NAZIS THROWN BACK ON LENINGRAD APPROACHES

Sub Attack On U.S. Destroyer Challenges Naval Patrol

Faced With 1st Incident In Atlantic

Congressmen, Cautious But Apprehensive, Caution Public Against Forming Hasty Opinions Regarding Attack By Unidentified U-Boat Incident Not Regarded As Sufficient To Lead To War

Washington, Sept. 5. — (AP) — Shooting in grim earnest — a submarine attack on an American destroyer which fought back with her depth charges — put the United States face to face today with the first "incident" to challenge the Navy's patrol of the Atlantic.

The capital looked expectantly to the White House for some word from President Roosevelt, and it was a foregone conclusion that the question would be raised as soon as he opened his regular Friday press conference.

The torpedoes fired at the U. S. S. Greer in yesterday's daylight attack missed their mark, but officials believed that they might have far-reaching consequences in determining the navy's strategy in the North Atlantic.

For the moment, the State Department had nothing to say, and the Navy Department declined to amplify the laconic three-sentence communiqué which announced the attack on the Greer — a flush-deck, four-stacker of World war construction, identical in appearance with the destroyers traded to Britain.

The fact that the Greer has the same silhouette as the ships now serving with the Royal Navy led to the belief that she might have been mistaken for a British vessel. Some of these already have been damaged or sunk by enemy action.

However, the mistaken identity theory was not universally accepted. Navy men pointed out that the Greer flew the Stars and Stripes, and one veteran submarine officer was satisfied that the attack was made during daylight.

"You can't see a torpedo track at night," he said, indicating that he had reasons to believe that the Greer used the tell-tale feathery wake of the torpedoes to rush to the spot where she dumped her depth bombs.

The submarine's identity was temporarily a mystery, and there was no certainty that a subsequent report from the Greer would add further information, for the action at sea apparently was fast and short lived.

Berlin almost immediately disclaimed all knowledge of the attack. London, on the other hand, was ready to blame the incident on a Nazi U-boat.

Lacking a more complete report, members of Congress were cautious but apprehensive in appraising the clash at sea. They counseled the public against forming hasty opinions, and expressed the belief that the incident was not of sufficient magnitude to plunge the country into war.

There was much conjecture, however, as to whether the Thursday morning attack represented the initiative of a single submarine commander, or whether it presaged the beginning of an intensified under-sea campaign that would meet not only the navy but the navy's patrol in the North Atlantic.

PROVISIONS OF REVENUE BILL TO BE OPPOSED

Doubtful Measure Will Be Passed By This Weekend

TO OPPOSE BAN ON JOINT RETURN

Sen. Connally Serves Notice Fight To Be Put Up By Senators From Community Property States

Washington, Sept. 5. — (AP) — Hopes of Senate leaders to pass the \$3,683,900,000 revenue bill by this week-end slumped today as members from eight community property states pledged a last-ditch fight against a provision prohibiting husbands and wives from splitting their income in making tax returns.

Such division, which usually operates to lower tax liabilities on joint incomes above \$3,500 now is permitted in Louisiana, Texas, Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico, California, Idaho and Washington. The projected prohibition would add about \$50,000,000 in revenue, some senators estimated.

The restriction was recommended by the Finance Committee, but Senator Connally (D-Tex.), a committee member, termed it "a proposal which no senator from a community property state can accept without making known his opposition."

"We do not plan a filibuster," Connally declared, "but there are 16 senators from community property states. Suppose one of them should go back to his people and they could say 'the Senate destroyed our basic law and you didn't raise your voice against it.'"

Another controversial provision involves a proposed \$5 annual use tax on automobiles and a sliding scale of use taxes on boats, depending on size. The levies, already approved by the House and estimated to yield \$160,200,000 annually, were sharply criticized today by Senator Danaher (R-Conn.).

Danaher and Senator LaFollette (Prog-Wis) were expected to collaborate in efforts to remove the levies, and the Connecticut senator told reporters that "if the federal government can tax the use of an automobile, it can tax the pipe out of your mouth."

