Japanese Jubilant Over Initial Successes In Conflict

NIPPON FORCES LANDED ON LUZON

First Army On U.S. Soil Since 1812

Army and Navy Forces Cooperate In Blasting One Sea-Borne Attempt On One Of Main Islands In Philippine Group, But City 200 Miles Northwest Of Manila Captured By Japs

(By The Associated Press) United States Army and Navy forces have blasted a sea-borne Japanese attack against the west coast of Luzon Island in the Philippines, the War Department said today, but other Japanese troops have effected a landing on the north end of the island in the first full-fledged enemy landing on American soil since the war of 1812.

Dispatches from Manila quoted the Philippine Constabulary as saying Japanese parachute troops had captured Vigan, on the coast 200 miles northwest of Manila.

Two waves of Japanese bombers raided Manila and its suburbs, pounding military centers, including Nichols airfield, Port McKinley and the Nielson airport district. This was shortly after noon, Wednesday, Manila time.

Manila dispatches said American and Filipino troops had gone into swift action against Japanese invaders who landed at Aparri, on the far north coast.

United States Army headquarters reported that Japanese troop transports and naval forces in great numbers were hovering off the north coast on a 150-mile stretch from Vigan to Aparri.

In Washington, the War Department, issuing its first communiqué of the war, said the Army and Navy had smothered a Japanese attack on still another section of Luzon, between Vigan and San Fernando to the south.

The War Department's communiqué was based on "information received last night" from Manila, but in view of the 13-hour time difference between Manila and Washington, it apparently referred to action of Wednesday morning, Manila time.

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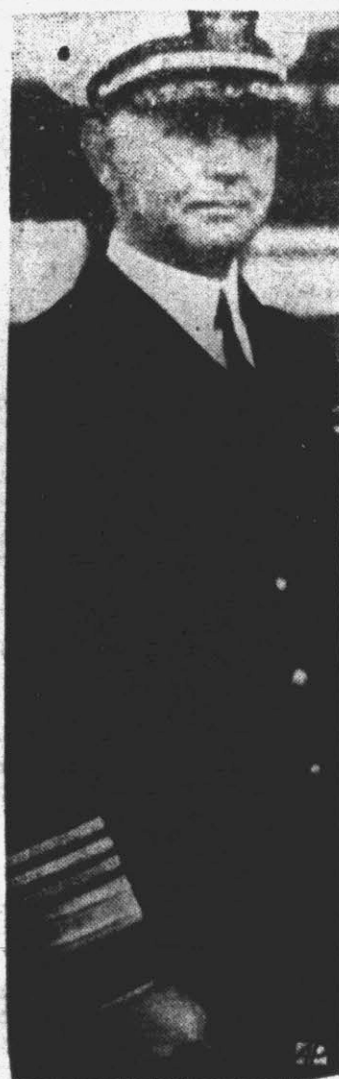

DR. FRANK SEES EXTENDED WAR

Declares First Strike Revealed A Hard War Ahead

"At one stroke we are taught that we are in a war that is going to be a hard war," declared Dr. A. D. Frank, head of the history department of the College, at the College Assembly hour Tuesday. If Japan is defeated in twelve months, we will be extremely fortunate; in two years, fairly fortunate.

In summing up the events of the past week leading up to the attack on Hawaii, Dr. Frank said until recently there had been honor among nations as among individuals and that we could be proud of the fact that we had never failed to conduct our affairs on an honorable basis. Japan originated the gangster idea of attack, and the United States is left with no choice but war.

The nation is fortunate in that the American people are united as they have never been before, said the speaker, pointing out the response of the leading isolationists. Indeed, he continued, we are fortunate that the president for the past nine years has not heeded the groups wanting to reduce our armed forces, and as a result the country is in better condition for war than it has ever been before entering a war.

In closing Dr. Frank urged the students not to listen to rumors and not to rush into things, but make themselves as efficient as possible and act as normally as possible until they are called or find their place in the nation's emergency program.

RAID WARNING AGAIN SOUND'D IN CALIFORNIA

San Francisco Plunged Into Darkness During Night

FLARES DROPPED IN COAST CITY

Other Northern California Cities Blacked Out; Sirens Again Heard In New York City Today

San Francisco, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Two air raid alarms early today plunged San Francisco into a blackout almost 100 per cent effective.

