U.S. WINS FIRST ROUND IN MARTINIQUE

Russians Begin Smashing Drive On City Of Kharkov

Red Forces Give Ground In Crimea

Germans Say Defeated Russians Fleeing Before Kerch Offensive; Red Star Admits Nazis Have Broken Through In One Sector But That Fierce Battle Continues

CASSIDY Moscow, May 14.—(AP)—The Red army reported today that it was smashing at the very gates of Kharkov, important industrial center of the Ukraine, in a full-scale spring offensive coinciding with German preoccupation of the Kerch peninsula 380 miles to the south, where the Russians admitted giving some ground.

Berlin (From German Broadcasts), May 14.—(AP)—The Russians in the Crimea have launched a counter-attack along the "Tartar Ditch" an old line of fortifications about 12 miles west of the town of Kerch, a spokesman for the high command stated tonight.

Masses of reserves who have been training just behind the front have gone into action for the first time, and assembled tanks and artillery are striking at the Germans after a pre-attack bombardment of Nazi air-dromes in the southwest zone, the Russians said.

The broad drive across the Ukrainian plains overshadowed both the German advance in the narrow Kerch peninsula and a new, vigorous Russian campaign in the north for the further relief of besieged Leningrad.

Araucaria and Tomahawk planes from the United States, Hurricanes from Britain and both American and British battle tanks are playing big roles in the Kharkov and Leningrad offensives.

Shipment of American supplies has lately increased in volume, and British materials have been going to Russia throughout the winter.

"The Germans are sustaining heavy losses in men and materials," declared Red Star, official army paper, in discussing the Kharkov offensive. "Everything is being abandoned by the Germans in great quantities on the field of action."

The Soviet dispatches said Marshal Semeon Timoshenko's offensive thus appeared to have surprised the Germans who have held Kharkov since last October, and not only forestalled a major German assault but to have laid the foundation for freeing Kharkov. All winter the city has been a major obstacle in the path of the general Soviet counter-drives.

(The German high command said that in the Kerch offensive "pursuit of the beaten enemy is being relentlessly continued" but gave no confirmation of claims from other Axis sources that they had captured the city of Kerch, on the peninsula's tip.

(The German radio said the action now was somewhere east of Pappatsch, a town about 50 miles short of the city of Kerch.) (Continued on Page Four)

Over Iceland

Reykjavik, Iceland, May 14.—(AP)—The United States army announced that a German long-range bomber, sighted off eastern Iceland, was driven off today by heavy anti-aircraft fire, with no bombs dropped and the extent of damage, if any, to the raider undetermined.

There have been evidence of German planes prowling the North Atlantic sea lanes and it was probably that this bomber was one of them.

FAVORS AID TO DEPENDENTS

Washington, May 14.—(AP)—Major Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, assistant service director, told the House Military committee today it soon might be necessary to induct into the army more single men who have been deferred and married men with working wives.

Hershey joined army and navy officials in endorsing, with reservations, the general provisions of a bill to provide for compulsory allotments of part of service men's pay toward the upkeep of their dependents, with the government supplementing the allotment.

JAP SHIP SUNK BY SUBMARINE

Tokyo (From Japanese Broadcasts), May 14.—(AP)—A large Japanese merchant vessel has been torpedoed and sunk in the eastern part of the South China Sea by an enemy submarine but the submarine itself is believed to have been sunk, an official announcement said today.

Tokyo Believes The Submarine Also Was Sunk

The War and Navy ministers said the merchant ship was under naval escort when attacked on May 8. "The sunken vessel," said the announcement, "carried as passengers persons engaged in economic activities in the southern regions."

BRITISH SEEK ESCAPE ACROSS INDIAN BORDER

Japs Continue Along Burma Road; Allied Airmen Active

New Delhi, May 14.—(AP)—The remnants of Britain's roughly handled defenders of Burma were reported tonight near the gateway of escape over India's Assam border, their withdrawal along the Chindwin river unimpeded by Japanese forces which were sharply checked four days ago near Kalewa.

Striking from secret airfields in India, big United States army bombers, in their ninth attack in the Burma theater, raided the Japanese airfield at Myitkyina in far northern Burma and set fire to many grounded planes, Major General Lewis H. Brereton's headquarters announced.

The RAF announced a successful bombing and machine-gun attack on a paddle steamer and barges the Japanese were moving up the Chindwin river and said that further details on a raid on Akyab air-drome yesterday showed bomb hits on runways and among dispersed Japanese planes.

