MOSCOW MENACED BY GERMAN DRIVE ON VOLGA

BRITAIN HELD BY DIVERTING NAZI AIRCRAFT

More Than 50 Per Cent of Force Kept From Russia

REMAIN AT HOME FOR PROTECTION

Germany Declared to Be Forced To Use More Than Half Of Fighter Strength On Western Front

London, Oct. 15.—(AP) British sources asserted today that the RAF's offensive against the continent had compelled Germany to maintain more than 50 per cent of her fighting planes on the Western front, thus relieving pressure on Russia.

"The heavy RAF offensive against Germany's western front is bringing aid to Russia on a scale which few imagine," the Air Ministry news service declared.

British airmen struck at southern Germany last night. The Air Ministry reported loss of four aircraft in the attacks and one in daylight operations yesterday.

"Despite Germany's belittlement of the results of the RAF's increased activities," the news service said, "she has found it essential to use more than half her fighter strength—not against Russia at the time of the greatest military effort in history—but in defense against the RAF upon the Western front, the very existence of which her propaganda has always been at pains to deny."

The raid last night marked the fifth consecutive night in which British bombers had struck at German targets.

A communiqué said that the objectives in southern Germany were bombed during the night in bad weather.

To Press Fight On Removal Of Train

Efforts to keep the Atlantic Coast Line from removing passenger trains, including the one operating from Winston to Rocky Mount, via Greenville, and return daily, will be continued, although the carrier has won each skirmish to date.

At a meeting here yesterday a committee formed to oppose the petition decided to take the issue to Superior court and the Utilities Commission already has certified the case to Edgecombe Superior court for trial.

The Utilities Commission upheld the railway's petition and also denied exceptions to the ruling after they had been filed by the committee opposing the removal of the trains.

Although it was not known whether the railroad could take off the trains pending hearings of the case in court, the general belief was that no such action would be attempted as those fighting the proposal could immediately resort to an injunction.

Wreck Case Heard In Court Tuesday

Most of yesterday afternoon's session of Pitt County court was taken up with the trial of a wreck case in which Lyman Tucker and J. H. Warren were the defendants.

Tucker was acquitted, but Warren was convicted of driving drunk and falling to dim his lights. Warren was fined \$50, taxed with costs and had his license revoked for 18 months. The defendant appealed to Superior court.

LeRoy Ellis, white man, was convicted of assault on a Negro and was given a six months sentence, from which he appealed. Bond was set at \$500.

Offer Camp Glenn For Supply Base

Raleigh, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Directors of the state-controlled Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad agreed today to allow the Navy to purchase Camp Glenn, near Morehead City, for a supply base. The price will be \$15,000.

Governor Broughton, who met with the directors, said the sale was authorized because the Navy had asserted that the establishment of a supply base was an immediate necessity under the national defense program.

Camp Glenn formerly was used as a National Guard encampment.

ASK REPEAL OF NEUTRALITY ACT

Action Taken By Legion Post In Meet Last Night

The Pitt County Post of the American Legion, in regular session last night, adopted a resolution demanding that "our representatives in the Congress" use their influence and votes in bringing about the repeal of the neutrality act, "thus unshackling our government and commerce."

The meeting was well attended and much interest was evidenced.

A committee composed of D. J. Whichard, Jr., W. T. Kyzer and J. H. Rose was authorized to continue their efforts to secure a suitable speaker for the Armistice Day program. The committee failed in efforts to secure Secretary of the Navy Knox for the occasion.

The question of establishing a Service Club to provide housing for soldiers and other service men desiring to spend the night here was further considered and it was revealed that the Army had been secured for such a purpose.

The post adopted the resolution calling for repeal of the neutrality act and also calling on all people of the nation to unite in a great national effort to place the country in the forefront in preparedness to protect its citizens and rights, after it had been presented by Arthur B. Corey.

