

NAZIS CLAIM 50 SOVIET UNITS DESTROYED

Berlin Indicates Pink Star Received Its Just Dues

FAILS TO TAKE RESPONSIBILITY Secretary Knox Calls For Repeal Of Neutrality Act

Authorized German Sources Assert What-ever Happened To U.S. Vessel Was In Accordance With Laws of War; Washington Wonders If Sinking Of Ship Open Challenge To U. S. Policy

Berlin, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Authorized German sources expressed the opinion today that whatever happened to the American owned steamer Pink Star, "it was done in accordance with the laws of war."

They said however, that no German submarines or other overseas craft had specifically reported the sinking of the Panama-registered Pink Star, but added that messages had been received concerning sinkings out of a big convoy.

"The vessel was Panamanian, not United States," an authorized source declared, "and we have not heard yet that Panama is part of the United States. The vessel was sunk in waters clearly defined as a German operations area."

These sources declared the Secretary of State Cordell Hull drove America another step nearer war with his statement yesterday that the United States neutrality act should be changed.

(Hull told reporters at a press conference that he and President Roosevelt had said at the time the neutrality law was enacted that it would be as likely to keep the United States into war as to keep it out.)

Washington, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The sea war added another American-owned merchantman to its toll today and the capital wondered whether this latest sinking was meant to be an open challenge to President Roosevelt's shoot on "order" which barred the "defensive waters" of the United States to all Axis raiders.

The newest victim was the freighter Pink Star, owned by the United States Maritime Commission, but operating under Panamanian registry.

The Pink Star went down last Friday, the State Department disclosed last night, and she met her end southwest of Iceland in the same waters that witnessed the loss of two other American-owned vessels and the unsuccessful submarine attack on the United States destroyer Greer.

The announcement of the Pink Star's sinking was on several details. Nothing was said about the fate of the 34 men in her crew and there was no hint as to how she met her end—by a mine, torpedo or aerial bomb or the guns of a surface raider. No amount of inquiry could elicit official information on these points.

The location of the ship's sinking, however, was definitely placed some 250 miles south of Iceland on the corridor of sea communications which Mr. Roosevelt specifically has ordered the Navy to keep clear.

The ship had no American citizens in her crew.

Doctors Exchange Filling Long Need

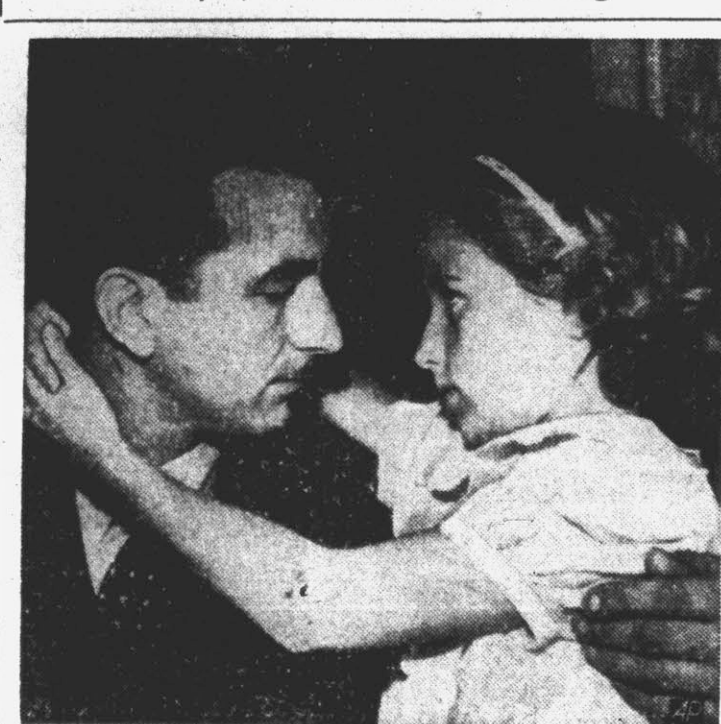
The Physicians Exchange, which was recently organized in Greenville, now is in operation and is expected to fill a long-felt need of the physicians of the city as it will afford them a little time off from their daily routine.

Under the exchange system, the physician calls the person in charge, leaves his probable location for the afternoon or evening and all calls received for him will be relayed to him immediately. A complete record of all calls received will be kept by the exchange operator.

