# U. S. FORCES FIGHTING IN FRANCE

## Russians Falling Back Before Increased Nazi Drive In Don Bend Area

### Reds Fighting Back Fiercely Making Every Inch Gained By Nazis Costly; Claim German Losses Of One And Quarter Million Men In 3 Months

Moscow, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The Germans poured strong reserves today into the Don bend and Caucasus battles from south of Voronezh to the high plains of Pyatigorsk and the bolstered onslaught presaged a full-scale drive against Stalingrad and along the Baku rail line to the shores of the Caspian.

The Russians were fighting back fiercely. A communiqué declared that the Nazis' gains since May 15 had cost 1,250,000 casualties—twice those of Russia—and that Adolf Hitler was draining western Europe for the new fighting men required in the east.

The Russians fell back in the Don bend where their counter-offensive appeared spent, and gave ground in the region of Pyatigorsk, 170

Moscow, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Pravda said today the Russian Black Sea fleet, forced to use bases on the Caucasian coast because of the Nazi occupation of the Crimea, still was operating and attacking its objectives despite raids by German air squadrons.

miles southeast of the destroyed and abandoned Malkop oil fields.

(In London a British source whom it was not permitted to identify by name said the Germans had made some progress toward Stalingrad, reaching but not crossing the Don river at the bend. He declared, however, that Russian resistance had stiffened in the Caucasus, slowing German progress considerably).

The Nazi drive down the Rostov-Baku rail line across the Caucasus had as its next apparent objective beyond Pyatigorsk and Mineralnye Vody the rail junction town of Georgievsk, only a few miles beyond the Nazi spearheads.

Grozny, heart of the Grozny oil field, lies 130 miles southeast along the railway, and the Caspian is 100 miles beyond Grozny.

In the northwestern Caucasus the Russians reported repulsing German attacks in the Krasnodar area 60 miles east of the port of Novorossiisk.

While the Germans "succeeded in somewhat pressing back our troops" in the Pyatigorsk sector, Cossacks cut down 300 of them with sabers (Continued on Page Six)

### Total Blackout

The entire county will be blacked-out Friday night, August 23, Charles A. White, commander of the Greenville Civilian Defense Council, announced today.

A United States army officer from Fort Bragg and June H. Rose, assistant director of state civilian defense, will be here as observers.

Everything is to be blacked-out. Traffic will be stopped. Air raid, police and fire wardens will be on duty. Police, fire, hospital, public utilities, rescue and other squads will actually respond to reports of raid by the air raid wardens.

This total blackout—Friday, August 23—is ordered by the United States army.

### 'Marvelous'

London, Aug. 19.—(AP)—United States Flying Fortresses raided a German fighter plane base at Abbeville today during the landing raid operations at Dieppe, United States army headquarters announced.

A communiqué said bomb bursts were seen on the target area, and all the big four-engine bombers returned safely. Two squadrons of the giant bombers took part in the attack. They were supported by RAF and RCAF fighters.

Wing Commander Kingcombe, leader of one of the escorting RAF fighter formations, added this comment to the communiqué:

"The American bomber boys were marvelous. They did not waste a single bomb on the middle of the airfield, but the building around the edge went up in clouds of smoke and debris. Wherever buildings were, bombs landed on or around them."

## BIG JOB AHEAD IN SOLOMONS

### Eventual Show-down With Jap Fleet Necessary

General MacArthur's headquarters, Australia, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The final expulsion of Japan from the Solomon Islands apparently rested today on the completion of two tedious, difficult jobs—the mop-up ashore where the United States Marines have landed and the consolidation of naval mastery in that South Pacific zone.

This still was a triple-header operation of major magnitude, involving land, sea and air activity, but every indication in the absence of official fact and figure pointed to accumulating successes.

For one thing, the Japanese radio has begun changing its story on the battle and the only reference to it in the latest Tokyo broadcasts was a commentator's warning that the United States onslaught might lead to further attacks on Japanese-held territory "or even on Japan herself."

A report to Auckland from a New Zealand correspondent somewhere in the South Pacific said the United States had won "sufficient successes" at sea to reinforce and supply the assault troops for what may be weeks or months of "extremely bitter" fighting in the islands.

"Japanese units which were in the Solomons at the opening of operations either have been sunk or have fled to the Caroline Islands." (Continued on Page Six)

### Should Post Names Air Zone Chiefs

## Predicts Food Shortage United Nations In 1943

Washington, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The United States and other United Nations are headed straight for an acute food shortage, Chairman Hampton Fulmer (D-SC) of the House Agriculture committee said today, and nothing is being done about it.

It will come about the end of 1943, the outspoken Carolina farmer predicted in an interview, and "the officials and bureaucrats handling the program won't do anything about it until it smacks them right in the face."

Fulmer said he based his belief on a growing shortage of farm labor and what he described as an increasing tendency to disregard the problem of the farmer.

### BRITISH BOMB NAZI SUB BASE

### Blast Shipbuilding Center Near Danish Border

London, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Flensburg, the Nazi submarine and shipbuilding center almost at the Danish border, was the chief target of RAP bombers last night, their second night in a row over northern Germany, the Air Ministry announced today.

A communiqué said four of the raiders were missing. The weight of the attack was not disclosed immediately.

