SITUATION IN JAVA IS GRAVE

MacArthur's Small Air Force Sinks Jap Ships

Foe Is Taken By Surprise In Subic Bay

One 10,000-ton, Another Of 8,000 Tons And Two Smaller Vessels Sunk In Daring Raid Which Set Fire On Docks Of Former U.S. Naval Station; Stalemate In Ground Activity

Washington, March 4. — (AP) — Two enemy ships and several smaller vessels were destroyed in a sudden surprise attack by General Douglas MacArthur's small air force on Japanese installations and shipping in Subic Bay, north of Bataan, the War Department announced today.

Large fires were started on the docks of Olongapo, former United States naval station in Subic Bay, and on Grande Island, a communiqué reported. Heavy explosions among enemy stores followed the fires.

One ship of 10,000 tons and another of 8,000 tons were destroyed, the department said, and also two motor launches of 100 tons each. Many smaller vessels were damaged.

The text of the communiqué, No. 133 of the war, based on reports received up to 9:30 a. m. EWT, said: "In a sudden surprise attack General MacArthur's small air force swept over Subic Bay destroying several Japanese vessels. Among the enemy ships destroyed were one vessel of 10,000 tons, one of 8,000 tons each. In addition, many smaller craft were damaged. Large fires were started on the docks of Olongapo and Grande Island. These were followed by many heavy explosions among enemy stores."

Explosion

Honolulu, March 4.—(AP)—Three heavy explosions shook Honolulu today immediately after the city at 2:10 a. m.

Army officials said, however, there was no air raid and that the sirens sounded inadvertently. The cause of the explosions was not disclosed.

Honolulu police said a number of windows were broken by the concussion. Telephone switchboards were swamped with calls.

ANOTHER UNIT U. S. SOLDIERS REACH IRELAND

Details Of Landing Withheld Until Men Located

LATEST ARRIVAL MERELY ROUTINE

Also Announced That Several Hundred Of United States Soldiers Have Been Sent To London

With U. S. Troops in Northern Ireland, March 4. (AP) — Thousands more cheering, husky United States fighting men have arrived in a northern Ireland port to augment the force that has been in Ulster for more than a month, it was announced today.

Details of the landing of the fleet of transport and supply ships were withheld until the soldiers, their guns and other fighting equipment had been scattered to the secluded spots throughout the six Northern Ireland counties and the ships had left port.

Compared with the ceremonial landing of the first contingent of the A.P.F. to Europe's part of the World War last month, the latest arrival was a routine job carried out with typical Army and Navy clockwork precision.

London, March 3 (AP)—Several hundred United States troops arrived in London today from Northern Ireland.

Like the first contingent, most of the latest arrivals are mid-westerners who had been in training in southern army camps for a year. But there are some representatives of every part of the country.

They came in full field equipment and with their guns ready.

The "white-haired" troop commander was a colonel from the middle west, a veteran of artillery campaigning in the first World War and five years commander of the same unit, which was with the Rainbow Division.

First ashore from the first shipload, the colonel saluted Maj. General Russell P. Hartle, U. S. Commander in Northern Ireland, and said "Glad to be here, sir."

Meanwhile his soldiers lined the rails, cheering and tossing American cigarettes to the pier to start scrambles among the dockworkers.

The honor of being first man in the ranks to land was given to Master Sergeant Donance Mann, of Council Bluffs, Iowa, who served in the first World War with the colonel commanding this contingent.

Bags Six Bombers And Becomes Ace

St. Louis, March 4 (AP)—Edward H. O'Hare had a new nickname to add to his collection today. Just call him ace.

The young Navy lieutenant—he will be 28 Friday, March 13—gained his distinctive new title yesterday through a Navy communiqué announcing he shot down six Japanese planes during a busy afternoon in the western Pacific.

"In the war of 1917-18, a pilot was unofficially ranked as an ace after bagging his fifth enemy plane," Bashful Eddie O'Hare was just plain Nero to his schoolmates at Western Military Academy in Alton, Ill. He participated in football and dramatics and was an honor student.

It was Butch O'Hare at the Pensacola Naval Station where he went for air training after his graduation from Annapolis.

"He always was crazy about airplanes," proud Mrs. Selma A. O'Hare beamed on hearing news of her son's feat. "I'm the proudest mother in the land!"

O'Hare's father, the late Edward J. O'Hare, was slain mysteriously on a Chicago boulevard in 1939. He was a nationally known horse and dog track operator.

Puerto Rico Blackout. San Juan, Puerto Rico, March 4 (AP)—This territorial capital was blacked out today from 3:05 a. m. to 3:40 a. m. There was no immediate explanation.

