Nazi Forces Storming Gateway To Caucasus Oil Fields

Reds Claim Dark Picture IS PAINTED ON LABOR FRONTS

British News Agency, However, Quotes Rome Radio As Saying Germans Already In Port City; Fierce Battles Reported Underway Along 200-Mile Central Front Defending Soviet Capital

Adolf Hitler's high command said today that German assault troops were storming the fortifications of Kerch, gateway to the Caucasus oil fields, and had already captured several coastal defense points south of the town.

Reuters, the British news agency, quoted the Rome radio as announcing that German and Rumanian forces had occupied the port, which lies on a narrow strait separating the Crimea from the Caucasus mainland.

Dispatches to the Soviet newspaper, Pravda, however, asserted that Red army troops had beaten off a German attempt to turn the Russian lines in the Kerch area.

Russian front line reports said the Germans were "equally unsuccessful" in fighting near Sevastopol, key Black sea naval base at the southwest tip of the Crimea, and that repeated Nazi tank assaults "failed to break through our defenses."

German bombers were pictured by the high command as blasting furiously at Soviet ships which might be used to evacuate Red army troops from the peninsula. A Nazi communique reported that three cruisers, a destroyer and five large merchant ships were badly damaged in nearby waters.

On the Central front, Soviet dispatches declared that fierce battles were raging on both flanks of Moscow's 200-mile defense arc—at Kalinin, 95 miles northwest of the capital, and at Tula, 100 miles south.

The Moscow radio said Field Marshal General Fedor von Bock, commanding the Nazi Central front armies, had moved up a division of Hitler's elite guards in the Volokolamsk sector, 65 miles northwest of the capital, in preparation for a new assault there.

London military quarters reported that the Nazis were apparently girding for a new offensive against Moscow at several points despite enormous losses already suffered in the 42-day-old drive on the Soviet capital.

Corey, all of near Greenville, and Mrs. Robert H. Strumb of this city, and Joseph J. Forbes and Arthur Forbes of near Greenville. Later she was married to James Moseley, who survives her, and one daughter, Mrs. Woodrow W. Glendon of this city, survive this union. Also surviving is one brother, Elias Braxton of near Greenville, and 27 grand children.

Railroads, Telephone Lines And Mines Face Walkout

STERN MEASURES BEING DEMANDED

Effect Of Labor Situation Felt By Sponsors Of Legislation To Revise Neutrality Act

Labor disputes today cast dark shadows over the immediate future of railroad transportation, long distance telephone communications and the mining of soft coal to fuel the nation's steel mills.

In addition, there was a growing possibility that the disturbed labor situation might even cause the defeat of administration-sponsored changes in the neutrality act. Some House members declared they would not vote to send American merchantships into war zones unless the administration took firm steps to prevent work stoppages on defense projects.

White House action of some sort appeared certain in the soft coal dispute, involving the CIO-United Mine Workers demand for a union shop in the captive coal pits operated by the steel companies. President Roosevelt invited UMW President John L. Lewis, CIO Chief Philip Murray, UMW Secretary-Treasurer Thomas Kennedy, and the heads of three large steel companies to confer with him tomorrow.

There was no indication of what action Mr. Roosevelt had in mind. The threatened nation-wide rail (Continued on page eight)

BAPTISTS END 111TH SESSION

Dr. Forrest C. Feezor Of Raleigh Named President

Asheville, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Dr. Forrest C. Feezor of Raleigh was elected president of the Baptist State Convention at the closing session of the 111th annual conference here today. He succeeds Dr. Harrison Williams of Charlotte.

O. M. Mull of Shelby, M. L. Barnes of Mount Holly and Wilson Woodcock of Greensboro were elected vice-presidents.

M. A. Huggins of Raleigh and C. B. Meade of Rockingham were named executive secretary and recording secretary, respectively, on Tuesday.

Others nominated for the presidency were Dr. Ralph A. Herrang of Winston-Salem and the Rev. Perry Crouch of Fayetteville, who brought in Tuesday's report concerning phases of the USO system.

The convention unanimously approved a plan to borrow \$95,000 to turn over to the North Carolina Baptist Hospital for completing equipment at the Winston-Salem hospital. The money will be used to provide complete cooperation between the newly-erected Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest College and the hospital.