Under the plan, the person calling must designate the physician he or she desires, assuring fairness to all participating doctors. No preference will be shown by the operator. Mrs. Aubrey Tilley will be in charge of the exchange and can be reached day or night over telephone 2627. The service is free to the public, the physicians themselves having arranged for the exchange.

The service is not an experiment, such a plan having been adopted in most places, both small and large. The exchange provides a needed service to the general public as well as the physicians.

STORM IN GULF MORE SERIOUS

Tropical Hurricane Is Bearing Down On Fishing Town

Port O'Connor, Texas, Sept. 23.—(AP)—A rapidly-dropping barometer and a rising gale that blew in gusts up to 60 miles an hour at daybreak today indicated to Coast Guard observers here that a howling tropical hurricane was bearing down on this highly exposed Gulf coast fishing village.

The United States Weather Bureau's advisory at 2:30 a. m. (CST) placed the center of the disturbance about 185 miles northeast of Brownsville, moving northwestward. Barometer readings at Coast Guard stations at Freeport, north of Port O'Connor, and at Port Arkansas, south, indicated the blow was following its scheduled course and would move inland some time today.

Camp Hulen, training center for the Coast Artillery located near Palacios, on dangerous Matagorda bay would also be near the center of the storm's path if it continues to follow its present course. Many of the troops who have been in training there are now in the Louisiana maneuvers.

Approximately 100 persons spent the night in the brick school house at Port O'Connor, planning to hold out during the blow. Another 400 had moved inland. Elsewhere, along the Texas coast, where unusually high tides prevailed and higher water was forecast, lowland residents had moved out and houses and stores were battered down against the savage fury of the storm.

Powell and wife, Lelia B. Powell in a consent judgment on a receiver-ship.

Another Record Set As Leaf Prices Continue Advance

For the sixth successive sales day the average price paid on the Greenville tobacco market established a new season high yesterday when farmers selling here received \$546.120.07 for the \$541.492 pounds sold—an official average of 35.43 cents per pound.

The sales brought to 24,682,834 pounds the total offerings so far this year, compared with 21,333,724 pounds sold to the corresponding date a year ago. Money paid out this year is more than double that for the same date last year, being \$6,799,388.89, compared with \$3,367,264.66 paid out on the same number of sales days last season. This year's season average of 27.55 compares with an average of 15.78 on the corresponding date in 1940.

Today's sales are lighter and reflect a decline in quality, following yesterday's highest levels of the season, with medium grades soaring to prices seven to eight cents a pound above the previous market.

Good tobacco advanced from two to three cents per pound. Followers of the market declare that present prices being paid are as high as in 1934 on many grades with some types probably selling higher. The difference being that there is not as much real fancy leaf that sold at 60 cents or better in 1934.

Duke And Duchess Arrive In Florida

Miami, Fla., Sept. 23.—(AP)—The Duke and Duchess of Windsor reached Miami by chartered plane today on the first leg of a six weeks' tour of the United States and Canada and were greeted by the cheers of several thousand Miamians.

They were met at the airport by leading officials, representatives of the British embassy and the United States State Department.

Hunters Prepare Warning System. Minneapolis.—(AP)—Upper Mississippi river duck hunters are making plans to avert any recurrence of last fall's unexpected and tragic blizzard in which more than a score of Nimrod's died.

They are working through federal and state agencies to expedite storm warnings, develop coast guard patrols in emergencies and provide an airplane guard over the duck sloughs to caution hunters of impending danger.

Hundreds of hunters out for an Armistice day shoot were caught unprepared when an autumn rain developed into a severe snowstorm.

Head of Navy Declares Measure Crippling Efforts of This Country And Should Be Repealed Immediately; Speaks At Launching Of Huge 35,000-Ton Battleship Massachusetts At Quincy Harbore

Quincy, Mass., Sept. 23.—(AP)—Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox today watched the huge 35,000-ton battleship Massachusetts slide down the ways of the Fore river shipyards and then declared to a crowd of thousands attending the launching that the neutrality act was "crippling" the efforts of the country and should be immediately repealed.

"There should be no handicap on those who are trying to keep war away from these shores," the Navy secretary shouted.

"We must waste no time in repealing the neutrality act."

The mighty Massachusetts was launched without a slip-up.

The Kiel of a new cruiser, the U. S. S. Flint, was laid on the spot just vacated by the Massachusetts before the bow of the battleship had entered the water.

Knox asserted that recent events on the Russian front had made "the prospect of a victory dim."

He did not elaborate on this, except to say that the casualties in Russia were greater than in any other conflict in history and that the fighting in Russia "had a direct bearing on our own situation."

