SEVERAL NAZI CITIES BOMBED IN RAF RAID

Offensive Resumed After Three-Night Idleness

LONDON ADMITS LOSS OF PLANES

Bremen, Wilhelmshaven and Emden Targets Of RAF; Germans also Carry Out Aerial Assaults

London, Oct. 21.—(AP) Bremen, Wilhelmshaven and Emden were bombed heavily last night by Royal Air Force crews reopening their offensive against Germany after three nights of idleness because of bad weather, an authoritative source said today.

Nine British bombers are missing from the attacking force, which he described as strong.

The Air Ministry said that, in addition to the major blows at Germany, "small raids were made on a number of objectives in northwest Germany and occupied territory."

"Yesterday," it said, "aircraft of the coastal command bombed an enemy seaplane base and factory in northern Denmark. Buildings were hit and aircraft set on fire."

It was acknowledged that a coastal command plane, presumably one which participated in this thrust across the North sea, was missing, making 10 bombers unreported in the 24-hour period.

German air attacks last night were centered on Merseyside, the port and shipbuilding area of Liverpool, and North Wales. A small number of persons were killed.

Funeral Held For Chocowinity Man

Jesse G. Godley, 60, died in Washington hospital last night at 10:40 o'clock following a stroke of apoplexy yesterday.

Graveside services and burial took place in the Godley family cemetery several miles below Chocowinity on the Aurora highway at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon. Services were conducted by Rev. Duff Toler, Free Will Baptist minister of Chocowinity.

Mr. Godley was born, reared, and spent his entire life around Chocowinity, except for the last few months, when he had been doing some work on government projects in Norfolk, Va. He was a member of the Haw Branch Union Chapel.

Surviving are six sons: Woodrow Preston, and Charlie Godley of Chocowinity; Nathan of near Greenville; Lindsay and Jasper of near Grimesland; five daughters: Mrs. Blate Harding and Miss Evelyn Godley of Chocowinity; Mrs. Levy Wilson of near Greenville; six grandchildren; two sisters: Mrs. William Henry Lewis of near Chocowinity and Mrs. Bill Eiks of Grimesland.

Maneuvers Described As Spectacular Move

Camden, S. C., Oct. 21.—(AP)—Getting an hour and a half start, Major General Lloyd R. Fredenall's second corps was reported by public relations headquarters here today to have executed a most spectacular maneuver against the opposing first corps of Major General Charles F. Thompson in the Carolinian war games.

An army spokesman said the movement was "probably the most spectacular we'll see during the operations."

To Return Tankers

New York, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Informed oil circles understood today that the British had just released to the United States 15 oil tankers formerly of American registry to be used in alleviating the gasoline shortage on the eastern seaboard.

The tankers, it was believed, have a total capacity of more than 1,200,000 barrels of oil. It was not immediately determined just what their previous ownership may have been, but it was said they would be placed at the disposal of Harold Ickes, petroleum coordinator, to be used as he saw fit.

Mart Closes 31st

The Greenville tobacco market will close its 1941 season, conceded by all the most successful in many years, on Friday, October 21, this action having been taken at a meeting of officials held yesterday afternoon.

Although it was agreed that most farmers in the Greenville territory will have already disposed of their offerings by that date, it was decided to keep the market open to make certain that every grower had ample time to get the remainder of their crop on the market.

So far this season 42,315,422 pounds have been sold for \$13,137,196.24, or an official average of 31.05 cents per pound. This average compares with a 17.70 figure for the corresponding date a year ago.

Although more tobacco was sold in 1940, the more than 13 million dollars already paid out this season compares with \$7,805,673.83 for the same number of sales days last year.

PITT FAIR NOW IN FULL SWING

Thousands Of School Children To Attend Tomorrow

Following the opening of the Pitt county fair last night with a crowd which measured up to the usual Monday night attendance, the exposition got into full swing today and thousands are expected to flock to the grounds tonight, to be followed by what promises to be a record Children's Day Wednesday.

Those who have visited the fair ground the exhibit hall to be filled with the best displays ever seen at an agricultural exposition in the county. All livestock pens are filled with the best hogs and cattle to be found in the county and the poultry entries are declared to be "exceptionally fine," both in quality and quantity.

