REPORT HOSTILE PLANES OFF EAST COAST

Japs Claim New Great Successes In Pacific Conflict

ARMY AND NAVY SEEKING JAP AIRPLANE CARRIER

SAY JAP NAVY NOW UP TO U.S.

Navy Ministry Spokesman Declares That Blows Already Landed Have Changed Balance Of Power So As To Nullify Roosevelt's "High Pressure" Policy; Claim Attacks On U.S. Pacific Bases

Tokyo, Dec. 9.—(Official broadcast picked up by AP) Great initial successes and a widening scope and increasing tempo of Japan's air, land and sea war of the Pacific with the United States and Britain were reported by the Japanese today.

A Navy Ministry spokesman declared the Japanese navy already had landed blows which had changed the old balance of American and Japanese sea power to such an extent as to nullify President Roosevelt's "high pressure Eastern policy."

The achievements of the Japanese navy, he declared, had "completely shattered all naval strategy popularized by United States naval experts."

The Army announced that its bombers had hammered Nichols field, U. S. air base near Manila in the Philippines in a mass attack which demolished "important air facilities."

A ring of Japanese warships which shelled tiny Midway Island a United States possession 1,400 miles west of Honolulu, set hangars and fuel stores ablaze in a bombardment yesterday, said a communiqué.

A Tokyo broadcast declared that Guam and Wake, two other United States stepping stones across the Pacific, were now under the Japanese flag.

The Japanese said they shot down nine planes in their attack on Wake Island yesterday.

At the same time Imperial headquarters announced that Japan's air and land forces began an attack upon the area of Singapore this morning and that many Japanese warplanes had destroyed many British fighter planes at their bases.

Two Japanese contingents were reported by Dornier to have completed occupation of Bangkok Thailand capital.

A Berlin broadcast said the Japanese were launching an attack from Thailand to cut the Burma road.

A British communiqué from Hongkong announced the Japanese launched an attack upon that stronghold at two places yesterday.

Both Hongkong and Manila reported air raids. Hongkong said the attacks there were almost continuous.

The seizure of more than 200 vessels of "enemy nationalities," including the 10,500-ton American President Lines liner President Harrison was announced in a Dornier dispatch.

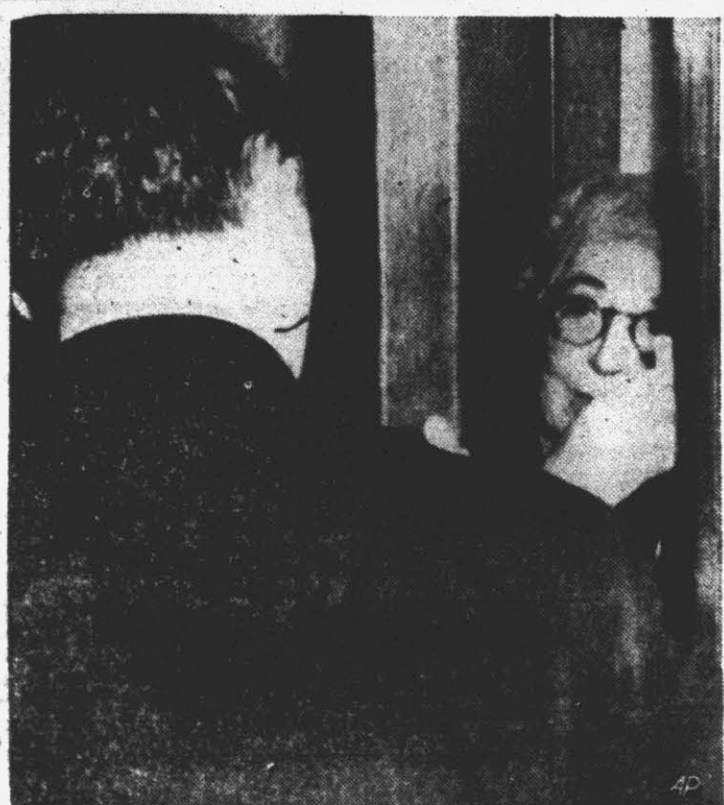

BOARD BEHIND RAT CAMPAIGN

Other Matters Considered by Merchants' Directors

Several important matters were considered at the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Greenville Merchants Association held last night with President H. L. Ormond presiding for the first time since he was elected president. Mr. Ormond was ill in bed when elected president and had been confined at all previous meetings.