It was indicated that the blackout was only practice, since San Juan has had such drills about once a week recently.

Royal Air Force Assaults Paris Industrial Suburbs

May End Coaxing With Vichy Rule

Heavy British Bombing Attack Carried Out On Paris Suburbs May Mark End Of Coaxing With Government And Substitution Of Warfare

London, March 4.—(AP) — The heavy bombing attack by the R. A. F. last night on the great Renault plant and other industrial installations in the suburbs of Paris may mean the end of Allied attempts to coax the Vichy government away from collaboration with Nazi Germany, informed British sources declared today.

An official spokesman asserted the bombing represented no change in R. A. F. policy, but merely in the weather, which other sources earlier had said was particularly clear and thus aided the raiders in finding their targets.

However, it was notable that this was the first time the British had risked the anger of the French by a heavy attack on any objective near the German-occupied French capital. In the past targets in France have been around Lille and Douai in the industrial north.

There was no consultation between the British Foreign Office and the State Department in Washington before the R. A. F. launched the raid, it was learned.

Since the U. S. State Department has borne the brunt of representing the Allied cause at Vichy from the time the United States entered the war, this was regarded as highly significant.

It was argued here that an attack on an objective so near Paris would not have been ordered unless the Allies were ready to risk a German propaganda campaign seeking to turn the French against the Allies with stories of destruction in working class districts and to historic landmarks.

"Much damage" was done, said an Air Ministry communiqué in the first official account of the air assault.

"Last night the Royal Air Force bombers attacked the Renault works at Billancourt on the outskirts of Paris which were known to have been engaged in production of war material for Germany."

"The target was clearly seen in bright moonlight and reports indicate much damage was done."

Informed sources believed the way was cleared for the raid by last Friday night's attack by British parachute troops on the Nazi radio location station at Bruneval, just north of Le Havre.

They declared demolition of this station had allowed the R. A. F. to cross the French coast and approach Paris undetected, and predicted that bombing of the Renault plant would be duplicated in other attacks on industrial areas in northern France.

"Vichy announced today that incomplete figures showed 800 dead in the Paris suburbs, and Marshal Petain ordered that the day of their."

Telephone System Hit By WPA Order

Washington, March 4.—(AP)—The War Production Board plans to permit no further installation of dial telephone exchanges or extension phones in private homes unless such work is "essential for public health and safety."

An order promulgating the restriction immediately was announced yesterday by the board.

The board also forbade replacement of existing wall and desk type phones with hand sets except when an instrument is beyond repair, and it ordered party lines installed whenever such lines would conserve scarce material.

No further replacements or additions to existing plants for service improvements or plant relocations may be made under the order.

Legitimate

Washington, March 4 (AP)—The British bombing of factories in the suburbs of Paris was a legitimate measure of war, acting Secretary of State Welles told a press conference today.

Welles was asked if comment on a London report that the bombing might mean the end of Allied attempts to coax the Vichy government away from collaboration with Nazi Germany.

He replied that it was entirely clear that the bombings of factories in occupied France making war materials for Germany was a legitimate measure of war.

As to the political repercussions of such bombings, Welles had no comment.

He noted, however, that the United States policy toward the Vichy government had been outlined only last week and that this policy was not likely to be affected by the British use of a legitimate measure of war.

REDS CONTINUE ON OFFENSIVE

Claim 50 Enemy Centers Of Resistance Destroyed

Moscow, March 4.—(AP)—Soviet forces have destroyed "about 50 centers of enemy resistance" and killed 650 officers and men in an offensive on the Leningrad front which still is continuing, the Soviet communiqué announced today.

Forty Germans were reported killed in one house alone when an infantry platoon tossed hand grenades into the windows. Twenty Germans heeded the call to surrender before the missiles were thrown.

Soviet soldiers slew 3,400 foe men in two combat zones above Moscow in 48 hours of action this week and placed an aerial supply base of the encircled 16th German army with shellfire, the Russians said today.

"Two thousand German officers and men were killed during the last."

British Freighter Is Sunk In Collision

Lewes, Del., March 4.—(AP)—The British freighter Gypsum Prince, 3,915 tons, sank two miles off Lewes today after a collision with the 5,000-ton oil tanker Voco Five men are missing.

About twenty survivors were landed at the coast guard station here. Navy officials said the Voco owned by the Standard Transportation Company of London and chartered by the Socony Vacuum Oil company, rammed the Gypsum Prince. The freighter sank in four minutes after the collision shortly after 6 a. m.

