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RUSSIANS MAY BE ABLE TO HALT GERMAN DRIVE

Nazis Claim Capture of Thousands Hull Says U.S. Must Face Steadily Mounting Danger

Hitler's Headquarters Report More Than 350,000 Reds Taken In Bryansk-Vyazma Front In Drive On Moscow; Nazi Air Force Offering Material Aid; Battle Is Largest In History

Berlin, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler's headquarters announced today that the number of Russian prisoners taken on the Bryansk-Vyazma front before Moscow had risen to more than 350,000, while German dispatches reported that a new Nazi spearhead had smashed through Russian lines 140 miles northwest of the Soviet capital.

The number of Soviet prisoners "grows steadily," said a special headquarters announcement.

The advancing Germans, said to be less than 100 miles from Moscow on the west and southwest, were aided by the German air force which incessantly pounded the retreating Red army forces, dispatches from the front said.

German reports said Russia no longer has fresh troops to rush into the gaps in contrast to the earlier stages of the war when German thrusts were retarded by wave after wave of Russian reinforcements.

Military commentators said that the double battle of Bryansk and Vyazma was probably the greatest encirclement action in military history and that it probably would be a long time before it was exceeded or duplicated because "no where else is there at present or likely to be in the near future such a vast massing of soldiers."

Authorized military sources, commenting on the offensive north of the sea of Azov spoke of a "military landslide" which would "lead to other great developments both militarily and politically."

The German air force, it was insisted, is seeing to it that the "Russians cannot retreat into vast spaces where foreign countries speak so much."

According to Patrolman C. R. Williams, J. Linwood (Bill) Evans of Greenville and Victor Jones of Chocowinity were drivers of the first two cars involved in the wreck.

Evans' car was turned over, partly on the roadway, Jones' automobile having crossed a ditch into a corn field. While the road was partly blocked by Evans' car, James P. Wood, soldier stationed at Fort Story, Va., slowed up to pass through the congested area. A car driven by Thomas Earl Venters, Ayclen, Route 2, struck the rear of Wood's car, the wreck being more serious than the original collision. A girl, whose name was not learned but said to be from Washington, suffered lacerations of the scalp. She was riding with Wood. Grady Dixon Sutton of Greenville, Route 1, riding with Venters, and Venters himself also received cuts about the head and face.

The fifth car involved was one owned by Gentry Boyd of near Grimesland, who had parked his car to see the wreck. His car was struck in the second collision.

Another driver, Brooks Hale of Grimesland, Route One, became involved, when, according to Corporal Williams, he came speeding up the scene in a pick-up, and waving disregard of flares and waving of flashlights, and barely missed striking pedestrians and vehicles. He was arrested on a charge of careless and reckless driving.

ARMY RETURNS TO MANEUVERS

Soldiers Back on Duty After Weekend Of Leave

Camden, S. C., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Soldiers of the First army returned today to their intensive training maneuvers after a week-end of leave during which many of the 350,000 men in Lieut. General Hugh A. Drum's command were entertained by the cities and towns and individual citizens of the Carolinas. The heat wave, with temperatures running into the 90's, which made the first week of field exercises unpleasant to the troops clad in winter clothing, appeared broken with cooler days and crisper nights in prospect.

As in the first week, which inaugurated a two-months maneuver program in a 10,000 square mile rectangle embracing 16 counties in North and South Carolina, the three corps making up the army will confine their operations to their respective areas.

Major General Charles F. Thompson's first corps, composed of the eighth, ninth and 30th divisions will function for the first time as a unit. Ranged along a line west of the Catawba river, it will face an imaginary enemy of the same strength which will line up near the Broad river to the west.

Pitt Colored School Accorded A-1 Rating

According to a recent release by the State Department of Education, the Farmville Negro school has been given the A-1 rating. This is next to the highest rating that the state gives to any of its secondary schools. The AA-1 rating is the highest. There are only 12 of the Negro schools in this group and they comprise the largest city units. The next highest is A-1 of which there are 19. The Farmville school is rated in this group.

The school has often been commended by leading educators and citizens; of both races, for the efficiency of its organization and administration.

The administration declares without hesitation that the school is indebted to the friendly interest and support of its white citizenship for this achievement. Without which, it could not have made this progress. There is, very probably not a Negro school in the state that enjoys a greater measure of confidence and moral support than this school.

Victims Range In Age From Seven To 79 Years

Charlotte, Oct. 13.—(AP)—At least 15 persons died over the week-end of injuries they received in automobile accidents on North Carolina highways.

Gaither A. Eller, 79, of Charlotte was fatally hurt in an automobile accident near Mount Airy.

Randus Scott Chandler, seven, died of injuries she received when he was struck by a car in Smyre village near Gastonia.

Paul Shuffler, 17, of Raleigh was killed in an automobile-bus collision near Raleigh.

Two automobiles collided on a sharp curve six miles east of Rocky Mount and James A. Johnson, 17, of Tarboro and Jerry Thomas, 30, of Rocky Mount were killed.

Cecil Dalton, 16, of Spartanburg, S. C., was fatally injured in an accident between Lincolnton and Gaston.

