NAZIS REPORT FALL OF SEVASTOPOL

British Offering Stiff Resistance In Defense Of Egypt

Nazis Claim Capture Of El Alamein

Russian Reports Admit Some Nazis Have Entered City But Make No Reference To Claim That The Stronghold Has Fallen; London Expresses Belief Claim Is True

Moscow, July 2.—(AP)—The Red army reported at noon today that bitter fighting was continuing in Sevastopol direction but dispatches telegraphed yesterday to the army newspaper Red Star said German assault troops had carried the battle into the city itself.

Red Star's account pictured heavily superior numbers of Nazi forces rolling slowly forward against the staunch defenders of the Crimean base.

While fighting was carried into the ruined city, the Russians were believed still to hold strong positions on rocky Cape Svyatoye, to the south, between Sevastopol and Balaklava.

The Germans have announced capture of Sevastopol and Balaklava but have acknowledged that fighting still is in progress on the Kheros peninsula, of which Cape

London, July 2.—(AP)—The German claim to have captured the Crimean naval base of Sevastopol is "not doubted" in London, informed British sources said today.

Fighting in the Crimea is not entirely finished but remaining Russian troops are not expected to continue their resistance much longer, it was stated.

The immediate effect of the capture of Sevastopol would be to release sections of the German air force to fight in the Kursk and Kharkov sectors, these sources declared.

Even without Sevastopol, the Red Navy's Black Sea fleet, including the modern cruisers "Red Crimea" and "Red Caucasus," could find bases at a number of good ports on the Caucasian coast, including Novorossiisk, Taganrog, Sukhumi and Batumi.

The situation in the last Soviet stronghold in the Crimea was described as "extremely tense and difficult."

"Two successive Russian communiques have ignored German claims of having captured Sevastopol."

The latest information came in dispatches from Sevastopol yesterday to the army newspaper, Red Star.

The enemy continue to move forward slowly to the outskirts of the city in a number of sectors," Red Star's correspondent telegraphed.

"In some places the enemy succeeded in carrying the battle directly into Sevastopol city."

The dispatch ended: "Nevertheless the glorious defenders of Sevastopol continue their stubborn resistance to the enemy."

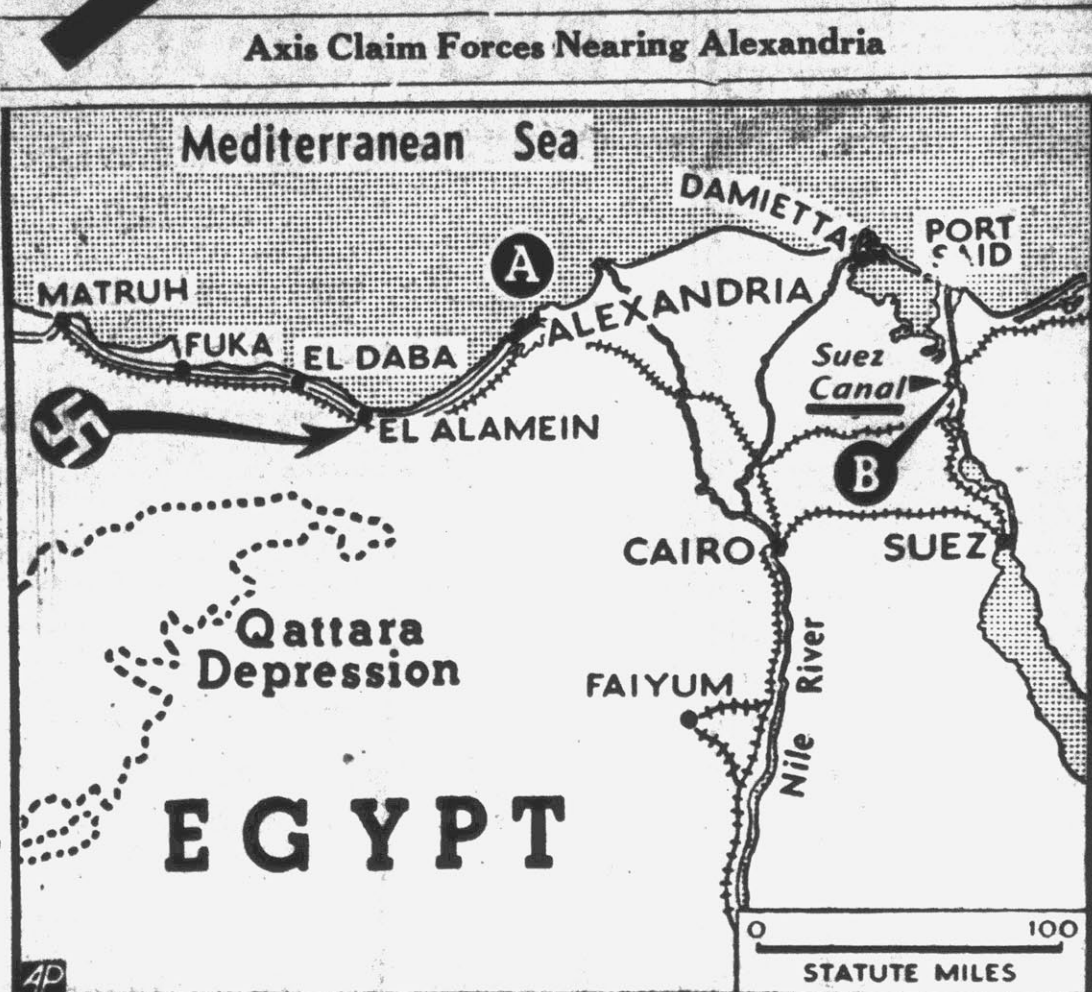
With hand to hand fighting going on and the Germans numerically 10 to 15 times superior, at some points Red army troops and Black Sea fleet sailors were reported to be refusing to surrender.

