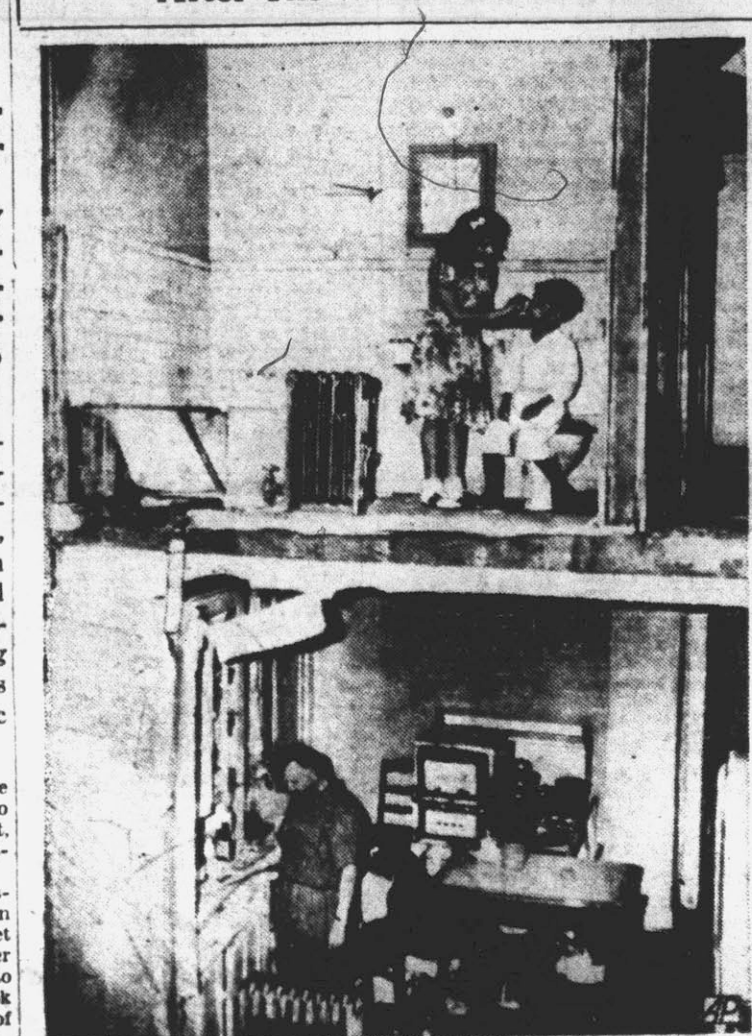

JAP MESSAGE
IS DELIVERED
TO ROOSEVELTContains Nippon At-
titude On Pacific
SituationIS DELIVERED AT
KONOYE BEHESTRevealed Earlier By
Japanese Spokes-
man That Represent-
ations Made Over
Oil Shipments To
RedsTokyo, Aug. 29.—(AP)—
A brief official announce-
ment said today that Ad-
miral Kichisaburo Nomura,
Japanese ambassador in
Washington, had delivered
to President Roosevelt yester-
day a message outlining
the "Imperial government's
attitude toward the Pacific
situation."The message was delivered at the
behest of Premier Prince Fumimaro
Konohe, said the announcement,
issued after a special cabinet meet-
ing.Ichi Kishi, a government spokes-
man, said earlier today that Japan
had made representations to Soviet
Russia and the United States over
shipment of American gasoline to
the Russian port of Vladivostok
solely "from a Japanese point of
view.""But that is not to say," he added,
"that we do not consider Axis in-
terests as well."Kishi said any conversation be-
tween President Roosevelt and Ad-
miral Nomura certainly would in-
clude discussion of shipments of
United States materials to Russia,
which Japan fears might eventually
be used against her.The cabinet held an emergency
session at the Premier's residence
at 1:30 p. m., with all ministers at-
tending, as well as a number of other
officials.Tokyo, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Japanese
said today that Premier Konohe's
message to President Roosevelt
stressed Japan's desire to end the
Chinese war, and spokesmen com-
plained bitterly against British and
United States aid to Chiang Kai-
Shek.A Domei agency statement declared
the message was prompted by
"the very delicate relations existing
between Japan and the United
States following outbreak of the
Russian-German war" and reaffirmed
Japan's desire to establish a "co-
prosperity sphere" in East Asia, then
lasting peace.Domei said Japan wanted disposal
of the Chinese affair.Ichi Kishi, a Board of Informa-
tion official, said Japan was trying
to create peace and security in East
Asia through cooperation with the
Ching-Wei regime in Nanking."In spite of this," he added, "these
powers (Britain and the United
States) are aiding Chungking with
materials and munitions and there-
by unnecessarily prolonging the un-
fortunate Chinese-Japanese hostilities."New Bus Services
Offered By RicksAnother new bus service for
Greenville, which connects with
the Asheville line, was announced
today by Paul T. Ricks of this
city, who recently was granted
a franchise by the Utilities Com-
mission to operate the line.The new service provides two
round-trips daily between Green-
ville and Roanoke Rapids via
Bethel, Oak City, Hobgood, Scot-
land Neck, Spring Hill, Tillery, Hal-
ifax and Windsor.Buses will leave Greenville at
6:45 and 12:30 and arrive at Roa-
noke Rapids at 9:25 and 3:05, re-
spectively. The return trips will
leave Roanoke Rapids at 3:30 and
7:45 arriving here at 6:10 and
10:20, respectively.The new service will make con-
nections with other lines.
A special Greenville-Bethel ser-
vice, which makes connections with
other buses, also is being inaugu-
rated by the local man. A bus will
leave Greenville at 7:25 p. m., ar-
rive in Bethel at 7:50, leave Bethel
at 8:10 and arrive in Greenville