The Baptists also voted to issue bonds to refund indebtedness of the hospital to the extent of \$36,000.

SECOND FRONT DEMAND MADE

Libya Mentioned As Possible Scene Of Action

London, Nov. 13.—(AP)—A renewed demand that Britain form a second fighting front to aid Russia, with emphasis on the possibilities of Libya, was sounded in parliamentary debate today by Laborite Emanuel Shinwell, who has been among the critics mentioned as a possible recruit for the British cabinet.

"Why has the offensive in Libya been delayed?" Shinwell demanded. "It has been expected many months. 'It would, in effect, have created a second front. It would certainly have distracted the Nazis and created difficulties for them. Let the government answer that question. 'Next week or next month an offensive in Libya may not be as effective.'"

This came in House of Commons debate on the reply of King George VI's message opening a new session of Parliament yesterday. Prime Minister Churchill spoke for the government yesterday.

War With Japan

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Senator Murray (D-Mont) said today "there is a definite possibility" that the United States may go to war with Japan, but his colleague, Senator Wheeler (D-Mont) declared that "we now have a real chance to adjust our differences with the Japanese."

Murray, a member of the Foreign Relations Committee, told reporters that forthcoming conversations between State Department officials and Saburo Kurosu, Japan's special envoy, "appear pretty futile."

Wheeler thought differently. "The people of Japan, like the people of the United States, do not want war in the Pacific," he said. "There is no reason why differences between the two countries can not be worked out in a peaceful way."

MAY MAKE NEW PLEA TO FINNS

Britain And U.S. May Renew Efforts To End War

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The United States and Great Britain may renew their efforts to end Russo-Finnish hostilities, diplomatic sources reported today, and undertake to work out some satisfactory guarantee for Finland's security against future attack.

The informed belief here was that the Helsinki government had left the diplomatic door open for further discussion along such lines, even though its not to the State Department did reject Russia's initial overtures for peace.

American officials were non-committal on the subject, pending a thorough study of the note which set forth the Finns' position and their insistence upon guaranteed security for their little republic.

Journal Recognizes Alfalfa Experiments

Raleigh, Nov. 13.—Recognition of their research work with boron deficiencies in soils where alfalfa is grown has come to two N. C. State College Experiment Station workers in a national scientific journal.

J. R. Piland and C. F. Ireland, the two scientists honored, have conducted intensive investigations on the failure of alfalfa to maintain satisfactory stands and to set seed.

The Journal of the American Society of Agronomy in its October issue carries a report from the two men, pointing out that growers of alfalfa in North Carolina have experienced for many years low yields due to boron deficiency and poor initial stands. Also, it was explained, there was a steady diminishing of the stand from year to year.

SPECIAL MEET IS CALLED FOR JAPANESE DIET

New Indications Government Preparing For Crisis

SPECIAL ENVOY NOW IN HAWAII

Among New Laws To Be Presented At Extraordinary Session Is One Sharply Increasing Taxes

Tokyo, Nov. 13.—(AP)—New emergency legislation was made ready today for a special session of the Japanese Diet amid indications that the government was preparing for a crisis should negotiations with the United States collapse.

(Saburo Kurosu, special Japanese envoy, has reached Honolulu en route to the United States for renewed discussions of the situation in the Far East.)

Premier General Tojo, Foreign Minister Tojo, and Finance Minister Kaya were received by the Emperor, to whom they submitted the speeches they will make to the Diet and the new laws they will introduce at the session starting Saturday.

Among the new laws is a new tax program which would increase, and in some cases double, indirect taxes on what are regarded as luxuries. The cabinet approved the program at an extraordinary session earlier today.

Sudden revival of the Imperial Rule Assistance Association, a Fascist-like organization begun by former Premier Prince Fumimaro Konoye, and growing concern over air defenses indicated the new atmosphere.

INCREASE FUND FOR ORPH'AGE

Methodists Vote To Levy Six Pct. Apportionment

Durham, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The North Carolina Methodist Conference voted today to increase revenues of the Methodist orphanage in Raleigh by levying a six per cent apportionment on revenues raised by churches of the conference.

Shortly thereafter, the conference decided to accept the invitation of St. Paul's Church of Goldsboro that the conference meet there in 1942.