The many shows and rides were in full swing today on the Kaus Exposition Shows offered one of the largest midways ever presented here. In fact, the grounds are almost filled to capacity and Mr. Kaus reported that he had other equipment he could have brought here, but that if he added much to the lot there would be no room left for the patrons.

Manager A. J. Gray and other fair officials have been lending every effort to secure a free act attraction, the one booked having been unavoidably kept from filling the engagement. Mr. Gray reports that he hopes to secure a popular act, and adds that in the meantime additional fireworks are being provided for the free entertainment of the crowds. The poultry exhibits already have been judged and the remainder of the entries will be judged tomorrow.

Thousands of school children from Greenville and throughout the county and adjoining sections will converge on the grounds tomorrow. All students will be admitted to the grounds free of charge, but will have to pay the three cents government defense tax.

The fair this year is one of the best ever presented here. The agricultural and home exhibits, community booths and displays of art and handicraft surpass those of any previous year and the midway attractions, rides and shows, offered by the Kaus Exposition Shows measure up to the slogan of a better and bigger fair.

Recommends Repeal Of Additional Section Of Neutrality Act While Appearing Before Committee To Support Proposal To Erase Section Prohibiting The Arming Of American Merchantmen

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull said today he believed that a neutrality provision which bans American merchant vessels from specified combat zones should be "repealed or modified."

He tossed this recommendation into a request that Congress repeal now the section of the act which prohibits arming of the ships. Hull's statement, given to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee behind closed doors, was supplied also by the State Department.

Hull specifically urged the repeal of section six of the act, which prohibits the arming of merchant vessels, and of section two (which prohibits their entry into specified combat zones) declared:

"In as much as section two is not under consideration, I will offer no comment except to say that in my judgment section two should be repealed or modified."

"When American ships are being wantonly and unlawfully attacked with complete disregard of life and property," the secretary said, "it is absurd to forego any legitimate measures that may be helpful to ward self defense. It is especially absurd to continue to tie our hands by a provision of law which prohibits arming our merchant vessels for their own defense."

It would be "little short of criminal negligence" for the United States to cling to the hope of somehow escaping the fate of other countries, he testified.

Ex-Panama Chief To Go Into Exile

Panama, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Arnolfo Arias, deposed president of Panama, left his homeland today by a Pan-American Airways plane scheduled to stop in Nicaragua, apparently having come to a sudden decision to go into exile.

He arrived at Managua, Nicaragua, at 7:30 a. m. (8:30 a. m. EST) by a special plane which carried an escort of three Panama police.

The ex-president had been in jail since his voluntary return last Tuesday from Cuba, where he was at the time of the bloodless coup on October 9, which displaced him.

His departure had the approval of the new regime, which had let it be known that he would be freed if he left the country.

Joseph R. Rawls Claimed By Death

Joseph Raleigh Rawls, 30, from the Republican section of Bertie county, died Sunday night at 10 o'clock at Duke hospital as a result of injuries received in an automobile wreck on highway 17 between Washington and Williamston.

Funeral services were conducted from the home of his mother in Bertie county at 2 o'clock this afternoon by Rev. Mr. Hollowell, Baptist minister, and burial followed in the Mizelle cemetery near Bear Grass.

Mr. Rawls is survived by his mother, Mrs. Nollie Rawls; five brothers: Willie and Clyde Rawls of Windsor, and Elbert, John, and J. Rawls of Norfolk, Va.; two sisters: Mrs. John Tayloe and Mrs. J. H. Webb of Windsor, R. F. D.

Mr. Rawls was raised in the Bear Grass community, where he was well known, and had only moved to Bertie county a year ago.

FOUR HELD IN DEATH OF NAZI

Four French Officers Arrested In Capital City

Vichy, Unoccupied France, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Four French gendarmes officers, including a colonel and three captains, were arrested today in Nantes in connection with the assassination of General Holtz.

At the same time, the Germans announced the execution of three more Frenchmen following the assassination yesterday of General Holtz at Nantes.

The three executions raised to 84 the firing squad deaths by Germans.

It was the first time the Germans had announced the shooting of more than one man at a time since the first mass executions in retaliation for attacks on individuals of the German occupying forces.

