PLEA IS MADE BY CHURCHILL FOR MORE AID

Looks to Nations Outside Range Of Conqueror

CANADA IS SEEN AS "LINCHPIN"

Prime Minister Points To Canada's Friendly Relations And Affectionate Intimacy With U. S.

London, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill told a lord mayor's luncheon today that the only way Germany could be beaten is by the full cooperation of all nations which "as yet lie outside the range of the conquerors' power."

The Prime Minister, who spoke at a luncheon with W. C. Mackenzie King, Canadian prime minister, described Canada as "the linchpin of the English-speaking world."

"Canada, with those relations of a friendly and affectionate intimacy with the United States on the one hand, and with her unswerving fidelity to the British Commonwealth and motherland on the other is the link which joins together these great branches of the human family," he said.

More Than 700 Well-Armed Germans Threaten To Resist Any Attempted Seizure Contrary To International Law

Tehran, Iran, Sept. 4.—(AP)—More than 700 well-armed Germans inside the thick walled compound of the German legation at suburban Shehgan threatened bitter resistance today against any attempt to seize them "contrary to international law."

Iranian police, acting at British-Russian suggestion, forbade the Germans to leave the compound after they planned to take refuge in the Turkish legation to prevent internment in Russia or India.

Turkish quarters denied they had consented to use of the legation, saying explicit instructions from Ankara were to avoid any controversy which might harm Turkey's foreign relations.

The British-Russian information, however, said the Germans were packed for moving.

The report that the Nazis planned resistance came from diplomats who were in contact with the German legation and said the hundreds of men of military age there were fully armed with rifles and pistols.

FIRST TANKER WITH U. S. OIL REACHES USSR

Arrival Is Reported Amid Increasing Oriental Tension

U. S. - JAPANESE TERMS STRAINED

Tokyo Simmers With Talk Of Total Mobilization Against Encirclement as U.S. Aids Russians

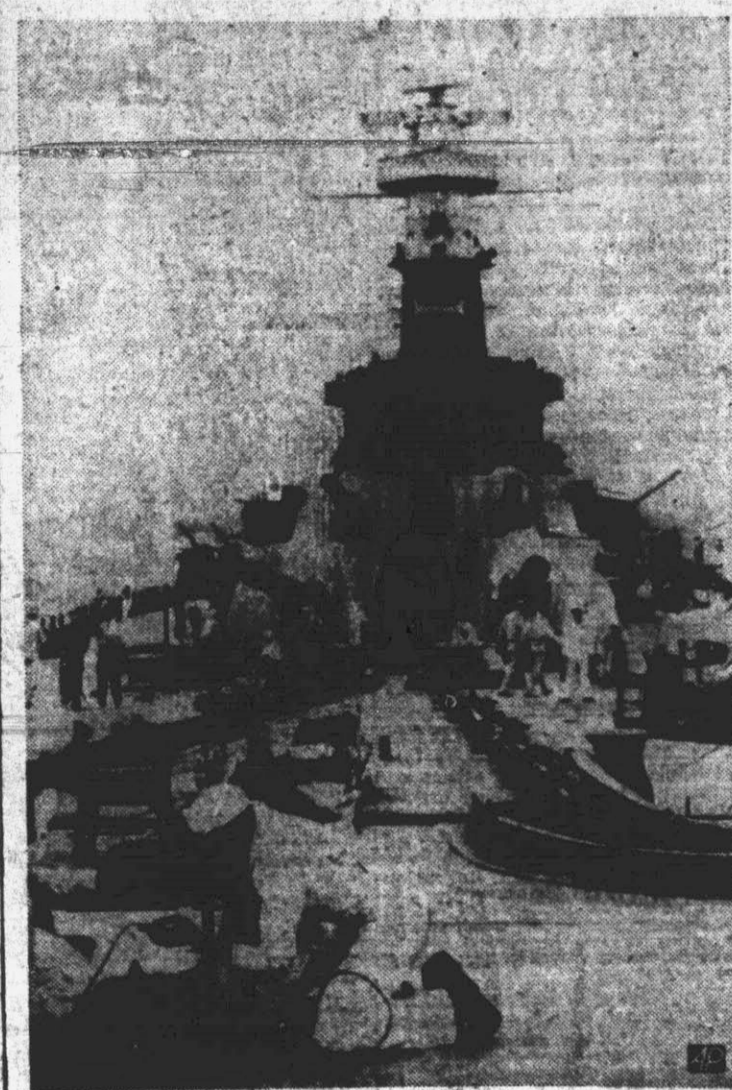
(By The Associated Press) Amid Oriental tension, the first United States tanker carrying aviation gasoline fuel for the Red air force was reported today to have reached Vladivostok.