In voting to increase revenues of the Raleigh institution which cares for about 300 children, the conference rejected a recommendation of the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes that the apportionment for the orphanage be 15 per cent of pastors' salaries.

The report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes said that due to an increase in the number of children, and due also to the increased cost of living the old financial plan for paying operating expenses of the orphanage is no longer adequate.

Dr. Frank S. Hickman of Duke University, will preach at worship services this afternoon. The Methodist orphanage banquet was scheduled for later in the afternoon.

At ordination ceremonies tonight several young ministers will be ordained deacons and elders. Dr. R. M. Andrews of Greensboro will deliver the ordination sermon.

MAYOR ISSUES PROCLAMAT'N

Calls On Citizens To Observe Thanksgiving Day

Mayor B. B. Sugg today issued a formal Thanksgiving Day proclamation, calling upon the citizens of this community "to gather about their firesides and in their respective places of worship on that day to humble themselves and render thanks to God for all His blessings."

Greenville, along with North Carolina and most other states are observing Thanksgiving, November 20, as Thanksgiving Day this year, instead of the last Thursday in November. President Roosevelt, however, has decreed that next year the nation will go back to the later date.

A general holiday will be observed throughout the country and business in Greenville is expected to come to a complete standstill for the day.

Mayor Sugg's proclamation follows: "Once again that season of the year comes around when our hearts have been gathered in, and like our forefathers, we begin to count our blessings and stir ourselves to thankfulness."

"The year fast coming to a close gives occasion for unusual thanksgiving. Our fields have brought forth another bountiful harvest of increasing varieties, till no man need want for food or fuel. Millions have found employment this year who were on relief for some years in the past. Farmer and merchant, business man and laborer have been well remunerated for all service. Our land has been spared the scourge of plague, and the horrors of war so far, in comparison with other lands across the seas. Unity and cooperation of our citizens are most gratifying in the effort to preserve peace. And the blessings of democracy, the heritage of our fathers, that have given 'life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness' undisturbed and unafraid, stir the hearts of all true patriots."

"All these, and a thousand unnamed blessings, call us to render thanks and acknowledge Him from whom life, and all its bounties have come."

"Therefore, as mayor of the city of Greenville, N. C., I proclaim Thanksgiving to Almighty God for His protection and for the blessings of the past year; uniting with the cities and communities of this great commonwealth of North Carolina in calling upon our citizens to gather about their firesides and in their respective places of worship on that day to humble themselves and render thanks to God for all His blessings. Victory Claimed By Rayburn Even Following Action Yesterday When Several Administration Votes Swung Over To Bloc Opposed To Easing Restrictions In Measure

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The House, by a vote of 212 to 194, today scrapped the neutrality act bans against arming merchant ships and sending them into combat zones.

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's prestige in matters of foreign policy hung precariously in the balance today, as a tense and closely divided House drove hourly nearer to a vote on the Senate's broad formula for neutrality act revision.

"A photo finish," concluded Rep. McCormack, Massachusetts, the House majority leader, after an industrious week-long canvass of members.

Republican opponents, reinforced by disaffected Democrats, were openly optimistic. "We have this bill licked," they claim.

Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex) who wove a worried look as administration votes swung over to the opposition yesterday, still insisted, however, that when the final roll call came, the House would approve the Senate revision amendments allowing American merchant men to go to belligerent ports and operate in combat zones.

Nevertheless, Rayburn disclosed that he intended to take the floor himself in behalf of the legislation—an extremely unusual thing for the speaker—and he was closeted with Mr. Roosevelt for an hour last night at the White House, reviewing the whole neutrality situation.

From what Rayburn said, the decision was to have the vote late today at the conclusion of the re-opening three hours of debate. The speaker dismissed "under present plans"—the idea of deferring the final roll call until absentee members could be rounded up—a possibility that was much mentioned at the end of yesterday's session.

To Hold Examinat'ns For Welfare Offices

According to Dr. Frank T. de Vyver, merit system supervisor, examinations will be given on Saturday, December 6, for professional positions under the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare and the County Welfare Departments.

This date has been set early in order to avoid conflict with the rush of work usually expected in the Welfare Departments around Christmas time, and in order to allow people in the Welfare Departments to attend the annual meetings of the American Public Welfare Association.

