BATTLE FOR JAVA NEARING ZERO HOUR

Churchill May Be Replaced By Sir Stafford Cripps

MOVE SEEN IN THREE MONTHS

Highly Reliable Sources In London Make Statement In Commenting On Continued Criticism To Present Government

London, March 5.—(AP)

An extremely reliable and well-informed political source, commenting on the failure of recent cabinet changes to quiet public and parliamentary criticism of the government, said today there was every likelihood that Sir Stafford Cripps would replace Winston Churchill as Britain's Prime Minister.

This source went so far as to predict that the doughty Churchill, whose speeches pulled Britain together in the bitter summer of 1940 and made him one of the world's greatest figures, would be unseated within three months.

After bitter parliamentary debates it must be emphasized, this source said, that while Churchill is vastly popular in the United States, he had steadily lost the strength of his hold on the British masses since the fall of Crete last June.

Sir Stafford, on the other hand, has grown in stature as a result of his work as Ambassador to Russia, a fact recognized by his recent appointment to the cabinet post of lord privy seal.

The steady growth of an opposition group in parliament, as described by the source of this speculation, is "all the more important since it transcends party lines."

He said the opposition to Churchill was dissatisfied primarily on these points:

1. Sending the Prince of Wales and Repulse to Malaya after asserted warnings that the big warships would find indifferent air support in those waters.
2. Placing Lord Beaverbrook in positions in which he allegedly alienated the fighting services and heavy industry.
3. The prime minister's exercise of his own judgment in conduct of the war.

Britons, this source asserted, remember the Churchill-suggested Gallipoli campaign in the world war and are not very strong for civilians overriding the opinions of military men who have studied war problems for a lifetime.

Lord Beaverbrook is admitted by the opposition to have made "a fine superficial showing" in his cabinet jobs pertaining to war production and supply, but they say forces in the Middle East have been fighting without tank replacements or aircraft parts.

No Increase Made In Burley Quotas

Washington, March 5.—(AP)—

Despite pleas of growers for an increase, the Agriculture Department announced today that a 1942 burley tobacco planting allotment of 363,000 acres would remain unchanged.

Rigid marketing quotas will apply to the production of this acreage.

In seeking a larger allotment, congressmen from burley growing areas pushed through congress legislation extending until March 1 each year the deadline for determining the planting allotment and marketing quota, or for making an increase in an already announced allotment. The deadline had been December 31.

The 363,000 acre allotment was determined last fall.

The department said in a formal statement today that no change in the allotment was justified by available information in supplies and prospective demand for this type of tobacco.

Prospective domestic consumption of tobacco products, such as a current increase in cigarette consumption, and also conditions affecting exports were major factors the department said it considered in determining burley as well as flue-cured and dark type tobacco quotas. "Burley tobacco," the department said, "has never been important in the export trade."

Honors MacArthur.

President Roosevelt signed today a bill changing the name of Conduit Road in the District of Columbia to MacArthur Boulevard in honor of General Douglas MacArthur.

MANY VICTIMS OF EXPLOSION

Death Toll At Iowa Ordnance Plants Stands At 16

Burlington, Ia., March 5.—(AP)—

Death toll of an earth-shaking explosion at the Burlington Ordnance plant stood unofficially at 16 early today while rescue workers searched the shattered, fire-scarred ruins of a TNT melt unit for possibly other victims.

More than 30 injured are in hospitals here.

The blast blew apart the three-story brick, steel and concrete building on production line 3 of the shell-loading plant shortly before midnight last night.

Declares Shift Of General Wavell In No Way Altered The British And U. S. Attitude Of Intense Support To Dutch; Declines To Say Whether Air Reinforcements Sent To Philippines

Washington, March 5.—

(AP)—Secretary of War Stimson said today that "material" air reinforcements had been sent to Java in the last week.

He told his press conference that the shift of General Sir Archibald Wavell from the southwest Pacific command had not altered in any way the American or British attitude of "intense support to the Dutch in the present battle."

"Not only has that support not been diminished by withdrawals, but in the past week we have increased our air support materially," he said.

Stimson withheld details of the reinforcements, and also was guarded in comment on the air force which General Douglas MacArthur employed to inflict heavy losses on the Japanese in a surprise raid on Subic bay in the Philippines.

Stimson, smiling broadly over the unexpected coup, told reporters the news from MacArthur was merely that the attack was made "by air."

"I won't say whether he had a large new air force, but he has enough to sink five ships," Stimson said.

(Yesterday's communique telling of the raid credited "MacArthur's small air force.")