A few German bombers were over England during the night. The Ministry of Home Security said bombs dropped in East Anglia caused some damage and slight casualties.

Berlin broadcasts said Germany also was attacked from the East, where Russian planes were said to have bombed parts of East and West Prussia.

They named Norwich as a target of German raiders over England during the night.

### Pitt Murderer Receives Parole

Raleigh, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Governor Broughton granted 15 paroles today, among them four to persons convicted of murder and another to one convicted of manslaughter.

Robert Williams, sentenced in Lee county in June, 1936, to 12-23 years for second degree murder in connection with the slaying of Deputy Sheriff James E. Thomas, was among those freed. Thomas was killed while raiding a still.

Others paroled included: Henry Miller, sentenced in Pitt county in 1939 to 6 to 8 years for second degree murder.

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## ADMIT LOSS OF BRITISH SHIPS

### Anti-Aircraft Cruiser And Destroyer Sunk

London, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Malta has received vital supplies, brought by a convoy which made a hectic voyage under heavy attack to the Mediterranean stronghold at a cost of four British warships, the Admiralty announced today.

The anti-aircraft cruiser Cairo and the destroyer Foresight were sunk in addition to the aircraft carrier Eagle and the cruiser Manchester, loss of which had been announced previously.

Swarms of Axis aircraft and many submarines attacked the convoy in a battle which started east of Gibraltar on August 11 and continued through August 13.

While British losses were considerable, the punishment inflicted on the enemy was high, the Admiralty said. It was announced that 66 enemy aircraft are known to have been destroyed and that it is extremely probable many others were lost.

There also were some losses of merchantmen in the convoy, but on this point the Admiralty said a large proportion of the convoy reached Malta.

### Traffic Deaths Higher In July

Raleigh, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Motor Vehicle Commissioner T. B. Ward reported that 72 persons were killed in traffic accidents on North Carolina highways during July.

Ward said that 25 persons died in non-collision accidents and added that the high toll indicated that in spite of all rationing and warnings of safety officials, drivers continue to be a dominating and dangerous factor in automobile death on the streets and highways.

### 145 Negro Draftees Went To Fort Bragg

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## Commando Raid May Be Forerunner Of Invasion

### JAP WARSHIP SUNK BY AMERICAN SUB

Washington, Aug. 19.—(AP)—A United States submarine has sunk a Japanese cruiser or destroyer in the western Aleutians, the navy announced today, bringing to 23 the total of enemy ships announced as sunk or damaged in that area.

The navy said that conditions made it impossible to determine an exact identification of the ship destroyed.

The sinking was announced in navy department communique No. 108, which follows:

"North Pacific area: 'L. A. United States submarine has reported the sinking of a Japanese cruiser or destroyer in the western Aleutian area. Conditions made impossible an exact identification of the type of ship.'

"2. This sinking has not been announced in any previous navy department communique."

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## Action That Began at Dawn (Europe time) Was Still in Progress Late Today; Planes, Tanks And Heavy Artillery Being Used In Battle Around Dieppe

London, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Allied Commandos were believed still fighting around Dieppe, France, as night approached, and it was made known that the chief objectives of this greatest raid of the war had been achieved.

Every operation of the day in this first great unified assault by American, Canadian, British and Fighting French invasion troops was reported to have been accomplished with clock-like precision.

The attack was mounted at dawn, with tanks and with probably the greatest aerial umbrella in history.

Despite the unprecedented scope of the attack, the British repeatedly announced that the action was not an invasion intended to create a front in western Europe but was of-

London, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The re-embarkation of the Allied forces taking part in the Commando raid on Dieppe today has been completed, a British communiqué announced tonight.

The announcement came from the headquarters of the operation, which said that the bulk of the troops in the all-day battle are likely to have been heavy.

A German radio location station has been destroyed, and an anti-aircraft battery wiped out, the communiqué added.

Ninety-five British aircraft are missing and 75 enemy planes are known to have been destroyed by a raid.

This was reported by the return to Britain during the afternoon of some of the Commandos who had accompanied their mission speedily.

The main battle raged on, however, and the possibilities inherent in the situation increased as night approached.

The constant procession of hundreds of enemy aircraft estimated more than 1,000 United States Army, RAF and Royal Canadian Air Force fighters and bombers from British front-line squadrons in the battle zone in France suggested that at the least, the great assault might be a test to determine whether such an aerial "big top" could positively protect a new invasion force all day long.

The planes shuttled to the attack and back for reloading and refueling so quickly that the escape of British aircraft recalled the battle of Britain in the fall of 1940.

Starting at dawn, there never was a break in the procession.

Despite the great concentration of planes, it was reported reliably that no parachutists were used.

The Americans, carefully chosen volunteers called the Rangers, were the first American fighting men to set foot on German-controlled soil in this war.

Escorted by British and Canadian fighters, the Rangers were to go into action in the night.

(Continued from Page One) also a native of Germany but now a naturalized American, said that he believed the raider had at least six guns, and some of her armament was of eight inch caliber. Of the drifting attack, he said he had a theory that the surface raider, a ship of perhaps 8,000 to 9,000 tons, had launched motor torpedo boats equipped with machine guns. The survivors were unable to estimate the damage done by machine guns.