Examinations will be given in Asheville, Charlotte, Durham, Elizabeth City, Fayetteville, Greensboro, Morganton, New Bern, Raleigh, Wilmington, Wilson, and Winston-Salem. Within ten days or two weeks applicants will receive their admission slips to the examination. These admission slips will contain information as to the time, center, and place of the examination. When the admission slips are received, the applicants are expected to attach a photograph in the indicated place, before appearing at the examination center.

Thus far, some 2,500 requests for information have been received and answered. Almost 1,500 people have submitted a total of 1,800 applications blanks.

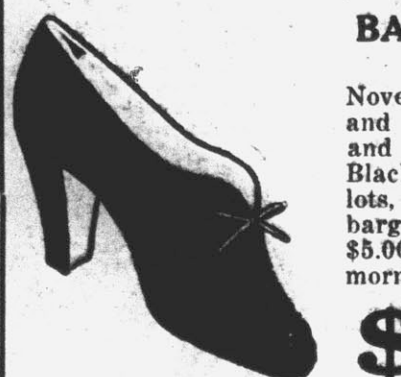

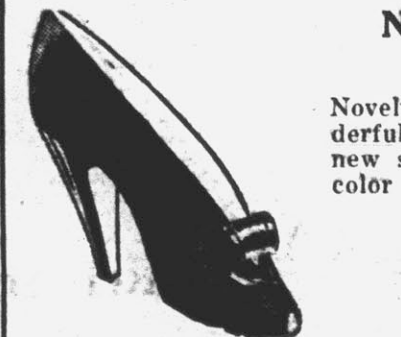

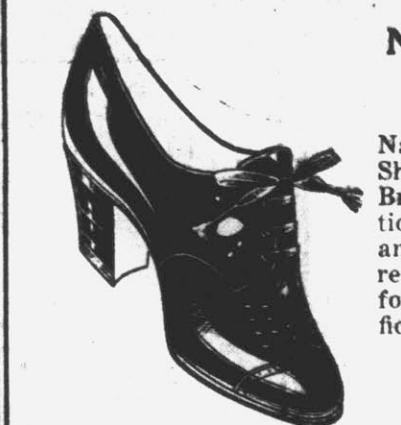

A GREAT MAN

Thongs cheered Honor-
able Josephus Daniels as he
led the Armistice Day par-
ade here Tuesday, more
than two thousand persons
filled the college auditorium
to hear his masterful ad-
dress and others listening
over the radio thrilled at his
words. Since Tuesday hun-
dreds of our people have
told local American Legion
officials how much they en-
joyed Mr. Daniels' address
and how proud they were
that he had paid our com-
munity the honor of being its
Armistice Day speaker.

In view of all the words of
praise we have heard for
Mr. Daniels since his appear-
ance here we are sure that
our people will be interested
in what people of another
state think of him, as set
forth in the following com-
ment from the Atlanta Con-
stitution written by Ralph
McGill:

Josephus Daniels, one of the great-
est and firmest of men, has re-
signed as our Ambassador to Mex-
ico, and it seems to me his passing
from the official scene merits more
than a casual editorial commen-
tation, no matter how sincere it may
be.

He will be 80 years old next May.
He resigns, not for idleness and rest
but for the arduous task of com-
pleting his memoirs, two volumes
of which already have been pub-
lished. They are "Tar Heel Editor"
and "Editor in Politics."

Those two books are excellent
reading for anyone interested in
the American scene. Josephus Dan-
iels has seen almost 80 years of it.
When an intelligent, observing re-
porter puts down what he has seen
and gives his interpretations, it is
an important work. When he has
been a part of it, as Josephus Dan-
iels has been, it is even more im-
portant.

His two books will not thrill you,
but they will hold your interest as
the panorama of the American

scene unfolds before you. It is a
fine, clean picture of that scene. He
was a newspaper editor, and a good
one. He fought for the people. He
opposed corruption in politics. He
exposed it, too. There were those
who hated him for it, but he didn't
mind that.

He had a great part in establish-
ing a firm foundation for education
in North Carolina. That is why
education in that state is on a sounder
basis than in any other Southern
state. There is none of the cheap,
dishonest and unpatriotic under-
mining of schools by cheap men such
as we now are witnessing in Georgia.

North Carolina has never had a
demagogue. She has had a few un-
worthy politicians, such as "Our
Bob" Reynolds. But she has never
had a demagogue. One reason why
is her schools.