Owen Jones was master of the freighter, operated by the Gypsum Packet Company. His fate was not determined immediately.

Six survivors were picked up from a raft and 13 others were rescued by coast guard boats.

Back To Normal After Snow Storm

By The Associated Press Communications and transportation systems slowly returned to normal in western North Carolina today after snow and sleet storms which broke all records in some sectors.

Asheville, summer resort city of more than 51,000 population, which was out of touch with the outside world following the storms resumed communications contact late yesterday and bus and train operations were resumed although several hours behind schedule. The snow fall there was 16 inches.

More than 22 inches of snow fell at Banner Elk and at Boone 19 inches was reported. Winston-Salem had a 6.7-inch fall while Mt. Airy reported six inches. Elkin had 15 inches and Wilkesboro 11 inches. Schools over most of the area had closed.

The snow fall had stopped in virtually all the areas and sun today aided highway workers in digging out the highways.

Death Toll In Excess Of 600 With More Than 1,000 Injured; Pamphlets Dropped Along With Bombs Tell Parisians Raid Carried Out To Bomb Factories Making Arms For "Our Common Enemy"

Vichy, March 4.—(AP)—The death toll of an R. A. F. raid on the industrial suburbs of Paris last night mounted steadily today, as rescue workers dug through the ruins, and shortly after noon was placed semi-officially at 600 with more bodies constantly being recovered.

Earlier, a communiqué had announced at least 442 persons killed, more than 1,000 injured and between 200 and 250 houses destroyed on the basis of preliminary information from the Nazi-occupied French capital.

Many of the wounded died on operating tables in hurriedly improvised hospitals where all available physicians in Paris were mobilized for the emergency.

One report said that of about 1,000 wounded in the Boulogne-Sur-Seine and Billancourt suburbs some 300 were feared to be dying.

A new air raid alarm sounded in Paris today at 12:30 p. m., but no bombing was reported.

The new alarm came as rescue workers continued to dig in the ruins for victims of last night's raid.

About 100 of the dead were placed in an improvised morgue in the Boulogne city hall.

All the municipal services of Paris were mobilized to restore lights, gas and water to the damaged areas.

Along with the bombs, the RAF dropped leaflets addressed to the Paris population saying they had come to bomb factories manufacturing arms for "our common enemy" and would return now that they knew where to strike.

At least 12 towers in the suburban belt around Paris were blasted during a two-hour attack the announcement said, although the most concentrated bombing apparently was directed at the factory regions.

United Nations Advised Follow Russian Example

Urged By Sir Stafford Adopt All-Out Program

London, March 4.—(AP)—Sir Stafford Cripps, government leader in the House of Commons, appealed to the United Nations to follow the "all-out" example of Russia in the world fight against Nazism and Fascism in a broadcast speech to the United States today.

"We now are all allies together to drive aggression and Fascism from the world," Sir Stafford declared.

"After the victory let us remain in the same gallant company to rebuild a stricken world upon the foundations of justice and equality that will secure for us, for them and for all people of the world a happier, saner and more peaceful future."

He warned repeatedly that the allies' recent setbacks would be followed by further reverses, but insisted that "modern war, on the gigantic and farflung scale upon which it now is being waged, is not finally won or lost as the result of territorial gains here or there."

"It eventually will be won by the resources in manpower and material that can be mobilized behind one side or the other," the former ambassador to Moscow and new lord privy seal in the war cabinet declared.

This would undoubtedly cost more, Nelson said. "More favorable prices are often obtained at a sacrifice of speed; by shifting the emphasis quicker deliveries can be had at comparatively minor increase in cost."

The new order, "Directive No. 2," makes negotiated contracts mandatory unless the War Production Board gives specific permission for inviting bids.

It was understood the Treasury Procurement Division immediately would get such permission, and perhaps some other agencies.

Nelson's office was deluged, meanwhile, by pledges of labor and management support for his Monday night order for an immediate increase in arms production.

Benjamin F. Fairless, president of the United States Steel Corporation, said in a typical message: "Every man and every facility in U. S. Steel is squarely behind the production program outlined in your radio address."

LITTLE FIRMS TO PLAY PART

Nelson Suspends Competitive Contract Bidding

Washington, March 4.—(AP)—Production Chief Donald M. Nelson ordered the Army and Navy today to bring thousands more of the nation's 200,000 factories into war production by suspending competitive bidding on arms contracts.

"Perfectly capable small firms" had been blocked from getting into war production, Nelson explained, "because under competitive bidding large concerns which already hold extensive war contracts are often able to underbid small manufacturers who are not doing any war work at all."