The secretary declined in response to a question to say whether the Philippine commander was in a position to use aerial reinforcements if they were available.

The war secretary said he has no further information on the air raid alarm at Los Angeles last week. He stressed that the theory that enemy agents may have flown commercial planes over the city came from an official report and did not necessarily represent his own views.

Unfortunately, he said, his own "personal disclaimer" was not made fully clear at that time, a day after Secretary of Navy Knox had termed the episode a false alarm.

Funeral services were conducted at the home this afternoon at 4 o'clock by Rev. W. O. Henderson, Christian minister of Elizabeth City. Burial was in the Brown family cemetery near Greenville.

Active pallbearers were Offie J. Stancill, Robert D. Stancill, Clayton G. Stancill, J. Russell Stancill, Alfred McLawhorn and S. S. Arthur. Mr. Johnston was born and reared in Pitt county and had lived in Greenville for the past 60 years. He was a member of Jarvis Memorial Methodist church.

Surviving are his wife, one sister, Miss Addie Johnston, and one brother, J. B. Johnston, both of Greenville.

U. S. Entry In War Reacting In Italy

Cairo, March 5.—(AP)—A traveler who arrived from Rome today said United States participation in the war has had a bad effect on Italian morale and has brought about an increase in anti-Fascist activity.

He said Count Carlo Sforza's "Free Italy" movement is gaining headway through underground channels.

(Count Sforza, former Italian foreign minister, now is in the United States as leader of the movement.)

Despite intensive efforts of the Orva (Italian secret police), the traveler declared, the secret anti-Fascist newspaper "Mateotti" has a wide distribution.

TRAPPED NAZI UNIT SLASHED BY RED FORCES

Soviets Report 36,000 Of 96,000 Already Slain

RED SUCCESSES IN OTHER AREAS

Force Of 24,000 Germans Said To Have Been Isolated At Railroad Center 200 Miles From Moscow

Soviet front-line dispatches reported a series of grim and bloody reverses for Adolf Hitler's battered armies today, declaring that the Russians had killed 36,000 Nazis in the 18-day-old battle of Staraya Russa and were now "destroying the remnants" of the trapped invaders.

Nazi prisoners captured in the Staraya Russa sector, where the 16th German army of 96,000 troops has been encircled, were quoted as saying they had gone without food for six days.

A force of 24,000 Germans, was likewise declared in Stockholm dispatches, to have been isolated by Red army attacks against Orel, a Nazi-held railroad center 200 miles below Moscow, but a Russian demand for surrender was rejected by the garrison Commander, Col. Gen. Heinz Guderian, Adolf Hitler's best known tank specialist.

In both the Orel and Staraya Russa areas the invaders were said to have been cut off from all reinforcements and supplies, save those ferried in by transport planes and Russian ground gunners and pilots alike claimed a mounting toll of these.

Reserve planes from Yugoslavia and Denmark were said to have been sent to the Staraya Russa front. London accounts said 200 had been destroyed over that area in one three-day period.

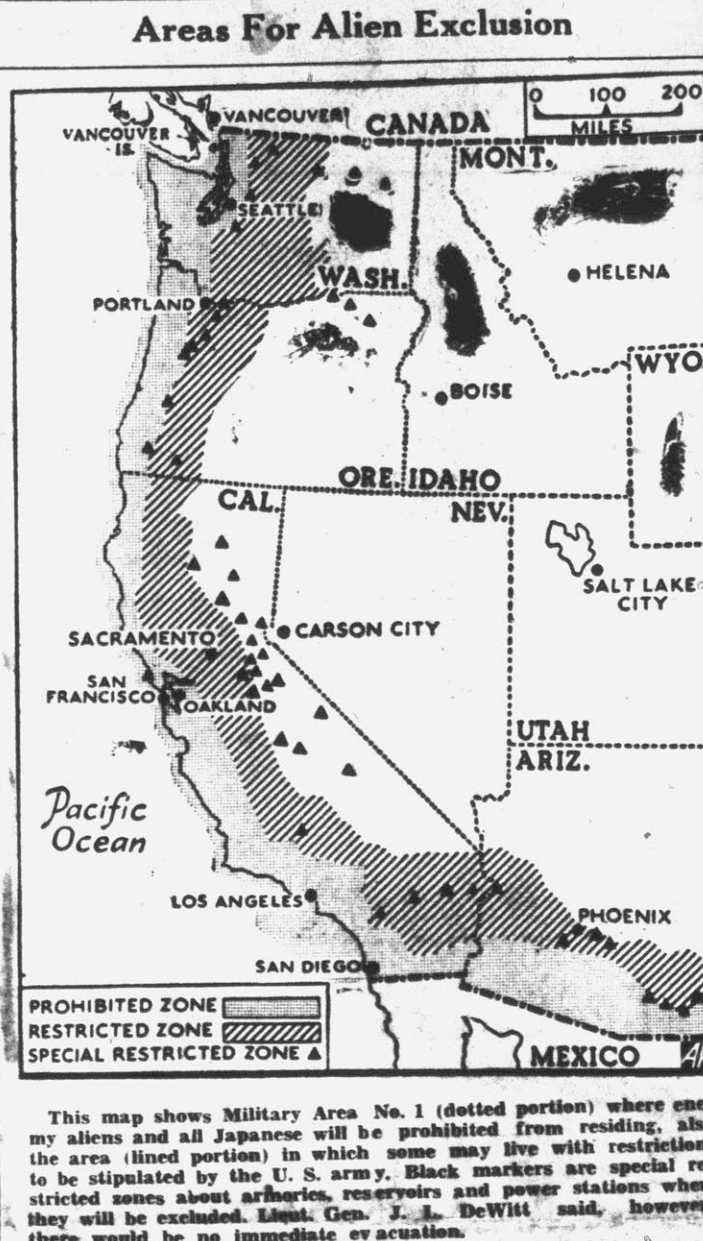
The Russian government announced Red army troops striking toward Smolensk, with a base already established only 50 miles east of that central front city, had broken into a Nazi defense zone and wiped out two regimental headquarters of the 17th German infantry division.