Senator Bailey (D-NC) has estimated that the tax would hit about 30,000 motorists. Democratic Leader Barkley conceded that the levy might develop considerable controversy, but declined to say whether the administration would yield on the levy.

New Constitution For France Asked

Vichy, Sept. 5. — (AP) — Marshal Petain has received proposals outlining the fundamentals of a new constitution for France providing for a democratic electorate at the bottom checked by an aristocracy at the top.

The system as submitted to the chief of state by the National Council, forms a combination of democratic and aristocratic rule, endeavoring to utilize best parts of each.

Besides one lower house of Parliament, it proposes two upper chambers. The whole system is based on universal manhood suffrage in municipalities as the base of the pyramid of authority.

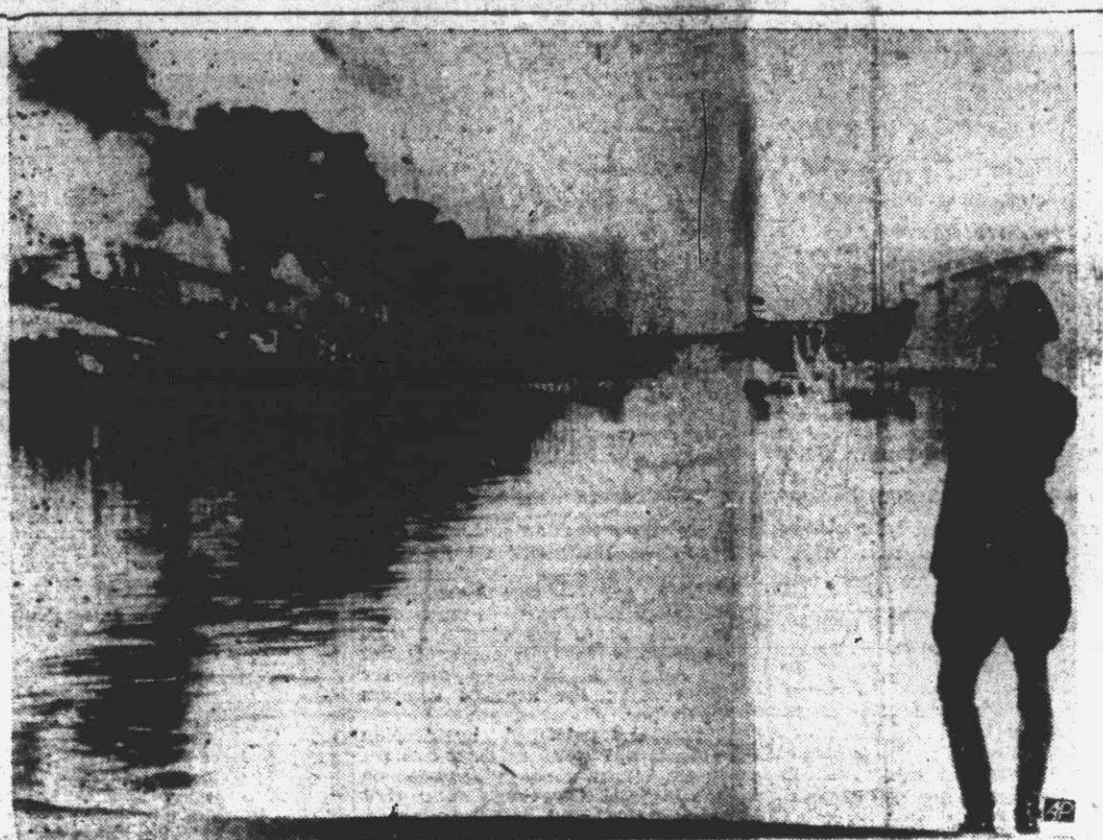
Voters would elect a municipal council to serve with a mayor appointed by a departmental prefect who, in turn, would be appointed by the central government.

Next in order would come general councils in each department, those elected by the municipal councils, then provincial councils in which half the membership would be named by provincial governors and the other half elected by members of the veterans legion syndicalist corporations, representatives of the most numerous families and local dignitaries who could have an ex-officio right to vote.

