TO NEGOTIATE

Possibility Of Compromise On Independence Terms

COUNTER PLANS
BEING DRAFTED

All-India Party Reported To Be Working On Proposal While Planning To Reject Offer

New Delhi, India, April 2. (AP)—Both Sir Stafford Cripps, special British envoy to India, and the All-India Congress party indicated today a willingness to negotiate a compromise solution of the Indian independence problem.

The executive committee of the party, India's most powerful political organization, was expected to deliver tonight its detailed rejection of a British offer for post-war dominion status in return for full participation now under British guidance.

But it was understood that the committee also was drafting counter-proposals to be submitted to Cripps if the British war cabinet member so desires.

By postponing his departure for home in the midst of the evident stalemate over Britain's take-it-or-leave-it offer, Cripps seemed to have left the door ajar for negotiation on counter-proposals.

Before he did this and before it became known that the Congress party committee was drafting a counter-plan, virtually all hope for the success of the Cripps mission had vanished.

Announcing that he was prolonging his stay "a short time," Cripps said that "points of difficulty are coming down to fairly narrow limits and with good will we may be able to solve the difficulties."

The implication was that Britain, which had submitted her offer on a basis of all-or-nothing, might modify her terms lest the whole scheme be doomed by Indian opposition to some points.

Whether India already under the shadow of Japanese invasion, would direct her own defenses still appeared to be the crux of the issue. There were indications that Britain might give up her insistence on keeping India's defense in her hands until after the war.

Cripps, who had arranged to leave next Monday, said he had postponed his departure because "I think I can possibly do something useful next week."

He told a press conference that it "was rather natural, in a state of keen excitement, that the people tended to over-commit themselves in a particular direction at rather too early a stage."

But, he added, "I think that piecing from what I have seen in the press this morning that it is sobering down a little now to a more thoughtful frame of mind."

Cripps said there was to be a substitute for the plan on which India's divergent peoples have been

Columbia, S. C., April 2. (AP)—Although thousands of soldiers are stationed at nearby Fort Jackson, only about 50 took advantage yesterday of the new privilege of sending their mail free.

Industrial Centers And Communication Lines In West And Northwest Germany Bombed

London, April 2. (AP)

The British Air Force bombed industrial objectives and communications in west and northwest Germany and the environs of Paris last night in far-ranging raids from which 15 bombers are missing, the Air Ministry said today.

"In occupied territory," the Air Ministry said, "bombing attacks were made on the Maiford (trucks) work at Poissy, a suburb of Paris, and on the docks and shipping at Le Havre."

"Mines were laid in enemy waters."

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Two, And Possibly Four Of 11 Ships Daring Nazi Warships To Escape To Britain Battered And Sunk; Others Turn Back, But Some May Be Racing For Open Sea

Stockholm, April 2. (AP)

German warships blocking the Skagerrak were declared today to have sunk at least two of 11 British-chartered Norwegian merchant ships which risked a daring dash to England from Goteborg, Sweden, and although several others were reported turned back the possibility was held out that some might yet be at large and racing toward safety.

The merchantmen which slipped out of Goteborg in a blinding snowstorm Tuesday night ran into a blockade of Nazi warcraft which had laid in wait for them since the Germans found themselves unable to seize control of the ships through action in the Swedish courts.

From the stories of fishermen and residents of the little coastal towns "high shock with cannonading Tuesday night and yesterday," Swedish newspapers compiled this record of the fate of the ships:

Two of the merchantmen, the 12,358-ton whale oil ship Skytteren and the 6,222-ton Buccaneer, were sunk by German gunfire almost as soon as they passed the three mile territorial limit outside Goteborg.

One ship went aground; one was seen burning at sea and perhaps sank; two cut off from hope of escape, turned back into a Swedish port yesterday afternoon. At least two more were said to be returning, perhaps damaged.

At least two large cargo vessels were given at least a fighting chance of breaking through. Fishermen said they were last seen yesterday, undamaged and racing for the open sea.

Norwegian official circles said that the Skytteren and Buccaneer had been sunk by a German destroyer and four armed trawlers.

The two ships which turned back and regained the safety of Goteborg harbor were identified as the 5,633-ton Lionel and the 5,263-ton Dicton.

A Vichy report reaching London said gunfire off the Swedish coast began about 2 or 3 a. m. yesterday and lasted to about noon.

It quoted Swedish fishermen as saying they saw lifeboats filled with survivors from sunken ships.

The nearest landfall across the North sea would be Aberdeen, about 500 miles from Goteborg, and the fugitive ships would be in constant danger of discovery by patrolling German air and naval forces virtually until they were berthed in the Scottish port.

Even before reaching the open sea for the final 300-mile dash to join Britain's merchant marine, they would have to thread their way through the mined and closely patrolled Skagerrak.

It separates the German-held coasts of Norway and Denmark, a perilous passage of about 200 miles from Goteborg, across the top of the Kattegat from northernmost Denmark.

