RUSSIA ADMITS NAZI FORCES ADVANCING

FEAR HOLD-UP OF WORK ON ARMY'S TANKS

CIO and AFL Involved In Jurisdictional Dispute

SPICER COMPANY FIRM INVOLVED

Trouble Declared To Have Started When Board's Bargaining Election Won By AFL Union

42—FEAR

Stoppage of the army's tank production was said by War Department officials today to be threatened by a CIO-AFL jurisdictional dispute involving the Spicer Manufacturing Company at Toledo, Ohio, and its subsidiary, the Hillsdale, Mich., Steel Products Company.

The Spicer Company makes 70 per cent of the transmissions for all of the army's tanks and also for most of the half-tractor and "jeep" combat vehicles.

Officials at Washington said the trouble started at Hillsdale with a jurisdictional dispute between rival AFL and CIO automobile workers. The AFL union won a National Labor Relations Board bargaining election, but rowing continued and the plant was closed temporarily this week by request of local officials.

The matter reached a climax when CIO-United Automobile Workers, who have a contract with Spicer, decreed that they would not handle parts from the Hillsdale concern, where the AFL is the authorized bargaining agency.

Spicer officials reported to the War Department that unless the CIO boycott were discontinued, the company would have to halt work on transmissions for the "half-tracks" and "jeeps" and that materials were on hand for only about a week's further manufacture of parts for tanks.

In Brooklyn, N. Y., 500 employees of Robbins, drydock, walked out at noon today to protest, union leaders said, the employment of two non-union workers at the shipyard, which is busy repairing both American and British ships. Company officials refused to comment on the walkout, staged by local 39 of the Industrial Union of Marine and Shipbuilding Workers of America (CIO).

Numerous Farmers Closing Out Crops

Numerous tobacco growers, both small and large, are selling the last of their 1941 crop, many offering their last today while others will wind up their crop on Monday.

With the last of the tobacco being offered, much of the offerings on the floors is of inferior quality, some farmers selling some tobacco that would have been disposed of as scrap last season.

The approximately 1,500,000 pounds offered today was being disposed of and the floors cleared for Monday's sale.

Figures to date show 37,673,704 pounds sold for \$11,558,979.80 or an average of 30.68 cents per pound, compared with offerings of 36,706,946 pounds sold for \$6,529,112.67, an average of 17.79 cents for the corresponding period a year ago.

END 1ST WEEK OF MANEUVERS

Fourth Division Gets New Commanding Officer

Camden, S. C., Oct. 10.—(AP)—The First Army came to the concluding phase of its first week of maneuvers in the Carolinas today with a new commanding officer for one division—the Fourth—and with the prospect of undergoing more strenuous training next week.

Major General Clifford R. Powell, New Jersey political leader and veteran of the World War, who had commanded the 44th, made up of New Jersey and New York National Guardsmen, for more than two years, gave way to Brig. General James Muir, upon the recommendation of the Second Corps commander, Major General Lloyd R. Fredendall.

Powell took up temporary station at corps headquarters awaiting War Department action upon his request for assignment to command of Fort Dix in his home state. Simultaneously, announcement was made that a colonel, two lieutenant colonels and two majors in the 29th division had been relieved of their duties and given temporary duties at corps headquarters.

A statement from the army's public relations department indicated that the five were all above the age limit for serving with troops in their present ranks.

Speaking to the officers of his corps, General Fredendall expressed satisfaction with the teamwork and progress shown in field tactics, but criticized the discipline of his troops, especially with regard to their use of water, the matter of proper dress and clean shaving.

Fire Chief Gardner Urges Clean-up Drive

Chief George Gardner of the Greenville Fire Department today issued an appeal to managers of business houses to clean up their basements and attics and remove trash from any other places in preparation for an annual inspection of the fire district next week.

Chief Gardner also urged homeowners to participate in the clean-up campaign and said that members of his department would inspect any home upon request.

Legion Meet

The monthly meeting of Pitt County Post No. 39, American Legion, will meet Tuesday night, October 21—one week earlier than the regular scheduled date—and will be held in the High School cafeteria. Heretofore the meetings have been held at the Third Street Hut, but members voted at the last meeting to change the place of meeting.

