U. S. DESTROYER IS STRUCK BY TORPEDO

Pro-Axis Jap Cabinet Formed; U. S. Relations Strained

ORDER SENT TO U. S. VESSELS

Unconfirmed Reports In Manila State All American Ships In Pacific Advised By Navy To Proceed To Nearest American or British Port; Serious View of Situation Is Taken In Washington

Japan today went under the military leadership of Lieut. General Eiki Tojo, pro-Axis former war minister, chosen as Premier to succeed Prince Fumimaro Konoye amid a growing crisis in Japan's relations with Russia and the United States.

Japanese quarters in Tokyo said generals and admirals would probably predominate in the new cabinet, and newspapers warned the people of the extreme gravity of the times.

Simultaneously, unconfirmed rumors circulated in Manila that all American ships in the Pacific had been ordered to leave the high seas. A Manila shipping executive said the Panama freighter Perla, operated by the U. S. Maritime Commission, had been ordered by the U. S. navy to return to Manila after sailing for the United States this morning.

Other ships were said to have been instructed to proceed only to the nearest American or British port.

"A fundamental disagreement exists between Japan and the United States," said the Tokyo newspaper Nichi Nichi. "Japan is facing a rise or fall at a difficult time never paralleled in history."

In Washington, Capitol Hill took an increasingly serious view of the Konoye cabinet overthrow and congressional leaders expressed the view that a new threat was brewing for American and British interests in the Pacific.

Sen. Gillette (D-Iowa), a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, declared the change "makes the chance of a peaceful settlement of our difference with Japan very meagre, indeed."

Konoye's ouster followed within two months after he initiated secret negotiations in Washington to ease strained relations between the United States and Japan.

The new premier, 56-year-old General Tojo, has been an open admirer of German military methods ever since he served as an attaché in Berlin in 1919, and as long ago as 1937 he declared:

"Japan must be prepared to fight China and Russia simultaneously."

Japanese newspapers, stressing the emergency in Washington-Tokyo relations, asserted that the United States would be responsible if the worst happens.

Washington, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Authoritative quarters indicated today that all American merchant ships that had been ordered out of Japanese and Chinese waters because of what the Navy called the "situation in the Pacific."

Ships in the rest of the Pacific would not be affected, it was indicated.

The Navy reported by Manila sources to have ordered the ships to proceed to the nearest American or British port, took this official position.

"In view of the present situation in the Pacific, the Navy Department has no comment to make."

Reliable informants, however, indicated strongly that the order had been issued.

The number of American ships in Japanese and Chinese waters was said to be "small," with a "considerable" number of American ships operating in the rest of the Pacific.

The Maritime Commission, like the Navy, declined to discuss ship movements in the Pacific or to estimate the number of ships operating.

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Expresses Belief Several Candidates In Pitt Would Result In Defeat For All; Announces His Candidacy for Re-Election As State Senator; M. K. Blount Only Pitt Man In Field Now

J. Con Lanier, Greenville attorney and business man, today announced the withdrawal of his candidacy for Congress from this district, "in the interest of harmony and in the belief that I can best serve by withdrawing from the race."

This leaves only one announced candidate from Pitt, this being Marvin K. Blount, who stated his candidacy some months ago.

Herbert Leary of Edenton is the only other announced candidate.

The incumbent, Herbert Bonner, is expected to seek to retain his First District seat. Rep. Bonner, former secretary to Congressman Lindsay C. Warren, was appointed to fill out Warren's unexpired term and also was declared the nominee for the regular term, when Warren resigned to accept the post of Comptroller General.

In his statement, Mr. Lanier announced that he would be a candidate for re-election as state senator.

He pointed to the increased party harmony evident in Pitt county for the past few years and added that it was in this interest he was withdrawing.

Referring to other possible candidates, Mr. Lanier declared that it now appears that there will be possibly others to announce from this county and added that such a situation could result in certain defeat for all the Pitt county candidates.

