

ASSAULT ON MANILA IS INTENSIFIED BY JAPANESE

Declares Allies To Be Ready For Offensive By 1943

DECLARATION BY CHURCHILL

British Prime Minister, in A Historic Address To U. S. Congress Asserts Allies To Be Given Lesson The World Will Never Forget; Accorded Roars of Applause By Solons

Washington, Dec. 26. — (AP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill told Congress today the Allies would be ready "to take the initiative of an ample scale" by 1943 and in the end give the Axis powers a lesson the world "will never forget."

Standing in the center of the green-carpeted Senate rostrum, the stocky Briton asked his intently listening audience these questions about the Germans, Japanese and Italians:

"What kind of people do they think we are? Do they not realize that we shall never cease to persevere against them until we have taught them a lesson which they and the world will never forget?"

This brought a roar of applause from the packed-and-jammed Senate chamber, where House members were sandwiched in between the regular Senate desks. Members

Washington, Dec. 26. (AP) — Winston Churchill raised his fingers in a "V" for victory sign as he left the Senate chamber after his historic address.

The Prime Minister sat down when he completed his speech. Several minutes of applause and cheering followed. Then, as he left the rostrum, Churchill held up his right hand with the first two fingers forming the "V" and the crowd roared.

of the Supreme Court, the cabinet and the diplomatic corps were also in his audience.

The Prime Minister spoke also of the "masses awaiting the hour of liberation when they, too, will be able to play their part and strike their blows like men."

The United States-British production, within a year or 18 months, Churchill said, would result in war power output beyond "anything ever seen in the Axis states."

The youth of Germany, Japan and Italy had been taught, the Britisher said, that aggressive warfare was the duty of the citizen and should begin as soon as the weapons were available.

"They have plotted and planned for war," he charged.

The stocky Prime Minister stood in the center of the Senate rostrum, and spoke in a calm, quiet voice. He was cheered lustily when he entered the chamber, which was jammed to capacity.

Churchill said it was natural that the planning and plotting by the Axis powers had placed the United States at a disadvantage. But, saying that we should be thankful that we had time to prepare for war, he added:

"If Germany had tried to invade Britain in June, 1940, and Japan had declared war on the United States the same day, no one can say what disaster might have come."

Churchill said that within 18 months production in the United States will produce results in war power beyond anything that has been seen and that "by the end of 1942 we will be quite definitely in a better position than we are now."

By 1943, he said, production "will enable us to assume the initiative on an ample scale." Applause halted his remarks.

The British leader said he and President Roosevelt did not hesitate to forecast a "long and hard war" because "our people would rather know the truth."

With the spirit which has developed he said it did not matter if it was 1942, 43, or 44. The task ahead, he said, is "not beyond our strength and endurance as long as we have faith in our own cause."

"Mighty strokes of war already have been dealt against the enemy," he continued, and with mention of Russian victories, the audience again applauded at length. Maxim Litvinoff, the Russian ambassador, sat unsmiling.

For the first time since the war began, Churchill declared, the British had been able to fight the Axis forces with equal weapons in Africa.

"For the first time," he said, "we have made the Hun feel the sharp (Continued on Page Six)

PEACE TERMS BEING TALKED

Would Reduce Axis Nations In Family Of Nations

Washington, Dec. 26. — (AP)—Senators, looking ahead to ultimate victory over the Axis, already are discussing peace terms, and Senator Lucas (D-Ill.) said today that "Japan should be reduced to a point where for 1,000 years she will have no control or force in the family of nations."

"That goes for Germany and Italy, too," the Illinois senator told reporters.

"We can never have a lasting peace until Hitlerism and the Philosophy which exists among the Axis powers are destroyed," he continued. "The peace we make is just as important as the war we are conducting."

"When we win the war," said Senator Davis (R-Pa.), "we should put a steel wall around Japan." Davis added that this country help make China a powerful, independent nation which could become "a stabilizing force in the Orient."

Senator Norris (Ind-Neb.) said he believed the allies first should disarm Germany, Italy and Japan. Provide sufficient food to keep the inhabitants of those nations alive immediately after the cessation of hostilities and then work out a long-range peace program.

Senator Clark (D-Ida.), who opposed administration foreign policies prior to American entrance into the war, declared that when we are able to negotiate a peace one of the first things we must consider is giving all countries access to raw materials. Unless there is equal access to the materials that make for the comforts of life there will be an interminable series of wars.

The Christmas story from the far east lacks the cheer of the season for the anti-Axis forces, since on the whole the Japanese have driven their spearheads closer to the heart of the allied defense—the all-essential base of Singapore.

