NAZIS REPORTED IN LENINGRAD SUBURBS

Repeal Of Neutrality Act Asked In Senate Resolution

Steps Taken By M'kellar Tennessee

Declares Act In Direct Conflict With U.S. Policy Of Freedom Of The Seas And Adds That While The Law Is On The Books, Government Is Paying Virtually No Attention To It

Washington, Sept. 25. — (AP) — Senator McKellar (D-Tenn.) introduced in the Senate today a resolution to repeal the neutrality act which bars the arming of American merchantships and prevents them from entering combat zones.

Declaring that the act was "in direct conflict with our freedom of the seas policy," McKellar told his colleagues that the law ought to be repealed outright. The Tennessee senator has been a consistent supporter of the administration's foreign policy, but there was no immediate indication as to whether he introduced the repeal with the knowledge of Senate leaders.

President Roosevelt said Tuesday that revision or repeal of the act was being studied, indicating that action might be forthcoming next week.

McKellar said he thought that while the law was on the statute books, the government was "paying virtually no attention to it" and for that reason it ought to be repealed.

Asserts Sen. Nye Endorsed Picture

Washington, Sept. 25. — (AP) — Harry M. Warner, president of Warner Brothers, told a Senate subcommittee today that Senator Nye (R-N.D.) one of the chief critics of alleged war propaganda in the movies, had endorsed the film, "Confessions of a Nazi Spy," in 1939.

Warner, appearing as a witness before a Senate Interstate Commerce subcommittee investigating the movies, read into the record a telegram from Ed Harrison of the Warner advertising staff who quoted Nye as expressing a hope that more pictures would be produced "of a kind dealing with propaganda emanating from foreign lands."

Wendell L. Wilkie, counsel for the moving picture industry in the hearing, issued a statement today saying that producers had merely exercised good entertainment judgment in making films which show Nazism in an unfavorable light.

Illness Is Fatal To G. Hall Roosevelt

Washington, Sept. 25. — (AP) — G. Hall Roosevelt, 50, engineer, banker and transport executive, died early today at the Walter Reed Army Hospital with his only sister, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, at his bedside.

Roosevelt had been ill many months, first in a hospital at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and subsequently was given army hospitalization by virtue of his World War aviation service.

The relationship between Roosevelt and his only sister, the first lady, was extremely close. Orphaned as children, they were tied by a strong and never-waning bond.

STRUCK SHIPS ARE RELEASED BY AGREEMENT

Seamen's Strike Is Referred To Mediation Board

VESSELS NEEDED HAUL MATERIALS

Threat Of Strike At Consolidated Aircraft Company Also Placed Under Jurisdiction Of Board

A seamen's strike for higher war bonuses was ended today by an agreement to negotiate the dispute between the sailors and owners before the National Defense Mediation Board.

The decision, reached yesterday, released for immediate service 25 ships needed for transporting defense materials and lend-lease supplies. On Monday, a conference in Washington will try to adjust the dispute, which involves the mariners' demands for a war bonus of \$60 a month for voyages to West Indian waters.

Ships had been tied up by the strike in 14 harbors on the Atlantic Pacific and Gulf coasts.

The mediation board took jurisdiction in another dispute of major importance to the national defense efforts—the threat of a strike by 22,000 American Federation of Labor mechanics in the Consolidated Aircraft Company plant at San Diego, Calif., which holds huge orders for bombers. While 98.3 per cent of the union membership were reported to have voted in favor of a strike, spokesmen for both the union and management appeared confident that the differences could be adjusted without an actual walkout.

In the hard coal fields of Pennsylvania, about 1,400 of 20,000 striking CIO United Mine Workers returned to work yesterday, after walking out several days ago in protest to an increase in union dues and assessments. Forty anthracite mines in the Hazleton, Penn., area remained closed, however.

Chungking Raided By Nippon Planes

Shanghai, Sept. 25. — (AP) — A large force of Japanese warplanes made a "devastating" raid on the Chinese capital of Chungking today, the Japanese announced, while both air and ground forces hammered against Chinese positions in Hunan province of Central China.