The alarms were accompanied by reports that a half dozen flares had been dropped over the city, presumably from enemy planes.

The army intercept command, silent as to the cause of the alerts, said no information was available concerning the flares, but added it was unlikely they had been dropped from U. S. planes.

Army planes took to the skies at the first warning—a yellow alert indicating the presence of "unidentified" planes in the area. This was about 1:45 a. m. (PST). Five minutes later the all-clear signal was sounded.

Then, at 2:15 a. m., came a second alert, this time a blue signal, signifying the approach of enemy planes. For slightly more than an hour the alarm continued, then sirens sounded an all-clear.

Windows were reported broken along downtown streets by citizens seeking to get at switches in stores where lights still burned.

Other Northern California cities were blacked out at approximately the same time. Oakland, Berkeley and other bay area cities and Sacramento. The blackout here was considerably more thorough than that of Monday night, when illuminated shop signs glowed on.

Stung by an army general command, San Francisco has dropped its easy-going ways and has begun to learn how to respond to air raid warnings.

New York, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Air raid warnings were sounded in New York at 8:41 a. m. (EST) today after similar warnings had flashed over Long Island. The all-clear was heard at 9:01.

Police headquarters reported that "enemy bombing was imminent," but First Air Force Headquarters at Mitchell Field disclaimed any knowledge of hostile aircraft being in the vicinity.

NAZIS SUFFER NEW REVERSES

Blasted From Strategic Russian Railway Center

Moscow, Dec. 10.—(AP)—German troops have been blasted from Tikhvin, 110 miles east of Leningrad, in a 10-day battle which cost them 7,000 dead, and have suffered new reverses before Moscow, the Russians claimed officially today. The Soviet government said that Red army detachments killed 14,000 invaders and took seven villages in the Kalinin sector, 95 miles northwest of the capital, and wiped out more than 600 men in winning back several settlements at Tula, 100 miles south of Moscow.

A special communiqué broadcast by the Moscow radio told of the developments at Tikhvin, a strategic railway center which has been a pawn of war for a month. It links Leningrad with Volodga and the supply port of Archangel.

Berlin, Dec. 10.—(AP)—German advance forces have withdrawn to winter lines in sector after sector along the Russian battle front, a military spokesman declared today. Asserting that the Nazi push eastward was through until spring the spokesman said "Germany has no strategic ambitions this winter."

Claim Navy In Control Of Pacific

Contend British Far Eastern Fleet Obliterated With Loss Of Two Capital Ships And that Japan Prepared To Assume Control In Air And On Sea In Pacific, Indian And Antarctic Oceans

Tokyo, Dec. 10.—(Official radio picked up by AP)—Loud speakers shouted Japan's most tremendous news of war successes so far—the sinking of two of Britain's mightiest capital ships and the landing of Japanese forces in the Philippine Islands, today to jubilant throngs of war-stirred Japanese.

Announcing that Britain's new 35,000-ton battleship Prince of Wales and battle cruiser Repulse had gone down in the Pacific off Malaya under bursts of Japanese air bombs, Imperial Headquarters declared "the British Far Eastern fleet has been obliterated."

Japan already had claimed naval supremacy of the Pacific after her Sunday air smash against the United States fleet in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and Imperial Headquarters today proclaimed her prepared to seize control of both the air and water of the Pacific, Indian and Antarctic oceans.

It declared that previously reported occupation of the United States Pacific island of Guam had been confirmed and that Japanese military and naval forces now were securely established there.

Against all these successes, the communiqué said Japan had lost not one warship.

They acknowledged only that two transports had gone down and two others were damaged, with no loss of life on any of them, and that 51 planes were missing, 13 army planes and 38 naval.

Claude Haddock, 52, died in Taylor hospital, Washington, at 12:55 p. m. Tuesday. Funeral services were conducted from the home near Grimesland this afternoon at 3 o'clock by Rev. D. J. Little, pastor of the Hodges Chapel Holiness church and burial followed in the family cemetery nearby.