If you had an opportunity to prove your worth to the community as an interested, intelligent citizen, you'd hesitate not to take advantage of such an opportunity. I'm sure. If this assumption is true, tonight will be a history-making night in the annals of Greenville.

Tonight the citizens of Greenville may clarify their thinking relative to the proposed school expansion program in an open forum scheduled for the high school library at 8 o'clock. Those who have registered, as well as those who have not, are urged to attend the forum tonight in an effort to become well-acquainted with the details of the proposed expansion plans.

Students, well-informed because of daily contacts with outstanding inadequacies, will present the most obvious needs of the school. Superintendent J. H. Rose will explain any questionable points relative to the proposed program and Principal V. M. Mulholland will preside over the meeting.

Appearing on the program in two-minute talks explaining urgent needs of the present set-up are: Sarah Moore, Betty Forrest, Charles Pace, Leroy Cherry and Ralph Fleming. These students will discuss such inadequacies as the firestone building, the crowded halls and classrooms, the lack of playing space, the absence of sufficient gymnasium and auditorium facilities, and the total absence of industrial arts.

A short business session has been arranged for the latter part of this meeting. At this time Mr. Herbert Waldrop will present recommendations concerning whether or not to have a Parent Teacher Association in the high school.

REDS PRESSING GERMANS HARD IN MOST AREAS

Claim Made By Moscow Radio Heard In London

CONTEND DRIVE BEEN RETARDED

Report States That Many Suburban Villages Have Changed Hands As Much As Three Times Daily

London, Oct. 21.—(AP) The Russian armies are pressing the Germans hard in most sectors of the front before Moscow in fighting in which "many suburban villages have changed hands as many as three times a day," the Moscow radio stated tonight.

"Encountering heavy resistance, the Germans have considerably slowed down their drive," the announcer said.

Nazi spearheads pressing into Moscow's defenses have made some slight progress from the South, informed quarters here said, and they added that it was "a good guess" that the Germans were a scant 50 miles from the capital in the Maloyaroslavets sector.

London advices said the battle now is so bloody and intense that the outcome is unpredictable and a Russian source spoke of an "epic battle of tanks" in progress on the southern approaches to the capital.

Russian quarters said it was "quite definite" that Soviet counterattacks near Kalinin, 95 miles northwest of Moscow, however, had thrown the Germans back across the Tver river.

Although a battle is raging back and forth near Mozhaisk, 57 miles west of Moscow with the Germans striving mightily to gain control of the main highway, it was said that the Hitler offensive in that direction appeared to have been brought to a standstill.

In the South, the Germans announced the capture of Stalingrad, a Soviet dispatches acknowledged that Marshal Budyenny's Ukraine armies, desperately pressed by the intensified Nazi assault, had withdrawn to new lines near Taganrog, only 30 miles west of Rostov. The Germans claimed Taganrog's fall yesterday.

Methodists Again Denounce Whiskey

Winston-Salem, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The militant stand which their church has taken against liquor was reaffirmed today by Western North Carolina Methodists, who are holding their annual conference here.

The church leaders chose as their spokesman one of the best-known Methodist laymen in the South, former Governor Clyde R. Hoey of Shelby.

Hoey congratulated the Methodists "upon the fact that nowhere in the bounds of this conference has the sale of liquor been legalized."

"Alcoholic beverages still occupy first place as a cause of crime, poverty and unhappiness in the world," said the former governor. "The church must continue its fight for temperance and for the elimination of the dominant evil."

He said the church should continue its fight against liquor, but added that the fight should not be confined to the enactment of prohibitory legislation.

"We have relied too much in the past upon the power of the law to make men sober," said Hoey. "It can not be accomplished by that method."

Louis Mayo Put On Honor List At Duke

Louis Mayo, a graduate of Greenville High School, now a junior at Duke University, has made such an outstanding record that he has been placed upon the dean's list. Being placed upon the Dean's list means that the student has done work of such high quality that he does not have to attend classes unless he wants to but can do his work wherever he chooses to do and only take the examinations from time to time.

The students of Greenville High School expressed themselves as being proud of this record of one of their graduates, particularly in view of the fact that Louis is working his way through college as one of the engineers at Station WDNC in Durham.