The resolution follows:

RESOLUTION Whereas, it is recognized by the people of the United States, that a great national, and international emergency now exists; in that the Dictators of the totalitarian nations of the world are making war upon civilization and liberty; and

Whereas, these United States were and are not at this time in a proper condition or state of defense, greatly needing arms and munitions of war, with all their attendant snags; and

Whereas, the great labor unions of these United States in their selfish attitudes are wittingly or unwittingly lending much assistance to the enemies of mankind; that is, Hitler and his cohorts; and

Whereas, there are certain individuals in these United States, consisting of private individuals and members of the government by their attitudes, and public utterances, through delusions or intentions are defeating the efforts of the patriotic leaders and citizens of this country in accomplishing the proper defense for the United States, but through their bickering and delays, are placing the United States in a condition that they will be easy prey, both physically and economically, for the totalitarian dictators; and

Whereas, the present neutrality law, is a hindrance to the freedom of movement of American commerce, on the high seas, placing us

Meanwhile, CIO Steel Workers Threaten To Force Shut-Down Of World's Largest Steel Mill, At Gary, Ind.; American Can Company Also Faced By Work Stoppage Because Of A Wage Dispute

(By The Associated Press) The CIO-United Automobile Workers today called off their strike at the Hillsdale, Mich., Steel Products Company, paving the way for resumption of work on transmissions for 70 per cent of army tank production at the Spicer Manufacturing Corporation in Toledo, Ohio.

R. J. Thomas, auto workers' president, announcing at Detroit that the strike would end, said the latest union action was at the request of the Defense Mediation Board.

The case was certified to the board by the Labor Department yesterday. CIO workers at Spicer, where the transmissions are assembled, refused to handle parts made by AFL workers at Hillsdale, a Spicer subsidiary.

In certifying the case, the Labor Department said AFL-United Automobile Workers, who won a collective bargaining election over the CIO at Hillsdale, had threatened to strike there if the company re-hired 11 CIO men who were discharged last August.

The CIO minority called their Hillsdale strike in protest to these discharges.

CIO Steel Workers today began an organizing drive which threatened to shut down the world's largest steel mill, at Gary, Ind., while other units of the same union threatened to call strikes at all 27 plants of the American Can Company unless a labor dispute at two Chicago plants is settled speedily.

The Steel Workers Organizing Committee ordered pickets put at the Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corporation's works at Gary, where 22,000 persons are employed. The pickets were instructed to keep from the mill every worker who could not produce a paid-up CIO union dues card.

A union spokesman said the aim was to make the Gary works "100 per cent CIO" in a step toward the union shop. The plan has been busy with defense orders.

The threat of a strike throughout the American Can system followed a breakdown in negotiations for new CIO contracts at two Chicago plants. The union has asked for elimination of a differential between wages paid in the west coast plants and at Chicago, also for a modified vacation plan and a union shop.

Minimum wages in the Chicago plants were reported by the union to be 60 cents an hour for men and 51 cents for women, with the corresponding scales on the west coast 77 and one-half and 68 and one-half cents.

List Deficiencies During Maneuvers

Camden, S. C., Oct. 15.—(AP)—A list of deficiencies in field discipline and training, including neglect of the ordinary requirements of sanitation and personal hygiene, was cited here today as the tactical section of public relations headquarters explained that the purpose of the current first army maneuvers was far more than the mere development of tactical and strategic knowledge.

After discussing tactical aspects of three separate corps in field exercises now under way, Col. Levin G. Farism read a memorandum from a corps commander whom he did not identify. Some of the shortcomings listed in this report were, in substance, as follows:

Principles of sanitation and personal hygiene were ignored on occasions. Some units did not build latrines; other built them too shallow.

Some cooks and other around field kitchens were found with hands unwashed. On at least one occasion water used for dishwashing later was sent out to men in the field as drinking water.

In addition, there was a long list of instances in which troops had clogged highways, making themselves targets for enemy fire, had not taken advantage of cover, had not obeyed orders strictly, and had otherwise shown need for intensive instructions.

PESSIMISM ON U.S. RELATIONS FELT IN JAPAN

Leaders Hold Conference On Important Matters

U.S. ACCUSED OF DOUBLE DEALING Doubt Expressed That This Country Is Seriously Endeavoring To Maintain Peace In Pacific

Tokyo, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Authoritative expressions of pessimism concerning Japan's relations with the United States were published today as empire leaders continued a series of conferences believed to be concerned with matters of high importance.