"We couldn't tell how many, if any, they killed," the second man said. "Those big shells were landing, you know."

(Continued from Page One) fighters, two squadrons of the U. S. Army Air Force's big flying fortresses smashed at one base of Nazi aerial resistance in a high-level bombing of a German fighter station at Abbeville, 38 miles northeast of Dieppe, setting buildings afire and smashing runways.

It was the second daylight operation of the four-motor American bombers over France and, as in the first raid two days ago on Rouen, 38 miles south of Dieppe, all of the bombers returned safely. From dawn on through late afternoon the constant shuddering roar of heavy explosions denoting the battle's continuance shook buildings on the English side of the channel. (Although the British repeatedly asserted the action was a Commando raid and not an invasion, the strength and continuing nature of the assault suggested that it was developing into a major operation with unpredictable possibilities.)

Even as the battle thundered on, first units of the Commando force had "speedily" accomplished their mission, returned to a British port and gave reports.

There was no immediate indication how many men returned in the first contingent, nor whether Americans were among them. It was presumed that they constituted the wing of the Allied force which a Commando said accomplished its objective and withdrew.

Hours after the battle progressed with the rumble of heavy gunfire and the constant roar of planes as audible testimony to the scope of the conflict on which Allied headquarters issued terse periodic communiqués.

Canadians made up the majority of the strong forces, that drove across the channel to Dieppe 50-odd miles from Beachy Head, the nearest point in England, and 100 miles from Paris.

Announcements from the United States Army and Allied combined operations headquarters disclosed that the Americans, British special service troops and the fighting French, all were in action.

The Americans, specially chosen from a host of volunteers as the first American fighting men to set foot on the continent of an embattled Europe since 1917, proudly wore the title "Rangers"—after the famous Rogers Rangers whose bold exploits made history in the French and Indian wars of American colonial days 150 years ago.

forces across to France.

On the left flank the Canadians first were repulsed by strong German opposition, but bounded back to carry the beach by assault while their comrades were pushing tanks ashore in the center for the main thrust, which a noon announcement said still was continuing.

The landings were accomplished at every point selected in advance in a carefully planned, closely secret operation that American officers of all services helped to arrange.

Eagerness to call this a second front, a real invasion, was cooled by repeated BBC broadcasts stressing the "limited and temporary" character of the action and declaring "it had nothing to do with military decisions which have been taken in Moscow recently."

The Germans, however, made no attempt to belittle the scope of the assault, and claimed that they had thrown even their naval forces into the bitter conflict.

For the Canadians, thirsting for a fight for months or years, it was the first real action against the enemy.

For the fighting French, whose Commando organization was disclosed only on Bastille Day last July 14, it was the first time they have set foot on the soil of their native land since the German conquest of 1940.

Observers on the British shore said there were more aircraft than ever before seen and heard over the channel as bombers and fighters shuttled across to assault or reload. Indicating the size of the present operation, it was recalled on at least one previous occasion 1,000 fighters participated in a sweep across the channel.

The raid, first announced at 6:45 a. m. (1:45 a. m. EWT) was still continuing at noon when a supplementary communiqué was issued.

After that, as the mist burned away and a fine, fair day developed, persons on the British shore still could hear the heartening sounds of offensive battle.

The objectives obviously were extensive, since it was the first time landing parties have used tanks. The objectives appeared to be these: To test the enemy's defense organization and to test the Allied plans for landing and the RAF ability to cover a big landing force.

Additionally, it was bound to disclose disposition of German troops and equipment in the cross-channel area that once was a vacation resort but now is a nest of Nazi fortifications.

The French were cautioned not to rise in support of the Allies until they should be given the word, lest there be a repetition of the tragic St. Nazaire battle, in which French patriots battled the Nazis for days after British Commandos had withdrawn and drew stern reprisals from the Germans.

Winston-Salem, Aug. 19—(AP)—A Forsyth coroner's jury today found that John W. Wilhelm was justified early this morning in the fatal shooting of Sergeant Julius A. Wooten while the soldier had apparently become confused and was attempting to get into Wilhelm's home in Forest Hills instead of the identical house next door where he was visiting.

After viewing Wooten's body and making an investigation on the scene in Old Town township, the jury found he died from Wilhelm's shot through the door and termed it "an unfortunate justified homicide."

Wooten, who is well known in Winston-Salem and has worked with Hanes Hosiery Mills since 1921, was on leave from army camp in Texas, and was visiting Charles D. Livenood, who lives next door to Wilhelm in a house identical to Wilhelm's.

**German Bombs Trawler**

## NAVY TAKES OVER PLANT

### Government Will Operate Vital War Plant

Washington, Aug. 19—(AP)—Robert F. Patterson, acting secretary of war, on orders from President Roosevelt, today directed Major Ralph F. Gow of the Boston Ordnance District to take possession of the plant of the S. A. Woods Machine Company in South Boston, Mass., and operate it for the War Department.

In a statement explaining the action, Patterson said failure of the company's officials to obey a War Board order in a dispute with the company's employees "has created a serious threat to the production of vital war material which it manufactures."

"No company and no labor organization can be permitted to defy the mandate of this impartial tribunal," Patterson asserted. The chief executive signed an executive order at 10:40 a. m., eastern war time, directing government seizure of the plant, after the War Labor Board laid the case before him yesterday for appropriate action.

