Field Telephones made in the United States linked Red army communication centers. Berlin (From German Broadcasts). July 1.—(AP)—German troops have captured Fort Malakof another in the series of Sevastopol fortifications to widen their breakthrough into the naval base's inner defenses while German and Hungarian troops have launched an attack in the center of the eastern front, the German high command announced today.

Simultaneously, a German military report said Rumanian troops have occupied the historic town of Balaklava, eight miles southeast of Sevastopol.

(Balaklava was the scene of the battle between the British and the Russians, on October 25, 1854 which was commemorated in the poem, "The Charge of the Light Brigade," by Alfred Lord Tennyson.)

The German-Hungarian operations on the central front were acknowledged to be of considerable extent, but no details were given and military quarters declined to say whether these constituted the

member of the Allied high command here, said that torpedo airplanes and other attack craft operating from Malta last fall had been instrumental in cooperation with surface ships and submarines in sinking up to 50 per cent of all supply ships which the Axis then was trying to send to reinforce Rommel's forces in Libya.

As a result of this remarkable showing, the German high command took drastic counter action; he said, concentrating overwhelming air forces in Sicily, which lies just north of Malta. These forces, Cunningham reported, moved Malta to the point where it was "neutralized" that is virtually useless, as a base from which to strike at Axis shipping which in most cases passed about 300 miles to the east.

The heroic defenders of the battered island never yielded in their resistance, however, and the spot has remained as a constant threat to Rommel's rear, the effectiveness of its position depending on the reinforcements which might be moved in there.

Disclosure that the 14,700 ton Wasp had taken in these reinforcements, using at least some British pilots and planes, was the first revelation that British air units had been brought into such close cooperation with the American Navy as to execute the extremely delicate operations involved in landing on and taking off from an aircraft carrier.

The communique specified the presence of British aircraft and RAF pilots, on only one of the ferry trips, but the announcement made it clear

FDR REPORTS ON SPENDING

Says 87 Per Cent Of Emergency Fund Allocated

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, reporting to Congress on how he had used \$239,500,000 of emergency funds made available to him, asserted today that the money had helped expedite construction of cantonments, hemisphere bases and ships and the accumulation of stock piles of wool and copper.

The money was appropriated to the chief executive in various acts to permit him to meet unforeseen defense and war contingencies.

He said in a message transmitting the report that 87 per cent of the funds were allocated to four agencies—the war and navy departments, the maritime commission and the federal loan agency.

In many instances, Mr. Roosevelt said, subsequent appropriations were made for the continuation of that at least two of these trips actually were successfully carried out. It was considered possible, although not specifically stated, that American planes and American pilots also had participated in the actions attendant on the ferrying operations. There was no indication as to whether they had been left at Malta for the permanent reinforcement of the tiny island.

The Wasp was the fourth vessel designed and built as an aircraft carrier for the Navy. Authorized in 1934, it was constructed at the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation, Fore River, Quincy, Mass., and was commissioned in 1940.

Government Warns Against Danger of Not Advertising

NO TIME NOW TO ABOLISH ADVERTISING

Says Advertising Will Help To Dispel Confusion At This Time

By JAMES MARLOW and WILLIAM FINKERTON
Washington, July 1 (Wide World) — "Keep the brand names and trademarks alive."

That's the advice of government merchandising experts to businessmen harried by the thought of losing a big investment in "good will" while their plants are turned to the job of winning the war.

Repeatedly, in recent months, spokesmen of the Commerce Department have urged on business groups the importance of adapting advertising to the war. And of keeping at least the skeleton of their selling-power intact.

Salesmen: Admitting that, as the wartime pinch on manpower increases, many salesmen will find their place in the armed forces or in war plants, Wilson declares that sales managers are necessary "to spread out as evenly and as economically as possible over the markets the goods which can be produced and distributed today."

Even with the production of consumer goods drastically cut down by the war effort, he says, "It will take personal selling to get it all to the right place at the right time."

Answers: Answering those who talk of abolishing advertising for the duration, Wilson replies that ads have two important functions now:

1. Education. "Today, more than ever before, distributors and consumers alike are confused. Informative advertising can and will help to dispel their confusion. x x x with new price regulations, rationing, shortages, the informative value of national advertising is evident. It can be a powerful force for distributor and consumer education."

2. Good will.

Taxes: There have been rumors that some businessmen, fearful that advertising costs might be put in the "unnecessary expenses" class by tax men, have been curtailing budgets as a precautionary move.

Persons usually well informed on treasury policy report, however, that Secretary Morgenthau and his aides intend to continue the present policy of allowing the deduction of legitimate advertising expenses from income for tax purposes.