In the attack on Chungking, the Japanese planes destroyed "important military objectives," the Japanese announced.

In Hunan, the Japanese reported today a mass raid on Changsha, the provincial capital, while ground troops pressed to within 26 miles of the city. Japanese planes strafed Chinese troops elsewhere in northern Hunan.

Depot Is Lost In Fayetteville Fire

Fayetteville, Sept. 25. — (AP) — Fire destroyed the Atlantic Coast Line freight station and nine freight cars here early today.

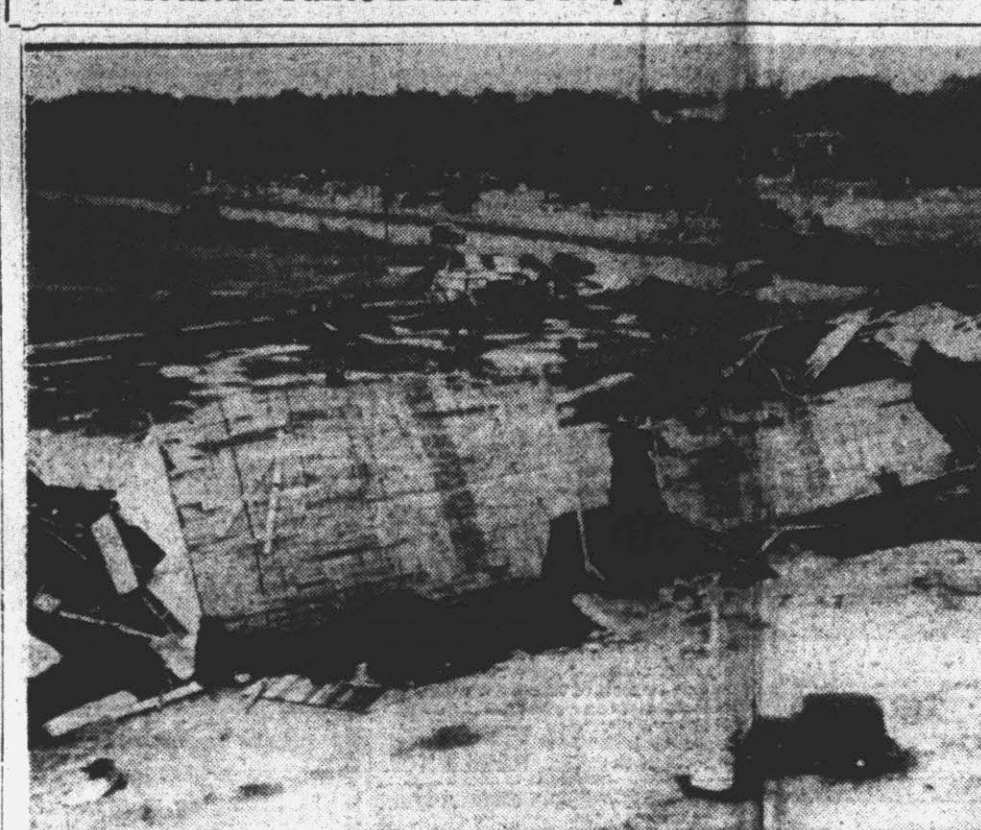
Damage was estimated unofficially at \$150,000 and \$300,000. Soon after the fire was discovered at 5:45 p. m., an explosion in the center of the 750-foot structure caused the blaze to spread rapidly. Firemen, discounting any possibility of sabotage, said the explosion was caused by an accumulation of gases.

Dover Harbor Hit By Nazi Bombers

Berlin, Sept. 25. — (AP) — German bombers raided the Dover harbor area last night, the high command announced, after daylight attacks in which it said various railroads on the Scottish-east coast were hit. In North Africa, a communiqué said, German pursuit planes shot down seven British fighters and one bomber without loss.

There were no hostile planes over German territory day of night, it stated.