The association voted to cooperate in a distributive educational program, entailing a course in salesmanship for clerks in variety department and clothing stores. The program will be conducted on a six-weeks basis starting January 5 under the direction of T. Carl Brown of Raleigh and with Miss Catherine Sams as instructor. The board named an advisory committee composed of C. R. McBrayer, O. P. Matthews and Carl Reid to handle details of the project.

The association endorsed the proposed rat campaign and a committee composed of C. B. Bissette, J. H. Blount and H. L. Hodges was appointed to work with committees from other organizations.

It also was brought out at the meeting that citizens and housewives could greatly aid in the campaign by securing garbage cans with covers. It was stressed that such cans should be purchased now, in advance of the actual launching of the campaign.

Another important decision was to have a general business session of all members of the association on February 9, at 8 p. m., to conduct a "question and suggestion box" through which every member will be given an opportunity to bring up any matter he feels will be for the good of the association work or assistance to the members.

Governor Says Raid By Germans Very Likely

Raleigh, Dec. 9.—Gov. Broughton believes that an actual air attack on strategic points in North Carolina "is very likely to happen."

"And when it comes," the Governor continued, "it will be the same sort of surprise attack that the Japanese perpetrated on Hawaii. It takes only a glance at the map to show that our chin is stuck far out into the Atlantic ocean."

The Governor expects the attack of course, from Germans instead of Japs. He does not care to predict how long before a state of war will exist between this country and the remaining members of the axis. Naturally he hopes it won't come. But he thinks it will.

It is a long way from North Carolina to the Pacific Ocean where the latest phase of World War II began. It is no distance at all from North Carolina to the Atlantic Ocean. Last war ships were attacked and sunk within 20 miles of the North Carolina coast where the state's "chin" sticks out around Hatteras. This war includes the use of carriers which, from points hundreds of miles out into the ocean can launch airplane attacks. Last war North Carolina had one camp, Fort Bragg, pretty well inland. This war North Carolina in addition will have Camp Davis, Marine Barracks on the New River, the marine aviation base at Cherry Point, the Navy-Coast guard air base at Elizabeth City and ship building activities at Wilmington. New Bern and—probably—Morehead strung all along the coast.

Like it or not, the fact remains that today war is closer to North Carolina, to the state itself, than it has been since the War Between the States.

Yesterday's speedy coordination and mobilization of defense agencies gave Raleigh its first realization of how close to home actual shooting may be. Hours before the actual declaration Governor Broughton, acting upon receipt of a telegram from the War Department, had called members of a central defense committee—his "war cabinet"—to his office.

U.S. IS VIEWED AS AGGRESSOR

Stockholm Broadcast Says Declaration May Come Within Hours; Berlin Agog With Rumors That Reichstag To Be Assembled Tomorrow

New York, Dec. 9.—(AP) An NBC broadcast from Stockholm, Sweden, predicted today that Germany would declare war on the United States within a few hours. The broadcast was by David Andersen, NBC correspondent.

Andersen said reports were that the American embassy staff in Berlin had been removed from the German capital. American correspondents were said to be ready for hasty departure.

The official German spokesmen in Sweden were quoted as saying that the aggressor nation in the Pacific was the United States and that the tri-partite pact binding Germany and Italy to help Japan in case of attack thus goes into effect.

Berlin, Dec. 9.—(AP)—Berlin was agog today with rumors that the Reichstag would assemble tomorrow to make known Germany's official stand on the American-Japanese conflict.

Contributing to these unconfirmed rumors was the postponement of opera performances scheduled for this noon and tomorrow night in the Kroll opera.

The opera is the place where the Reichstag meets on such few occasions as Reichsfuehrer Hitler calls the members together for a pronouncement of policy or notification of far-reaching action taken.