Simultaneously a communique released in Chungking disclosed that "flying tigers" of the American volunteer group had reached out a long arm to pound the important Japanese air base at Hanoi in Indo-China, more than 850 miles southeast of Myitkyina.

"Fifteen Japanese planes, including bombers, one large transport, and two-seater and single-seater fighters, were burned on the ground," said the Chungking announcement, issued by AVG headquarters. At least 25 other Japanese planes were reported damaged and direct hits were scored on air-drome buildings.

Both these raids were carried out Tuesday, the official bulletins said. Only one American flyer—one of the pilots participating in the Hanoi raid—was reported lost.

The attack on Myitkyina was the first on that city in daylight. Chinese headquarters said Chinese troops had destroyed bridges across the upper Salween river and were holding the east bank against enemy vanguards 60 miles west of Paoshan.

Another Japanese column striking northward from the Burma road reported threatening the ancient city of Tengueh, on the caravan route between China and Burma.

Chungking sources reported tonight that Chinese troops, operating only 25 miles south of Nanking capital of the Japanese-sponsored government for conquered China had recaptured Holsien, on the Yangtze.

About 100 Japanese were killed in the fight, it was said. It was off Holsien on December 12, 1937, that Japanese bombers sank the United States gunboat Panay.

French Ships Now Being Immobilized

Foreign Reports Say Merchant Shipping Not To Be Released; Washington Insists Vichy Government Will Have No Part In Negotiations

Washington, May 14.—(AP)—French warships at Martinique are being immobilized, it was authoritatively disclosed today.

The immobilization is being carried out in cooperation between French and American naval and other officials on the spot.

Other important details of a comprehensive solution of the problem of French possessions in the Caribbean are still being discussed, it was said.

Responsible sources emphasized that these negotiations are being carried on directly with Admiral Georges Robert, French high commissioner on Martinique, and that the United States is not in any sense dealing with or looking to the Vichy government in this matter.

Warships affected by the immobilization agreement include, it is understood, the aircraft carrier Bearn, and the cruisers Emile Bertin, and Jeanne D'Arc.

It was not immediately disclosed whether any French merchantmen are involved in the discussions now proceeding.

The German-controlled Paris press recently published that the United States had sought to requisition merchantmen lying at Martinique and that Admiral Jean Duran, commander-in-chief of armed forces under Vichy control, had instructed the commanders of these vessels to scuttle rather than allow them to fall into American hands.

Secretary of State Hull conferred with President Roosevelt today and it was understood they discussed the Martinique situation. Before he went to the White House, Hull talked with high ranking army and navy officers and with Ray Atherton, acting chief of the state department's division of European affairs.

Reports from Berlin and Bern that Pierre Laval, the French chief of government who rejects collaboration with Germany, had advised the United States he was ready to immobilize French warships now at Martinique but would not hand over merchant ships berthed there met a cold reception at the State Department.

Reporting officials have pointed out that the United States was negotiating directly with Admiral Georges Robert as the "ultimate" French authority in the Caribbean, and that questions involved would be settled on Martinique.

Officials said flatly that no note had been sent the French government at Vichy concerning the matter and that none had been received from Vichy.

Silence shrouded the actual status of the negotiations begun by Admiral J. H. Loefer and Samuel Reber of the State Department Saturday under the personal direction of President Roosevelt.

Informal sources pointed out that this was in line with the policy proclaimed by this government.

Prisoners

Berlin (From German Broadcasts), May 14.—(AP)—Japanese headquarters announced today that United States and Philippine plane troops on Corregidor, surrendered May 6, had numbered 14,000, that the defenders lost 700 dead and that 12,000 prisoners were taken, half of them Americans.

(The last report to the War Department gave 11,574 men as the defense strength on Corregidor and three other Manila Bay forts, as of April 15. A navy announcement said there were 3,845 men and officers of the navy and marine corps in its Manila Bay detachment.)

NAZIS CLAIM TOLL 21 SHIPS

Say Nine Sunk Out of England-Bound Convoy

Berlin (From German Broadcasts), May 14.—(AP)—A special announcement said today German submarines sank nine ships of an England-bound convoy in the Atlantic in an attack lasting several days.

German submarines operating in American waters were credited with sinking an additional 12 ships totaling 82,000 tons and also a patrol boat.

The text of the announcement: "German U-boats have achieved further great successes in the fight against enemy supply shipping in various seas."