North Carolina, with the oldest
state university in the nation, has
an affection for it and would not
permit what has happened in Geor-
gia. Georgia's university was char-
tered first, but North Carolina built
one and had it in operation some
time before Georgia was able to
build one.

On visits to Mexico I asked many
questions about Josephus Daniels.
The Mexicans spoke of him as a
"May Symptomatic Caballero."

They said it with affection and
with sincerity.

That means he was a person of
sympathy and of character. It
meant he had won them.

That was one of the finest accom-
plishments of any American ad-
dresser anywhere and at any time.
He succeeded Dwight Morrow
Morrow was there in the days of
Morrow. He did a fair job. The
Mexicans knew him to be a repre-
sentative of a great power. He was
an improvement on what they had
been used to having. He worked at
being a good fellow.

But Dwight Morrow never once
scratched the surface when it came
to solving any of the problems which
made relations between the two
countries difficult. He left them
un-solved.

Josephus Daniels came in with
two strikes already called on him.
He had been Secretary of the
Navy when Vera Cruz was bomb-
arded and occupied. The Mexicans re-
sented that. The hostile Nazi
press and the hostile Mexican press
resented that issue.

Josephus Daniels moved in. He
was quiet, gentle, firm.
But Mexicans soon found out here
was a real man.

He understood they had problems
and he understood they had rights.
He represented the big neighbor but
he didn't represent some of the big
pressures of the north. He wanted
to understand Mexicans. And their
problem.

Daniels was there during the de-
pression years of this country. He
was there when the Cardenas gov-
ernment took over the oil fields of
Mexico.

I could not attempt to weigh the
rights and wrongs of that question.
No one person can.

Josephus Daniels took the position
that the whole history of Mexi-
can oil was a not pretty one, and
that neither side had clean hands.
He found enough in the situation
to refuse to recommend that this country
intervene. He withstood the most
tremendous pressure.

He took the position that the land
belonged to Mexico and the oil in
it. It was up to the United States
and to Mexico to work out a plan
of paying the owners.

That is being done.
He was there at the time of the
pressures exerted during the Alma-
zan-Camacho election, in which cer-
tain American interests selfishly
and unsuccessfully sought to use
money and influence to turn the

election. Josephus Daniels prevent-
ed it.

He remained during the difficult
years. He demonstrated that the
phrase "good neighbor" was not
just a phrase. He was a good neigh-
bor and he made this country one.

He leaves a job, always a head-
ache, with a record of diplomacy in
Latin affairs which is unequalled.
He began his public service as a
clerk under President Grover
Cleveland.

He has never sought office. He has
served his country long, honestly
and well. He is not merely a great
Southerner but a great American.
In thinking about a great man you
may use him as a yardstick. Many
of those who claim the mantle of
greatness are as pygmies beside him.

Washington Daybook

By Jack Stinnett

(The fate of some 185,000
small factories and about 2,000-
000 workers rests with OPM's
new contract distribution divi-
sion and its director, Floyd B.
Odum. In two articles, Jack
Stinnett, Washington columnist
for The Reflector, describes the
man and tells what he is trying
to do to solve this problem.)

Washington—There are people in
Washington who tell you that
"Little Od" (Floyd Bostwick Odum)
is going to be the goat in one
of national defense's greatest fail-
ures—the failure to spread defense
contracts over the nation's small in-
dustries. There are others who say:
Just wait until Od cracks down.

There you have it. As director
of the Office of Production Man-
agement's two-month-old divi-
sion of contract distribution, this slight
way man who was one of the great-

est, if not THE greatest, financiers
spawned by the depression, will
either emerge as the savior of small
manufacturing or fizzle out in solv-
ing the biggest problem which has
come out of national defense.

Floyd Odum was born in Union
City, Mich., in 1892, one of five
children. His father was a Meth-
odist minister—typical of the clergy
that had "one foot in Heaven" and
hands groping often around an al-
most empty ladder. When his fam-
ily moved to Colorado, Floyd went
to the university and came out of
it with a law degree and \$5. With
the \$5 he bought a bargain railroad
ticket to Salt Lake City for no other
reason he can recall now than
that it was a bargain. With the
law degree, he got a \$50-a-month

After setting the new Bern Bears back 33-0 in last Friday's game the Greens have been sent through stiff workouts all this week by Coach Farley.

