

REDS CLAIM NAZI THRUSTS TO MOSCOW HALTED

SYMPATHY FOR COLETTE SEEN IN PARIS PRESS

Laval, Meanwhile, Fighting Desperately For Life

LEGION ASKING FOR CLEMENCY

All Jews In Occupied Territory Ordered To Hand Over Receiving Sets To Officials

Vichy, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Sympathy for Paul Colette, youthful De Gaulist who attempted to assassinate Pierre Laval this week became evident today, even as the wounded politician lay fighting for his life.

In response to sentiment in favor of Colette, the anti-Soviet Legion, which Laval was sponsoring when he was shot, decided to back Laval's gesture in asking that Colette be treated with clemency.

Furthermore, latest editions of the newspapers of German-occupied Paris were much milder in attacks on Colette than they had been, and some even defended him.

At the same time, letters and telegrams of condolences for Laval continued to pour into the Versailles hospital, where he remained in grave condition. After a slight rally last night during which his temperature dropped and plans for an operation were held in readiness, his condition was aggravated this morning. A morning bulletin did not mention the temperature.

Examination of Colette by a magistrate was delayed pending a more thorough investigation of his connection in Marseilles and other French towns.

It was disclosed today that a German firing squad—not French, as previously reported—had executed eight men for espionage and activity against German occupation authorities.

Furthermore, the victims, including a French count and a Netherlands, had been sentenced by a German military court and not by the new special anti-Communist court, as first reported.

One of the most sweeping measures of the drive against possible sources of the growing opposition to German collaboration with Germany was the ordering today to turn over to police their radio receiving sets.

But German-French repression is being directed more and more against De Gaulist elements in opposition to German intervention. This opposition itself has become increasingly marked.

J. E. Willoughby Claimed By Death

Joseph E. Willoughby, 56, died at his home in the Bell Arthur community Friday afternoon at five o'clock. He had been in declining health for three years. He had been in bed for the last few months. Funeral services will be conducted from the home Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock eastern standard time, by Rev. K. W. Taylor, Methodist minister of Walstonburg, assisted by Rev. J. C. Moyer, Free Will Baptist minister of Snow Hill. Burial will follow in Greenwood cemetery.

Mr. Willoughby, son of the late Thomas and Betty Crawford Willoughby, was born, reared and spent his entire life on the farm on which he died. He was one of Bell Arthur's most prominent citizens and for a number of years he had served as constable in that township. He was a member of the Bell Arthur Methodist church. He married Besie Sutton, daughter of the late J. W. Sutton and Mrs. Sutton of the Bell Arthur community, on January 1, 1911.

Surviving are his wife, four sons: Larry Bruce of Green county, Joseph of Bell Arthur, and Louis Skinner and Hallet Ward Willoughby of the home; four daughters: Mrs. Seth Meadows of Green county, Mrs. Sidney O'Neal of Bell Arthur, Mrs. Lulla and Ann Willoughby, both of the home, and seven grandchildren.

GOOD AVERAGE IS MAINTAINED

Market Ready For Beginning Of Second Week

A total of \$1,401,605.01 was paid out on the Greenville tobacco market during the first week—four sales days—the auction center has operated this season. A substantial increase having been shown in the offerings, money paid out and average over figures for the corresponding date last year.

With the floors having been cleared yesterday in preparation to receiving tobacco for the beginning of the second week of sales Monday, better grades were declared to be selling stronger and many observers were advising farmers that now is a good time to sell some of their good leaf.

Beginning next week the market is expected to be down to routine with the result that everything will go off according to schedule and without any interruptions, which are of necessity associated with the first few days of the season.

Although much inferior tobacco was offered on the floors during the past week, an average of 25.79 was maintained for the four days. Offerings totalled 5,435,146 and brought \$1,401,605.01, compared with offerings of \$4,001,892 for \$653,727.70 and an average of 16.33 for the corresponding period last season.

A substantial increase is shown in each figure—offerings 1,533,254 money paid out \$747,377.31, or more than 50 per cent, an average of 9.46.

With such a situation, observers can readily see why farmers are encouraged after one week of sales.

BRITAIN ACTS GET SUBJECTS OUT OF JAPAN

Mass Evacuation Indicated By Tokyo Statement

PLANS TO SEND SHIP TO NIPPON

Japanese Government Meanwhile, Closely Studies Delicate Relations With Britain And U. S.

