Moscow Defenses Endangered At Volokolamsk

SOVIET PAPER ADMITS CRISIS

Although Invaders Admitted To Have Driven Closer To Russian Capital, Soviet Resistance Continues To Keep Nazis From Turning Flanks; Heavy Toll Claimed In Soviet Rostov Successes

Moscow, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Massive German attacks near Volokolamsk, 65 miles northwest of Moscow, endangered outer Russian defenses to the capital today.

The newspaper Izvestia admitted the situation of Soviet troops in this sector was "aggravated."

Resistance to the expanding German drive was continuing, however, Izvestia said. In the last 10 days the Germans have failed to turn the flanks protecting Moscow, although they have driven closer. Pravda, the Communist party organ, added.

Izvestia described the German offensive near Volokolamsk, one of the many spearheads aimed at Moscow, as "furious."

In one action, the Germans threw six tank and five infantry divisions into the drive against the Soviet lines. Izvestia reported. The Germans sought to encircle the Russians and push them back into a lake, the newspaper added. "But Soviet resistance thwarted this plan."

In a review of the Russian counter-attacks which Soviet officials reported had pushed the Germans back 70 miles in the Rostov area, Pravda said over 10,000 Germans were killed and wounded.

More than 50 tanks, 400 trucks, 130 guns and 88 machineguns were captured and 50 planes brought down, Pravda's correspondent continued. In addition, he said, 85 machine guns, 10 mine-throwers, batteries, 70 guns, 1380 trucks and 115 tanks were destroyed.

Josephus Daniels Successor Chosen

Washington, Nov. 27.—(AP)—George M. Messersmith of Delaware, now Ambassador to Cuba, was nominated by President Roosevelt today to be Ambassador to Mexico.

Messersmith, a career diplomat, would succeed Josephus Daniels who resigned recently because of his wife's ill health.

Messersmith, who has been Ambassador to Cuba since January 12, 1940, has a long and distinguished career in the American foreign service. He served as Assistant Secretary of State from July, 1937, until he went to Havana.

Decorate Streets For 1941 Holiday

The annual task of putting up the Christmas street decorations got under way this morning under the direction of Mrs. Cora S. Powell, executive secretary of the Greenville Merchants Association, and with the cooperation of the Utilities Commission.

All light poles on the white way are being wrapped with mountain laurel and the light globes covered with red cellophane paper so they will show up as colored lights. The only decorated lights to be used will be at Five Points.

VOTE GRANTED TO CHURCHILL

Government Bolstered By New Vote of Confidence

London, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The Churchill government, bolstered today by a new vote of confidence, voiced belief that Germany, seeking respite from the war in Russia, was shaping a peace offensive through the expanded anti-Comintern pact.

But in the same breath, the government, speaking through Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, served notice that the German move would not affect by "one jot" the determination of Britain and her allies to carry the war to a victorious conclusion.

The House of Commons overwhelmingly squelched a move by the four-man Independent Labor party to unseat the Churchill government and in debate covered virtually every phase of government operations, including conduct of the war.

Determines Rates On Tobacco Loans

Washington, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The Agriculture Department announced today rates at which it would make loans to growers on the 1941 crops of burley, fire-cured and dark air-cured types of tobacco.

The loans, which are designed to support producer prices, will be made to farmers through cooperative associations and other agencies.

The average loan rates, which were said to equal 85 per cent of parity prices for the tobacco, were: Fire-cured—type 21, 10.9 cents a pound; type 22, 10.4 cents; type 23, 7.8 cents; and type 24, 8.3 cents.

Dark air-cured—type 35, 7.4 cents a pound, and type 36, 8.1 cents. Burley—type 31, 20 cents a pound. Rates for sun-cured, Maryland, clear filler, and cigar binder types of tobacco, all of which are marketed later in the season, will be announced later. Rates for fire-cured were announced several weeks ago.

Conviction Of Batson Upheld by High Court

A. S. Batson, well known here, where he was employed by the local ABC Board and County Commissioners several years ago for special detective work, yesterday lost his appeal to the State Supreme Court from an eight-months sentence imposed for battery by Judge Hunt Parker in Wilmington last May.