Mr. Lanier's full statement follows:

"In the First District's 1942 Congressional race, I had hoped to be the only Pitt county candidate. I sincerely believed that in view of my close and continuous contact with the tobacco program in Washington, together with my years of experience in formulating and drafting legislation affecting farmers, I was best qualified to serve the people of my county and my district as their representative in Congress."

"However, it now appears certain that there will be one and possibly two other candidates from this county for this position. It is my judgment that such a situation could only result in certain defeat for all the Pitt county candidates."

"The political history of Pitt county for many years has been one of frustration because of division within the county. Happily, during the past few years we have been working more closely together in the best interest of the whole county. Therefore, in the interest of harmony and in the belief that I can best serve by withdrawing from the race, I have decided not to be a candidate in the 1942 Democratic primary."

"I shall always be grateful for the numerous promises of support from my many friends throughout the county and the district. I am sure that they will be able to elect a representative to Congress."

House Votes To Repeal Ban On Arming Vessels

TORPEDOING IN DEFENSE ZONE

Kearny 1st U. S. Warship Hit Since Start Of War

Hyde Park, Oct. 17.—(AP)—President Roosevelt asserted today that the torpedoing of the United States destroyer Kearny southwest of Iceland was clearly in the American defense zone.

The chief executive declined, however, to discuss the incident in detail, telling a press conference he would leave that to the Navy department in Washington.

Three minutes after reaching his home here this morning, Secretary Knox advised him by phone of the attack on the Kearny. He appeared surprised that the press had learned of the torpedoing so soon.

But there was little evidence of alarm in his bearing over the fact that an American warship had been hit for the first time since the war in Europe began.

Mr. Roosevelt said in response to questions that he had no information about casualties or possible retaliation by the Kearny.

To an inquiry whether the same instructions, to hunt down the raider, had been given as in the case of the destroyer Greer, the chief executive merely replied that regular navy orders applied. Unsuccessful torpedo attacks were made on the Greer last month in the same general vicinity as the Kearny attack today.

Galleries were packed, and a larger than usual number of legislators were on hand for the historic vote and the oratory which preceded it.

A New England Republican, Rep. Plumley of Vermont, told the House in the last hours of debate that the Kearny accident made it evident that the United States faced a world of the basest, foulest criminals.

SOVIETS REPEL NAZI THRUSTS IN KEY AREAS

Concede, However, Danger To Moscow Still Serious

BERLIN REPORTS NAZI SUCCESSES

Claim To Have Captured Power Station Supplying Important Moscow Industrial Sector

Soviet dispatches today reported that stubbornly fighting Red army troops had broken two German spearheads thrust into the key sectors of Vyazma, 125 miles west of Moscow, and Kalinin, 95 miles northwest of the Russian capital.

While conceding that the danger was still extreme, the Russians nevertheless declared that the German onslaught on the approaches of Moscow had been slowed as Soviet defense armies of Marshal Semyon Timoshenko massed in front of the capital for a last ditch stand.

Berlin reports said that Nazi troops slashing at Moscow's outer defenses—only 60 miles away at some points—had captured an important industrial section south of the U. S. S. R. capital and seized a power station which supplied the Moscow industrial region.

Authoritative quarters in London said the British military mission in Moscow was "on the move," and members of the Soviet government itself were reported moving to the interior city of Kazan, 450 miles east of Moscow. U. S. Ambassador Laurence A. Steinhardt and his embassy staff have already departed for the interior.

A midday Red army bulletin reported no new gains for the Nazi invaders, noting merely that the 16-day-old struggle before Moscow was particularly fierce, with vast destruction of men and machines on both sides.

Adolf Hitler's high command reported that Nazi warplanes in attacks on Soviet troop ships fleeing Odessa, Russian Black sea port, had sunk or damaged 14 ships and that the pursuit of "the beaten foe" was continuing between the sea of Azov and the Donets river.