WAYNE KILLER GOES TO DEATH

Negro Pays Penalty For Killing White Man For Pay

Raleigh, Sept. 5. — (AP) — Tom Melvin, 42-year-old Goldsboro Negro convicted of the hatchet murder of Irvy G. Holmes, 40-year-old Goldsboro white man, was executed in Central prison's gas chamber today.

On the other side of Raleigh, in North Carolina's woman's prison Mrs. Florence Holmes, who admitted in court that she offered Melvin \$2,000 to kill her husband, was serving the ninth month of a life imprisonment term for being an accessory before the fact.

Melvin, one-time Baptist preacher, florist assistant and numbers runner, took his execution calmly. The state took 11 minutes and 20 seconds to gas the 140-pound Negro to death.

In the witness chamber watching Melvin die was Thomas H. Spear, chaplain of the state prison system, said after a visit with Melvin this morning that the Negro had told him that he was prepared to die. Watts said that Melvin revealed that Jesus had visited him in his Central prison cell on January 23 and that the Christ had told him, "I will be with you."

Melvin entered the chamber at precisely 10 a. m. Mr. Watts prayed with him briefly, and Melvin was still praying as the executioner released the suffocating cyanide fumes into the small death chamber.

The Rev. Lawrence A. Watts, chaplain of the state prison system, said after a visit with Melvin this morning that the Negro had told him that he was prepared to die. Watts said that Melvin revealed that Jesus had visited him in his Central prison cell on January 23 and that the Christ had told him, "I will be with you."

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Reveals That Steps Being Taken To Locate Sub

Washington, Sept. 5. — (AP) — President Roosevelt said today that the United States destroyer Greer had been attacked more than once, that steps were being taken to track down the marauding submarine, and that the vessel would be "eliminated if found."

Mr. Roosevelt, speaking to a press conference, did not say exactly how many attacks had been made on the vessel, which was carrying mail to Iceland. But, he said, they occurred in daylight, and definitely on the American side of the ocean.

He said that while the Greer was alone at the time torpedoes were launched at her with no other American ships nearby, she was clearly marked, and carried an identification number, plus an American flag.

Asked what would be done if the attacking vessel were found, Mr. Roosevelt said he supposed American forces would "eliminate" it or try to. He authorized direct quotation of the word "eliminate," and said it was a good one.

The chief executive said the Greer was attacked under conditions of good daylight and visibility. The Navy Department had announced torpedoes were launched at her yesterday morning and that the destroyed probably dropped depth charges.

Mr. Roosevelt did not say whether all the attacks occurred within a relatively short time yesterday morning or were spaced at intervals. He left little doubt that he approved the action of the commander in taking immediate steps against the submarine by dropping powerful depth charges.

Mr. Roosevelt said it was fortunate the destroyer was not hit, remarking that it was beyond his power to say why the aim of the submarine was so poor. He would not disclose whether the undersea craft's periscope was above water, declaring he could not talk about that.

"As a landlubber to a sea expert," a reporter inquired, "is it possible for a submarine to make a mistake in broad daylight at torpedo distance?"

Mr. Roosevelt said he would put the explanation this way: "If a submarine had a periscope above the surface there was no excuse for a wrong identification. Most torpedoes, he said, are fired by a means of a visual sight."

However, almost all naval vessels, including German and Italian, he added, have listening devices and it is possible to fire at a sound. This method is not nearly as accurate.

STRIKE ORDER IS AUTHORIZED

Nation's Railroad System Threatened With Tie-Up

Chicago, Sept. 5. — (AP) — Chief of 19 railroad unions announced today that they had been authorized to call a nation-wide strike in an effort to enforce demands for wage increases.

Heads of the non-operating unions with a membership of approximately 900,000 set September 11 as the date for a strike. Officials of the five operating groups said that 98.7 per cent of their 350,000 members voted in favor of a strike.