Cargo Ship Is Torpedo Victim

An East Coast Port, July 1 (AP) — A medium-sized Panamanian cargo ship was torpedoed and sunk by an Axis submarine off the Atlantic Coast June 24 with the loss of one member of its crew of 32, the Navy announced today. Able Seaman Olaf Svendsen of Norway was the only casualty.

The 31 survivors, including two stewardesses, were rescued 20 minutes after they abandoned ship and were brought ashore at this coast port the following day. The crew was composed of 31 Norwegians and one Dane.

Naval officers who interviewed the survivors said the stewardesses and two other crew members had been aboard a ship which was bombed and sunk off Malta last February.

Stewardess Helga Aspel suffered a broken ankle and leg injuries when her ship was bombed and spent six weeks in a hospital at Alexandria, Egypt. She said her life had been a series of bombings since the war began, adding that she had lived in bomb shelters in London, Paris, Marseilles, and many other European cities.

The two women and the other crew members came through their experience aboard the Panamanian ship without injury and all voiced a desire to go back to sea.

Occupy Indian Ocean Island

Tokyo (from Japanese broadcasts) July 1 (AP) — Japanese forces occupied the Nicobar Islands, in the Indian Ocean between the Andamans and the northern tip of Sumatra, on June 13 and 14, a Domei war correspondent reported today. The seizure was accomplished without bloodshed, he said.

Millions Barred By Illiteracy

Denver, July 1 (AP) — Ten million American adults are lost to war industry and the armed forces, the United States commissioner of education declared today, because they can't read newspapers or simple printed directions, or write letters or A-B-C instructions.

"They are the functionally illiterate," said John W. Studebaker, of Washington, D. C., in an address prepared for delivery before the National Education Association annual convention, who are "seriously handicapped as soldiers and as workers—not because they are unintelligent but because they find it exceedingly difficult to understand."

Culminating a long fight against illiteracy, Studebaker said, the U. S. Office of Education has prepared a program "which we hope will shortly be submitted to the Congress."

Discussion of its details now would be premature, the commissioner explained, but he went on:

"Our eventual goal must be a population taught to read and write and figure in its youth—a population to whom accessible free public schools and good teaching are everywhere available."

The "legions lost to us in this hour of peril" through inability to read and write, Studebaker said, "may number some of our best intellects and capabilities."

ment.

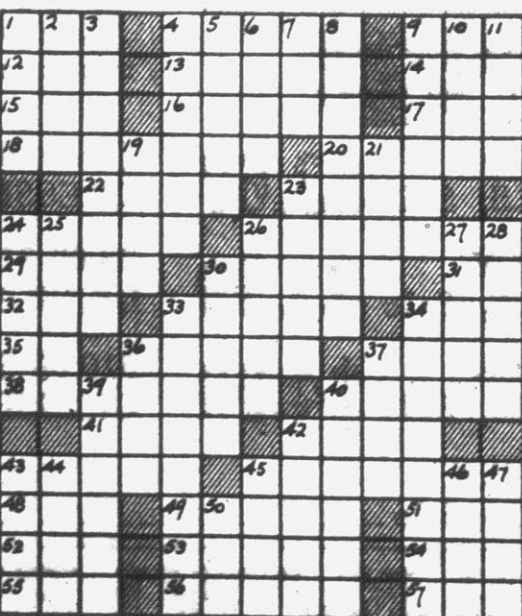

Europe's Refugees Held Up In Jersey

Jersey City, N. J., July 1.—(AP)—More than 800 American and alien refugees from Europe were detained overnight on the Swedish exchange ship Drottningholm because of fear that the Axis powers might be attempting to smuggle saboteurs or spies into this country in the guise of friendly aliens.

Federal agents, including Army and Navy intelligence officers, conducting the most intensive search ever held on any ship in New York harbor, had only questioned some 100 of the vessel's 949 passengers by 7:30 p. m., yesterday, 10 hours after it docked, and kept the remainder on board overnight until they could continue their check today.

Not even the 500 Americans aboard were exempted from the thorough probe of their credentials, for, as one official put it:

"When they land Germans here in rubber boats (he referred to the recent landing of eight submarine-borne saboteurs on the east coast), you're going to be sure they don't send them over here to do damage. Many of these Americans aboard have been over here for many years. Maybe some of them have been indoctrinated with Nazi plans and ideas."

main battle hasn't yet been joined but it can't be far in the offing. When it comes much will depend on the British power of counter-attack.