The Privy Council, highest advisory body on foreign commitments, met in the presence of Emperor Hirohito. Later Marquis Kodo, Lord Privy Seal, held consultations at the palace with Premier Prince Kono and Lieut. General Suzuki, head of the cabinet planning board. Secrecy was maintained on the subject matter of these discussions.

Both Domei, news agency with close government connections, and the influential newspaper Asahi, put forth gloomy views of the Japanese-American situation.

Domei quoted authoritative quarters as saying that the United States was guilty of "double dealing" and had assumed a hostile attitude toward Japan while conducting negotiations looking toward an accord.

"It is doubtful whether the United States is seriously endeavoring to maintain peace in the Pacific," they said, "Japan is in danger of falling into a trap set by America."

Captain Bissette comes here highly recommended by Lieut. Julian Timberlake, who has a host of friends here and who helped to secure the British captain's services for the program here.

Mrs. Murrow and Captain Bissette are appearing here under the auspices of the Greenville chapter of the Bundles for Britain movement.

Mrs. Little has named several committees who already are at work to make the "Victory Rally" a success.

POTATO PROBE IS UNDER WAY

Grand Jury Charged By Judge Meekins In Wilson

Wilson, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Federal Judge I. M. Meekins charged a 23-man grand jury today with the duty of gathering evidence concerning the potato industry in the United States with a view to determining whether there have been any anti-trust law violations.

At the outset he asked the jurors—headed by Roscoe Griffin of Rocky Mount as foreman, whether any of them had any connection with the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company and A. & T. Commission Corporation or any other chain store organization; F. S. Royster Guano Corporation; American Agriculture Chemical Corporation; Baugh & Sons; G. W. Catte; or S. M. Jones Company.

After explaining the technical aspect of the anti-trust law, the judge declared "the case has to do with the purchasing, distributing, and production of potatoes. Potatoes are a crop of large value to the people of the state. Many people in the state produce them."

Handling the investigation for the government are Harold Seliz, John H. Skiles and Lawrence Sherry, all special assistants to the attorney general, and U. S. District Attorneys Charles Rouse of Winston and Chauncey Leggett of Tarboro.

Watchm'n Exempt From Labor Laws

Raleigh, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The State Supreme Court today upheld a decision that a watchman for an industry in interstate commerce did not come under the provisions of the federal wage and hour act.

The decision was rendered in Pasquotank county, where Martin Hart, a watchman, brought suit against P. P. Gregory, operator of a lumber mill.

The case had been to the Supreme Court once before, on the question of a non-suit, and on an earlier occasion the court had held that Hart's contention was sufficient to go to a jury.

Other opinions included: Lupton vs. Edmundson, Wayne, affirmed; Bunting vs. Henderson, Pitt, affirmed.

Arias Imprisoned In Native Panama

Panama, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Dr. Arnulfo Arias, ousted president of Panama, reached Panama early today and was locked up in the city jail after surrendering to Panama police in the Canal Zone.

Five cars filled with police met the special motor railway car in which Dr. Arias journeyed to the capital from Cristobal, where he had surrendered from aboard the steamer Cefalu.

As the motorcade left the railway station, the ousted president stuck his head out of a window and shouted: "Viva Panama!" (Long live Panama.)

There was just a lone answer: "Viva Arnulfo," but who shouted it was not identified.

Today's Offerings Only 200,000 Lbs.

With the season drawing to a close, offerings again were light on the Greenville tobacco market today, only about 200,000 pounds being on the floors at the start of sales for the second successive day. Yesterday's sales brought to 40-387,906 the total offerings for the year, for which \$12,502,575.55 have been paid to establish an average of 30.98 compared with an average of 17.38 paid for the 39,368,782 pounds offered during the same number of days last season. This season's average is 13.02 cents per pound higher than the 17.86 mark on the corresponding sales day a year ago.