Nelson, in the directive he issued last night, said that henceforth simple, standardized articles must be ordered by the armed services and the Maritime Commission from smaller concerns, leaving the larger plants free to concentrate on accelerated production of such items as tanks, planes and big guns.

Under the original Army-Navy policy of dealing with larger firms, efforts to bring new plants into the picture had concentrated on encouraging contractors for the completed weapons to sub-contract "bits and pieces" to smaller plants and factories.

The Nelson decree, instead, will let smaller plants contract for the weapons themselves, specifically the more easily handled items.

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James M. Landis, OGD director; District Commissioner J. Russell Young; General L. D. Gasser, in charge of protective training in OGD, and several high ranking army officers were unanimous in praising the almost perfect co-operation of residents and business men. The blackout of all private lighting was effective from 8 p. m. to 6 a. m. It did not apply to street lights or motorists.

Wreck Case. Only one case was tried at the afternoon session of Pitt County court yesterday, this being the result of a wreck. Victor Jones, convicted of careless and reckless driving, was given a 60-day sentence, suspended upon payment of costs, the judgement further provided that the defendant's driving license be revoked two years, the suspension to terminate after 30 days if defendant reimburses J. Linwood Evans for property damage sustained in the wreck.

Emden Raided. London, March 4 (AP)—The big German naval port of Emden was raided and mines were sown by air in enemy waters last night while the RAF was making its major blow against Paris, the Air Ministry disclosed today, listing two planes as the night's total losses.

Defenders Pressed By Jap Forces

Invaders are Striking Hard Against Indies Defenders; Allied Strength Estimated 50,000, Including "Few Thousand British And Americans", Against 85,000 Japs

Japan's invasion hordes scored new gains against outnumbered American, British and Dutch troops in the critical four-day-old battle of Java today, and the danger was now so acute the N. E. I. headquarters announced the major part of a scorched earth defense policy had already been carried out.

A Tokyo radio broadcast said Japanese mechanized units this morning reached a point west of the big Dutch naval base at Soerabaja, in eastern Java, and there clashed with "allied forces trying desperately to halt the Japanese onslaught."

Other enemy columns were striking toward the capital city of Batavia, in western Java, where demolition squads already had begun to blast the picturesque 330-year-old town, and toward the allied headquarters city of Bandung.

Once again, a tragic story of allied numerical inferiority—in planes, ships and men—emerged from the struggle for this last United Nations stronghold in the Indies.

Dutch quarters in London said that only about 50,000 allied troops, among them "a few thousand American and British," were fighting at least 85,000 Japanese and that the United Nations naval force had suffered "a crippling blow" in attempting to halt the Japanese invasion fleet.

Previous reports said the Dutch had an army of 100,000 to 200,000 troops reinforced by "many thousands" of American, British and Australian soldiers, to combat the enemy's sea-borne attack.

A bulletin from N. E. I. headquarters conceded that the invaders "succeeded in making some headway at some points" as a result of numerical superiority "especially in the air."

The extent of the Japanese gains was not specified.

While there still appeared to be no radical change in the situation, the signs were ominous.

"The principal (scorched earth) destruction in Java has now been carried out," the Dutch command said.

Bandung was raided again today, by 25 Japanese planes which swept over the city at 15,000 to 20,000 feet in groups of nine, and seven, Aneta news agency reported.

Dutch anti-aircraft guns opened heavy fire and fighter planes went into action. Bomb explosions could be heard, mostly in the direction of the Bandung airport. Smoke puffed up from the direction of the field but disappeared within ten minutes, indicating that the fire had been extinguished quickly.

There were two more raid alarms in Bandung during the afternoon but so far as could be learned no bombs were dropped in the city.

Heavy clouds made it impossible to count the number of planes which came over, but in the afternoon raids the Japanese had changed tactics and no longer flew in formation.

In Burma

Rangoon, Burma, March 4.—(AP)—British army headquarters announced today that tank-supported British infantry units "have been in contact with the enemy northeast of Pegu" and have inflicted casualties.

(This fighting presumably was along the Sittoung river, which runs from northeast of Pegu into the gulf of Martaban.)

The communiqué said RAF fighter planes attacked the Japanese positions "in close support of our land forces" today, while British bombers were credited with successful low-level attacks yesterday on enemy transport columns, particularly staff cars.

One British bomber was reported shot down in an encounter with a strong flight of Japanese fighter planes, one of which the RAF shot out of the sky.