Tokyo, Aug. 30.—(AP)—A mass evacuation of British subjects from the Japanese empire was indicated today in a British embassy announcement that it had arranged for a ship to come to Japan to remove all British nationals desiring to leave.

As the Japanese government studied closely its delicate relations with both Great Britain and the United States as a result of the Russian-German war, the British embassy issued the following statement:

"In view of freezing regulations a number of British subjects have declared their intention of leaving Japan at the first opportunity. To facilitate their departure the British government will shortly send a ship to Japan."

"British subjects who wish to avail themselves of this opportunity are being requested to get in touch with the nearest British consular office."

There are about 1,000 Britons living throughout the empire. Throughout all Japan tonight, each British subject was to receive from his consul a letter following the lines of the embassy statement. The British are discreetly silent on details concerning the type of ship to come and the time of its arrival. Nothing was said about the route here or where the vessel would go afterward.

The Japanese government for the moment turned its principal attention to the United States, getting a detailed report on the American situation from the minister in Washington, Kaname Wakasugi, who arrived home today and immediately went into conference with Toyoda.

United States Ambassador Joseph C. Grew cancelled plans to spend the week-end outside the capital.

SAYS CHINESE ON OFFENSIVE

Announces Initiative Assumed In Five Provinces

Chungking, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Chinese forces have gone on the offensive in five provinces and are threatening the capitals of two of them in operations begun Monday. The Chinese war ministry said today.

Nanchang, capital of Kiangsi, and Foochow, capital of Fukien, were being menaced yesterday by strong forces of Chinese, and small scale attacks have been launched against Japanese posts in Chekiang, southern Kiangsu and southern Anhwei provinces, the ministry said.

(Chinese troops have reached a point on the Min river 10 miles northwest of Foochow, and severe fighting has been in progress in the Lienkung area northeast of the capital, a Chinese central news dispatch to Hongkong said today.)

So far the Japanese have suffered 2,500 casualties, the ministry said. Chinese troops have reached the walls of Shanghai, famous Chekiang province, and center and Japanese were expected to withdraw, it was said.

(Japanese at Pieping claimed today the capture of Chenchaiyuan, Chinese Communist base in Hopei province, and the encirclement of 40,000 troops.)

Roosevelt Works On Two Addresses

Hyde Park, N. Y., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Accompanied by Harry L. Hopkins, President Roosevelt came to his Hudson Valley home here today to make two possibly weighty addresses in three days.

Although Hopkins, the President's lease-lend supervisor, is a relatively frequent guest at the Roosevelt estate, his presence on the train trip from Washington this time stirred up new speculations about what the chief executive might say in a speech this afternoon to the Roosevelt club and in another Monday to the nation.

It appeared likely that any detailed discussion of the tempestuous international situation would be reserved for the speech Monday, when the President will have 15 minutes on radio networks.

He will speak at 12:45 p. m. EST.

COURT SESSION IS CONCLUDED

School Teacher Gets Two Years In Holiday Wreck Case

This week's criminal session of 21st Superior court was concluded yesterday, with the next criminal term being scheduled for October, although a week of civil court is to get under way Monday, September 8.

Charles F. Norton, driver of a car which was involved in a wreck on a curve on the Falkland highway last December 1 while he was returning from a Thanksgiving holiday to Avon, where he was teaching school, was given a two-year sentence. He was acquitted of a driving drunk charge, the sentences coming on charges of driving reckless and reckless and assault with a deadly weapon.

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Slomb of Benson, occupants of the other car involved, were injured in the wreck, as was Miss Elizabeth Nowell of Goldsboro, passenger and owner of the car being driven by Norton.

Among the other cases disposed of at the concluding day of the session was one charging David Cannon, 17, of Ayden with attempted rape. The young man, described to be of low mentality, was ordered committed to the East Carolina Industrial Training School after pleading nolo contendere to the charge.

Amos Mills, charged with permitting a fire to get out of control, was freed on a directed verdict of acquittal.

James Reed was given three to five years on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

Two Negroes, Harry and Alex Mueller, charged with larceny, were given six months sentence each, the terms suspended on good behavior for five years. Another Negro, Bert McCafferty, was given six months on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

IN FINE SHAPE JURY REPORTS

Grand Jury Submits Findings To Judge Q. K. Nimocks

All municipal jails, the county jail, county home, state convict camp and various county offices are in fine shape and are due high commendation, according to the report of the new Pitt County Grand Jury submitted to Judge Q. K. Nimocks at the closing session of criminal court here yesterday afternoon.

