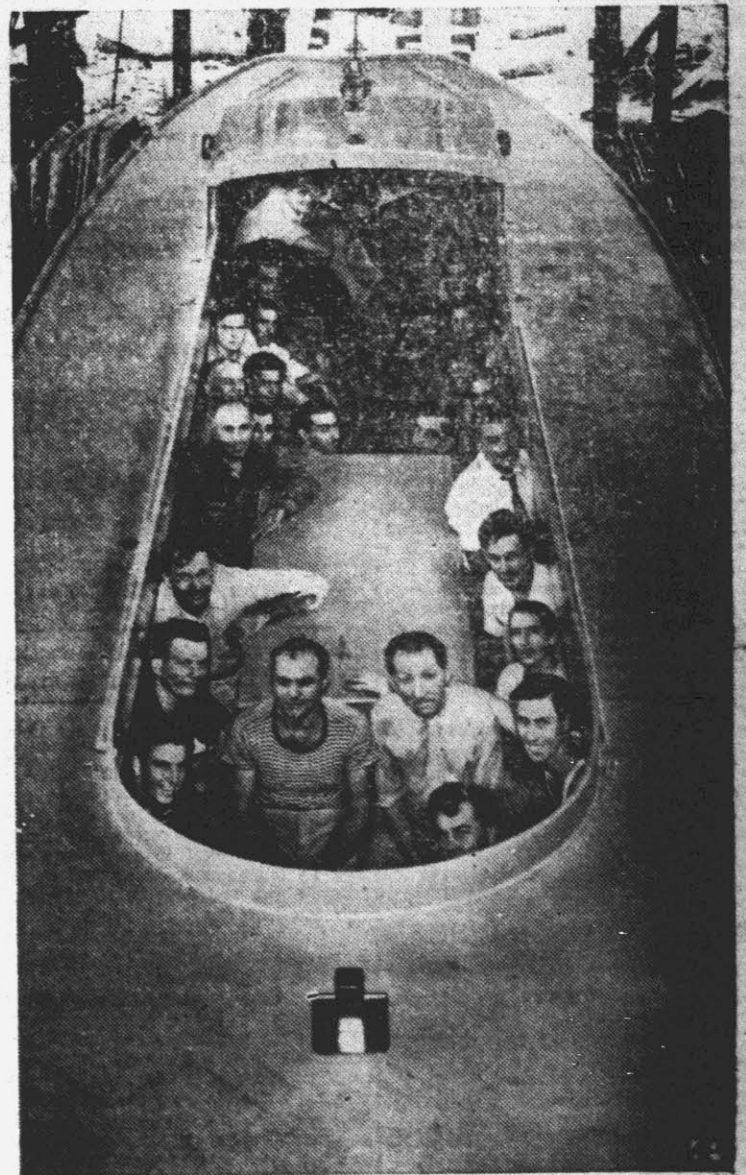

WE SHOULD KNOW OUR PLACE

An opinionated man of strong re-
ligious convictions was holding
forth quite vociferously one day be-

that line. He did not hesitate to
speak contemptuously of anyone
who ventured to differ with him.

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COURT RULES DRUNKEN DRIVER A MURDERER

A decision of the United
States Court of Appeals of the
District of Columbia re-
cently declared that a drunk-
en driver is a murderer when
his reckless driving makes
an innocent citizen a victim.