HOT DEBATE ON HAWAIIAN RAID

Bulwinkle Calls For Slow Action On Court Martial

Washington, Dec. 9.—(AP)—Rep. Dingell (D-Mich.) told the House today he proposed to demand that courtmartial proceedings be instituted against four high-ranking Army officers and the commander of the Pacific fleet for "what happened in Hawaii."

Dingell named specifically Lieut. General Walter C. Short, commanding the Hawaiian department; Major General H. H. Arnold, deputy chief of staff for air; Major General George H. Brett, chief of the Army Air Corps; and Admiral Husband Kimmel, commander of the Pacific fleet.

Then Rep. Bulwinkle (D-N.C.) immediately arose to say "it behooves members to keep their feet on the ground" and not act without knowing the full facts.

"It is times like this," he declared, "it is the patriotic duty of every American, especially every congressman, to be guarded in his words in order not to give aid and comfort to the enemy."

A burst of applause greeted his remarks, as well as a statement by Rep. Van Zandt (R-Pa.) that he resented criticism of Kimmel. Van Zandt said House members did not appreciate the advancement of air-craft and when all reports were in that there would be no criticism of any of the admiral's staff or personnel.

Dingell's outburst came a short time after the House Naval Committee heard Rep. Vincent (D-Ky.) assert that someone responsible for Hawaii's defense "was asleep."

U.S. Coast Invaded By Warplanes

Little Doubt That 30-Odd Planes Which Participated In Reconnaissance Flights Over Industrial Area Around San Francisco Bay Last Night Were From Airplane Carrier Off Pacific Coast

San Francisco, Dec. 9.—(AP)—The Army and Navy were on the prowl today for an enemy aircraft carrier which sent at least two squadrons of planes in reconnaissance flights over industrial plants ringing San Francisco bay—without dropping a bomb.

The 30-odd planes ranged from the San Jose at the south tip of the bay to the huge naval yard at Mare Island the Fourth Army Interceptor command reported.

Seattle, Dec. 9.—(AP)—Planes at Portland, Oregon, air base hopped off at 8:15 a. m. today the Second Interceptor Command announced, to hunt 600 miles to sea for two or three Japanese aircraft carriers and some submarines reported operating off coasts.

Simultaneously, Brig. General Carlisle H. Walsh, head of the Interceptor Command, reported planes here and at other western Washington fields were preparing to take the air as soon as the weather moderated.

The flight caused the first blackout in San Francisco's history. Two other blackouts followed in the darkness of early morning, but the Army did not disclose whether enemy planes again approached.

Army interceptor planes followed the first of the enemy squadrons but were unable to determine where they finally went. The Navy then took up a search for a plane carrier, presumably lurking off California's coast and possibly 500 or 600 miles at sea.

"I don't think there's any doubt that the planes came from a carrier," said Lieut. Gen. John L. DeWitt, commander of the Fourth Army and the western defense command.

First Casualties Of War Disclosed

Washington, Dec. 9.—(AP)—The War Department published today the Army's first official casualty list of the war today, making public the names of 37 Army officers and men killed in action in the Japanese attack on Hawaii.

Six were commissioned officers, all of the air forces, and the others also were air corps men.

The names were announced as a partial list of the casualties resulting from Sunday's bombardment of the Island of Oahu, Hawaii, by Japanese air units.

"The Adjutant General of the Army in each case notified the next of kin of the deep regret of the Secretary of War at the death of this soldier in the defense of his country," the War Department said.

No North Carolina names were included in this first list.

Argentina Pledges
Washington, Dec. 9.—(AP)—Argentina today pledged the United States "reciprocal assistance and defense cooperation" in this country's war with Japan.

Planes Over Panama
New York, Dec. 9.—(AP)—A Panamanian radio broadcast heard in New York by NBC said Japanese aircraft were reported flying over the Panama coast this morning, but no bombs were dropped.