Mr. Haddock was born and reared in the Aviden community and had been living near Grimesland for a number of years. He was one of the leading farmers of his community.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Dillie Elks Haddock, six sons, Jesse D. Grover, C. Oscar, and Frizzell Haddock, all of the home, L. J. Haddock of Chocowinity, and C. S. Haddock of near Washington, three daughters, Mrs. Herbert A. Mills of Grimesland, Mrs. Robert Bedford of near Washington, and Miss Mary Marie Haddock of the home one brother, Noah Haddock of Grimesland, and nine grandchildren.

Conducts Roundup Of Enemy Aliens

Washington, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Attorney General Biddle said today that 2,303 Germans, Italians and Japanese had been seized by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and were being held temporarily by immigration officials.

Biddle said at a press conference that the aliens would be given into the permanent custody of the Army as in the last war, after their status had been determined by Civilian Boards of Review to be set up in communities in all parts of the country.

The "enemy aliens" seized include 865 Germans, 147 Italians and 1,291 Japanese.

TAKES ACTION FOR FULL USE OF MAN POWER

Rep. May Calls For Swift Action On Legislation

ACTS TO RETAIN FIGHTING FORCES

Reclassification Of Selectees And Extension Of Age Limits Also Under Consideration

Washington, Dec. 10.—(AP)—The United States moved today to make the fullest use of its great reservoir of man power.

Chairman May (D-Ky.) of the House Military Committee called for swift passage of legislation which would permit retention of all fighting forces for the duration, and allow selectees to be dispatched to any point on the globe. A similar measure was ready for Senate action.

Congress sent the President only yesterday a bill freezing naval enlistments for six months beyond the end of the war.

Brig. General Lewis B. Hershey National Selective Service director said reclassification of selectees who had been given occupational deferment was under consideration, and that later the reclassification of men deferred because of dependents might be discussed.

Although General Hershey said there was a "strong possibility" that Congress would lower the draft age minimum from 21 to 18, Rep. May depreciated the likelihood of such a change.

"I don't think there will be any such step soon, maybe not at all," the Kentuckian said. "There is no sentiment for such a change in the committee. Of course, in a long war anything is possible."

He said that if any change in the present registration limit of 21 through 35 became necessary, he thought it more likely that the maximum might be raised to some extent.

General Hershey spoke of the possibility of calling up men of 28 or over, who under the revised Selective Service act were deferred from call, or released if already inducted.

BRITISH UNITS AGAIN UNITED

Again Tobruk Garrison Joined With Other Forces

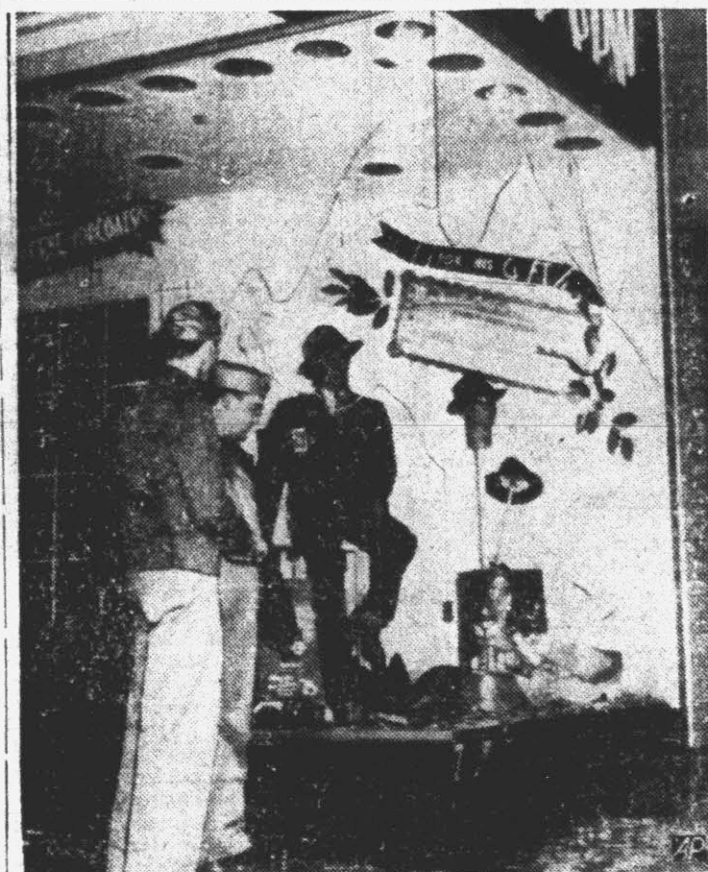
Cairo, Dec. 10.—(AP)—The British announced rejoining of hands of the Tobruk garrison with British forces at El Adem in the Libyan desert today and declared that the westerly movement of Axis forces "has now apparently accelerated under the vigorous pressure of our forces."