A British source in London said there was no confirmation of any attempt by the 10 ships to run the Nazi blockade. It was pointed out, however, that the Admiralty holds merchant ship movements in strict silence which it would be unlikely to break unless such an exploit were announced later in a communiqué.

German fighters shot down two British planes in the continued day and night attacks upon Malta, the high command's communiqué declared.

Gibraltar was raided by Italian aircraft, it said.

Rome (From Italian Broadcasts) April 2. (AP)—The Italian high command reported today that a light Italian patrol vessel had been lost in torpedo action by a submarine.

Senate Committee Recommends Aviation Expert

ASSEMBLY LINES
NOT AT CAPACITY

Report Proposes Efforts Be Concentrated On Breaking Bottlenecks To Production

Washington, April 2. (AP)

Criticizing the nation's armed forces for a "poor job of over-all planning," the Senate Defense Investigating Committee today recommended that the War Production Board draft a trained aircraft executive to direct a drive to break the bottlenecks which are "holding up peak production" in the war plane program.

Summarizing a subcommittee's visit to the west coast, the committee reported that plane assembly lines in big plants were not running to capacity because of recurring shortages of some vital parts being produced by subcontractors.

"A poor job of over-all planning, from aluminum ingots to finished aircraft, by the armed services and the old OPM (Office of Production Management) must be blamed for the present situation," the committee said in its report. "The usual

LOST TO SUBS

Eight Of Crew Missing From Norwegian Vessel

Gloucester, N. J., April 2. (AP)—Battered and set afire by torpedoes from an enemy submarine, a medium-sized Norwegian motor tanker sank under a hail of shells off the Atlantic coast early on the morning of March 27, the fourth naval district announced today.

Eight of the crew of 37, including most of the ship's officers, are missing and believed dead. The 29 survivors were picked up by a Portuguese freighter after spending about seven and one-half hours in two lifeboats and were brought here March 31.

The 58-year-old chief engineer of the tanker said the attack came without warning about 2:30 a. m. The ship was struck by two and perhaps three torpedoes, he said, and was bombarded by about 50 shells before she finally went down.

The first torpedo struck just forward of the bridge on the port side, setting the bridge afire. It was followed almost immediately by a second which struck just behind the amidships section, the chief engineer said.

The crew abandoned ship within a few minutes after the attack. The submarine then rose to the surface and shelled the burning hulk until it sank five hours later.

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Japs May Launch
Attack From Sea
On Port Moresby

Recent Movements of Ships Indicate Such Action Following Bog Down Of Drive Through New Guinea Because Of Rainy Weather And Allied Air Superiority

Melbourne, April 2. (AP)

The Japanese, halted in their attempted overland drive in New Guinea by torrential rains and robbed temporarily of air superiority by the rising Allied strength, soon may launch a sea-borne attack on Port Moresby, it was predicted today.

The likelihood of such a move against the key position on New Guinea's south coast, which lies within 300 miles of the Australian continent, is "suggested by recent movements of enemy ships, which are constantly being attacked at Lae and Salamaua by the Allied air forces," said the Sydney Sun.

At the same time, the newspaper reported, the Japanese are obtaining "aerial reinforcements which must be described as considerable."

Because of this, the Sun declared, "the air supremacy we have gained may not be permanent and at most will dislocate the Japanese plans only temporarily."

The Japanese kept up their air attacks, giving Darwin its 11th raid of the war this afternoon.

Australia Seen As Allied Base For Offensive

Washington, April 2. (AP)—Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) said today that on the basis of information given the Senate Foreign Relations Committee today by Vice Admiral Thomas C. Hart he was encouraged to believe that the United Nations forces were sufficiently strong to hold Australia as a base for future offensive action.

Hart, appearing before the committee in a closed session, was said to have been questioned in detail about the disposition of Allied forces in the southwestern Pacific where he turned over the command of the United Nations naval units to a Dutch Admiral before the fall of Java to the Japanese.

"Apparently," Connally told reporters, "the military and naval situation in the southwest Pacific is much more hopeful than some of us had thought. From such information as is available, in my opinion the United Nations have been able to get considerable supplies and aircraft to Australia."

"Australia has brought back many of her own troops and on the whole I believe that the United Nations will be able to hold there while offensive power is being built up."

Clark Lee Takes Up Work In Australia

Editor's Note: Clark Lee, 35-year-old Associated Press war correspondent who covered the fall of Manila and for more than two months reported the defense of Bataan in dispatches described by army men as "the best war has produced on any front," arrived in the Philippines three days ago from the Philippines.

Lee landed in Australia just two weeks after MacArthur's arrival. But army censorship has forced him to withhold details of his trip. In the following dispatch he sheds fresh light on the conditions under which MacArthur, his wife and young son, and many of his staff made their journey through waters

supposedly controlled by the Japanese.

General MacArthur's headquarters in Australia, April 2. (AP)—For military reasons the story of our trip from Bataan peninsula to Australia has been delayed and even now the details cannot be published, but as a matter of fact the journey was rather uneventful and the highlight was congratulating General MacArthur today and hearing the story of his trip from members of his staff.