LAND INVASION THREATENING PHILIPPINES

Island 50 Miles Off Manila Bay Reported Seized

ISLANDS RAIDED BY JAP PLANES

Approximately 3,000 Nipponese Fifth Columnists Posing As Fishermen Reported Already Active

Manila, Dec. 9.—(AP)—The Philippine Islands, target of repeated and widespread Japanese air raids, faced a new threat today as reports reached here that Japanese troops had seized Lubang Island, about 50 miles off the entrance to Manila bay.

Adding to the anxiety over this situation was the fact that the Japanese might effect a landing on the big island of Mindanao, where about 10,000 of the 25,000 Japanese settled in the Davao area were said to be armed and ready to cooperate with an invasion attempt.

One report said that approximately 3,000 armed Japanese already were actively resisting Filipino authorities attempting to curb incipient fifth column activities in Davao province.

Reliable sources, authority of the reported seizure of Lubang said the Japanese apparently had gained full control there with the aid of fifth columnists posing as fishermen.

Control of Lubang would be of tremendous importance to the Japanese because of its dominating position southwest of Manila bay and because it virtually controls waterways between the middle Philippine Archipelago and the China sea.

Mapla itself which experienced three air raid alarms during the night, was on the alert for a new thrust by Japanese air raiders against nearby strategic points.

CALLS ON U.S. BE ON GUARD

Hull Warns Against Sudden Raid By Nazi Forces

Washington, Dec. 9.—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull indicated today that this country should be on guard against a sudden German move supporting Japan in fulfillment of the Axis tri-partite pact. The State Department emphasized, however, that Secretary Hull's warning had no connection with the reports that hostile planes were approaching the eastern seaboard. Hull had no knowledge of these reports at the time he issued the warning.

In reply to a press conference question as to whether he thought such a German move would be in the tradition of the Sunday morning attack on Honolulu by Japan, Hull said that the United States always should be on guard against surprise moves, especially when what he called international desperadoes were prowling around the world.

An preliminary move of the character of the Pearl Harbor attack, he said, would only arouse the American people to resist with all the speed and all the might this nation can exert.

With specific reference to Japan's air and submarine attack on Pearl Harbor, Hull said that if the national effort to which he referred were put forward no American need fear the outcome of the attack which he said was so outrageously and treacherously undertaken by Japan.

Aleutians Isles

Victoria, British Columbia (Canadian Press)—Dec. 9.—A warning that the "Japanese are off the Aleutian islands" came from Mayor Andrew McGavin last night shortly after Air Commander A. F. Godfrey said "there is every reason to believe there will be an attack in the Pacific northwest."

"The Japanese are off the Aleutian Islands; we expect them here any time. The situation is very serious," Mayor McGavin said.

Commodore Godfrey said the Canadian Air Force was "standing by" and that instructions were issued to all cities for a complete blackout.

New York, Dec. 9.—(AP)—A second air raid alarm was sounded in New York City at 2:05 today, just 15 minutes after the all-clear signal had been flashed by the police department after a previous alarm at 1:25 p. m., EST, prompted by unconfirmed reports of hostile planes off the east coast.

New York City, the metropolitan area and Long Island had braced for a possible air attack after the alarm was sounded at 1:25 p. m., EST. All school children were sent home.

Acting on information received from Governors Island, headquarters of the First Army, that hostile planes were reported two hours out of New York at noon, all planes at Mitchell field took to the air and families were evacuated from the military reservation, although air corps detectors had not confirmed the presence of planes.

Navy press officers said they had not received a report on any hostile planes. They rushed the news to the office of Admiral Adolphus Andrews, commandant of the Third Naval District and commander of the North Atlantic coastal frontier which extends from Hatteras to Halifax.

In Washington, the White House, War and Navy departments said they knew nothing about the reported presence of planes off the east coast.

Captain Lynn Farnol, public relations officer at Mitchell field, said the field was on the alert and that every necessary precaution had been taken.

Cairo, Dec. 9.—(AP)—General Erwin Rommel was reported regrouping his battered German forces today for a resumption of heavy fighting in Libya after withdrawing westward to a line extending south from Tobruk through El Adem and Bir El Gobi.

British mechanized forces and infantry were reported still busy cleaning up pockets of German resistance along the Libyan coast in the vicinity of Bardia.