Road communications eastward from Tobruk have been established and the British have recaptured Gambut, coastal point about 40 miles east of the fortress, the communiqué added.

It said the British from Tobruk had reached South African and Indian troops at El Adem to the southeast, but admitted that Germans and Italians still were in strength on the western perimeter of Tobruk's defenses.

Berlin Newsmen "Arrested." Bern, Switzerland, Dec. 10.—(AP)—American press correspondents in Berlin left their offices for their homes at 12:40 p. m., today, presumably under house arrest.

British Malayan Base Believed Lost To Japs

Air Base At Kota Bharu Apparently In Jap Hands

Singapore, Dec. 10.—(AP)—The British apparently have lost Kota Bharu, the northern Malaya air base where the Japanese have landed strong forces just inside the Thailand frontier, but a communiqué indicated tonight they have bailed Japanese drives both in that area and at Kuantan, only 200 miles north of here.

The communiqué mentioned Japanese tanks for the first time, saying seven were trapped and destroyed yesterday in the Keoh area along the Thailand border by a British Punjabi motorized unit. "British troops," after acquitting themselves splendidly, have reorganized south of Kota Bharu and now are in excellent spirits after heavy fighting over a wide area yesterday," the communiqué said.

Strong Netherlands East Indies warship and warplane reinforcements had joined the British land and air forces in trying to check the Japanese assaults on Northern Malaya in the spreading battle of southeastern Asia.

Cites Importance Of Cotton Quotas

The cotton marketing quota referendum is only a few days away. The referendum will be held on December 13.

According to J. V. Taylor, president of the Pitt County Agricultural Conservation Association, the issues at stake are of tremendous importance. The American farmer is the only farmer in the world who has the privilege of deciding such an important course of action.

There is now on hand a two-year supply of cotton. In the past whenever a surplus, even approaching that level, has been permitted to swamp the market, cotton producers received bankrupt prices. The government was able to offer a cotton loan on the 1941 crop due to the fact that quotas were approved by growers last December. Today, because of that loan, and despite export losses, cotton prices are the highest since 1929. No quota means no loan. To lend money on an uncontrolled surplus would be an unwarranted risk of public funds.

All farmers who produced cotton in 1941 are eligible to vote in the referendum on Saturday, December 13 and they are urged to go to the polls and vote on this important issue.

HOME DEFENSE PLANS TALKED

Meeting Held By Pitt County Defense Council

The Pitt County Defense Council meeting this morning, pledged its support to the Selective Service boards, the Red Cross, inaugurated plans to conserve waste paper and undertook a program to enroll civilians in defense work.

J. H. Rose, chairman, presided over the meeting, which was attended by approximately 35 members, including members of the Selective Service boards, Mrs. Chester Walsh, representing the Business and Professional Women's clubs, was elected secretary.

The council pledged to render its fullest cooperation with the Selective Service board with the trying difficulties ahead.

In its program to enroll civilians in defense roles, the council will place enlistment cards in the various mayors' offices throughout the county, except in Greenville, where the cards will be placed in the Red Cross sewing room. Volunteers will be asked to enlist in first aid classes, which will be started in as many parts of the county as the needs require. Chiefs of fire departments will start training classes for those enrolling in this phase of home defense. The sheriff's office and the various police chiefs will organize forces for the enforcement of regulations during blackouts and begin training at once. These forces also will be charged with handling the public in other emergencies.

The council went on record as endorsing the home demonstration agent in a program for conserving food and increasing the production of butter, eggs, milk and other essential foods.