A bulletin from Hitler's field headquarters acknowledged a series of fierce tank-led Soviet attacks in the Donets basin, in the Ukraine, and elsewhere along the 1,200-mile front.

The Nazi command said all the attacks had been repulsed.

On the North African front, the two-week lull in land fighting still prevailed except for minor patrol clashes, with the British holding Field Marshal Ernest Rommel's Axis forces at bay 40 miles west of Tobruk.

Henderson Warns That No Rubber Forthcoming

Passenger Cars May Have To Be Parked Shortly

Washington, March 5.—(AP)—

Leahon Henderson, director of Civilian supplies, told a Senate defense investigating committee today that "not a single pound of crude rubber" would be available for tires for upwards of 30,000,000 passenger cars now in operation and that officials had discussed requisitioning tires now on cars of ordinary citizens.

Painting a dismal picture in marked contrast to recent testimony by Secretary of Commerce Jesse Jones Henderson estimated that rubber requirements of the United Nations for the next two years would be about 2,000,000 tons, whereas "the most optimistic estimate" of supply from all sources was from 1,400,000 tons to 1,500,000 tons.

Last month Secretary Jones told a Senate committee that "I think we will be getting enough rubber to get along" next year "if we are careful with what we have and serving that I think that by the end of 1943, or the first part of 1944 at the most, we ought to be getting all of the rubber we need out of the (Continued on Page Six)

SHIPS AND MEN OF U. S. BETTER

Have Qualitative But Not Quantitative Superiority

Washington, March 5.—(AP)—

Naval experts said today that three months of sea war in the Pacific had produced positive evidence that qualitatively, American ships and men are more than a match for the ships and men of Japan.

Every engagement in which surface and air units of the United States fleet have participated to date, it was said, has furnished proof of the American edge on a ship-for-ship, man-for-man basis.

Because of this evidence, the experts said, the big question no longer was how U. S. forces would stand up in action against the enemy, but rather how quickly Japan's numerical superiority can be equalized or overcome in the western Pacific.

This in turn is a production problem for the nation's ship builders and armament makers who are working on it according to the best available indications, at a speed better than they had attained last fall before the Pacific war started. At that time they had trimmed approximately a year off the original (Continued on Page Six)

Old Draft System Will Be Retained

Washington, March 5.—(AP)—

The Army will continue to induct men by number, Secretary of War Stimson said today, and does not plan to alter induction of Selective Service registrants by age groups.

He said that men who registered February 16 in the 20-21 and 37-44 age groups would be grouped with men previously registered about June 1, after a lottery March 17 to determine their order numbers and induction orders would be issued by the local boards in the ration of new registrants to old.

As an example, Stimson stated a hypothetical case of a local board asked to supply 100 men for induction. This board has 100 men left from its original list of registrants, and 900 of the new group, and therefore would draw 90 men from the new group and ten men of the original group to make up its allotment.