The leaders of the operating unions reported that preliminary figures on a strike authorization vote showed that out of 287,000 votes cast, 283,429 were for a strike and 3,571 were against.

Vichy Protesting Against U. S. Press

Vichy, Sept. 5. — (AP) — The French announced today an official protest to Washington against what was described as a "lying campaign" in the United States press against Gaston Henry-Haye, Vichy's ambassador to Washington, and members of his embassy.

The official announcement, which cited the New York Herald Tribune particularly, said that the alleged campaign, "coming after the appeal recently addressed by Marshal Petain to the American press asking it to show more understanding and regard to France was felt with particular sadness in France."

U. S. RAILWAYS TO SUPPLY GAS BY TANK CARS

Oil Industry Pledges To Use Every Available Car

RATES REDUCED BY RAIL LINES

Railroads To Be Given Opportunity To Prove They Can Eliminate Oil Shortage Within Two Weeks

Washington, Sept. 5. — (AP) — The Green signal was flashed today for railroads to send hundreds of trains rolling out of the West to relieve the oil emergency in the Eastern states.

Representatives of the oil industry gave the government a pledge last night to use every available railroad tank car, opening the way for the railroads to prove that their kind of transportation could eliminate the oil shortage within two weeks.

Rail representatives and a committee of the oil industry agreed yesterday on sharp reductions of rates for rail movement of oil.

J. J. Pelley, president of the Association of American Railroads, told a Senate committee Wednesday that the oil shortage could be ended within two weeks by utilizing all available tank cars. He said there now were 20,000 idle rail tankers capable of moving 200,000 barrels of oil to the east daily. The daily shortage is estimated by government officials at 174,000 barrels.

No official statement was issued immediately on the rate reduction agreement, but reliable reports said it embraced a flat 25 per cent rate cut on gasoline and all fuel oils, and reductions ranging up to 50 per cent on crude oil, for west-to-east shipments.

A 25 per cent slice in gasoline rates would mean the motor fuel would move at one to 1.5 cents a gallon under rates now effective. The present tariff runs up to 5.5 cents for the long haul from Texas to the New York area.

U. S. Firms Forced Give Up Contracts

Washington, Sept. 5. — (AP) — Acting Attorney General Francis Biddle announced today consent decrees under which four important American drug companies must break contracts with the German dye trusts which prevents United States firms from doing business in South America.

The two decrees based on civil action charging anti-trust law violations by restricting markets, particularly in Latin-American countries, were filed with Federal District Judge Samuel Mandelbaum in New York.

The action named Sterling Products, Inc., Alba Pharmaceutical Company, Inc., the Bayre Company, Inc., and Winthrop Chemical Company.

Moscow, Sept. 5. — (AP) — Red army units counter-attacking amid artillery fire on the approaches to Leningrad, were reported today to have advanced almost a mile at one point in the battle for Russia's second largest city, taking four villages.

The defenders of Leningrad were said to have been bolstered by the arrival of troops from Tallin, evacuated successfully before the Germans took the Estonian capital. These forces were reported already back in battle against the Nazis.

RAID NETWORK PLAN DELAYED

Official Red Tape Is Said To Be Holding Up Plan

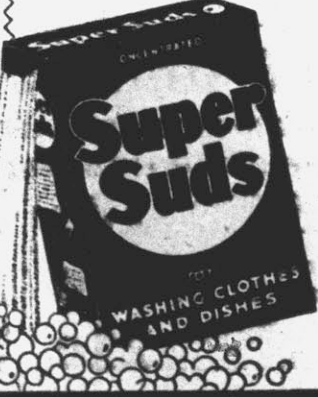

Mott.

Religion operates at its best within the circle of the family and what the father does, either to help religion or to hurt it, generally makes a deep impression on the children.