The crime, as defined by the solicitor, means to "strut up and excite divers quarrels, strikes, suits and controversies among the honest and quiet citizens of this state."

United States Basic Principles For Maintaining Peace And Security Outlined To Japanese Envoys; Terms Stated by Sec. Hull In Direct Contrast To Off-Repeat-Nipponese Policies

Washington, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The United States put the issue of peace or war in the Pacific squarely up to the Japanese government today. It was for Japan to accept or reject the formula of basic principles which the United States considered essential to the maintenance of peace and security in the Far East.

And those basic principles, in their application, would be diametrically opposed to the off-repeated policies which Tokyo officials have proclaimed for "the greater East Asia co-prosperity sphere" that Japan envisages.

Relations between the United States and Japan reached this critical juncture late yesterday after seven months of almost continuous diplomatic negotiations had failed to find common ground for the settlement of existing differences.

Secretary of State Hull met the impasse by presenting a formal restatement of the American government's position to Admiral Nomura, the Japanese ambassador, and Saburo Kurosu, special Japanese envoy.

The restatement of basic principles was accompanied by recommendations for their practical application by Japan in the Orient. Practical application, it was said, would involve abandonment of a program of aggression, withdrawal of troops from China and French Indo-China, and the inauguration of a peaceful economic policy.

The Japanese envoys were understood to have cabled the document to Tokyo during the night, together with their own reports on their extended conversations with President Roosevelt and Secretary Hull.

Washington, Nov. 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, Secretary of State Hull and Japanese envoys will meet this afternoon in an aftermath of Hull's step last night, putting the issue of peace or war in the Pacific squarely up to the Japanese government.

Special importance was attached to the White House meeting in view of the State Department announcement that basic American proposals for adjusting long-standing problems with Japan had been handed Admiral Nomura, Japanese ambassador, and Saburo Kurosu, the special Japanese envoy.

The White House would give no details as to the reasons underlying today's conference.

Secretary Hull's attitude on the matter was flat.

OPERATORS OF CAPTIVE MINES INTERROGATED

Asked By Board If They Will Accept Its Findings

TWO REPORTED NON-COMMITTAL

General Strike Situation Throughout The Country Meanwhile Reported To Be Showing Improvement

(By The Associated Press) The special arbitration board named by President Roosevelt to settle the union shop issue in captive coal mines of the nation's major steel companies today asked the companies whether they would accept the board's findings as final after reports were published that two steel firms had not agreed to accept them.

Dr. John R. Steelman, board chairman and the public's representative, telegraphed executives of nine steel companies asking them to reaffirm or clarify their position with respect to the case and to say if they wished to appear before the board.

Published reports said Republic Steel Corporation and the National Steel Corporation had not agreed to abide by the arbitration board's future decision.

In general, the labor situation seemed improved. A jurisdictional strike of AFL machinists in the St. Louis area was ended and another special presidential fact-finding board held a preliminary meeting with Mr. Roosevelt before opening new hearings in Washington on a threatened nation-wide strike by railroad employees.

Wayne L. Morse, dean of the board chairman, would not say what Oregon University Law School, the members discussed with the President.

So far as he knew, Morse said, the board would hold public sessions beginning tomorrow morning and would grant each side in the dispute one day to testify.

There was a threat of a west coast shipyard workers strike, after a meeting of 1,500 men employed in Los Angeles shipyards last night, but normal day shifts showed up this morning.

Only One Dead In Two Train Wrecks

(By The Associated Press) Two fast Atlantic Coast Line passenger trains, southbound from New York to Florida, derailed within the same hour early today near Hixson, Ga., and Dover, Fla., killing one person and injuring 20.

A middle-aged man tentatively identified by a social security card as John Carroll, address undetermined, was crushed to death when the streamlined Tamaqua Champion left the tracks south of Hixson, spilling seven cars into the marshy land near Satilla river.

Doctors waded knee deep in roadbed ditches to reach 12 injured passengers in the Champion for emergency treatment, then rushed them to the ACL hospital at Waycross.

Shortly before the 6 a. m. Champion wreck, the Havana Special was derailed just after leaving Dover, near Tampa, Fla., injuring eight persons, only two of whom required hospitalization. The locomotive and all seven cars left the rails, but only three cars overturned.