J. H. Kenyon, 60, of Raleigh was killed today when his car and a truck collided head-on near Fayetteville.

Two Fort Bragg soldiers were killed near Bynum yesterday when their motorcycle hit the rear of an automobile and crashed into an army truck. They were listed as James M. Haley, 20, and Robert E. Ost, 21.

Virgil Priest, 27-year-old tobacco man of Scottsboro, Va., was killed in an automobile collision Sunday on Highway 17 about one mile from Williamson.

Corinthia Bowen of near Plymouth, was killed while on a bicycle riding party in celebration of her 13th birthday. A car smashed into her bicycle.

Thomas Cecil Brower, 20, of Siler City, was killed near Ramseur when his car got out of control and left the highway.

PLEA IS MADE TO ARM SHIPS

Secretary Of State First Witness To Be Heard On Revising Neutrality Act; Declares America Can Not Turn Away From Danger

Washington, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Secretary Hull, urging prompt revision of the neutrality act to permit the arming of merchantmen, solemnly told Congress today the United States "can not turn and walk away from the steadily mounting danger" of the Nazi military campaign of "world conquest."

Testifying as the first witness before the House Foreign Affairs Committee on proposed repeal of the prohibition against arming American merchantships, Hull declared the German government "is today and has been throughout the course of this war sinking defenseless vessels of this and other countries" "either without warning or without making provision for the safety of their crews."

He declared the Nazi military machine was engaged in a campaign of conquest "unprecedented in the annals of history."

In addition to removing the limitation on the arming of merchantships, Hull told the committee he personally favored "repeal or modification" of section two of the act which prohibits American merchantmen from entering combat zones.

House Democratic Leader McCormack of Massachusetts made the flat prediction that before the week-end the House would approve amendment of the neutrality act to permit the arming of merchantships "and do it" "by a substantial majority."

His forecast went unchallenged even by Republican opponents of revision.

Neither Rep. Fish (R-NY) the ranking minority member, nor Rep. Tinkham (R-Mass.) were present when the hearing started and members of their office staff said both were absenting themselves from the proceedings in protest of the majority in restricting the inquiry to two days of almost completely closed sessions.

War Secretary Stimson, who followed Secretary of State Hull to the witness chair recommended immediate repeal of the ban on arming merchant ships.

"I believe that the repeal of this humiliating provision of law would not only conduce to regaining our self respect upon the ocean," Stimson said, "but that it would materially promote the safety of the vessels which we are now sending out and the safe landing of the munitions which Congress has decided to make available to the nations whose defense is vital to our own defense."

Stimson added that the ban on arming merchant ships was not the only "dangerous restriction" in the neutrality act.

"Section two, which in effect closes to us the ports of those belligerent countries, now recognized by Congress to be fighting our common enemy, has also been shown by current history to be entirely futile for accomplishing the purpose for which it was enacted."

Collision Yesterday At Third and Summit

Both drivers of automobiles involved in a collision at the intersection of East Third Street and Summit street about 7 o'clock last night reported to police and reiterated their statements in Municipal court this morning, that they were going East on Third street and both also claimed they were on the way to the local hospital to visit patients.

Police officials said one of the drivers evidently was "mixed up" but they were unable to determine which. Both were acquitted in court this morning.

U.S. RAILWAYS TENDER BONUS

Carriers Submit Wage Increase Counter Proposal

Chicago, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Railroad management submitted a wage increase counter offer today to President Roosevelt's fact-finding board investigating a dispute between the nation's major carriers and 1,260,000 organized employees.

Described as a plan of emergency compensation resembling the Canadian war emergency bonus plan, the proposal was based on a formula relating changes in the index of living costs to the trend in railroad gross revenues.

The initial effect would be an estimated six per cent increase on earnings up to \$35 a week or \$65 on semi-monthly payrolls effective November 1 and amounting to approximately \$95,400,000 a year.

The raise would apply to all employees, a spokesman explained, but only on their first \$30 a week or \$65 a half month. An employee earning more than \$30 a week would not have the increase percentage applied to the excess over \$30.

COURT AGREES TO FIX STATUS OF RED PARTY

To Decide Whether Overthrow of U.S. One Of Aims

APPEAL GRANTED TO PARTY CHIEF

State Secretary's Citizenship Papers Had Been Cancelled Because of Communist Membership

Washington, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The Supreme Court agreed today to review litigation which would open the way for a straight out ruling on whether the Communist party advocates violent overthrow of the United States government.

The tribunal granted an appeal by William Schneiderman, state secretary of the Communist party for California and a native of Russia.

He sought a review of a decision by the Federal District Court at San Francisco, canceling his American citizenship on the ground that membership in the Communist party had been concealed.

Whether Communist membership prevented allegiance to the United States government was the principal issue.

This was one of more than 350 cases acted upon today at the first session of the new term devoted to transacting business.

Among other actions, the court granted a Justice Department petition for a review of a decision holding that the federal anti-racketeering act does not apply to members of a labor union alleged to have required owners of trucks entering New York City from outside the state to hire a union member to drive and unload the truck.

This was the first case involving construction of the anti-racketeering act to reach the tribunal.