CHINESE STAGE NEW AIR RAIDS

Attack Jap Bases At Hankow And Yochow

Chungking, July 2.—(AP)—Large formations of Chinese bombers yesterday attacked Japanese military establishments in the Hankow area and Yochow, in north Hunan province, both vital points on the Yangtze river, Central News reported today.

This marked the second air attack on Hankow, great river port in nine days. American volunteer group flyers on June 23 raided the city, sinking a Japanese warship and three transports.

It also represented a new blow by pilots of China's fledgling air force who a week ago last Sunday, in their first offensive activity in nearly five years of war, sank two Japanese warships in the Yangtze at Sinta, 65 miles southwest of Hankow.

Yochow, also known as Yoyang which was attacked along with Hankow yesterday, is a little more than 30 miles up river from Sinta.

All the raiders were reported to have returned safely to their base. Hankow in the past has served as the main base for Japanese air raids on Chungking while Yochow has been the base for three Japanese campaigns against Changsha.

A few small Japanese warships and some transports nearly always are to be found in the Yangtze both at Hankow and Yochow.

A Chinese army spokesman asserted for the second successive day that Japanese forces had not closed the gap between columns driving east and west in eastern Kiangsi province along the Chekiang-Kiangsi railway.

The Japanese had claimed yesterday to have occupied the railway completely but the Chinese spokesman said a gap of about 35 miles still lay between the Japanese forces.

He said the Japanese now were concentrating most of their pressure in Kiangsi in a semi-circular movement south of the railway starting at Linchuan, aimed at entrapping large Chinese forces.

REPORT LOSS OF TWO SHIPS

Latest Sinkings Bring Sub Victims Total To 331

The Atlantic coastal waters off the United States have become the graveyard of ships since Pearl Harbor with the recent sinking of a large merchant vessel announced today by the Navy Department and the sinking of a Brazilian ship off South America bringing the unofficial Associated Press tabulation of sinkings in the western Atlantic to 331.

All 50 members of the crew of the larger merchant vessel were landed at an east coast port. In the sinking off South America there also were no casualties and survivors were landed at a West Indian port, the Navy announced.

The larger cargo vessel was sunk within sight of its home port after having safely traversed 18,000 miles of submarine and mine infested waters. She went down at dawn.

The Associated Press breakdown of ship losses by United and neutral nations in the western Atlantic since Pearl Harbor showed:

Sunk off the United States, 143; In the Caribbean, 104; Off Canada, 35; In the Gulf of Mexico, 26; Off South America, 23; total, 331.

U. S. TOBACCO ASS'N. MEETS

James S. Ficklen Is Named To Vice-Presidency

Richmond, Va., July 2.—(AP)—H. W. Jackson, Jr., of Richmond, was elected president today of the Leaf Tobacco Exporters Association, an organization of 61 firms engaged in buying, packing and selling leaf tobacco.

Jackson succeeds H. R. Pettus, also of Richmond, who has headed the association since its organization last fall. The first annual meeting was held here in connection with the convention of the Tobacco Association of the United States, which will announce tobacco market opening dates tomorrow.

J. S. Ficklen of Greenville, N. C., was named vice-president, and N. M. Schaum of Wilson, N. C., treasurer. Named to serve on the executive committee with the officers were A. B. Carrington, Jr., of Danville, H. Dickinson and Pettus of Richmond, Clyde B. Austin of Greenville, Tenn., E. J. O'Brien, Jr., of Louisville, Ky., and L. L. Gravelly of Rocky Mount, N. C., who will serve as chairman.

Lawrence Myers of the Commodity Credit Corp., announced that the corporation would pay 20 cents per month for storage of hogheads of tobacco under an arrangement by which the association will redy one-third of the corporation's flue-cured tobacco purchases, estimated to amount to approximately 100,000,000 pounds.

Myers said that because of the war and transportation problems there probably would be some difficulty in obtaining storage facilities and recommended storage locally wherever possible.

Churchill Is Given Vote Confidence

Commons Shows Its Faith In Leadership By Vote of 475 to 25

London, July 2.—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill won an overwhelming vote of confidence from the House of Commons today after he had gravely assessed the Allied position in the Mediterranean and Middle East war zones as a near-disaster with a hope of victory pinned on "very considerable" reinforcements now in progress.

The vote was 475 to 25.

The parliamentary victory came at the end of a speech one hour and 28 minutes long in which Churchill staunchly defended his direction of the war as the best possible under the circumstances.

Churchill sketched a dark picture of the battle of Egypt. He said it had developed "a recession of our hopes and prospects in the Middle East and Mediterranean since the fall of France."

To this he added, without elaboration, a statement that "at any moment we may receive news of grave importance."