To Be Deprived Of Largest Storehouse Of War Needs

Manila, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Henry F. Grady, President Roosevelt's special economic representative, said today he had received assurances during a comprehensive tour of southeastern Asia that the Axis would be shut off completely from the world's largest storehouse of war materials.

He told a press conference that officials of the Philippines, China, Malaya, the Netherlands East Indies, India, Burma and Ceylon had pledged their efforts for increased and expedited delivery of United States and British of several strategic materials.

Grady also reported: 1. The United States probably will increase supplies of industrial machinery and war equipment to southeastern Asia while guaranteeing the absorption of any increase in production that may result. 2. China within a few weeks will have an "effective" air force composed entirely of American planes. 3. Throughout eastern Asia, excluding Thailand, there is no indication of appeasement toward Japan.

4. Japan will be unable to put the Burma road out of commission without a land invasion, which is improbable. Grady, who arrived by clipper plane from Hongkong, said the United States and southeastern Asia were established a vast economic pool which the Axis could penetrate only through military force.

It also means the collapse of any peaceful prospect of Japan's "Co-prosperity" sphere, he added, as well as Anglo-American victory in the year-old economic war with Tokyo in southeast Asia.

Grady said Japan was obtaining at present an unimportant amount of rubber and tin from Thailand, while Thai officials were stiffening their attitude toward Nippon.

First Bertie Man Executed By N. C.

Raleigh, Oct. 10.—George Peele, 20-year-old crippled Negro, today became the first resident of Bertie county to be executed in Central prison since the state took over the task of inflicting capital punishment on March 18, 1910.

Peele was convicted and sentenced to death for the slaying of E. W. Gray, 78-year-old Windsor store clerk, who surprised the Negro while he was allegedly robbing an office safe.

Gray, who had been waiting on a customer, was said to have walked in unexpectedly on Peele, who was in the act of rifling the safe. The Negro then allegedly picked up a rifle lying nearby and beat the old man to death.

Witnesses said the 165-pound, five-foot, nine inch Negro maintained the same expression he held during his trial. His last words, as attendants strapped him in the death seat, were, "I'm innocent."

GUN SHORTAGE BEEN REMOVED

Administration Leaders Declare That Enough Weapons Exist To Equip Merchantships Immediately Following Action By Congress Granting Permission

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Merchantmen plying the Atlantic danger zones can be armed just as soon as Congress gives the word, administration leaders disclosed today, because the Navy has sufficiently overcome the serious shortage of proper weapons which existed earlier this year.

"There will be enough guns for the ships in the Atlantic as soon as the necessary revision of the neutrality act is accomplished," an informed administration source said.

Although the Navy is known to have a great many guns in reserve which were adequate to protect ships against submarines, there was a shortage of anti-aircraft weapons. Last April 5, however, Congress made \$75,888,820 available to correct that situation and shortly thereafter the navy began getting deliveries of those guns in substantial numbers. The April estimate placed expected production at about 100 a month.

The money provided was for the purchase of 1,445 guns and 1,344 mounts.

Paris Executions Now Stand At 74

Paris, Oct. 10.—(AP)—German authorities announced today that the 74th person had been shot as reprisal for attacks against the German-occupied forces.

The announcement said Gaston Pinot was shot today. He was condemned to death last Tuesday for illegal possession of firearms. It was said also that 15 militant Communists had been interned at Amiens on orders of the prefect of Somme department. This raised to 45 the number of Communists sent to concentration camps in that department in the last several days.

Bus Station Is Now At Fifth And Greene

The Greenville bus station, which has been located at Pleasant's college store for several years, has been moved to Smith's service station at the corner of Fifth and Greene streets.

The new location is adjacent to the site where the new bus station is being erected.

ECTC Adds Schools To Practice Teaching List

Because of the greatly increased number of seniors at East Carolina Teachers College applying this year for the work required in practice teaching under competent critic teachers, the College organization for practice teaching has been enlarged to provide work in the fields of home economics and science in Williamston and Chocowinity both of which have recently been approved by the State Department of Education for this purpose, according to President Leon R. Meadows.