We knew when some days ago we heard by radio of his arrival in Australia that he must have left Bataan with great reluctance and only because he believed that by doing so he could better serve the Philippines and the whole allied cause.

Set On Land
Under Cover
Of Warships

Point of Disembarkation Only 350 Miles Across Bay Of Bengal From Calcutta; Battle Of Burma, Meanwhile, Reported To Be Showing No Change With Allies Holding At Promote

Chungking, April 2. (AP)

A Chinese spokesman said today that Japanese troops covered by a force of cruisers and destroyers had landed at the chief west Burma port of Akyab, only 350 miles across the Bay of Bengal from Calcutta.

(Akyab is only 100 miles southeast of the India-Burma boundary and landing there represents a direct threat to the rear of the British imperial lines now guarding the central Burma oilfields. These lines are based on the Irrawaddy river town of Prome, which lies 180 miles southeast of Akyab.)

New Delhi, India, April 2. (AP)—A British communiqué on the battle of Burma reported today that there had been no substantial change since yesterday on the western, or Irrawaddy, front where the main British forces now are holding a line south of Prome.

It said that "a reconnaissance in force down the railway line (to Rangoon) destroyed an enemy patrol; otherwise there has been no contact with the enemy."

British sources in London said the Japanese were believed to be gathering strength for a drive on the British and Chinese armies in Burma.

(A military commentator said the British "barring the way to the oil fields of inner Burma, expect raids by Japanese and Burmese bands in renewed attempts to cut communications between Prome and the oil regions to the north.")

Hostile Burmese forces on this front now number more than 4,000, it added.

More than 1,000 of these forces were said to have been located yesterday on the west bank of the Irrawaddy river opposite Prome, in an infiltration threat to the British right flank.

Japanese scouting planes were active over the whole front yesterday, the communiqué said, and an airdrome in northern Burma was raided but no details had been received of damage or casualties.

Schools To Yield Drink, Candy Sale

Chapel Hill, April 2. (AP)—The sale of soft drinks and candy on the premises of the state's public schools soon will be prohibited, if educational authorities adopt two recommendations of the Committee on National Health of the North Carolina Dental Society.

The committee's report, filed today with the executive committee of the society, is based on a study of the health of the state's children and seniors in high schools.

Copies of the report were sent to Gov. Broughton and to the State Education Board.

The report said that the "sale of soft drinks has the effect of curtailing the consumption of much needed milk for bone and tooth development, while the sale of candy has not only taken the nickels and dimes given to children by parents for wholesome school lunches, but also has contributed materially to the decay of the children's teeth."

Weiss Is Paroled After 15 Months

Washington, April 2. (AP)—Senator Weiss, New Orleans hotel owner and treasurer of the late Huey Long's political machine, has been paroled by the United States Board of Parole after serving about 15 months of a 4-year sentence for mail fraud.

It was disclosed that Weiss had paid his \$5,000 fine and had paid the government \$115,000 in income taxes, leaving a balance of \$20,000. An official said that arrangements had been made to pay this off in monthly installments over a period of 5 years.

The parole was granted yesterday and disclosed by officials today.

Takes Questions Of Old Testament

Reverend George W. Perry chose two questions from the old testament for his text "What shall I do when God rises up? What shall I answer Him?" in his sermon last night at Jarvis Memorial Methodist church the third in the series of five each night at eight this week. The answer given was, "I shall accept Christ, believe in and trust Him, and honestly endeavor to follow Him. That is sufficient."

Second, Job's answer—told the Lord how good he was. Mr. Perry classed with Job those who say they are as good as so and so but commented that being as good as that fellow affords nothing to brag about.

THE BLESSING AND CURSE OF POWER
The outstanding characteristic of this age, of course, is the development of power. Until one hundred years ago, there was practically no power except what was furnished by men and animals. During this past century, and especially during the past fifty years — and most of all during the past few decades — mechanical power has been developed to such heights of efficiency that even those of us who are used to it and were born into the power age are overwhelmed by its immensity. And everywhere science has been laying a beneficent hand upon human life. Think how medicine has progressed in the last generation. The power of science has resulted in the wiping out of diseases that were once dreadful and widespread scourges. It is an inspiring thing to go into hospitals and into scientific institutions and see there the alert men and women whose energy of mind and body is being concentrated to the relief of human suffering and the improvement of public health. Think how science has helped agriculture, of the utilization, for man's comfort and well-being, of products that were formerly thrown away as useless. Yet with all this progress we have yet to learn how to get along with each other. When we do, wars will cease.
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TIME FOR NATIONS TO TAKE SIDES

We are in full agreement with this country's recent action in cutting off the furnishing of vital materials to Argentina until such time as that country takes its proper place along with its sister nations in the hemispheric defense program. Naturally, the reason as expressed by our government was that materials beyond those for countries now cooperating were not available, but in our opinion, our government could have been even more frank in telling Argentina the time has come when she is considered with us or against us. There is no country in the whole world that does not have a stake in the outcome of the present war and for this reason it's time for America and her Allies to consider every nation an enemy that does not become an ally. Every nation must realize that an Allied victory means freedom and than an Axis victory, on the other hand, means virtual slavery, and that the time has come for them to make their choice as to the kind of world they want in the future. This is no time for "so-called" neutrality.