For the 115 some members undoubtedly expressed partial disapproval of the Churchill government by abstaining from the vote but many could not attend the session because of wartime duties and other causes.

Churchill's somber portrayal of the war in Africa was relieved only by his statement that "very considerable" reinforcements have reached or "are approaching" the battlefield.

This major strengthening of the battered British Eighth Army, athwart the Axis path to the Nile delta, Alexandria and Suez, was the basis of Churchill's statement that "I do not consider the struggle in any way as decided."

This appraisal of the Allied position in Africa and the Middle East, evoked by two days of debate in the House of Commons on Churchill's conduct of the war, was given in a speech which also touched upon the Prime Minister's recent consultations with President Roosevelt.

He said the conversations were concerned "only with the movement of troops, ships and aircraft and measures to be taken to combat losses at sea and more than replace sunken tonnage."

Arrest Twenty For Spy Activities In Caribbean

Charged With Fueling Subs And Giving Shipping Information

United States Army Headquarters Panama Canal Zone, July 2.—(AP)—Lieut. Gen. Frank Andrews, defense commander of the Caribbean area, announced today the arrest of 20 persons who, the army charges, formed spy rings engaged in fueling Axis submarines and disclosed information of United States shipping to the enemy.

A roundup completed June 25 included arrests extending from British Honduras to Panama.

Involved are prominent business men, laborers, night club hostesses, coast guard shipping employees, and trusted Panama Canal Zone workers.

All 20 persons now are being held for trial.

The governor of British Honduras is awaiting the authority of the British government before determining trial procedure of those arrested in his territory.

A United States patrol plane uncovered the first definite evidence of the location of the ring's operations when it spotted a slow ship in the Caribbean carrying oil drums.

Ownership of the vessel was traced and a U. S. army observer placed on the trail. Attempts were made to poison him and to sabotage his plane.

He survived the attempts and with the cooperation of army, navy, Canal Zone and British authorities he managed to round up all he believed to be involved, including one man who was arrested at sea by the crew of a U. S. naval patrol plane.

Reds Still Fighting In The Crimea

Nazi Claims Of Pursuing Fleeing British Toward Nile Delta Countered By British Reports That Axis Attacks 70 Miles West Of Alexandria Have Been Repulsed

London, July 2.—(AP)—Fighting the battle for Egypt in a desert sandstorm, the British announced today the repulse of powerful Axis armored and infantry attacks at El Alamein, 70 miles west of Alexandria, but the Germans and Italians asserted they had seized that drab coastal village and were pursuing toward the inviting green delta of the Nile.

All sources agreed on the intensity of the conflict, but on nothing else.

"Results were not unfavorable to us," British headquarters in Cairo declared in reporting a battle that continued all day yesterday.

The armored forces of Nazi Marshal Erwin Rommel were acknowledged to have made a temporary break at one defended locality, only to be driven out again by the British columns.

Further south, on the edge of the great Qattara depression, British forces repulsed 17 miles west of their positions to engage Axis tanks, but the main battle obviously was along the coastal road toward Alexandria, where General Sir Claude J. E. Auchinleck chose to make his stand against persistent frontal assault.

Despite the standstill, the RAF continued intense bombing and strafing of the enemy in the El Alamein area, the British said, but the Axis claimed domination of the skies over the battlefield.

The Germans credited their dive-bombers with paving the way for the claimed breakthrough at El Alamein.

Allied bombers meanwhile, were reported stepping up their attacks on Axis lines, forcing blasting away at lines of communication, supply depots and concentrations of mechanized units.

The air operations were carried out despite heavy standstills, headquarters declared. Especially heavy attacks were reported concentrated on the Axis airbase near Sidi Barrani, where seven enemy planes were reported destroyed and many others damaged.

The stand by the British followed a 350-mile retreat across the desert in less than three weeks.

It seemed certain that on the outcome of the battle depended not only the fate of Alexandria, with its great naval base, but the whole British position in the Eastern Mediterranean and the Allies' back door supply route to Soviet Russia.

The Eighth Army was bolstered for the struggle by support troops and reserves stretching back across the desert to Alexandria, and it appeared that General Sir Claude Auchinleck had prepared a defense in depth to meet the Axis assault.

EXTEND RAIDS ON JAP BASES

Allied Raids Reach A Point 800 Miles From Australia

Allied Headquarters, Australia July 2.—(AP)—The long arm of the allied air force reached out more than 800 miles northwest of Australia yesterday to rain explosives on Japanese warplanes concentrated at the Kendari airbase in Dutch Celebes, General MacArthur's headquarters announced today.

In other farflung operations allied bombers struck simultaneously at Japanese bases at Dili, former capital of Portuguese Timor, at Lae and Salamaua in New Guinea, and at Tulagi and Bougainville in the Solomon Islands.

The attack on Kendari caught the Japanese completely off guard, returning pilots said, and the allied raiders were able to make several low-level runs over the airbase scoring many direct hits on ground-level planes and buildings.

"It was a most successful raid," declared the leader of the formation. "Airlanes were parked on the airbase everywhere. I saw bombs (Continued On Page Two)"

sent in a third, fresh battalion. An artillery battery was cited also for firing constantly until it was outflanked and surrounded. Then it broke its way through the enemy encirclement and resumed fighting.