The citadel of Hongkong has surrendered after a gallant stand, thereby giving the Japs a mighty important base from which to strike at Singapore and the Philippines. The Nipponese reportedly have captured Kuching, capital of Sarawak, on the great island of Borneo which lies close to Singapore, thereby creating still another threat against the British stronghold.

Thus the Japs have continued to whittle down the vast line of island defenses which shield Singapore from the east and permit passage

AXIS SUSTAIN SET-BACKS IN EUROPEAN WAR

Twenty Thousand Reported Lost In Crimean Area

MANY VILLAGES TAKEN BY REDS

More Than 13,000 Axis Prisoners Reported Taken In Africa; Bengasi In British Hands

Adolf Hitler's Crimean armies were reported today to have lost 20,000 killed in a six-day battle at the approaches of Sevastopol, long-besieged Russian naval base, and Soviet dispatches listed an additional 13,900 German slain on other battlefields during the Christmas holidays.

With the steam-roller Red army counter-offensive sweeping on unchecked, advances reaching London said the Russians had recaptured the strategic Oka river city of Kaluga, 110 miles southwest of Moscow, Kaluga is 65 miles northeast of Tula, where the Germans for weeks attempted to break through to Moscow.

In the north, on the Leningrad front, Soviet troops were credited with capturing Ozyu after a 62-mile-drive from Tikhvin, 110 miles southeast of Leningrad, and it was apparent that this thrust, if continued, would soon threaten the right flank of the German siege forces before Leningrad itself.

Aside from the bloody slaughter at Sevastopol, where the situation was still obscure, the Russians said 10,000 German officers and men had been killed in fighting on the Moscow front from December 21 to 25, another 3,000 slain in an undisclosed sector, and 800 killed on the southern (Ukraine) front.

Dispatches to the Soviet newspaper Izvestia reported that Red army troops had succeeded in smashing into a "large" populated place on the western bank of the Oka river, which Hitler had personally ordered to be held.

A Berlin broadcast reported that the Fuehrer again spent Christmas among his soldiers and described it as a "serious" and "more of a wartime Christmas" than before.

On the North African front, British headquarters reported that more than 13,000 Axis prisoners had already been removed to the rear and that British troops were inflicting heavy losses on German General Erwin Rommel's forces attempting to retreat near Agedabia, 60 miles south of British-captured Bengasi.

Cairo dispatches said "isolated bodies in various stages of disorganization" still remained around Barce and south of Bengasi but "the bulk of the retreating enemy" was being engaged near Agedabia. Cairo military observers said most of the tanks of General Rommel's fleeing armies had already been wiped out in heavy battles which marked the 340 mile sweep of Britain's desert armies across Libya from the Egyptian frontier to Bengasi.

FRENCH ISLAND NOW ANTI-AXIS

Taken Over By Free French; U.S. Offers Protest

St. Pierre, St. Pierre-et-Miquelon, Dec. 26. — Free French seamen went about the business of organizing this barren Atlantic outpost today as a little but loyal ally of anti-Axis powers which seemed reluctant to accept its services.

They were supported by 98 per cent of the voters from the cod-fishing population of about 3,500 on the islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon, 15 miles off New Foundland.

The voters chose Free French rule — as against that of Vichy — in a plebiscite yesterday, one day after Vice Admiral Ighite Muselier, commander of the Free French naval forces, had steamed into St. Pierre with four corvettes to seize the islands for Gen. Charles De Gaulle's forces.

Only ten opposing votes were cast. The United States government was reliably reported to be endeavoring to restore the status quo of the islands in conformity with an agreement made recently with the French authorities in Martinique to free France's western Atlantic islands out of the war line-up.

(The purpose of the Martinique agreement was to keep the Vichy government from moving farther toward the Axis. The U. S. State Department yesterday characterized the seizure as "an arbitrary action contrary to the agreement of all parties concerned and certainly without the prior knowledge or consent in any sense of the United States government.")

(The British radio quoted the Berlin radio as reporting that Admiral Jean Darlan of the Vichy government had gone to Toulon, big French Mediterranean naval base where several major units of the French fleet are berthed.)

Whatever might be the attitude of Washington and London General De Gaulle himself wired congratulations to Admiral Muselier from Free French headquarters in London.

No RAF Bombings On Christmas Day

London, Dec. 26 (AP) — The Royal Air Force was reported authoritatively today to have refrained from bombing Germany on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, although German planes were active against England.

It was said that no RAF planes crossed the Channel and only routine fighter patrols along the coast were in the air.