Scenes of the two wrecks, in southwest Georgia's turpentine belt and on the Florida west coast, are approximately 300 miles apart.

There was no evidence of sabotage in either wreck, E. B. Rush, superintendent of transportation in the railroad's Southern Division offices, said in Jacksonville, Fla.

PRICE CONTROL SUB DEFEATED

Administration Victorious In First Encounter

Washington, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Victorious over a much broader substitute proposal, the administration-backed price control bill found new difficulties ahead today as House groups lined up for an attempt to force the legislation back to committee for additional study and perhaps drastic revision.

There was a temporary lull in the actual battle for the House was celebrating the second Thanksgiving Day with a recess. This postponed until Friday a vote on whether the measure should carry a clause empowering the government to buy and sell commodities to keep their prices stable. The administration favors such a provision.

The pending bill weathered its first test yesterday by a margin of 218 to 63, when the House crushed an attempt to substitute stringent control of all prices, rents and wages for the administration plan of imposing price ceilings on only those commodities whose prices got out of line.

But important opposition was brewing on two important points. The Republicans were dead set against a proposal to license dealers handling regulated commodities, and representatives of farm states did not favor the omission of wage control. This double dissatisfaction evoked speculation on the possibility of a coalition drive for recommitment.

The Rev. Mr. Ferguson was ordained December 3, 1940, by Bishop Darst at services in the local Episcopal church. Since he has served as rector of the Clinton church and priest-in-charge of Grace church, Whiteville, and St. Gabriel's, Faison. He also has assisted with services in Jacksonville.

Rev. John Armfield, rector of the Greenville Episcopal church, read the litany at today's services and the ordination sermon was delivered by Rev. W. Tate Young, Fayetteville rector.

The Rev. Mr. Ferguson prepared for the priesthood by attending General Theological Seminary in New York City, Duke Divinity School, and the University of the South Theological School at Seawane, Tenn. He is a member of Sigma Nu social fraternity.

He is the son of Mrs. E. B. Ferguson and the late Mr. Ferguson. He is the grandson of the late Mrs. Hattie C. Skinner of Greenville, for many years a leading churchwoman in the diocese.

END IS IN SIGHT FOR MANEUVER

Blue Army Pushes Toward Success Over Red Forces

With the First Army in the Carolinas, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Soldiers of the Blue First Army kept up their pressure on the out-numbered Red Fourth Corps today, hoping as they pushed forward in their advance that the order to "cease firing" would end the maneuver at any moment.

This hope for an end to the intensive field training of the last eight weeks was emphasized by the celebration of one regiment last night of a false "armistice report," a celebration that recalled the premature armistice day joy-making of 1918.

The general expectation, however, was that the maneuver between Lieut. General Hugh A. Drum's Blue Army of 200,000 or more men and Major General Oscar W. Griswold's Red force of 100,000 including mechanized and motorized divisions, would be ended today or tonight, but there was no word from Army General Headquarters, which is in charge of the operation, on that point.

Continuing Blue successes on the ground and in the air were claimed by the latest of General Drum's communications. The First Corps, commanded by Major General Charles Thompson, and the second by Major General Lloyd R. Pritchard, were reported advancing in an effort to encircle the Red forces.

Col. William E. Kepner's air forces were praised for doing an "excellent job in pinning Red aviation to the ground."

Members Of Two Forces Join Hands

New Zealand Force, Supported by British Tanks, Smashes On Northward To Join Garrison After Recapturing Rezegh En Route; British Acknowledge Nazi Thrust Across Border Into Egypt

Cairo, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The seven-months siege of Tobruk, one of history's most dramatic, appeared ended today as the British command announced that a relief column, which had recaptured the bloody battleground of Rezegh en route, had joined hands this morning with the Tobruk garrison.

New Zealand forces, supported by tanks, smashed northward to meet a column from the conglomerate Tobruk defenders this morning, a communiqué said.

The great tank and infantry battle swirled through its 10th day with both sides throwing in new reserves. The main battle still apparently was about Rezegh, 10 miles south of Tobruk, but was spreading far to the East into Egypt, where the British fought to wipe out an Axis column which drove across the frontier yesterday.