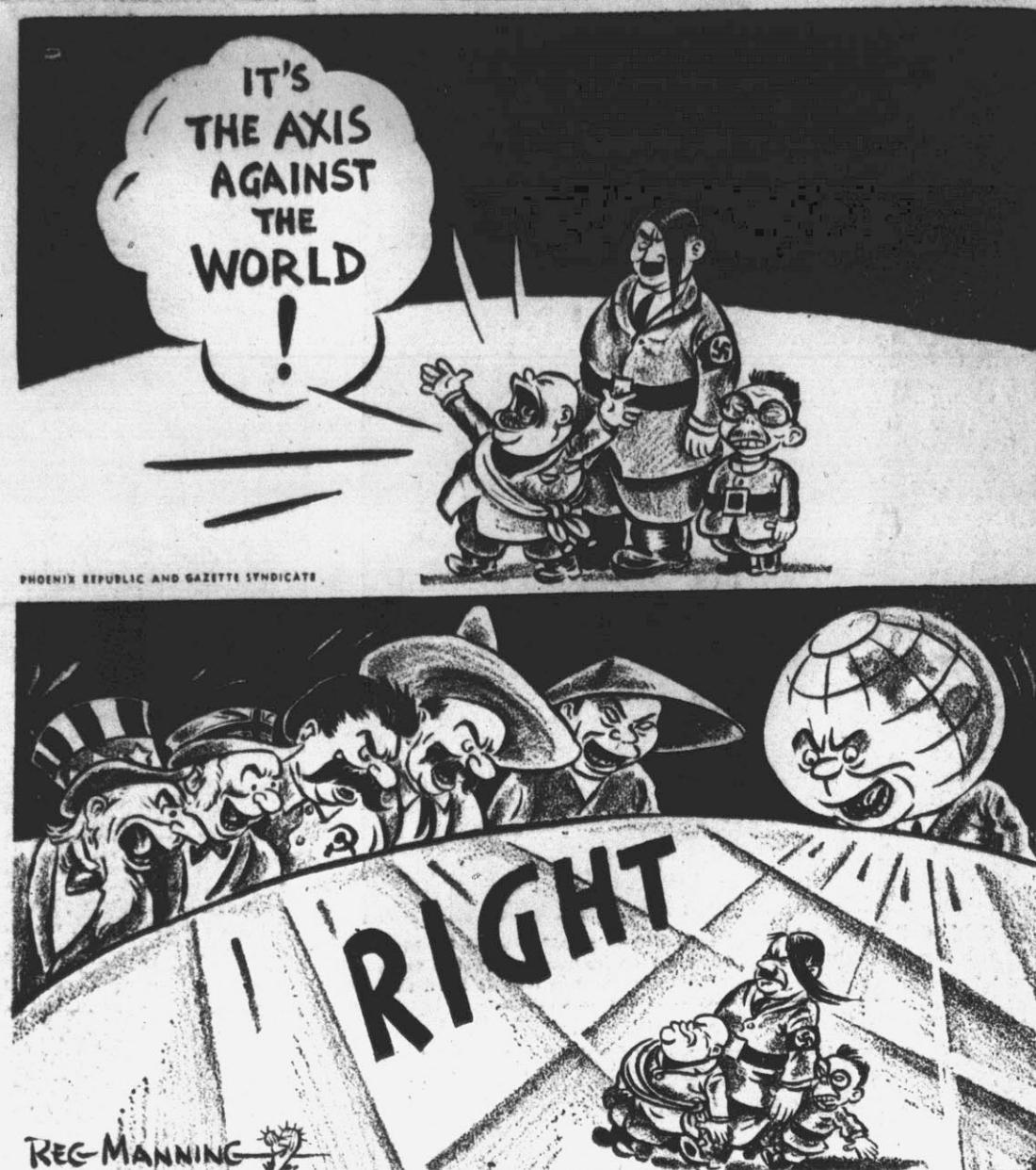
An appeal of a 27-year-
old youth to overrule a
prison term of fifteen years
to life for killing two persons
in a drunken joyride was de-
nied by Chief Justice D. Law-
rence Groner.

The boy's defense was
that he was too drunk to
know what he was doing,
that he suffered a loss of
memory and that he recalled
nothing of the tragedy until
he awoke in a cell and won-
dered why he had been ar-
rested. The defense called it
insanity. The jury called it
murder in the second degree.
The jury's judgment was
confirmed in strong words by
the Chief Justice.

Drunken driving and its
resulting deaths has long
been considered one of so-
ciety's greatest problems.
Because the boy chose to get
hopelessly drunk was no ex-
cuse that he should escape
the punishment of the law.
The Court of Appeals had
the strength to rule as it did
on this type of case, and its
decision is sure to have far-
reaching effects on similar
cases that come up in other
courts.

True, there was no malice
aforethought when the boy,
in a stupor, committed his
crime. But there was a great
deal of malice, as the Judge

and reckless disregard for
others. There were no miti-
gating circumstances in the
case.

Washington Daybook

Washington — United States busi-
ness men finally have decided that
we are in a national emergency —
and that business-as-usual is as
dead as last week's ticker tape.