TO OPEN DRIVE HERE MONDAY

Community Chest Board Meet Called For Thursday

Charles B. Bissette who was unanimously selected chairman of the Community Chest drive, announced today that the campaign would be conducted next week and called a meeting of the Board of Directors to be held at Sheppard Memorial library this coming Thursday afternoon at 5 o'clock.

Complete plans for the drive will be outlined at the meeting and a full membership of the board is requested by Chairman Bissette. Some committees already have been named and others will be selected during the week in order that the campaign may get into full swing on Monday.

Chairman Bissette was optimistic over the outlook and was even enthusiastic over prospects for the coming drive.

"The money is here and it is not a question of whether we can raise it," he declared, adding that a budget of \$6,440 had been set up and that this was the minimum on which the Community Chest can operate during the year 1941-42.

Of the total budget, only \$200 is set aside for operating expenses and in order to carry out the drive successfully, it will be necessary for all members of the board and the public in general to cooperate 100 per cent, Mr. Bissette declared.

"I feel sure we can put the drive over with no trouble at all if we secure enough workers," he stated, and added that he felt certain no difficulty would be encountered in finding enough workers to contribute their services.

It is proposed to set up a campaign office in the Municipal building during the week of the drive if space can be found for the purpose.

The budget, as adopted by the board, follows: Boy Scouts, \$2,000; Girl Scouts, \$2,500; Salvation Army, \$300; Thrift Shop, \$240; School Lunch Fund, \$500; Kings Daughters, \$200; Emergency Relief, \$500; Operating expenses, \$200.

With Russians Apparently Having Checked Nazi Invasion On Moscow Front In Bloody Conflicts, Rail Center City Of Stalino In Vital Donets River Basin Falls To Invaders

German and Italian troops smashing into Russia's vital Donets river industrial basin were reported today to have captured Stalino, 100 miles northwest of Rostov-on-Don, while on the Central front, the Russians appeared to be stemming the Nazi drive on Moscow amid a series of huge-scale tank and infantry battles.

Stalino, a city of 455,000 population, lies on one of the two main rail lines between Moscow and the great Caucasian oil fields.

A bulletin from Adolf Hitler's field headquarters, describing Stalino as one of the most important armament centers in the Donets basin, said Axis forces took the surrounding region yesterday and that "Stalino itself was taken by Axis troops." These might be either German or Italian troops.

Nazi military commentators reported that the southern Axis armies were led by picked units of Hitler's own elite guard. They indicated that Rostov, gateway to the Caucasus, soon would probably become the pivot for a gigantic new encirclement to take the Donets basin.

On the bloody Central front before Moscow, the German high command said General Petrov, identified as commander-in-chief of the Russian 50th army and a member of the Supreme Soviet Council, had been found dead on the battle field east of Bryansk, 200 miles south of Moscow.

In the North, German military dispatches reported that Red army troops counter-attacking around Lake Ladoga, near Leningrad, had suffered heavy losses. The Germans acknowledged, however, that the Soviet counter blows had been launched on a broad scale with great ferocity.

Tass, the official Soviet news agency, said Russian troops had driven back a new German thrust toward Moscow from the southwest, but conceded that the Nazis had advanced several kilometers from Mozhaisk, 57 miles west of the capital.

The advance was blocked, Tass said, after a terrific tank battle at a crossroads on the Mozhaisk-Moscow highway, the route followed by Napoleon on his ill-fated march to Moscow in 1812.

A. A. U. W. Meets.
How women can most effectively help in the defense program was the theme of the A. A. U. W. at their first fall meeting last night at the home of Mrs. J. E. Winslow.

Miss Lois Grigsby, of the English department of the college, the speaker of the evening, struck the keynote of the year's program in her talk on "Women in Defense," in which she gave a comprehensive survey of agencies through which women could serve and opportunities for contributions.

Speaking from a rich background of study and reading and wide experience, she marshalled an impressive array of facts and figures gathered from the best sources and latest reports to support her points as to needs and suggestions for ways and means of helping. "Buy stamps not only with spare money, but money you can spare," "shop with pencil and paper so you will keep accurate accounts to keep down unjustifiable rise in prices," "find out how many children here do not have food sufficient for nutrition needs," were among the suggestions she gave for helping. She stressed the importance of safeguarding the children in their emotional as well as physical needs.