It was the second time within a week and the seventh time during the current national emergency that the government had exercised its power to take over a private industry.

Last Friday the President ordered the navy to seize the plant of the General Cable Corporation at Bayonne, N. J., after the employees struck in protest against a Labor Board decision against their demands for a wage increase.

(Continued from Page One) prowling the South Atlantic had been sighted near the Brazilian island of Trindade, 1,000 miles off the coast several days ago.

Throughout the country, in fervent demonstrations, Brazilians called upon the government to avenge the affront to Brazil's honor and the apparent loss of several hundred lives, including those of women and children, in the recent wave of ship losses.

Lieut. Col. Joao Pinto Paeca, speaking for War Minister Gen. Eurico Gaspar Dutra, told one crowd here that the country was at the "gates of war" and the army was "ready to obey the order of the chiefs who direct this nation."

Demonstrations against the Axis mounted so dangerously that the police here ordered all bars and cafes closed at 9 p. m. daily and advised residents to be in their homes by 10 p. m.

Official announcements showed only 185 persons known to be saved of the 836 listed as being aboard the five vessels which were sunk. There was a report, however, that several lifeboats with survivors had landed on an isolated beach.

Both President Getulio Vargas and Foreign Minister Oswaldo Aranha violently denounced Axis "placidity" and gave hints that strong measures would be adopted.

"I can assure Brazilians that, forced by the brutality of aggression, we will offer a reaction which will serve as an example to peoples who seek to destroy contemporary civilization," Aranha said.

Newspapers unanimously echoed in the popular cry for revenge. Radio stations scrapped light programs for martial music and almost continuous news announcements. Rio de Janeiro's three gay casinos closed last night in memory of the dead.

Army men, angered by the loss of a number of the 453 soldiers on one of the ships, participated in many of the demonstrations. Round-ups of Axis fifth columnists received new impetus. In the city of Juiz de Fora, about 100 alleged Axis sympathizers were arrested.

The German and Italian ambassadors and some other Axis diplomats still were in the city, two days after their exchange ship had been scheduled to sail. The sailing was cancelled, apparently because of the U-boat attacks.

The new Chilean ambassador to Brazil told a crowd that "Chile stands in solidarity with Brazil and condemns the barbarous aggression Brazil has suffered." Chile and Argentina are the only two American countries still maintaining relations with the Axis.

(Continued from page one) The Office of Price Administration was advised by the committee to devise a consumer rationing plan for use if the allocations system and some readjustments in existing price ceilings on meats failed to accomplish an equitable distribution. Fulmer asserted that despite governmental pleas for bumper crops to furnish food for the United Nations, the war food program is falling down because farmers simply cannot get the labor they need to raise big crops.

He attributes this condition to the draft and the attractive pay offered by industry.

The only solution he could see, he said, was to boost farmers' income to permit the payment of wages that could compete with off-farm pay. To this end, Fulmer said he planned to begin hearings soon on legislation to revise the parity formula designed to give farmers a purchasing power in proportion to that of other groups.

# Degradation Will Follow Axis Victory In The War

## Retired Army Officer Warns That Germany And Japan Would Enslave America

(Colonel, U. S. Army, Retired, in the Los Angeles, Cal., Examiner)  
In order to win this war we must win in terms of what defeat would mean. Therefore, let us realistically envisage what a Hitler-Hirohito new order would mean for America.  
Based on a clear analysis of the pronouncements of Axis leadership and what has happened in every quarter of the globe their armies have conquered, here is what we may reasonably expect in case of Axis victory.

Japan is determined to control the Pacific basin and to do so she must incorporate in her empire the Hawaiian Islands, Alaska, the states of Washington, Oregon, California and Lower California, taken from America, as well as British Columbia. This would include the entire Pacific slope of the North American continent, with the ranges of the Rocky Mountains as her impregnable new frontier.

The remainder of the United States would become a puppet state of the greater German Reich, governed by American-born Quislings, who would receive their orders from Berlin. Many of our heavy industries would be dismantled and their machinery shipped to Germany, the remainder would produce for the fancied needs of the "superior" Germanic race; our oil and our food supplies would be shipped to Germany; our subsistence level would be reduced to the bare necessities of life.

Only officialdom and S. S. troops of the Nazi-American regime would possess automobiles; our technicians would be sent to many parts of the globe to work under German supervision in rebuilding Hitler's new economic order; American families would be uprooted and sent to the steppes of Russia; German families would be transplanted to America and given the homes and farms of those dispossessed.

American labor would be sent to work in German factories, our churches would be closed.  
A gloomy picture, but the half has not been told. Our gold and art treasures would be sent to Germany; our money counterfeited and debased; our political and labor leaders shot or put in concentration camps; our womanhood made the playthings for the Nazi and Japa-

nese overlords.  
Would to God that this picture of what defeat would mean could be seared into the consciousness of every American man, woman and child and then in all its true greatness the souls of America would be reborn. We would cease our petty bickerings; our political subterfuges, our greed and selfishness.