Houston Takes Brunt Of Tropical Texas Hurricane

DRAFTING BILL TO CURB PROFITS

Washington, Sept. 25. — (AP) — Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau announced today that Treasury experts had begun drafting a proposed bill to limit corporation profits to six per cent.

Following up his recommendation for such a limit before a congressional committee, the secretary told a press conference that he set his aides to work this morning putting the idea into legal language for presentation to Congress.

"We have started drafting this proposal and will be ready whenever Congress wants to work on it," he said.

Morgenthau indicated, however, that he preferred to present the idea as a tax bill before the House Ways and Means Committee, rather than as a rider to the price control legislation being considered by the House Banking Committee. He expressed the idea for the first time in testifying on the price bill.

The drafting task of his experts, Morgenthau explained, is to surround the idea of a six per cent limit on corporation profits with other provisions to make the proposed law as fair as possible to different kinds of business firms.

Claim 11 Vessels Sunk By Nazi Subs

Berlin, Sept. 25. — (AP) — Germany declared today that U-boats traveling off West Africa had destroyed 11 merchantmen of a convoy of 12 ships sailing toward England, "despite powerful protection by destroyers."

"Only one small steamer managed to escape," said a special communiqué. "Eleven ships of a total of 78,000 tons were sunk."

Methodist Leader Dies.
Atlanta, Sept. 25. — (AP) — Bishop Warren Aiken Candler, 84, retired, a leader in Southern Methodism for more than half a century, died at his home here today after a 10-day illness.

CROATIA ZONE REOCCUPIED BY ITALIAN ARMY

Rome Declares Aim is To End Any Disturbance

SERBS REPORTED TO BE RESISTING

Rebellious Serbs Said To Be Continuing Resistance Despite Arrival Of Nazi Reinforcements

Rome, Sept. 25. — (AP) — The Italian army has completed re-occupation of a demilitarized zone in Croatia to restore order in that turbulent state carved out of the dismembered Yugoslavia, it was announced today.

The area into which the Italian army has moved lies along the Adriatic seaboard between the Dalmatian coast and the Dinar mountains and a communiqué said the step was taken with the consent of the Croat government.

Its aim, it said, was to "end any disturbance and a return to normal life for the population as well as an absolute guarantee for the period of the war that Italian security in the Adriatic and the hinterland will not be disturbed by the enemy of its agents, whether they be Anglo-Saxon, Jew or Bolshevik."

(A British broadcast, heard in New York by NBC, said 12,000 Serbs attacked a Serb town yesterday and that it still was the scene of violent fighting today despite arrival of German reinforcements and German dive-bomber attacks.)

Berlin, Sept. 25. — (AP) — DNB reported from Belgrade today that German soldiers and armed Serbian forces had "rendered innoxious a Communist gang" which had been terrorizing the Obrenovatz district.

A flight of several hours and a search through a forest in the region near the town of Bjeljina, west of Belgrade, the German news agency said, ended with 14 of the band dead, including its leader. Ten others were arrested.

Authoritative sources said they were uninformed on a report broadcast by the BBC that dive-bombers had tracked 12,000 rebellious Serbs.

Evans had already enrolled for the 1941-42 session at the college. He was graduated from Greenville High School in 1933, the last class to graduate under the 11-year plan. For the next two years he attended Edwards Military Academy of Salisbury, and served as editor of the student newspaper there.

In 1940 he enrolled at East Carolina Teachers College and worked on the Teco Echo, student newspaper, and the Tecoan, the year-book of the college. He was a member of the Men's Student Government Association for 1941-1942 and was serving the newspaper as columnist.

He was an active member of the Young Democratic Club.

He was born in Wilson in August, 1921, later moving to Greenville with his parents, and had made his home here since.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Sallie Jackson Evans of Greenville; his father, L. C. Evans of Florida, and a sister, Mrs. Ella Frances Whitford of New Bern.

LOCAL MARKET REMAINS FIRM

Average Of 35.10 Cents Per Pound Paid Yesterday

With the market remaining firm, the 598,120 pounds of tobacco auctioned on the 10 local warehouses yesterday brought \$209,879.25 for an official average of 35.10 cents per pound.