JAPS DROWNED IN SUBIC BAY SURPRISE RAID

Three Large Vessels Listed As Transports

LOSS ESTIMATED IN THOUSANDS

Nipponese Drowned When Ammunition Aboard Vessels Set Afire By Attacking U. S. Bombers

Washington, March 5.—

(AP)—General Douglas MacArthur reported to the War Department today his belief that thousands of Japanese soldiers were drowned in the surprise raid of his little air force on Subic Bay north of the Bataan peninsula fighting front in the Philippines.

Three large vessels which were identified later, a war department communique said, as transports loaded with enemy troops. Those killed met death by drowning or as a result of explosion of ammunition aboard, the communique said.

Meeting no aerial opposition for the first time since the Pacific war started, none of the American planes was damaged.

The communique reported also a raid by a single enemy plane on Hawaii which dropped several bombs near Honolulu without causing damage.

The plane is believed to have come from a Japanese vessel west of Hawaii.

Although American planes immediately gave chase, unfavorable weather conditions with poor visibility hampered the search.

The text of the War Department's communique, number 136 based on reports received here up to 9:30 a. m. eastern war time today.

"1. Philippine theater: General MacArthur reports that the three large enemy vessels sunk in Subic bay by our surprise air attack on March 4 have been identified as transports, loaded with Japanese troops. It is believed that thousands of enemy soldiers were drowned when the vessels sank, or were killed as a result of explosion of ammunition carried on board the ships. None of our aircraft was damaged. It was the first time since the war began that no enemy aircraft was present during an action."

"2. Hawaii: A single enemy plane dropped several bombs near Honolulu. The missiles were dropped from above the clouds and did no damage. The plane is believed to have come from a Japanese vessel west of the Hawaiian Islands. Unfavorable weather conditions, with poor visibility, hampered the search which was immediately undertaken by our aircraft."

"3.—There is nothing to report from other areas."

Japs Trying Knock Out Escape Port

Picture Also Darkens For Burma With Announcement Japs Crossed Sittang River After Eight Days: Australia Fears Attack: Tokyo Reports Air Raid On Isle 1200 Miles From Tokyo

Java appeared doomed to conquest today as Japan's invasion hordes captured at least six key towns, imminently threatened both the old capital, Batavia, and the Allied headquarters at Bandung, and bombed the last possible harbor at which United Nations reinforcements might debark.

Starkly summarizing the crisis, a bulletin from Dutch headquarters acknowledged that the enemy was "advancing continually" with fierce battles now raging "all over the island."

The communique said Rising Sun bombers were also attempting to knock out the port of Tjilatjap, on the Java south coast, to prevent either reinforcement or escape of the island's defenders.

While dispatches from Java indicated that the Allies were gravely handicapped by lack of air support, Secretary of War Stimson declared in Washington that "material" aerial reinforcements had been sent to the embattled island within the past week.

Late reports said the Japanese had already gone far toward cutting Java in two with the capture of Soerakarta, a junction point on the Batavia-Soerabaya railroad line, 35 miles from the south coast.

A bulletin from N. E. I. headquarters indicated that the Japanese invaders were virtually overrunning the 622-mile long island of Java, advancing in many sectors despite "nerve and courageous resistance" by American, British, Australian and Dutch soldiers.

Official reports placed the enemy within 10 miles of Batavia, the capital, which the government had already left, and within 25 miles of the new government seat at Bandung.

The communique said the Japanese had numerical superiority both on the ground and in the air, and that a regular front no longer existed because of Japanese infiltration tactics.

While the Dutch made no mention of a new landing, British quarters said Japanese reinforcements had arrived on the west coast, presumably in a thrust toward the partially destroyed capital, Batavia, and that allied troops immediately launched fiery counterattacks.

An N. E. I. communique said the invaders had captured Kalidjati airfield near Bandoeng, the island mountain city headquarters of the Dutch command, and at least three towns in western Java.

Another Japanese column striking southward from Rembang advanced to Bodjanegara, less than 50 miles from the big allied naval base at Soerabaya, in eastern Java.

Still another enemy force took Soerakarta, in the center of the island, 70 miles inland from the Rembang beachhead.

While the five-day-old struggle for Java appeared to be reaching its tragic final stages, equally dark news came from the Burma front as Japanese assault troops stormed across the lower Sittang river and seized a key rail town only 60 miles from Rangoon.

The Sittang river, stubbornly defended by British imperials for the past eight days, was the last natural barrier on the road to the Burmese capital.

With Java seemingly doomed, Australia took new alarm over the prospect of an imminent Japanese invasion of that huge but thinly populated commonwealth.