He said it was possible that the battleship just launched might have to "participate in another fight for human liberty."

The Massachusetts and other battleships recently launched or building would carry the heaviest guns afloat, he said, and would participate in the job handed to the Navy of "seeing that the sealanes between this country and Great Britain are kept free."

High Court Hears Abernethy Appeal

Raleigh, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Attorneys for Charles L. Abernethy, Jr., of New Bern, congressional candidate found guilty of violating election laws in the Democratic primary last year, asserted today that the State Supreme Court today that their client was convicted on a faulty bill of indictment.

Jesse A. Jones of Winston, one of the attorneys, said the bill should have been quashed because it charged conspiracy, yet named only one defendant.

He also said the bill depended for its validity on the alleged receipt of stolen ballots and pointed out that under North Carolina law stolen ballots do not constitute stolen property.

George B. Patton, an assistant attorney general, replied that the court record showed ample evidence of conspiracy and interference with election officials in the performance of their duty. The bill of indictment, Patton contended, was not faulty.

Abernethy was convicted in Wayne county of conspiracy to interfere with election officials and of interference with election officials. He received a suspended sentence of 30 days.

Changes Hour For Returning To EST

Raleigh, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Governor Broughton asserted today that if North Carolina goes on a daylight saving time basis next summer it should do so as a part of a daylight saving time measure "on a national basis."

The governor made the assertion in announcing a shift in the changing from daylight saving time to eastern standard time from midnight, September 28 to 2 a. m., September 28.

SOVIET ENVOY CLAIMS THIRD OF NAZIS LOST

Maisky Says German Strength Reduced By One-Third

NAZI FIGURES ARE RIDICULED

Ambassador To London, However, Admits That Russia, Like Germany, Has Sustained Heavy Losses

London, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Three million Germans—one-third of the Nazi army—have been killed, wounded or are missing after three months of war with Russia, Soviet Ambassador Ivan M. Maisky declared today in an address before the American Chamber of Commerce.

The German high command's announcement last week concerning German losses was "utterly ridiculous," he asserted, calling his own estimate a moderate one.

(The German high command on September 19 announced these as Germany's losses in the first two months of the Russian war: 85,896 dead; 296,670 wounded; 20,299 missing.)

Maisky conceded that Russia, like Germany, has suffered heavy losses and that "the enemy has occupied important industrial districts."

Warning against "dangerous complacency" which he said arose from glib talk of amateur strategists about "Generals Winter and Mud," he said the facts proved that the Nazi war machine still was strong.

"Russia is facing a tense and difficult situation," Maisky said, and there is no use in people "shutting their eyes to the realities of the situation."

While he voiced no doubt that the original German plans had been upset and that Hitler's lightning war "had failed miserably," he declared:

"War on the eastern front will not be at a standstill either in autumn or winter and the Soviet people do not base their views on such doubtful calculations."

Flanagan Speaker At Civic Meeting

Col. Ed Flanagan, State Highway Commissioner of the N. C. Highway and Public Works Commission, told members of the Greenville Rotary club at last night's meeting that the State Highway Commission was the largest highway organization in the world.

He described the highway commission as having information as to how the 58,930 miles of roads are maintained throughout the state.

Col. Flanagan discussed his plans for improving and modernizing secondary roads in his district, which consists of Pitt and ten other surrounding counties. He said, "It is my desire to build roads where they will serve the most people and do the most good."

Remus Sugg, Negro who lives near the Pitt-Greene county line and who was arrested Sunday in connection with the hit-run wreck on the Farmville-Snow Hill highway Saturday night, yesterday afternoon signed a confession that he was the driver of the car which struck and seriously injured Willie Eason, Greene county man who has been employed at a local warehouse this season.

According to officers, Eason was struck while he was fixing a flat tire, the car that struck him having crossed the center of the highway and hit Eason while almost on the left side of the highway.

Senator Norris Asserts Neutrality Act Repeal Would Lead U.S. to War

Nebraskan Also Voices Doubt That Congress would Approve Declaration of War; Announces That He Intends to See Showdown Next Week By Introducing Resolution Calling For War With Germany

Washington, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Senator Norris (Ind.-Neb.) asserted today that repeal of the neutrality act "would mean war" and he voiced his doubts that Congress would approve a declaration of war at the present time.

On the question of a declaration of war, Rep. Fish (R-NY) was ready with the prediction that the House would vote it down "more than two to one." He announced he intended to seek a showdown next week with a resolution calling for immediate war with Germany.