Ignoring opponents' warnings that it was another long step toward war, the House voted to repeal the neutrality act provision prohibiting the arming of merchantmen engaged in commerce with any foreign nation.

The repealer also would authorize the President to arm ships, during the unlimited national emergency which he proclaimed last May 27 and, at the same time, would exempt them from the law which requires armed merchant vessels to be bonded in twice the amount of the value of both the vessels and their cargoes.

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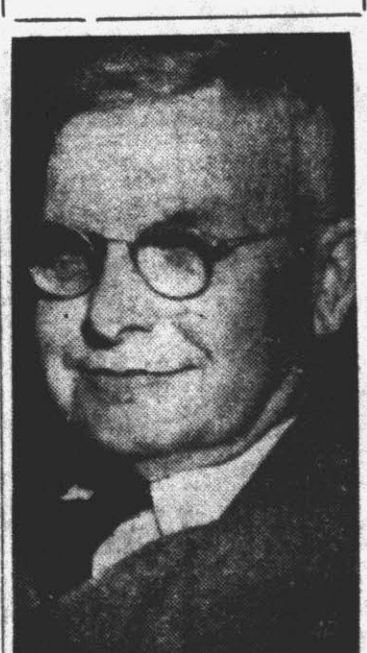
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No Possibility Vessel Mistaken For British

General Resigns



Maj. Gen. Ralph E. Truman (above) offered his resignation from the army after he was relieved of his command of the 35th division at Camp Robinson, Ark. Shortly afterwards Senator Clark, Democrat of Missouri, telegraphed Lieut. Gen. Ben Lear that he ought to retire "rather than make Maj. Gen. Truman the goat" for what the senator described as a "tactical defeat" for Lear's Second army in the recent Louisiana maneuvers.

The Kearny, completed only last year, is one of the Navy's newest destroyers.

Armed with the standard five-inch gun battery carried by ships of her class, the Kearny is 341 feet long, has a 35-foot beam and displacement of 1,930 tons.

No other details were available, the Navy said.

The position given for the torpedo attack was the same general area where the destroyer Greer was reported to have been hit by a submarine more than a month ago.

At was the first torpedoing since President Roosevelt's speech on September 11 which gave the fleet its shoot-on-sight orders and barred all "defensive waters" of the United States to Axis warcraft.

The Kearny has but two smokestacks and thus contrasted with the 30 World War type, four-stack vessels, transferred last year to Great Britain, which minimizes, navy officers said, the possibility that the American ship was mistaken for a British destroyer.

Officials estimated the Kearny carried a crew numbering between 125 and 150 officers and men.

There was no indication in the Navy's first report on the Kearny incident as to just how the torpedoing occurred or what, if any, combat or protective steps preceded it. The official American record in the Greer case, however, has finally been made clear. Only four days ago, Chairman Walsh (D-Mass) of the Senate Naval Committee made public a statement by Admiral Harold R. Stark, chief of naval operations, detailing the story of the encounter between the Greer and a German submarine.

Other comments:

Rep. Eaton (R-N.J.): "If a German submarine was responsible, it proves that this man Hitler has absolutely no inhibitions about anything."

Rep. Tinkham (R-Mass.): "The United States, having taken a position in the center of submarine activities by action of President Roosevelt according to plan, it is not surprising that this has occurred. I suppose there will be war very shortly, as planned by President Roosevelt at least as far back as 1938."

Speaker Rayburn: "This justifies statements by many of us that the United States is in danger of attack. It looks like it's a direct attack on the United States when there is an attack on one of its vessels."

Senator Aiken (R-Vt.): "I think we should expect it. If we send out destroyers hunting for submarines we can expect to have them shot at."

Do 10 Per Cent Of All N. C. Retail Business

Reflector Bureau. By HENRY AVERILL. Raleigh, Oct. 17.—Service stations, commonly known as gasoline filling stations, do ten per cent of all North Carolina's retail business—and just a wee bit more.