LET'S GO 'ALL-OUT'

Further Congressional action on restrictive labor legislation has been postponed until April 20, at which time the Senate will take up a measure that would give the government the authority to freeze all matters pertaining to plants producing war materials, except in the matter of wages. It seems to us that this is a matter in which the government should go the "whole hog." So long as the matter of wages is un-

controlled we do not see how other matters, including prices of all commodities, can be controlled. The Japanese, to try invasion of India, and they need mighty little encouragement. Should they be successful it would create the possibility of a junction between them and Hitler in the Middle East—a nasty situation for the allies.
In short, it would represent a setback of unpredictable proportions to the allies, and a corresponding victory for the Axis.

CHILE—COASTAL EMPIRE
If that drop of iodine smeared over a bruise or abrasion could share the intelligence and tendencies of its human beneficiary, it would, likely enough, have much to say of its unappreciated dignity and importance, in war as in peace, of its parent, nitrate of soda, of the nitrate's power in life and death in the human family, and, finally, of the world's only producer of natural nitrates on a commercial scale—the Republic of Chile.
Chile, an empire in itself, a great ribbon of 286,396 square miles, spread along the rim of the Pacific for nearly 3,000 miles, reaches farther south than any other nation of the American continent. It is sometimes referred to as "the California of South America." If there is some similarity as to relative location, shape and topography, the parallel cannot be carried far.
Two Californians, nearly, could be contained within the boundaries of Chile. They would hold Germany, Belgium, Denmark, Holland and Switzerland, Cape Horn and the Chilean archipelago are about as far from the bleak desert country of the north, where are the nitrate fields, as San Francisco is from New York. The belt line, at its broadest, is about the distance from Washington to New York.
Stretched cut between the great Andean mountain range and the Pacific, Chile has a climate varying from the heat of the baked northern desert to the snow and ice of the stormy deep south. Nature has partitioned the country, roughly, into three productive ones. In the extreme south, adjacent to the strait of Magellan are good grazing areas where stock-raising is a rapidly developing industry. To the north is the great Central Valley, famed as one of the world's garden spots. Here all the products of the temperate zone and most of those of sub-tropical climates grow luxuriantly. This is the most thickly settled and the most highly cultivated part of the country. And here, in a fertile valley between mountains and sea, is the beautiful capital city of Santiago. On the coast, only 116 miles away, is the equally famous port of Valparaiso.
And last, but by no means least, is the zone of the nitrate fields. The eyes of the nations of a world at war as the struggle in defense of the ideals of the New World moves toward decision, will turn with more and more eagerness toward Chile's desert storehouse. For nitrate, with its by-product, iodine, is a principal item in the manufacture of explosives. A necessity of war, both for the making and mending of wounds, it is priceless, too, as a nutrient for man and his husbandry.
In times of peace and normal demand, Chilean nitrate was second only to Chilean copper, another war need now. As a world-producer of this metal, Chile is outranked only by the United States. The country has, in addition, surpluses of iron and coal. After more than a hundred years, the mining of gold has been resumed. Recent discoveries of oil seepages may be herald of another great industry to come.
Chile is a republican form of government, with executive, legislative and judicial branches. Its present constitution dates back only to September 18, 1925, but it re-

This older constitution was largely the work of the great statesman Diego Portales, Minister of State under President Prieto from 1831 to 1841. This constitution was an island in the still older one, Chile's first. It was drafted by a committee appointed by the famous General O'Higgins shortly after the Chileans, with the help of the Argentine patriot and soldier, General San Martin, defeated Spanish royalist forces. This triumph, the Battle of Maipo, April 5, 1818, marks the end of Spanish power in Chile and the birth of the Republic.

The Japanese line all the way to Australia in his tiny but tough boat.
The general made clear that their destination was an island in the Philippines and asked Bulkeley if he could make it through waters in which the Japanese were attacking shipping.
"Can do, sir," Bulkeley answered—and it is history that he did, although the journey was difficult.
MacArthur is delighted with the cooperation he has received in Australia and is as confident as ever that the Japanese can be stopped and crushed.
Just before he left the Philippines he staged several attacks which pushed the Japanese back a considerable distance on Bataan.
These blows were combined with an attack on Japanese ships in Subic bay by MacArthur's midship but menial air force.
His aviators rigged a bombing device onto their planes enabling them to dive at targets with fairly heavy explosive loads. They caught ten ships in Subic bay and sank five of them, including an 18,000-ton transport on which it was estimated that 6,000 Japanese soldiers were killed.
The Japanese were heard at that time to complain bitterly about "MacArthur's unfairness in sending planes to bomb and machinegun soldiers while innocently swimming in Subic bay and not carrying weapons."
Our trip was tame compared with MacArthur's.
Melville J. Leiby, correspondent for Time and Life magazines, and his wife and I left Bataan for reasons which still cannot be disclosed except to say that the journey definitely was not an escape from the war we had seen since its first day and in which we had developed the sincerest admiration for MacArthur and his Filipino and American soldiers, whose gallant cause we believe is still not lost.
We hope to return to see them conquer the Philippines.
In making our trip to a certain point in northern Australia, we had several lucky breaks.
Once our vessel played hide and seek with a Japanese destroyer which had been shelling ports and shipping in inner Philippine waters. We sighted planes three times but nothing happened.
Once we sighted a convoy of eight ships, probably Japanese, but