Norris made it clear that he endorsed the policy the administration had pursued regarding freedom of the seas. The United States, he remarked, could not recognize any German attempt to "map off the ocean and tell us where we can and can't go."

The veteran Nebraskan, only surviving member who cast a Senate vote against this country's entrance into the last war, consistently has supported the administration in foreign affairs. He emphasized to reporters today that he thought all possible aid should be given to Great Britain and Russia. And he said, too, that a request for repeal of the neutrality law "would be a logical outgrowth" of the administration's internal policies.

Nevertheless, he contended that "changing the neutrality act to send our ships to belligerent ports would mean war. And if we decided to arm merchant ships that might give Hitler a right to sink them under international law."

Eastern Carolina Project Approved

Raleigh, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The Eastern Carolina Regional Housing Authority today asked the Utilities Commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity to allow housing projects to be built in 11 rural counties.

The counties are Johnston, Sampson, Duplin, Harnett, Jones, Bladen, Onslow, Craven, Pamlico and Pender.

D. L. Ward of New Bern, attorney for the Authority, said the federal government already had allocated a total of \$1,650,000 for the work, which he described as the first rural housing program in the country.

Under present plans \$550,000 of this total would be used for rural houses and \$500,000 would be used for houses in towns of less than 5,000 persons.

Ward predicted that work would begin within 60 days.

Washington, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The United States Housing Authority announced today President Roosevelt had approved United States Housing Authority loans totaling \$15,879,900 to provide new homes for 5,093 low-income families by construction of slum-clearance projects in 38 cities and 92 rural counties.

Among the projects approved was Eastern Carolina Regional Housing Authority, 275 units and \$495,000.

Would Not Exempt Russia From Help

Washington, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Informed members said Edward Stettinius, administrator of the lend-lease program, urged a House Appropriations sub-committee considering the \$5,985,000 lend-lease appropriation bill today to reject any prohibitions which would bar aid to Russia.

At the same time, however, members said Stettinius explained that it was not the policy of the government now to aid Russia through the lend-lease program, but emphasized in view of the uncertainty of the future any restrictive provisions would be especially undesirable.

COLLEGE HERE OPENS SESSION

Orientation Program Marks Start Of 33rd Year

With faculty members already on the grounds and freshmen coming in yesterday afternoon and this morning, East Carolina Teachers College began its thirty-third year today, the first part of a three-day freshman orientation program having been "scheduled for this morning."

Freshmen assembled in the Wright auditorium at 9:30 to hear President Leon R. Meadows welcome them to the College and introduce members of the faculty, and to receive helpful suggestions from other officials. President Meadows, after saying that he felt like congratulating the group before him on securing space in the dormitories when many other girls are asking in vain for dormitory rooms at the college, told the freshmen that he welcomed them to all the privileges that East Carolina Teachers College offers, pointing out specifically such privileges as the opportunity to work, to develop character, to secure training for earning a living to prepare for service, and to enjoy association with "things and people of the campus."

The two deans, Miss Annie L. Morton and Dr. Herbert ReBarker, Treasurer P. D. Duncan, and Registrar H. J. McGinnis, gave helpful suggestions in their various fields. Dr. Carl Adams talked on choice of a curriculum; and Miss Harriet Marshburn, president of Women's Student Government, on what she hoped the newcomers would find in college life, emphasizing such things as learning to make choices and assume responsibility, to live with and cooperate with others, to study efficiently, and to become a real part of the College.

Also Claim Capture Of Many More Around Kiev

Total Of About 750,000 Troops Declared By High Command To Have Been Destroyed, with 380,000 Reported Captured in Bloody Trap East Of Ukraine Capital, Already In Hands Of Nazi Legions

Adolf Hitler's high command today reported the destruction of 50 Soviet army divisions—about 750,000 troops—and the capture of 380,000 prisoners in the bloody trap 125 miles east of Kiev, while Italian dispatches pictured scenes of chaotic retreat by Russia's armies in the Ukraine.

The commander-in-chief of the Soviet fifth army was listed among the prisoners.

The official Italian news agency said that Red troops hurled back from the Dniester river were fleeing in disorder without artillery toward a new defense line on the east bank of the Don river.

If true, this would mean a huge-scale retreat and the abandonment of the great Dnieper river industrial basin.