Here is the official British account of the relief of Tobruk: "During the night of November 25-26 New Zealand forces, supported by British tank formations, recaptured Rezegh and occupied El Bir El Hemed in the face of heavy opposition."

"Stiff fighting continued in that area throughout yesterday and it was not until early this morning that elements of the relieving forces were able to join hands at Ed Duda with the British force from Tobruk which yesterday captured that important locality."

(Available maps do not show Ed Duda, but evidently it lies between Rezegh and Tobruk.)

It was here that the most critical battle of the offensive developed as British tanks clashed with German forces. The town was taken, lost and re-taken again as the heavy fighting swayed along the desert.

The British admitted that part of the Axis raiding party which thrust across the Egyptian frontier in the Sidi Omar sector, apparently to divert British forces from the main battle, still was operating on Egyptian soil.

The RAF supported the land forces by heavy attacks on German and Italian concentrations west of Rezegh, where several tanks and transport vehicles were destroyed, the communiqué said.

Keen Competition In State For Mayflower Cup

Raleigh, Nov. 27.—There are 48 books, all written by North Carolinians and published last year, entered in the contest for the Mayflower cup which will be awarded December 5.

The award of the cup, generally recognized as being the highest state honor a North Carolina writer can win within the state, will be made at the annual meeting of the State Literary and Historical Association. Never before have there been as many books eligible for the prize. Last year, for instance, there were 23.

There is a better than average chance, according to those who keep in touch with Tar Heels' literary efforts, that this year the cup will be won by the father of a previous winner, Josephus Daniels, whose son, Jonathan won with "A Southerner Discovers the South" three years ago, has his "Editor in Politics" entered.

The competition, however, will be stiff. Fiction, history, biography, social studies and poetry are included among the entries. The authors include Katharine Newland Burt, W. W. Anderson, Legette Blythe, Bernice Kelly Harris, a previous winner, W. J. Cash, Archibald Henderson, also a previous winner, and others prominent in their fields. Judges will be Phillips Russell of

Chapel Hill, William T. Polk and J. Edward Allen of Warrenton, and David A. Lockmiller and Lodwick C. Harney of State College. The cup will be presented by Macon R. Dunnagan, member of the Society of Mayflower Descendants which gives the cup.

The Mayflower Society Cup contest was instituted in 1930 and the first award was made in 1931. The large silver cup was provided by the Society of Mayflower Descendants in North Carolina, and was placed in the Hall of History. Past winners have been: M. C. S. Noble, Archibald Henderson, Rupert B. Vance, Erich W. Zimmermann, and Mitchell B. Garrett, all University of North Carolina professors; Richard R. Washington Daybook

By Jack Stinson

Washington — It isn't discussed
publicly but I can assure you that
the government is out now to build
some buildings so they won't last.
These are the temporary build-
ings designed to take care of the
vast overflow of government work-
ers here to see that the nation's
defense program moves constantly
forward.

The idea of constructing tempo-
rary buildings so they will be tem-
porary and nothing more is not the
wish of any contractor out to make
a pot of cash off the government.
It comes right down from Mr.
Roosevelt himself. As a matter of
fact the plan of building "tempo-
rary" office buildings so they will fall
down about the time the emergency
is over, isn't something that the
President has just thought up for
the present emergency, either. He
has had this idea for nearly a quar-
ter of a century.

The two most famous "tempo-
rary" buildings in Washington are
the Navy and Munitions buildings
occupying a generous portion of the
War Department. Only three-story
buildings, twin structures they
stretch for blocks along Constitu-
tion Avenue and are an eye-sore to
the Mall. The Mall could be the
most beautifully landscaped, green-
est of roadways in the world. At
its east end is Capitol Hill. At its
west, a couple of miles away are
the Washington monument and the
Lincoln Memorial and between
them the long Reflecting Pool. A
network of roads leads from one
end of the Mall to the other and
flanking these streets are the vast
departmental and other govern-
mental buildings.

Some are old, some are ugly,
some are impressive—all save those squat
little "temporary" buildings that
were built up during World War I
and have remained ever since. They

are as conspicuous as an out-of-
step West Pointer in a newsreel
review.