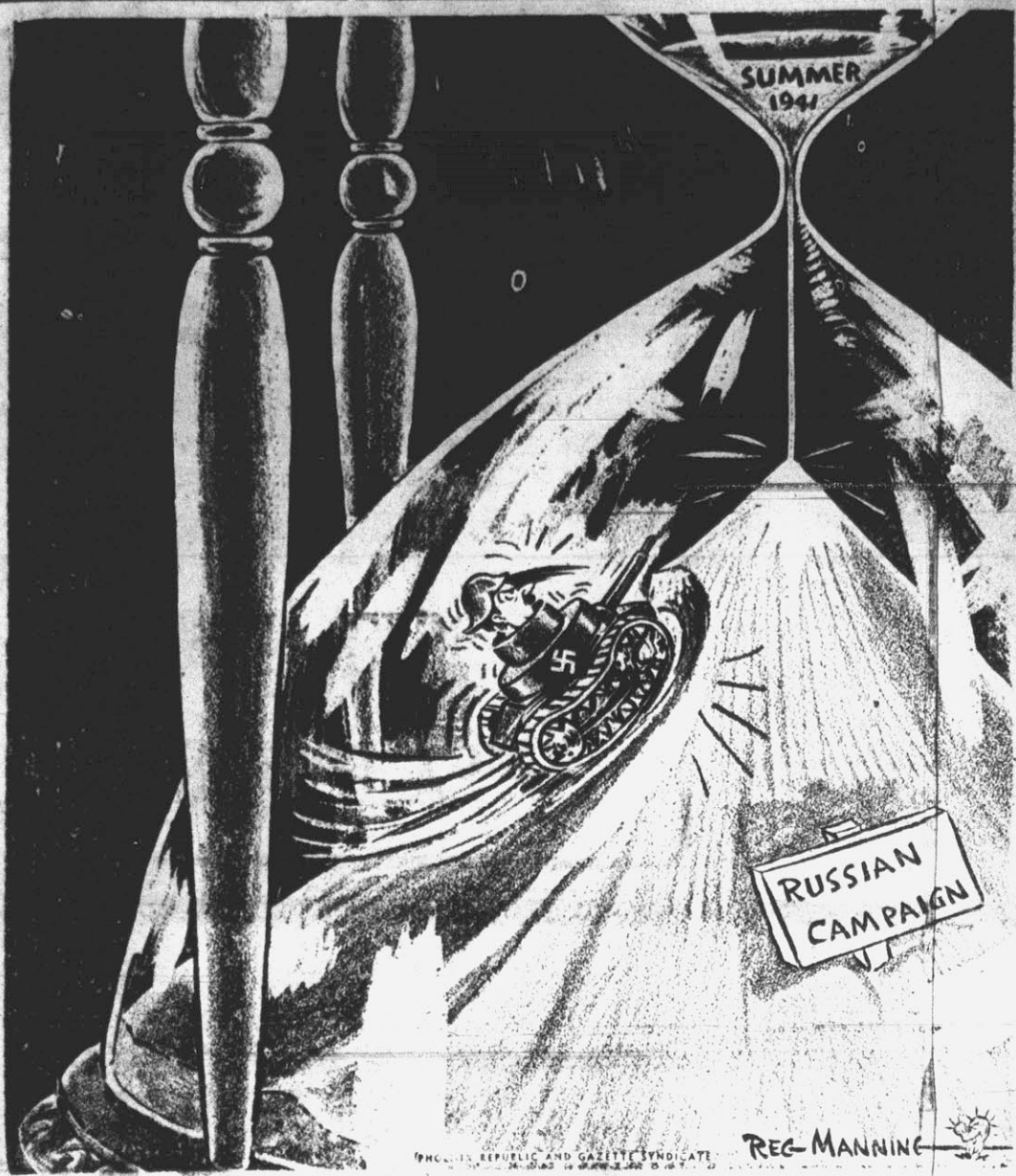
PRO-NAZI VICHY

Washington Daybook

Washington.—For three years David H. Young could have used his phone for a hat rack. It practically never rang because so few people were interested in a master-weaver who was designing cotton hosiery. Cotton? It was to laugh.

Now the long distance calls pile up in his office at the Department of Agriculture. Frantic hosiery manufacturers want to know what can be done with cotton.