Currently the strain in Japanese-United States relations hinges on the program, now under way, of sending lease-lend supplies to Russia through the Sea of Japan, for use against Germany.

This week while the first tanker approached the Russian port, Japan simmered with talk of total mobilization against "encirclement" and establishment of an ocean safety zone around Japan by expansion of territorial waters to include nearby waters leading to Vladivostok.

This agitation was persistent today, topped by the declaration in a diplomatic review sponsored by the Tokyo Foreign Office, that the United States and Britain were pushing rapidly toward a goal of (Continued on page eight)

Fate Of All Four Areas Seems Near

Russians Claim Assault On Leningrad Checked, But Pravda Admits Enemy Has Broken Thru; Terrific Fighting Rages On Approaches To Kiev; Russians Claim Deepest Thrusts West Of Moscow

(By The Associated Press) The battle of Russia is surging toward a climax in the four principal sectors of the main Russian-German front, on the immediate approaches to Leningrad in the north, on the front west of Moscow, on the railways and highways converging on Kiev, and on the siege ring around Odessa.

The Russians said that the assault on Leningrad, now threatened on the north by victorious Finns and on the south by the Germans, had been checked, but Pravda, Moscow organ of the Communist party, admitted that "the beastly, treacherous enemy is breaking through on the approaches to the city."

Inhabitants of Leningrad, had turned out to build a deep, continuous defense line to meet their fate, determined, it was said, to turn the approaches into graveyards for the invaders.

Terrific fighting has started on the approaches to Kiev, capital of the Ukraine, with the Russians declaring the Germans repulsed by stiff counter attack. In one outlying village, several German regiments were said to have sustained loss of more than 1,000 men in dead and wounded.

Somewhere on the indefinite front west of Moscow the Russians claimed their deepest counter thrust, while the Red fleet, taking advantage of its command of the Black sea, was attempting to relieve Odessa by landing storm troops behind the German-Romanian siege line.

The success of the offensive was pictured by German and Russian sources independent of the official communiques.

To Start Work Soon On Greenville Bus Station

Building To Be Erected By Dr. Wooten On 5th Street

Dr. W. I. Wooten, who has been granted a franchise by the Board of Aldermen to erect a bus terminal here, announced today that plans had been agreed upon for the erection of the structure on West Fifth street, on the site where the Hut now stands, and that work would get under way in the near future.

Dr. Wooten will erect a building meeting the specifications of the Carolina Coach Company and he and W. G. Humphrey of Raleigh, traffic manager for the bus line, have been working on arrangements for some time.

Plans as first drawn were rejected, but revisions have been made and accepted by all parties.

The Carolina Coach Company will operate the terminal under lease from Dr. Wooten.

The building will be modern throughout, with separate waiting rooms for white and colored patrons. A lunch room also is provided in plans for the structure. Arrangements have been worked out whereby there will be a minimum of congestion for incoming and outgoing buses.

Frank Benton, Wilson architect who had charge of the new municipal building and re station, will supervise the construction of the bus terminal building.

Dr. Wooten said he was unable to state exactly when work would get under way or when the building would be completed, but he stated that work would be started as soon as possible.

To Die Tomorrow For Paid Killings

Raleigh, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Tom Melvin, 42-year-old Negro convicted of being a hired murderer, will be hanged tomorrow morning in Central prison here.

Governor Broughton today declined to intervene to stay the execution.

Melvin was sentenced in Wayne county last January for the slaying of G. Irvy Holmes, on December 1, 1936.

The state contended that he was hired by Mrs. Holmes to kill the white man.

Edwin Gill, Commissioner of Prisons, issued a statement today asserting that both Melvin and Mrs. Holmes had confessed. The woman who pleaded guilty to accessory before the fact, now is serving a life sentence.

The only basis upon which executive clemency has been requested has been the fact that some good citizens of Wayne county feel that the prisoner should not suffer death when his accomplice, Mrs. Holmes who instigated the crime and who persuaded him to commit the act received only life imprisonment, the statement said.

"In this connection, the governor does not feel that it would be proper for him to attempt to correct what they contend is an inequality in punishment which exists in the law itself. The maximum punishment for the accessory before the fact is life imprisonment. The only punishment provided for murder in the first degree of which Melvin was convicted) is death.

Declares Britain To Call More Men

London, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The Laborite Daily Herald said today that "sweeping new plans for calling up millions of men for military service will be announced soon by the government."