Acting upon other outstanding controversies the court:

Declined to review a decision holding that a state (Tennessee specifically) had the right to require payment of a poll tax as a prerequisite to voting for a member of Congress.

Declined to review a decision ordering William Dudley Pelly, leader of the Silver Shirts or America returned to Asheville, N. C., for possible revocation of pro-ration granted after his 1935 conviction of violating North Carolina blue sky laws.

Indies Commander Victim Of Crash

Batavia, Netherlands East Indies, Oct. 13.—(AP)—General C. J. Berenschot, 54, commander-in-chief of The Netherlands East Indies army was killed in a plane crash today shortly after a conference with Britain's commander-in-chief for the Far East on joint defense measures.

Four other occupants of the plane and five native children were killed as the plane landed on a native hut and burned.

Berenschot's plane had just taken off from an airport on the outskirts of Batavia in an army Lockheed plane after talking with Air Chief Marshal Sir Robert Brooke-Popham, commanding British forces in the Orient, who stopped in Batavia for a conference while en route from Singapore to Australia.

Hard Pressed Russians Conduct Counter Drives

Reading from a prepared statement, Tom Linder, Georgia's commissioner of agriculture, attacked the federal administration's price control bill at a hearing of the House Banking and Currency committee in Washington. He also challenged the qualifications of Leon Henderson to head the proposed new price control agency.

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The Pitt county man was locked up about 7 o'clock after having been arrested by Corporal C. R. Williams of the State Highway Patrol and H. E. Wooten of the city police force.

Shortly after being locked up, County Jailor W. G. Leggett heard a commotion in the cell block where Stocks and several other prisoners were being held and found that Stocks had thrown pop bottles at other prisoners. The other prisoners were moved to another block and Stocks left alone on one side of the jail.

The jailer did not see Stocks any more until shortly after 11 o'clock, when he went up stairs of the jail to "look around and lock the cell block gates" before retiring.

When he went to the block in which Stocks was being held he noticed a blanket hanging from the bars and in a corner, shielded from light by the blanket, saw Stocks in a sitting position with a towel around his neck.

The jailer went into the cell and found that the prisoner was dead. Stocks had torn off part of a towel, tied the ends together, making a loop 12 inches in diameter. He had tied one end of the remainder of the towel to the loop, and the other end to the bars, then had slipped the loop over his neck, with the knot against his neck. Placing himself in a sitting position, the man strangled himself to death.

Funeral services were conducted at Reedy Branch Free Will Baptist church this afternoon at 4 o'clock and burial followed in the church cemetery.

Despite Claim of Germany That Nazi Armies Have Pressed To Within 100 Miles Of Moscow, Soviets Declare One Thrust Slowed; London Also Asserts Momentum Lost by Invaders

In the face of Germany's claims that her Russian sweep had carried within 100 miles of Moscow on the West and South, Russian dispatches declared today that one German thrust had been slowed down and that the Red army had launched counter-attacks at several points.

Authoritative sources in London asserted that the German offensive now in its 12th day, had lost momentum as compared with the speed of the first two or three days and added that it was quite possible that the German drive might be stopped 70 or 80 miles short of the Russian capital.

The limit of human endurance and the wear and tear on the thousands of tanks and armored cars may intervene to stabilize the Russian-German front with Moscow untouched as the first snows of winter blanket the plains, perhaps smothering Adolf Hitler's hope of a pre-winter victory.

The Russian dispatches said that the German drive had been slowed particularly in the direction of Vyazma, which the Germans have reported passed and already in the process of being mopped up. Vyazma is 125 miles west of the Russian capital.

One of the Russian counter attacks was said to have recaptured a town near Bryansk, 210 miles southwest of Moscow, in the region of the German drive on Moscow from the South.

Another counter attack was launched north of Orel and east of Bryansk. Orel was lost to the Germans a week ago.

Despite the Russian resistance, a dispatch to the Moscow newspaper Pravda acknowledged that the Germans still were moving on Moscow, and the only question was whether the drive could be robbed of its momentum short of the goal.

Reinforcements were streaming steadily to the Russian front, it was said. German reinforcements maintaining a numerical superiority for the invaders, however, also were reported.

Adolf Hitler's headquarters claimed capture of more than 350,000 Russian prisoners in the double battle of Bryansk and Vyazma.

It was estimated that at the end of today's tobacco sales, the money paid out to date will have reached the \$12,500,000 mark and the offerings approximately 40,250,000.

While the offerings will be some 36,750,000 pounds below the total amount of 79,039,000 pounds sold two years ago during the entire season, the money paid out will be within \$400,000 of the total paid out for the entire 1939 season.

These figures reflect the high prices being paid this year. As the new week opened today there were about 1,250,000 pounds on the floor, with the offerings gradually getting lower in quality as an increasing amount of scrap grades are being marketed.

Prices, however, remained strong and in line with those of last week. So far this season 39,168,100 pounds have been sold for \$12,000,236.59, or an average of 30.84 cents per pound, compared with a 17.80 average for the corresponding date a year ago.

