

PLAN SIMPLIFY PRICE CONTROL

To Issue Rules In Understandable Language

New York, Aug. 3.—(Wide World) Frankly worried that lack of understanding may blow holes in price control and send living costs spiraling crazily upwards, some leading retailers are taking one of the most fundamental and intelligent steps since Pearl Harbor.

They are getting down to cases, speaking in simple language that can be understood by any honestly confused retailer or by any trickster who may have failed to realize what price control means for the national warfare.

They are campaigning with booklets and mailing pieces to show the nation's two million retailers that it's necessary for them to fight inflation by complying with the maximum price regulations laid down by the Office of Price Administration.

The OPA itself is preparing new informative material such as simplified digests of regulations and a series of guides and various stores and is sending state OPA offices a planned program for achieving complete coverage of all retailers.

Lack of such coordinated, simplified information in other fields—plus the spectacle of even officials contradicting one another—has left citizens and some experts bewildered and wondering: who's right?

This contribution to confusion has been amply demonstrated in the past two weeks in the fields of rubber and steel but nowhere more so than in oil: one government official said gasoline rationing for the entire country was necessary; the next day another official said it wasn't.

Retailers throughout the country this month are making a national drive to get the fullest retail and public support for the price control regulations.

As part of the drive the National Retail Dry Goods Association has issued a booklet with 22 questions and answers concerning the reasons for the requirements of price control.

Can't Get Along Together In Concentration Camp

Missoula, Mont., Aug. 3.—(Wide World)—It seems to be quite a problem out here to keep the hundreds of Italians and Japanese happy at the Fort Missoula concentration camp.

They're living in a place that looks like an expensive summer resort. They get three squares a day. They have practically no work to do.

But they still glower at each other. The camp guards never have seen an Italian say so much as "good morning" to a Japanese. The internees just don't seem to grasp the kernel of the Axis philosophy—you know, that the Japanese and Italians have a lot in common and therefore should be as happy as pigs-in-a-rug when they're together.

So there had to be special arrangements at the Missoula camp. Of course, no one at all gets into the camp. The guards even arrest people who try to take pictures through the fence. But the stories circulate anyway through the pretty college town of Missoula.

The Japanese have picked on a curious pastime. They make gadgets from pebbles, vases, bowls, what-nots. They'll sit alone for hours picking small pebbles from the gravel on the camp roads. Then they trot silently back to their quarters and stick them together into some sort of gadget. They all seem to have the fever. They work as intently as though they were dig-

ing a tunnel to Tokyo. The happy-go-lucky Italians vary. Some make ship models, very beautiful ones. Some get together and yodel opera arias. There are a few gifted painters. The rest just walk, or "set."

The Italians and Japanese are housed in separate buildings. It was soon found they wouldn't even eat together, so there are two dining rooms and two kitchens. Now the camp is planning movies for the men. They'll have to run each show twice, so the Axis brothers won't have to sit together.

There are no Germans in the camp. They're in another camp, with more Japanese. It seems the Japanese just snub both the Italians and the Germans, and receive snubs in return. But things happen when the Italians and Germans are housed together.

The only group which hasn't caused trouble seems to be the Italian bakers. They were ship's bakers, and they really like turning out good bread. They bustle about happily at their jobs.

Dodgers And Giants to Meet In A Benefit Game Today

EXPECT DRAW RECORD GATE

Proceeds From Game For Army Relief Fund

The Brooklyn Dodgers, who might not be so far along with their work had they met the New York Giants more often, tonight will be in a contest that has generated more excitement in Gotham than any baseball battle since the last world series.

This interborough brawl was just another Monday ball game when the schedule was drawn months ago but now it's an important struggle with army relief the principal beneficiary.

When the two National League rivals played for navy relief in the Dodgers' park in May they took in about \$80,000, a mark none of the other teams has touched. This time they'll have the major league spotlight to themselves when they start swinging in the Polo Grounds at 6:45 p. m. and they have promised to do even better by the army.

Officials won't be satisfied with anything less than \$100,000.

The extra special attraction will be Van Lingle Mungo, new addition to the Giants' pitching staff, hurling against the Dodgers, whose uniform he wore when he was the terror of the majors not so many years ago.

Whitlow Wyatt will be Brooklyn's starting pitcher.

The Giants helped the Dodgers preserve their nine-game lead yesterday by splitting a doubleheader with the second-place St. Louis Cardinals, which is all the Dodgers could do with the Chicago Cubs.

It took the Dodgers ten innings to turn back the Cubs, 5-4, in the first game. In the second game, Claude Passeau pitched the Cubs to a 7-5 triumph, but he had a happy day in the third when the Dodgers rallied for three runs.

Carl Hubbell pitched the Giants to a 7-1 decision over the Cardinals for his fifth straight win as Mel Ott blasted two home runs, one with the bases loaded. Then Mort Cooper tossed a four-hitter at the Giants and the Cards won, 3-2.

The Cincinnati Reds clung to their one-game third-place margin over the Giants by splitting with the Boston Braves, Al Javery blanked the Reds 7-0 on five hits in the first game, with Max West contributing a grand slam homer, but Cincinnati took the second, 4-2, on Circuit blows by Eric Tipton and Eddie Joost.

The Pittsburgh Pirates dumped the Philadelphia Phils, 4-2 and 3-2, and hopped over the Cubs into fifth place.

In the American league, the New York Yankees downed the St. Louis Browns twice and stretched their lead to 12½ games over the Cleveland Indians, who wrested second place from the Boston Red Sox with the help of the Detroit Tigers.

A two-run homer by Tommy Rhenrich led the Yanks to a 4-2 victory over St. Louis in the opener and Ernie Bonham blanked the Browns, 10-0 in the nightcap.

The Indians noosed out the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-3 and 4-2, with Pinchitter Chubby Dean singing home the winning tally in a three-run ninth inning rally in the first game and Jim Bagby scattering eight hits in the second.

The Detroit Tigers knocked the Boston Red Sox into third place by four percentage points, taking the first game, 8-4, as Paul (Dixie) Trout pitched seven-hit ball and contributed a three-run homer. The Tigers annexed the second, 6-2, on the nine-hit burling of Virgil Trucks and Al Benton. Both Boston runs in the second game came on Ted Williams' 24th homer.