No authority was quoted. "This move is the first indication that vital new decisions on war strategy have recently been taken by the government, arising out of developments on the Russian front," the Herald said. The paper said that those principally affected would be men under 40 now in reserve occupations. Britain now has approximately 4,000,000 men under arms.

South-Wide Meet Called For Union

Charlotte, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Leaders of the American Federation of Hosiery Workers (AFH) will hold a south-wide conference here Saturday.

Cedric Stallings, North Carolina field representative of the union, said a new form of contract, which went into effect Tuesday, would be discussed. The contract provides for a 10 to 18 per cent wage increase, vacations with pay and several other new features, he said.

Speakers at the conference will include Alexander McKown of Philadelphia, president; Alfred Hoffman of Washington, vice-president and union representative in the OPM; Edward F. Callaghan of Chattanooga, Tenn., second vice-president, and William Smith of Philadelphia, secretary-treasurer. Union leaders reported steadily increasing unemployment in the hosiery manufacturing industry caused by lack of raw silk due to the government's embargo on Japanese imports.

FOREST PRIMEVAL TO REMAIN THAT WAY

Colorado Springs, Colo.—(AP)—Forest service officials have discovered a forest so beautiful they have started a movement to have it set aside perpetually as an area where never a woodman's axe may ring.

E. S. Keithley, supervisor of Pike National Forest, said the trees are Engelmer spruce with a stump diameter of about 30 inches and some are 125 feet high—as tall as a seven story building. They cover a 40-acre tract.

Keithley said the area was "discovered" while he was on an inspection trip. He said the timber was virgin, spared for many years from forest fire or timber cutters. He has suggested the forest service set aside the area as a forest primeval and build a road to it so that the public may see the giant trees.

London Populace Learns To Handle Blitz Repairs

London — Preparing for great intensification of air raids during fall and winter months, the British Ministry of Works has formed a mobile organization which intends to be repairing damage to homes within 10 minutes after completion of blitzes to come.

During the summer raid lull 90,000 workers have repaired 95 per cent of the damaged houses in the London area which were repairable. Costs were borne by the 28 London boroughs.

Almost no repairs have been made to London's historic buildings, except for minor work on roofs and windows. Great holes still gape.

Wrecked Buildings Removed.
No figures are available on repair of private or public business properties, but informed sources say thousands of laborers have been on that job for months. In London's huge business area, temporary repairs have been made to hundreds of damaged business buildings, which again are filled with workers, their structures too badly damaged have been torn down.

Other crews have been repairing utilities, city streets, sidewalks, and the Ministry says, "the greater part of that task is completed." No London street is closed now because of bomb damage.

The Ministry adds that 72,000 damaged houses were made habitable again in one recent week. The total included 40,000 in the province and 32,000 in London "which suf-

fered twice as much damage in air raids as the rest of Britain combined."

MEMORIAL TO AN INSECT

It seems a strange thing to build a foundation and dedicate it to an insect, particularly when that insect happens to be a boll weevil which has so ruthlessly operated against the cotton crop in the South. But the people of Enterprise, Coffee County, Alabama, actually built a fountain some years ago and dedicated it to the boll weevil in profound appreciation for what it had done as the herald of prosperity.

The moral need hardly be pointed out. We could all dedicate a fountain to some boll weevil which, after a season of suffering, has brought us prosperity. If we could arrange our lives as we desire, none of us, perhaps, would choose anything but sunshine and happy achievement. But God often sees to it that we are kept in the pathway of creative living by disconcerting experiences. Some boll weevil drives us from what we want to do; from what God wants us to do; from what living to real living.

BICYCLES DEADLY TOO

No doubt you have driven along the streets or highways and noticed children on bicycles weaving in and out of traffic, swerving from one side of the road to the other, or otherwise paying no attention to the rules of traffic or safety. Such practices caused accidental death to 25 bicyclists in this state during the first seven months of this year, an increase of 80 per cent over the corresponding period of last year.

Realizing the seriousness of this situation the State Highway Safety Division has issued the following 12 safety rules for bicyclists which if put into practice will save many lives in the months to come:

1. Refrain from "clever" or "stunt" riding.
2. Dismount and walk across dangerous intersections.
3. Keep to the right and close to the edge of the roadway.
4. Learners should ride in a park or another safe place.
5. Ride without wobbling; avoid sharp turns.
6. Say "No" to anyone desiring to ride as a passenger.
7. Never hitch onto a moving vehicle.
8. At night, carry a light in front and either a light or reflector in the rear.
9. Stop for all stop signs.
10. If parcels are carried, strap them to the frame and place in a basket carrier.
11. Avoid crowded streets

T. Barnum, William Jennings Bryan, Mark Twain, Calvin Coolidge and others. The "remains" were the property of George Vincent, who they say, "has an eye for the future and an ear for the past." He collects "voices" as a hobby.