City Superintendent J. H. Rose has been asked to act as coordinator of all the practice teaching, since the greater part of the program will still be carried on in the Greenville schools. The work of all other departments can be cared for in Greenville.

During the college year of three terms around 180 seniors will be doing their teaching in over a dozen departments in high school, and 110 in primary and grammar grades at the Training School.

Last year for the first time it was necessary to send seniors to live and teach in certain neighboring towns, and this year there is a still larger number to be placed in some fields, 76 having asked for the work in home economics alone, according to Miss Katherine Holtschaw, head Dr. Charles in science.

MAY LIFT BAN ON ARMS FOR PANAMA SHIPS

New Government Reconsiders Order Of Ousted Head

MANY U. S. CRAFT TO BE AFFECTED

President Pledges Collaboration In Continental Defense And Respect For Obligations To U.S.

Panama, Oct. 10.—(AP)—A coup d'etat government pledged to collaboration in continental defense is reconsidering an order made Monday by ousted President Arnulfo Arias which barred the arming of merchantships flying Panama's flag.

A cabinet member said today that some decision on the question—which affects many United States owned vessels shifted to Panama registry because of the neutrality act to carry war supplies to Britain—might be announced today.

Ricardo Adolfo De La Guardia, the new president sworn in late yesterday as the republic's third

Rome, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The authoritative Fascist editor Virginio Gayda today accused the United States of responsibility for yesterday's coup d'etat in Panama.

Writing in his newspaper, Il Giornale D'Italia, he said the coup was intended to set up a new regime submissive to Washington's orders and "intrigues." The Berlin radio broadcast the comment that "it was recalled in the Wilhelmstrasse that exactly 40 years had elapsed since Theodore Roosevelt, by bringing about the separation of Panama from Colombia, obtained for the United States control over the Isthmus of Panama."

chief executive in one eventful day after disclosure that Arias had flown to Cuba, issued a statement declaring his government "will be inspired by the most absolute sentiments of collaboration in defense of the continent, maintaining always national dignity and the greatest respect for contractual obligations with the government of the United States."

(Informed Washington sources said the United States would regard De La Guardia as the constitutional leader of Panama. There is no question of recognition, they said, since the shift followed constitutional procedure without disorder.)

(In Havana, Arias said he was surprised at the overthrow of his government; that he had flown to Cuba for eye treatments and was trying to telephone the new executive to learn whether he could return to "the country I love so much." He said "I am not pro-Axis; I am pro-Panama.")

Chinese Claim Capture Of Important Port City

Declared Be Biggest Chinese Victory Since 1938

Chunking (Saturday), Oct. 11.—(AP)—Chinese military headquarters announced tonight that the Chinese armies driving eastward along the Yangtze river had captured Ichang, important port which has been the westernmost outpost of Japan's invasion.

The announcement, shortly after midnight, let loose a wild celebration in this war-time capital, with thousands of firecrackers shattering the night calm. Newsboys ran through the streets with extras.

Chinese leaders declared that the Ichang victory (not yet conceded by the Japanese) was China's greatest since the battle of Taierchwang in southern Shantung province in 1938, when the Japanese drive was halted with heavy losses.

Ichang, 800 miles from the sea and most important Yangtze river port between Hankow and the great gorges of the river which lead to Chungking, has been in Japanese hands nearly two years.

It was the objective of a strong offensive launched last week which the Chinese said carried their troops into the city at least four days ago. Chinese authorities also reported the capture of Nantungkwan, a strategic height a few miles north of Ichang.

U. S. To Recognize New Panama Rule

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—President Roosevelt declared today that diplomatic relations with Panama would remain absolutely unchanged as a result of the change of presidents in the Central American republic.

He told a press conference that he had talked about the Panamanian shift with the State Department last night and that apparently it was made in accordance with the Panamanian constitution so that no question of re-recognition was involved.

Asserts Foe Undergoing Big Losses

Germans Declared to Be Throwing Huge Numbers Into Battle Of Moscow; Atmosphere In Moscow, However, Distinctly More Confident; Soviet Union Opens Flood Gates Of Reserve Manpower

Soviet front line dispatches admitted today that Adolf Hitler's invasion armies were still advancing "over mountains of German corpses" in the Bryansk sector of the nine-day-old Battle for Moscow, smashing through by sheer weight of numbers at several points.