At least they did in 1939 the last year for which comparative figures have been compiled by the United States Census Bureau, and there is no reason to suppose that there has

been much change in the ratio. This is made the more likely by the fact that gasoline sales, as reflected in the gasoline tax collected by the state, have set a new high record in practically every month's report this year.

The figures, as reported by the 1939 census were for North Carolina—Total retail sales, \$633,240,000; total service station sales \$65,331,000. Percentage service station sales to all retail sales, 10.3.

This figure put North Carolina fourth in the nation in ratio of service station to retail sales. Only states higher were South Dakota with 11.9 per cent, Wyoming 11.5 per cent, and Kansas 10.5 per cent. North Carolina was well above its neighbors, South Carolina 8.3 per cent, Virginia 7.9 per cent, Georgia 7.9 per cent and Tennessee 7.2 per cent.

Actually the price paid by consumers for gasoline to the service stations in 1939 was far above the \$65,331,000 figure, as the six-cent a gallon tax is not included, though of course they figure in the total cost of gasoline to the public.

In 1939 a total of \$29,187,000 in state and federal gasoline taxes was collected in this state. This year the state alone will collect that much if returns for the last three months continue at anything approaching the nine months already reported.

Strength For The Day

STAGNANT WATER
This past summer I watched a
dog stake his claim at a stagnant
pool. Just a few hundred feet away
was a sparkling lake of fresh wa-
ter. Yet he chose to drink muddy
water out of a hole in the ground,
rather than avail himself of the re-
freshing water of the lake.

The spectacle is not as unusual as
one would think, nor is this stupid
procedure confined to dogs alone.
Millions of people every day are
drinking stagnant water, with fresh
sparkling fountains nearby. Robert
Louis Stevenson wrote years ago
that the world is so full of a num-
ber of things, he thought we should
all be as happy as kings. But it is
amazing how many people live
within their own gloomy thoughts,
brood over slights and insults, cher-
ish aversions, when if they would
just walk out into the clear sun-
shine and open their minds and let
a little fresh air in, they would be
happy indeed. They are perfectly
willing to lap up stagnant water as
long as the supply holds out, while
near them are streams of clear,
limpid happiness in which they
could drink their fill if they would.

There is an indifference to religion
today which is alarming to
leaders of thought everywhere. It is
not that men are hostile to religion
— they are just sufficiently indiffer-
ent that they allow play, week-end
engagements, the pressure of busi-
ness, or the weary pursuit of daily
tasks to keep them from drinking
at a fountain where they can be
refreshed indeed.

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A FINE SPIRIT

Senator J. C. Lanier's an-
nouncement today that he
has voluntarily withdrawn
from the First District Con-
gressional race in the inter-
est of harmony in Pitt Coun-
ty and to better the chances
of election of a Pitt County
candidate to the post, cer-
tainly deserves the commen-
dation of Pitt County citizens
generally. At the time of M.
K. Blount's announcement
for the post we expressed
the hope that there would be
no other candidates from
this county and we likewise
expressed our disappoint-
ment when Mr. Lanier an-
nounced because we were
aware that with two strong
candidates running from this
county our chances of vic-
tory would be greatly weak-
ened.

Mr. Lanier's action in leav-
ing the field open to another
candidate is the second in-
stance of this kind in Pitt
County during this year, the
other being when two of
three potential candidates
for the post of State High-
way Commissioner volun-
tarily withdrew in favor of the
third. Such an attitude on
the part of Pitt County citi-
zens indicates a growing
unity between our people
which will make us stronger
politically in the future.

In announcing his with-
drawal from the Congres-
sional race today, Mr. Lan-
ier stated that he would be
a candidate to succeed him-
self as Pitt County's mem-
ber of the State Senate. In
view of Mr. Lanier's placing

Washington Daybook

By Jack Stinson

Washington.—If bombs ever fall
on the United States, our police
won't be caught short on knowledge
of the best methods of meeting
such emergencies.