Russian forces fought on overnight in the Sevastopol sector and the Red army massed a toll of about 7,000 German dead in repulsing attacks over a 48-hour period on the Kursk front 500 miles to the north, the government reported.

"The defenders of Sevastopol have covered themselves with unfading glory," the Soviet Information Bureau said. "They are firmly and courageously defending from the German Fascist invaders every inch of Soviet land."

A guerrilla detachment in the region of German-occupied Orel was declared to have slain nearly 1,000 invaders in two months, battered their communication lines and captured rifles, machine-guns and several thousand cartridges.

Numerically superior German forces seeking to expand their lodgments east of Kharkov were declared to have sacrificed more than 1,000 men in two days of action against Soviet lines and then "retreated to their original positions."

"In the Kursk direction our troops beat off German attacks, inflicting heavy losses on the enemy," the Information Bureau said. "In two days of fighting Soviet units destroyed 39 German tanks and armored cars, 50 mortars and 24 guns."

Soviet fliers were reported to have shot down 28 German planes assigned to Field Marshal Fedor von Bock's offensive there in a day.

Russian dispatches said the German command, testing the outer defenses of Moscow with a thrust from a flank in the first major action in the central front in more than four months, found them as strong as when the invaders were routed in a great autumn battle for the capital.

Return Of American Diplomats Discussed

Washington, July 2—(AP)—Further news of the American diplomatic and consular officials and other Americans being repatriated from Japanese areas in the far east was not available in Washington today.

It was pointed out in official quarters that it will take some time to transport the more than 1,200 Americans involved to Portuguese East Africa and to bring them home from there after exchange for Japanese transported from the United States and other American republics. The names of these Americans were made public last month.

In the case of Americans repatriated from Europe the names of persons actually homebound on the repatriation ship have not been made public until arrival of the vessel in an American port.

ASKS INCREASE IN OPA FUNDS

Henderson Takes His Plea To Senate Committee

By WILLIAM E. SPEAR
Washington, July 2.—(AP)—Price Administrator Leon Henderson stocked his vest pocket with cigars today and prepared to head for Capitol Hill to ask the Senate for the extra \$80,000,000 the House refused him—the difference, he said, between rationing and anarchy in distribution.

The session of the Senate Appropriations sub-committee considering the supply bill which carries this fiscal year's funds for the Office of Price Administration was private but Henderson made his case public in advance with a statement that price, rent and rationing controls are all placed in jeopardy by the \$75,000,000 budget which was all the House would give him.

Henderson sought \$161,000,000 for operations through next June and said that this estimate "was built upon careful first-hand estimates of the requirements of the office." Unless the full amount is forthcoming, he said, the OPA may have to cancel rent control in 282 of the 377 projected areas and curtail other functions.

The staff "is already badly overworked," he added, but even existing personnel would have to be reduced. Moreover the OPA "believes that it faces at least 10 additional rationing programs during the coming 12 months."

"Unless additional staff is available," Henderson's statement declared, "there will be utter disorganization and anarchy in the distribution of scarce commodities as supplies run out."

Even if he succeeds in convincing the Senate committee, however, any increased appropriation probably would face opposition on the Senate floor, where members recently have voiced bitter criticism of the OPA's operations, particularly the gasoline rationing and price increase in the east. And if the Senate boosted the appropriation, there would be a struggle to induce the House to reverse its stand.

Miami, Fla., July 2.—(AP)—Claude Nolan, Miami and Jacksonville automobile dealer, was indicted by the federal grand jury here yesterday on charges of conspiracy to violate the rationing regulations set up by the OPA.

Also named as defendants were the two companies operated by Nolan: Nolan-Pfeiler Motors Co., of Miami, and Claude Nolan, Inc., of Jacksonville, and Connor Brown, vice-president of the Jacksonville firm and a nephew of Nolan.

He indicted Nolan accused the defendants of selling as used tires many with only a few miles of wear. Under OPA definitions a tire does not become "used" until it has been 1,000 miles of duty.

NAVAL BASE IN IRELAND

U.S. Base To Care for European End Of Supply Route

U. S. Naval Base, Londonderry, Northern Ireland, July 2.—(AP)—Here in far northern Ireland, at the European end of the Allies' bridge of ships, this great new naval base has sprung into being in a year's time to guard the precious cargoes bound across the north Atlantic for Britain and Russia.

Its existence was announced publicly for the first time today although it was commissioned last February 5 and, according to Commodore Ross Stewart, commander of the adjoining British base, "already has lifted a great burden of the convoy problem."

Where hundreds of United States marines and bluejackets operate machine shops, supply bases, dry-docks and other naval shore establishments in a plant spreading over hundreds of acres, only a year ago 3,000 Irish and American workers were starting construction.

It was built with lend-lease funds and Capt. William Larson of Chicago said "everything in the base down to the last pork chop or nut and bolt has been brought from the United States."

Details of its intricate mechanism, of course, still are a war secret but it could repair or rebuild the biggest United States destroyer. It has millions of dollars worth of precision machinery ready, if necessary, to operate around the clock in black-out buildings.

Wally's Home Destroyed
Monterey, Pa., July 2.—(AP)—The historic Monterey Inn, birthplace of the former Wallis Simpson, now the Duchess of Windsor, was destroyed by fire early today.