Citing the British women as examples, she urged each to carry on her own work, sticking to her job, doing it better and better. In an impassioned plea for all to hold to the highest things democracy can give, she warned against intolerance, hatred, bitterness, which kill the spirit and leave only the shell of the way of life we are attempting to defend.

Miss Louise Williams, the president, in opening the meeting commented on the fact that on May 10, 1929, the Greenville branch of the A. A. U. W. was organized at the home of Mrs. Winslow, and said that it seemed quite fitting to begin the new year, so full of challenge for every member, in the same home.

An interesting series of programs planned for the year brings out the underlying theme of the defense program, its effect on our "good neighbor" policy, on agriculture, on social welfare problems, and on the consumer. The branch plans to have one or more of the meetings of general interest open to the public.

The social welfare aspect of the program was emphasized in a letter from Mr. Futrell, superintendent of public welfare, read by Miss Williams, commending the group for its work last year in mental hygiene and urging that the work be continued.

The consumer emphasis came out in a report by Miss Mary Ann Cobb on the state executive board meeting of the A. A. U. W., which she and several other Greenville members attended in Chapel Hill, which urged the group to refrain from buying anything not absolutely necessary which would be in competition with the defense program, and to study consumer problems with the idea of bringing findings to the attention of the whole community.

The most important business of the evening was the election of Miss Audrey Dempsey, a member of the Commerce department of the college, as secretary to fill out the unexpired term of Miss Ruby Scholz, who is now with State College in Raleigh.

Other announcements of interest to the community were that the drama readings would be continued, with the first reading in November; and that the organization will again sponsor a children's play for the children of the city.

The program for the year, which was presented by the chairman of the program committee, Miss Mamie Jenkins, had been worked out in cooperation with the two other committee members—Mrs. S. B. Underwood and Mrs. Howard Mims. The guests of the evening, all women eligible for membership by virtue of the standing of the colleges from which they graduated, were introduced by Miss Mary Ann Cobb, of the membership committee, and warmly welcomed by the group.

The large number present to start the year's work were guests of Mrs. J. E. Winslow, a member of the social committee of the local branch and the treasurer of the state organization. After the program, Mrs. Winslow invited her guests into the dining room where delicious refreshments were served. She was assisted in receiving and in serving by Mrs. D. S. Spain, Jr., chairman of the social committee, and Miss Elizabeth England and Miss Pearl Chapman, also members of the committee.

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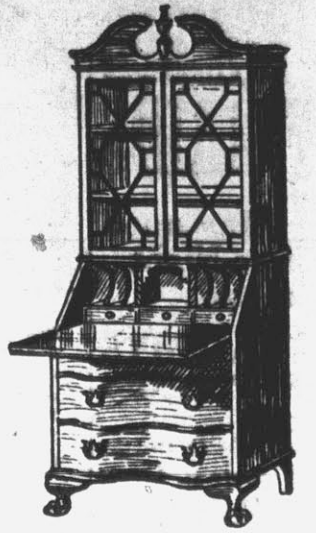