Over at the Federal Bureau of
Investigation, J. Edgar Hoover's
boys have set up an exhibition
straight from England, showing all
of the equipment used by police
during black-outs and air raids.
There are a couple of Oscars
(ghoulish dummies used by the
FBI in demonstrating murder in-
vestigations) togged out in costumes
that would make Men from Mars
look like a bunch of sissies. In
snouted gas masks, rubber suits and
boots, steel helmets, walkie-talkie
radios strapped to their backs, and
"blackout" lights, which look like
covelets at their belts, these two
fellows are enough to finish off a
good nightmare even if never a
bomb was dropped.

To anyone who ever has battled
the traffic of American cities, prob-
ably even more impressive will be
the display of street lights, traffic
lights, and auto headlights. With
bumpers painted white, strips of

white paint around fenders, and a
single headlight that shows three
slits of down-cast light, the sam-
ple of an authorized car for black-
out driving can be dimly seen at 20
paces.

The street lamps, "20 feet above
the kerb," toss out the glorious il-
lumination of 02 of one candi-
power—about the same as a lighted
cigarette held a foot away from the
object you wish to see.

The traffic lights are the custo-
mary green-yellow-red, but the
light is emitted from little four-
inch crosses, with bars an eighth
of an inch wide.

There's a lot more to the exhibi-
tion—bomb shelters, various meth-
ods of combating incendiary
bombs, air raid sirens, first aid in
air raids, and a dozen other hor-
rendous things that any good police
force in a bombed city would have
to know.

The exhibition is semi-public—
that is, available to visitors to the
Justice Department building, when
it is not being used to instruct "re-
training courses" in the FBI's na-
tional police school, where 400 men
from police departments all over
the country are getting concentra-
ted instruction in methods employ-
ed by London bobbies to protect the
public during air raids.

There is one story in connection
with the exhibition that never has
been told. Early last winter, Hoover
sent two of his ablest assistants to
London at the height of the air-
raid season.

He told them to take their time,
to make a thorough study of ev-
erything that had to do with po-
lice activity during blackouts and
air raids. He armed them with spe-
cial letters to Scotland Yard offi-
cials, and ordered them to bring
back every item of equipment that
might be used in demonstrating
British methods to the American
police.

The men stayed four months and
collected hundreds of pieces of
equipment, ranging from mittens
with the finger tips cut out for
teletype operators, and such, dur-

ing gas attacks) to tail-fins from
4,400-pound "land mines" (which
were dropped on London and made
craters 60 feet deep).

The men came back by plane,
the exhibition by ship. Somewhere
off the coast of the British Isles,
ship and exhibition lie at the bot-
tom of the sea, victims of a subma-
rine.

It took nearly six months more
to assemble another collection and
get it over here. It is the only such
exhibition in the United States.

Raleigh, Oct. 17.—When the ex-
pected "priorities unemployment" be-
comes a sad fact in North Carolina,
there is going to be quite a strain
put on the State Employment Ser-
vice—a fact which officials of the
service realize and which they are
preparing to meet as adequately as
possible.

They are passing along and giv-
ing full publicity to the advice of
Federal Security Administrator
Paul V. McNutt that all employers
report their problems to the near-
est state employment service office.
This sort of action, it is stressed,
is the first step in obtaining gov-
ernment action to determine the
probability of utilizing the plant
and its workers for defense produc-
tion. Employers who anticipate lay-
offs in their plants because of
shortages of materials or curtail-
ment orders should waste no time
in communicating with the State
Employment office.