NEW CUT MADE IN CAR OUTPUT

At Least 51 Per Cent Slash Ordered For January

Washington, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Leon Henderson, OPM civilian supply director, today ordered a reduction of "at least" 51 per cent in passenger automobile production in January, 1942, compared with the January, 1941, output.

The slash, together with others previously ordered to conserve defense materials, means an overall reduction of at least 36.3 per cent in passenger car production for the first six months of the model year which began August 1.

Henderson emphasized that the January quota, which permits a maximum output of 204,848 cars compared with 418,350 produced in January, 1941, could not be guaranteed to the industry since sufficient materials might not be available.

Difficulties in obtaining steel, especially stripped steel, indicated that production actually would fall below the maximum set, he said.

Georgia Students Petition Governor

Athens, Ga., Oct. 15.—(AP)—A group of Georgia students today arranged a mass motorcade to lay before Governor Eugene Talmadge in Atlanta a demand that he "restore" the political independence of the University system board of regents.

The demonstration was projected at a meeting of nearly 2,000 students on the campus last night, called to discuss action of the Southern University Conference in ousting the university from its membership because of "political interference" by the governor.

A petition adopted by the student meeting asked the governor to obtain resignations of all members of the regent board he had appointed just prior to a hearing at which Dean Walter D. Cocking of the school of education was removed on charges he advocated racial education.

The petition denied that racial equality was taught on the campus, declaring "we feel that students and faculty harbor no such ideal."

NAVY IS READY TO ARM SHIPS

Congress Is Acting Quickly To Remove Ban On Action

Washington, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Secretary Knox said today that the Navy was ready to put guns and gun crews on merchant ships "as fast as the ships come to us" once Congress authorizes such action.

Knox spoke at the House Rules Committee granted parliamentary right of way to legislation lifting the neutrality act's ban against arming the ships. Earlier the Foreign Affairs Committee approved the proposal.

"We're satisfied now we can get enough guns to arm the ships," Knox told a press conference.

The Navy secretary explained that while there were not enough guns immediately on hand to arm all ships at once, guns would be available as rapidly as ships could be brought into port to receive them.

He asserted also that the arming of merchantmen was a highly effective method of protecting them against both aerial and submarine raiders.

Washington, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The arming of American merchantships for their protection against submarines, aircraft and surface raiders moved a step nearer actuality today with approval by the House Foreign Affairs Committee of the repeal of a neutrality law provision which now prevents such arming.

Committee members said there was no change in the simple resolution originally considered. There was no record vote, members added.

Chairman Bloom (D-NY) planned to ask the House Rules Committee later in the day for permission to bring the legislation to the House floor tomorrow for strictly limited debate and expressed belief the House would approve it by Friday.

Local Lions Hear District Governor

The local Lions on Monday night were honored with a visit from their district governor, Norman Trueblood of Hertford. This marked the first time Trueblood had visited the local club since being elected to his present office.

After being introduced by Lion President Withers Harvey, Trueblood addressed the local club on the subject, "Why Be a Lion?" In his talk he cited the joyful satisfaction which one may derive from being a party to the many constructive enterprises which the Lions clubs undertake. He also pointed to the warm spirit of fellowship in which a member is privileged to share through his association with other Lions.

The speaker paid special tribute to the work of the local club during the past year. He read the report which the local club had sent in to Lions International and described that report as one of the best submitted by club in this district.

At the conclusion of his remarks, the speaker announced his intention of visiting Greenville again on November 3rd when the local Lions will observe Ladies' Night.

Admits Foe Is Pressing On Capital

Declares, However, Nazi Parachutists Seeking Foothold Behind Soviet Lines Wiped Out; Neutral Observer In London Asserts Hitler May Well Lose Despite All-Out Efforts

(By The Associated Press) A fiercely-driven new menace to Moscow was acknowledged today by the Red army, which declared the Germans were swarming forward over their own heaped dead in a mighty attempt to turn the capital's Volga river defense flank near Kalinin, 95 miles north-west of Moscow.