Squabbles about unionizing labor would cease; labor would produce without regard to wages and hours; farmers would forget parity prices; industrialists would forget profits; the public would conserve and save till it hurt; politicians and corrupt labor leaders would be driven into oblivion and only high minded, unselfish, clear thinking men put into office and into directing our war efforts.

The greatest obstacle to victory is the over optimism in all quarters that ultimately we are bound to win. This is a dangerous psychological condition that will lead to defeat unless overcome.

## Dunn Counsel For Newspaper Editor

An imposing array of legal counsel will appear in the hearing of the action of Carroll L. Wilson, district state highway commissioner of Roanoke Rapids, against the Roanoke News Company, publisher of a weekly newspaper at Roanoke Rapids, for \$10,000 damages for alleged libel and defamation of character.  
Judge Albion Dunn of Greenville, E. L. Travis of Halifax, and W. H. Yarbrough of Louisburg, will appear for the defendant, George C. Greene of Weldon, and Allsbrook & Denton of Roanoke Rapids, represent the plaintiff.  
The libel suit was instituted as a result of alleged statements in the Roanoke Rapids News about District Highway Commissioner Carroll L. Wilson allegedly having a road built to the Roanoke river without proper advertising and without ample justification for the road's construction. The bill of complaint alleges that the highway commissioner had built eight tenths of a mile of road and that it would serve no public purpose. It is further alleged that no one lives along the road and that where it terminates at the Roanoke river there is nothing but a cabin privately owned by the highway commissioner. This came out in a story published in the Roanoke Rapids News on July 16.  
Complaint in the libel action was filed in Superior court at Halifax. Answer to the complaint had not been filed today.  
Notice has been served on the defendant to appear before A. L.

## SEEK SUBS IN WEST INDIES

### Torpedoes From Axis U-Boats Explode On Beach

Willemstad, Curacao, Netherland West Indies, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Allied Navy and Army forces started the search for enemy submarines off the south coast of Curacao today after two torpedoes exploded on the beach.

An official announcement said: "Late yesterday afternoon explosions were felt throughout the city of Willemstad and persons on the south shore of Curacao saw water geysers thrown into the air at spots where two enemy torpedoes struck the beach. Appropriate action was taken immediately by naval and military authorities, and within a few minutes depth charges had been dropped in the suspected areas."

Curacao, an oil refining center, is garrisoned by United States forces in cooperation with the Dutch.

The firing of the torpedoes marked the third attack in the West Indies by enemy submarines. On February 16 a submarine shelled oil installations on the island of Aruba, and on April 19 another shelled similar installations at Bullen Bay.

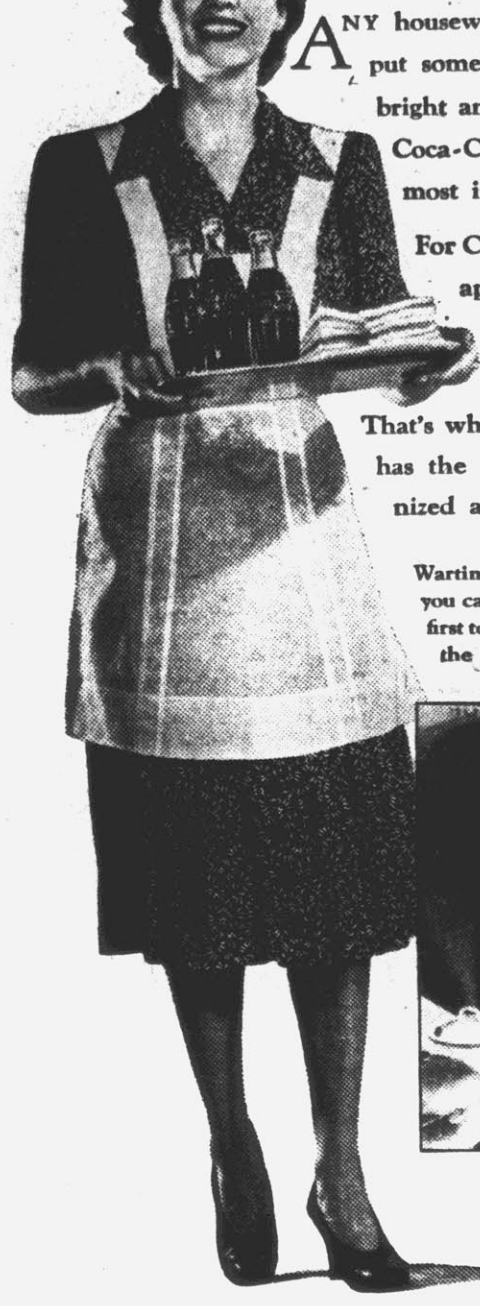

**FORESTALLING TEMPTATION**  
How can we escape the ravages of temptation? The insidious promptings of evil slither into our lives like a poisonous serpent, or he coiled along life's pathway. How can we walk unafraid, knowing ourselves to be immune to such lurking dangers?

If you will watch a bird hopping about over the lawn, searching for worms and grubs, you will notice that fully half his time is spent in looking out for a possible adversary. He bushes himself with devouring his food only for an instant; then he looks all about him to make sure no enemy is near. If there is the suggestion of approaching danger, he leaps upward into the air. He leaves the level of danger and seeks the safety of higher regions.