In his charge to the jury, Judge Nimocks instructed the body to make a thorough investigation of all institutions of the county, "not with a view to giving praise where praise is not due, as such a visit would be worse than no visit at all," but with the idea of actually determining the situation.

The Grand Jury yesterday reported it had visited these places and found everything in order.

The report, submitted by Chairman A. L. Woolard of Stokes, follows: "We, the Grand Jury have passed on all bills coming before us and rendered our decisions thereon, according to evidence presented. "As directed by the court, we have visited all municipal jails in the county and found them satisfactory in every respect. These jails have no problem of segregation as the prisoners are transferred to the county jail when the matter of segregation arises."

"We also visited the county jail where we found the necessary segregation of prisoners, as the law provides. We were particularly impressed with the clean and highly sanitary condition of the jail, and an examination of the food purchases showed the variety and quantity of food to be highly satisfactory. Prisoners were interviewed and expressed themselves as being well satisfied with both food and management. We were particularly impressed with the low cost of operation and we feel the jailor W. G. Leggett, is to be commended."

"We visited the county home and found every evidence of excellent management. There is an abundant supply of fall crops of every kind; more than 100 hogs, a milk supply in excess of 15 gallons daily; 836 half gallons of canned vegetables, fruits and preserves; a large quantity of cured meats, and many other evidences of an ample food supply, all of which shows a deep personal interest on the part of the superintendent and the matron. The sanitary conditions are good and the inmates are well looked after. We find several of the inmates are invalids, which increases the cost of operation, as their condition necessitates constant nursing care. All inmates interviewed expressed themselves as being contented and spoke in the most favorable terms of the matron and superintendent."

"We visited the state convict camp where conditions are excellent and we commend Superintendent Crawford for the fine work he is doing."

"We inspected all the county offices and found them, insofar as we were able to determine, in satisfactory condition. Several of the officials, on invitation, appeared before the Grand Jury and made detailed statements concerning the work done by their offices. From these reports the Grand Jury is satisfied that the public is being efficiently served and employees generally are endeavoring to render efficient and loyal service. We find

Say Germ'y Has Endured Heavy Loss

Germany, Meanwhile, Reports Destruction Of 100 Soviet Ships Laden With Troops Trying To Flee Captured Estonian Capital; Shortages Of War Materials Acknowledged On All Sides

(By The Associated Press)

The German thrust toward Moscow has been stopped with ten thousand German slain or wounded in great battles on rain-drenched fields, the Russians asserted today, while the Germans reported destruction of up to 100 Soviet ships laden with troops fleeing from Tallinn, Estonia.

These rival claims of victories in widely separated areas came as both the Axis and the Allies were acknowledging shortages in vital sinews of war needed in the expanding general conflict, now nearly two years old.

Rome dispatches said sharp Axis needs for oil and other raw materials were major items in the Hitler-Mussolini war talks, along with discussion of means to safeguard the continent against possibility of a British or American invasion.

British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden declared production of war material by Britain, her allies and the United States "still falls short of our needs," and predicted those needs would grow as the war widened "until it engulfs the world." He spoke at Coventry.

Eden mentioned that Britain must help meet the needs of Russia and remarked that the war thus far has shown that "to be short of materials is the most costly method of waging war."

The German press was busy extolling the conference of the two dictators as sealing an Axis plan for permanent European peace—based on a decisive German-Italian victory. Japanese dispatches said the conference also dealt with American-Japanese relations.

In Rome, the five-day sessions which ended yesterday were understood by political circles to have dealt with raw materials and the means to supply them to continue the war in its third year.

Of food there is enough, it was said, but other necessities of modern war-making remained to be found—particularly oil, without which the panzers and planes and submarines might as well not exist.

Coming through the Italian censorship, along with this unusual acknowledgment was word from well-informed political sources that Premier Mussolini had agreed to supply as many Italian soldiers for the front and workers for Germany as Hitler might require.

The same sources said it was assumed that the Fuehrer and Duke discussed means of bringing all of Europe, including nervously neutral Portugal and Turkey, into a solid "new order" front against the possibility of British or American invasion.

Both in Rome and Berlin, the Axis meeting was pictured as an answer to the talks of President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill at sea earlier this month. News of direct action in the war was comparatively scarce, but Leningrad's period grew ominously closer.

The Finns reported a thrust to Kivenappa, 30 miles north of the old czarist capital, along with capture of the ruined city of Viipuri, 75 miles north.