Red Star, the Russian army newspaper, said the Germans were throwing immense forces into the new push after being routed earlier in the Bryansk sector, 230 miles southwest of Moscow.

As an example, Red Star said two Nazi tank divisions and two motorized infantry divisions were hurled against a single Red army unit of undisclosed size, and that three German infantry divisions led by 100 tanks attacked another Soviet unit during a one-day battle.

Other Soviet dispatches, however, asserted that despite the renewed fury of the German onslaught, Hitler's vast encirclement plans before Moscow had collapsed and that at least some of the trapped Red armies had battled their way out of the Nazi netherclaw.

The atmosphere in Moscow itself, contrasting with yesterday's official acknowledgment of a grave emergency, was distinctly more confident. The Soviet command was reported to have opened the flood gates of Russia's might manpower reserves, throwing masses of fresh troops into the bitter conflict.

The Germans declared that the gigantic armies of Russia could be virtually discarded as a menace to the Reich "even for a fortnight" in decades to come.

German newspapers hailed the latest victory claims of Adolf Hitler as the German armies pressed on with what highest German sources called the "last decisive battle of the year which shall crush the opponent before the winter sets in." The Germans admitted that they still faced a bloody fight, but authoritative sources insisted "the military decision has fallen."

Recess Is Ordered In Tobacco Trial

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Trial of the nation's three largest tobacco companies and 20 of their executives was recessed today until next Thursday as both sides completed their introduction of evidence in the 18-week-old case.

The length of the recess, declared by Federal Judge H. Church Ford, made it appear almost certain, attorneys said, that the case would not reach the jury until the week after next.

Judge Ford said he would set no time limits on the attorneys' arguments to the jury.

Today's session was devoted to jury of rebuttal documents introduced by the prosecution after the R. J. Reynolds, Liggett and Myers and American Tobacco companies had closed their defense late yesterday.

world to come after Hitler's
defeat. The new French Na-
tional Committee has been
established and recognized
by the above governments as
agent to carry out the true
French resolve for freedom.
General de Gaulle's Commit-
tee has attained interna-
tional status among the Al-
lies—all except the United
States.

The committee represents
no exiled government. It is
the French Government. It
neither accepted the armis-
tice nor the Vichy policy of
collaboration with Germany.
The time is ripe for the Uni-
ted States to open its eyes to
the frailties of Marshal Pe-
tain and his sorry bunch and
offer, like other Allied na-
tions have done, recognition
to the Free French.

The World War I French
Premier, Georges Clemen-
teau, was forced to make a
decision during France's
most trying hour, when ac-
tion was going badly at the
front. He said: "At Doullens
I found myself between two
men. One was saying that
we were lost; the other, pac-
ing up and down like a mad-
man, wanted to fight. I said
to myself: 'Let us try Foch.'
At the very least we will die
with gun in hand.' I dismis-
sed Petain, the sensible, rea-
sonable man, and chose the
madman, Foch. It was the
madman who pulled us
through." Admirers of his
cause have called General de
Gaulle the Foch of France's
present-day plight. Even
when all seemed lost, Gen-
eral de Gaulle strove to keep
the French spirit alive and
fighting. And one day he
will, with other Allied forc-
es, risk an invasion of Europe
in collaboration to regain all that seemed

Washington.—When Washington-
ians of this war era start running
over the list of Republicans whom

ovan.

They shouldn't, because of the sil-
ence which has shrouded the Of-
fice of Coordinator of Information
are beginning to come hints of just
how vital a role this new agency
may play in defense. Already it is
being referred to as the potential
"ministry of information and prop-
aganda," should the country get in-
to a shooting war.

Not only does it have the respon-
sibility of digesting all the infor-
mation that comes out of Europe
and Asia, but also it must plan
counter offensives against anti-Am-
erican propaganda outside the
United States. Clive that thought
and you'll see why OCI is one of
the more important agencies.

Ever since he started flying
around Europe and the Mediter-
ranean as the "eyes and ears" of Sec-
retary of Navy Knox, Colonel Don-
ovan has been referred to as a "mys-
tery man" in our defense drive.
Probably that's because he doesn't
talk much and, when he does, he
doesn't talk about himself.