The Australian government gravely weighed the possibility that yesterday's raid on the north coast port of Darwin by Japanese fighters was a "feeler" attack preliminary to direct invasion.

A correspondent of the Sydney Daily Telegraph gave Java "two weeks of life at most"—this was before today's reports of wholesale new Japanese gains in the Dutch East Indies stronghold—and predicted an early attack on Australia's east coast, probably in North Queensland.

Meanwhile, an announcement by Imperial Tokyo headquarters that 30 planes had attacked the Japanese island of Mikamioto Shima, 1,200 miles southeast of Tokyo, stirred (Continued on Page Six)

Winston was 27 years old when he left the army and entered politics, becoming a member of Parliament under the banner of the Conservative party. Since then he has devoted his entire life exclusively to politics, except for brief intervals filled with lectures, travel, painting, the study of military science and the writing of 19 excellent books. In 1911, when he was only 41, he was named First Lord of the Admiralty. He completely reorganized the navy and did his work so well that the entire fleet had sailed out of English harbors toward

Miss Elizabeth Smith gave a most interesting talk on "Art in Advertising." She said that "Everything in advertising art must help the observer to classify at once what they see, therefore, the artists who illustrate advertisements have to convey to us a clear and immediate effect."

Sexes are carefully distinguished in advertising art. Men fall quite easily into economic and occupational groups, the laborer, salesman, merchant, scientist, doctor, the man-about-town, and so on. Each has his own special attributes, just as the figures in Christian or pagan religious art.

"Women are not divided into as

many classes as men. They fall into the professional girl type, the debutante type, so useful for cigarettes and cosmetic advertising, and the housewife, who is the most important, as she is the buyer of the nation's food, household equipment and clothing. Women are always portrayed to be young, therefore we find them in advertising art, to be 24 or younger until they are 50.

"Children in advertising offer the advertiser the surest sort of approach to the emotions of his audience. As they grow older, they are presented in activities as play-acting, eating food and the like.

"There is a great deal of resemblance between the description of religious art and that of advertising art. Advertising art is, in fact, itself a religious art. It uses set subjects and types, some of them altered, some borrowed from other art forms. Advertising art today, of course, is the American standard of living. Art, genuine artist's art, has been turning up increasingly in advertising. A good part of the credit for this development goes to the American Association of Art, Inc., which under the aggressive direction of Reeves Lewenthal, who has sold the idea to both advertiser and to the artists. 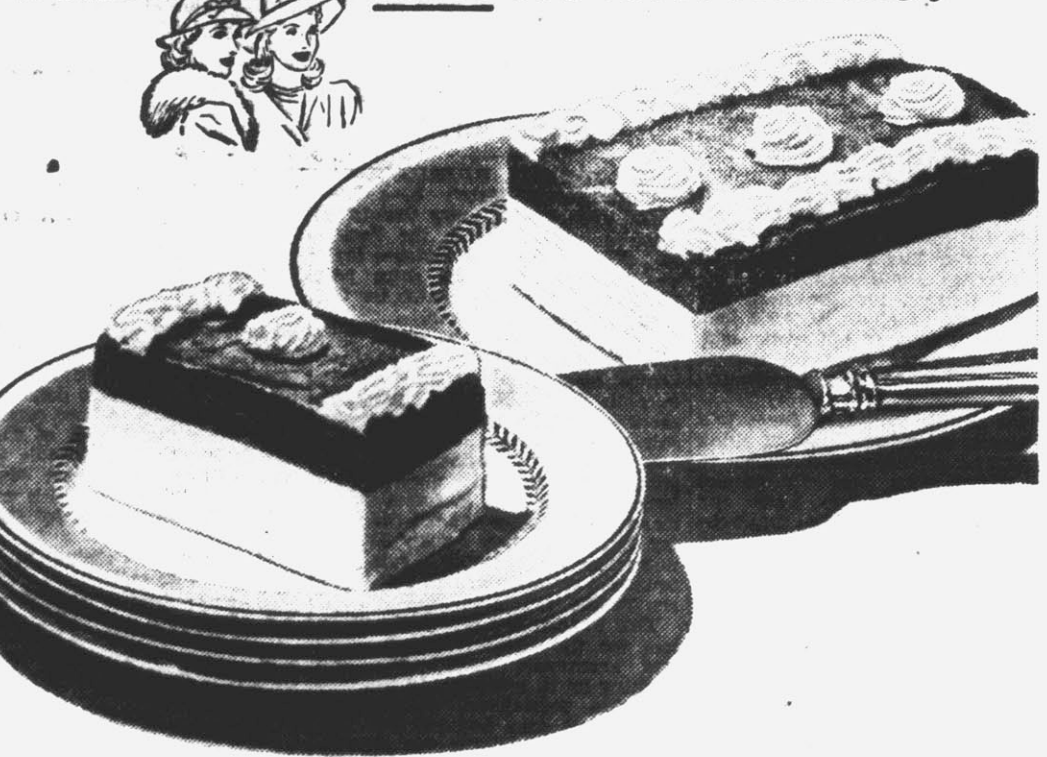