Approximately 4,000 Italian troops also were believed to be trapped along the coast.

Opening at the local WPA Art Gallery today is a charming exhibit of "Paintings of the Indian Country"—a group of vivid water colors by Jose Rev Toledo, an Indian of New Mexico, known among his people as the Morning Star. Toledo draws the subjects for his paintings directly out of his own experience and personal observations of the life of American Indians of today. Thus this group of paintings now on display at the gallery will be of interest not alone for the exquisite handling of color and design and minute details which combine to make Toledo an artist of distinction, but also for their portrayal of Indian tribal customs and traditions.

Of special significance in this pre-Christmas season is the painting "Les Matachines," which depicts the Indian tradition concerning the Three Wise Men. "The Drum Makers," "The Grinders," "Preparing for a Dance," "A Stick Race," and "Bringing the Bear into the Village" are other titles among this group of Toledo paintings that afford intimate insight into Indian life in New Mexico today.

This exhibit may be seen in the local gallery until December 26. In addition to the 14 paintings in the gallery on the second floor of Sheppard Memorial Library, five are on display in the library. The gallery is open to visitors from 7 to 9 each Tuesday night, and each afternoon, Monday through Friday, from 2 to 6 o'clock.

To meet the demand for qualified men created by the huge shipbuilding program of the Maritime Commission, the United States Maritime Service is training youths to become radio operators in the American Merchant Marine.

Physically fit American male citizens 16 to 23 years of age with no previous experience are being offered a 10 months' course in radio operation, maintenance, and repair. Youths accepted are paid from \$36 to \$60 a month while in training. Food, quarters, and clothing are furnished by the Government.

Those who successfully complete the course become radio operators in the Merchant Marine with pay starting at \$105 a month; food and quarters furnished.

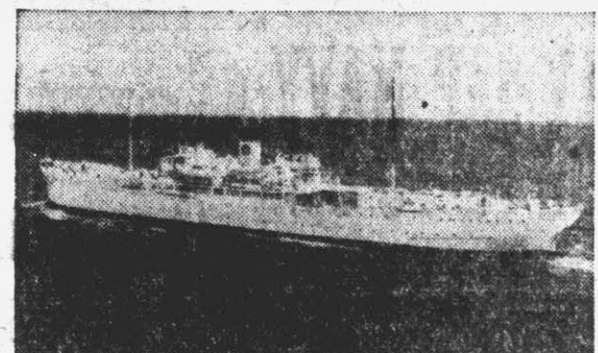

Washington Daybook

Washington—Covering Wash-ington for the newspapers these days is generally pretty grim business, but it's not without its lighter side. For example:

In the days preceding the sign-ing of that agreement with Mex-ico, reporters plagued Treasury Secretary Morgenthau at every press conference for news of develop-ments. The weeks dragged on and nothing happened.

The "burning question" of course was whether the payment of in-

demnity for expropriated oil prop-erties in Mexico was what was hold-ing up the agreement. On one of the days when a question-weary reporter put this up to the Secre-tary, Mr. Morgenthau was in one of his lighter moods.

It was not the oil payments at all, he explained, with a smile. It was merely that the Mexican rep-resentatives in Washington were awaiting a shipment of tequila bottles of which were to be dis-tributed in the press room the day the agreement was signed.

The remark kicked around the treasury press room for days. The usual morning greeting was: "Have you got your tequila yet?"

Then the day came when the agreement actually was to be signed. Into the Treasury building that day came the fiscal secretary of Mexico and the Mexican ambas-sador, the two signers, and behind them marched two embassy em-ployees, carrying between them a case of tequila—bottles from which were distributed to the press room staff.

On the morning of the day that the United Mine Workers strike in the captive coal mines was called off John L. Lewis threw the press corps covering the strike into near panic. Slipping out a back way, the head of the CIO labor union disappeared from the United Mine Workers building for an hour and a half. Frantic with fear that they were missing something which might cause their papers to be beaten on the story, the reporters staged a pretty good imitation of what Hol-lywood thinks reporters are like.