Admitting that the Nazi masses of men and steel still surged forward, Red Star, organ of the Soviet army, said nevertheless that German parachutists seeking a foothold behind the Russian lines had been wiped out and that Moscow's grim defenders had pinched off wedges thrust deep into their lines.

Some of the parachutists were said to have been trapped behind the Kallein line where armored units had smashed to the approaches of the city.

Directly west of Moscow, other German forces were reported in London to have pulled back from Vyazma toward the capital, and to the south the German press said the munitions-making town of Tula, 100 miles from Moscow, had fallen to the tightening Nazi semicircle.

Red Star declared the Red army's position the most critical of the war, and a high ranking neutral observer in London commented:

"Hitler for the first time in two years of war has thrown every available gun and tank into one attack. If he fails to take Moscow or destroy the Russian armies in the present drive—and he well may fail—Germany is finished, until spring and might well have lost the war."

Authoritative informants in London said it was possible that the German drive on Moscow from the northwest already had engulfed Rzhev, 125 miles from the capital, and that the push passed Vyazma apparently had carried as far as Moshaisk, 60 miles west of Moscow.

Two experienced WPA Negro leaders will be in charge of the pre-school and it will be under the supervision of Mrs. David Proctor, county supervisor of WPA recreation projects in Pitt county. There will be story-telling, story plays, singing, games, rhythmic activities, mimetics, drawing, painting and free play for all.

It is requested that parents or older brothers or sisters bring the little children who are to attend the pre-school beginning Monday, as it will be necessary to register them at the center.

Plans are being made to provide nourishment of some sort to the children free of charge, from the lunchroom at the Fifth street colored school.

Farmers Are Advised How To Treat Smut

The County Farm Agent's office today released a bulletin on the treatment of covered smut or bunt in wheat, oats and barley seed. For the first treatment farmers were advised to use one-half ounce

of Ethylene mercury phosphate dust known as new improved ceresan for each bushel of wheat or oats. They were told to use the same type of barrel or cotton seed treatment machine as used for cotton seed treatment. The seed and ceresan in the barrel and turn mixture for one minute. This treatment can be applied as much as four weeks in advance of planting if desired.

The second treatment was outlined as follows: copper carbonate dust (50 per cent copper) may be used at the rate of two to two and one-half ounces per bushel of wheat, using the same method as for treatment number one.

Farmers are cautioned that both ceresan and copper carbonate are poison.

Japanese Claim Ship Record. (AP)—Japanese shipping circles here claim to hold the world's record for transporting the largest number of human beings in a single ship.

They say they carried 8,400 Chinese laborers from Tsingtao, China, in a single trip of the 6,000-ton Paris Maru.

A century or more ago a distin-
guished Italian violinist died, and it
was decided by the government to
enclose in a glass case and place in
a museum his violin which had long
delighted Italian audiences. It was
felt that this would be the most fit-
ting means by which they could
show their respect for a great artist.
For all time people could look upon
the violin, and it would remind
them of the distinguished artist
with which this violinist had in-
spired his contemporaries.

But within a short while the ap-
pearance of the violin began to
change. It grew drab-looking. At
last the varnish raised in blisters
and peeled off. A few decades more
the strings had all snapped, the
case holding the instrument to-
gether had begun to disintegrate,
and little by little the violin fell apart.
How much better it would have
been if they had put the instru-
ment into the hands of someone
who would have carried on the
great artist's tradition. Constant
use would have done more to pre-
serve the instrument than anything
else. Like all unused things, it
gradually disintegrated and fell
apart.

There are violins used today in
concerts which were made centuries
ago by Amati and Stradivari.
They are priceless because they
have been used. Had they been
carefully put away in glass cases,
they would have disintegrated long
ago and fallen to pieces.

There are certain groups

come. It seems that this is
the one point upon which
most of the division rests.