The news agency quoted prisoners as saying that Marshal Budennyi, commander-in-chief of the Ukraine forces, had been relieved of his command and temporarily replaced by Marshal Timoshenko, who commanded the central front.

Hitler's field headquarters, in a special bulletin on the fighting east of Kiev, said German troops slashing into four entrapped Russian armies had already captured 570 tanks, 2,100 guns and great stores of other war booty.

Authoritative military quarters in London, acknowledging that the Soviet armies in the south faced an "uglier situation" than ever before in the 94-day struggle, declared nevertheless that a more optimistic outlook was developing on the northern front.

Around Leningrad, the British said, the situation was not unfavorable, and north of Leningrad on the Karelian Isthmus the Russians were said to be holding the German-allied Finns on approximately the line of the pre-1940 frontier.

In the Ukraine, the British admitted that the Russians might find difficulty in withdrawing sufficient forces from the Kiev area to reestablish defenses before Kharkov and Rostov.

DNE, official German news agency, said Leningrad's defenders were waging a losing battle in attempting to stem Nazi forces steadily closing in on the old czarist capital.

Berlin, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Simultaneous Russian counter-offensives in the north, central and southern sectors were reported in German war dispatches tonight for the first time, although all three were declared to have been repulsed with 380,000 prisoners already taken in the encirclement area carved out by the Germans east of Kiev.

These captures announced by the high command in a special communique overshadowed the Soviet counter thrusts as far as Germany (Continued on page six)

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APPEASEMENT DOESN'T PAY

Earlier this year, the United States both directly and indirectly aided Franco's Spain with various supplies. This was done despite Franco's known pro-Axis leanings. More recently, the Spanish Fuehrer took his cue from his German master and spoke not only in favor of the Nazis but took the opportunity to blast the United States.

It was naturally assumed that this definite and official attitude of hostility toward the United States would cause the Government to cut off all supplies to Spain. Such is not the case. If press reports are reliable, the United States still is sending large quantities of petroleum products to Franco in a final attempt to woo him away from the Axis.

Events move fast in the present war, but it wasn't so long ago that England, France, and a host of other countries tried the same game with Germany and Italy. France fell, England now fights for its life, and the lesser nations were destroyed. Those were the dividends of appeasement.

There is no doubt that Franco will enter the fight against the democratic nations at any time that Hitler really insists upon it. He is in no position to resist even if he wanted to, and there is ample evidence that he is perfectly happy to play stooge to Hitler. The cards are stacked against appeasement and always have been.

Franco is a much more dangerous enemy than he appears to be on the surface. It is his particular brand of Fascism that appeals to Latin Americans, many of whom still look to Spain for cultural and political leadership. Anything that strengthens Franco strengthens Fascism in Latin America.

The argument that oil or other supplies will not help Hitler just doesn't hold water. The same argument was used with Vichy, and we now know that oil destined for General Weygand in Africa actually went to the Germans and that food supplies sent to France resulted in the withdrawal of at least a like amount of other foodstuffs from the unoccupied territory to Germany.

The United States cooperated with Great Britain to appease Italy at the start of the war, with the result that Mussolini was in excellent shape to deliver a death blow to defeated France. United States attempts to appease Japan led to the present Far Eastern crisis.

It has been proved again



and again that the totalitarian nations interpret appeasement as a sign of weakness, and turn it to their own advantage. They only understand strong talk backed by guns and ships and planes. It is hoped the State Department will eventually awake to this obvious truth—which has been evident to the United States people for a long while.

Washington Daybook
By Jack Stinson

Washington — One of the fifth floor corridors of the old House of Representatives is overflowing with stenographers, clerks, investigators all busy packing dynamite into files: dynamite which some observers say is likely to explode into one of the major investigation blowoffs in this session of Congress.

These workers are the staff of the naval defense investigating committee, which under instructions from Rep. Carl Vinson (D-Ga.), chairman of the House naval affairs committee, and on House authority, is making inquiry into the seven billion dollars in contracts let in the Navy's vast expansion drive. The man behind this preparation is Edmund M. Toland, tall, angular Washington attorney and one-time G-man, who is counsel for the Vinson committee.

As counsel a couple of years ago for the Smith committee, investigating the National Labor Relations Board, Toland brought a new technique into preparation of congressional investigations and he is following the same pattern at present.

Toland's staff of 78, of whom 44 are investigators in the field, started work in April. Hardly a word has been heard from it—and if Toland has his way there won't be until he is before the committee and presenting the explosive contents of those files for its consideration.