Young can tell them. He has a "dictionary of design" including 400

different ways to weave cotton mesh hose. He was hired three years ago by the department to develop his ideas.

Then there was no indication that Japan's silk supply would be shut off. The Department certainly didn't foresee tense women, three-deep at store counters, demanding silk hose by the dozen pairs. The Department had only a wistful hope that some day American women would take to cotton hosiery—if they were fancy enough—and thereby help use up the cotton surplus.

Now it's Cotton Anyway
It seems that last year we women bought 43 million dozen pairs of hose. We would have used up 300,000 bales of cotton if all those hose had been cotton.

Now it looks like we'll be wearing the cotton.

It really doesn't sound so bad to hear Young talk, and to see the samples he has. He shoulders at the thought of chignon hose with a sports outfit. He thinks women should develop hosiery wardrobes. So he has woven fine stripes to wear with tailored suits, delicate meshes for evening dresses, bolder meshes for sports clothes, herring-bone weaves to go with herring-bone woollens.

Young comes from a long line of weavers. He started designing some of our finest silk fabrics 25 years ago. Then he retired. But he retired to Hollywood, where the clothes so stimulated his fancy that he opened an experimental laboratory.

Just Give Him Time
Just about that time the girls got it into their heads to go bare-legged. That didn't please Young, so he devised the sunburn "bare-legged" hose. You remember, they had no seams, and they were so fine they hardly were visible. That had caught on.

Then the girls began to kick

about too much sheen in hose. So Young thought of twisting the fiber as the hose was woven. We got those lustreless high-tast hose.

Since he has been working for the Department of Agriculture Young has had some more practical ideas. He designed a two-way stretch top now in use on some silk hosiery. It's a great saver when a woman stoops suddenly to pick up her compact. The hose stretches, and the result is fewer runs.

He also has devised a way of weaving heels which eliminates the side seam. He did that because women took to wearing shoes without heels.

Now Young grins over the cotton hose demonstration. He says all that cotton hose need at this point is the championship of some great beauty.

Short Shots

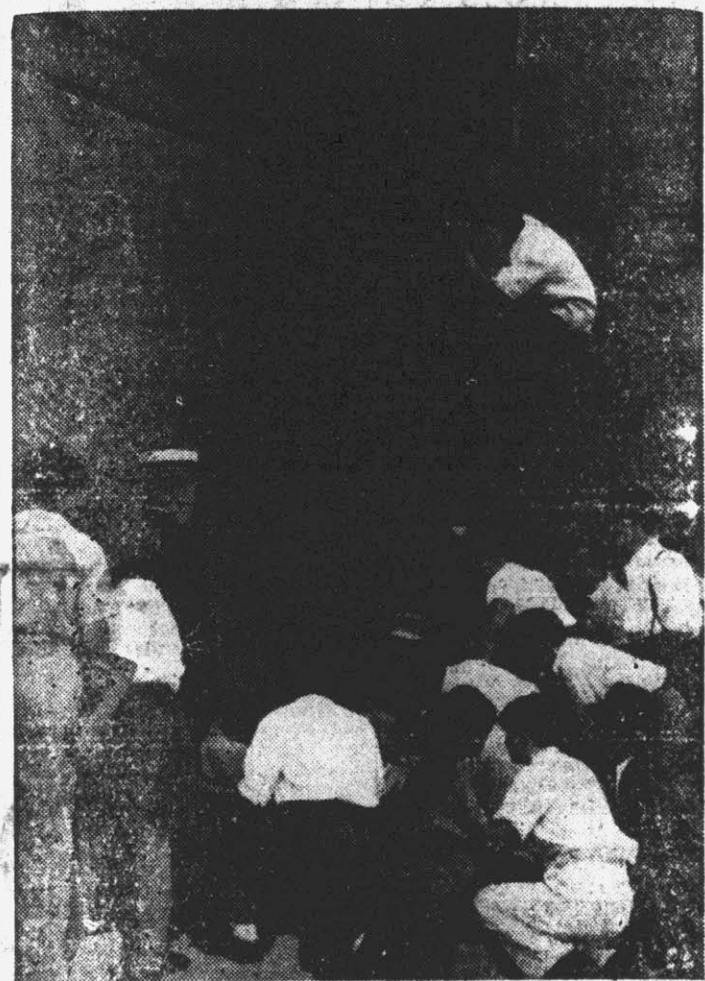
Raleigh, Sept. 5.—Would-be customers of rural electric lines who weakened after having secondary wires run from main power lines to their homes are going to be given about sixty days to go through with their original plans or else wait for nobody knows how long before having another chance to light up their homes.