From the School Board's
point of view it has given the
matter careful study and
along with the Board of Al-
dermen has reached the de-
cision that the proposed plan
is more economical and
should be put into effect, but
at the same time the board
expresses a desire to carry
out the wishes of the people
in the matter. In view of this
attitude it has been suggest-
ed that along with voting for
the bond issue the citizens
likewise be given the oppor-
tunity to vote also on a pref-
erence as to the plan to be
followed in expanding our
schools. In this way, it is
pointed out, there would be
no opposition to the bond
issue and the School Board
could get at the true senti-
ment of the people regard-
ing how they want the
money spent. It is true that
the central high school plan
would no doubt cost more
money, but if that is what
the people want and are
willing to pay for, then the
School Board would know
what to do.

There seems to be a feel-
ing among some groups that
the School Board is trying to
ram something down their
throats. Frankly, we feel
that the board is trying to do
the best job it can for the
people in the most economi-
cal way, but we are sure
that the board wants, as far
as possible, to carry out the
wishes of the majority of our
people. In view of this, if it
can be legally done, we
would like to see the people
given the opportunity to ex-
press themselves at the polls
on the plan of expansion at
the same time they are vot-
ing for the bond issue. In this
way the wishes of the major-
ity can be ascertained.

Washington—Answering the mail

P. L. R. Savannah, Ga. My in-
formation is that, in spite of talk
to the contrary, there is no plan
now to reduce the size of the ar-

000 fewer men than that. The 200-
000 or more over-age soldiers, those
with dependents, and "hardship

Christmas will be replaced by in-

of export control is headed by Milo
Perkins, formerly director of the ag-

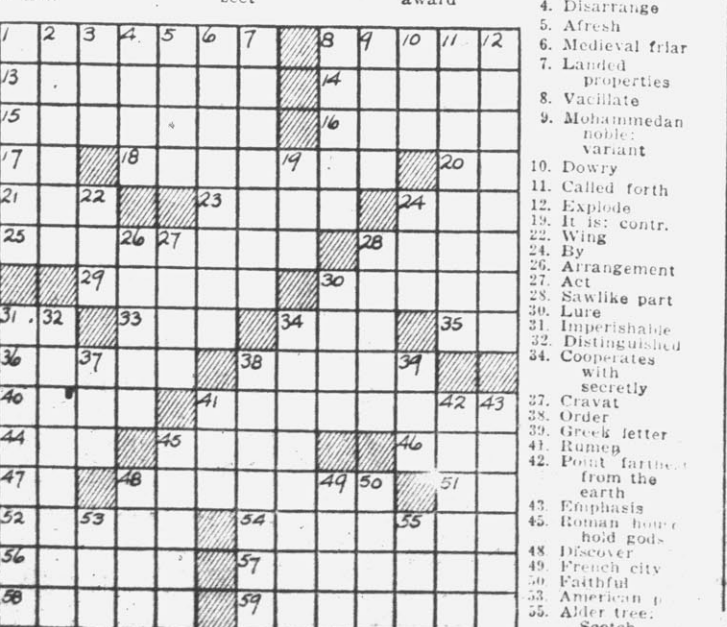

Of course there have been the usual stock arguments on both sides—arguments which have been used in every liquor election since the year One—but the anti-store folks have gone a bit farther in Bertie in challenging the ABC setup as the biggest "bootlegger" of them all.

In fact, a full-page advertisement in the Bertie Ledger-Advance of last week is devoted almost entirely to citing chapter and verse on alleged flat and direct violations of the control laws by the so-called "control" store.

After citing two cases in which the sheriff of Hertford county is alleged to have related stories of catching "leggers" with much Windsor ABC liquor the ad continues: "But you ask specifically 'Is the Windsor store guilty of bootlegging like this?' Here are some of the facts. In the records of Recorder of Bertie county is recorded the case of the State versus Johnny Parham and Willie Lewis. These two men, bootleggers from Ahoskie, were tried and convicted in Judge Winston's court on the charge of possessing more ABC liquor than the law allowed. Patrolman J. C. Scarborough made the arrest in this case. He apprehended these fine gentlemen as they were loading up their car in front of the Windsor control store. They had been sold their large quantity of whiskey by your legalized liquor dealers who know it was unlawful to do so." That isn't the only case, but is a sample of the very specific detailed charges brought by the dries.

