NAZIS DRIVEN BEYOND TAGANROG

APPROVAL WON FOR PROPOSAL BY CHURCHILL

Commons Support Maximum Mobilization Measure.

INSURGENT MOVE BADLY CRUSHED

Bill Extends Age Limits For Men And Also Provides For Conscription Of Unmarried Women

London, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The House of Commons today passed Prime Minister Churchill's plan for maximum mobilization of men and women by 326 to 10, after putting down an insurgent Laborite amendment which also would have conscripted wealth.

This vote was preliminary to action on the bill itself and was asked by the independent Labor party on Churchill's suggestion that:

"For the purpose of securing maximum national effort in conduct of the war and in production, the obligation for national service should be extended to include the resources of woman power and man power still available."

Following the vote on that general statement, a bill, giving effect to Churchill's proposals to draft unmarried women between 20 and 30 years of age and to raise the limits of the draft to include men up to 51 and reduce the number of exemptions, was introduced immediately.

The Laborite amendment which also would have nationalized many industries, was beaten 336 to 40. It previously had been disapproved at a caucus which had smoothed over a threatened Laborite split on the issue.

Fire Drills Held In Local Schools

Fire drills are being conducted in each school in the city system each month and Chief Gardner said that in addition to getting the students fire conscious so they would not become panicky in case of a real fire they are now able to get out of the buildings in record time.

All children were saved when a Lenoir county school recently burned, although the blaze enveloped the building in only a few minutes after it was discovered. Officials of the school declared that had it not been for fire drills some of the children might have been lost.

The fire drills are being conducted here through the cooperation of the Fire Department and school officials. Officials of the Fire Department also make inspections of all school buildings and report them to be free of fire hazards.

The speed with which students can get out of the various buildings was checked in recent drills and showed the following results: Training School, two-story building, 500 students and teachers, one minute and 32 seconds; High School, two-story building, 700 students and teachers, one minute and 20 seconds; Third Street School, one-story building, 285 students and teachers, one minute and eight seconds; West Greenville school, two-story building, 232 students and teachers, one minute and 24 seconds; Fleming Street colored school, two-story building, 634 students and teachers, one minute and 34 seconds; Fifth Street colored school, one-story building, 653 students and teachers, 48 seconds.

Serbs And Axis Forces Locked In Another War

Battle Rages Between Unconquered Forces Of General Mihailovic And Three Axis Divisions In Yugoslav Valley Of Western Moravia

Cairo, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Three Axis divisions (45,000 men) and the unconquered guerilla forces of General Mihailovic were reported by exiled Serbs here to be locked in battle in the Yugoslav valley of the western Morava.

Supported by tanks and aircraft, a Serb communique said, the Axis divisions launched Tuesday "what appears to be a general offensive against our positions."

"Our forces under General Mihailovic are resisting successfully in the face of furious onslaughts, although in the sector of Ulice (a battle-torn town of 12,000 population) enemy tank attacks have obliged one of our units to withdraw," the communique said.

It was declared that Serb partisans had carried out several successful operations in the Axis rear.

The Havas news agency said 53-day that 1,500 persons were killed by an explosion of a munitions dump at Ouzjiza, Serbia, in a fight between guerilla and government troops.

Americans Head For Duty In China

Manila, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The first group of American transportation men who will keep supplies rolling over the Burma road while American planes and pilots guard them from air attacks overseas have reached Manila en route to China.

With them came United States supplies en route to China, with a single shipment alone carrying a quarter million dollars worth of materials. There also were war materials for American forces in the Far East.

The 46 men in the transportation group are under contract to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's government and will receive up to \$500 a month in United States currency.

Tennessee Marts Average Near \$29

W. Z. Morton, Greenville tobacco warehouseman, has just returned from a tour of Tennessee markets, which opened Monday, and reports that prices being paid on the Tennessee-Kentucky markets are about \$10 per hundred pounds higher than on the opening days last year.

Mr. Morton said tobacco on the markets he visited were averaging around the \$29 mark. He reported that farmers apparently were satisfied and pleased.