The suggestion which this scene has for us is twofold. First, we too must be watchful. Also it is always well for us to bear in mind that the best way to elude the enemy of the soul is to leave the ground, as the bird flies up into the air upon the approach of danger. We are saved from assault only by leaving the place and level upon which the temptation is operating.

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### IT'S YOUR WAR, TOO

If we are to lick the Axis and at the same time lick inflation it is necessary that a portion of every pay day envelope be used at this time for the purchase of war stamps and bonds. The money is needed by our government to help pay for implements of war and at the same time removal of this surplus from individual spending will help to cut down the demand for consumer goods, of which there is not enough to go around if everybody attempts to spend to the limit. Be sure that a portion of what you earn goes into war stamps and bonds every pay day.

ers have mushroomed. So have the moonshiners (increased federal taxes on liquor give them a greater margin of profit) but the illicit distillers are running into trouble—priorities—they can't get the sugar and they can't get the cooper and other metals for the stills.

Striking before the war stamp counterfeiters could start trading, the Secret Service seized \$52,500 worth of stamps in New York, sent six men to prison for from 8 to 10 years. Working with Canadian officers, they smashed an international ring of gold thieves and smugglers who in three years had bought "high graded" (stolen) nuggets from Canadian mines and smuggled them into the United States to the tune of \$3,000,000.

Thanks to the Secret Service "Know Your Money" campaign, the first six months of war found it rough going for the counterfeiters, making it less likely that enemy nations can get away here with financing fifth column activities and sabotage with counterfeit money as they did in many of the conquered nations.

The "good neighbor policy" was called into play for the Treasury's greatest counterfeiting haul. Working with Mexican police and with several of its own investigating agencies cooperating, the Treasury captured an internationally known counterfeiter in Mexico City. His plant was complete, agents said, for the manufacture of \$50 and \$100 U. S. notes, as well as Mexican currency.

The Customs Bureau, working with Office of Exports, the Board of Economic Warfare and Treasury's foreign funds control division, blocked numerous attempts to smuggle out of the country industrial diamonds, machine tools, platinum

and other war necessary metals.

Two big narcotic smuggling rings were broken up on the Mexican border—one in California, one in Arizona. Eighteen persons were arrested, eight of them said to be remnants of the old "Dutch" Schultz and "Lucky" Luciano mobs in New York.

The 100 investigators of foreign funds control made 2,000 investigations, the most spectacular of which was the discovery of \$10,000,000 in assets belonging to fugitive Henry Blackmer of Teapot Dome fame.

Internal revenue did its share of "war work," too, obtaining prosecutions in 111 income tax violations and recovering \$38,000,000 for the war chest in taxes and penalties.

that the Nazi defenders of the Dieppe beaches now know at first hand.

Today's obviously is the greatest of all the commando raids, larger in scope and of longer duration than its four predecessors which have harried the invasion coast. The blackclad Britons, Americans and Canadians swarmed ashore with tanks and other fighting equipment heretofore unused in such operations. The Dieppe raid, therefore, takes on the aspect of a full dress rehearsal which may be followed soon by the real thing, the opening of the second front, using all the weapons that will be used on that day—the umbrella of air support overhead, the heavy fighting ships offshore laying down a barrage, the special landing barges disgorging their steel-clad fighting machines on the beaches that once formed one of Europe's gayest playgrounds.

The German radio's description of the raid stresses its scope and boldness of conception. This may betray genuine alarm, may reflect the mounting anxiety with which the Germans doubtless watch their western barricades while trying desperately to finish the war in the east before the blow falls elsewhere. Or it may be merely a build-up for a story of an alleged British failure to be broadcast after the commandos have returned across the channel.

Whatever the outcome of this adventure, it emphasizes again the steady development of a unified, worldwide plan of action to which the United Nations are beginning to fit their conduct of the war. Especially is the pattern of the war against the European end of the Axis becoming more definite. The United Nations still have nothing to match the singleness of direction which Adolf Hitler's great general staff gives to the campaigns in Russia and Africa and the defensive dispositions in western Europe. But Winston Churchill's journeys reveal that something is in the making that ultimately may match the unity that Hitler imposes on his own people and his satellites. The British prime minister, in Washington in June, London in July, Cairo and Moscow in August, has made himself into the most distinguished liaison officer in history, binding together the purposes of the world's greatest powers, helping stiffen the resolve of Russia at one extremity, helping assure at the other that the growing might of the United States will be brought to bear, in the battlefields where it will be most effective.

**Merchant Vessel Sunk**  
Washington, Aug. 18.—(AP)—The Navy announced today that a small British merchant vessel was torpedoed and sunk early in July in the Atlantic off the northern coast of South America. Survivors have landed at a Gulf coast port.

# Cardinals Pushing Closer To National Loop Champs

## HAVE GAINED THREE GAMES IN THREE DAYS

### Brooklyn Has Lost Five Out Of Last Ten

After nearly everybody except their relatives had given them up for lost, the St. Louis Cardinals are threatening at last to make a race out of the National League pennant drive.

They still trail the front-running Brooklyn Dodgers by six and a half lengths, but they have knocked three full games off the Dodger lead in the last three days and apparently have gathered enough steam to make things hot the rest of the way down the stretch.