In the north Atlantic they attacked a convoy going to England and sank in stubborn fighting lasting several days nine ships totaling 31,000 tons. An additional steamer was damaged by a torpedo.

British Disperse Nazi Tank Drive

Cairo, Egypt, May 14.—(AP)—British forces operating on the central sector of the narrow Libyan front dispersed a detachment of 15 Axis tanks in a sharp encounter yesterday. It was announced officially today.

Another small force of enemy tanks was forced to withdraw under a British artillery bombardment, headquarters reported.

Still a third group of Axis vehicles, moving along the coastal area between Tami and El Gassala, was dispersed by British artillery fire, a communique said.

Navy Cross

Washington, May 14.—(AP)—Secretary Navy announced a Navy Cross today to Captain Arthur Granville Bowers, the master of the American cutter Markedown which recently completed a 12,000-mile journey from the Java Sea to a United States port after being badly damaged.

## ARMY TO HAVE NEW DIVISIONS

Washington, May 14—(AP)—Secretary of War Stimson announced today the army had ordered formation of four more infantry divisions and the staging this summer of large scale, realistic field maneuvers which will place "emphasis on the offensive."

The divisions, latest of 32 to be added this year to the expanding land forces, will be organized in September. Six others already are in process of formation.

The new units and their posts are: 94th division, Fort Custer, Michigan; 98th, Camp Breckenridge, Morganfield, Kentucky; 102nd, Camp Maxey, Paris, Texas; and 104th, Camp Adair, Corvallis, Oregon.

All reserve divisions, heretofore existing only on paper. The nucleus for each will be organized about June 15 and assigned to parent divisions for training until about August 1 when they will be available for their own divisions.

## Formation Of Four Infantry Divisions Announced

Washington, May 14—(AP)—Secretary of War Stimson announced today the army had ordered formation of four more infantry divisions and the staging this summer of large scale, realistic field maneuvers which will place "emphasis on the offensive."

The divisions, latest of 32 to be added this year to the expanding land forces, will be organized in September. Six others already are in process of formation.

The new units and their posts are: 94th division, Fort Custer, Michigan; 98th, Camp Breckenridge, Morganfield, Kentucky; 102nd, Camp Maxey, Paris, Texas; and 104th, Camp Adair, Corvallis, Oregon.

All reserve divisions, heretofore existing only on paper. The nucleus for each will be organized about June 15 and assigned to parent divisions for training until about August 1 when they will be available for their own divisions.



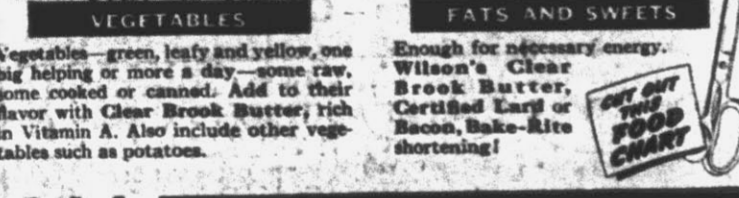

## SUCCESS OF FORTRESSES IS TEAMWORK

### Crews Must Work With Clockwork Precision

Washington, May 14—With the clockwork precision born of great teamwork, the crew of the flying fortress took their bomber up from Bolling Field and before he knew it, they had carried Robert A. Lovett, the assistant secretary of war for air, far out over the Atlantic.

Lovett hadn't got over it yet.

"I looked down and saw a lot of water," he explains with a pleased expression. "But I thought we were just somewhere over Chesapeake Bay. Those youngsters handled their plane so smoothly that I didn't even realize what sort of time we were making. Beautiful! It's the only word that would do justice to the teamwork of that bomber crew."

It is the same sort of teamwork which has made the army air force's heavy and medium bombers weapons to be reckoned with in all theaters of operation. It is teamwork attained in spite of a peculiar but understandable handicap which the air forces now are attempting to overcome.

Their task could be likened to the problem of a baseball coach who has nine fine ball players, each of whom wants to be the pitcher. That's the central position, the one constantly in the spotlight, and it's only human nature to want to be in the spotlight.

Col. Edgar P. Sorenson, the air force's director of bombardment, admits that you can't blame the boys.

"After all, ever since the Wright brothers took off at Kitty Hawk in 1903 the pilot has received most of the credit," he explains. "For many years it was the pilot alone who was responsible for the plane's operation. But modern bombers have changed all that. Each man has his responsibilities, and without a better than competent performance by each man the bomber must fail in its mission."