When they were first planned 21
years ago, young Assistant Sec-
retary of the Navy Franklin D. Roo-
sevelt had the vision to see this.
He wanted the buildings built so
they would fall down in seven or
eight years at most and when no-
body applauded his foresight, he
suggested that they be built on
the south lawn of the White
House. That, he felt, would assure
their temporariness. President Wil-
son objected, not on the wisdom of
making them temporary, but be-
cause he felt that no President
could work with so much noise go-
ing on just outside his window.

There hasn't been the least hint
that President Roosevelt still feels
the same about cluttering up the
south lawn, but there has been
more than a hint that he feels the
same about "temporary" eyesores,
marrying the national capital's
beauty in the years when peace has
come again.

That has the architects and con-
struction engineers fretting over
their plans and it is likely some of
the new temporary structures au-
thorized by Congress will be built
without stone or steel—little more
than elongated shanties that will
fall to the storms or termites be-
fore a decade is two-thirds done.

Under construction now are a se-
ries of new "temporary" buildings in
the morning shadows of the Capitol,
but a block south of the Mall prop-
er. Some of these are to house of-
fices of the Navy. (The Army has
its brand new and pretty new stone
and office building and a good many
other permanent structures around
Washington, but the Navy seems
always to be drawing "temporary")

quarters. These buildings have
concrete but I wouldn't call them
permanent. I don't think the
President would either—or he never
would have okayed the plans.

An interesting sidelight on this
"temporary buildings" business is
just how long does the President

think the buildings will be neces-
sary. You'll never find that out for
certain, but the closest I can get is
something more than five and
something less than ten years.

Disappointment.—One of the
Broughton administration's great-
est disappointments has been the
results, or rather lack of results,
in the highway safety campaign.

Whether or not it is anybody's
fault, the fact remains that in the
five months since the Department
of Motor Vehicles was set up ac-
complishments have been practi-
cally nil. There are two new officials
at desks in Raleigh and 25 more
patrolmen on the road but the
death and accident rate continues
to climb. If Commissioner Bodie
Ward has any comprehensive plan
to combat the situation, he has kept
it to himself.

Causes.—The presence of so many
soldiers, the fact that maneuvers
are going on, the theory that people
are more reckless during these
 hectic days are some of the possi-
ble causes advanced. Courts are
criticized for being too lenient. Con-
ferences have been held between
the commissioner and his 213 offi-
cers. There have been lots of con-
versations but little prevention. And
although he is not making any
statement about it, it is a safe bet
that Governor Broughton is wor-
ried.

Comparisons.—That automobile
accidents can be reduced has been
proven in several other states where
intensive enforcement and educa-
tional campaigns have been con-
ducted. Perhaps the new department
might get some good ideas from

what the Industrial Commission
and the Labor Department have
done in North Carolina industries.

Due in great measure to their ef-
forts, compensation insurance rates
on North Carolina industrial ac-
cidents have been reduced 46.7 per
cent during the last six years. On
the other hand insurance rates
which are based on automobile ac-
cident experience have gone up on
the whole and are due to climb still
higher.

The representative of a company
which does a big business in auto-
mobile collision, fire and theft in-
surance only this week told a state
agency that its company was los-
ing \$22 on every \$100 of North Car-
olina premiums.

Progress.—Although the accident
rate continues to climb, there has
been progress made in the matter of
safety education within the last
week. Dr. J. Henry Highsmith of
the Department of Public Instruc-
tion has written to high school su-
perintendents that credit toward
graduation be given students who
pass courses in safety which meet
certain standards.

That is one thing which Ronald
Hocutt, who has charge of that
phase of the department's work,
has been trying to secure for years.

Plan.—The department also has
a plan which, if undertaken with-
out further delay, may tend to re-
duce criticism and eventually ac-
cidents. Counties are to be organ-
ized for local safety campaigns. Al-
though the details are yet to be an-
nounced, the general idea seems to
be to arouse general interest
through local councils.