With Southpaw Max Lanier hurling seven-hit shut-out ball, the Cards ran their latest winning streak to five in a row last night by beating the Chicago Cubs and Claude Passeau, 5-0.

The Dodgers dropped into Philadelphia for a one-night stand and were jolted, 3-1, by the Phils, whom they had expected to roll over and play dead.

That defeat was the second straight for the Brooks, who have lost five of their last ten games. The Cardinals have won ten of their last 12.

While the Dodgers can look for trouble in their remaining six meetings with the Cards, they also have a problem close to home in the surprising New York Giants.

The Giants, in third place and unwilling to vacate without a struggle, have won six and lost eight with the Dodgers and still have 8 more battles scheduled with the flatbush flock.

Carl Hubbell pitched the Giants to a 10-2 triumph over the Boston Braves yesterday, scattering six hits as his boss, Mel Ott, chipped in with his 21st home run and took over the leadership of the league.

It was the sixth straight in the longest Giant winning streak of the year and the eighth in a row for Hubbell, whose victory string is the longest unbroken one among National League pitchers.

In beating Passeau for the first

In the American League, the Boston Red Sox ran their winning streak to five games by edging out the New York Yankees, 8-7 in ten innings.

Johnny Peacock doubled off relief pitcher Johnny Murphy in the tenth and scored the winning run on Dom Dimaggio's outfield fly, handing the veteran Yankee fireman his seventh straight defeat. The loss chopped New York's lead to 11 1/2 games.

Denny Galehouse turned in a 7-hit shutout in a night contest as the St. Louis Browns whipped the Chicago White Sox, 7-0, and climbed to within a single game of the third-place Cleveland Indians, who were idle.

Jack Wade gave the Browns their first hit of the game in the sixth inning but they buried him under a six-run assault in the seventh and continued their 11-hit attack on Joe Haynes.

The Washington Senators came from behind to trip the Philadelphia Athletics, 2-1, in another arc light tilt, with Alex Carrasquel shading Phil Marchildon in a mound duel.

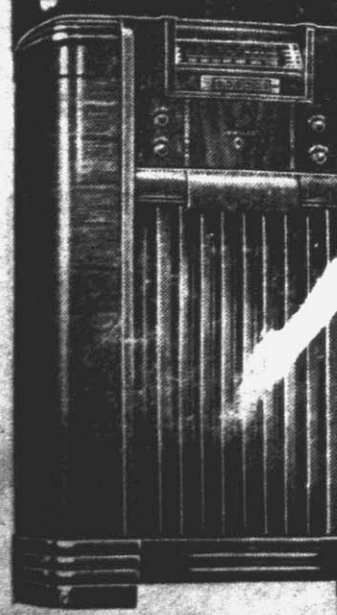

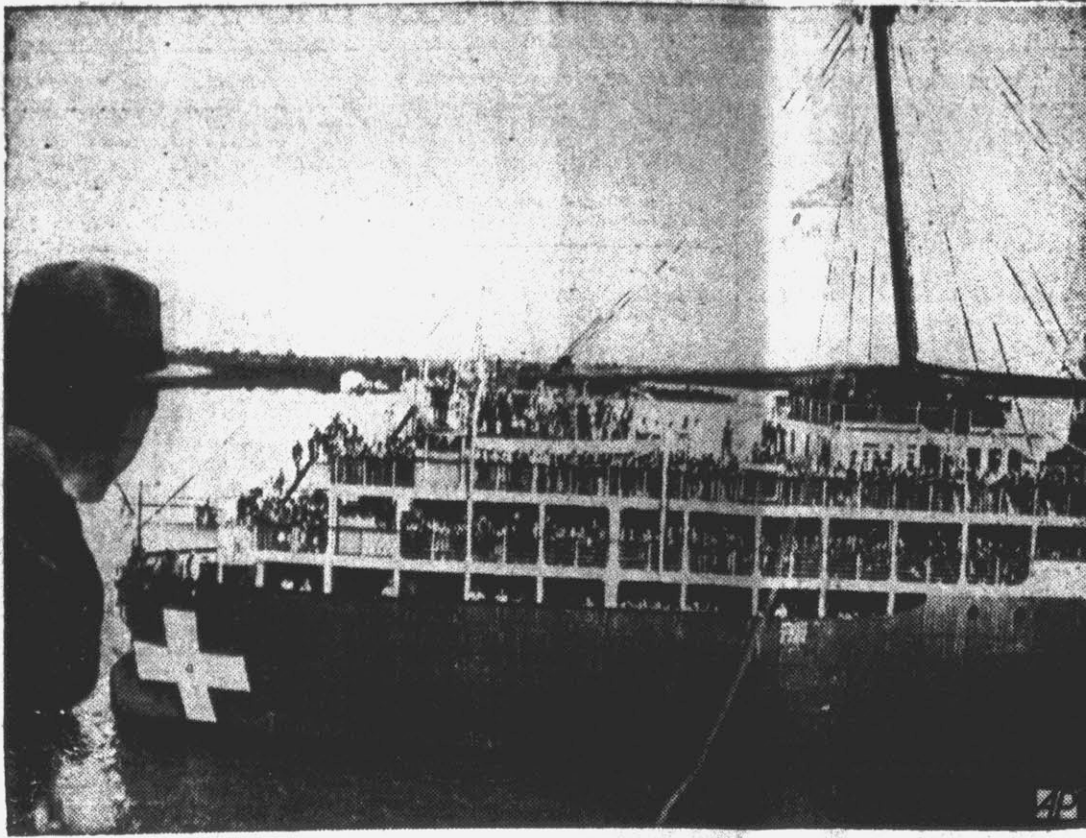

## SABOTEURS TO AID GOVERNMENT

### Spared Nazis Will Help Prosecution Aides

Washington, Aug. 19—(AP)—The two Nazi saboteurs agents who talked themselves out of the death penalty imposed on six companions may talk some more, when the persons accused of aiding them go to trial.