The inn, a summer resort 18 miles southwest of Gettysburg, at one time served as headquarters for General Robert E. Lee.

has been in action for some days in the North African struggle while United States service and supply units have been engaged on behalf of the Allies behind the battle lines.

"Almost everything arranged was secret," Churchill added of his talks with the President, and "there was never a more earnest desire between Allies to engage the enemy."

In the closing passages of his historic reply, just before Commons began voting on a motion to censure his government for its direction of the war, Churchill said: "I have stuck hard to my blood, toil, sweat and tears, to which I have added muddles and mismanagement."

The war, in Churchill's opinion, is likely to be a long one and moreover, he said, there is no reason to suppose that hostilities will cease "when the final result has become obvious."

He paid tribute to the Russians for their "steady resistance" to the Germans and predicted they would "surprise Hitler again."

Churchill said the balance of naval power in the Pacific has been "altered in our favor" by the "brilliant victories of the United States Navy and Air Force" over the Japanese in the Coral sea and at Midway.

"I am confident that now a land invasion of Australia would be hazardous and unprofitable operation for Japan," he declared. These splendid American achievements have not received the attention they deserve in these islands.

A minister once preached a series

Too often people imagine that

war effort. Our people are
ready and willing to do
without anything the gov-
ernment needs for its war
effort, but in doing without
they would like to know that
they are really making a
worthwhile contribution.

'REAL WAGES' ARE
WHAT COUNT

In the interest of the
worker himself, requests for
wage increases should be
scrutinized with extreme
care at this time by the au-
thorities—and should not be
allowed except in those iso-
lated instances where some



group's wage levels are ob-
viously out of line with the
levels of other groups and
correction is necessary.

It is the government's pol-
icy to fix and freeze prices.
That can be done success-
fully only if the items of cost
entering into industrial over-
head are likewise fixed and
frozen. In most industries,
the cost of labor is among
the principal items of over-
head. Thus, if widespread
wage increases are granted,
it will be necessary to permit
widespread price increases
—and then we'll again be on
the road to inflation.

A worker's income can
only be accurately evaluated
in terms of "real wages"—
which simply means that his
pay check must be consid-
ered in the light of the com-
modities and services it will
buy. If a man, for instance,
gets a ten per cent wage
boost and his cost of living
then advances fifteen per
cent, he is worse off than be-
fore, not better off. And past
economic history definitely
proves that during infla-
tionary periods the cost of living
always rises faster than

wages.
Wage stability, to sum up,
is essential to price stability.
And we can't maintain price
ceilings without wage ceil-
ings, either voluntary or en-
forced.

Washington Daybook

Washington—The subject of the
most muddled conversations in
Washington today is "Congress."
Locally, there has been a strong
reaction against the violent attacks
on our legislative branch of govern-
ment. It has been conceded that
Congress is vital to representative
government; that much of the snip-
ing against it has been unjustified;
that Congress has, on the whole,
cooperated magnificently with the
Administration in furtherance of
the war effort; and that making
Congress and certain congressmen
the "goats" for everything that has
gone or goes wrong is one of the
unkindest cuts of all.

Still, Congress is on the fence.
It takes the hide off the CCC
without ruffling the fur of the re-
cently unpopular NYA. Some of
its investigating groups blow the
War Production Board out of the
water, but a powerful faction rises
in wrath at an alleged threat that
the Army is planning to take over
WPA.

After approving anti-inflation
legislation all the way down the
line, it suddenly balks at okaying

Leon Henderson's demand for funds
to even grant all that the Budget
Bureau put the blue pencil on.
It gives the green light imme-
diately to 50 billion dollars or so of
Army and Navy appropriations, but
develops its own legislative log jam
over some nine other departmental
and agency appropriation measures.

After months of wrangling in
committee hearings, it brings to the
floor a tax bill more than two bil-
lion short of Treasury recommenda-
tions, but passes along a hint
through a few important spokes-
men that more will come later.

While Washington housing be-
came daily more acute, the two
chambers despatched for a month
over a \$32,500,000 defense housing
bill. The stymie was whether to
build 1,000 family housing units or
appropriate all the funds for dormi-
tories.

These are a few random examples
—there are more.

A person doesn't have to ignore
these facts to agree wholly with
Senator O'Mahoney of Wyoming.
He put it this way:

"Of course, it (Congress) has not
been perfect. It is its weakness
and its failings, but I do NOT hesi-
tate to say that NO Congress in
history has worked more diligently
and more continuously than this."
And later, he added: "These
members of Congress are your peo-
ple. They are chosen by you and
they speak for you. If they are
less able or industrious than they
ought to be, change them.... But
don't let anybody undermine your
faith in Congress as an institution,
for only the Congress of the United
States stands between the people
and an all-powerful central gov-
ernment."

—to preserve the right of free
speech and rule by the people.

aged to save a large proportion of
his remaining armored strength in
the long retreat across the desert.
Much obviously depended now on
his ability to manipulate his mech-
anized units to prevent Rommel
from executing his favorite German
maneuver—a smashing blow at a
concentrated enemy force.

Much also depended on the Nazi
chief's ability to maintain his
extended lines of communication,
stretched almost to the breaking
point by a swift advance that has
covered 305 miles in the 10 days
since his armies captured Tobruk—
now his nearest port of supply.