As a matter of fact there is no
mystery about Donovan, unless it is
how he got that monicker "Wild
Bill." He doesn't even know him-
self. It popped out about the time
he was playing football at Colum-
bia University and may have been
merely a sports writer's transfer of
a nickname commonly applied to a
big league pitcher of that day nam-
ed Donovan whose control wasn't
all that it should have been.

Bill Donovan is a big, square-
headed Irish Catholic, whose life is
one of those success stories that
has been warming the heart of Am-
ericans ever since there were any.

The son of a small-time Buffalo,
N. Y., politician who had come to
this country from County Cork, Bill
spent his early years on the wrong
side of the tracks. He worked his
way through Columbia Law School,
went back to Buffalo and set up a
practice which soon was proving
that Bill Donovan wasn't just an-
other guy with a shingle. He then
wooded and won Miss Ruth Rumsey,
who not only came from the right
side of the tracks, but so far over
that she was a member of one of
Buffalo's very first families.

Having been interested in the
National Guard and risen to the
rank of captain, he was ordered out
for the Mexican border trouble. The
order found him in Poland, where
he had been sent by the American
Relief Commission. He did join his
company later and demonstrated at
once that he was a born military
leader.

He came out of the World War a
lieutenant colonel of the famous
"Fighting 69th," with three wounds,
and six decorations for bravery, to
which later was added the highest
of all our honors, the Congressional
Medal of Honor. The stories of his
courage and calmness under fire
are legion. One of the members of
his regiment once told me: "In-
stead of being one of those officers
who said 'Now go out there, boys,
and give 'em hell,' he was the kind
who was always glancing back and
saying 'Come on, men, a little bit
further and we got 'em on the
run!'"

Four years after the war, Don-
ovan was appointed United States
Attorney in New York, and two
years later he was appointed As-
sistant Attorney General by Presi-
dent Coolidge. He was one of Herbert
Hoover's chief backers and closest
friends. Washington was shocked

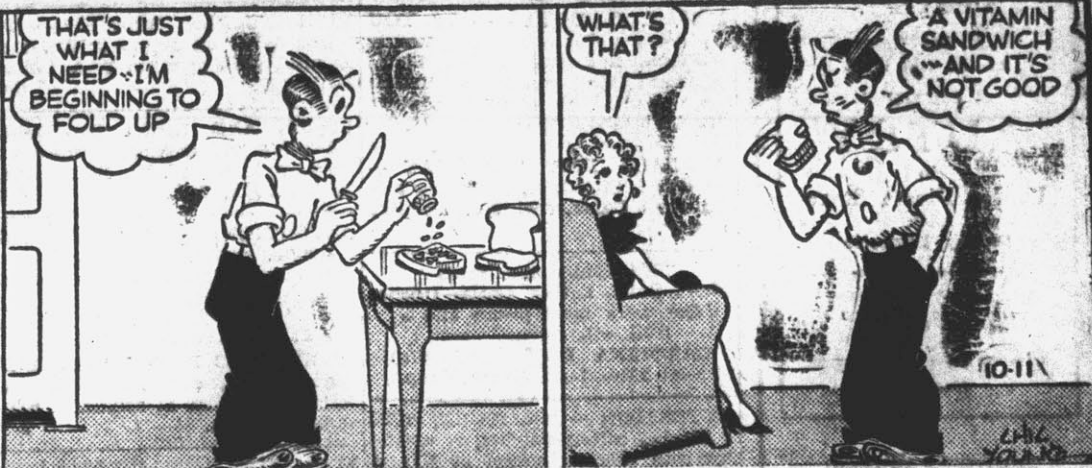

British Striking At Supply Routes

London, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The British fleet air arm, operating off Norway, has smashed heavily at Germany's supply route to her forces on the North Russian front, the Admiralty announced today, saying that four supply ships were hit and one of them abandoned by its crew. The Admiralty called this sweep, launched at dawn Wednesday, "further successful action" by the British, against the enemy's supplies and sea communications with its troops on the North Russian front.

(The fleet air arm off Norway indicated the presence there of one or more aircraft carriers.) The fleet air arm carried the attack to German objectives on land also, destroying electric power pylons on Grend Island, the Admiralty said.