They yelled and screamed over telephones. They shouted at and pleaded with union employees in the building. They sent couriers and scouts to every place in Wash-ington they could imagine that Lewis might have gone.

Finally out of reports and rumor, some of them wrote two stories. One said that Lewis reportedly had slipped into the back door of the White House and spent an hour go-

ing over the details of the settle-ment with President Roosevelt. An-other said he had gone to Walter Reed hospital for a secret confer-ence with Gen. Hugh Johnson and that the former New Dealer turned critical columnist had been respon-sible for working out the strike so-lution.

At the end of a weary day, four of the labor reporters were attending a dinner at the Mayflower hotel and still puzzling over the morning disappearance of Lewis. At a lull in the conversation, one of the guests piped up: "Say, maybe some of you reporters can tell me. What was John L. Lewis doing this morn-ing walking up and down the cor-ridor of the Investment building for more than an hour with a fel-low with one arm?" (That was Per-cy Forester, Ohio district president of the UMW and one of Lewis' close advisers.)

The reporters almost fainted. The Investment Building is almost next door to the United Mine Workers building.

Except for occasional banter, the President's press conferences are models of decorum and except for the news breaks, sometimes sensa-tional, nothing much ever happens.

The other day, however, the Se-cret Service guards who surrounded the President were startled and re-porters struck dumb to see rising out of the crowd near the Presi-dent's desk a big, gnarled black-thorn stick.

Before any one could move, a voice said "Mr. President, you need this. There hasn't been a big stick around here since the days of Ted-dy Roosevelt."

The President laughed and said that he could use it and the tension was broken as quickly as it had arisen. The donor was 83-year-old Charles A. Hamilton, "the oldest working newspaper man in Washington," correspondent for the Birmingham N. Y. Press, who has been cover-ing the capital for more than 60 years.

Around... Capital Square

POLITICS OUT — The North Carolina political picture has com-pletely changed since Saturday. Or, rather, it has been obliterated by the United States entry into the war. Not even those who usually eat, sleep and drink politics are giving the subject a thought right now.

Saturday there was a distinct movement underway to find a for-ward candidate against Senator Bal-ley. State Treasurer Charles John-son, former Speaker Willis Smith, State Senator William Rodman and perhaps others were thinking about running. Today they like the rest of the country aren't thinking about anything but the war.

WHAT'S AHEAD? — What the effect of the war on North Carolina politics will be between now and next May's primary, no one who ought to know has even an opinion satisfactory to himself. The fact that we at last are shooting and being shot at might accentuate the resentment against Senator Bailey's son Pou, who has been trying to avoid the draft, to the point where it would be the deciding factor against Bailey's renomination. But from this distance it seems probable that the Senator's own actions in Congress with regard to the pro-secution of the war will so complet-ly overshadow the insignificant actions of his son that the thing may be forgotten.

After all, the filling station boys have something else to talk about now.

REYNOLDS — Even Bob Rey-nolds, who finally got around to voting for war, may be a little more popular — or, a little less —

ular — then he was a few days ago. Monday morning, before the declara-tion, there was some talk around the capital of ways and means of letting the country know that in-so far as his recent, isolationist ac-tions were concerned Reynolds did not have backing of his state. The Attorney General was asked infor-mally if there was any way a state could recall a Senator. (Incidental-ly, there is not.)

Reynolds' statement after the at-tack on Hawaii — to the effect that he would have to know more about it before he would decide whether or not to vote for war — caused a storm of resentment that surpassed all previous criticism of the junior Senator hereabouts. When Gov-ernor Broughton was asked if he had any comment to make about the statement, his answer was "no, not a word," but he managed to say in it in such a way that everyone had a pretty good idea of what the Governor thought.

"Do you mean, Governor, that you can't phrase your opinion of Reynolds in language which would be printable?" he was asked.

The Governor just grinned.

ONE WORSE — Other state of-ficials were equally as reluctant to talk about Reynolds for publication although they had plenty to say "off the record." Only one had anything to say in his behalf.