FOR BOOSTING SOLDIERS' PAY

Reynolds, Committee Chairman, Favors Proposal

Washington, March 5.—(AP)—A proposal to increase pay of the nation's fighting forces won enthusiastic support today from Chairman Reynolds (D-N.C.) of the Senate military committee who said he would convene the committee tomorrow to consider it.

"I am for it," he declared, adding that if he obtained committee approval he would ask for immediate consideration of the legislation in the Senate.

"If we can afford to finance all the armies of the world," Reynolds said, "I want to give our own boys what they should have."

The legislation was approved yesterday by a sub-committee, headed by Senator Johnson (D-Colo.) who introduced the bill.

The measure would establish a uniform pay scale for enlisted men, non-commissioned officers and the lowest of the commissioned grades in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, Coast and Geodetic Survey and Public Health Service.

Instead of entering the Army and Navy at \$21 a month, men would start at \$42. At present, an enlisted man serves four months at \$21 and then receives \$30 a month until his second year. After one year a \$10 increase, which would be abolished under the new scale, is provided.

Seven non-commissioned pay categories would be established for all the services with identical rates.

Second lieutenants and ensigns would be paid \$1,800 a year instead of \$1,500, their rental allowance would be upped from \$480 per year to \$720 and subsistence allowances from \$219 to \$504.

Johnson estimated that as of last January 1 the cost of the pay increases would total \$255,000,000 a year.

Senator Gurney (R-ND.) a member of the sub-committee, said he had concurred in approval of the bill on a "tentative" basis.

He asserted that a concentrated fighting force of 6,000,000 men would mean an increased pay cost of about \$750,000,000 per year.

Grimesland affirmative debated Scranton negative at Washington; Mother of Mercy negative debated Scranton affirmative at Grimesland and Grimesland Negative debated Mother of Mercy affirmative at Scranton.

Moses Kennedy and Elvira Kennedy supporting the affirmative for Grimesland won from Scranton negative. Both speakers were highly complimented by the critic judge, Mr. M. J. Whitehead of Elizabeth City Teachers College. From a possible highest score of 100 points Moses Kennedy received 99 points in the cross-examination period.

Carrie Chapman and Alonza Mills supported our negative side. They lost by five points to Mother of Mercy.

The Oregon plan of debating was used. The Grimesland debating team is coached by Howard O. Barnhill.

Washington—It is becoming more and more likely that some drastic—and I mean drastic—congressional action will be taken soon to provide governmental agencies with new weapons to combat fifth columnists and spies.

There is no serious criticism of the work being done by existing agencies. But ever since Pearl Harbor, there has been a growing list of discovered fifth column activities. FBI agents recently picked up more than 50 suspects in Dallas County, Texas, with cameras, radios, weapons. Thirteen German and Italian aliens, all purportedly in possession of munitions and other suspicious equipment, were picked up near an important airplane factory in New Jersey.

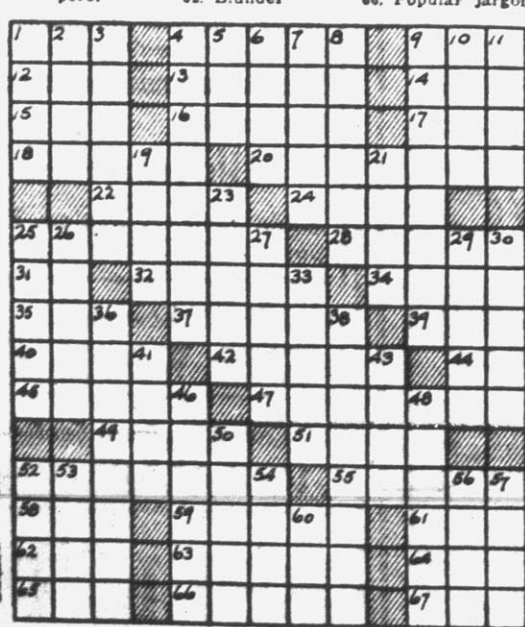
There was a series of similar arrests in New Orleans. In San Antonio, suspects were caught with code books, maps of vital military establishments, binoculars, weapons and gas masks.