J. B. Kittrell was named chairman of a committee to handle the matter of conserving all waste products, especially paper. Instructions soon will be issued as to what disposition to make of waste paper as it is proposed to deliver this waste to paper mills at Plymouth and Roanoke Rapids.

The council also conducted a campaign to encourage citizens to go about their regular duties in a calm manner, without excessive hate or fear.

Worst Loss For Britain During War

Battleship Prince Of Wales And Battle Cruiser Repulse Acknowledged To Have Been Lost In Biggest Single Blow Thus Far; Japs Announce Another Big Ship May Have Been Sunk

London, Dec. 10.—(AP) Britain lost two of her mightiest capital ships today—the powerful new 35,000-ton battleship Prince of Wales and the 32,000-ton battle cruiser Repulse—both sunk by the Japanese off Malaya in the most disastrous single blow struck to the British Navy in the whole war.

Their loss was announced by the Admiralty without a word of how they were sent to the bottom of the Pacific ocean or of the fate of their crews, together more than 3,000 men.

A Japanese communiqué said they were destroyed by air attack. This, if confirmed, would be the first known sinking of any warship of the size either of the Prince of Wales or the Repulse by aerial bombardment.

Prime Minister Churchill made public the announcement in a terse statement before the shocked House of Commons.

The Prince of Wales, only recently dispatched to the Pacific, was the flagship of the fleet Britain had massed and organized to defend the empire in the Far East.

Previously, in more than two years of war, Britain had lost only two of her capital ships, the battleship Royal Oak, 29,150 tons, sunk by a German submarine October 14, 1939, in Scapa Flow, and the 42,100-ton battle cruiser Hood, sunk by the German battleship Bismarck May 24, 1941, in the Atlantic.

The Prince of Wales was one of the vessels which hunted down the Bismarck in the Royal Navy's quick revenge for the loss of the Hood.

The Atlantic Charter was drawn up aboard her in August by Prime Minister Churchill and President Roosevelt.

Berlin, Dec. 10.—(AP)—DNEB quoted Japanese naval authorities today as announcing they had reason to believe that the 35,000-ton British battleship King George V, also had been sunk with the Prince of Wales and battle cruiser Repulse in air attacks on Britain's Far Eastern fleet.

Proposes Conference

Washington, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull today proposed a conference of American foreign ministers to be held at Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in the first week of January.

Hull's call for a conference to discuss the new war menace which confronts the Western Hemisphere was disclosed today by the State Department.

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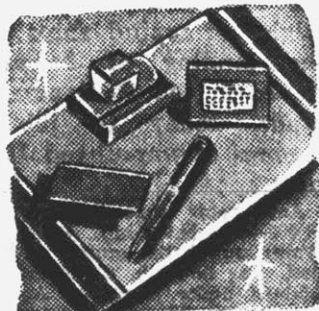
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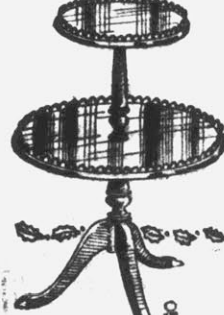

Around... Capital Square

Reflector Bureau.

Recruiting—About the busiest place in Raleigh these war days is the top floor of the Federal building, the headquarters of Navy recruiting for North and South Carolina. For several years this station has had one of the best records in the country — frequently leading them all though the population of its territory is well under that of some other stations. In October it broke all records with 550 men actually enlisted in the Navy in 30 days. The way things are moving at present indicates that a new record might be made this month.

Commander.—In charge of the navy's Carolina's recruiting station is Lt. Commander McFarland W. Wood. Day by day he administers the oath to from 20 to 30 embryo sailors. He talks Navy night and day. He is one of the navy's best salesmen and business is booming. Few of the people who have seen Commander Wood this week realize that behind that cheerful smile is a very worried mind. Commander Wood's brother was in command of one of the destroyers based at Pearl Harbor which the Japs attacked without warning last Sunday. He has not heard of him or his wife and children and probably won't for some time.