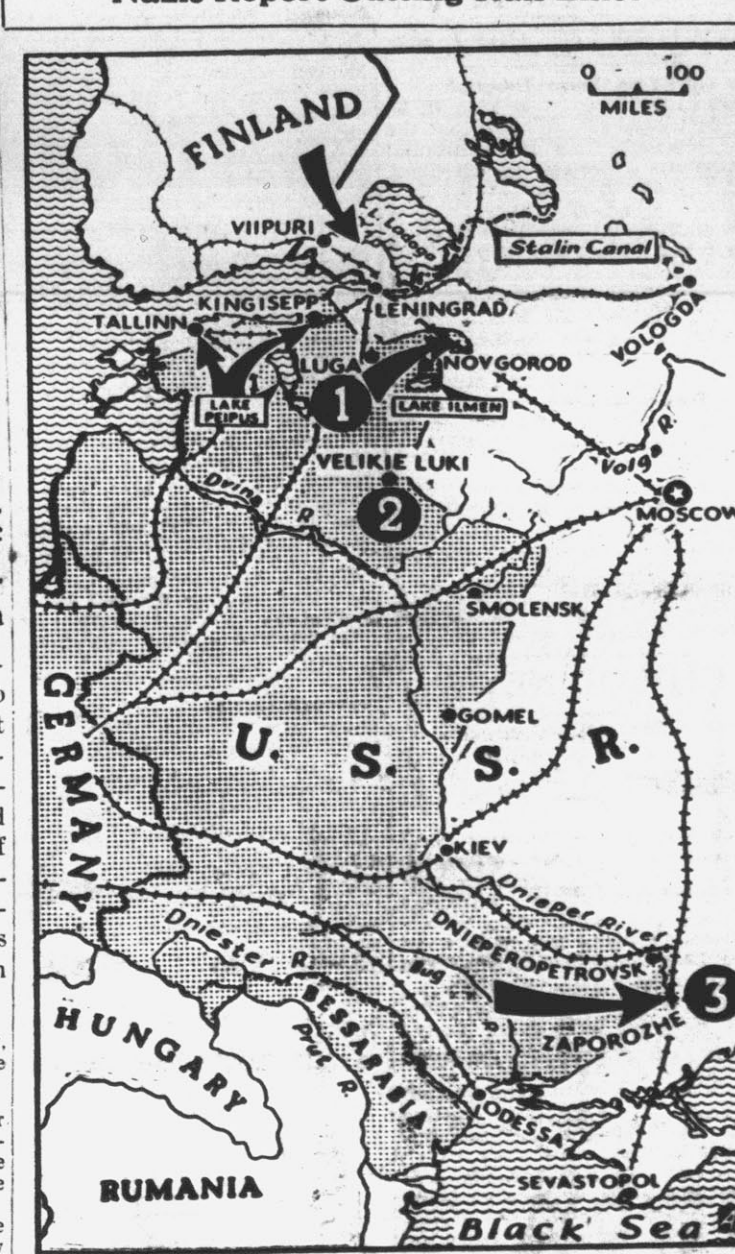
After The Wind Died Down

Turn For Worse Seen
In Condition Of LavalLEAF FIRM ON
OTHER MARTSOfferings Continue
Heavy With Prices
StrongRaleigh, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Offer-
ings continued heavy today and
prices firm as the opening week of
the North Carolina Bright Belt's
flue-cured tobacco auction season
nears its close.With prices generally running 10
or more cents a pound better than
the 1940 average, growers, deligh-
ted at the trend, poured their leaf
into the warehouses.Much was of inferior grades, but
there was a generous sprinkling of
better leaf, which brought prices as
high as 50 cents at some points.Sales Supervisor N. G. Blackburn,
Jr., of the Wilson market, reported
today that 533,190 pounds were sold
yesterday at an average of 25.19
cents a pound and that sales thus
far for the week were 4,094,354
pounds for \$1,077,653.72, for an av-
erage of 26.65—nine cents a pound
higher than a year ago, when 4-
028,990 pounds sold during the first
week brought \$714,337.60, an av-
erage of 17.73 a pound.At Goldsboro, Sales Supervisor
Frank M. Park, Jr., said yesterday's
sales amounted to 271,194 pounds
for \$74,277.07, an average of 27.44
cents a pound. He said that to date
751,642 pounds had been sold for
\$209,269.62, an average of 27.84
cents a pound. Enough leaf was on
warehouse floors in Goldsboro this
morning for day-long sales.Offerings at Winston today con-
stituted mostly of inferior grades.
The market there sold 1,208,518
pounds yesterday at an average of
24.97 a pound.Jake May, sales supervisor at
Wendell, said 148,608 pounds were
sold yesterday at an average of
28.16 cents.Medium and common grades pre-
dominated on the Rocky Mount
market, where Sales Supervisor Ed
Johnston, Jr., said 1,101,994 pounds
were sold yesterday for \$298,755.25
an average of 27.11 cents a pound
and sales for Tuesday, Wednesday
and Thursday amounted to 3,328-
426 pounds for \$947,217.19, an av-
erage of 28.46. Sales were described
as exceptionally good and growers
were said to be well pleased.Meanwhile, Relatives
Of Assassin Call-
ed To ProbeParis, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Doctors
declined to attempt an emergency
operation on Pierre Laval late this
afternoon to remove an assassin's
bullet just below the heart to save
his life.(Since it was 8 p. m. in Paris
at 1 p. m. EST, the operation may
already have been performed at
that time. Communications from
the German-occupied French cap-
ital are slow.)Fears for the 58-year-old French
leader mounted through the day as
physicians attributed a sustained
fever to a possible infection from
the bullet wound, inflicted two days
ago.The possibility of peritonitis was
regarded as a mortal peril.Paris, Occupied France, Aug. 29
—(AP)—The condition of Pierre
Laval, shot by an assassin Wednes-
day, has grown slightly worse, ac-
cording to a bulletin issued at the
Versailles hospital at noon today.Laval's temperature jumped to
39 degrees centigrade (approx-
imately 102 degrees Fahrenheit)
doctors said, adding that they fear-
ed the politician's wound below the
heart had become infected.The condition of Marcel Deat,
who is also one of the top leaders
of the group favoring stronger col-
laboration with Germany and who
was shot at the same time as Laval—