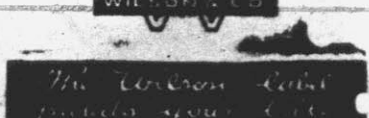

Raleigh, March 5.—(AP)—All but two of the eight teams that begin the race today for the 21st annual Southern Conference basketball tournament championship will pin their hopes on individual anchor men.

Ironically enough, these two quintets, Duke, top-seeded, and Washington and Lee, which barely gained the company of the select eight, will meet in the tourney opener.

In the absence of glamour boys, both the Blue Devils and the Generals find their true strength.

Take the top-ranking Duke team, for example. It has no outstanding individual star whose keen eye is responsible for its success. In fact, if you consult the scoring records, you will find that not a single Blue Devil was among the first 10 conference leaders.

The same is true for Washington and Lee. The Generals wouldn't even be in Raleigh today if it were not for a determination to uphold the high name of Washington and Lee in tournament history.

As for the other six teams—N. C. State has its Horace "Bones" McKinney, who led the conference with 200 points; George Washington has Matt Zunic, whose all-around shoulder may dim the second-seeded Colonial's chances; Wake Forest has its Herb Cline, runner-up to McKinnis with 196 points; William and Mary has its Glenn Knox; South Carolina has Preston Westmoreland; and North Carolina has Bob Rose.

Westmoreland and Rose were members of the 1941 all-tournament team.

The tournament will open this afternoon at 2:30 with the Duke-W. and L. clash. At 4 o'clock, South Carolina meets N. C. State; and in the night games, North Carolina plays Wake Forest at 8, and William and Mary faces George Washington at 9:30.

The winner of the Blue Devil-General game will play either North Carolina or Wake Forest at 8 p. m. Friday, and the victor of the Gamecock-Wolfpack clash will face either William and Mary or George Washington at 9:30 Friday.