Millions Turned Back.
So thoroughly is the preliminary work being done, I learn from good authority, that some naval contractors who have been queried about their profits already have turned back or offered to turn back to the treasury millions of dollars in what would have been excess profits.

Who is being investigated? Shipbuilders, aviation contractors, general construction contractors, shipyard engineers and architects, shipyard repair and conversion contractors, navy ordnance contractors, ship sellers, and labor unions — a cross section in each field.

The method of investigation is by questionnaires which must be answered under oath and by field investigators who examine files of the contractors and subcontractors.

Navy Cooperating.
In most instances, the first questionnaire broadly inquired into the costs of material and labor. Those which followed have been more specific, probing costs and operations.

In defense cost-plus contracts, the law provides a seven per cent profit. It will be the responsibility of the committee to determine whether costs have been padded. In the case of competitive bid contracts, the question will be whether there was any collusion or the Navy was gyped in any other way.

On only one point does Toland break his silence.

"I have had," he says, "the greatest cooperation from the Navy, from Secretary Knox, from Under-secre-

tary Forrestal, and from every one of the admirals."

Toland makes it pretty clear he feels that if mistakes have been made they have been honest ones, growing out of an eagerness to get the naval defense program under way.

No date has been announced for the open hearings. Toland hopes to have preliminary phases of the work cleaned up within a month.

Short Shots

Raleigh, Sept. 23 — Outstanding deduction to be drawn from the fiercest floor fight at the Y. D. convention over election of a state president is that the organization ought at once to go over its constitution with a fine tooth comb and bring it into something remotely approaching intelligible shape.

Probably the only reason it has stood almost unamended as long as it has is that never before has any grave strain been put upon it; previous pre-convention contests having been solved by the simple, but efficacious method of buying off contenders who threatened the powers that be. Buy "buying" your reporter does not mean to imply that any money ever passed. It didn't; but it is a demonstrable fact that almost without exception aspirants for the Y.D. presidency who more or less gracefully withdrew prior to the convening of the state meeting soon found themselves rewarded with a political job of some sort or other. And if this be not "buying" in the broad sense of the word, then your reporter misunderstands its meaning completely.

Within the last four years there was the case of Mae Oliver who loomed as a very serious contender against Raleigh's Arch T. Allen. She pulled out, and soon thereafter was sitting at a desk in the probation

set-up.

Then there was Lee Wilson of Davidson who was regarded as just about elected last year until Ralph Gardner launched his lightning war. Mr. Wilson became State Senator and is also a member of a commission or so.

And this year Ralph Monger, Jr., who started out like a house afire, only to retire in favor of Leonidas Hux, has a job with the Revenue department.

Of course, Marshall Kurfrees and Todd Caldwell didn't get any stick of candy, because they weren't worth paying off. The best joke of the convention was their throwing the strength they didn't have to Hoover Taft.

Railroad, State Highway No. 11 and State Highway No. 91, and on to a point on the southern right of way line of the Norfolk-Southern Railroad, just south of the Railroad trestle, thence in a northerly direction around the eastern boundaries of the Hortense Moyer Farm (leaving out said farm); thence easterly down the Stantonsburg Road to the western boundaries of the Dr. Perkins farm (including said farm); thence in a north-westerly direction to a corner of the Old Tank Smith Farm (now the J. Nova has a chance, a good chance, against Joe. If Lou is careful and doesn't try to slug with Louis and can wear him down, he might do it. Nova can take punishment pretty well, but he isn't good enough to beat Joe at Joe's own game—punching.

Gene Tunney, 1926-1928, New York: Louis has been a fine champion but this Nova is a big, strong determined youngster and has a good chance of winning.

get the promptest attention, Weaver said. Therefore, it is advisable to place orders for parts well in advance so that there will be no delay when next year's work begins and the machine is needed.

Leaving a machine to be repaired just before the crop season starts is a definite mistake. Not only does it sometimes mean the purchase of another machine, if available, but it also means the discarding of an otherwise perfectly good piece of equipment, Weaver pointed out.

The rush season for repair parts is just before spring work, and manufacturers' stocks are often reduced at that time. Also delays in mailing and the sending of wrong pieces make it essential that this ordering be done early.

Painting wooden parts and polishing and greasing metal surfaces adds years of life to a machine. This is a job that may be done during the fall and winter when the machines are idle.

"Most farm machines work only a few days a year," Weaver said, "but they rust or rot away the remainder of the year if not given the proper protection."