I got it straight from the Wash-
ington lawyers.
The Washington lawyers are in a
class by themselves. Their business
thrives in direct proportion to gov-
ernment activity in private indus-
try. When sailing is comparative-
ly smooth in the marts of trade,
most Washington lawyers are as
idle as a fisherman who forgot to
bring along the worms. But when
the laws of the land start dump-
ing apples out of the industrial cart
here and there, capital legal lights
have to weight their coat tails.

That's why seven or eight months
ago, when national defense began
to boom; when the army and navy
were splitting whereas in thou-
sands of contracts; when there came
the first rumble of priority talk —
Washington lawyers peeled off their
coats, rolled up their sleeves, and
got ready for the avalanche of busi-
ness they felt certain would strike
within a few days or weeks at most.

Then what happened? Nothing.
The legal business jogged along at
its even pace.

Couldn't Understand It.
"We couldn't understand it," one
of the legal fraternity explained to
men. "And as the weeks became
months and nothing happened, it
grew all the more puzzling. Why,
my business for the first six months
of this year actually fell under the
period a year ago."

"Here, industry was being pulled
up by the roots and transplanted
in new soil — and yet it seemed to
be going through this cataclysm
without even a representative in
Washington."

But that was a month or six
weeks ago. Now, all is changed.
The avalanche arrived with Wash-
ington's mid-summer heat and the
Washington lawyers have dropped
their fishing poles and nibbicks and
come back to work.

It is thumping through the first
few truckloads of cases that their
clients have dumped in their laps
that has brought the conclusion
that the cause of the delay was sim-
ply that the United States business
men hadn't waked up. They
thought they could expand without
causing dislocations. They thought
they could deal with priorities with-
out disrupting business-as-usual.
Now, say the lawyers, they are find-
ing out.

A few of these cases — engendered
mostly by priorities — are in-
teresting and throw some light on
the situation.
There was the case of the western

vate contract in years. It required
thousands of feet of lumber. He
went to Seattle personally to place
his order. Sure, the lumber com-
pany officials told him they would
be glad to have the order. They
would guarantee delivery in 400
days. . . in 1943! His lawyer's prob-
lem? To get a waiver of priorities
so the contractor can have his or-
der slipped into the batch that are
purely defense.

Wants None Of It.
There was the small Pittsburgh
steel firm which for years had been
supplying steady customers with
about 3,000 tons of processed steel.
The big company from which it got

the unfinished steel assured it that
it could continue to have 3,000 tons
a year. Then the little processing
company got a defense contract —
10,000 tons a year — and a priority
order for that 10,000 tons. The
small company went back to the big
company. Okay, its men were told,
you'll get 10,000 tons — but we can't
let you have the 3,000 additional.
The government wouldn't like it.

So this firm actually has hired
a lawyer to get it out of a defense
contract which would quadruple its
business. It would rather hold the
customers it has had through the
years.

These aren't isolated cases. They
are just a couple of the thousands
of shocks that are waking indus-
try up to what defense really means
— and skyrocketing the capital law
business.

Man About Manhattan

By George Tugan

New York. — I lay long this morn-
ing thinking about a game I saw
the other night at the Polo
Grounds, and about "Berlin Diary,"
and about the things to be done
before I can get away for some sort
of vacation.

Under the amber lights the game
was tense and exciting, but unreal.
It seemed like a contest in techni-
color. For two miles on either side
of the ancient hangout of the Glim-
pans under Coogan's Bluff the
roads were lined with cars. More
than 52,000 people had turned out
to see the old hero, old Long Draw-
ers Carl Hubbell, try to turn back
Medwick and Camilli and the
Dodgers. He lost, 3 to 1. Somehow
it makes me sad to see Hubbell
lose.

After the game we returned, for
a change, without pausing for any
thing to eat. The idea was to get
a good night's rest. But it didn't
work out that way. I picked up
William Shirer's "Berlin Diary,"
and couldn't put it down for a
hundred pages. Finally I fell into a
fitful sleep and dreamed all night
of being chased by wild dogs with
great evil fangs, and about a man
selling Christmas trees. I don't
know who the man was, or what he
was doing with Christmas trees in
August. "Berlin Diary" is a day-by-
day account of purges, politics, fa-
naticism and trumpet calls, from
1934 to 1941. Shirer saw all the
principal actors of the Third Reich
almost every day and he knew their
aims and their petty grievances.
For instance, when Goering mar-
ried a provincial actress, says Shir-
er, Goebbels told the newspapers
they could "comment sarcastically"
if they wanted to. No wonder "Ber-
lin Diary" has outstripped, by leaps
and bounds, all other current books
on Europe and the war.