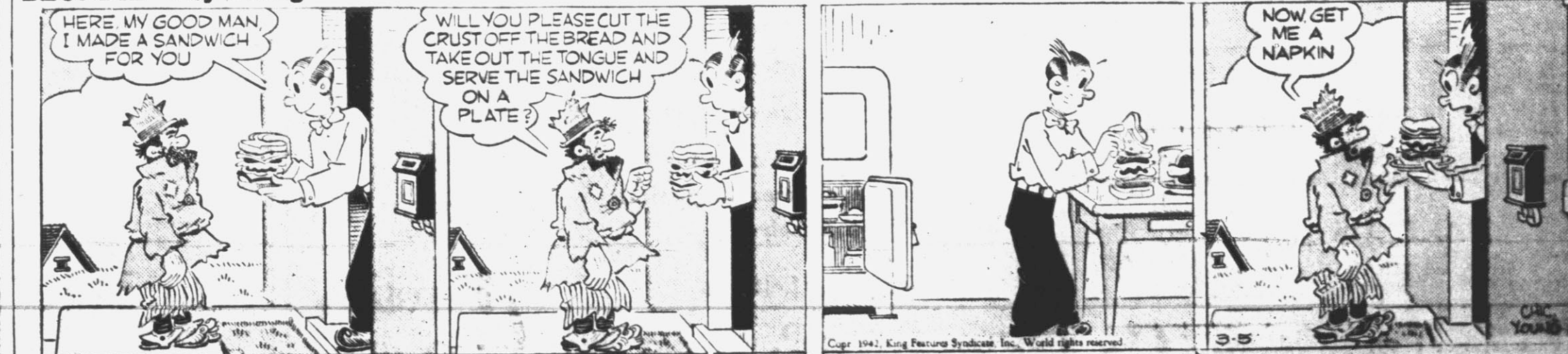

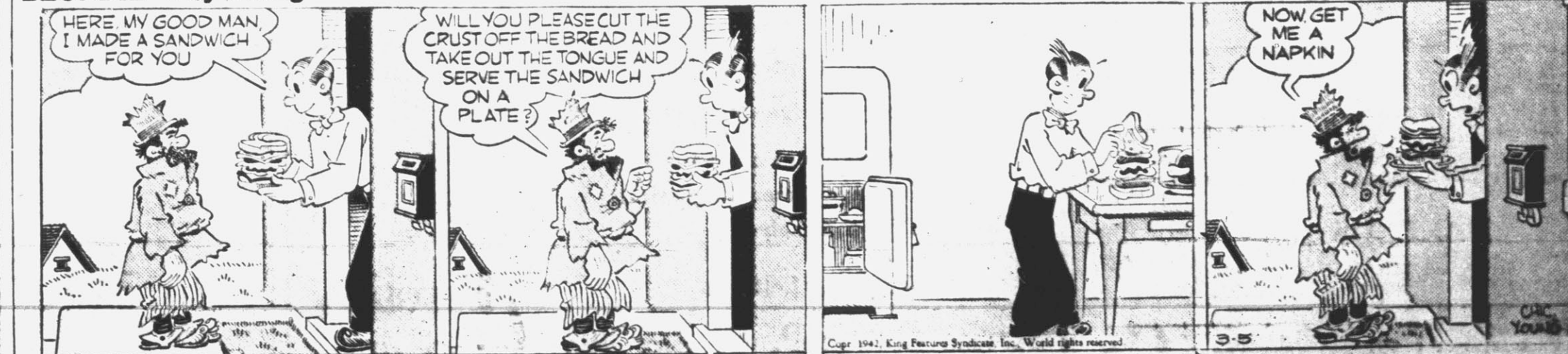

Symphony Orchestra Heard At College

Eastern Carolina music lovers were given the treat of a lifetime Wednesday night at the college when they listened spellbound to the National Symphony Orchestra of Washington, D. C., under the masterly direction of Hans Kindler. Even though the program lasted over two hours the determined audience refused to leave the Wright Auditorium until Dr. Kindler appeared for the sixth time.

To most people present the program was an event they had looked forward to for many months. For various reasons it far exceeded their expectation—the completeness of the organization, exceeding 80 in number; the artistry of each performer; the surprising variety of instruments, each with its own peculiar quality; the massive grandeur of the selections played—and above all, the leadership of an artist director who through his splendid personality and thorough musician enlists the supreme effort of each player.

Of notable interest in this organization is the cello section, placed in the front, instead of behind the violins, where they are frequently hidden by the more brilliantly pitched instruments. This group performed outstandingly, reflecting the inspiration received from Dr. Kindler, who has himself toured the world as cello soloist.

At the beginning of the scheduled program, the group arose and played the "Star Spangled Banner" with that pomp, dignity and feeling which only a symphony can express; and as the program progressed, each selection presented its own emotional quality in lovely tone combinations and fascinating rhythms. While the heavier selections, "Overture, Die Meistersinger" by Wagner, and "Symphony in D Minor" by Franck, were played with a finish which very fully displayed the artistry of the group and director, the descriptive "Romeo and Juliet Overture" by Tchaikovsky, with its breath-taking syncope and swaying emotions, the ever appealing "Waltz of the Flowers" and the Bach Air played with dignified charm and unusually fine finish were of especial interest to the audience. The weird "Polovetskian Dances" by Borodin, was like a bag of tricks, ever revealing new effects obtainable from a thorough mastery of instrument displayed by the organization.

This program is most assuredly one which all in attendance will long remember.

One workman said he was but a few hundred feet away when he heard the blast, turned and saw debris, fire and smoke shoot high in the air.

"It looked like pictures I have seen of volcano eruptions," he commented.

It was the second such blast in less than three months at the 20,000 acre shell-loading plant. The first, December 2, brought death to 13 workmen.

Witnesses said the explosion was accompanied by a sheet of flame 300 feet high and a terrific roar that resounded through Burlington, five miles from the plant, and surrounding countryside.

The concussion was felt at Port Madison, Pa., 20 miles away.

Officials said an army investigating board was scheduled to leave Washington for Burlington today. A similar board inquired into the first blast but its report was not made public.

far east." He also forecast a synthetic rubber production capacity of 400,000 tons annually by the end of 1943.

Witnesses told the senators it would be "almost a miracle" if such a synthetic rubber production goal was achieved and warned against expectations of increasing supplies by imports from rubber-producing areas in the Pacific now in the hands of the Japanese.

He estimated that in 1943 Guayule rubber plants in the United States would yield 1,000 tons of crude rubber.

red speculation that allied warships and bombers may be maneuvering to threaten Japan herself or at least imperil and greater extension of Japan's far-flung lines of communication in the southwest Pacific.

Imperial headquarters said the raiders—unidentified but presumably American—killed eight persons and set a building afire. The Tokyo radio, announcing the attack, warned people in the homeland to "take precautionary steps."

On Tuesday, an official Washington announcement said a U. S. naval task force, including planes, shot down 16 Japanese planes "west of the Gilbert Islands." Minamitori Shima lies 2,000 miles northwest of the Gilbert group.