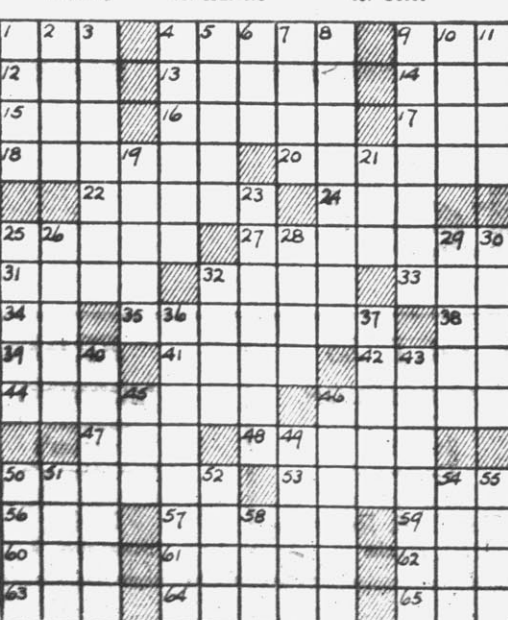
If plants cannot be converted to
defense production, the employ-
ment service is responsible for
prompt action to move displaced
workers into defense plants and
where necessary to arrange for
training courses that will fit them
for jobs.

But while preparing for the
"storm" of priorities unemployment
the N. C. Service has been hand-
ling a reversal of the usual fall
trend in employment placements.
Normally the peak of fall place-
ments begins in August and con-
tinues to December; but in four
of the last seven years September
placements fell below August. This
year all placement activity increas-

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YELTON WARNS AGAINST MOVE

To Permit No Strike Of School Bus Operators

Reflector Bureau. By HENRY AVERILL

Raleigh, Oct. 16.—Nathan Yelton, executive secretary of the state school commission, believes that the training high school youths receive as school bus drivers is in itself valuable vocational education.

He thinks that those youngsters who have recently been threatening to strike for increased compensation have been misled as to the facts, and can easily be made to understand the true situation.

But, finally, he will not tolerate for a minute any actual strikes among the drivers.

"We will not have anything of that kind," he said, "and any striking bus drivers will simply be replaced for good."

The Commission hasn't the money to increase state compensation to bus drivers, he said, citing the increased cost to the state of an increase to drivers from the \$9.50 a month they are now paid to the \$15 which seems to have been the goal set by boys seeking higher wages.

There are 4,000 drivers, approximately. They want an increase of \$5.50 a month apiece. Just multiply 4,000 by five and a half and then by eight, and it's found that it would cost the state \$215,600 for the eight months term. The Commission hasn't anywhere to get that much money."

Any county which feels that its school bus drivers are underpaid can remedy the situation by local supplement, he said. This is done in some counties, among them Mitchell, Mr. Yelton's home county, and New Hanover—both of which employ adult drivers.

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hand at the Bendix, N. J., factory of Air Associates, Inc., where CIO men walked out two weeks ago.

The executive board of the AFL machinists union announced last night that plans for a strike at Consolidated would be held in abeyance "a reasonable length of time" in order to permit settlement to be reached in Washington. The disagreement, the board contended, was between the government and the management.

W. D. Chudleigh, president of the machinists local, said the men began discussing the advisability of a strike after Major R. H. Fleet, Consolidated president, had announced that he would not sign a proposed contract raising wages, unless the government paid part of the extra cost. Fleet said the wage increases would amount to \$82,000,000 and would "break the company."

High officials of the Army and Navy were keeping in close touch with the situation and considering Fleet's demand.

Consolidated employs 28,000 workers and holds contracts for \$750,000,000 worth of aircraft. Sheriff William R. Browne at Bendix, N. J., telegraphed Governor Charles Edison yesterday that "mass violence appears inevitable" today at the Air Associates plant, which has orders for \$5,000,000 worth of airplane parts. The sheriff said he had heard reports that striking CIO-United Auto Workers would try to force the plant to close.

It has remained in operation since the CIO men walked out, demanding a form of union shop, an increase of minimum wage scales from 40 cents to 75 cents an hour, and a 15-cent hourly boost for employees drawing 75 cents or more.