A communiqué said: "In the early part of last night enemy aircraft were active near the east coast of England. Incendiary bombs were dropped at one place on the coast, but caused neither damage nor casualties."

Nazis Sink Freighter.
Berlin, Dec. 26. (Official broadcast recorded by AP) — German airmen sank a 3,000-ton freighter off the English east coast last night and heavily damaged four other merchant ships with bomb hits, the high command said today.

Another Jap Destroyer Sunk By Dutch Aircraft

East Indies Forces Average One Jap Ship Daily

Batavia, N.E.I., Dec. 26 (AP) — The Dutch, whose air and submarine forces have set a daily average of one Japanese ship sunk or seriously damaged since they went to war with Japan, announced today the sinking of a Japanese destroyer and transport in an air attack on enemy shipping concentration off Kuching, capital of Sarawak, Island of Borneo.

(Aneta, official Dutch news agency, telephoning the communiqué to New York appeared to say that a "destroyer or a transport" had been sunk. The New York office of Aneta was rechecking this passage.)

On the basis of the latest report the Japanese had lost two destroyers in recent days to the Dutch, who reported only yesterday that one of the 2,100 ton Amagiri class was torpedoed and sunk the night of Dec. 24-25 by a submarine which escaped the death bombs dropped by an accompanying destroyer to report its victory.

Just when the other destroyer was hit was not clear since the Dutch Naval Air Force has been hammering at shipping off Kuching for the past three or four days.

A Dutch reconnaissance plane was said today to have spotted a Japanese seaplane circling around the wreck of a burned out and abandoned ship. The Dutch plane, an American-built Maryland, attacked, but the fight was broken off, with the Dutch plane slightly damaged.

The abandoned ship appeared to be a 6,000-ton freighter of "foreign nationality."

The communiqué said that in an air raid on a Dutch airdrome in the outer possessions yesterday morning a heavy Japanese bomber was shot down by anti-aircraft guns.

"Bombardment of one of our local airdromes by Japanese bombers caused only a little material damage. The airdrome, however, cannot be used for the time being. No persons were killed or wounded," it said.

Gives First-Hand Account On Fighting At Lingayen

(Editor's Note: — Clark Lee, Associated Press staff reporter with wide experience in Asia, tells here what he saw during a trip to the Lingayen front in the Philippines. Lee was born in the AP in 1929 and has worked in New York, Newark, Mexico City, Honolulu, and all over the Orient.)

Manila, Dec. 26. (AP)—Masses of Japanese troops—some of them boys of 15 to 18 years old and poorly equipped with 25 caliber guns—are dying in attacks on the Lingayen front as if simply accepting the inevitable.

An American officer who commanded one of the beach defenses told me there was "no hysterical exaltation" in the charge on the shore last Monday, when the major invasion began.

"They didn't charge, but crouched forward just a little bit," lifting their knees high in a sort of imitation goose step," he said.

"They kept coming forward in pairs, one directly behind the other. They were coming on to die and many of them did."

"Many times one of our heavy machine-gun or rifle bullets killed two men at once."

"When hit, they just threw up their hands and fell backward as (Continued on Page Six)

NEW PRESSURE ON SINGAPORE NOW EXPECTED

Hongkong Surrendered After Heroic Defense

LOST IN FACE OF JAPANESE ODDS

British Report Says Nipponese Push Now Developing Down Center Of Malaya Peninsula

Singapore, Dec. 26. — (AP) The Christmas day fall of Hongkong after a week of fighting upon the island itself was expected today to signal intensification of the Japanese against Singapore, British bastion at the tip of Malaya.

Hongkong's garrison, under assault by land, sea and air since the outbreak of the Pacific war, was forced to yield the island, the heart of a Crown Colony established by Britain at the mouth of the Canton river 100 years ago, by the overpowering numbers of the invaders.

(London officials said destruction of all water supplies handicapped the British, Indian, Canadian and Chinese defenders.)

(The colonial office commented: "So ends a great fight against overwhelming odds." The foreign office, while giving no figures, said "military and civilian casualties were heavy.")

(A Chungking statement said Hongkong's defense was an inspiration "to all the allied forces.")

(Domei, the Japanese news agency, said a 15 minute parley of Japanese authorities late yesterday with Sir Mark Young, governor and commander in chief of Hongkong, led to an unconditional surrender.

The governor met Lieut. Col. Tokukuni Tada of the Japanese staff at the Peninsula hotel in Kowloon. He was quoted as saying: "I am here to become a prisoner by ordering the entire British forces to cease all resistance." He remained at the hotel overnight under Japanese guard, Domei said.)