was declared improved. Deat's
temperature had returned almost to
normal.An investigation of the Caen
home of the assassin, Paul Collette
was said to have disclosed that he
had fought side by side with British
troops at Dunkerque and had been
evacuated with them to Eng-
land. He was reported to have tried
to return to England recently, pre-
sumably to join the Free French
forces under General Charles De
Gaulle. How he got back to France
in the first place was not explained.An investigation was carried out
at Collette's home and relatives
were summoned to a local police
station for questioning.Weather Outlook

Complete Occupation
Of Iran In Order
To Hasten War
Supplies To Russia
From Britain And
U.S.; Not Determin-
ed Whether Any
Peace Terms Pre-
sented As YetLondon, Aug. 29.—(AP)—
Britain and Russia moved
swiftly today to complete
their occupation of Iran in or-
der to hasten war supplies to Russia
from Britain and U.S.; not deter-
mined whether any
peace terms pre-
sented as yet.Official quarters declined to say
whether the Allies had presented
peace terms to Reza Shah Pahlavi's
government, but informed sources
expressed belief London and Mos-
cow would stand on these points:1. That the Iranian government
hand over all Germans still in the
country—estimated to include some
3,000 technicians.2. That Iran guarantee facilities
for transport of war supplies
through the Persian Gulf to Russia.3. That a steady flow of oil be
maintained to feed the British navy,
army and air force in the Middle
East.It was regarded as a foregone
conclusion that the British and
Russians would insist on retaining
military control of all strategic
points in Iran until the end of the
war. The Allies have asserted, how-
ever, that they have no designs on
Iran's independence or territorial
integrity, and it was assumed the
Teheran government would be per-
mitted to retain control of the do-
mestic administration.As soon as the occupation is com-
plete the Allies are expected to hasten
improvement of Iranian trans-
portation facilities to implement
the shipment of supplies from Brit-
ain and the United States to Russia.PROPOSES U. S.
BUILD BARGESSuggested As Means
for Transportation
Of OilWashington, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Ad-
miral Emory S. Land today propo-
sed construction of 100 oil-carrying
barges as the speediest and least ex-
pensive solution for shortages of
gasoline and fuel oil along the east-
ern seaboard.The blunt-spoken chairman of
the Maritime Commission said he
was opposed to construction of a
huge new pipeline from southwest-
ern oil fields to the East because it
would take 750,000 tons of steel badly
needed by the Navy and Mari-
time Commission.The admiral told a Senate com-
mittee that the barges could be towed
by tankers and other ships and
could be constructed at the rate of
20 a month, starting in January,
with about 100,000 tons of steel."I don't know where they are go-
ing to get this 750,000 tons of steel
(for the pipeline) but if it's to come
out of the Navy or my shops, then
I'm against it," Land said.Shortly before this, Land said
that seizure of 26 tankers by South
American republics was under a
"pro-forma agreement" and that
some of these might be used within
two months to meet any petroleum
shortage in this country.NEUSE BAPTIST GROUP