If the war has seemed far away and unreal to some of us, this great crisis should bring it very close, for upon a sweeping success in the battle for Egypt Hitler might build a victory which would bridge the Atlantic and threaten the security of our very homes. We see a manifestation of the vital importance of the situation in the British House of Commons where critics of the government today are demanding that Prime Minister Churchill give an accounting of his stewardship.

All of us know, of course, that the Nazi leader's chances of winning the war depend on his breaking through to fresh supplies this year. We know, too, that the only feasible sources are the Caucasus and the Middle East, with their rich oil deposits and other re-sources.

Moreover it's clear that Hitler's offensives in the Ukraine and in Egypt are correlated, and that if both of them are successful they will form a vast pair of pincers which will grip Britain's interests in the eastern Mediterranean. What may not be so apparent, however, is how a Nazi victory in Egypt alone might have ramifications which would give the rest of the Middle East into the clutching hands of the German all highest.

If Alexander should fall it might be the fatal blow to John Bull's control of the eastern Mediterranean. It's true, as London points out, that he might retire with his warships to Port Said, Egypt, or to Haifa, Palestine. But those ports aren't properly equipped to mother a fleet. The naval force would be in the position of a cavalryman who has had his charger replaced by a burro.

Moreover, capture of Alexandria would render Port Said and Cairo vulnerable, and if these two places fell into Hitler's hands, he would be master of Egypt. With the British navy and air force unable to protect the Mediterranean routes, the Axis could pour troops and equipment into Egypt and smash directly at the Middle East through Palestine.

Two Five-Hit Games Not Good Enough In Big Leagues

EDGAR SMITH AND BILL LEE IN HARD LUCK

White Sox And Cubs Lose Despite Good Hurling

There were only two five-hit ball games pitched in the major leagues yesterday and neither of them was good enough to win.

If you were given a blindfold test and asked to name one of the pitchers who had the misfortune to lose such a well-pitched game, it's almost certain you would name Lefty Edgar Smith of the Chicago White Sox on the first guess.

You would be right, of course. Everything happens to Cotton-Top and last night it was Lou Boudreau. The boy manager of the Indians personally collected four of the five hits made off Smith and one was Boudreau's first homer of the year.

That explains in a nutshell how Smith acquired his 12th setback of the season opposite two triumphs although he has pitched consistently well all year. Jim Bagby, working on one day's rest kept the Sox to seven safeties in gaining his ninth victory, but needed the aid of Chubby Dean.

The other losing five-hitter also was pitched by a Chicagoan in a night game—the Cubs' big Bill Lee setting turned back at Cincinnati 4-1 by the Reds as Ray Starr, the 36 year old rookie, obtained his 11th victory against three defeats.

Lee was in frequent trouble because of walks, but Starr, hurling a six-hit rebuttal, would have had a shutout except for a double steal.

The game was played for army-navy relief and, along with an exhibition by Reds-Cubs stars against the Great Lakes naval team, drew \$36,000 from approximately 30,000 fans.

Mort Cooper of the St. Louis Cardinals matched Starr's 11-3 win and lost record by beating the Pittsburgh Pirates 4-2, but saw his streak of consecutive scoreless innings snapped at 32 and lost whatever chance he had of getting his fourth straight shutout when Elbie Fletcher homered in the first inning.

Altogether Cooper allowed nine hits, the most he has given in any game this year, but the cards made the same number off rip Sewell and had things their own way with Enos Slaughter batting in three runs and Jim Brown accounting for the other on his first home run of the year.

The Boston Braves stopped the Brooklyn Dodgers 4-3 for the first time in 15 games over a period stretching back into the 1941 season. Hugh Casey, the relief specialist, started on the mound for Brooklyn but was removed for a pinchhitter with the score tied at 3-all in the third. Rookie Les Webber gave up the winning run in the fifth.

Cliff Melton achieved his tenth triumph as the New York Giants nosed out the Phils 4-3 on a run which Melton himself singled home in the fourth. The Phils made a double play in every one of the first four innings, but couldn't keep the giants from getting all their runs in the same span.

The faltering New York Yankees saw their American League lead shrivel to 4½ games as they divided a double header at Philadelphia while the Boston Red Sox swept a pair of games from the Washington Senators.

The Yanks dropped their first tussle 8-5 for their third straight loss and 10th in 15 games. It was the first defeat of the year for Hank Borowy and the first win for Lefty Herman Besse of the A's. The champs almost booted the second but rallied for three runs in the ninth to win 4-3, relief pitcher John Lindell knocking in the deciding run with a singleton. The Red Sox made 26 hits in thumping the Senators 9-8 and 4-2.