In attempt to smash these lines
of communication the RAF, aided
by United States Air Force bombers,
was said to be operating a variable
"shuttle service" across the battle-
line from dawn to dusk.

American-built Kittyhawk fight-
ers, equipped for bombing opera-
tions, were credited with playing an
important role in these operations.
One RAF squadron leader de-
clared the "Kittyhawks" were
proving extremely effective against
enemy tanks, reporting that 31
tanks had been knocked out in one
series of 45 sorties.

An American tank corps general
returning here from the fighting
front commented on the high de-
gree of cooperation attained be-
tween the British air and land
forces, and said the latter had been
given maximum protection during
their withdrawal.

In recognition of the close threat
to the Nile valley, the Egyptian
government replaced police guards
with soldiers at all important bridges,
dams, and buildings and began
rounding up criminal elements as
a precaution.

The Vichy French expressed fears
that the British might destroy the
French battleship, submarine, four
cruisers and three destroyers which
have been interned at Alexandria
since the fall of France, rather than
let them fall into the enemy's
hands.

Any act against these ships would
be one of "violence," warned a semi-
official Vichy statement.

Seek Identity of
Crash Victims

Welch, W. Va., July 2.—(AP)—
Army officials sought today to
identify the mangled and burned
bodies of 21 soldiers, occupants of

an army transport plane which
crashed in flames on a southern
West Virginia hillside.

The transport, a former Ameri-
can Airlines flagship, lost a wing
at 800 feet and plunged with smoke
pouring from the fuselage into a
garden at Premier, three miles from
here, yesterday.

Nine soldiers were killed in an-
other mishap yesterday in Califor-
nia when a four-motored army
bomber crashed and exploded on a
low knoll with a roar heard for
miles. Army men at March Field
said the craft was on a routine
training flight.

Guarding wreckage of the airliner
at Premier, said the bodies were be-
yond recognition but they believed
13 could be identified by tags, an-
other by clothing and a 15th pos-
sibly by a ring.

RAF And Nazis
Exchange Blows

London, July 2.—(AP)—One me-
dium sized enemy ship was set afire
last night during British attacks
on the Air Ministry reported today.
Other planes bombed airfields
and railways in occupied territory
and shot down three German bomb-
ers. One British plane was lost.

German planes operated dur-
ing the night over districts in southern
and western England and South
Wales, bombing various places but
developing no concentrated attack
anywhere, it was announced. A

LEAGUE LEAD NOW CUT TO THREE GAMES

Defeated by Athletics Last Night; Score, 5 to 4

It has been some time since anyone needed to feel sorry for the World Champion New York Yankees, but their plight is getting more pathetic night and day.

Since marching boldly out of Yankee stadium nearly three weeks ago they have lost 11 out of 17 contests and last night saw their American league lead cut to three games as they blew a 5-4 decision to the Philadelphia Athletics.

This was a reduction of 1 1/2 games in their first place margin in a single day because of the Boston Red Sox' second straight doubleheader victory over the Washington Senators.

The Yankees were held to five hits by three Philadelphia pitchers but this was not what whinned them. The champs held a 4-0 lead at the end of four innings, one of the runs being Joe DiMaggio's 11th homer of the year. But when the Yanks folded up as they have done in four of their last five games.

They couldn't score any more themselves and they let the A's rally for two runs in the fifth and tie the score in the seventh. Then in the ninth, with runners on first and second, Johnny Murphy fielded Relief Pitcher Luman Harris' bunt and threw into left field to allow the winning run to cross the plate. Altogether the A's made 14 hits.

Washington was held to five hits in each game and the Red Sox made twice as many. They downed Buck Newsom 3-2 in the opener with a run in the seventh and three innings of perfect relief pitching by Yank Terry and then they captured the nightcap with the greatest of ease 7-1.

This brought Boston's current surge to 20 victories in 24 games and put a premium on the three-game series between the Yanks and Red Sox at Fenway park tomorrow and Saturday—with the possibility that New York may lose control of first place.

The victories weren't enough to satisfy some of the fans, however, and they booed Ted Williams for his apparent loafing in the second game with the result that Manager Joseph Cronin replaced his star with Pete Fox in the fifth inning. The Cleveland Indians kept with-

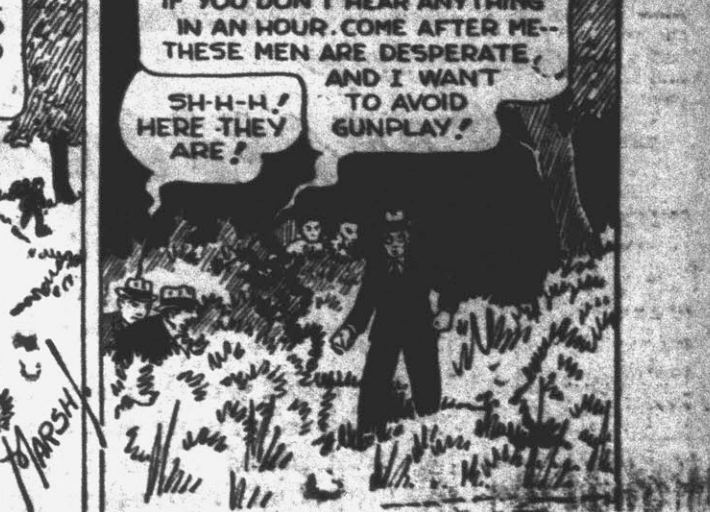

Watch For Attack By Enemy July 4th

Boston, July 2.—(AP)—A War Department warning that independence day might be chosen for Axis raids or concentrated sabotage was relayed to the public today by Executive Director J. W. Farley of the Massachusetts Public Safety Committee as he moved to tighten a ban on all fireworks celebrations.