Thus to Mr. Vincent's office went Beatrice Kay, who is interested in songs of the so-called Gay Nineties. She is going to imitate the late Lillian Russell, and she wanted to hear the voice of Miss Russell herself. From these recordings it is now possible to obtain fine instruction, which should be a boom to film companies producing pictures of the departed great.

Miss Kay tells me she holds rehearsals each week singing the songs that were popular 50 years ago and by "auditioning" Gay Nineties voices via phonograph.

It was a train ride that enabled Ben Carson, radio engineer, to plot out his "magic brain" of radio, the device that now plays both sides of phonograph records without changing or turning them over. He was on a train one day when he noticed

Each, dead in its own way, with the supernatural. Each mingles living characters with the shades of others long dead. One does this strictly for comedy—and "Mr. Jordan" is one of the brightest comedies of this or any year. The others have elements of comedy—and something else we call Americanism.
This is no ordinary movie cycle no ordinary follow-the-leader jump on a bandwagon. Here are three stories, all of them in process of creation by their authors at approximately the same time, all of them reaching out for entertainment along unusual lines.
It may be just coincidence. It may be, as Stuart Heister (director of "Andrew") suggests, the product of a search for "escape" entertainment combined with a timely message, not propaganda but a reminder.
They are interesting pictures. "Andrew" is still in production, and its ghosts fill the stages like portraits from the history books. Dalton Trumbo's story is of a small town clerk who, aided by the spirits of Andrew Jackson, George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson and other characters—including Jesse James and a lowly private of Washington's army—puts to rout a group of small-time crooks who aren't doing right by popular government. William Holden is the boy; Brian Donlevy plays the shade of Jackson visible to Holden, his historic con-

temporarily, to the audience but to no others; and George Waits, from the stage, looks in make-up more like Franklin than Ben's own pictures do. Montague Love is Washington, Gilbert Emery is Jefferson.
After years of using "transparent" figures to represent movie ghosts, all three of these new movies establish their inviolability otherwise, and let them proceed as usual. "The Devil and Daniel Webster" does not bother even to make Walter Hueston's Mr. Scratch invisible; anybody in the picture can see him whenever he's around, but it's just the chosen few who know his real home address.
This may seem simpler, at first thought, than using the standard ghost technique, but Stuart Heister believes otherwise. New Ruling Revealed On Turning of Wheat

The office of County Agent E. R. Bennett today issued the following statement regarding a new ruling regarding turning of wheat as a soil building practice:

"Since the 1942 Farm Program Bulletin for North Carolina has been issued, a change has been made in regard to turning wheat as a green manure for a soil building practice.

"The new ruling is quoted as follows:

"Credit will be given where wheat is turned as a green manure crop on a non-wheat allotment farm. No credit given for mature wheat left on the land.

"Wheat allotments have been set up for farms that produced wheat in any one of the three years 1938, 1939 or 1940. Any farm in Pitt county that has a wheat allotment may request that it be changed to a non-allotment wheat farm at the time the producer signs his 1942 farm plan, or his farm will be classified as a non-allotment wheat farm if he plants wheat 10 per cent in excess of his allotment.

"Since farms that had a wheat allotment of less than 10 acres were not notified of their wheat allotment, producers who wish to know what their wheat allotment is may ask for it at the county agent's office.

"For the 1942 crop year any farm (all land under one serial number) may plant 15 acres of wheat without penalty on soil conservation payments or marketing quotas.

"Three acres per family may be elected in lieu of 15 acres per farm; if all the wheat produced is used on the farm and the tenant families share in its production.

"Crimson clover, Austrian winter peas, vetch, and rye-grass will not be available through the Agricultural Conservation Association as a grant of aid due to the scarcity of seed. If producers need these seeds in order to meet their soil-building goals for 1941, they should get in touch with their local seed dealer at once.

"Some of the Pitt county merchants and seed dealers have agreed to have an adequate supply of these seeds for Pitt county producers; however, orders should be placed as soon as possible since there is a shortage of seed."

"Because he loved her?"