I may go down to Miami next
week, thus combining a little busi-
ness with pleasure. If I do, I will
fly either to San Juan or New Or-
leans. It doesn't really matter
which. There are people I ought to
see in both places.

I am building some new book
shelves that will stretch the length
of two windows. They will reach
from the sill to the floor and will
be used exclusively for members of
the American Guide Series, state
and regional. The latest state guides
that have come my way are "Mas-
sachusetts. A Guide To Its Places
and People," and "Alabama. A
Guide To The Deep South."

Massachusetts is 675 pages; Ala-
bama is 442. Each is an encyclo-
pedia in information on the history,
geology, art, architecture, transpor-
tation, industry, and wild life of
the state. They make an intriguing
contrast between the colonial Puritanism
and current industrialism of
the East and the ante bellum cus-
toms (now gone with the wind, if
one may borrow from Margaret
Mitchell) and the newer way of life
(still faintly aromatic with mag-
nolias) as lived in the Deep South.

West Greenville defeated the High School 9-0 in "A" competition yesterday in the WPA city league, to even the series at one victory each.

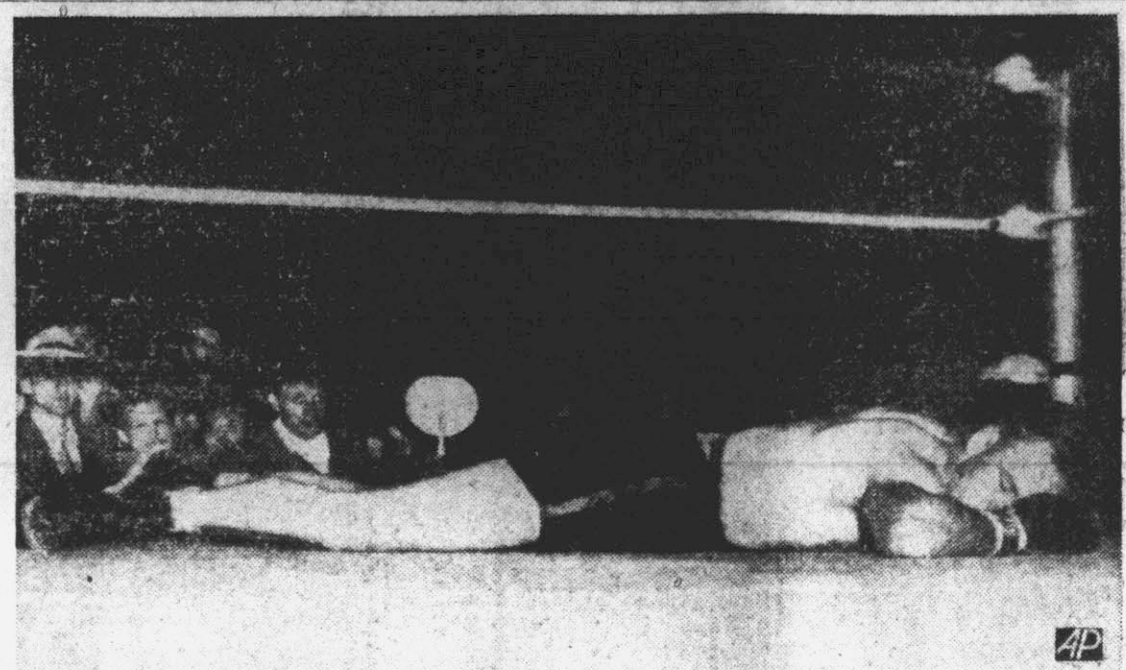

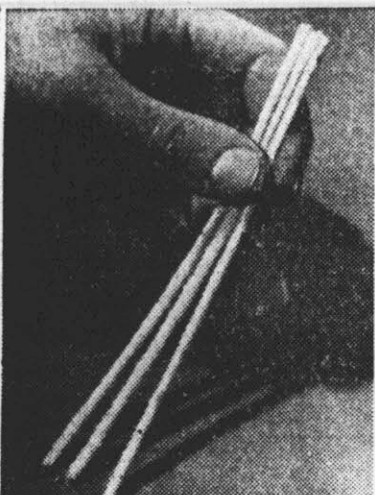

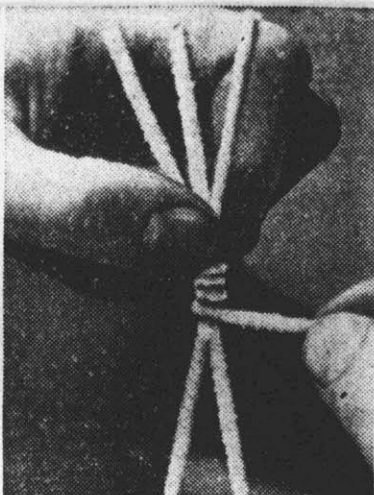
Peter Pipe Cleaner Stars In Table-Top Pictures

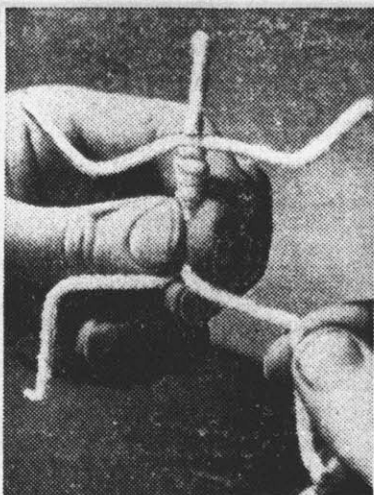
Rain or shine, Kenneth Adams

ams works:



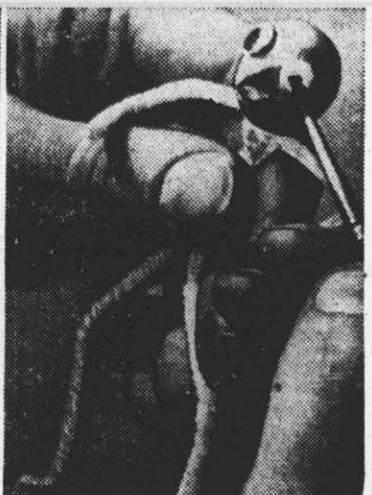
1. Hero of one of Adams' table-top episodes is made with three pipe cleaners. This is the beginning.