we ducked into a rainquall and changed course. It was the only rainy day of the trip through the danger area.

timetable. Units engaged were identified in the army's communique yesterday as merely "our troops," with no indication of whether they were American or Filipino.
Some 250 miles west of Digos, across the Moro gulf, a native Sulu unit fought to the heart of the important Japanese-occupied city of Zamboanga in a surprise raid. The Sulus destroyed several machinegun nests, inflicted heavy casualties, and withdrew unscathed, apparently to the forests just north of Zamboanga.
Mindanao has thousands of miles of rough country where native fighters can mass for sudden attacks—mountains, swamps, and forests of ironwood, rattan, teak, ebony and juniper. The Lanao Moros of the island already have 10,000 Bolomen sworn on the Koran to drive out the Japanese or die.
Military men pointed out that pressure by bush-fighters may immobilize large Japanese units for garrison duties.

E. H. Meacham, soil conservationist of State College, visited the county this week and after conferring with Mr. Hendrix, it was decided to make every effort possible to establish the Soil Conservation district in Pitt county. In a series of meetings, namely, the Victory Garden program, the district organization was discussed and met with favorable comment from the farmers attending the meeting.
"Briefly speaking," Hendrix says, "a Soil Conservation district is a land unit generally a major watershed in which the farmers have organized themselves into a legally constituted, cooperative association, whereby they may have some technical assistance in helping solve their own erosion and farm problems." Hendrix said yesterday that there is now a good likelihood that this district work will be secured for the county. Establishment of a district here would give the county one and possibly two additional men to aid in carrying out conservation work such as terracing, crop rotations, cover crops, pastures, forestry work, farm management, farm drainage, and other steps for the conservation of water, soil and its resources.
The need for such work in the county and the demand for assistance

ance in making complete farm plans has greatly increased, Hendrix says.
Although the topography of this county lends itself well to intensive farming the ravage of erosion takes a heavy annual loss. Most people think of erosion only in the form of gullies, but this is only one form in which the damage is done. Areas where slight sheet erosion has now already caused the loss of approximately one-third of the fertile top soil total 9,000,264 acres, or 28.8 per cent of the land area in North Carolina.

Anti-Sub Campaign Stepped Up To Meet Summer Raids

ALL-OUT DRIVE SEEN BY AXIS

Germany Expected to Employ 300 Raiding U-Boats

By ROY G. BLANCH
Washington, April 2.—(AP)—America's anti-submarine campaign is being stepped up rapidly to meet an expected all-out summer drive by 300 to 400 U-boats, reliable sources said today.

The navy announced late yesterday that 28 Axis submarines had been sunk or presumed sunk by U. S. forces thus far. Naval observers said, however, that the rate of destruction was still too low to check the German drive. They gave this picture of the situation:

Germany had at the very least 120 ocean-going submarines before December 7 and 180 more building for service by mid-summer. New evidence indicates that this figure is

ultra-conservative, and salvaged parts of destroyed submarines show the Germans have developed very rapid methods of construction.

Although Germany has suffered heavy U-boat casualties thus far, the rate of sinking has not slowed the present U-boat campaign and would be of dubious effectiveness against a more intense drive. Even so, the Germans have failed to divert U. S. naval strength from more vital war-fronts to form convoys in American waters—the second line in the ocean battle. The number of merchant craft sunk off the Atlantic and Caribbean coasts is approaching the 30 mark, but this rate might prove far from crippling in view of the tremendous ship-building program and development of land transportation facilities to bear some of the load.

The United States is making large increases in patrol forces, particularly in the air, and is developing new methods of locating and destroying U-boats. Placing army planes on the patrol under direct command of the navy has stimulated the submarine hunt. Further large increases in the patrol await only the delivery of anti-submarine craft and the training of crews.

Naval observers emphasized that while the battle of the American

coast is far from won, it is also far from lost. The real fight is just beginning.

Of the total of 28 Axis submarines announced sunk or presumed sunk, seven were in the Pacific. Donald Francis Mason, a 28-year-old Rochester, Minn., naval flier emerged as one of the heroes of the preliminary campaign.