A War Group

The Sheppard Memorial Library has just received a group of new war books which will be ready for circulation today. The leading book "Looking For Trouble," is by a woman newspaper correspondent, Virginia Cowles of Boston. So splendid is it that critics and reviewers have placed it among the very best of the books on the current situation. It was apparently not hurriedly gotten up like most of the other war books, for it is well written, well organized and easily read.

The book is a personal view of the whole war panorama. The author interviewed many of the important personages of Europe and visited all the battlefronts from the beginning in Spain up to the Russian onslaught, being the only woman who accomplished this feat. She went everywhere regardless of danger, and time and time again when she made her appearance some man asked, "How did you get here?"

Being a close observer, a shrewd judge of people and a sensible person, she brings to her readers much information and lots of new material. It will be an excellent book to read following the ace of war books, "Shirer's Berlin Diary."

"You Can't Do Business with Hitler" by Douglas Miller—A rather pessimistic book about what will happen to America if Hitler wins, telling the amazing story of Nazi pressure methods. The author was for many years a commercial attaché in Berlin, where he tried to do business with the supposedly friendly Nazi government. He definitely points out that there is no hope of any profit in dealing with Germany. This book will particularly appeal to business men.

"I Have Loved England," by Alice Duer Miller—For the second time a lover of England has sought to preserve and acclaim the charm and beauty of the English countryside. Her first by a beautiful poem, "White Cliffs," her second with excellent photographs and poetic

prose. A book designed to recall an England well beloved.

"Young Winston Churchill," by Richard Harding Davis—The old saying that "the boy is father to the man" is nowhere better proved than in this story of the youthful days of the man who now guides the British Empire. Almost half a century ago the same qualities of bravery and endurance that today make Winston Churchill one of the great figures in history were evident in the boyish soldier whose personality so charmed that other brave man and writer—Richard Harding Davis. Here one sees from what kind of boyhood and youth there emerged the man who now stands as champion of the forces of Freedom against tyranny.

Washington, Oct. 13. — (AP) — President Roosevelt urged congressional leaders today to speed enactment of the \$5,985,000,000 lend-lease appropriation and received assurance that the bill would reach the Senate floor early next week.

Senate Majority Leader Barkley of Kentucky reported that the Appropriations Committee would begin hearings tomorrow and finish them within a few days.

He told reporters that Mr. Roosevelt had urged that the measure be expedited. All parties, Barkley said, "were anxious to get action as soon as possible so they can make contracts and assure a continuity of supplies."

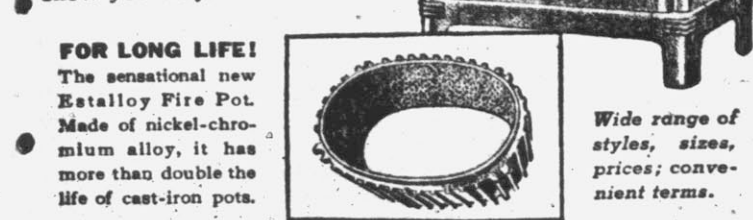

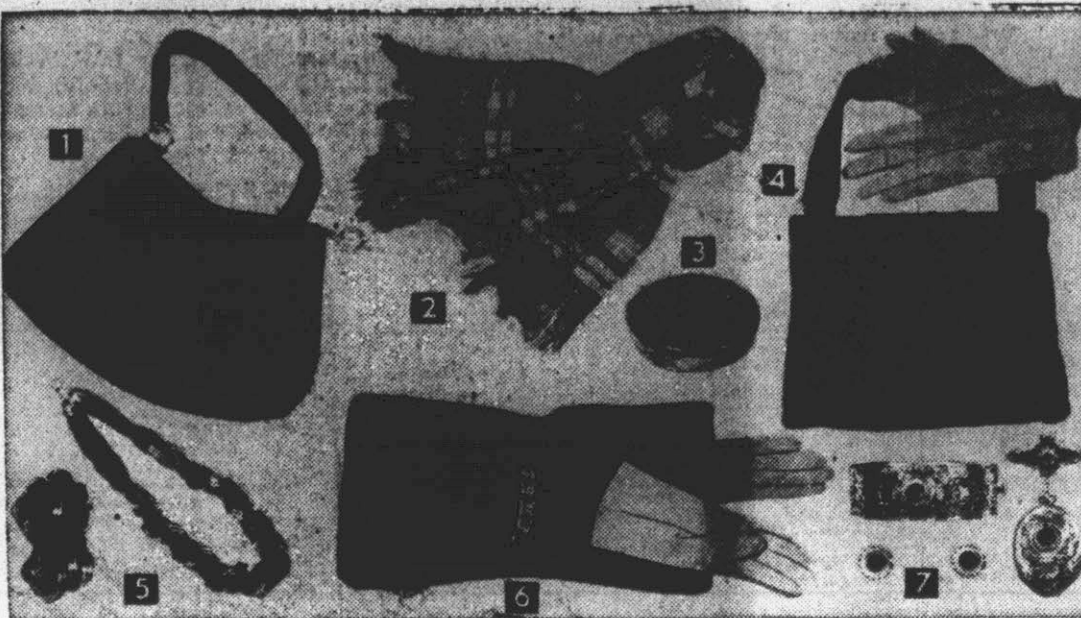

American's don't mind making sacrifices that they feel are necessary, but when their tax burdens are heaviest they don't relish seeing money wasted.