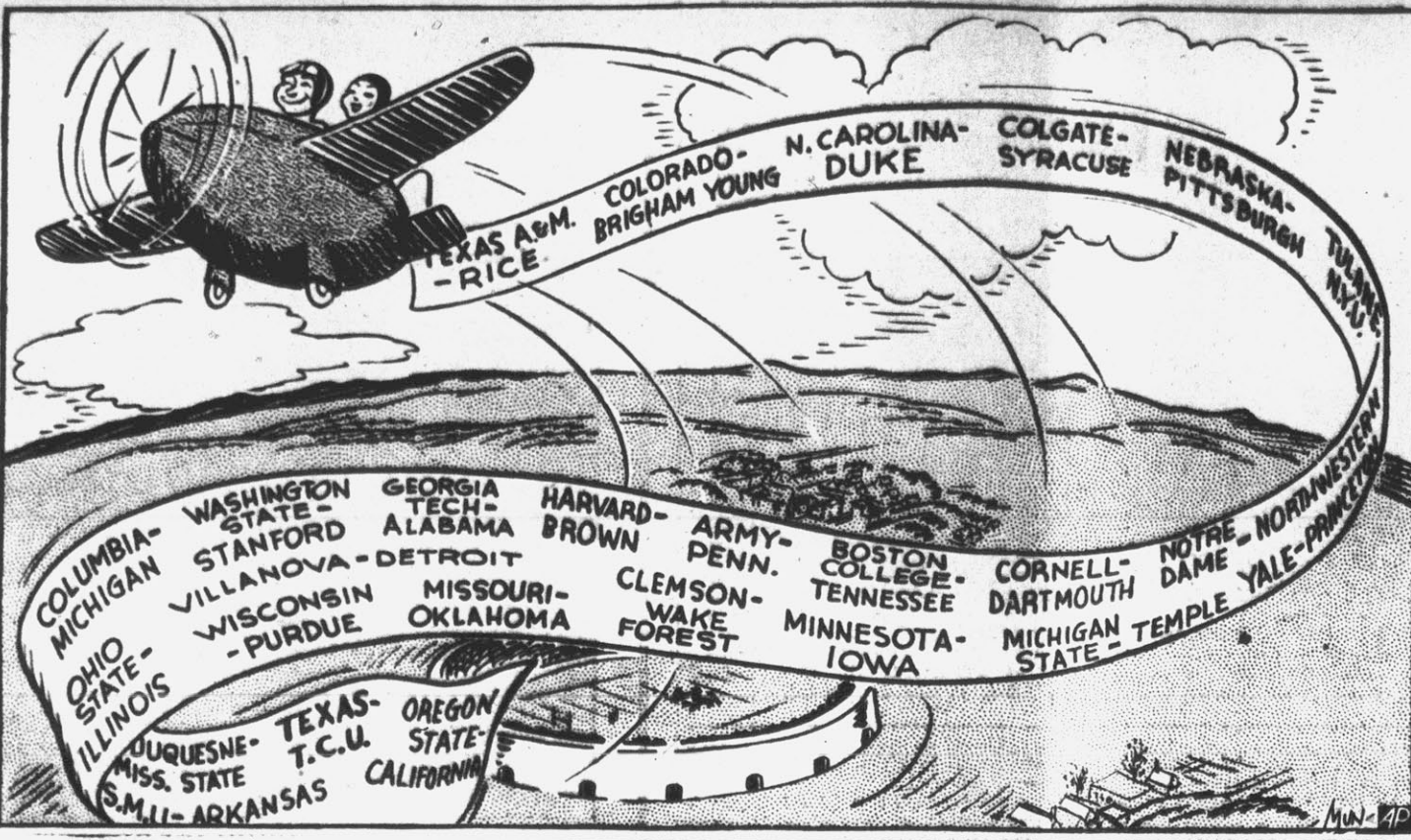

Current Agricultural Problems Are Discussed

In session yesterday afternoon the Pitt County Agricultural Workers Council considered a number of current problems related to agriculture.