Approximately 700,000 pounds of the leaf were on the floors at the start of today's sales, much of the offerings being of low grade leaf. Prices, however, remained consistently high.

Yesterday's sales brought to 25,961,978 pounds the total for the season, for which \$7,248,168.53, or an average of 27.92, has been paid. These figures show a gain of 3,008,112 pounds over the 22,953,866 pounds sold during the corresponding period last year. Total money paid out this season exceeds last year's figure of \$3,595,298.57 by \$3,652,869.96—more than a 100 per cent gain. The season's average of 27.92 to date this year is 12.01 cents per pound higher than the 15.91 established during the corresponding period in 1941.

The fact that the market continues steady, with little fluctuation, is shown in the daily averages so far this week—35.43 Monday, 35.08 Tuesday and 35.10 yesterday. The small difference in the figures was caused by differences in the general quality of offerings for the three days.

Warehouses were being cleared this afternoon in preparation for a big sales day tomorrow.

Nazi Bomb Sights Tried Out In U.S.

New York, Sept. 25. — (AP) — Testimony that the United States had obtained German bomb sights and was using parts of them was introduced today at the trial of 16 men charged with espionage conspiracy.

William Friedman, Federal Bureau of Investigation agent, testified that he had eavesdropped on a conversation March 7, 1941, between William Seboid, FBI counter-spy, and Hermann Lang, a defendant accused of selling secrets of the American-made Norden bomb sight to the German government.

Friedman said he was hidden in an adjoining room when Lang, a German-born draftsman of the Carl L. Norden Company, entered the office. He said the talk eventually came around to bomb sights.

"Lang said his plant was being enlarged," Friedman testified. "He told Seboid of bomb sight instruments which had been taken from German planes and are being experimented with at my plant and certain parts are being used. Send this across."

"Seboid said he would."

Russia Also Counters With Assertion That Battle Beginning To Turn In Favor Of Defenders; Nazi Reports Assert Fighting Actually Being Waged In Streets Of Suburbs Of Old Czarist Capital

German troops were reported fighting in the streets of Leningrad's suburbs today, posing a grave threat in the siege of the old Czarist capital, and Nazi military quarters declared that the position of Red army defenders was becoming "more and more hopeless."

The Russians, however, countered with the assertion that "the fierce battle was beginning to turn in favor of Marshal Klement Voroshilov's defense forces."

Soviet counter attacks in greater number and strength were reported to be stemming the Nazi onslaught, despite the arrival of a steady stream of German reinforcements.

The Moscow radio, as heard in London, admitted that a few German tanks had succeeded in cutting through the Soviet first line of defense at Leningrad yesterday, but asserted they were thrown back with heavy losses.

Nazi shock troops were pushing deeper toward the heart of the city of 3,200,000 after crushing Soviet resistance in at least two villages on Leningrad's outskirts.

German assault troops were pictured as fighting the Russians hand to hand with bayonets, hand grenades and sledgeham in a bloody advance from street to street and house to house.

A single German division was reported to have seized a large Leningrad factory district where every house was bitterly defended by the Russians.

The Moscow radio, denying that the Germans had actually penetrated suburban Leningrad, said the Nazi report apparently referred to the small town of Peterhof, on the Gulf of Finland, nearly 20 miles west of the city.

Hyman L. Cherry, 50, well-known Pitts-county farmer, died late Wednesday afternoon in Pitt County Hospital here following a two-months illness.

Funeral services were conducted from the home of a brother, L. W. Cherry of near Red Banks this afternoon at 5 o'clock by the Elder S. B. Denny, Primitive Baptist minister of Wilson. Burial was in the Greenville cemetery in Greenville.

The Greenville Masonic Lodge No. 284 of the A. F. and M. E. was in charge of the services at the graveside.

Mr. Cherry was born and reared in Pitt county. He was widely connected throughout Eastern North Carolina.