Ham Jones.—Three times Hamil-
ton Jones of Charlotte has run for
the Democratic nomination for
Congress and three times he has
been beaten by Representative A.
L. Bulwinkle after a hard fight.
Last time the incumbent got 35,000
and some to 32 plus for Jones. Next
May Ham will make his fourth try
at this time things will be differ-

ranged now that North Carolina is

Civilian Defense Insignia

The Office of Civilian Defense
has released illustrations and spec-
ifications of dimensions, colors, and
materials for 16 different insignia.
Each of the activities in civilian de-
fense, 15 in number, will have a dis-
tinctive design which the volunteer
workers, after they have been en-
rolled and trained, will wear on
white armbands or embroidered on
the left sleeve of uniforms. 1 inch
below the shoulder seam. One of the
insignia is shown below.



NURSES AIDES CORPS

identified by a red cross within
white triangle set in blue circle.
This indicates that the volunteer
has been enrolled and trained by
the Red Cross for service in Civilian
Defense.

Special training by the Red Cross
and by hospitals designated as
Training Centers is necessary be-
fore women volunteers can serve as
Nurses' Aides. Upon the completion
of instruction they will become el-
ligible to assist nurses in wards and
outpatient clinics of hospitals or
in visiting nurse, public health, in-
dustrial hygiene, and school health
services. The insignia must not be
worn until the course has been sat-
isfactorily completed.

The wearing of this insignia is
limited to workers who are enrolled
in the Volunteer Nurses' Aides
Insignia Organization.

DEFENSE BOND QUIZ

Note — To purchase Defense
Bonds and Stamps, go to the
nearest post office or bank, or
write for information to the
Treasurer of the United States,
Washington, D. C. Also Stamps
are now on sale at retail stores.

Q. How does the buying of De-
fense Savings Bonds help to keep
down the cost of living?

A. With increased national in-
come resulting from armament ex-
penditures, more and more earn-
ings are likely to be spent for the
limited supply of consumer goods
available, sending prices up. Wide-
spread buying of Bonds tends to act
as a brake on rising prices by di-
verting to defense uses money
which otherwise would be spent for
consumer goods.

Q. What is the Christmas gift for
almost any purse and purpose?

A. Defense Savings Stamps. Any
quantity desired may be bought in
denominations of 10 cents to \$5 and
put in an album which is provided
with the purchase. These Stamps
are always exchangeable for cash
at their face value.

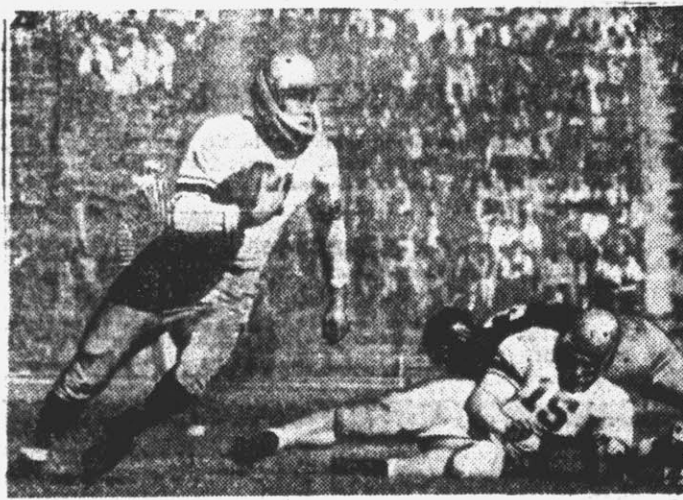

FLEET COP PLAYS DECOY FOR A DOG

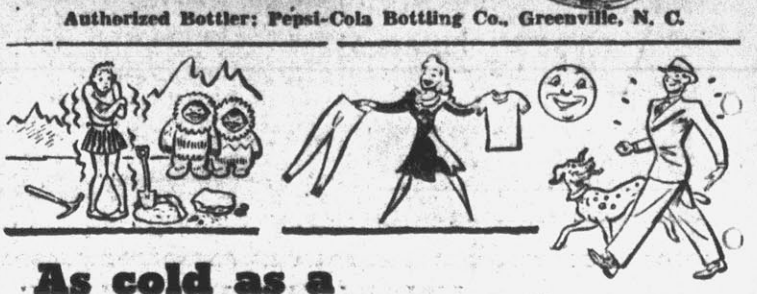

Christmas Employees Must Get Security Cards

Marshall H. Burney, manager of the Rocky Mount field office of the Social Security Board, advised today that all employees who are hired during the holiday season on a temporary basis should make sure to give their employer their Social Security account number card in order that their wages may be properly reported and credited to their individual account. Many people who have not worked before in covered employment will probably secure jobs for the duration of the season. These employees should apply for a Social Security account number as soon as they have been employed.