It seems that scattered over the state there are hundreds of people (though there are even approximately accurate estimates of how many) who signed up with one agency or another and agreed to become electric light customers. On the basis of this signing-up the electric agency (sometimes it was a public utility company, sometimes a cooperative, once in a while a municipality) ran secondary wires from transformers to houses of the prospective customers. But many of these prospects went broke, or for some reason or other decided they didn't want the power.

Hence there are hundreds of wires running from transformers to nowhere at all, just dangling outside unwired houses; and it is this sort of situation it is planned to remedy.

J. M. Grainger, engineer for the State Rural Electrification Authority is requesting all power agencies with cases of this sort to give the owners of unwired houses to which secondary lines run, sixty days in

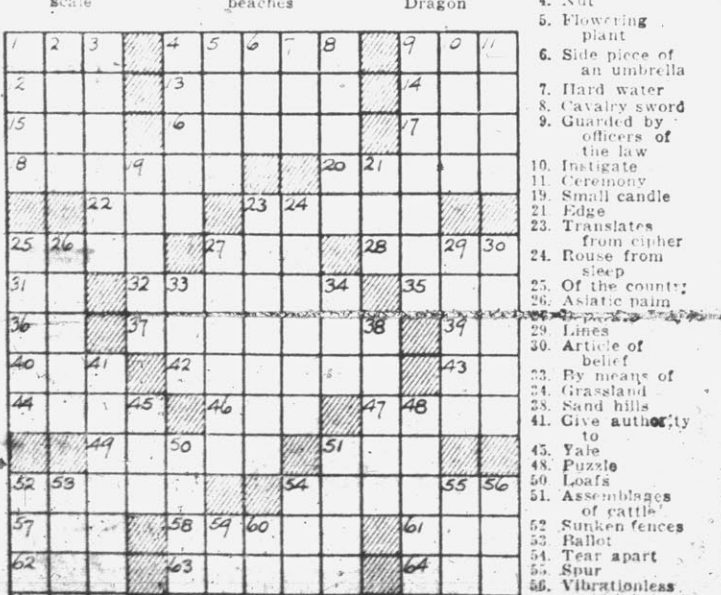

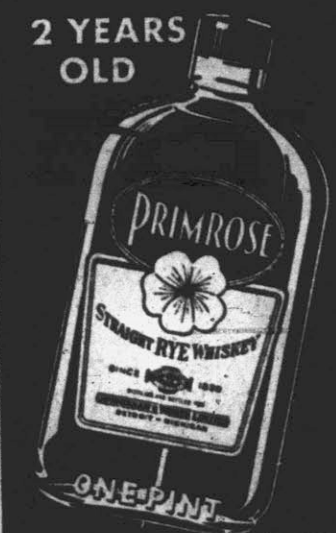

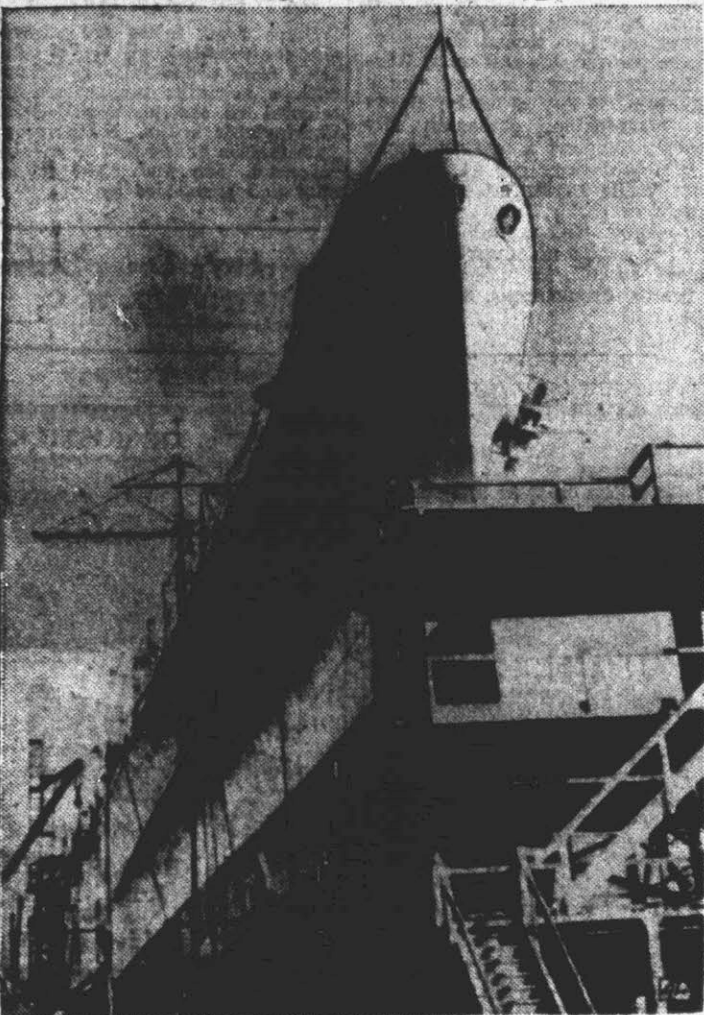
Early Reports Indicate Decrease In Enrollment

Reflector Bureau.
By HENRY AVERILL.
Raleigh, Sept. 5.—Early reports on enrollment in North Carolina schools indicate a considerable chance that the state will reflect what experts say will be a national decrease in registration this year. So far none of the larger defense area centers, such as Wilmington and Fayetteville, have been heard from and it is possible that heavy increases there will counteract what appears to be the normal trend elsewhere; because increases of up to 50 per cent are predicted for schools near the big military camps of eastern North Carolina.

Incomplete registration figures indicate that there will be decreased enrollment in Durham, Charlotte, Rocky Mount, Gastonia, Shelby and Hickory among others; while almost no case has yet come to your reporter's attention in which any increases over last year has been reported.