The gunner is invaluable. He must protect the bomber on the way to its target, and must see that it comes safely home again. The pilot may fly the course, but it's the navigator who lines it up for him.

"As for the bombardier, he knows that all of our bombers employing the bombsight, it is the bombardier who actually is in command and control of the plane once it has reached its target. He isn't responsible merely for seeing that his bombs hit that target—he also determines when the B-17 or the B-24 should start her run and when that run is completed."

Just how the bombardier takes over control of the plane is a development in the realm of military secrets. But it is no secret that the army air forces are doing their utmost to see that henceforth all members of successful bombing expeditions receive full credit.

## Saturday, May 16, Last Day For Registration

The registration books for the Primary to be held on May 30 will close at sunset on Saturday, May 16. If you haven't registered, or if you have changed precincts, be sure to register before sunset next Saturday.

Any person (otherwise qualified) who is twenty-one years of age, or who will be twenty-one years of age by November 3, 1942; and has been a resident of this state for twelve months; or will have been a resident of this state for twelve months by November 3; and who has been a resident of the precinct in which he lives for four months or will have been a resident of the precinct four months by November 3 is entitled to register and vote in the Primary.

Any person who has moved from one precinct to another in the same township must get a transfer to his new precinct in order to vote in the Primary, but if he has moved from one precinct to another, not in the same township, he does not have to get a transfer, but must register in the new precinct in order to vote.

Any registered voter who is in the Armed Forces of the United States is entitled to vote by absentee. Application for the ballot must be signed by the voter himself or by a member of his immediate family (wife, mother, sister, parent or child), and delivered to the chairman of the County Board of Election.

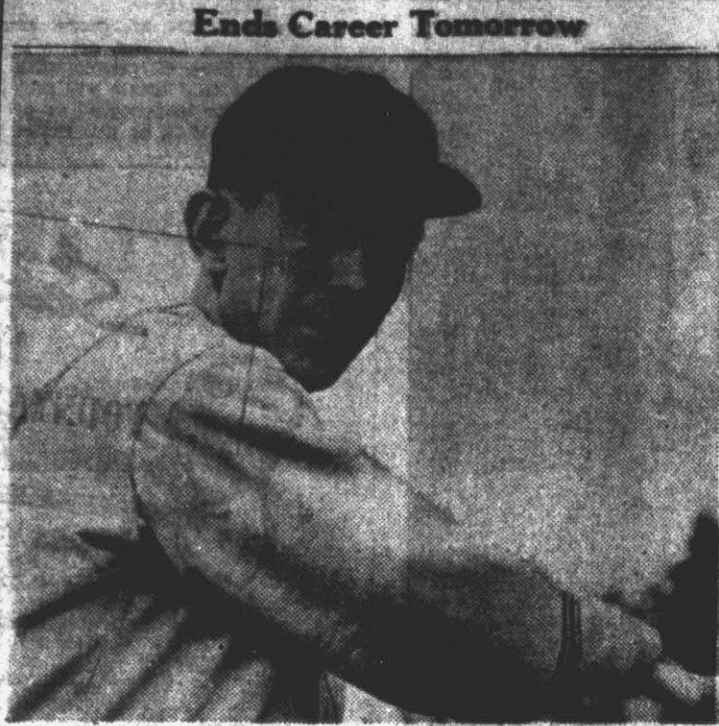

# SAY JAPS MUST STRIKE AGAIN TO SAVE FACE

## False Victory Claims To Drive Admirals To Action

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER  
Washington, May 14 (AP)—American military experts, infuriated by Tokyo's solemn but hollow claims of a resounding Coral sea victory, concluded today that such boasts could only drive the Japanese admirals to a grand-scale assault on the approaches to Australia in an effort to save face.

These claims have become so extravagant in the last few days, it was said, that the Japanese may be compelled to try to make good on them soon by a new foray in tremendous force. Hence authorities believed another big battle is in the making—a battle in which the enemy might throw in some of his heaviest fleet units.

Other elements in the present strategic situation also impel the Japanese toward a large-scale naval attack. One is that the enemy's fleet strength has not been vitally impaired by the Coral sea engagement, disastrous as it was.

If Admiral Yamamoto wants to cut the supply line to Australia, therefore, he has only to call up reinforcements and try again in the same theater, in some other area leading to the continent or else along the vast island chain guarding the supply line.