Relaxing.—Since Sunday the Navy has relaxed its physical standards and is enlisting men from 17 to 49 years of age. To speed up the enlistment routine, about half of the "paper work" has been eliminated. So far the office has been able to keep abreast of the tide by keeping open until around 10 o'clock at night.

Spurt.—The declaration of war caused a definite spurt in naval enlistments in North and South Carolina. Wood said that he has not had time to analyze the influx. He cannot say what proportion are older men, taking advantage of the relaxed standards for admission. But he has seen enough to know that old-fashioned, garden variety of patriotism has had much to do with it.

"Carolinians have always been foremost in defending this country

and I am sure the people will not fail to respond now," he said.

Enthusiasm.—The enthusiasm of the recruits is very pleasing to Commander Wood but the other night he found that there was such a thing as overdoing it. After a hard day he finally had to go to sleep late at night when his telephone rang. It was a collect call from a town about 100 miles from Raleigh.

"Just want to know I'm coming up tomorrow and join the Navy," said a drunk at the other end. "Get everything ready. These damn Japs can't do this to me."

Textbook.—For 10 years Paul Kelly, assistant director of the Department of Conservation and Development, has harbored a dream. It was that in the schools throughout North Carolina conservation would be taught as a regular course and from a good textbook. This week his dream was about ready to come true. The course will be taught in either the seventh or eighth grades. The new textbook, published by the State Textbook Commission, is off the press and ready for distribution. Paul hasn't said whether or not he thinks it satisfactory but he ought to. He and John Baskerville, formerly of the department's division of state advertising and once the manager of this Raleigh bureau were the co-authors.

Form.—The next text, "the Story of Conservation in North Carolina," is attractive in appearance and in form. The text is a readable conversation between "Uncle Bob," who apparently knows more about conservation than any other single person yet discovered, and a nephew and niece or so.

"What do people mean when they speak of North Carolina as the 'balanced state,' Uncle Bob?" asks Niece Mary at the beginning of the book and from then on, for 379 pages, Uncle Bob answers questions, tells stories and describes the resources of the state. The book ends with Nephew James' statement "we