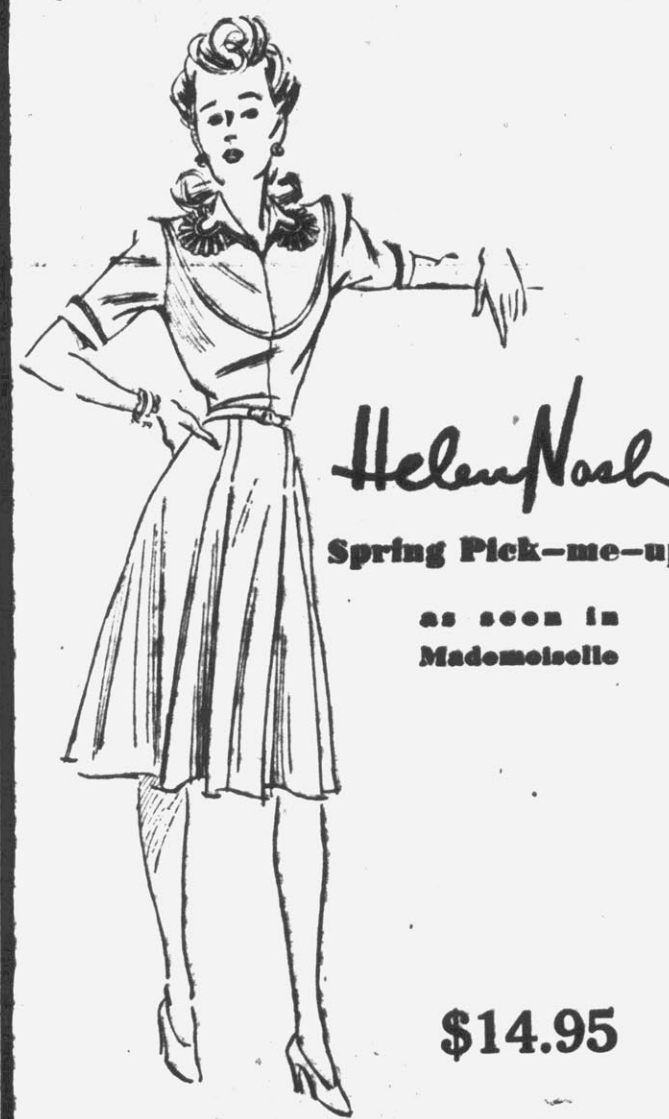

Japanese Hold Leases On Strategic California Areas

CONTROL LAND NEAR HARBORS

Situation Emphasized By Map Showing Holdings

Los Angeles, March 4.—(AP)—Southern Californians, who long have known that Japanese had infiltrated into defense vital areas, had that fact emphasized with startling clarity today. District Attorney John Dockweiler's office exhibited a map showing Japanese hold leases on land in or adjoining nearly every strategic region hereabouts.

Japanese, alien as well as American-born, leased all of the strategic shoreline of the Palos Verdes hills. Some outposts of the harbor defense setup are in that area. Land under lease includes beaches which could be used for military landings, largely concealed by cliffs.

Other Japanese leases include land in or adjoining these vital resources:

• Every railway line in Los Angeles county.

• Owens Valley aqueduct, which furnishes water to Los Angeles and many other cities in the county.

• Every major highway.

• Vulture, Douglas and Lockheed aircraft factories.

• Heart of the Signal Hill oil field and adjacent to Long Beach Municipal airport.

• Virtually every major refinery and oil tank farm in the harbor area.

The map also showed that Japanese hold a mile-square, flat, semi-desert tract northwest of Lancaster which could be converted into a military flying field.

The map was prepared at request of the state attorney general's office for investigation of possible illegal leases—those obtained in one person's name but actually exercised by another.

If fraud is proved, the land would escheat to the state.

Japanese aliens have been removed from a few of the areas.

No Gas Tax Levy In Military Areas

Raleigh, March 4 (AP)—Gasoline used in vehicles operated exclusively within military reservations in North Carolina is not subject to taxation, Attorney General Harry McMullan ruled today.

The ruling said specifically that "any person who buys gasoline in 10 gallon or larger quantities for use in vehicles to be operated exclusively on military reservations, and not on the highways of this state, is entitled to a refund of tax so paid."

In a digest of recent rulings, McMullan also held that:

• Property owned by the Veterans Loan Fund is exempt from taxation.

• A justice of the peace may not draw up contracts, chattel mortgages or fill in warranty deed blanks.

• Persons of nearer kin than first cousins may not legally marry.

• Every railway line in Los Angeles county.

• Owens Valley aqueduct, which furnishes water to Los Angeles and many other cities in the county.

• Every major highway.