Official reports indicated that the Japanese drive southward down the Malay peninsula against British defenses 300 miles north of Singapore had been stemmed, although there was haphazard dive-bombing by Japanese planes.

(The British radio reported a Japanese push developing down the center of the Malay peninsula toward Kuala Lipis, 280 miles north of Singapore. The report, heard here by CBS, said the Japanese were following a rail line and keeping to the jungle of either side.)

(The report also said British casualties in Malaya were "lighter than expected and many units which had been considered lost, were turning up. The Japanese arriving on small carriers and moving up rivers on rafts, were reported very lightly equipped and armed only with tommy guns.

The nominations were made by J. H. Rose, Civilian Defense head, Clerk of Court J. Frank Harrington and David T. House, Jr., chairman of the Board of County Commissioners. They will be formally named by Gov. Broughton.

The three men will have complete control of the sale of tires and there will be no appeal from their ruling. Anyone purchasing a tire will have to secure a certificate from the board and it was announced that no certificates would be issued for the purchase of tires for strictly pleasure cars.

Stack Arms!

Tokyo, Dec. 26. — (Official broadcast recorded by AP) — The remnants of the British Imperial garrison at Hongkong, estimated at 6,000 men, was reported to have been ordered to stack arms by noon today in conformity with yesterday's surrender to Japanese siege assault.

The disarming got swiftly under way at various points of the now occupied British crown colony following the British command's formal acceptance early this morning of demands presented by representatives of the Japanese army and navy.

The Japanese demands provided: 1—Stationing of a "certain number" of Japanese troops for maintenance of order.

2—British assumption of full responsibility for cessation of hostilities and prevention of "unwanted incidents."

3—That decisions on further conformity with the British surrender should be made later.

Receives Cablegram From Son in Hawaii

A Christmas greeting cablegram received by Mrs. Mabel Mann of this city from her son, Ricks, was the first word she had received since she was advised by the War Department that he was injured during the Japanese aerial assault on Hickman Field, Hawaii, December 7.

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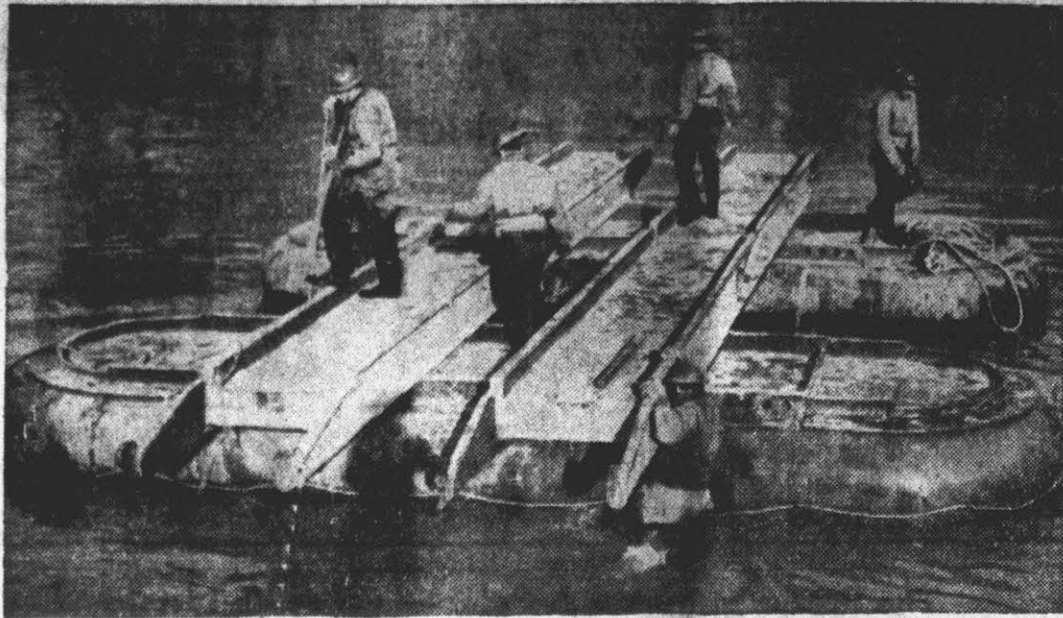

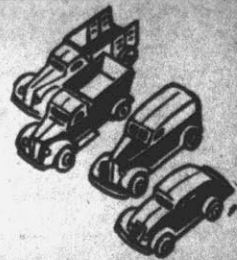

Washington — The Capital in Wartime:
All the horrors of war aren't confined to the front or even to bombed cities. For example, there are those "patriotic" songs that have sprung up on the radio overnight — as thick as weeds in an unworked cotton patch.