Washington Daybook

(Second of two articles about the automobile situation.)

Washington — The big decrease in automobile production is going to send people to the used car lots who never have been there before. The demand that is expected to develop for used cars may sharpen the practices of those dishonest dealers who fringe the second-hand business.

There are, in Washington, two national agencies which have made a study of the used car trade and the dishonesties which some resort to in putting over a deal. There is almost no limit to trickery and rules that could guarantee every buyer against being gipped.

There are, however, a few rules which if followed cut your chances of getting stung. Here they are as they were given to me by these same agencies:

No car should be bought without a road test, and "road test" does not mean a drive around the block. The car should be driven far enough (50 to 100 miles) to get really hot, and to test the consumption of oil and gas. Start with both gas and oil at "full." Drive through traffic and open country, over hills and rough roads. If the car is a gas eater or a oil hog, trouble already has started.

If a cold engine starts with a slapping noise and quiet down, the pistons are loose. If it idles excessively fast, it is possible that the motor has been "revved up" to cover mechanical irregularities.

Doctored Motors.
A clutch that grabs on the get-away or slips in a speedup is in bad shape. Brakes should be tested on a brake machine, but if none is available, make "slam" stops at from 25 or 30 miles an hour, and examination of skid marks will tell most of the story.

When the car is hot, put it up to the limit allowed by law and then take your foot off the accelerator and let the car "push" the engine until you have dropped to about

20 miles an hour. Then step hard on the accelerator. If blue smoke comes out of the exhaust, it indicates worn pistons, rings and cylinder walls. If the smoke changes from blue to black as you gain speed, the carburetor mixture is too rich, a stunt sometimes resorted to by sharp dealers to soften the explosions and hide engine noises. A clattering noise during this speed-up indicates loose connecting rods, and a heavy thumping may mean a loose main bearing or fly wheel.

Tires Tell A Story.
Don't go by speedometers as an assurance of mileage. Examine the wear on the break, clutch and accelerator pedals and on the tires. A car with several makes of tires in various stages of wear probably has been over 20,000 miles or more. An appraisal of the tires by a good tire man might tell a lot.

Check the battery by using the starter and horn while the lights are on. If they go very dim the battery probably is in bad order. Many of these things could be corrected by a competent mechanic. That's up to your horse-trading ability.

Watch your step on guarantees. A "money back guarantee" has been known to mean simply a credit on a more expensive car and maybe a bigger gyp. "New car guarantees" literally cover only defects in workmanship and materials and have nothing to do with worn parts or defects developed by abuse.

Go over your time payment or even cash contracts and make sure the title is good.

If you have done all that, say my informants, and are as sharp as a tack to boot, you probably will get what you paid for, whether it's a \$50 puddle-jumper or a latest model that had rolled only a thousand miles before its owner up and died.

Reflector Bureau.

Raleigh, Oct. 12.—This still does not seem to be immediate prospect of final determination of selection of the agency which shall be given full responsibility for a school bus safety program.

Repeatedly it has been said in advance of a School Commission meeting that a decision would be reached, but each session has passed with no announcement.

It's repetition to say that the reason is two-fold—(1) Disinclination of either Commission or Highway Safety Division to take on a program in which one hundred per cent, plus, is demanded in results, and (2) Lack of funds in either unit for a full-fashioned, inclusive safety program.

Meanwhile, school bus problems continue to pile up from several other directions. There is, for instance, the great difficulty in obtaining new buses on account of the defense priorities situation. Some of the several hundred buses wanted by North Carolina are being delivered; but nowhere near the quantity desired.

That's a second headache, upon which there has recently been piled a third—the matter of pay for school bus drivers.

From several counties have come threats of "strikes" by youths who want \$15, or thereabout, per month instead of the present \$9.50, and in Durham county an actual walk-out, or sit down, or whatever it is when bus drivers won't drive, has been reported.

This last problem, however, seems rather incidental as there is little probability that the Commission can, or will, do anything in matter of increasing the wages and there is every likelihood that the places can, and will, be filled at the existing scale.

TESTIMONY of a star witness at the Nazi spy trial in Brooklyn revealed a complicated secret code plan which the witness, William G. Sebald, said Nazis used in communications with spies in the United States. Sebald, who testified he had become a counter-espionage agent for the United States after having been hired by the Nazis, explained that the code works like this:

1. The spy receives a harmless looking slip of paper full of numbers. Nothing in this guy could be arrested for... but then—

2. He receives this cable. Note the date, Sept. 22. Add month number (9), day of month (22), add 20 and you get a total of 51.

Navy's Blimp Patrol Keeps Guard In Coastal Waters

BABY AIRSHIPS HUNT FOR SUBS

Trainees Use Whales And Sharks For Targets

After the Hindenburg went up in flames, Lakehurst nearly went out of the news. Now it is the center of some of the most important defense activity on the Atlantic coast. Here Joe Morton tells you about the blimp patrol, vital link in the U. S. Navy screen against possible enemies, which operates out of the old dirigible base.