PROJECT HERE NOT AFFECTED

Local NYA Training Center Not To Be Curtailed

The National Youth Administration Training Center located off Tenth street extension here will not be curtailed, although other projects, including aid to high school and college students will feel the effects of the reduction in appropriations for the agency, it was revealed by officials here today.

In fact, it was explained that the Training Center would be expanded since it is considered a defense project and new equipment is arriving to provide for increased training.

High school and college officials have been advised that their appropriations would have to be cut one-third beginning in January. The Greenville schools, both white and colored, are now receiving \$200 a month to help needy students continue their education.

The local girls' resident center also faces a possible reduction in expenditures and such projects as the curb market which is nearing completion will be curtailed in the future.

A reduction of \$34,000,000 was ordered in the national NYA budget and approximately two and a half million dollars less will be expended in this state next year than during the current year.

Britain Now Representing As Intending To Whittle Down Enemy Strength Tank By Tank As Illusions Of A Quick Victory Vanish; Rome Claims Capture Of Two Positions From British

Cairo, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Fighting in the Libyan desert lapsed into sporadic raiding, the British Middle East command announced today, while both sides apparently reorganized their forces for new operations.

A British communique said the lull continued in the last 24 hours although "our forces continue their pressure on isolated enemy centers of resistance" in the Libyan-Egyptian frontier area.

Three Italian tanks were reported destroyed in one small engagement, while on the main front southeast of Tobruk, small bodies of the Axis forces endeavoring to move toward the Sidi Azeiz area, were engaged by British mobile columns.

The British, who now aim to whittle down the Axis armored power in North Africa, tank by tank, were said to have concentrated their main strength on an offensive line from El Gobi northward toward Rezegh, 10 miles below long-besieged Tobruk.

This line, it was said, will be the base of future operations against the divisions of German General Erwin Rommel and the British banished illusions of a quick victory.

Rome, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Troops of two Italian divisions captured several fortified points from the British on the Tobruk front, the high command reported today, while German and British mechanized forces fought west of Bardia.

The Italian Savona division on the Salum front captured British prisoners between its outposts, the communique said.

In the central sector between the Salum and Tobruk fronts, the Italians claimed they beat back a British attack on Bir El Gobi, 40 miles southeast of Tobruk.

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Span Of Hartford Bridge Collapses

Hartford, Conn., Dec. 4.—(AP)—A section of the new bridge across the Connecticut river here collapsed today, plunging an undetermined number of workmen into the water.

A huge girder and a 100-ton crane described as the largest in the world, fell. The Hartford Times said at least 20 men were believed to have been on the section which collapsed.

Some of the workmen were able to crawl out from the river, but rescuers were attempting to determine whether others were pinned beneath the girder or the crane.

NAZIS ATTACK UNITED STATES AID TO TURKEY

Caustic Comment Comes From Official Germans

GERMAN TROOPS SENT TO BORDER

Revealed In Washington U.S. Aid Been Going To Turkey, Through Britain, for Past Six Months

Berlin, Dec. 4.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's announcement that lend-lease aid is being extended to Turkey was a subject of caustic comment among authorized Germans today.

"It is interesting to note the ever-expanding American defense zone now embraces the Near East," one commentator said. "But, mark my word, the last word has not been spoken in this matter."

What Turkey will do about it, whether she might find President Roosevelt's gesture embarrassing, was not discussed by authorities in responsible positions.

New York, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The British radio reported today that new German troops have been rushed to defenses along Bulgaria's southern frontier with Turkey, to which President Roosevelt has extended American lend-lease aid.

The broadcast, heard by CBS, said that Nazi military preparations all along the frontier had been accelerated and that the Germans were tightening their control on Bulgarian ports and airfields.

Washington, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The United States began furnishing Turkey with military supplies six months ago so the Turks could stand by their pledge to defend Turkey and the strategic Dardanelles against any threat of Axis aggression.

This Turkish-British pact, it was learned authoritatively today, accounts to a great extent for President Roosevelt's formal decision adding Turkey to the list of nations eligible for lend-lease aid.