In Hollywood, several Johnnie-come-lates turned out at the crack of dawn one morning to file first claim at the Hays office to the title, "Remember Pearl Harbor." Another company announced with patriotic fervor that it would abandon proceedings on a super-duper called "Pearl Harbor Pearl."

One well patronized Washington restaurant already has changed "Italian spaghetti" on its menu to "Liberty noodles," which must make the Nazi nudel lovers laugh. And another is advertising its spaghetti as "Victory Macaroni" which is equally silly maccheroni being just as Italian as its slender cousin.

A traffic violator, hailed into court the other day for failure to post his bail the night before, explained he had driven up to the 8th Precinct police station and discovered "it was closed for the night." The judge let him off. He should have.

The 8th Precinct station is the city's finest example of how to blackout a building. During blackouts, its looks about as full of life as an abandoned warehouse on the

riverfront in a heavy midnight fog.

One of Washington's several women taxi drivers applied to the Red Cross for appointment as an ambulance driver. She was told, she says, that she would have to prove her worth by driving 100 hours for the Red Cross in her own car. She asked how about the 10 years she had been driving a taxi in Washington traffic. That didn't count.

Speaking of taxis, the District of Columbia are being organized into a "civilian defense motor corps" that might be one of the most effective aids to the capital if trouble comes. It is estimated that there is one to every 250 persons in the District.

In an air attack, these would be assigned to rush doctors and nurses to stricken areas to act as emergency ambulances, and to aid in evacuating.

One thing air raid preparations are doing for Washington is to bring Mrs. Got-Rox, Secretary Phoofer and Sen. Even Phoofer off those high horses.

With the exception of New York and Chicago, Washington probably is proportionately more of an apartment city than any other. Like all big apartment cities, the most unneighborly people in town are the neighbors.

I know a young man who had lived in the same building with a senator for three years, but had never seen him until they both turned up at an air raid warden organization meeting. The young man's apartment is one room, the senator's seven. But it was the young man who was named deputy warden for that section of the building.

Three nights later, the senator called and wanted to know if the deputy would's please come in and help him plan the blackout of his 21 windows. Now instruction class-

es are being held in the senator's apartment and the senator is just one of the gang.

Such stories are being told all over Washington. Approximately sixty-five senators, seven cabinet members, several Supreme Court justices, a couple of hundred dollar-a-yearers, and numberless congressmen live in apartments and are getting acquainted with the folks around them for the first time.

Maybe this IS the beginning of democracy.

Around... Capital Square

WARNING — Don't let the holiday spirit cloud the fact that these are dangerous times.

Such was the warning Governor Broughton received from the Secretary of War in a telegram which arrived just before the capitol shut down for Christmas.

"The approaching holiday season is a period of increased danger from fifth column and sabotage activities," wire the secretary. He predicted that New Year's Eve would be "particularly" dangerous but went into no details. He asked "special vigilance" during the holiday season and concluded as follows:

"Surprise and treachery are Axis weapons. We must anticipate and guard against their employment whenever the enemy might have cause to believe there is a likelihood of relaxed vigilance."

In other words, the Secretary of War issued the same sort of warning that many people called "fantastic" when it came from state officials three weeks ago.

COLLEGES. — Two days after Christmas the North Carolina College Conference will meet at Greensboro College "to organize for maximum cooperation in the nation's victory drive," according to the statement of Charles Parker who is acting as the Governor's "clearing house" of defense information. Exactly what these representatives of colleges will or can do is left to the imagination. But you can lay a safe bet on one thing. If, as and when a senior in a North Carolina college joins the armed forces of the United States, he probably will get his degree without the necessity of passing his final examination.

Understand, please, the colleges have not said anything like that yet. In fact, the college authorities we have talked to said that nothing like that would happen. But it did once before. And it probably will again. Ex-Marine Frank Graham, president of the University of North Carolina, is not going to be able to keep his boys at their books any better than his cousin, Edward Kidder Graham, did when he was president. And Frank is going to be just as sympathetic with the desire to get into service as was Graham I.

Fact is that the little sawed-off leatherneck would give all his degrees, caps and gowns to get into this war himself and he is going to have one difficult job trying to be convincing when he argues against anybody getting in uniform.