George John Dasch, 39, sentenced to 30 years at hard labor, and Ernest Peter Burger, 36, under life sentence, are being held in the District of Columbia jail, it was learned today, pending final settlement of details which may take them to federal courts in Chicago, New York and Brooklyn.

Attorney General Biddle announced last week that grand juries in three jurisdictions would be asked to indict 12 of the 14 persons arrested as suspected accomplices of the men who came from Germany by submarine with explosives and incendiaries. Indictments charging treason will be sought against more than half of the 12, Biddle said. The two against whom no indictments are sought have been ordered interned as enemy aliens.

The Justice Department declined to say whether custody of Dasch and Burger actually had passed to it from the army, but one official commented that that was a mere technicality.

However informed persons who withheld use of their names said it was unlikely that Dasch and Burger would be taken to prison until their usefulness in prosecution of the alleged accomplices had been exhausted.

When they are no longer needed by government prosecutors, the two men may be taken to Atlanta to

Folkestone, Aug. 19—(AP)—Air activity on a major scale swirled over the English channel this afternoon as German commandos slashed at German ground defenses in the Dieppe region across the channel. Large formations of planes swept across the channel in the direction of Dieppe as the distant roll of gunfire continued.

Dozens of fighters, flying just above the sea, thundered toward Northern France shortly after 11 A.M. and about an hour later another formation of fighters roared over the waves. They were lost to view in mid-channel, still heading for Dieppe.

Other formations of planes were heard operating at a great height over the channel, some going out, others returning.

Visibility improved after noon as a freshening wind blew away the mist. The weather was fine.

3. The arrival in Egypt of new United States contingents, including ground staffs for the American Army Air Forces whose medium and heavy bombers already are in action and whose fighter planes have completed their last desert training.

Although in Alexander the British have picked an advocate of attack and surprise to match with the Axis' wily Field Marshal Erwin Rommel, some of the misgivings arose over the fact that Britain once again had switched middle east commanders.

"The process of selection by trial and error already has proved far too costly," commented the Daily Mail.

One unanswered question was whether Auchinleck had resigned, or was being given another post. No new assignment was announced for him and the war office offered no comment. Some unofficial British sources, however, said it was unlikely that a general of Auchinleck's standing and experience would be sent into retirement.

(Silence concerning the replacement of Middle East commander might mean that the British were keeping the enemy guessing. Auchinleck commanded the forces which took Narvik from the Germans in 1940 but when the Nazis invaded France soon after his arrival in Norway he was ordered back to defend Britain. He later succeeded General Sir Archibald P. Wavell in North Africa and the latest Nazi drive, stalled now at El Alamein was stopped after he had taken personal direction of the Eighth Army in the field.)

Cairo, Aug. 19 (AP)—The first British headquarters—RAF communication since the announcement that Gen. Sir Harold Alexander had succeeded to command of Britain's Middle East forces indicated today that the stalemate still held on the Egyptian front.

It reported only "little air activity" yesterday and minor patrol actions Monday night against Axis scouts and working parties.

in a surprise raid, the Soviet Information Bureau announced at midday.

Defenders of the Krasnodar region of the western Caucasus, counter-attacking at intervals, routed a German infantry regiment and destroyed many trucks and seven German tanks, the bureau said.

While the Germans gained in a Don bend sector, three vain attacks were cited in which they lost four tanks and more than 300 men. More than 100 German automatic riflemen were reported slain on the approaches to a village.

Southwest of Stalingrad, Red army patrols were active overnight and one was credited with the destruction of seven Nazi supply trucks, a searchlight installation and two anti-aircraft guns behind the German lines.

Fighting flamed again on the Bryansk front southwest of Moscow, the Information Bureau said. A Soviet artillery battery repulsed eight attacks, wiped out a river crossing and killed at least 500 Germans.

Midnight reports indicated a resurgence of Nazi effort along both arms of a pincer groping toward Stalingrad and the Volga, while the Red army counter-attacked in the Krasnodar sector and stood off assaults in the Pyatigorsk area of the Caucasus.

Already wedged into Russian positions in one sector of the Don bend front, the Germans massed large formations to strike elsewhere southeast of Kletskaya and forced a Russian unit to retreat, the Soviet Information Bureau said.

"After a sanguinary battle during which our troops destroyed 10 German tanks and about 800 Hitlerites, our troops retired to new defensive positions," it said.

Coupled with the announcement of these developments less than 80 miles northwest of Stalingrad was a statement that German and Rumanian forces—reported yesterday to have been driven back several miles in an action above Kitenikowski, itself 95 miles southwest of