If the Japanese admirals do not attempt to follow up the first battle with another attack in which they would hope for a smashing success soon, they must not only give up any immediate plans for isolating or invading Australia, but must also risk a face-losing exposure to the emperor of their wishful thinking about the battle already fought.

The navy's reports here and dispatches from allied headquarters in Australia have made it clear that the Coral sea fight ended in defeat for the Japanese, whose scattered, battered forces fled in disorder. Their ships sunk or damaged totaled almost two dozen, including two aircraft carriers.

American and allied losses have not been disclosed except that they were considerably less than the Japanese and did not include either aircraft carriers or battleships.

# SALES TAX IS LOSING FAVOR

## Administration Pressure Has Its Effect

Washington, May 14 (AP)—Strong behind-the-scenes administration pressure was reported today to be making heavy inroads against sales tax sentiment among House Ways and Means Committee members who already have decided to lower personal income exemptions to bring millions of new wage earners into the tax fold.

One informal poll showed that a once-substantial majority for either a retail or manufacturer's sales tax had disappeared and that the present lineup was 12 to 12 against such a levy.

The trend away from a sales tax was emphasized yesterday when the committee decided tentatively to cut the present \$750 personal income tax exemption to \$500 and the \$1,500 exemption for married couples to \$1,200. Under this plan a single man earning as little as \$10 a week would have to file a tax report.

Members said that such a big dip into the ranks of low-income workers who formerly were tax-exempt probably would include the possibility of a sales tax which most factions concede would fall most heavily on the class of workers.

Nevertheless, sales tax proponents said that the committee apparently would end up far short of the administration's \$9,700,000,000 goal and would face the alternatives of resorting to such a tax or being content with what one member said would be "a half-way tax bill."

Having decided on the exemption levels, the committee went to work today on normal and surtax rates but there was no indication what the ultimate tax bill of the average citizen would be. It was presumed that the new rates would be somewhat higher, even with the wider base taken into consideration.

The Treasury Department's revised program calls for \$3,400,000,000 in additional revenue from individuals, while the committee's statisticians have proposed \$1,547,000,000. The exemptions selected by the committee were a compromise between the two programs.

Final Wheat Vote  
Raleigh, May 14 (AP)—North Carolina wheat growers voted 1,449 to 232 for the retention of quotas on the 1942 crop, a final tabulation of the vote cast May 7 showed today.

E. Y. Floyd, AAA executive officer, said these totals would be transmitted to Washington as official for North Carolina.

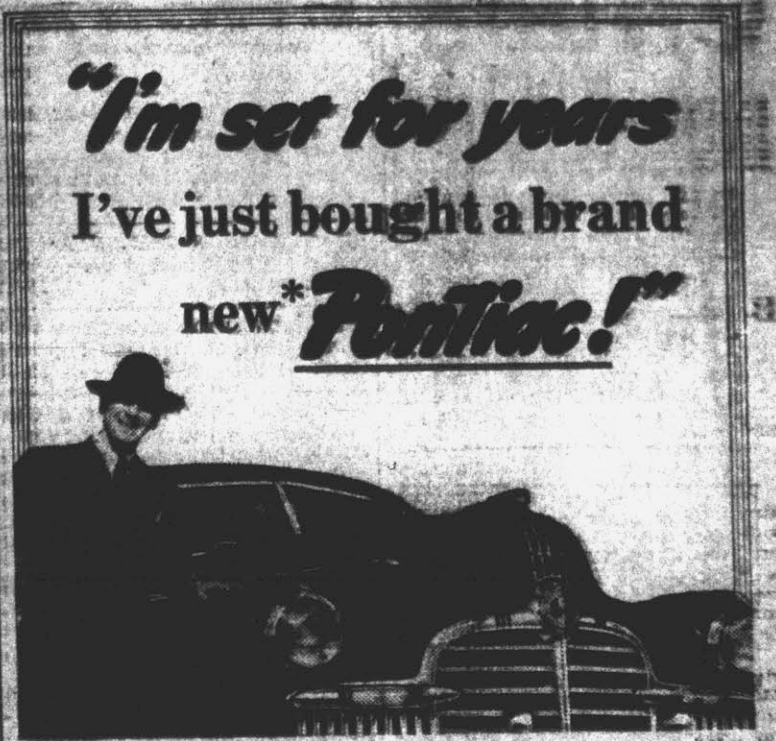