WING COMMANDER. — Mark Reid, Jr., having found that he would be unable to accept the designation of Wing Commander of the North Carolina Civil Air Patrol, the Governor has appointed Junius Horner, ball-headed, lanky, cadaverous Asheville lawyer to the job of organizing this phase of civilian defense.

Twenty years ago June Horner had a nickname which no newspaper would print. But it was the kind of nickname that college kids

would hang only on boys they liked. He outgrew that and later outlined a not-too-dignified reference to the activities of the "Bishop's son" which Tom Wolfe included in "Look Homeward Angel." It was not until he had reached the age men are supposed to bulge around the waist and give up strenuous activities that June went in for flying. He looks about as much like an aviator as the living skeleton in the county fair side show but those who know the flying game say he is good and there is no doubt about his enthusiasm and neergy.

ETIQUETTE. — Governor Charles Sprague of Oregon is probably a very busy man these days but even at that he or his secretary or somebody around the office ought to read a copy of Emily Post's book of etiquette. As soon as it became certain that the Rose Bowl game would be moved to Durham, Gov. Broughton wired him an invitation to be his guest at the mansion and at the game. What mail is backed up in the local postoffice no one knows but up until Christmas Governor Broughton had received no answer, one way or the other.

JR. H. G. — A boy we would like to know is Bill Oliver, Jr. of Reidsville. That young man of 12 years is going to get somewhere in this world. The other day he wrote a letter to the Governor asking executive sanction of his plan to organize the "Junior Home Guard," among boys in his town. Most all of them, said Bill, were good shots with a "BB rifle" and some of them have their own .22 calibre rifles with which they are especially accurate.

Bill added a postscript to his letter, saying "Let's keep 'em flying." The Governor, when questioned, admitted that he more or less dodged the question in the matter of giving governmental sanction to Capt. Oliver's company of deadly marksmen. Having several sons himself, Governor Broughton can pretty well imagine what the reaction of some mothers might be. But he did answer the letter, commending Bill's patriotism even if he did not give the gubernatorial OK to the idea.

SONS. — Speaking of sons, Clifton Beckwith, of the Attorney General's office, has three sons in the army, all sergeants. On the record the ages of two of them, twins, appears as 22. 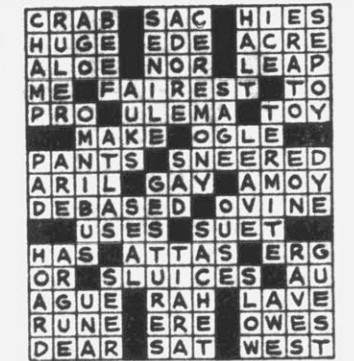