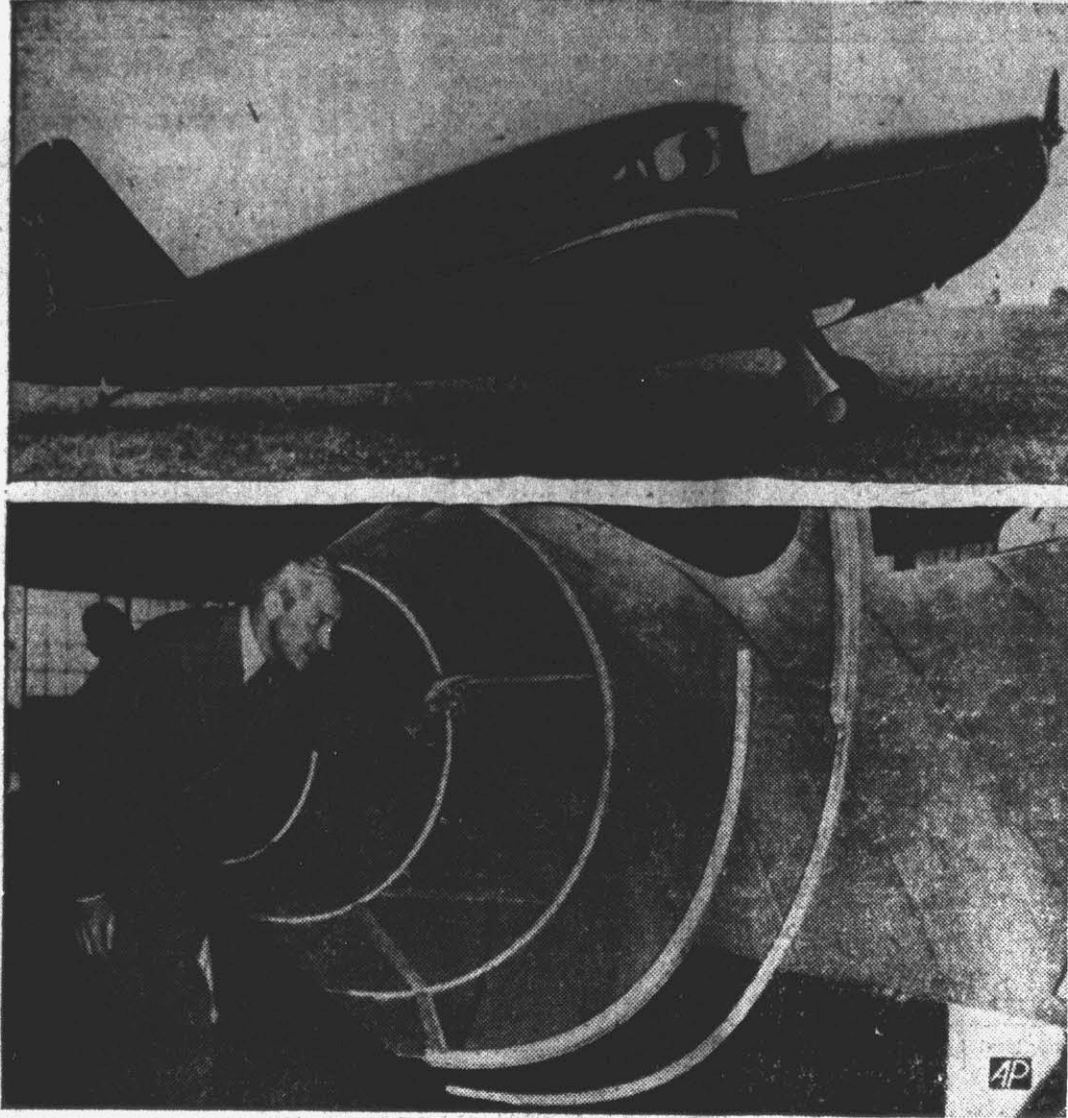

No Tires For School Buses

Raleigh, July 1.—(AP)—Some North Carolina school buses may not be able to operate next year because of lack of tires.

Secretary Nathan Yelton of the State Highway Commission made that prediction yesterday following rejection by the Office of Price Administration of an application for 7,000 tires for buses.

"We know that some buses probably will be put out of service and we know that our bus mileage will have to be curtailed," he said. "We are now trying to determine just how serious the curtailment will be."

Yelton said that the commission withdrew its requests from local rationing boards and submitted a lump application to the OPA.

Fletcher, 57-year-old native of Marshalltown, Iowa, who makes his home at La Plata, Md., commanded the task force which accompanied the aircraft carrier Lexington in the Coral sea victory.