FUEHRER, DUCEFive-Day Conference
Conducted On East-
ern FrontAIMS SET FORTH
IN ANNOUNCEM'TObjectives Of Axis
Powers Listed As Re-
moving Causes Of
War And Develop-
ment of CooperationBerlin, Aug. 29.—(AP)—
Adolf Hitler and Benito
Mussolini concluded a secret
five-day meeting on the east-
ern front today with the an-
nouncement that they aimed
at removing the causes of
war and developing an har-
monious and profitable co-
operation for all the peoples
of Europe, predicated on
complete Axis victory.Their meeting began on Monday,
within sound of cannon-fire on the
front.It started just 11 days after
President Roosevelt and Prime Min-
ister Churchill's Atlantic conference
and expression of war and peace
aims were announced.The communique disclosing the
conference, which was attended by
the highest military and political
officials of both nations, said Hitler
and Mussolini discussed "all po-
litical and military questions con-
cerning the development and dura-
tion of the war."It listed "destruction of the Bol-
shevist danger and of plutocratic
exploitation" as necessary to create
the political, economic and cultural
cooperation envisioned for Europe.The Roosevelt-Churchill state-
ment of aims for world peace, free-
dom and prosperity envisaged the
destruction of "Nazi tyranny."It was indicated that the Fuehrer
and the Duce paid particular at-
tention in their discussions to the
length of time the war will continue.SELECTS HEAD
OF DELEGATIONRoosevelt Picks Har-
riman for Moscow
ConferencesWashington, Aug. 29.—(AP)—
President Roosevelt selected today
that he would appoint A. Averell
Harriman head of an American
delegation which will go to Moscow
to consider the problem of aid to
Russia.Harriman has been in London
handling lease-lend operations, and
Mr. Roosevelt said John Biggers,
who has been in charge of produc-
tion for the Office of Production
Management, would take over Har-
riman's duties in the British capital.The delegation to Moscow, which
will meet with corresponding British
and Russian groups, may be ap-
pointed within a few days, the Pres-
ident said, and may have a half
dozen members.Harriman originally was sent to
London, the President explained,
chiefly to handle shipping problems
and assist in getting aid to nations
resisting aggression.But the position enlarged itself,
Mr. Roosevelt said, to take in prob-
lems of production and supplies
of all kinds, and the point was reached
where the chief executive needed
another general trouble-shooter.Not only will Biggers take over
Harriman's duties, but he also will
attempt, Mr. Roosevelt said, to tie
British production problems more
closely with those of this country.Shiloh Revival Set
Start Sunday NightThe annual revival will begin at
the Shiloh Methodist church Sun-
day night, August 31, at 7:30 "old
time." Rev. J. G. Phillips of Beth-
el, pastor at Shiloh, will be in
charge of the services and will
preach at each of the services to be
concluded on Sunday night, Sep-
tember 7.A successful vacation church
school was conducted at Shiloh
church the second week in August
with fifty children enrolled. An
effort will be made to begin a Sun-
day school, and to make improve-
ments to the church property.

rail line (1) in the northern sector, where Leningrad is the ob-
jective of three-way ressure (arrows). Berlin also said their vic-
tory at Velikie Luki (2) had relieved Russian ressure on the cen-
tral front. In the Ukraine (3), the Germans claimed to have en-
tered Zaporozhe, a railway point, east of the Dnieper river.Committee Reports On
Anti-Argentine ProbePolitics Found In Na-
zi Welfare Organi-
zationsBuenos Aires, Aug. 29.—(AP)—
German Ambassador Edmund Von
Thermon was charged by a con-
gressional investigating committee
today with receiving money from
extensible German welfare or-
ganizations and using it for ends "for-
eign to his diplomatic character."The committee, which has been
investigating anti-Argentine activi-
ties for two months, submitted to
the House of Deputies its report on
Nazi penetration.It said there were 60,000 Germans
in Argentina organized into cells
and under oath to obey Adolf Hitler
and other Nazi leaders "to the
death."Paul Damonte Taborda, commit-
tee chairman, in a synopsis of the
report cited a receipt for 100,000
pesos allegedly bearing Von Ther-
mon's signature and acknowledging
payments by German welfare
organizations which the committee
charged were the "Nazi political
machine in disguise."He said a special report on ac-
tivities of the German embassy
staff would be presented later to
Congress.J. T. Lewis Heads
County PrincipalsJ. T. Lewis, principal of the Bel-
voir school, last night was elected
president of the Pitt County Prin-
ciples club to serve during the new
school year. He succeeds J. W.
Webster, who gave up the position
when he left the county system to
accept the principalship at Wal-

each third Monday night.LOCAL MARKET
ENDS 1ST WEEKDeclared One of Most
Successful In Mar-
ket's HistoryThe Greenville Tobacco Market
today was completing the first week
of the 1941 auction season — one
of the best opening weeks in the
51-year history of the Greenville
market.Sales of a million and a quarter
were estimated for today, the fourth
of the current season. Offerings
presented an increasing amount of
common tips and other inferior
leaf. To offset this, however, the
U. S. Government's Agricultural
Marketing Service reported some of
the grades were selling higher than
on opening day.For the first three days of sales
the Greenville market, a total of
4,165,534 pounds of the golden
weed for \$1,098,940.12, establishing
the high average price of \$26.38.As revealed by these figures, more
than a million dollars have been
paid out here in only three days.
With such a large amount of money
having been turned loose, the en-
tire community is feeling the result
as farmers start spending money,
yesterday's sales prices going for
40.41 and 42 cents per pound were
much more noticeable than on either
of the previous days.While it was advertised yesterday
that the warehouse floors would be
cleared, a sudden inflow of the leaf
in the afternoon brought more to-
bacco to the market than could be
disposed of. However, most of the
weed on the floors when sales were
concluded was brought for today's
sale and did not constitute a block,
according to Sales Supervisor R. C.