Mason is the Atlantic pilot who recently reported "sighted sub, sank same." The navy added enough words to that report to explain that Mason spotted a submarine cruising at periscope depth, dived and dropped two bombs from a low altitude which straddled the periscope and blew the sub partly out of the water.

It then sank and a large patch of oil covered the area.

On a later patrol Mason blew up another submarine with depth charges. He has been awarded a distinguished flying cross, a silver star to the cross and a commission as an ensign.

Another recent sinking in the Atlantic was accomplished chiefly by Ensign William Tepuni of San Francisco. Tepuni bombed a U-boat until it lay helpless on the surface and was finished off the next day by destroyers. He was awarded a distinguished flying cross.

only action reported from the Anzac war zone during the day, said the raid was carried out by seven bombers, escorted by fighters, but that there was no damage or casualties.

(The BBC, quoting a message from Sydney, reported that United States and Australian planes have "destroyed or crippled 96 Japanese planes with a loss of 12 of their own" since March 10, and added that the crews of five of the Allied aircraft were saved. The Australian radio broadcast a report from Darwin that the red circle in the insignia of U. S. planes is being changed to white to avoid any possible confusion with the solid red emblem of Japan.)

The reorganization of the Australian army, rapidly being keyed to a peak war pitch, was virtually completed with the appointment of Lieut. Gen. Henry Gordon Bennett as a corps commander and the assignment of various other high officers to important posts.

The appointment of Bennett, who commanded the Australian Imperial force in Malaya and escaped after the surrender of Singapore, was announced by Army Minister Francis Forde.

Bennett's chief of staff will be Brigadier W. M. Anderson, who formerly was attached to an arm-

ored division and served in the Middle East last year.

General Douglas MacArthur, supreme commander, was expected to disclose soon how United States higher commands would be dovetailed with Anzac commands.

Millions of pounds already have been allocated to provide United States forces in Australia with air bases, living quarters and some forms of equipment. Air Minister Arthur S. Drakeford disclosed, with more millions to follow.

A number of former Royal Australian Air Force stations used for training purposes and aircraft assembly factories and other facilities also have been turned over to the United States forces, he said.

Drakeford also disclosed that Americans were taking part in the conversion of Royal Australian Air Force pilots from advanced trainer types of aircraft to fast combat machines.

This aspect of the cooperation, he said, is of tremendous value to Australia and has assisted in speeding up the final stages of the empire training system.

Previously, all Australians who had completed their flying training had to undergo their conversion course abroad or in operational training units in Australia.

An added value, he said, was that members of the Australian and American forces rapidly were becoming "buddies" and producing a well-oiled fighting machine.

The halting at least temporarily, of the Japanese is proof, Drakeford said, that Australian and American cooperation had a truly iron ring about it.

The power to call upon men between the ages of 18 and 60 years old for compulsory civil defense duties was delegated to the states today by Prime Minister John Curtin in a national security order.

Those affected may be required to

perform a maximum of 48 hours of air raid precautionary service in any period of four weeks.

Sydney, Australia, April 2.—(AP)—The Sydney Sun's correspondent at United Nations headquarters reported today that eight fully equipped Japanese divisions, between 120,000 and 150,000 men, now are believed massed in Java and at Singapore awaiting the starting signal of Japan's next major offensive.

These forces are said to include large numbers of parachute troops.

The Sun correspondent said the growing flow of United States aid to Australia was considered likely to speed Japan's next move, implying it would be against Australia.

tries in the Paris region, it attacked the Matford Motor Truck Works at Poissy, eight miles west of Paris, for the second time in less than a month.

The previous assault on the Matford works took place in daylight on March 8 when bombs were reported to have fallen squarely on the plant which the British said were turning out 20 trucks daily for the Nazi war machine.

First reports of the night operations against Germany indicated the attack was on a large scale.

(A German report said 10 bombers were shot down over Germany.)

A British source, however, said the attack on the Matford works was not on the same scale as the RAF smash on the Renault plant March 3, one of the heaviest the British have made.

He called it "a good little show" nevertheless.

The raids were the first in force by the RAF's big bomber squadrons since the German Baltic port of Luebeck was blasted last Saturday

night.

British fighter-bombers also were active last night, attacking airfields, a factory and railroad centers in France and Belgium, the Air Ministry reported.

A Czech pilot shot down some Junkers 88 and damaged another as they were taking off from a German-occupied airfield on the continent, it said.

Vichy, April 2.—(AP)—The British air force dropped bombs in the west and northwest outskirts of Paris early today and "so far one death and several wounded are reported," the Vichy news agency said.

The alert lasted from 4 to 5:30 a. m.

"The RAF dropped bombs at a number of points," the news agency reported, particularly at Rueil, Cormelles-En-Parisis, Sannois and Poissy.

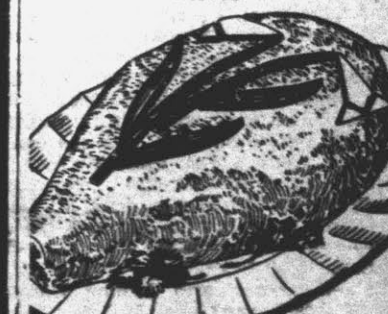

red tape and delays in making contracts also were partly responsible.