Lakehurst, N. J.—Each morning of the year, not long after daybreak, early risers in this New Jersey pine-land region glance automatically at the skies, then at their watches, and muse aloud: "Time for the blimp patrol."

Soon, two, sometimes three or four, compact streamlined craft nose out towards the Atlantic. At nightfall they return, each with a log showing operations over some 2,000 square miles.

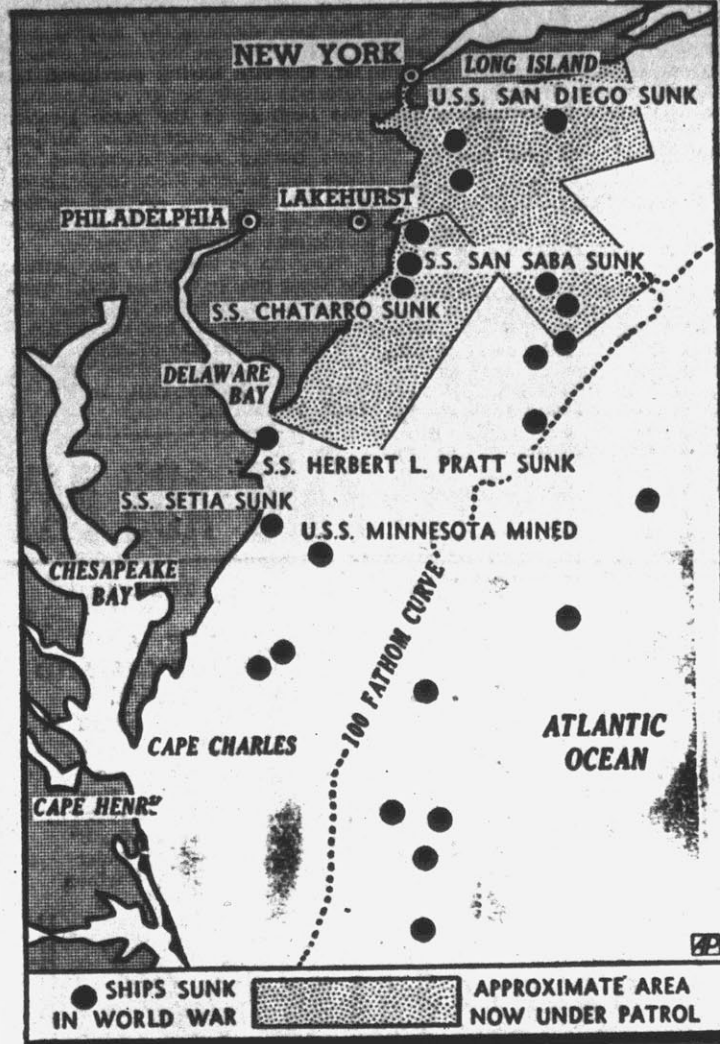
The blimps, tendons in the powerful Navy air arm, have been "looking for submarines."

During the World War—Germany sent half a dozen U-boats to American coastal waters to torpedo merchantmen, lay mines, and otherwise harass shipping. In hope part of the U. S. fleet would be withdrawn from Europe. In six months exactly 100 ships were destroyed, among them the cruiser U. S. S. San Diego.

In the present war the United States, at peace, has her guard up. Blimp crews, trained by intensive daily maneuvers, are ready for action.

The blimp (non-rigid airship), whether hovering motionless or cruising at a speed up to 65 knots an hour, serves the navy best at reconnaissance. Its crew has time to search minutely for the oil smears rising inevitably behind a U-boat several weeks from its base, and to watch for the tell-tale white wake of a submarine. Under certain conditions the submerged craft itself may be spotted—some have been sighted 90 feet down.

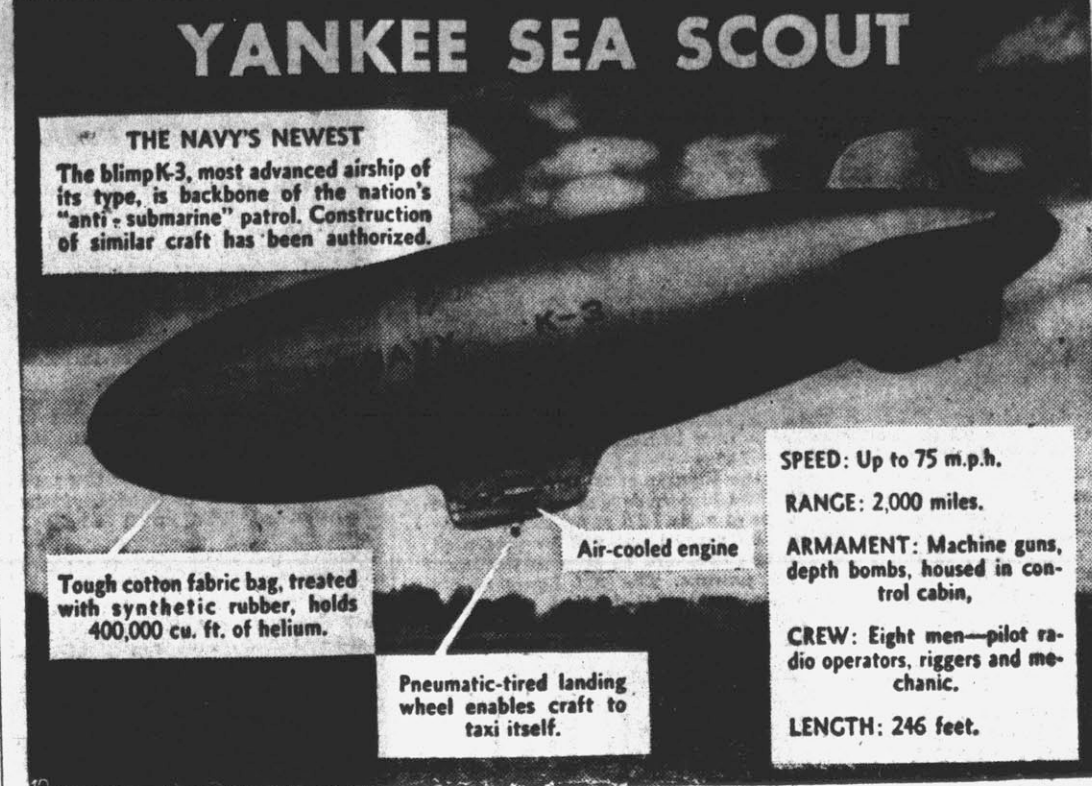
For the present-day patrol, whales and sharks—far smaller than submarine—afford common practice targets. Miniature depth