It is important, Mr. Burney stated, that all wages be properly reported because the protection which is offered by the Social Security program of Old Age and Survivors Insurance depends upon wages earned and properly credited. Any employee who wishes to know how much wages he has to his credit can ask the Rocky Mount Social Security Board office for a post card addressed to the Records Division of the Social Security Board in Baltimore which when filled out and mailed will elicit from the Social Security Board the total of wages which have been reported for him by all employers for whom he has worked under Social Security.

In order to get an account number card a person should apply in person at the local field office in Rocky Mount or mail Form SS-5 "Application for Social Security Account Number" to that office.

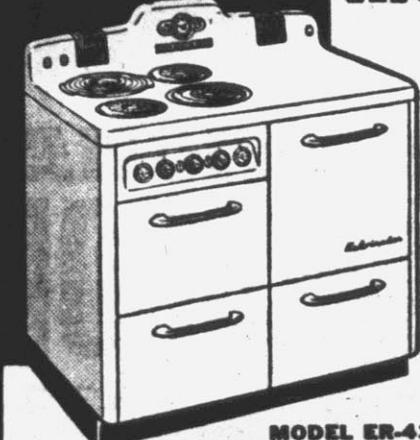

In the erratic war on North African sands Axis and British armies have taken turns chasing each other:

1. Amid fanfare, Italian General Graziani's legions pushed off toward Suez in September, 1940, after the scorching summer sun had cooled sufficiently for his soldiers to hold their rifle barrels. The troops bogged down at Sidi Barrani, Egypt.

2. Then British General Wavell pulled his spectacular counter-push and sent the Italians hot-footing back several hundred miles into Libya, far past Bengasi to El Agheila.

3. So completely did the Italians seem to be crushed that Britain

transferred many of her desert fighters to the Battle of Greece last spring. Meanwhile the Germans were slipping thousands of troops across the Mediterranean. They attacked, sent the few Britons hustling back toward Egypt. A garrison of British empire troops managed to hang on to encircled Tobruk.

4. Came summer of 1941 and another time. Recently as the sands began cooling, both sides showed signs of feverish preparations for something. Britons struck first last week, sped 80 miles to the Tobruk region where they eased the pressure on their beleaguered colleagues.

"One obvious motive for the Brit-

ish move is to strengthen her hold on her lifeline across the Mediterranean. Another possible reason is that General Weygand's "resignation" from the French North African command may foreshadow a German move to take over control of French colonies. A British drive to French North Africa might head off such a move.

Still another possible explanation is that Britain fears Germany may try to crash down through the Near East from the Caucasus to Suez this winter. By the current move the British are trying to make sure that Adolf Hitler won't be able to work his famous squeeze technique on Suez by launching a simultaneous drive from Libya.

What It Means: America's Merchant Fleet

Washington — America's traditional policy — freedom of the seas — is the official reason why Congress voted to arm merchant ships and send them into war zones.

In short, Uncle Sam will travel the ocean highways even if he has to pack along a six shooter, and furnish the travelers with armed escorts (naval convoys).

But there are other reasons why

the government is vitally interested at this moment in the risky business of arming ships and traveling combat zones. These reasons do not appear in the record. But they are more practical than any reasons covered by the flourishing phrase, "Freedom of the Seas."

Let's take ship arming first:

An armed ship is more of a problem to an attacking submarine than a helpless one. The more timid undersea captains are tempted to release their torpedoes farther from the target, when they know the target is armed.

And there's always the chance that some merchant ship's crew might get a lucky pot shot at a hapless sub before it can submerge.

Then there's merchant marine morale. At the moment, nothing's more important to the Allied cause than sailors' morale.

Unarmed ship's crews have a helpless, futile, defeatist feeling that often borders on panic when the white paths of torpedoes are sighted nearby.

So much for arming ships. But how about traveling in war zones? Why was the administration so insistent on that point? Winston Churchill revealed the strategic reason in his November speech to Parliament.