The White House statement yesterday, however, said merely: "The President announced that he had found defense of Turkey vital to the defense of the United States and had directed lend-lease Administrator E. R. Stettinius, Jr. to see that the defense needs of the government of Turkey were filled as soon as possible."

Under present plans, it was disclosed, future lend-lease aid to Turkey is expected to include some \$100,000,000 worth of planes, tanks, trucks, anti-tank and anti-aircraft guns, ammunition and other supplies urgently required by the Turkish army.

All supply shipments since last May have been made to Great Britain, which in turn delivered them to Turkey, and it was learned that this procedure would prevail on all future shipments.

By the arrangements, it was explained, Britain will be enabled to fulfill her treaty promises of military supplies in return for Turkey's pledge not to allow any aggressor the use of Turkish territory as a passageway for attacks on Iraq, Iran, Palestine, Suez, or the vitally important Caucasus and Mosul oil fields.

JAP OFFICIALS IN CONFERENCE

U.S.-Jap Negotiations Considered by Privy Council

Tokyo, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The American-Japanese negotiations at Washington were discussed in a two and a half hour session today of the Privy Council, highest advisory organ of the empire, to which Premier General Tojo and Foreign Minister Togo reported in detail.

"Active opinion were exchanged by the privy councilors and the premier and foreign minister," said Domei's account of the session.

The refusal of the United States, Britain and their associates to "understand Japan's program for East Asia has carried Japan to an unprecedented crisis," he told the opening of a three-day East Asia economic conference.

Summarizing the Tokyo press reaction to Secretary Hull's statement yesterday indicating an unbridgeable gap between the attitudes of the Washington and Tokyo governments, Domei, Japanese news agency, said the papers showed "shocked surprise and extreme pessimism" over the future of Washington negotiations.

Driven Back In Disorder Before Reds

Four Divisions On the Southern Front Declared to Have Been Knocked Out As Germans Scatter In Disorganized Rout; Nazi Offensive On Moscow Front Said To Be Slackening

London, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Red army troops were declared today to have driven the Germans beyond Taganrog in a scattered and disorganized rout and knocked out virtually four Axis divisions in the Southern front counter-offensive.

The drive beyond Taganrog, 40 miles west of Rostov, was announced in a Kuibyshev dispatch which said that the Germans were in full retreat toward Mariupol, 60 miles farther along the coast of the Sea of Azov.

Russians, fighting through fierce winds, bitter cold and snow so deep as to stall their own motor units, also claimed fresh gains in the two-months-old battle of Moscow.

The German offensive on the Moscow front is slackening, a correspondent for the Moscow paper Pravda reported.

He said the Germans actually had passed to the defense in the town area north of Moscow and that a see-saw battle was in progress in the Volokolamsk area northwest of the capital.

The Russians were said to have occupied several villages around Volokolamsk while being forced to yield others.

The situation was said to be "most serious" in the Moshalsk sector 57 miles west of Moscow, with the Germans trying to move eastward between the Volokolamsk highways.

German plans to cut off Leningrad from the East were declared to have been frustrated by Russian soldiers who slew more than 5,000 invaders, destroyed 32 tanks and recaptured several more villages in the vicinity of Tikhvin.

More than 200 miles north of the Rostov-Mariupol fighting, the Russians still claimed the initiative in the Kharkov sector after launching a counter attack November 28.

Lieut. General P. Bodin, writing in the army newspaper Red Star, said the Germans were calling for operations in the Kharkov theater.

The initiative now is in Russian hands," Bodin wrote, "but the strength of the Germans is not crushed. The enemy has many tanks and reserves."

Berlin accounts told of man-to-man fighting in the Rostov-Mariupol area, through which Germans had hoped to strike at the oil-rich Caucasus.

Marshal Semeon Timoshenko, chief of the Soviet counter-offensive, was quoted as saying German losses were so enormous that the 14th German armored division had "only 30 panzers left"—a reference to tanks and steel-shielded combat cars—and the 16th division had only 25.