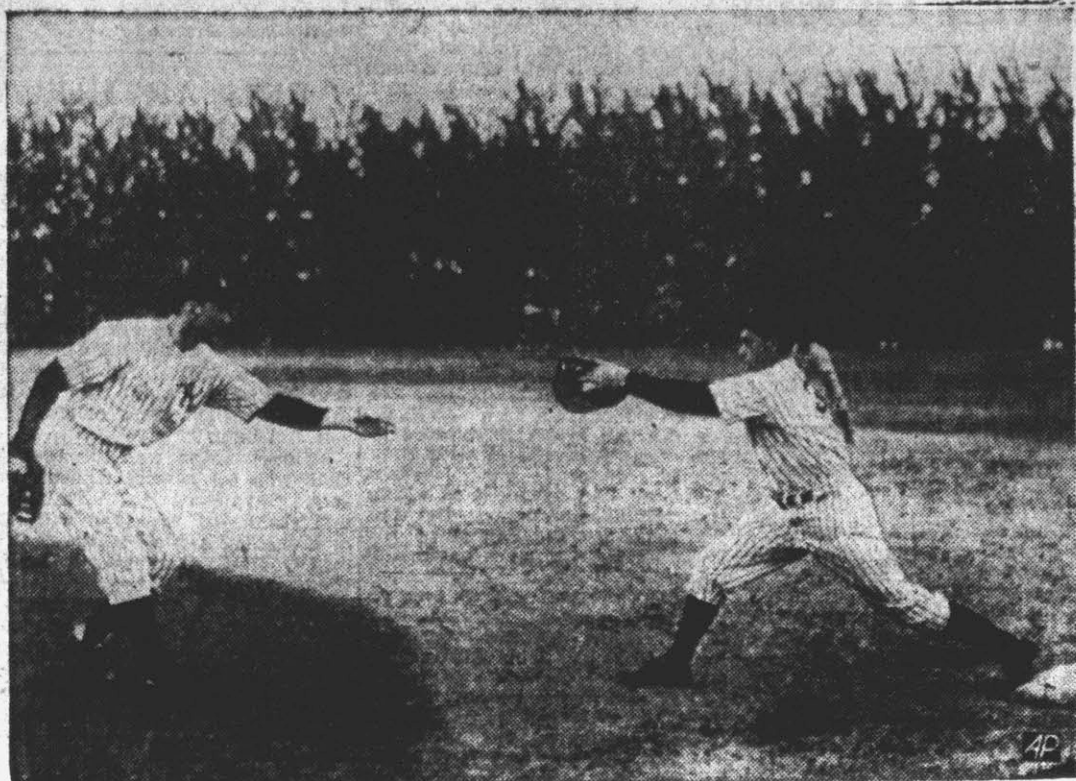

Raleigh, March 4.—(AP)—With the powerful Blue Devils of Duke favored to win their second championship in succession. The annual Southern Conference basketball tournament is scheduled to get underway here tomorrow afternoon.

PACIFIC FLEET ATTACKS JAPS

Action Backs Up Promise of Aggressive Action

Washington, March 4 (AP)—A task force of the United States Pacific fleet, driving deep into the hornet's nest of Japanese mandate islands, blasted 16 heavy enemy bombers out of the skies in a running fight that backed up today the Navy's promise of aggressive action.

The engagement, for all its spectacular success, was hardly major in character, but it had a double significance that impressed the capital.

First: Prohibitive losses had been inflicted on the enemy—only two of 18 attacking bombers escaped—a

fact which spoke volumes for the effectiveness of the fleet's anti-aircraft gunnery and its carrier-borne fighting planes. The bombers failed to score a hit and only two American planes were lost.

Second: Fleet task forces were rambling farther westward, evidently close to the well-fortified Japanese Caroline island, where lie such important enemy bases as Ponape, Truk, Yap and Pelew.

The Navy communiques last night did not indicate how deeply the task force penetrated this general area of the Pacific. It said merely that the action had taken place west of the Gilbert islands—the Japanese mandates which a fleet task force raided with destructive results on Jan. 31.

It was apparent, however, that the task force had come within striking distance of a Japanese base, for the heavy bombers that attacked were land-based aircraft that can not operate from carriers.

Admiral Ernest J. King, commander-in-chief of the U. S. fleet, intimated Monday that such operations could be expected to increase. The matter-of-fact language of the Navy's communiques gave a stirring picture of the pulse-quickening

drama and danger that goes with this initial strategy.

"In the course of recent naval operations west of the Gilbert islands," said the report, "a task force of the Pacific fleet consisting of an aircraft carrier, cruisers and destroyers, was attacked by 18 heavy bombers of the enemy operating in two groups of nine each.