Churchill said ship losses in the last four months have been only one-fifth what they were in the preceding four months. The combined efforts of the United States and Royal navies and their air services have cut losses by four-fifths, though more subs are roaming the Atlantic than ever before.

He said if that continues, and the United States keeps up its ship building program (we expect to build 6,000,000 tons in 1942), the Allies will be ready for an overseas

PRINTERS GET TOPS IN WAGES

Publishers And Printers Pay Highest Salaries

Reflector Bureau.

Raleigh, Nov. 27.—Publishers and printers paid the highest wages of any large North Carolina employers last month, according to the report of the State Department of Labor Hotels paid the least.

The report shows that the average weekly wage for printers was \$27.13 a week. His average weekly work period of 24.7 hours was the lowest in the state, just as his average hourly and weekly wage was highest.

At the bottom of the hotel industry, which employs a large proportion of unskilled help, pays its employees an average of 20.2 cents an hour or \$9.55 a week. However, the report does not show hotel income from tips which make up a large part of some hotel employees' income. The hotel work week of 46 hours was one of the longest in the state.

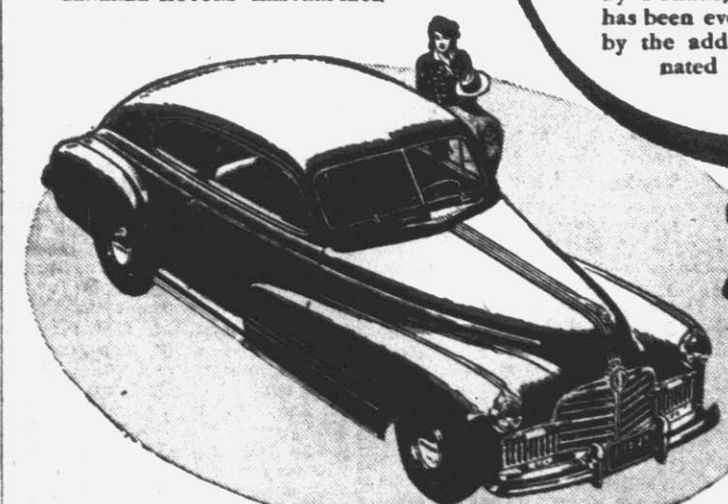

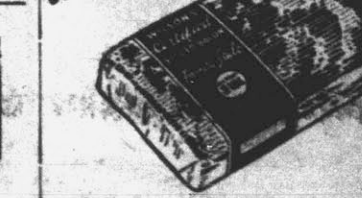

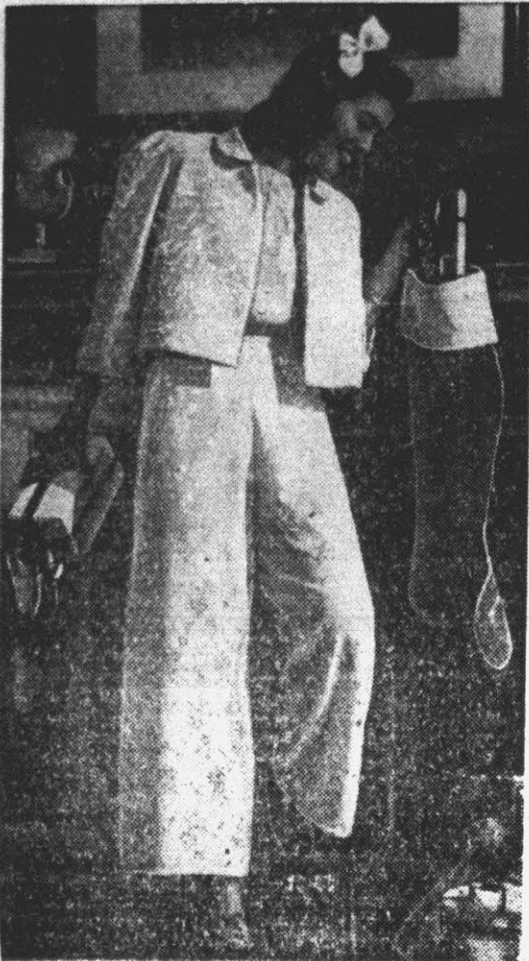