bombs may be dropped for practice; full-size depth bombs lie ready in the racks.

The gas-filled craft sauntering from Lakehurst's Naval Air Station today scout northward and southward along the coast, each assigned to part of an "inshore" belt. This generally is the stretch of water lying within the 100-fathom curve, the area where coastal shipping is concentrated and where submarines might be expected to lurk. It was with the intention of making this "inshore belt" secure that Congress authorized construction of 48 lighter-than-air craft for patrol purposes. Five of these are being delivered to Lakehurst at the rate of one a month; funds for 21 others have been allocated. Actually on



and has facilities for mapping the position of each of the 30 to 50 ships noted in a day's flight. The crew of eight—two pilots, radio, men, riggers and mechanic—all act as observers.

The newest patrol blimps have ample living quarters for the full crew, are able to make 76 miles an hour, and, with development of the

expeditionary mast, no longer are hangar bound. They hold some 400,000 cubic feet of lifting helium. Such a blimp can come to rest on the surface of the water, pick up supplies, fuel and water ballast, and change crews while riding at anchor. They can refuel from a passing ship which need not slow down, opening the possibility of still closer action with the fleet.

Where The Blimp Got Its Name

As the airship grew out of its infancy, craft fell into one of three general classifications according to structure: those without metal reinforcements were called non-rigid or limp. The first successful British non-rigid was the B-11 type. English sailors promptly coined the name "blimp"—and it stuck.

Her best friends didn't know her in that wig, nor did the producer who had to cast the role. He saw her, sighed with joy, and gave her the part. She played it in the test wig, the same that had been on many an aspirant's head, and she was a great Belle Watling for "Come With the Wind."

"And I didn't work for a year—that's what Belle did for me," she laughs today.

There was a reason: as Belle she was heavily padded, wore built-up shoes, bore no resemblance to the wispy-slim girl she is. She doesn't get around Hollywood much; people thought of her as "Buxom Belle" when they thought of her at all.

Her idleness ended when she took Claire Trevor's place at a Republic premiere in Lawrence, Kas. Executives saw her not as Watling, but as Munsen, and put her to work in "Lady from Yousiana." Taking Claire's place has been, lucky for Ona in other ways too—when Claire was ill, Ona's test to replace her in that Edward G. Robinson radio serial has kept her on the air the past three years.

For Mother Gin-Sling in "The Shanghai Gesture," Ona Munsen again is unrecognizable. She slithers slimly—her weight is down to 88 pounds—in exotic costumes; her facial make-up requires four hours each working day; again she wears a wig, heavily lacquered and usually feather-decked. She's the new, Joseph Von Sternberg version of the original Mother in John Colton's once sensational play.

"I laughed," she says, "when I heard they wanted me. Have I come so soon to playing old women, I wondered? But Mr. Von Sternberg said I was it, and they talked and talked, and finally I said yes, I'd do it."

Mother Gin-Sling is a beauty in the new version, but even the Gin herself isn't certain how she'll turn out. It seems Von Sternberg already has departed from the script, and Mother Gin-Sling is but a puppet pulled by the directorial strings. Ona says she isn't worried.

We needn't be, either, about her future, even if Gin-Sling buries her again.

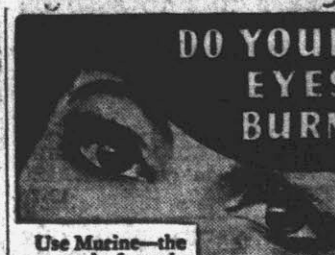

'Meek' Defined By Methodist Pastor

The word "meek" as used in the Beatitudes was revealed to have a much broader meaning by Reverend T. M. Grant in his sermon yesterday morning at Jarvis Memorial Methodist church. Definition of the word "meek" in the light of the original Greek word which the writers of the King James Version of the Bible translated into Shakespearean terms means more "disciplined life" than what meek usually taken to mean today.