Now that the Russians
have withdrawn from Fin-
nish territory the world
awaits announcement from
Finland as to her future in-
tections. In reply to recent
notes from the United States
and England, Finland has

Washington Daybook

Washington—Capital talk:
Uncle Sam may forgive his debt-
ors but he doesn't forget them. Over
in the General Accounting Office
are ten clerks who do nothing but
be sure that the people who owe
Uncle Sam money aren't forgotten.

This little division of GAO was
started only a few years ago and
in its beginnings had only one clerk.
Since then, the division has grown
to such proportions that in govern-
ment employ circles it has acquired
the nickname of "the beartrap." Caught
in the trap when it was last
run were more than 300,000 per-
sons who owe the government the
staggering sum of more than \$1-
650,000,000. (These are individual
and company debts and have nothing
whatever to do with unpaid foreign
loans.)

Probably the reason that Uncle
Sam's nephews and nieces gave the "bear-
trap" its nickname is that thou-
sands of them have had their fin-
gers nipped in it. Whenever a gov-
ernment employee quits, owing the
government for extra time off, over-
payment for expenses, etc., his card
goes into the file. And if he
ever steps into government service
again (as thousands have since na-
tional defense started), he pays his
debt or else.

Uncle Sam's debtor list is grow-
ing by leaps and bounds. The av-
erage monthly additions now have
crawled up to around 5,000, while
settlements are being made at the
rate of only 600 a month. At that
the United States is no slouch at
collecting its bad debts from indi-
viduals and corporations. From a
half million to a million dollars a
year rolls into the federal coffers
as result of GAO's new collection
policy.

There's a curious reason behind
the government's establishment of

two internment camps and why the
Italian sailors (interned when their
ships were seized in American har-
bors) are held at Fort Mifflin, Pa.
Mont, and the German sailors at
Fort Lincoln, N. D.

That reason—and the only one—is
that the government doesn't dare
keep these sons of the Axis powers
together because they constantly
fight.

Even in transporting them, al-
though many seamen from both
Germany and Italy were arrested in
the same harbors, they were kept
far enough apart so that they
couldn't even threaten each other.
When I asked a government offi-
cial who has been connected with
internment of the sailors what
made them fight, he shrugged his
shoulders and said: "All I can get
out of them is that they hate each
other like poison."

Paul V. McNutt, Federal Security
administrator, has started a cam-
paign to coin common or "popular"
names to replace scientific terms
which sometimes scare the day-
lights out of persons buying foods
and drugs.

As an example of what he is
driving at, Mr. McNutt cites the im-
portant vitamin, "nicotinic acid."
This vitamin, so essential to health,
Mr. McNutt explains, is found in
lean meat, certain vegetables, milk,
and in some other common articles
of diet—yet when processors label
their wares, "This contains so many
units of nicotinic acid," the custo-
mer shy from it as if it were un-
adulterated poison.

"Words, to the scientist," says
Mr. McNutt, "may be purely de-
scriptive but to ordinary people they
often have the power to arouse
loyalty or hate, belief or unbelief,
confidence or skepticism."

PRESS — It was getting close to 11:30 o'clock, time for Governor Broughton's press conference, and reporters began drifting into the office already filled with people waiting to see the Governor.

LEASE — When the state-con-
trolled Atlantic and North Carolina

Parisiens Facing German Reprisals

Paris, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Paris citizens must surrender the persons guilty of two recent terrorist acts against German soldiers by next Monday or suffer "the most rigorous of reprisal measures," the German commander of Paris decreed last night.

Lieut. General Ernst von Schaumburg issued his edict within 24 hours after a German army physician fell victim to a revolver shot while walking on the Boulevard Magenta. The doctor's condition was not disclosed.

The order also covered persons responsible for the bomb deaths last Saturday night of two German army officers and the wounding of a number of others in the Montmartre district.

Two Stills Found By ABC Officers

Pitt county ABC officers, assisted by officers of Beaufort county yesterday located and destroyed a 50-gallon capacity steam liquor still near Traffers creek.

Equipment found and destroyed included eight 50-gallon fermenters full of fermented mash, a 50-gallon wooden still, two 50-gallon doubleblers, a 50-gallon pre-heating unit, a 50-gallon cooling barrel with coil.