"Well, there is at least one mem-ber of Congress whose opinion I have less respect for than I go of Bob's," he said after the war vote. "That is the Rankin woman who cast the only vote against the de-claration."

SAFETY — At last the State Highway Patrol has come forward with a fact which may be inter-esting to at least one reason there has not been more state highway patrolling. Immediately upon the beginning of war Major John Arm-strong told reporters that for sev-eral months the patrol had been working with the FBI and had made "several hundred" investigations at the bureau's request.

SPEECH — If all the work done by all the employees of all the state department Monday morning was laid end-to-end it wouldn't even stretch the length of a common man's cigarette — much less that of the "king's size."

Portable radio's were carried to officers by the state department soon. Those who are reserve offi-cers expect to be called sooner or later. In the Revenue Department Lieutenant Thomas Alexander, U.S. N.R., who has just returned from active service, probably will be gone again very soon. Monday and Tues-day army, navy, and marine offi-cers stationed here were swamped for information as to how one went about getting a reserve commission.

It is this column's prediction that if the war goes on for long a num-ber of state jobs now held by young-men will be filled by women who now work for the state in minor capacities.

(Continued from page one) taken. He said the reported presence of planes did not originate with the Air Corps, but that the Air Corps was acting on the theory that the reports might be substantiated.

In Boston, U. S. Navy sources reported they had received "official word" of the report and that "action is being taken." Officials declined to expand on what the action might be.

An air raid alarm was sounded at the Navy's new air base at Quonset, R. I., and all civilians were ordered to evacuate. Officers said all men were "at their battle stations."

Civilian employees also were evacuated from the Boston Navy Yard. Schools throughout the greater Boston area were ordered to release all children at once.

N. Y. Stock Market

New York, Dec. 9.—(AP)—The stock market suffered another relapse today after an attempt to overcome war nervousness and touch-off a recovery which met with only faint response.

The list started with a fair amount of recoveries in a fractional range. Toward noon, however, a new selling wave hit leaders for one to four or more points and the ticker tape for several minutes behind floor dealings for the second time since November 1940. The pace slowed later and near the close extreme setbacks had been reduced in some cases.

The spokesman asserted the landing was effected without losses, DNB said.