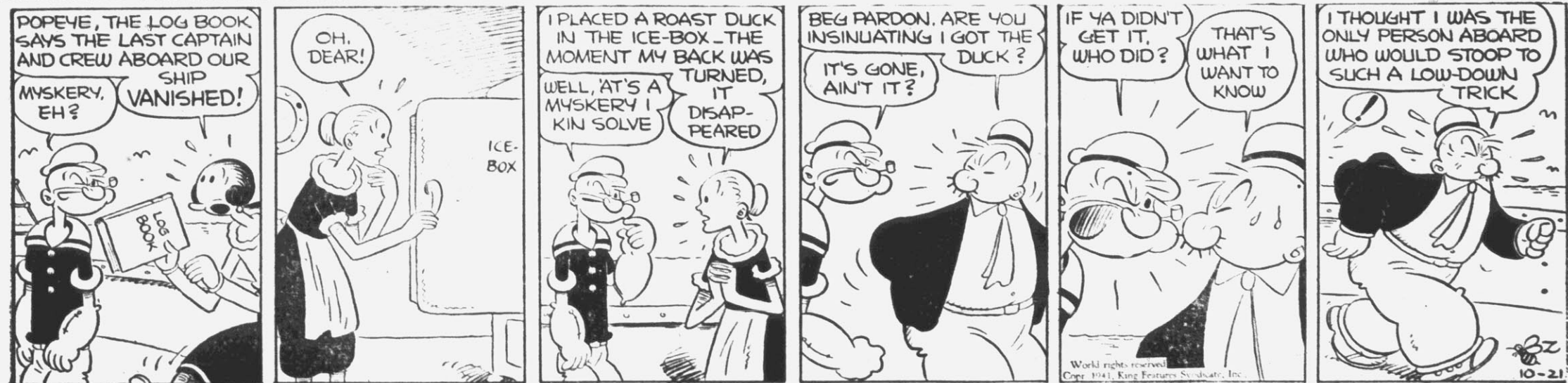

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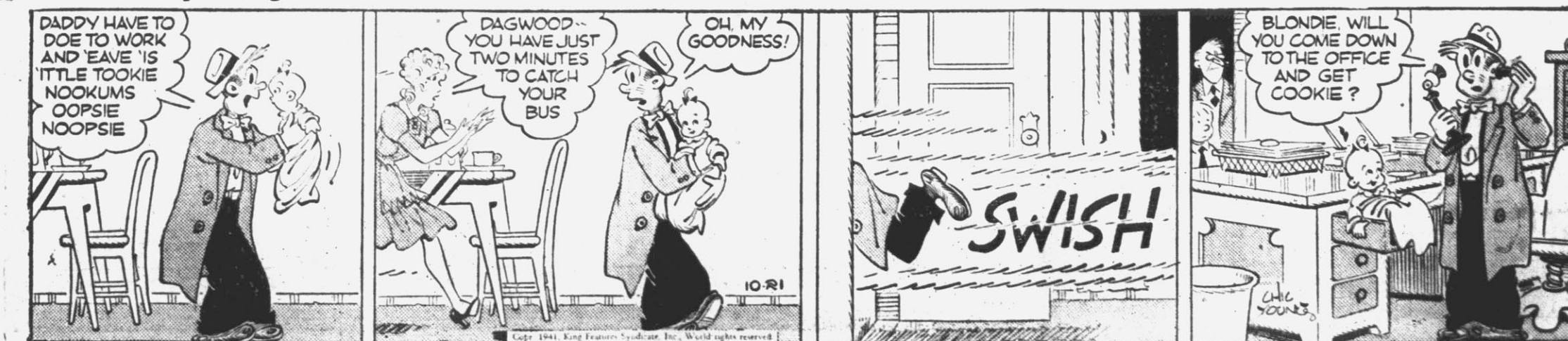

Washington Daybook

Washington — Behind the major
efforts of national defense, which
got most of the publicity, is a min-
or one which almost invariably
causes a roar of layman laughter
and a disgusting snort about "What
the heck are those guys in Wash-
ington up to anyway?" It's the con-
struction of concrete ships to re-
lieve the shipping shortage.

The United States Maritime com-
mission now has bids on hand for
100 such ships and before you join
the "snorters" let me present the
case for concrete ships. Since no-
body contends that concrete ships
ever will replace steel ones, or that
a fleet of concrete freighters would
ever be more than supplementary
in an emergency, there's no need
to go into any great debate on it.

In the first place, the 100 ships
now proposed are oil tankers or
barges—without motors. But they
are ships, nevertheless. A floating
freighter of 6,000 to 8,000 tons, be-
tween 300 and 400 feet long, with a
40-odd foot beam is no rowboat, even
if it does have to have a tug or
so alongside to get it places.

An official of one shipbuilding
firm (the Newport Concrete Ship-
building Co.) who built concrete
ships in the World War claims these
barges will cost only about half
what steel ones would. He also told
me he had put into his bid an
agreement to deliver the first con-
crete in 120 days from date of con-
tract and a ship a week thereafter
from a shipyard with only eight
ways for as long as the government
wanted to take them.

If he could live up to that, and
only half of the 60-odd firms also
bidding on the proposed 100 tankers
could match it, think what would
have happened to our potential oil
shortage if such a shipbuilding pro-
gram had been started last spring
to replace the motorship tankers
turned over to Great Britain.