States Objective For Rejected Men

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—A program with an immediate objective of rehabilitation of some 200,000 men rejected in the draft because of physical or mental deficiencies was announced today by President Roosevelt.

He told a press conference a question of building a stronger race of Americans in the days to come was involved.

The chief executive cited figures showing that 1,000,000 men had been rejected when examined for induction in the army under the Selective Service act. Of these, he said 100,000 were turned down because they lacked the requirement of the equivalent of a fourth grade education. The remaining 900,000 were rejected for various physical or

N. C. SHERIFF TO BE PROBED

Governor To Seek Investigation of Man from Brunswick

Reflector Bureau.
By HENRY AVERILL
Raleigh, Oct. 10.—Governor J. Melville Broughton will seek a full investigation of charges that Sheriff D. L. Ganey of Brunswick county has acted in an arbitrary and illegal manner in preferring charges against motorists and having the charges tried before his brother, a justice of the peace.

The governor told your reporter he has no authority to take direct or summary action himself, but added that he will refer to the district solicitor (David Sinclair of Wilmington) a letter he has received from a Wilmington lady, in which serious charges are made against Sheriff Ganey.

The governor made it plain that he does not contemplate any executive action and that he has no evidence of the truth or falsity of the charges other than the Wilmington letter. The incident related, however, is of sufficient seriousness, if substantiated, to warrant presentation of the matter to a grand jury, he said.

According to the letter, signed by Mrs. Charlotte Bailey of Wilmington, Sheriff Ganey stopped an automobile in which her son (an army lieutenant) and three others were riding in Brunswick county, bashed the lieutenant over the head with a blackjack when request was made for a reason for arrest. Then, the letter charges, the lieutenant was hauled before the sheriff's brother, a justice of the peace, and assessed the costs on a charge of "obstructing traffic."

Inasmuch as it was necessary for the army man to go on maneuvers and it was impossible for an appeal to be heard in less than three weeks, costs were paid on advice of a Wilmington attorney.

Mrs. Bailey charged that the sheriff's actions have been so flagrantly violative of motorists' rights that many Wilmington people are now afraid to travel on Brunswick roads at all.

Ready To Receive FSA Applications

Qualified farmers in Pitt county who at present do not own farms and who desire to apply for a loan to purchase a family size farm under provisions of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's tenant purchase program should file their applications now with the Farm Security Administration, Vernon E. White, FSA supervisor, said today.

Seeking to give as many eligible farm families as possible an opportunity to own a farm of their own, the Department of Agriculture is accepting applications for loans which may be made any time between now and June 30, 1942.

Applications should be filed at once for loans to be made during the fiscal year, so that the approved families will have sufficient time to select farms and make plans for the 1942 crop, the supervisor said.

OFFICIAL BUSY ON PROBLEMS

Attorney General Ponders Many Legal Questions

Reflector Bureau.

Raleigh, Oct. 10.—Attorney General Harry McMullan and his assistants have no easy task in unscrambling the weighty questions of law presented to them from all kinds of people in all sorts of places; and in addition they frequently have to go actively into court and uphold some state agency's legal rights.

It's all in a day's work for them, but Thursday there were good examples of both types of duty.

Mr. McMullan and Assistant Attorney General Wade Bruton were concerning themselves with the question of whether carrying a pistol in the closed glove pocket of an automobile would make the owner of the car and pistol guilty of carrying a concealed weapon; while Assistant George Patton was appearing before Judge W. C. Harris to argue a demurrer in behalf of the State Board of Health in a case in which it was sought to make the state agency financially responsible for payment of an award by the Industrial Commission in favor of an employee of the Vance county board of health.

In the concealed weapon matter the searchers' closest case in point seemed to be an 1880 vintage decision holding that a pistol carried in a lunch basket in a buggy was "concealed about the person"; but

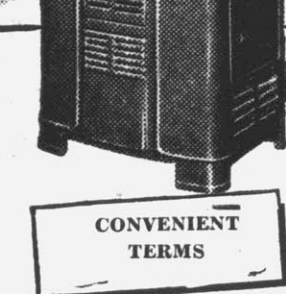