Seek Smash
Soviet ShipsViolent Naval Battle

Adolf Hitler's invasion
armies have captured the
long-besieged city of Tallinn,
capital of Estonia, the Ger-
man high command an-
nounced today, and a vio-
lent naval battle was believ-
ed raging in the Gulf of Fin-
land with the Germans at-
tempting to smash a fleeing
armada of Soviet warships
and troop transports.The thunder of gunfire in the
gulf was heard in Helsinki, 50 miles
across the gulf from Tallinn, and
Finnish fliers reported seeing many
dozens of Russian ships steaming
out of Tallinn and heading eastward
last night.German and Finnish fleets and
warplanes were said to be attacking
the Russians in their flight from
the burning capital.Finnish aerial observers also re-
ported great fires reddened the skies
last night over Vilpuri, indicating
that the Russians were destroying
their capital 75 miles north
of Leningrad. The flames were vis-
ible 32 miles away, the Finns said.Besides the capture of Tallinn,
"after a hard fight," the German
high command announced that
Nazi troops had seized the modern
port of Paldiski, 20 miles west.Meanwhile, the Russians sched-
uled another major setback—the fall
of the great Ukraine city of Dnie-
propetrovsk and destruction of the
\$110,000,000 Dnieper dam.The Nazi war bulletin declared
several thousand prisoners were
taken at the Tallinn naval base,
along with 22 loaded transports, six
coastal batteries and vast stores of
booty.With the fall of the port, German
troops now held control of all Baltic
territory except a few islands.Along with the Nazi capture of
Dniepropetrovsk population 500-
000 marking the end of the great
battle of the Dnieper river bridge,
the Russians conceded that German
assault troops had penetrated to
the approaches of Leningrad.Nazi military dispatches said that
German divisions were within 32
miles of the old czarist capital, Rus-
sia's second largest city, and that
the Finns were steadily advancing
from the north.Russian front line dispatches,
however, said Red armies were bat-
tling fiercely to save Kiev, the Uk-
raine capital, on the west bank of
the Dnieper river, while Red sailors
and soldiers trapped in the steer-
ing Black Sea port of Odessa fought
to execute Marshal Desmoy's
yenny's order for a defense "to the
last drop of blood."New 'Yoo-Hoo' Penalty Hike

"That I'm a degenerate, a maniac who scares little girls?"

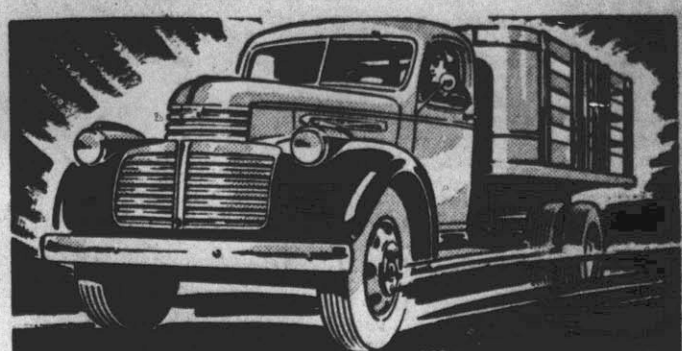
"Why did Miss Blanton leave your show?"

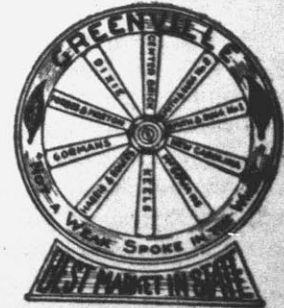

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Strength For The Day

HE IS ABLE

It seems blasphemous, does it not, that we should doubt the power of God to take care of us? He takes care of the heavens, and not a planet or star deviates from its course. He makes the seasons to follow one upon another, and summer and winter, seedtime and harvest never fail. If we look through the microscope, we observe Him at work in areas too minute for the naked eye to see. If we look to the heavens or into the human heart, we see quiet but majestic power at work everywhere.

Jesus seemed to feel that anxiety was one of the most marked evidences of a lack of faith, and therefore a sin. We cannot doubt His abhorrence of gross sins such as unchastity and intemperance, but He seemed to have been just as deeply concerned over the fact that men often worried about things they should have left in the hands of God. He declared that the Heavenly Father who clothes the field and marks the fall of a sparrow can be depended upon to look after the welfare of man whom He has made after His own image. He counseled His disciples to look to the health of their souls and assured them that if they did so, God would see to it that they were taken care of in every other way.

As a certain devout man lay on his death-bed, he said, "What do you think gives me special comfort now? The Creation. Did God create the world, or did I? I think He did. Now if He made the world, He can sufficiently take care of me."