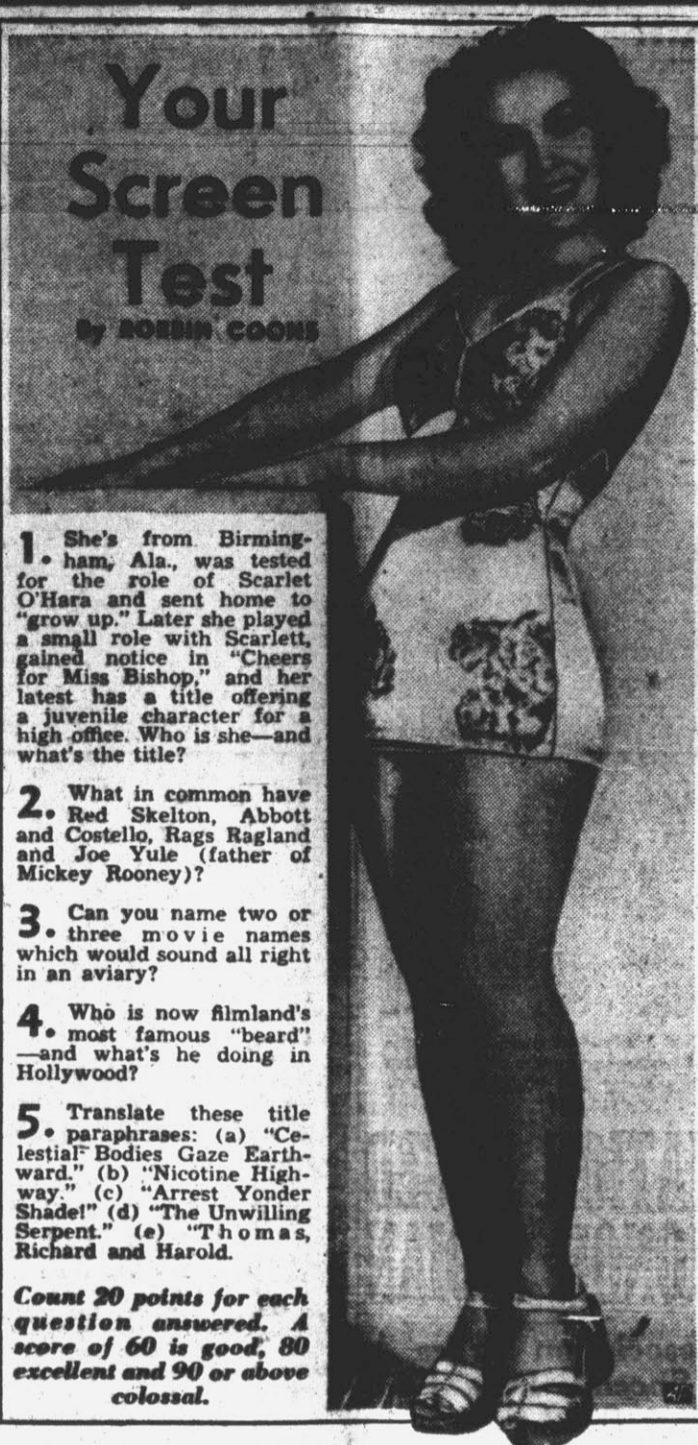
"Amelia convinced me that there were no men in Eve's life, no men at all, let alone Bowers. No, he did not love her. And she didn't love him."

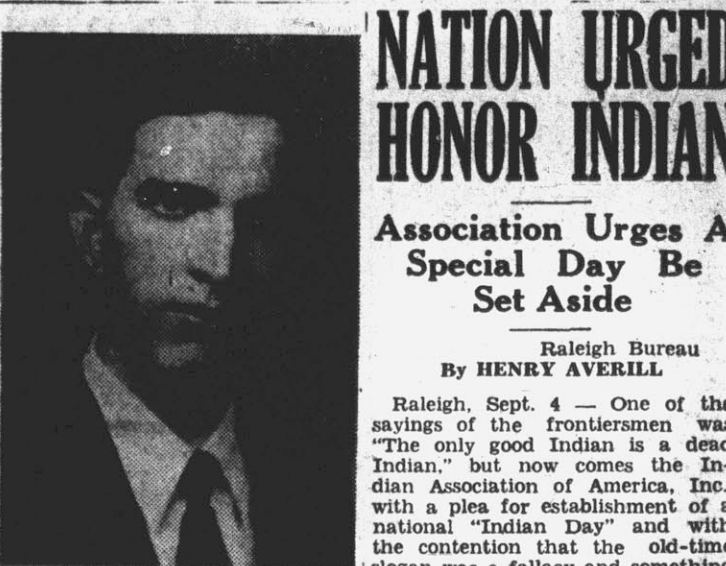