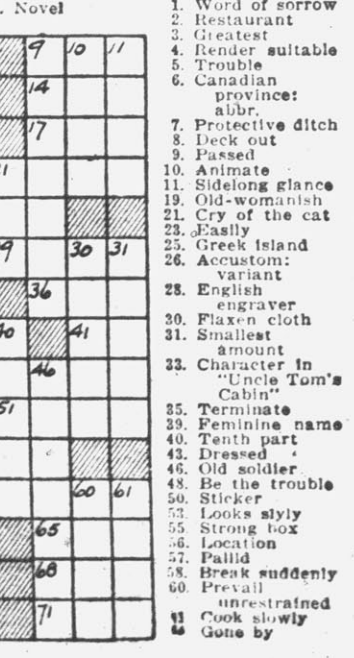

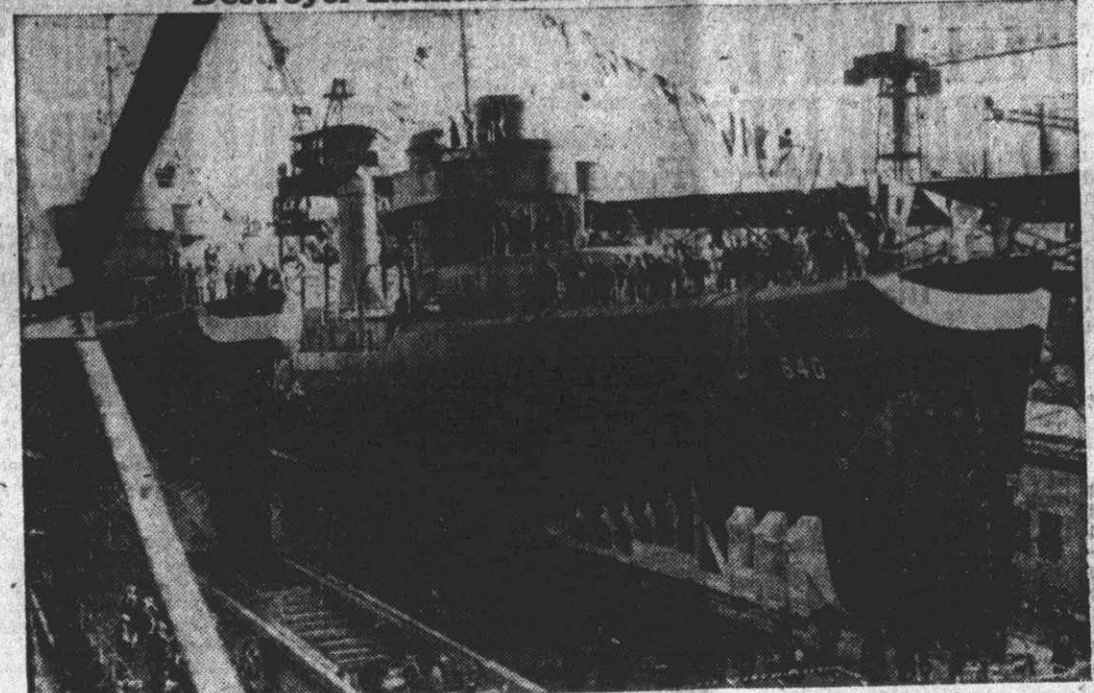
"Golly!" Asey said as he got out of the car, "now you speak of it, Jennie did murmur something about your having phoned."

ASSAULT ON MANILA IS INTENSIFIED BY JAPANESE

(Continued from page one)
The attacks the army declared the fighting was going on in all sectors and Francis B. Sayre, United States high commissioner, pledged that "we will fight to the last man."
The proclamation declaring Manila an open city said that "in order that no excuse may be given for a possible mistake, the American high commissioner, the commonwealth government and all combatant military installations will be withdrawn from its environs as rapidly as possible."
As soon as the order was announced, U. S. High Commissioner Francis B. Sayre said he was transferring his office outside Manila and added:
"We will fight to the last man."
Sayre declared that "we know our fight is America's fight. America's help is sure. There can be no shadow of question as to the ultimate victory."
President Manuel Quezon announced he was leaving Manila on the advice of General MacArthur and would administer affairs of the civil government from the outside.
Japanese planes flew over Manila early today at approximately 10,000 feet without drawing anti-aircraft fire. All guns apparently had been removed.
Meanwhile a noon communique acknowledged increasing Japanese pressure on the southeastern front from Alimanan, 75 miles southeast of Manila, to Maubun, on the Lamon Bay 20 miles above Alimanan. The communique said:
"Action on the northern lines was confined to artillery duelling. On the southeastern front, from Alimanan to Maubun, the enemy pressure is increasing."
Earlier it was reported the Japanese driving southward from Apari, on the northern coast of Luzon, had reached Tuguegarao, 50 miles inland, and that it was planned to declare the summer capital of Baguio an unfortified and open city.
At 8 a. m. the army spokesman declared "our line is still holding on both the north and south fronts, although Japanese pressure is continuing. No additional landings have been reported."

It accepting an inevitable fate. "Some were poor quality khaki; others were in half uniforms and half civilian clothing."
The invaders carried 25 caliber rifles and about one-fourth of them had 25 caliber sub-machine guns. The commander of the landing section said the 25 caliber bullet would not kill a man unless it struck in a vital spot.
The battle in the Lingayen area started at 2 a. m. with an artillery duel between Japanese warships and American shore guns.
Opposing the Japanese were Americans and young Filipino troops who are being welded into a first class fighting force.
I spent four days in and around the fighting front, including a two-day hike over mountain trails after the Japanese cut the main road southward, forcing me to abandon and burn my automobile.
Part of the Japanese forces turned southward, and by Wednesday night, when I left the foremost area, they had reached Pozorrubio and Binalonan on the main highway to Manila.

But while this war-time Yuletide has brought its burdens, it has had its good spots as well. The Russians report that they have captured another hundred villages and continue their devastating counter-offensive against the Germans.
The allied triumph in Libya has vastly strengthened the British control of the Mediterranean and has removed any immediate threat to Egypt.
And if one may be permitted to inject a rather personal note, Christmas has brought to me a feeling which I should like to share with you. It is reinforcement of the belief that there's only one way in which we can lose this war—just one way:
It's through selfishness—personal selfishness, which is the basis of collective selfishness.
This greatest crisis of our history can be solved only through the utmost sacrifice by each of us. We can't leave it to George. It's a case of everyone sharing fully according to his talents and resources.
It may be a matter of money, of personal services, of sweat in what once was our leisure time. The individual must figure that out for himself, and in addition accept cheerfully the sacrifices which the government has to impose.
This is a total war, the like of which the world never before has seen. It calls for total sacrifice, total unselfishness. In short, the certain way to victory is for every man, woman and child to jump in and fight like hell, each after his own capabilities.
We can't lose if we do that, because the United States in particular and the allies in general are blessed with resources which can smother the Axis—if we utilize those resources to the utmost.