Surviving are his widow, who before her marriage, was Miss Leann Harris; an adopted daughter, Mrs. H. K. Herring of Columbus, Ga.; two brothers, L. W. and W. A. the ship, in which he said among
other things: "I put a New Testa-

ture who tries to be faithful and
truthful to duty can possibly be
guided."

The word testament means cove-
nant, or promise. The New Testa-

siah would come; the New Testa-
ment is the new promise made to
the world that through the Messiah
who did come, salvation is every-
where granted to man. The New
Testament is just what Dickens said
it was, "the best book that ever was

And this because it teaches the most
important lesson that can ever come
to man's heart.

John Quincy Adams, the most
learned American of the early nine-
teenth century, spoke of the Bible
as the first and almost the only book
deserving of universal attention.
"The Bible is the book of all others
to be read at all ages and in all
conditions of human life," he de-
clared. "I speak as a man of the
world to men of the world when I
say to them, 'Search the Scriptures.'"
The Bible reveals the life of man
in the light of God's love.

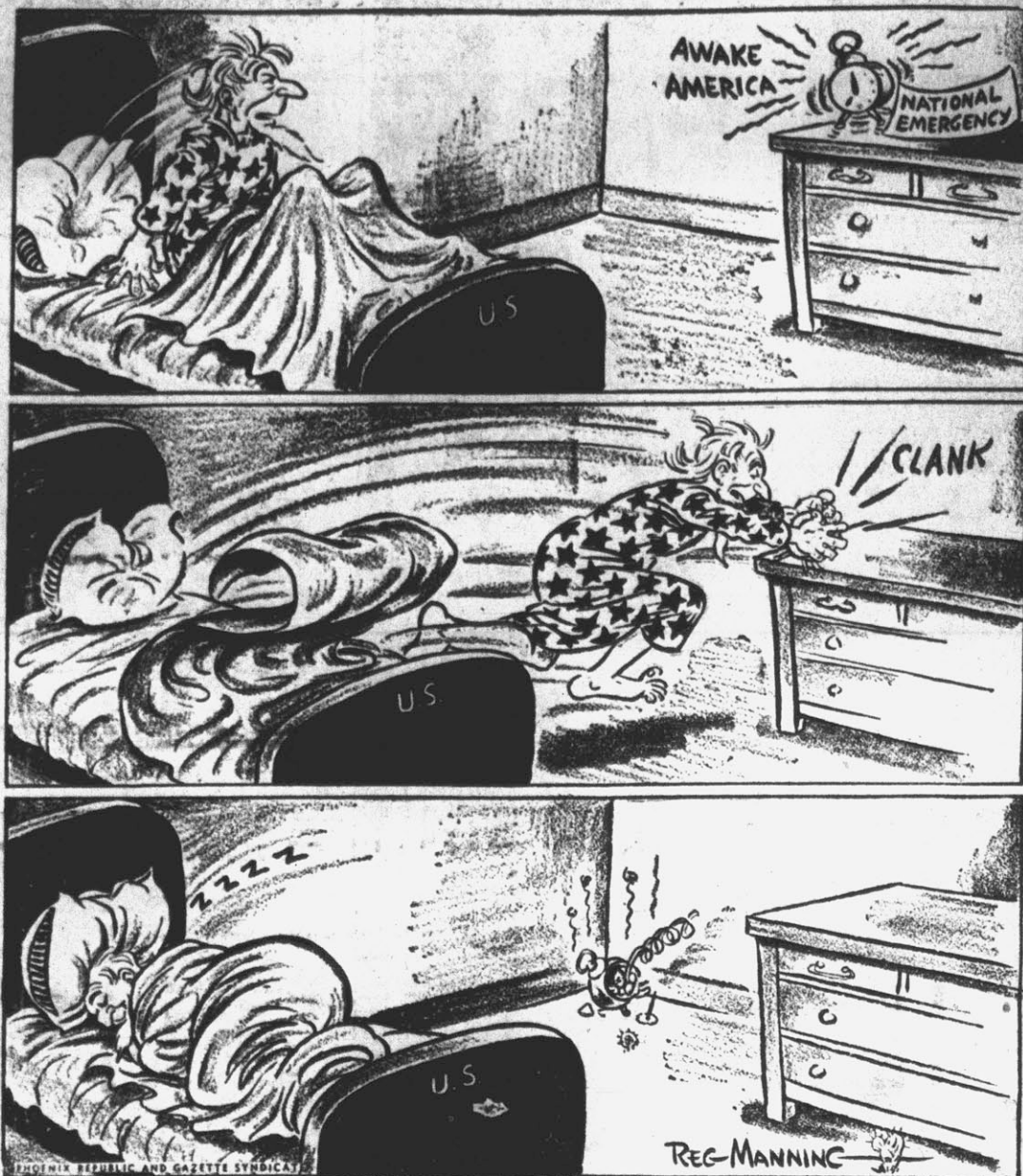
RIGHT HERE AT HOME

Washington Daybook

By Jack Stinson

(First of two articles on the
"petroleum products shortage.")
Washington — Not since this war
started has Washington had a big-
ger chuckle than that over the hu-
labeleo which accompanied the
so-called shortage of gasoline, fuel
oil and other petroleum products in
17 eastern seaboard states.

Back in the spring, Secretary of
Interior Harold I. Ickes, who also
is national defense petroleum co-
ordinator, smelled out a "potential"
shortage in the eastern states, pe-
troleum products, and what fol-
lowed was a governmental comic opera
interlude, like "Pussy Wants a Cor-
ner" with everybody off base at
once.

There were threats of gasoline-
less Sundays, gasoline ration cards,
frigid apartments and houses be-
cause of a lack of heating oil, and
idle industries. Filling stations were
closed from 7 p. m. to 7 a. m. and
finally their supplies of motor fuel
were cut 10 per cent. All of which
had the effect of increasing the
consumption of gasoline.

Everybody Takes A Hand.
The railroads came forward with
the assertion that they had "20,000
idle tank cars." President Roose-
velt cleared the right-of-way for
pipelines which, in six to twelve
months, might eliminate the short-