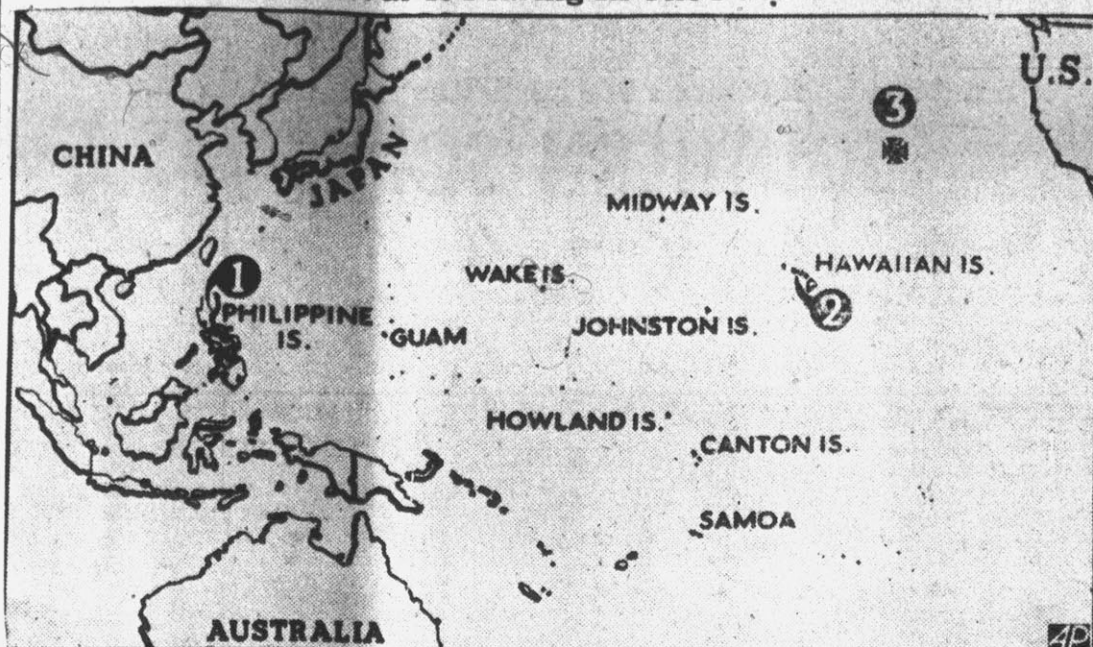

Washington to police all airports and defense industries. Plans include the guarding of bridges designated as "strategic." Tomorrow there will be special meetings here of all the fire chiefs of the state, to plan preparedness against incendiary fires, and of the officers of the Sheriff's Association, the Highway Patrol, the SBI and representatives of the FBI to launch a campaign against any undercover activities of the enemies of the United States, either active or potential.

Already a survey of the German population of the state is under way. (It has been found that about the only Japs and Japanese-Americans in North Carolina are those in service with the army.) The Governor has warned the state against "spy hysteria" and "witch burning" but it is a known fact that the SBI and the patrol have been cooperating with the Federal Bureau of Investigation in investigating "suspicious characters" in this state for some time.

Yesterday General Metts wired commanders of all units of the State Guard to be "on the alert" and ready to be called into active service if, and when, the army wants to turn over certain duties to this 1941 edition of the old time "home guard."

Theodore Johnson sent "on the alert" messages to those civilians who recently have been active as airplane spotters, and on "filter center" staffs. The next time these people started searching the skies for planes, it won't be in connection with maneuvers.

General Metts expects an immediate change in selective service practices. Those men between 28 and 36, who have managed to escape service only because of their "old age," may just as well prepare to shoulder a rifle. The General would not be surprised if another registration of those who have reached the age of 21 since the last, in the very near future.

And next time it is at least possible that the "draft age," or at least the age of registration, will begin around 18 and run to 40 years or beyond.

If there is anybody in North Carolina who does not actually feel the imminence of war, they soon will.

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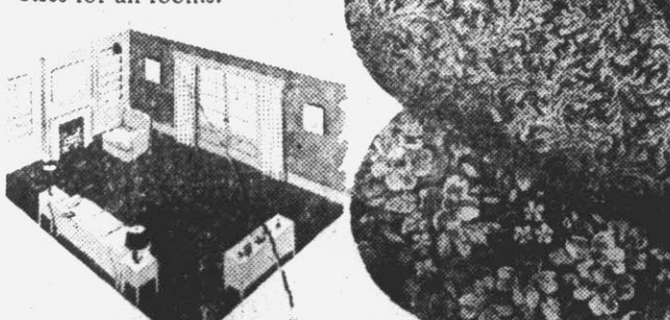

Warns Against Panic On Sugar Situation

J. B. Kittrell, large sugar distributor, today warned citizens against getting panicky over the sugar situation and called attention to the fact that the price of the commodity was under control of the Price Control Administration.

The local broker likewise said that as long as refineries could get raw sugar there would be no sugar shortage in this country.

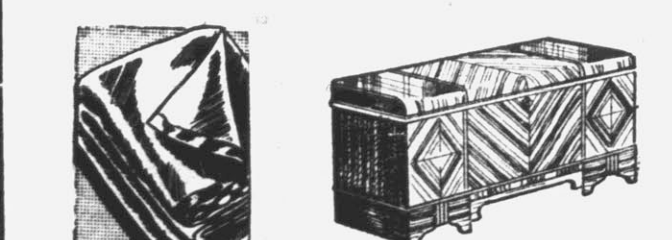
He also stated that there would be no material increase in prices, since sugar is under the Price Control Administration of the OPM.

Mr. Kittrell released a copy of a telegram sent to all sugar refineries in the country by Price Control Administrator Henderson, which follows: "Request until further notice you limit sales of refined sugar to immediate requirements of customers."

Mr. Kittrell reiterated that as long as customers ordered their normal requirements, there was nothing at the present time to worry about, either a shortage or a sharp rise in prices.



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