4. Clay and paint are added to the head and our hero takes on character. Still missing: the cotton hair.

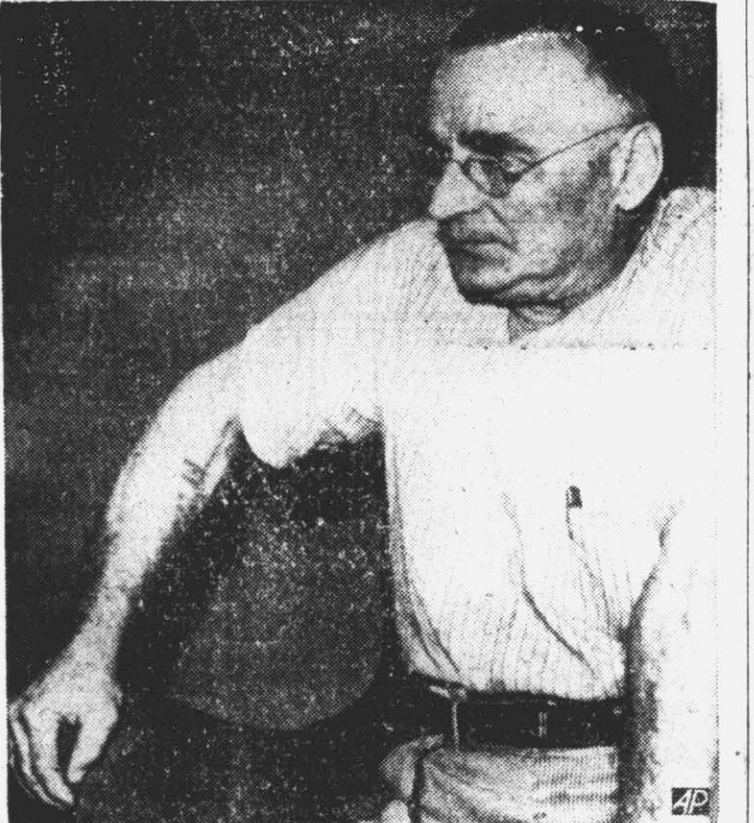

Tar Heels Save Big Sum By Reduced Power Rates

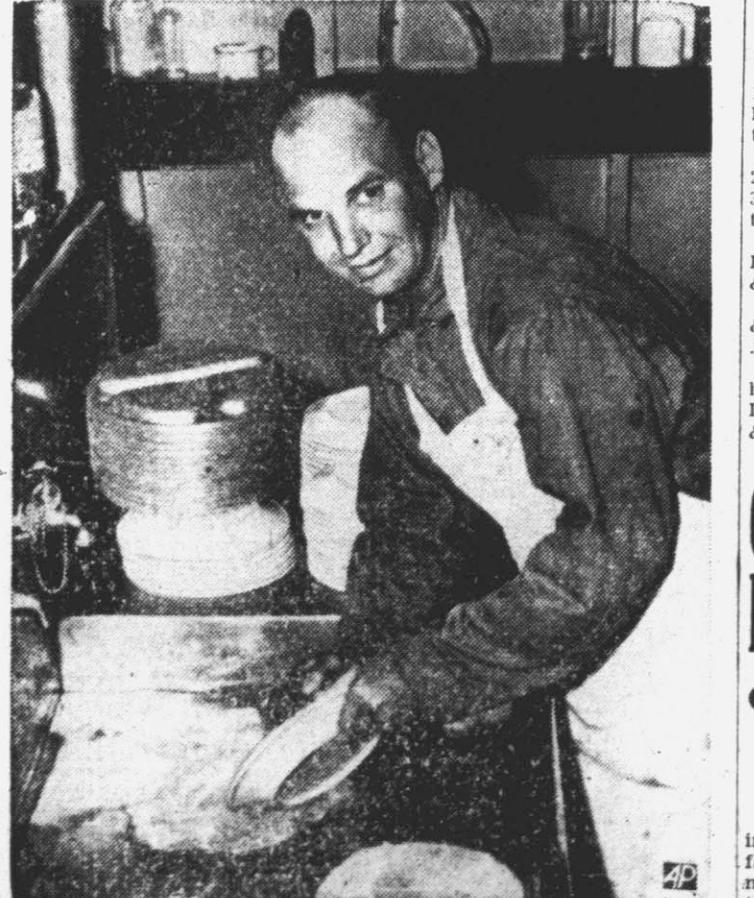

sects are not causing damage in some sections, but in the infested areas the damage will be almost twice as great as for the average of the past several years.

Shanklin said the weather was unfavorable in North Carolina during the first part of the season, as it was in other states from the Texas panhandle eastward. Especially did South Carolina suffer, that state now expecting to harvest its smallest crop since 1922.

Missouri, Tennessee, Arkansas, and Mississippi are the only cotton states that are regarded as having a larger than average crop this year. Georgia, Florida, and Louisiana will have crops well below their averages.

for their economic prosperity.
"Fifth, they desire to bring about the fullest collaboration between all nations in the economic fields with the object of securing, for all, improved labor standards, economic advancement and social security.
"Sixth, after the final destruction of the Nazi tyranny, they hope to see established a peace which will afford to all nations the means of dwelling in safety within their own boundaries, and which will afford assurance that all the men in all the lands may live out their lives in freedom from fear and want.
"Seventh, such a peace should enable all men to traverse the high seas and oceans without hindrance.
"Eighth, they believe that all of the nations of the world, for realistic as well as spiritual reasons must come to the abandonment of the use of force. Since no future peace can be maintained if land, sea or air armaments continue to be employed by nations which threaten, or may threaten, aggression outside of their frontiers, they believe, pending the establishment of a wider and permanent system of general secur-

ity, that the disarmament of such nations is essential. They will likewise aid and encourage all other practicable measures which will lighten for peace-loving peoples the crushing burdens of armament."