ages, only to have the defense pri-
orities agency step up and veto the
largest of these on the grounds that
between 400,000 and 750,000 tons of
steel (nobody quite agreed on what
amount would be necessary) could
not be spared from more vital de-
fense needs.

Into this mess, primarily at the
instigation of the American Auto-
mobile association, stepped a sen-
ate investigating committee which,
after a couple of weeks of hearing
everybody who had any authority
to talk on the subject, concluded
that "there is no shortage of petro-
leum products in the eastern sea-
board states," but protected itself
by intimating that there might be
some day, because nobody knows
what the future holds.

In the interim, Price Administra-
tor Leon Henderson slapped a ceil-
ing on gasoline prices; railroads re-
duced rates on gasoline and crude
nearer to tanker and pipeline levels;
bootlegging of gasoline after hours

was reported; the oil companies,
nearly three months late, pledged
to use all available tank cars; com-
plaints came in to Deputy Petro-
leum Coordinator Ralph K. Davies
that orders were not being filled
because oil companies couldn't get
tank cars, and the Republicans asked
the removal of Ickes and Davies
as heads of the defense petroleum
set-up.

Not Too Funny, At That.

To any observer who felt that this
confusion might not be such a
laughing matter after all, at least
two official statements in the in-
vestigations must have been signifi-
cant.

One came from Leon Henderson
in his testimony before Sen. Fran-
cis Maloney's senate committee.
"Transportation has always been
the key to the oil problem from a
competitive standpoint. A major
factor in the growth of the large
integrated companies in this indus-
try has been their ownership of
cheap privately operated transpor-
tation facilities."

The other was a little-noticed
paragraph buried in the report of
the Maloney committee:
"The committee members have
not attempted to explore the charges
of unworthy purposes behind the
announced oil shortage. We have
not felt that it was part of our im-
mediate responsibility to attempt
to find out whether or not the
"shortage" question arose as the re-
sult of a desire to construct a large
pipeline, or other pipelines, or
whether behind the scene there was
some connection with pending anti-
trust suits (against the major oil
companies) or whether the price of
petroleum products was involved."