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LABOR MISLEADERS

To put it bluntly, it is clear that certain powerful labor leaders have one aim in mind: To make it impossible for any man to obtain a job, any man to earn a living, unless he belongs to a labor union. These labor leaders, in short, are driving toward a labor monopoly—and toward personal dictatorship over every working man and woman in this country.

In pursuing that goal, these leaders will use any weapon that comes to hand. They will call strikes in defense industries, apparently not caring a whit that the country's security and safety are thereby imperiled. They will rig labor election in one way or another, so that the ordinary union man is virtually voiceless. They will, on occasions, stoop to violence and terrorism. They make use of that most terrible weapon—the blacklist. Their obvious purpose is to put the fear of God into workers and employers, so that they will knuckle under.

The callous disregard certain labor leaders have shown for government itself in this time of grave crisis indicates the way the wind blows. They make totally unjustified and impossible demands on industry on an "or else!" basis. Their methods are often impossible to differentiate from those of Capone in the heyday of organized vice. This projected labor monopoly is one of the most serious problems the



United States has ever faced. Let this state of affairs go on long enough, and the country will be helpless. A few fat-salaried labor leaders will rule this country as surely as Hitler rules his Reich. Nothing will be done without their permission—and on their terms. These are the syndicalistic tactics that did much to destroy France.—Southern Farmer.

Washington Daybook

Washington — You'd know the name in a minute. Her family makes a product used for generations. She's fat, worth millions, and covered with smiles and diamonds. Her friends admit she's inept.

So when she wanted to crash better make friends with the newspaper women. She asked them in to cocktails, and they flocked over to see the newcomer to Washington's social zoo. They said nice things, and she, fat and overdressed, beamed.

Finally she turned to a distinguished, gray-haired woman, a stranger standing next to her, and looking at the crowd of newspaper women, said: "Really, several look as though they are well-born."

The gray-haired woman, a top-notch reporter, drawled: "So? How can YOU tell?"

The fact is, some of Washington's newspaper women are much-sought dinner guests. True, some are frumps. And true, again, some are fashion plates. But they can talk well, and they wield an influence which no canny newcomer ignores.

They wield influence both in the drawing rooms and in the corridors side the House and Senate chambers, depending on their abilities. Let me cite a few instances:

The most dramatic, in the politicians - versus-a-newspaper - woman category, occurred when a reform bill was up in the House.

That bill was the special enthusiasm of little, red-haired Ruth Finney who has written politics for 15 years. The issue was ticklish so the House decided on a teller vote. A teller vote is a skirt to hide behind. The House members parade by tellers and announce their votes in near whispers. As a result, the individual votes are not known.

But there was a catch which Miss Finney saw. The "no" votes spoke to one man, and the "yes" votes to another. So Miss Finney organized a staff, and they spotted each representative as he walked by the two tellers. That night Miss Finney printed the vote, man by man. There was consternation in the House. The bill finally passed, and many think it was due to Miss Finney's maneuver. Her political enemies call her "Little Poison Ivy."

There are more subtle jobs. I've often listened to newspaper woman Esther Van Wagoner Tufty, sister of Michigan's young governor, give various congressmen advice on projected speeches.

Mrs. Roosevelt also is known to confer with a trusted few on plans. I remember one time when three newspaper women beat a rich lobby here that was putting pressure on a

cabinet member. The secretary was swamped with phone calls from influential Washington women who had been spark-plugged by the newspaper women. The lobby was beaten.

There's an easy camaraderie here between the writers and the women who hold big federal jobs. The jobholders often show an imaginative sympathy for the writing women's problems.

I remember the time a man editor ordered me to see Secretary Frances Perkins and get a year's review from "the women's angle."

Miss Perkins chuckled: "Go back and tell your editor women are also able to find a woman's angle to any real news."

Short Shots

Raleigh, Aug. 29.—The August issue of North Carolina Employment Security Information, organ of the U. C. C. and the State Employment Service carried a lengthy story rejoicing that "the North Carolina Supreme Court, in a recent decision cemented into place the principal stones in the foundation of the Unemployment Compensation law."

In view of the case to come before the seven Tar Heel justices next week (In re George Mitchell is its official designation) this rejoicing may have been a bit premature.

While it is doubtless almost beyond the bounds of belief that the Supreme Court would, at this date declare the U. C. C. law unconstitutional in any of its main phases, this Mitchell case raises again the whole question of the statute's validity; and has been deemed by

the U. C. C. of sufficient importance to submit a 46 page brief (if any document that long can properly be so called) in defense of the act.

Said counsel: "This brief has become rather lengthy because not only is the question raised as to the findings of law by the commission—but the question of the constitutionality of our act was attacked."

There seems no reason to fear for the life of the act, however, as the Mitchell case came before the lower courts before the Supreme Court's ruling in U. C. C. versus Willis Barber Shop had been handed down. This latter case, counsel points out in the brief, seems controlling on all the constitutional points.

What does remain to be adjudicated is the claim of Mitchell that he was covered by employment compensation because he worked for a partnership which also conducted a like business as a corporation; making the two practically a joint enterprise.