According to the experts the decreased enrollment will be directly due to a diminished birth rate during the depths of the depression. National statisticians have it all figured out that this decreased rate will be reflected this year for the first time. The percentage of decrease is estimated to be less than

Reaction Divided On Calcutt Parole

Reflector Bureau.

Raleigh, Sept. 5.—First reactions to the parole given Joe Calcutt, slot machine king, by Governor J. Melville Broughton have been divided about evenly between praise and censure for the governor.

Of the editorial comment which has so far come to your reporter's attention, about three-fourths is highly critical of the Broughton action, the Durham Sun going so far as to head its remarks "Humiliating."

On the other hand, the ordinary citizen on the street here—and your reporter talked to at least a score in order to get their slant—is at least three-fourths inclined to feel that the governor was justified in turning the Fayetteville man out long before his term was up.

In fact, the majority view in this group is that he should never have been sent to prison at all, unless members of the 1933 legislature who voted for the revenue bill section

authorizing licenses for slot machines were sent along with him. They blame the law makers far more than Calcutt for the situation which allowed him to be mulcted for taxes running into five figures annually and then to be nabbed and jailed for something the legislature knowingly and willfully invited him to do.

In short, the reaction was just about the same as when a hearing was held on his clemency application before he entered State's prison. One group, which includes most of the press, regards him as a cold-blooded, calculating racketeer who waxed arrogantly defiant of law and authority, relying on the power of money and politics to keep him out of jail. The other looks on him as a good business man engaged in a business the legislature said was okay and as a good citizen outraged by the law.