The plant was complete when seized and officers used 14 sticks of dynamite to destroy it. The plant was not from a recent run. Three gallons of distilled liquor was found at the site.

The local officers also captured a 50-gallon steam outfit near Venters crossroads, along with 100 gallons of mash, a 50-gallon steam drum, a 50-gallon cooling barrel. This plant was unusually small and of a crude type.

Anti-Strike Bill Is Sent To Senate

Washington, Dec. 4.—(AP)—A hard-boiled strike curb bill, stamped with an unexpected House endorsement of almost two-to-one, moved to the Senate today where extensive modification appeared probable.

Senators predicted freely that their chamber would relax the bill's drastic terms, and then let a Senate-House conference committee work out some agreement on the final scope of the legislation needed to avert work stoppages in vital defense plants.

After working itself into a complicated parliamentary snarl, the House finally rolled up a 252 to 136 vote yesterday for the far-reaching bill by Rep. Smith (D-Va.) without even considering some pending "middle-of-the-road" measures.

Little Learned In Anti-Fascist Case

Trieste, Italy, Dec. 4.—(AP)—With 22 of 60 persons questioned so far in the mass trial of alleged terrorists and anti-Fascist conspirators, the government has obtained little more than statements that some of them were acquainted or friendly with others.

Seven defendants, including two men who were sent to Lipari prison island several years ago on suspicion of anti-Fascist activities, denied during hearings yesterday that they had any part in plotting which the government charges included a 1938 attempt on the life of Premier Mussolini.

The government is seeking to prove the existence of a separatist plot before the war to join the Trieste section of northeastern Italy to Yugoslavia.

FEW SPEEDERS ARE ARRESTED

Average Patrolman Convicts Only Five A Month

Reflector Bureau. By BOB THOMPSON

Raleigh, Dec. 4.—The average number of convictions for speeding obtained by the average State Highway Patrolman during the entire month of November was less than five, or one every six days—and November was the best month the patrol has had since the Division of Highway Safety started keeping a record of speeding convictions two years ago.

The average number of convictions for all highway traffic violations obtained by the average patrolman during November was less than 10.

During the 31 days of October—the last for which total arrest figures are available—the 213 members of the patrol arrested less than 3,100 people, or an average for each man of less than one arrest every two days.

Each month the Highway Safety Division gets out a report of convictions of those arrested by patrolmen for speeding, passing on curves, disobeying stop signs, driving on the wrong side of the road, parking on the highway and so on down to "traffic violators miscellaneous." Although the report is for the month, it will include convictions for infractions made previously, just as it will omit convictions of those arrested in November but not tried until later.

The division also has some figures on arrests made by patrolmen which resulted in acquittal of the defendants but, according to Director Ronald Hootch, these last figures are not inclusive. However, Captain Charles Farmer of the patrol made an estimate that around 90 per cent of those arrested for highway violations are convicted. Of course the average of one arrest every two days for the average patrolman does not include cases in which the officers stopped motorists and let them off with warnings.

There are 213 officers and men on the patrol. This figure includes the seven commission officers who were not counted in figuring the average arrest per man. It does, however, include the 24 sergeants and 24 corporals who are supposed to spend much of their time on the highways.

Theoretically, according to William Rogers, assistant motor vehicle commissioner, each patrolman is on duty for 12 hours a day. These men are supposed to spend as much of their time as possible on the highways but naturally must stop for meals, do some inside work and spend many hours in court.

But an average of less than five arrests per man per month for speeding. Well, even at the Motor Vehicle Department the figure was admitted to be "surprising."

Smith Is Cheered By Manufacturers

New York, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Rep. Howard W. Smith (D-Va.) whose anti-strike bill was passed by the House yesterday, received an ovation from the National Association of Manufacturers today when he declared the bill would provide for "two fundamental rights: The right of man to work and the right and the duty of his government to protect that right."

Approximately 2,000 delegates, representing industries throughout the nation, stood and cheered when Smith was introduced.

When the applause died, Smith said quietly:

"If there is any misapprehension in my audience that this bill is a move on behalf of you, I would like to disabuse your minds right now."