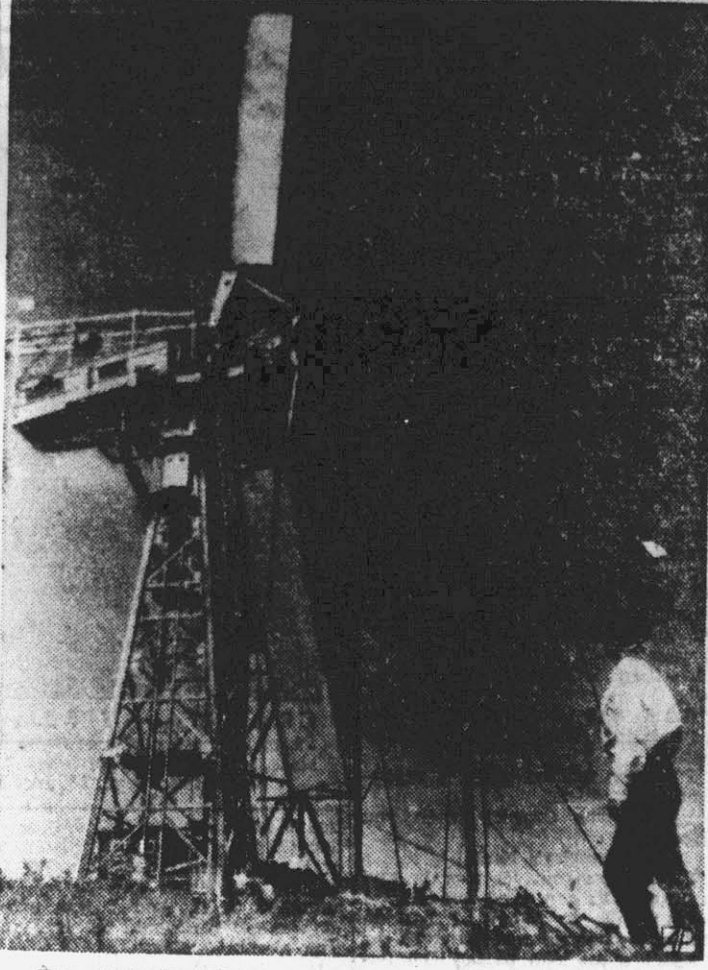

Convict Two More Under UCC Counts

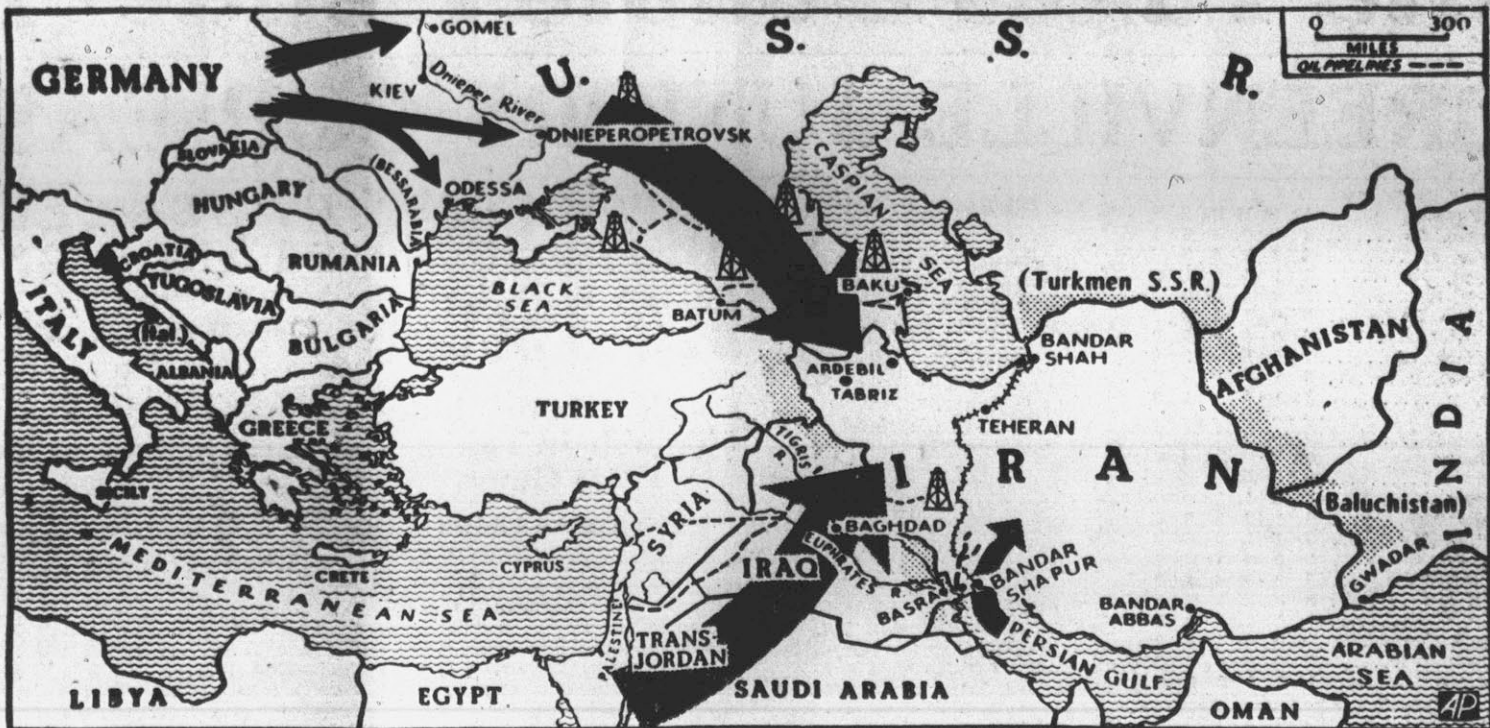

Conquest Of Iran Promises New Routes To Russia



Black arrows on this map show German penetration of the Soviet Ukraine; shaded arrows indicate direction of Russian and British drives into Iran. The Russians said their Cossacks had reached half-way from the border to Tabriz, Iran's second-largest city. Russian forces also were heading for Ardebil on the east shore of the Caspian sea. The Russians also had a force on the east shore. The rail terminus of Bandar Shah would be one of their objectives. The British disclosed that they had occupied oil installations just inside Iran, about 80 miles northeast of Baghdad and that the air force and the navy had seized the Persian gulf port of Bandar Shapur and nearby Abadan, seizing Axis ships. Conquest of Iran would provide an all-season supply route from Egypt and from the gulf.

OFFERS TO BUY MUCH TOBACCO

Federal Agency To Take Leaf Off Dealers' Hands

David T. House, Pitt county tobacco farmer and member of the state AAA committee, said today the Commodity Credit Corporation had offered to buy from American dealers as much as 10,000,000 pounds of flue-cured tobacco from the 1939 crop to meet present requirements of British leaf