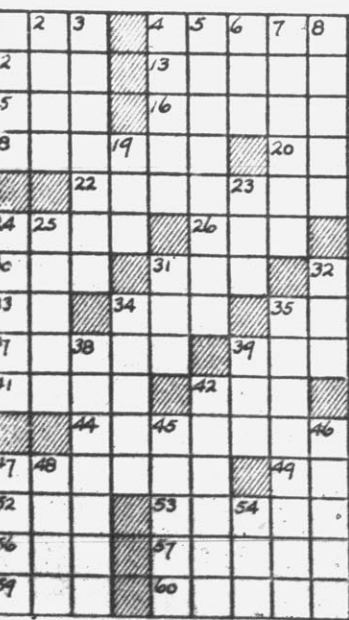

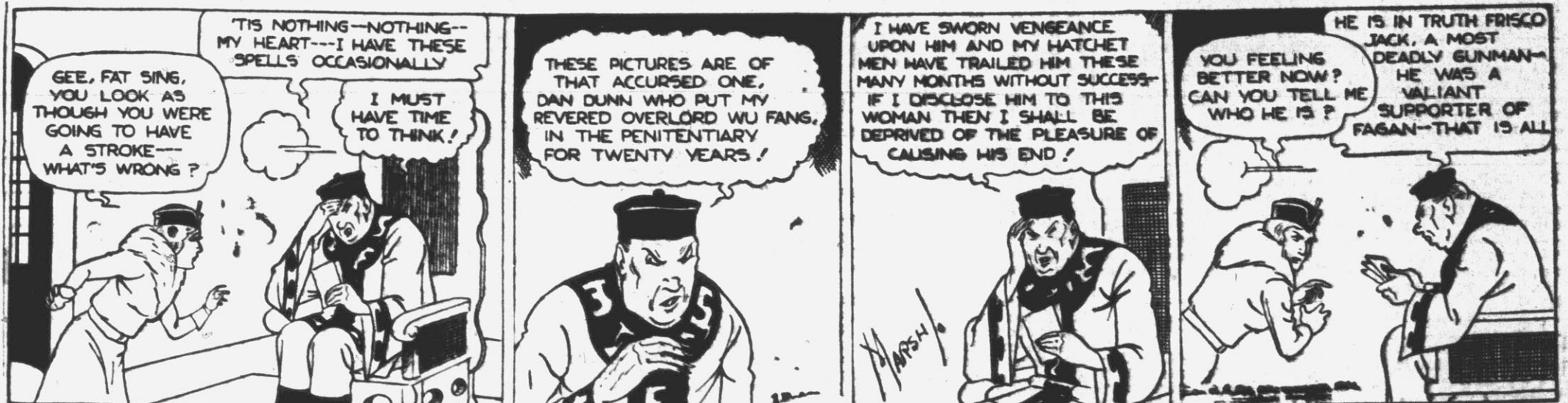

The attack occurred between San Fernando and Vigan. "Our first bombing attacks on six transports at Vigan resulted in direct hits on three hostile ships and damage to the remaining three one ship capsizing and sinking immediately," the communique said.

The Army said the Navy and Army air forces participated in the attack in close cooperation. No operations have as yet materialized in the southern islands of the Philippine group, the communique added.

The text of the department's communique: "Information received last night from the commanding general, Far Eastern Command, reveals the defeat of a hostile attack against the west coast of Luzon between San Fernando and Vigan."

"The Navy air force participated in the attack in close cooperation with the army."

New York, Dec. 10.—(AP)—A brief Manila dispatch to the Associated Press, from which parts were missing, indicated that the Manila area had been under attack by Japanese planes this afternoon (early morning New York time).

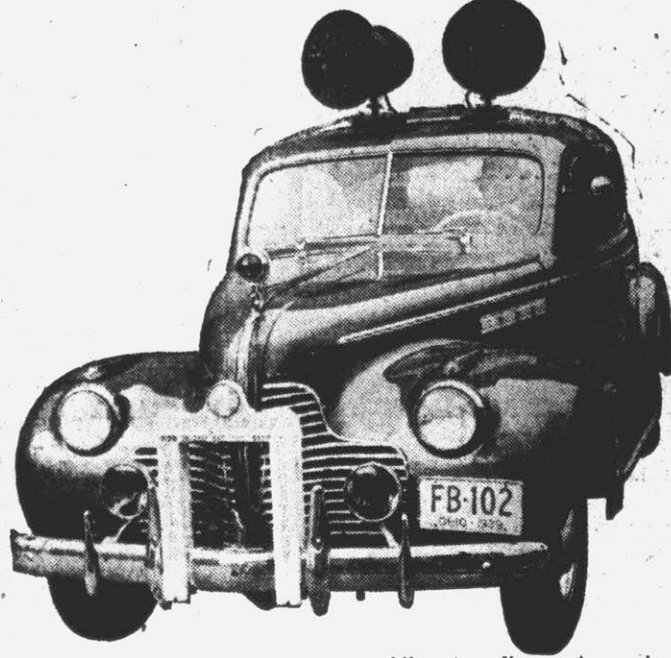

GUARD FACING CALL TO DUTY

May Be Ordered To Active Service Within Week

Reflector Bureau. Raleigh, Dec. 10.—The North Carolina State Guard probably will be ordered out for active guard duty soon—perhaps by the end of the week.

No announcement has been made but it has been learned that federal authorities have asked the state to consider taking over certain duties in order to relieve regular army soldiers for other duty.

The order is expected as soon as arrangements have been made to pay and provide for the state soldiers.

It is not believed that the guardsmen will be taken any great distance from their respective homes. Rather each unit will be assigned to guard power plants, reservoirs, railway yards, bridges, trestles and strategic points in their immediate territory.

In command of the guard is Brig. Gen. J. Van B. Metts. Asked if the guardsmen would be put on "part time" duty so as to be able to continue with their regular work, he said probably not. The duty for which they are expected to be called means they must give up their regular jobs.

There are 40 State Guard units of approximately 50 men each in North Carolina. These are uniformed volunteers, whose ages range from 17 to 45, are the modern counterpart of the old "home guard." But they are far more vital to national defense. The kind of war they have now days makes the home just as much a point of attack as the trench.

Most of the units are commanded by veterans of the last war.