Farley said that he had received an urgent communique from the War Department saying:

"Fireworks displays and large gatherings should be avoided this year. The reasons advanced for these views are the opportunity which such gatherings present for saboteurs to cause confusion and possible injury to the public and the favorable opportunity which such gatherings present for a token raid. Either of these enemy activities might well prove to be a major catastrophe."

Farley instructed all city and town chairmen to ask local authorities to rescind immediately permits which may have been issued.

SEAMEN GUARD SHIP'S CARGO

Man Guns To Beat Off Nazi Fliers At Murmansk

By HENRY C. CASSIDY
Moscow, July 2.—(AP)—American merchant seamen man guns both at sea and in port to beat off German fliers seeking to slash the supply line feeding vital war materials into Soviet Russia through the Arctic port of Murmansk.

This job of delivering the goods—and even guarding them on occasion after they have been delivered—was described today by Com. Samuel B. Frankel, 37, of Stapleton, N. Y., U. S. assistant naval attaché stationed in Murmansk but now visiting Moscow for conferences.

U. S. merchantmen carrying supplies to Russia, he said, are bringing their cargoes successfully to port with relatively few casualties despite the attacks of German dive bombers and torpedo planes.

During the last four months, Frankel declared, American casualties have not been more than 25 wounded and the same number missing or dead.

In the future, he said, losses should be even less, for the advent of the foggy season will give the convoys greater protection and the retreat of the Arctic icefields will permit them to make a great circle far north of the Norwegian coast.

Russian authorities have showed their gratitude to the American seamen by granting each crew member a Soviet port bonus of an additional month's pay, Frankel disclosed.

The bonus, by dollar draft presented to the captain of each ship and payable in the United States, amounts to about \$3,000 per vessel. This is in addition to other bonuses granted in the United States.

The Russians also are doing everything possible to make the Americans feel at home, Frankel said, by providing Russian and American movies nightly, by staging operetta performances and by opening an international club for sailors.

FBI Search Homes 225 Enemy Aliens

Altoona, Pa., July 2.—(AP)—Twenty-five Federal Bureau of Investigation agents, assisted by local and state motor police, seized a quantity of contraband articles last night in "post searches" at the homes of 225 enemy aliens in the important rail center on the main line of the Pennsylvania railroad.

The federal agents, saying the searches were routine, declined to connect them with the disclosure by FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover Saturday that eight German saboteurs caught in this country had planned to destroy the Pennsylvania line along Horseshoe Curve, among other objectives.

Washington, July 2.—(AP)—The Senate passed and sent to the House today a bill creating a Women's Auxiliary Naval Reserve which would take over many shore duties and release male enlisted men and commissioned personnel for duty at sea.

More Executions.
London, July 2.—(AP)—A spokesman for the Czech government in exile said today that the Vichy radio had reported 141 more executions by the German Gestapo in Czechoslovakia.

These, he declared, were in addition to 115 persons reported by the Vichy radio yesterday as sentenced to death.

Mexico Ready For Attack On Coast

Mazatlan, Mexico, July 2.—(AP)—Mexico's army, navy and air force now stand ready to repel any attack on her west coast, Gen. Lazaro Cardenas, former president and commander of the military zone of the Pacific, declared today.

Cooperation in continental defense with the United States, he added "has definitely crystallized."

General Cardenas spoke in an interview upon his return to headquarters here from a tour of inspection of defense units along the Gulf of California and Lower California as far north as Ensenada.

American General on Visit Troops Ireland

With U. S. Forces in Northern Ireland, July 2.—(AP)—Maj. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, commander of U. S. forces in the European theater of operations, concluded a quick visit today to American forces in northern Ireland.

"I am highly pleased with what I have seen, especially Gen. Hartle's staff and the way they have carried out their job," he said.

Escapee Recaptured.
Raleigh, July 2.—(AP)—Grant Moore, a Negro who escaped from the Edgecombe prison camp September 9, 1937, while serving a 25 to 30 year sentence for second degree murder, has been apprehended at Chester, S. C., Penal Director Oscar Pitts said today.

Alaska Restricted Zone.
Anchorage, Alaska, July 2.—(AP)—Maj. Gen. Simon D. Buckner, Jr., commanding the Alaska defense forces, today proclaimed all Alaska coastal waters westward from Cape St. Elias, extending 20 miles offshore, as a "mobile zone dangerous to navigation." Vessels were warned to enter only under navy direction.