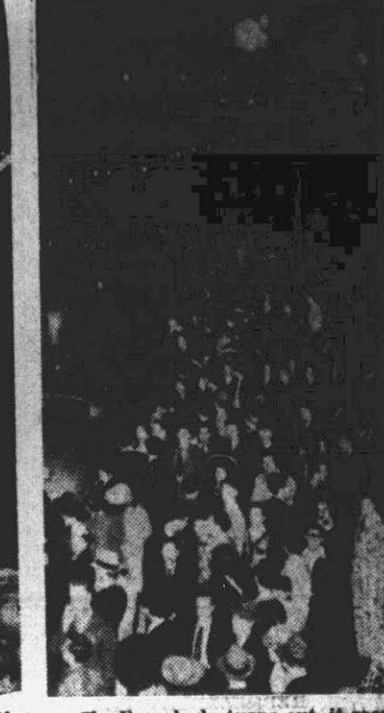

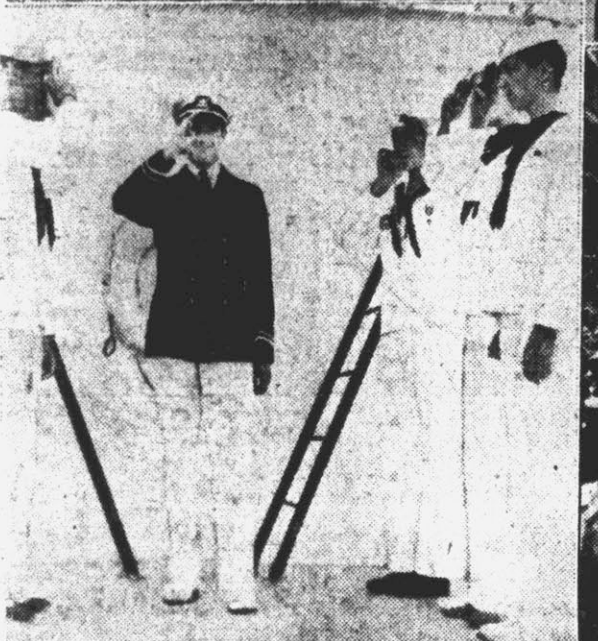

Here's America's Answer To Dictatorship



In the above pictures you see scenes as enacted in dictator countries of Europe as compared to the American scene—that of East Carolina Council Scouts participating in their Boy Scout activities. One of the first acts of the Dictators was to abolish the Boy Scout Movement in their countries. In Europe today, youth is regimented, given a gun, and taught that to kill is glorious! Millions of children are nourished on a diet of hate and intolerance—they know only what the

state wants them to know—and scores of Scout-age boys today are refugees, forced from their homes. The long arm of dictators reach even into our own country, as is pictured in the lower right hand corner of the above group—communists marching in an American city. Everywhere men are asking "What are we going to do about it?" "How can we keep the spirit of America alive in the nation's youth?"

Scouting is America's answer "Sweet Land of Liberty"—to respect his flag—as a symbol of his country's ideals and traditions—is the just step taken by the new Scout. He is taught its history and significance—he has promised on his honor to "do his duty to God and his country." Scouting stands out sharply in contrast to youth movements all found abroad. Centering its appealing activities in and about the

"a passage especially for young people," the twelfth chapter of Ecclesiastes, and speaking of the great value of a knowledge of the Bible to anyone preparing for life. After painting a picture of the many ways in which everyday life has changed since his boyhood days, President Meadows raised the question of what to seek for in college in order to have something that will not be outmoded.

Develop a sense of responsibility, the speaker also urged; the discipline one gives oneself is the most valuable. And "get out of college as much pleasure as you can," he said, "remembering that the best way to get happiness is to give it."

Dr. Meadows, who is a member of the Speakers' Bureau for the campaign in the interest of the sale of Defense Stamps and Bonds, also urged the students to begin now to save by setting aside regularly a certain amount, even if only a small sum, to buy defense stamps and do their bit toward national defense.