"These attacks occurred in the late afternoon and were timed one-half hour apart.

"The Japanese formations were closely and vigorously engaged by our carrier fighter planes and by

anti-aircraft fire from the ships of our task force.

"Only three enemy planes of the first formation reached their bomb release point over the aircraft carrier, which avoided all bomb hits by split-second maneuvering.

"The leading bomber of this group attempted a crash landing on the carrier and was shot down by heavy close-range anti-aircraft fire when barely 100 yards from its objective.

"In the second attack only five bombers of the enemy formation reached the release point. In this instance the salvo of enemy bombs was closer to the carrier than on the first attack but again no hits were obtained.

"Sixteen of the 18 attacking enemy bombers were shot down in this action. There was no damage to our surface forces. Lieutenant (J.G.) Edward H. O'Hare, U. S. Navy fighter pilot, personally accounted for six bombers of the enemy.

"In the two attacks only two of our fighter planes were lost. The pilot of one was recovered."

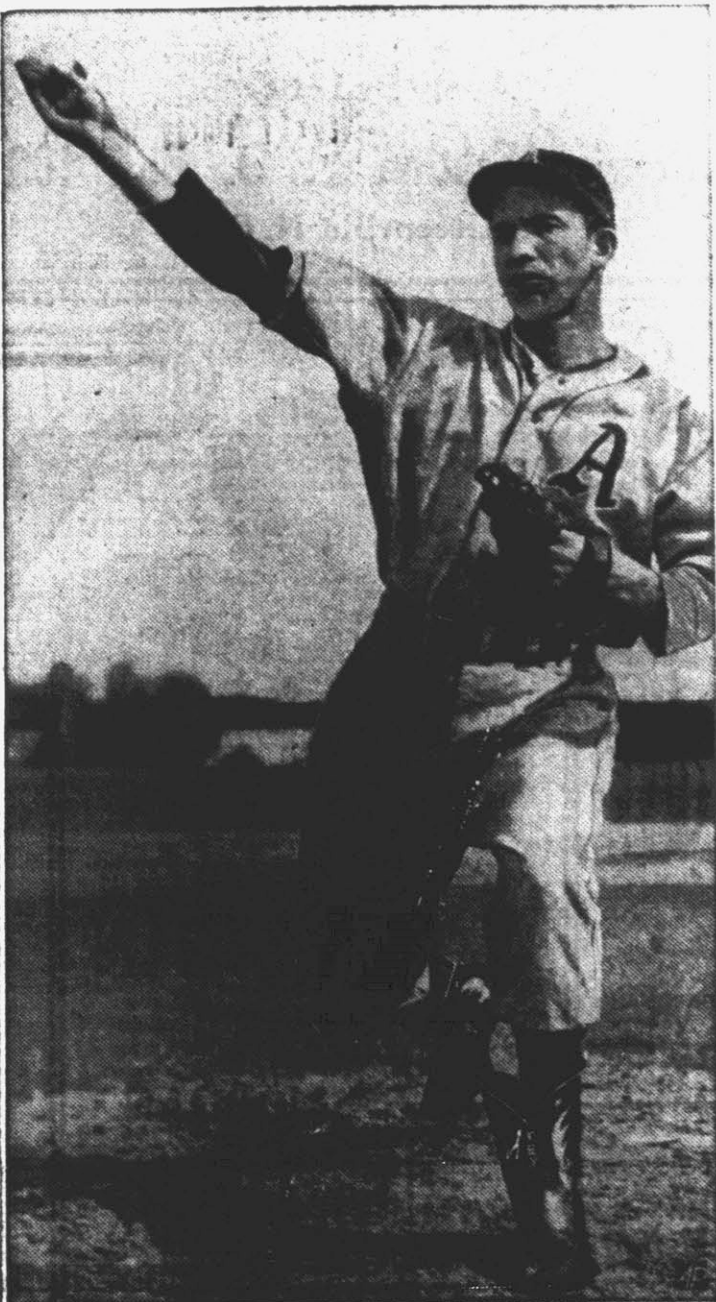

AXIS BOLD IN U-BOAT RAIDS

Effectiveness of Supply Lines Probable Reason

Washington, March 4.—(AP)—The Navy's effectiveness in maintaining ocean supply lines despite enemy counteraction was credited today with driving the Axis powers to rash tactics in their submarine campaign to divert U. S. fleet to home waters.

Naval experts said the enemy seemed to be growing more reckless in attempts to create a panic fear of coastal raiding activities here and in Latin America. They cited as an example the shelling of Mona Island, off Puerto Rico, where there was no conceivable military reason for the enemy to waste a shell or risk a ship.