As for concrete ships, they are
nothing new. There were about 38
built during the World War and al-
though the building of 12 by the
U. S. Shipping Board at a cost of
some \$80,000,000 has been described
often as a fiasco, the 26 built for
the Army proved something else
again.

For instance, the trim little river
steamer, Gen. D. H. Rucker, com-
pleted in 1919, plied the Potomac
for nearly 20 years between Port
Hamilton and the Navy Yard and
it probably would be in service yet
if it hadn't caught fire and burned
out the concrete, of course, the
wooden superstructure.

An interesting item in connection
with the General Rucker is that in
1937, after it had been in service 18
years, the army officially reported
the total cost of repair and main-
tenance of its hull had been \$35.

When one commentator recently
deplored the talk of concrete tank-
ers, but suggested helpfully that
tank cars might be loaded on rail-
road barges on the inland water-
ways to relieve the possible petro-
leum shortage in the east, he over-
looked the fact that some of the big
railroad barges on the Mississippi
are of concrete and at least one of
them has been in service for more
than 20 years.

A number of other concrete ships
and barges did their stint for years.
Even one of the old shipping board's
12 "mistakes" (resulting, according
to some opinions now from faulty
designing, hasty construction, and
an attempt to build them too large)
still is in use as a moored fish re-
duction plant at Point San Pablo,
near Richmond, Calif.

Contrary to general conception,
concrete hulls are only a few inches
thick and inside the concrete are
thick webs and lacings of steel
"wire." The thing is that this re-
inforcement may be made from

and 60 per cent or more of the lab-
or required may be unskilled and
drawn from a market that nearly
always is overflowing. Concrete
hulls are slightly heavier than steel
ones, but lighter than wooden hulls.

That, in part, is the case for what
some skeptics have derisively de-
scribed as the "floating bathtubs."
It was good enough to cause Chair-
man Rear Admiral Emory S. Land
and the other members of the Mari-
time commission to order a hundred
of them — and don't think the
rear admiral got his title by NOT
knowing boats.

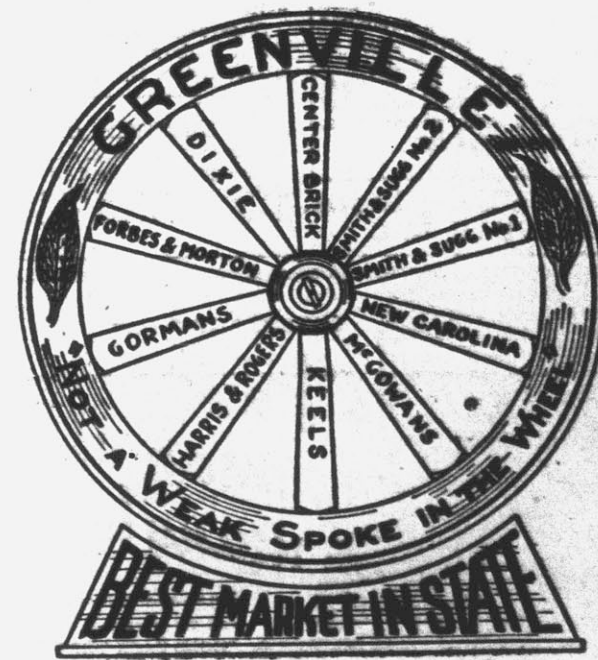

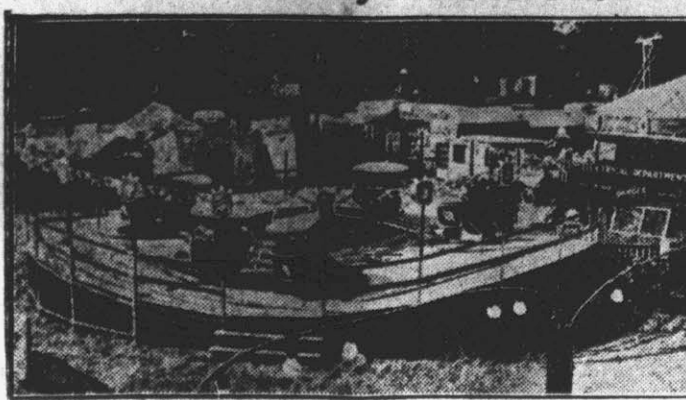