Enemy Ships Sunk By Asiatic Fleet

Washington, Dec. 26.—(AP)—The Navy confirmed the sinking of two Japanese warships in the far east and the probable sinking of two others in a communique today as the Army reported repulse of repeated enemy attacks on the main Lingayen front in Luzon, largest of the Philippine Islands.
The Navy said that Admiral Thomas C. Hart, commander of the Asiatic Fleet, listed one enemy transport and one mine sweeper sunk with the probable sinking also of another transport and a seaplane tender.
Naval operations are being pressed against submarine activity in the western Pacific, where attacks have taken place off the California coast, the communique said.

Red Cross Moves To Aid Stricken Civilians

edge of the tolls with which he had subjugated Europe."
He noted that the Axis had about 150,000 men in Africa, one-third of them German. The British had set out to destroy this army; he said, adding:
"I have every reason to believe this aim will be fully accomplished." Churchill was glad, he went on, to be able to stand before Congress and say, shortly after American entry into the war, that the British were able to prove that, with equal weapons, they could "beat the life out of the savage Huns."
Hardly pausing for the applause Churchill went on to say that the same kind of medicine had to be given the Axis forces wherever they might be encountered.
There were "glad tidings" from the blue waters of the Atlantic, too, he said with a smile.
The supply lifeline from the United States across the ocean to Britain—far from being decimated by enemy attack—was "incomparably stronger" than ever before and was growing even stronger.
He has found in this country, he said, "an inflexible purpose" which indicated to him that this nation had a "well-grounded confidence in the final outcome" of the war.
If the United States is faced with certain "short-comings" in Pacific preparedness, Churchill said, his was in "no small part due to the assistance you are giving us in the defense of the British Isles and in the battle of Libya, and above all, the help you are giving us in the battle of the Atlantic." He added:
"The choice of how to dispose of our hitherto limited resources had to be made by Britain in time of war and by the United States in time of peace. I believe that on the whole history will judge that the choice was right."
The Prime Minister, frequently interrupted by applause, said when one took into account the resources of Britain and the United States as well as China—"which so long and so valiantly has withstood invasion"—it was difficult to reconcile the Japanese attack on America with

prudence "or even with sanity."
One point he set forth was that this country and Great Britain should make it certain that the catastrophe of war does not come again.

A second telegram stated that \$9,000 had been turned over to the Red Cross through the cancellation of the party-meeting. The company pays for the party and also the traveling and other expenses of its men.

U.S. Stand Hailed By Vichy Regime

Vichy, Dec. 26.—(AP)—The French declared here today that they "welcomed with satisfaction" the United States State Department's condemnation of the DeGaulle occupation of St. Pierre and Miquelon.
They added that the Washington and Ottawa governments, in the state of their relations with the French government, cannot admit any new blow against the existing situation.
It was asserted that the DeGaulle action depends on the decision of the Anglo-Saxon countries and "France consequently counts on prompt reestablishment of the situation existing before December 25 to give her satisfaction."

IS OPPOSED TO CUT IN BUDGET

La Follette Says Huge Reduction Unwarranted

Washington, Dec. 26.—(AP)—In a sharply critical minority report, Senator La Follette (Prog.-Wis.) charged today that the joint economy committee's recommendations for a \$1,131,075,000 cut in non-defense spending was "hasty and unwarranted."
La Follette asserted that committee suggestions for the abolition of the Civilian Conservation Corps, the National Youth Administration and the Farm Security Administration would "knock some of the major props of federal support out from under our special structure in the lower income levels." He alone signed the report.
Earlier Senator George (D-Ga.) had expressed the opinion the United States would be lucky if it could finance one-third of the cost of its war with the Axis out of current revenues, despite projected tax increases.
George, who is chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, told reporters that the \$1,131,075,000 cut recommended yesterday for non-defense expenditures, coupled with such new taxes as Congress may vote in 1942, still would leave the budget far out of balance.
Reports have been current that, before the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, the Treasury had calculated government spending would reach \$3,000,000,000 a month during the fiscal year beginning next July 1.