The Council, composed of representatives of the various agricultural agencies in the county, emphasized the importance of the drive announced by Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard to

portance of the farmer checking over the farm machinery now and ordering new parts or repairing broken parts where needed. By going over the equipment on the farm now producers may avoid losses next spring and summer. The government is striving to have sufficient equipment and repair parts available for agricultural use but the pressing need for steel and other metal for guns, ships and the like may cause delay and shortages in the near future. The word now is "prepare your machinery for the coming year while you can."

The next item of business on the program was the importance of organizing an "over all" Agricultural Fair and Planning Program. Committee of farmers who represent each and every local neighborhood in the county. The townships have already been broken down in to local neighborhoods to insure, in an election meeting to be held next week, that representation will be elected from each neighborhood in the county.

After the election of the Agricultural Planning Committees the committees will go into the planning of the kind of agricultural program the farm people want for themselves—beginning from the ground up. These committees composed of men and women will be voluntary leaders planning their

own programs in a truly democratic way.

The Agricultural Workers Council proposed that an Achievement Day program be held at which time the farm families who signed up with the Food and Feed Production Campaign to produce at least 75 per cent of the food and feed needed on the farm would be presented with a certificate of recognition signed by the governor of the state of North Carolina.

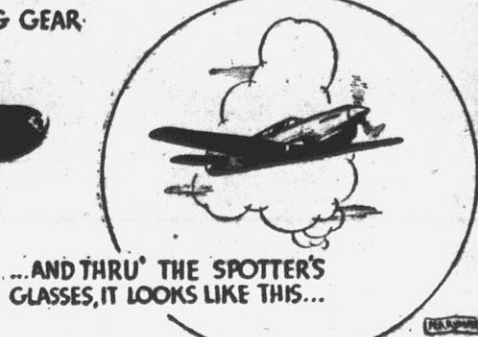

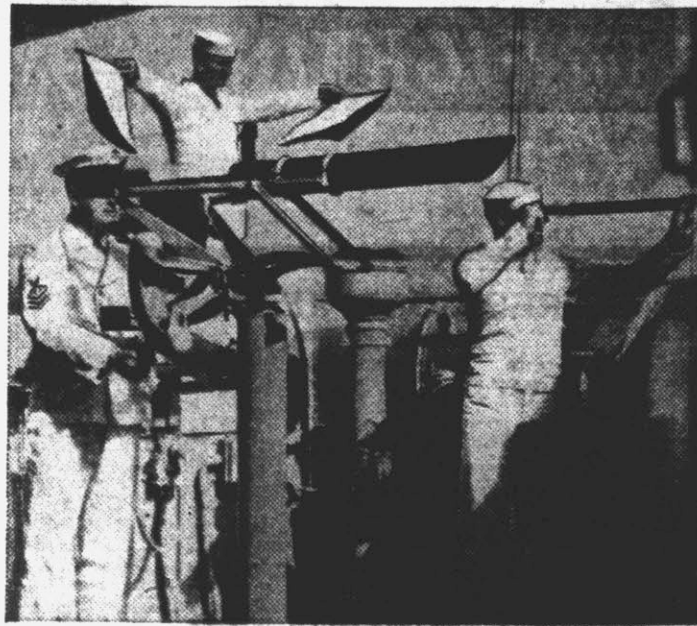

justify it. He was unsuccessful and finally the matter was brought to the attention of former Governor Hoey.

Upon being apprized of the facts Governor Hoey immediately ordered the practice stopped, called for an accounting and gave his personal check for \$433.20 to the prison department in payment of the bill. For four years all the mansion groceries came from the same stores that furnished the average citizen. Soon thereafter Robert Grady

Johnson, then prison director, gave orders that superintendents and others who had been buying supplies from the prison at wholesale rates must stop.

Johnson was succeeded by Pitts in May. The records show that the prison began supplying certain groceries to the mansion a few weeks thereafter. Pitts and at least two of his men about that time became regular "customers" of the prison's "grocery store"—although they pay for all they get.

Under the present system, the record shows, the mansion gets eggs, milk, butter, vegetables, ham, bacon and products raised on the prison farm for nothing. It has also been getting some groceries, such as sugar, for which the prison paid. One check for \$36.59 in payment for these items has been received from the mansion, according to the books.

Asked how he justified the resumption of the practice, Chairman Ben Price of the Highway Commission, who is Pitts' immediate superior, said "It has not been established as a practice yet....I am

going to look into it."