Mr. Grant told of practices engaged in in India to discipline the character of men such as assigning dignitaries to menial tasks. This practice, sometimes reveals that some people have been "converted in areas."

"Our Master says the blessed are those who are meek or disciplined in nature, who are controlled and can meet any situation and do their task."

"Nothing in experience is more mystifying than suffering and the very best of people seem to suffer as well. Suffering is bitter and tragic."

"When we cannot understand human suffering we can keep it from overcoming us. We may not understand why such experiences but we can stand up under it and be triumphant if we have the secret of life in our natures and are responsive to the great things in life and to God Himself."

After citing how busy men such as E. Stanley Jones, the internationally famous missionary who recently preached in Kinston, find time to do so many more things than other people—Dr. Jones beside his work has written several books—Mr. Grant said:

"It is strange to see how some lives are so powerful and do so much. The answer is that they have organized disciplined natures. Men who are converted completely—not in 'areas'—can move out and conquer the world."

"Connecting up the significance of the controlled, disciplined nature in the development of personality Mr. Grant summed up in conclusion:

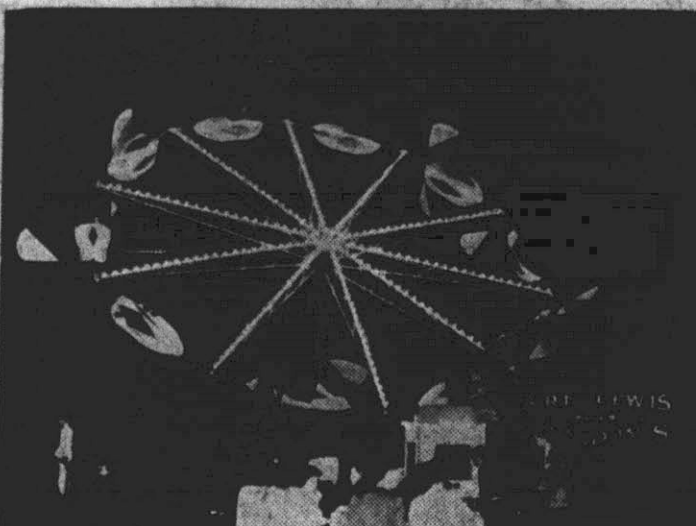
"Human personality is the big thing in life. When a man can realize that personality is the big thing in life, he is getting into the company of the Master."

POWER BATTLE RAGES IN N. C.

Private - Public And Federal-State Involved

Raleigh, Oct. 13.—Back of all the statements pro and con on the alleged power shortage in the southeastern states lies the perennial contest between advocates of private and public operation of power plants and the equally perennial effort of the federal bureau to take over control of everything in sight.

Thus, there is a strong current of opinion, held for instance, by North Carolina's Utility Commission Chairman Stanley Winborne, that all the conferences which have been called and will be called by the Federal Power Commission had, and will have, two undercover objectives.

(1) a weakening of belief that private companies can adequately meet an emergency situation and (2) establishment of a federal overlordship over production and distribution of power through the section.

Neither Mr. Winborne nor anyone else acquainted with the situation denies the fact that there is something of a power crisis in the southeast, but they do hold that the reasons for the crisis are almost exactly the opposite of what the federal officials would like to make it appear.

Thus, claim the advocates of private ownership, the only critical shortage in power comes from Tennessee, where the federal government

how to answer any given question should consult this board and follow its instruction. That's what the advisory board is for."

ment has taken over power production and distribution through the TVA. There, it is pointed out, no auxiliary steam plants have been provided, with entire dependence placed on the huge hydro-electric units. On the contrary, private companies of North Carolina and other states have provided for emergencies by building auxiliary steam plants. Here then is a clear-cut demonstration that private operation is more efficient than public.

Perhaps the very strongest statement of the position taken by the advocates of private as opposed to public, operation and of state, as opposed to federal, regulation was a recent speech of Walter R. McDonald, chairman of the Georgia Public Service Commission, before the National Association of Railroad and Utilities Commissioners.

Here's how he stated his side (a side, incidentally, on which Mr. Winborne is found):

"With all due respect for the good and sincere men in charge of the operation of TVA, with whom I agree on many questions and for whom I have the highest regard and friendship, the conduct of affairs of that agency in this emergency provides ample proof of the greater facility and ability of the state authority to cope with any emergency or real power supply problem."

"Tennessee was just as dry as Georgia and even more dependent on hydro. TVA had encouraged the location of and assumed the responsibility for supplying the defense furnaces, but not a single step was taken beyond the holding of meetings and the making of plans and proposals looking to the conservation of badly needed energy. Nature provided the relief in advance of the inauguration of a single one of those plans or proposals. (Note: subsequent drought has made the emergency greater than ever). After we were out of the woods, and feeling good over the job we had done, along comes Mr. Olds' commission and proposes a revised multiple 'Little TVA' program with an added division designed to collectivize, or perhaps it would be more polite to say naturalize the industry in the holy name of defense and the national emergency."