Also submitted to the Senate for confirmation was the reappointment of Abner Ferguson as Federal Housing Commissioner.

Cairo, Ga., July 1 (AP)—The Atlantic Coast Line Southbound train, the Southwind, and another train collided near Whigham, Ga., near here early today, resulting in the death of one engineer and the injuring of about 50 passengers, none seriously.

Several passengers were taken to the Cairo hospital, but reports from there said none was seriously hurt and they would shortly be ready to proceed on their journeys.

H. H. Wind, editor of the Cairo Messenger, said the trains collided east of the Whigham station between 5 and 5:30 A.M. The engines were badly damaged but none of the passengers were overturned.

The Engineer of the Southwind was reported killed.

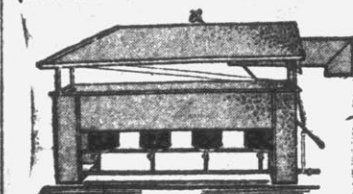
The Southwind is a Chicago-Miamia passenger train. The other passenger train was proceeding westward on the Atlantic Coast Line. Editor Wind said he understood

PRAISE WORK U. S. AIRMEN

Fliers Writing New Chapter In Air Warfare

By WALTER CLAUSSEN.

Headquarters, Hawaiian Air Force, July 1.—(AP)—American bombing crews are "meeting the challenge of long range combat operations which in the Pacific area have opened a new chapter in air warfare," Major Gen. Willis H. Hale, commanding U. S. Air Forces in the mid-Pacific, said today.

He cited the June 27 raid on Jap-held Wake Island, 2,000 nautical miles west of Pearl Harbor, as an example.

General Hale disclosed that Col. Roger M. Ramey of Denton, Tex., led the Army bombers on their long over-water mission which leveled the ground defenses on Wake, and commended the pilots, navigators and bombardiers for their "fine teamwork."

The general in his first interview since being appointed to his new command, said that air forces "will be the controlling factor in the Pacific" and that American forces "are fighting as one team—Army, Navy, and Marines."

But he warned that the showdown is yet to come and that it "looks like a long, hard job."

"We are strong, but so is the enemy," he said. "The Japanese have real planes, manned by real fighters who are highly skilled and well trained."

Meanwhile the Japanese are to be kept guessing what is coming next. "Our real punches," General Hale declared, "will tell their own story as our Army-Navy team delivers them."

He disclosed that one of the actions in the southwest Pacific had revealed the Japanese were using women as warplane pilots. He gave no further details except to say that none of the women pilots was captured.

Prior to this, it was known that Japanese women served as gunners in warplanes and there also have been other cases of Japanese women in combat. During the assault on Lingayen, on Luzon island in the Philippines, Japanese women in regulation army uniform were used in an assault against tanks.

Continues Program.

Kinston, July 1.—(AP)—Recreational facilities will be continued in Kinston despite curtailment of WPA activities here. The city council appropriated \$11,950 for the recreation program for the fiscal year beginning today.

Claim 150 Ships.

Berlin (from German broadcasts) July 1 (AP)—One hundred and fifty enemy ships totalling 885,000 tons were sunk during the month of June, the German radio said today.

DOWNED FLIERS REACH SAFETY

Return From Coral Sea Battle With Prisoner

Somewhere in Australia, July 1.—(AP)—The crew of an American bomber forced down in the Coral sea by lack of fuel, has reached an Allied base with a captive Japanese pilot and a wounded American they picked up en route.

Corporal Donald Welch of Berlin, N. H., told the story from a hospital bed.

"The bomber sank at night within four minutes," Welch said. "I smashed a window to get out. One member of the crew had a dislocated back so we put him on the collapsible raft and the rest of us clung to the sides and paddled three miles to an island."

Nearby they found a Japanese flier, also marooned on the island, and took him prisoner.

"The Jap told us he fought in Zeros over Malaya and Java. Then the Pacific," said Welch.

"The next morning we started walking along the beach when three native canoes happened along. "They took us to the mainland, where we found some natives tending another wounded American pilot at a village. We stayed at the village for a while and then carried the wounded through the jungle to a deserted mission station where we got transportation back to an Allied base."

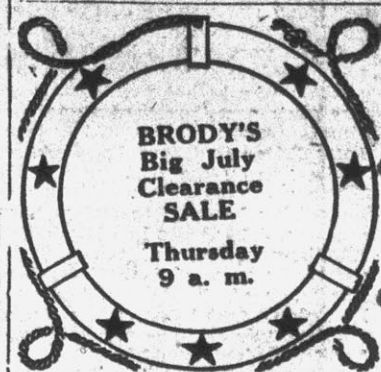