The committee recommended that the WPB set up a section charged with over-all planning for aircraft production, headed by a trained production executive drafted from the industry.

"The subcommittee had been told," the report commented, "that the WPB still does not have a single top notch aircraft production man in its organization."

The report recommended also that "instead of wasting its energies on a generalized plea for 'all-out production,' which has confused management, labor and the public, the WPB concentrate its efforts on breaking those bottlenecks which are in the aircraft industry to the subcommittee's certain knowledge and probably in other fields, really holding up peak production."

Reviewing the production of aluminum, the committee said that evidence gathered by its subcommittee "indicated there is still something seriously wrong in the light metals section of the War Production Board, successor to the old OPM section, which failed so miserably to anticipate and prepare for the greatly increased demand for these metals."

The committee said that its investigation of ship building work had disclosed "truly amazing" progress in erecting yards. It commented also that labor relations in the plants it visited were "excellent."

The committee found that employees in most west coast plants were working 48 hours a week, adding that "comments of several executives indicated that the overtime pay for the 8 hours over 40 was

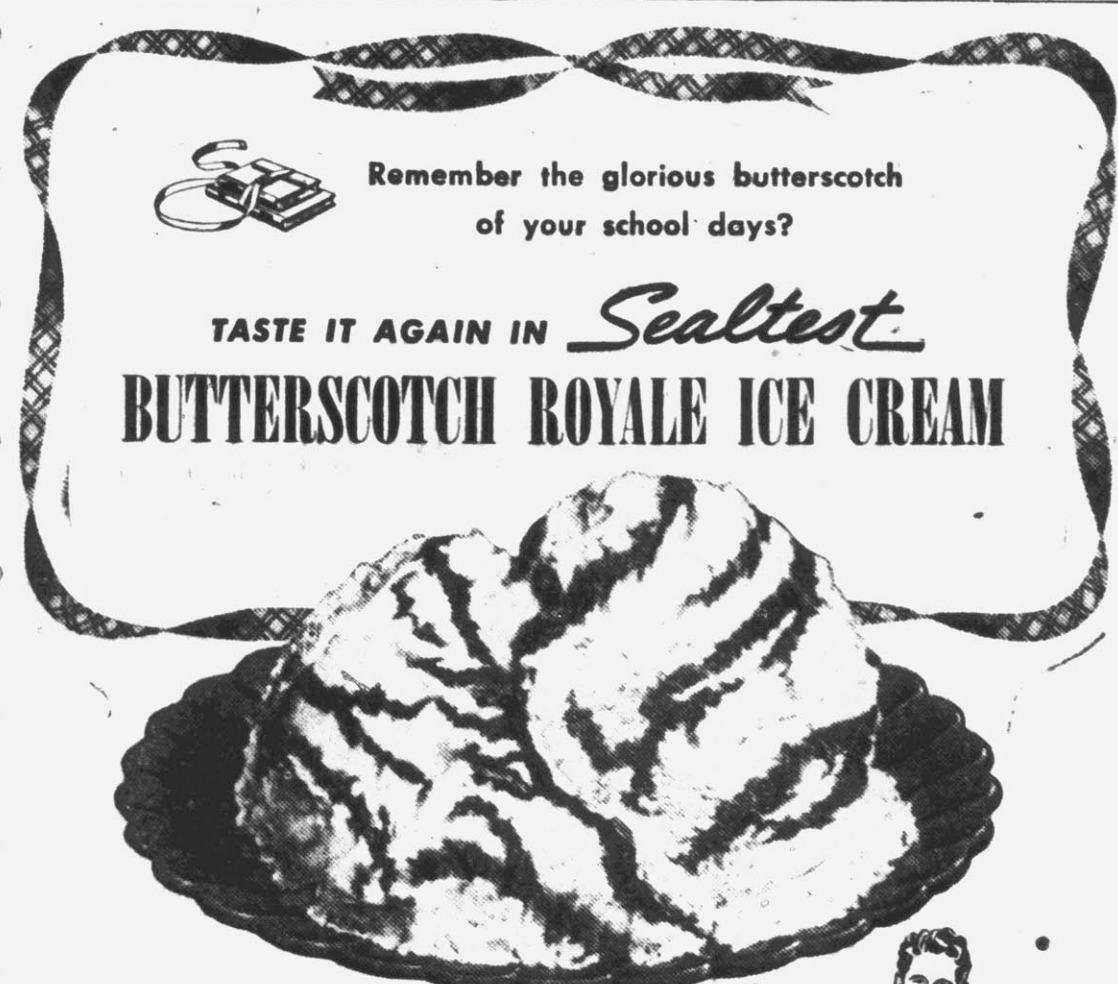

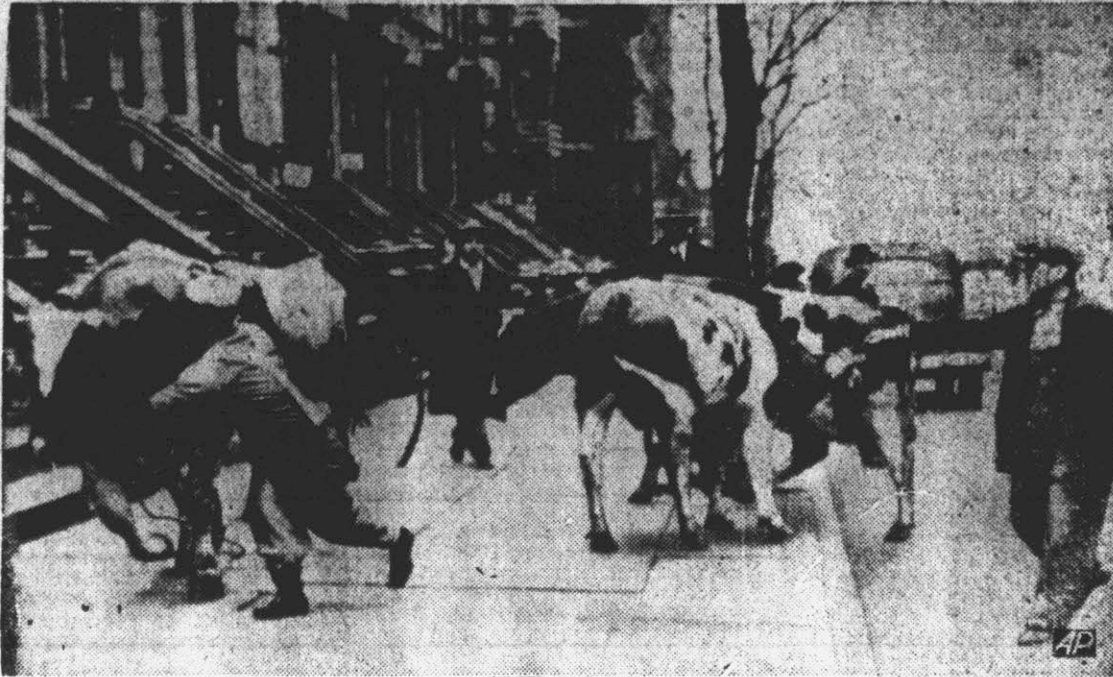

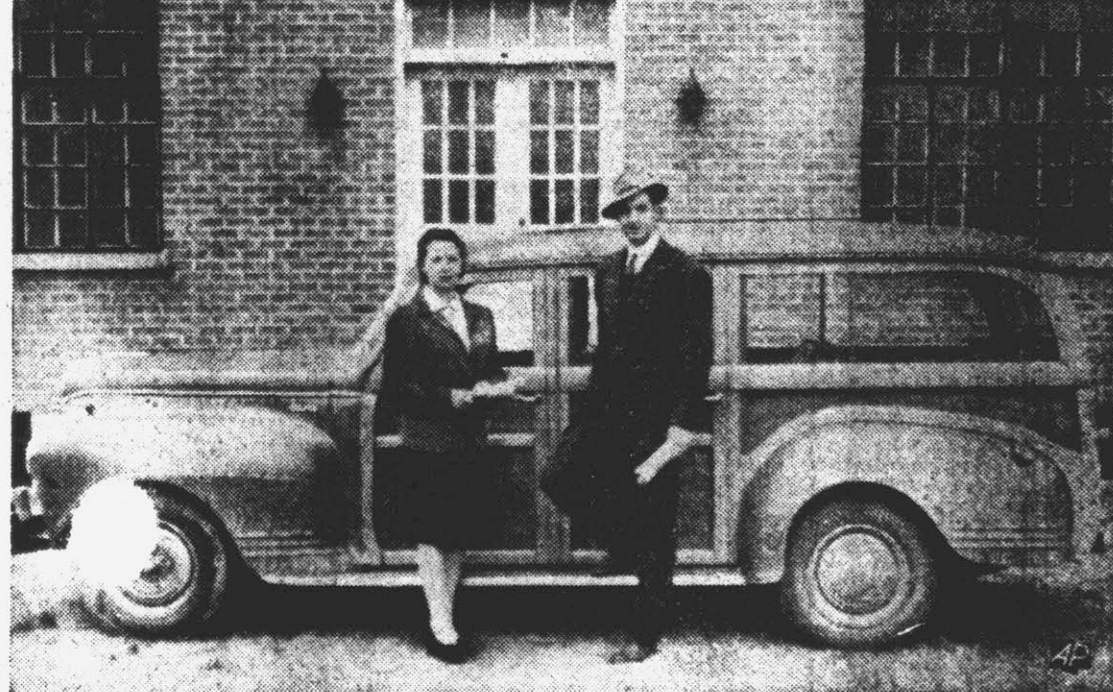