Both the Germans and Japanese must be fully aware, it was said, that the steadily increasing flow of American munitions to the battlefronts in Europe, Africa and Asia will have to be broken up this spring and summer if the Axis nations are to prevent its becoming an overwhelming flood of defeat for them.

One means of accomplishing this would be to force such a popular demand for unlimited coastal protection in the Americas that the Navy would be compelled to give up some of its offensive patrol and convoy duties for purely defensive activities in this hemisphere.

Into this strategy of panic, authorities here fit the current wave of U-boat attacks off the Atlantic coast, the submarine assaults on west coast shipping, the shelling of oil centers in California and at Aruba, and the bombardment of Mona Island.

The three latter attacks, it was noted, gave indications of recklessness. The submarines which drew close enough to pour shells into Aruba and Goleia, California, ran the risk of destruction for relatively small immediate accomplishment. The sub which shelled Mona Island, tourist and fishing resort and location of an NYA camp, could accomplish nothing at all directly except to show that the United States territory could be bombarded.

Dr. Brooks Heard At Assembly Hour

Saying that as he wished to speak in the role of a preacher, he would choose a text, Dr. Frederick P. Brooks, speaker at the College Assembly yesterday, quoted as his "text" the aphorism from "Fox Richard's Almanac," "a rolling stone gathers no moss," and proceeded to point out to his student audience the importance of their being enough of a rolling stone to make sure of finding a life work in which they can be happy.

Remember what happens to the stone that does gather moss, said Dr. Brooks. Even slow growing moss is able to cover it. In the same way a person who will not change the course of his life in order to make progress becomes literally a mossback.

Dr. Brooks declared that his idea of a rolling stone was not that of a little ineffectual rock that happened to get loose and roll down a hillside without result, but instead that of great stones in a grist mill always ready to turn with a purpose.

Pointing out that especially today many girls who might normally expect to make a career of marriage and homemaking will not be able to do so, but will have to go on alone, the speaker declared that it therefore to be of great importance that his listeners ask themselves if the career they have chosen is one to bring them happiness.

After all, the happiness of the individual is the first thing to seek he said, as a person in the long run contributes more to his community by being happy himself than by setting out to reform his neighbors.

He urged the students not to let the fact that they might be half way through preparing for a chosen life work keep them from changing if they found they would fit in better in another field. You may not go so far from the new road, he admitted, as you would have on the old, but you will gain more solid satisfaction from the distance you do cover.

After driving home his point with a number of cases, Dr. Brooks concluded: "Look into your life. Try to see what goal you are working for and what will bring you happiness. If you decide that you are now working toward the proper goal, then change."

Rome's Claim

Rome.—(From Italian Broadcasts)—March 4.—(AP)—The Italian high command reported today that Italian submarines operating off the coast of the United States have sunk merchant shipping totalling \$7,204 tons.

This was Rome's first official claim that its submarines are operating off the U. S. coast. While a large number of ships have been sunk by under-sea raiders in the western Atlantic, they were believed to have been German U-boats. Nazi communiques of U-boat operations in the Atlantic have made no mention of Italian submarines.

TAX INCREASES WIN APPROVAL

Sanctioned By House Ways And Means Committee

Washington, March 4.—(AP)—The staggering income tax increases proposed by the treasury for both individuals and corporations got an unexpectedly favorable reception today from House Ways and Means committee, although some thought the boosts might prove too steep.

Those who thought the increases were apt to be too severe expressed the opinion that "a more painless" method—such as a general sales tax—might decide on to help raise the \$7,000,000,000 in new general revenue which President Roosevelt has asked.

It was evident that the committee intended to go ahead with plans to write its own tax bill independently, even though its members for the most part appeared in general accord with the broad features of the recommendations submitted yesterday by Secretary Morgenthau.

Morgenthau asked that congress raise \$3,200,000,000 more in individual income taxes—with a doubling of payments in the middle brackets—and another \$3,600,000,000 from increased excess profits taxes and a new war surtax on corporations.

Increased and new excise taxes, revised estate and gift levies and closing of tax loopholes would raise the remainder, with allowance for the revenue that would be lost because of conflicting taxes.

Rep. Duncan (D-Mo) was one of those who said that the committee would want to make an independent analysis of the prospective yields of various increased rates, as well as the sociological and economic effect they might have "consistent with demands to meet the war problem."

Two members expressed belief that while the tax structure Morgenthau proposed might be used, the committee would see fit to scale down some of the increases, even at the sacrifice of part of the \$7,000,000,000 goal.