manufacturers. The CCC, in requesting bids from dealers on 1939 flue-cured tobacco, offered to pay the original cost of the leaf, plus expenses incurred in packing, transportation, storage and carrying costs over the period ending September 1 this year. Committee House said. Interested dealers should submit bids to the CCC, Washington, D. C., by Wednesday, September 10, it was added. Forms for the submission of bids will be supplied by the federal agency upon request. Dealers, in offering bids, should specify for each grade: the quantity in hogsheads and pounds, redried weight, the average auction floor price, transportation, storage and other carrying costs which contribute to the aggregate cost of the weed to date. All information thus submitted must be motorized and subject to verification. For offers which may be accepted, Mr. House explained, the CCC will consider the quality of the leaf, initial warehouse cost, its suitability for the British trade and the bid price. Before tobacco can be accepted by the CCC for relay to the British trade, it must be inspected by a committee composed of representatives of the tobacco trade and the CCC. Final acceptance of the tobacco will hinge upon inspection of each hogshead offered for sale, the Pitt county farmer concluded.

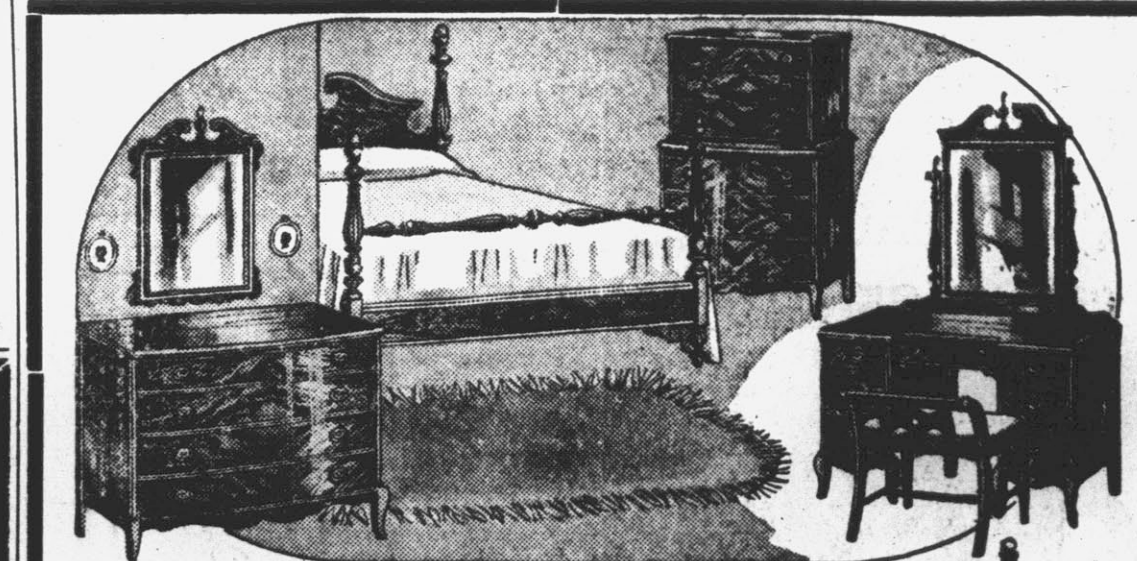