He added that although the practice had been going on for months, he knew little or nothing about it until recently when the auditing department informed him that it was carrying on its "accounts receivable" an unpaid grocery bill against the mansion. Price then arranged for the payment of the \$36.20 to reimburse the prison for money it had paid out. What to do about the remainder and steadily increasing account, he had not decided. In the meantime, it is still being carried on the books.

When Pitts was asked how he justified the practice, he said that he thought it was all right for the prison to send farm produce to the mansion because several prisoners are working there as the Governor's servants. He said that he had understood that the highway attorney, past highway officials and the former Governor considered the practice illegal but that he considered it justified as the prison's contribution to feeding the prisoner-servants. The mansion does not pay the

prison for the services of the prisoner-servants although the prison system does receive from the highway division \$1 a day for prisoners who work on roads.

"It's not enough to amount to anything," said Pitts. "And there's nothing new about it. Until Hoey came along it had been going on for years."

The records of the grocery transactions between prison and mansion are not complete, it was learned at the department's auditing office. All invoices have not been received. For the first two and a half months the total reached \$130.86. Auditor Sam Smith said that he was calling on the prison to bring the account up to date.

According to the law, the state is to furnish the Governor with a mansion and servants necessary to staff it. Some of these are paid some are prisoners. The state also furnishes the Governor's car, pays his drivers, provides \$1,500 a year for "public entertainment," \$600 for travel and pays him \$10,500 a year in salary.

It is a fact that the expenses of being Governor exceed the remuneration in money and prerequisites and that the majority of Governors during the last 40 years have lost money while in office. It has been suggested that a bill be presented to the legislature, authorizing the prison to furnish supplies to the mansion. But at present, according to the highway commission's own legal department, there has been found "no justification" for the practice recently resumed.

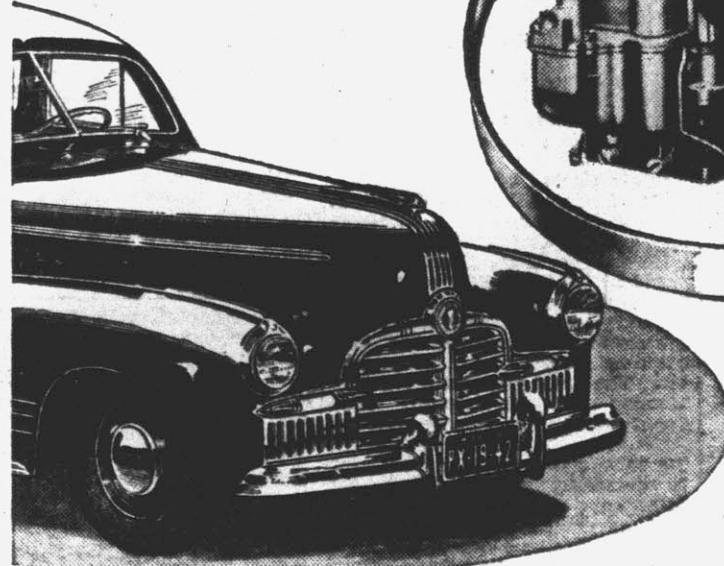

(Continued From Page One) road strike caused extreme concern to the country's shippers as well as to the administration.

The five operating brotherhoods, representing 350,000 workers, decided to walk out progressively December 7, 8 and 9 in support of their demands for a 30 per cent wage boost.

Fourteen unions of non-operating employees, representing 900,000 workers in the railroad industry, issued a joint statement today rejecting the recommendations of the president's emergency board for settlement of their wage dispute.

The statement did not contain a direct threat of a strike, although non-operating employees authorized their leaders last September 5 to call one, and the five big operating brotherhoods have ordered a walkout to begin December 7.

The projected telephone strike, set to begin at midnight tomorrow, would tie up long distance lines in 32 states.

This union announced, however, that it would "maintain a sufficient force to keep open all news channels." This would include the trans-

mission of news and photographs by wire. John J. Moran, president of the Independent Federation of Long Lines Telephone Workers, said the decision to call a walkout of 15,000 workers followed a meeting with the U. S. Conciliation Service and representatives of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company to discuss the union's demand for a four per cent wage boost and narrowing of geographic differentials in pay.

There still appeared to be a chance the strike would be averted if the dispute was certified to the National Defense Mediation Board.