Members have heard these and
other charges—and while we do not
dismiss them entirely, and while
they might be considered later, the
committee has felt that its purpose
was to ascertain whether or not

there was a petroleum shortage, and
if there was, how it might be cor-
rected.

Short Shots

Raleigh, Sept. 25.—Way out in St.
Paul North Carolina's Banking
Commissioner Gurney P. Hood is
telling the banking supervisors of
the country that we ought to get
ready for the heaviest and most se-
vere taxes ever imposed in this
country. He even sees the capital
levy (merely a variant of taxation)
as a possibility, albeit a remote one,
if the war should be of long dura-
tion.

He left with your Raleigh reporter
a copy of the speech he is sched-
uled to be delivering. It is a call
to the bank supervisors to recognize
the stern necessity of paying as
much of the national defense cost
as possible through taxes, no matter
how high they may rise and no mat-
ter how onerous they may become.
"If the current defense effort is
largely financed through borrowings
and especially from banks, certain
inevitable results are to be expected.
None of these effects will contribute
to a sound future for American
banking," he says.

After explaining why he takes this
view the commissioner continues:
"There is, therefore, every reason
for the application of the broadest
and highest possible taxation to the
end that the major portion of the
defense program shall be financed
out of current taxation."
"We cannot have our butter and
our cannon now without having less
butter and fewer cannon next year,

a year, France with fatal results.

Great Quantity Of Food To Be Sent To Britain

Raleigh, Sept. 24.—American foodstuffs for the British in 1942 will amount to 261,432 cars, or enough to make up a train that would reach from Washington to Los Angeles, Dr. I. O. Schaub, director of the North Carolina State College Extension Service, said today.

Dr. Schaub said 5,000,000,000 pounds of milk are scheduled for the English next year. This will require 83,333 tank cars which would stretch out 750 miles.

Eggs, another item on the list, will total 500,000,000 dozen. Figuring 12,000 dozen to the car, this would require 41,666 cars, enough to make up a 378-mile train.

Canned poultry in the amount of 18,000,000 pounds would require 600 cars at the rate of 30,000 pounds to the car. These cars would stretch out five miles.

Government officials expect to ship across also 1,500,000,000 pounds of pork and lard. Figuring 30,000 pounds to the car, this means that 50,000 cars will be required to transport these products to shipping points. This train would total 454 miles.

A 750-mile trainload of fresh fruits likewise is intended for trans-ocean shipping. The 1,250,000 tons would require 83,333 cars if 15 tons were shipped in each car.

Canned vegetables amounting to 2,500,000 cases will swell the grand total of foodstuffs. If 1,000 cases were shipped in each car, this would require 2,500 cars, or a train 22 miles long.

Pactolus To Get Carpenter Course

A carpentering shop will be installed in the Pactolus school in the near future, E. N. Meekins, director of Vocational Education at N. C. State College, having recently inspected the plant regarding such a step at the invitation of Principal H. L. Hart.

The director inspected the industrial art shop to determine the advisability of setting up a course in carpentering for the benefit of young men of the community. Enrollments must be 17-25 years old, inclusive.

After a thorough investigation of the shop facilities, and the cabinets library shelves, tables, and other useful school supplies made in the school shop, the director gave the plans for such a course his heartiest approval. When as many as ten eligible young men have manifested an interest in the course, ample

WAYNE CHOSEN AS GUINEA PIG

To Try Experiment in Coordinating Agencies

Reflector Bureau.

Raleigh, Sept. 25.—Wayne county has been selected as a sort of guinea pig for an experiment in cooperation and coordination of numerous existing public agencies with private groups and the ordinary citizen.

A county nutritional project will be the vehicle, and upon the degree of cooperation and coordination secured will depend the success of the undertaking, which will involve at least ten state and federal agencies as well as local governmental units, civic clubs and the like.

A meeting in Wayne, probably at Goldsboro, will be held in the very near future to work out final plans for the undertaking which has already been broached and which has secured the endorsement of many local groups.