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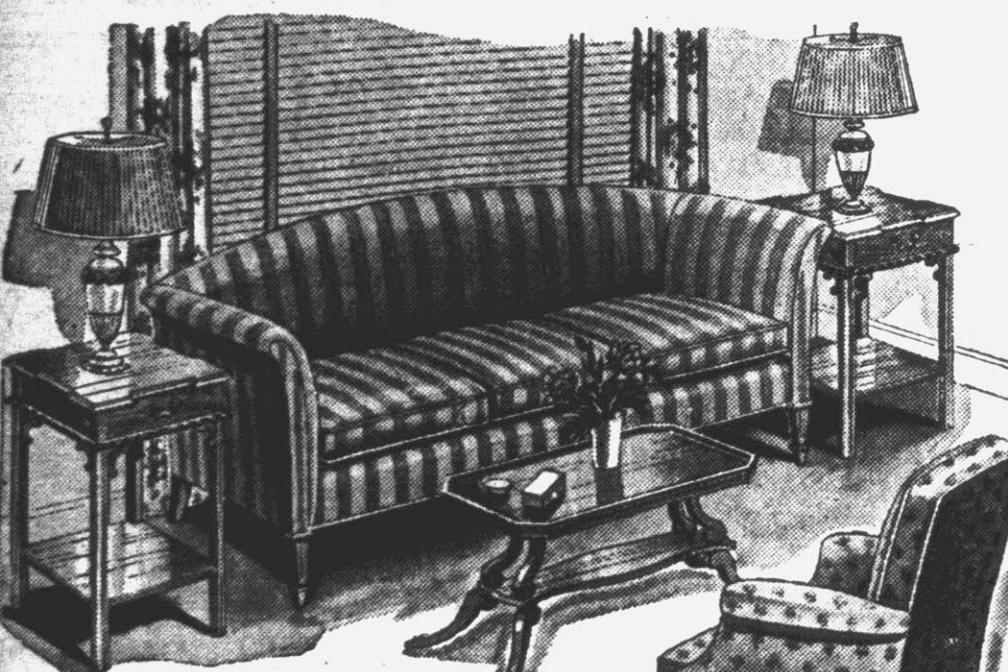

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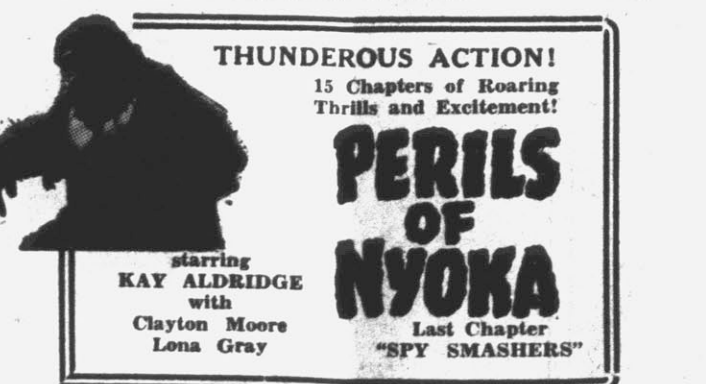

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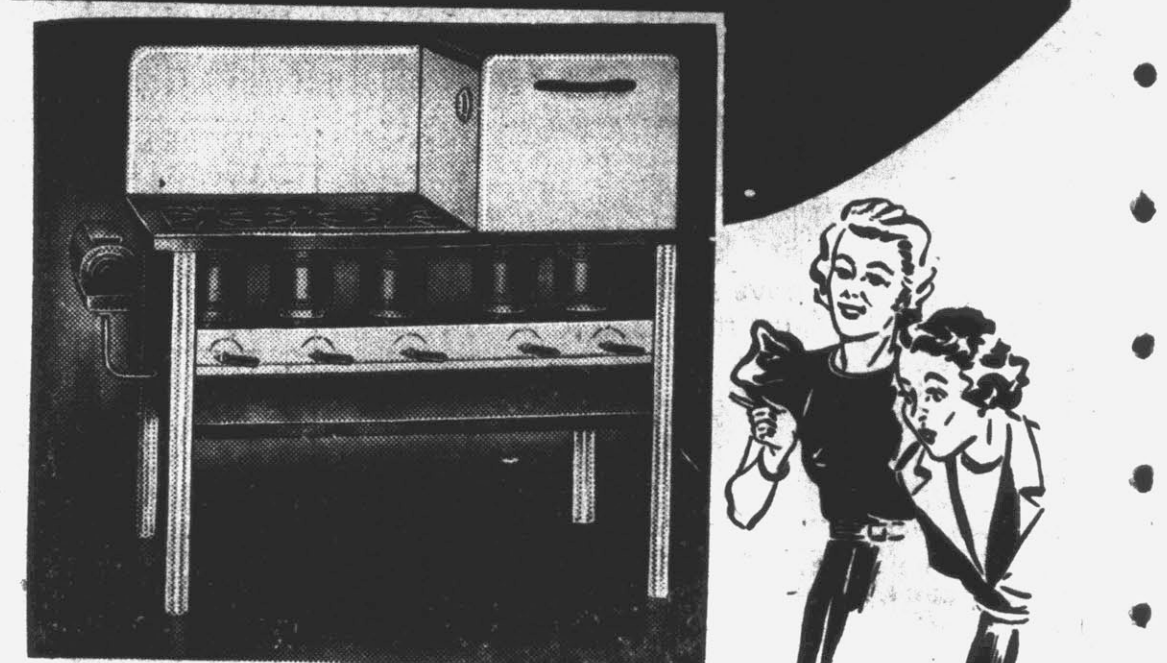


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