Back of the whole thing is the universally-acknowledged need for improved nutrition. The defense emergency has put into bold relief that fact that a tremendous percentage of the people are undernourished either from lack of enough food or lack of knowledge of the proper foods essential to good

tools will be placed in the shop by the district supervisor.

Adequate space for the workshop is assured by the construction of an additional room, the materials being already on the ground for it. This will constitute one of the main projects of training. To supplement it will be the construction of cabinets for classroom supplies, additional library shelves, tables, etc.

diet and good health. And so the leaders of the State Health Coordinating Service recently set out to see what can be accomplished by a concerted effort on the part of all existing agencies which might be brought into a campaign for proper nutrition.

The State Board of Health, the Department of Public Instruction, the Rural Electrification, the federal farm security administration, the Extension Service at State College, the State Department of Agriculture and others all have workers and units which can and will participate.

And so the idea spread that all these could and ought to be consolidated into a concerted and allied army to fight the battle for better nutrition, with all county and local units enlisted beside the state and federal for the duration.

It is planned to set up a county nutrition committee or council which will have a membership broad enough to include a representative of every group interested in contributing to a program of nutritional improvement. It probably will include, probably must include if the experiment in cooperation is to be a success—all home demonstration agents, all farm demonstration agents, county welfare representatives, county superintendent of education, county health officer and county nurses, county commissioners and members of the board of aldermen at Goldsboro; representatives from these federal agencies: FSA, NYA, WPA and surplus

commodities corporation; local and county groups such as the civic clubs, merchants, women's clubs, church groups, PTA's, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H clubs, canning clubs and colored groups.

gram can be put over, but whether all the agencies can cooperate and work in harness together. If they can, sponsors of the movement believe, there is no doubt that the nutrition program will succeed.

Dr. John Kendrick of the State Board of Health, and Dr. Henry Highsmith of the Department of Public Instruction, both point out that the program is not theirs, but that of every organization participating. They stress the fact that there will be no "Rockefeller money" or anything like it; but that the program can succeed only on the efforts of those organizations participating.

Wayne has been selected as the first county in which the experiment in cooperation will be tried, because it is generally believed the people and officials there will co-

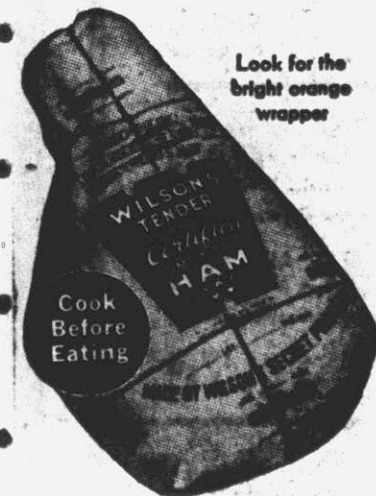

Draftees Advised To Travel Light

Raleigh, Sept. 25.—Selective Service registrants enroute to army induction centers should "travel light," taking nothing but essentials so as to avoid inconvenience to themselves and to the armed forces. Brigadier General J. Van B. Metts, state director of selective service, cautioned today.

One small bag should be sufficient until he is given his equipment by the army, the director declared. He said:

"If you wish, take a small bag with a few clean clothes, a few handkerchiefs, socks, soap, towel, and other necessary toilet articles. These are not essential, for you will be issued necessary equipment by the army, but they may come in handy should there be any delay in your induction."

"Leave jewelry, large sums of money, and other valuables at home, for they may be easily lost. If possible, take a little spending money for such needs as you may have before your first pay-day. Take some postal cards or stationery and stamps, a fountain pen, and an inexpensive watch if you have them."

Selectees were warned by Director Metts to leave automobiles and motorcycles at home. Commanding officers will tell the men on their posts if they may have these vehicles and the soldiers will then have an opportunity to get them from their homes, he pointed out. Unnecessary articles taken to induction centers must be returned to his home by the selectee at his own expense or otherwise disposed of, Director Metts said.
