

Russians Beat Off Four Nazi Attacks

Nazis Capture Two Streets in Stalingrad At Cost Of 2,000 Dead; New Drive In Kalymyck Area Indicates Nazis Trying To Cut Red Army in Two

Soviet headquarters reported today that Russian troops had broken into German trenches northwest of Stalingrad and beat off four night attacks inside the Volga metropolis, while the Nazis captured two streets of an industrial suburb at a sacrifice of 2,000 dead.

For the first time since the siege began, Adolf Hitler's field headquarters omitted any mention of the gigantic battle for Stalingrad.

Soviet reports said German invasion columns sweeping south of Stalingrad had advanced into the U. S. R. autonomous area of Kalymyck, which lies along the lower Volga to the Caspian Sea. (The Germans long ago claimed they had captured Elstka, a major city of the Kalymyck area, about 180 miles west of the big Caspian Sea port of Astrakhan.)

It was not immediately clear whether this meant that the Nazis, disheartened by the slaughter and lack of success at Stalingrad, were now turning south.

Latest reports said the fighting at Stalingrad was still intense.

Dispatches said the violence of the 46-day-old German assault was rising, despite a Nazi broadcast last night indicating that Axis shock troops would be withdrawn and that the city would be pounded into surrender by heavy siege guns and dive bombers.

The fight for Stalingrad has changed, the broadcast said, quoting German military quarters.

Several versions of the Berlin broadcast were heard by Allied listening posts, all hinting that the battered siege armies would be withdrawn to a safe distance.

"The strategic objective at Stalingrad has already been achieved," one version declared.

"It is no longer necessary to send German infantry and assault engineers into the battle.... the finishing touches will now be entrusted to heavy artillery and Stukas."

But Soviet accounts declared the Germans were intensifying efforts to blast through Stalingrad's defenses to the Volga.

The last 10 or 12 weeks have been a period of retreat for the Japanese. On three major fronts they have yielded ground, much of it won at high cost in men and weapons. On the others, they have given no

convincing signs of new advances in preparation. It would be easy, thinking wishfully, to suggest that the tide of Japanese conquest that spread so rapidly and disastrously for the United Nations throughout the first half of the Pacific war has begun its ebb. But wishful thinking is always dangerous and there are indications the enemy is doing what he can to encourage us in that weakening opinion. We will be wise to examine with all possible skepticism those hints issued by

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U. S. Bombers In Heaviest Raid Of War On France

Fliers Blast Japs In The Aleutians

Fifteen Tons Of Bombs Dropped On Base at Kiska; Navy Announces The Loss Of Coast Guard Cutter

Washington, Oct. 9.—(AP)—The navy announced today that army bombers, continuing their steady pounding of Japanese in the Aleutian islands, had dropped 15 tons of bombs on the enemy base at Kiska last Tuesday, starting fires in the camp area, damaging a cargo ship in harbor and strafing the radio station.

This information was given in navy communique No. 145, which also disclosed the loss in the Atlantic of the U. S. Coast Guard cutter Muskeget, the former S. S. Cornish of the Eastern Steamship Lines.

The 1,827-ton steam vessel had been overdue "for some time and must be presumed to be lost," the navy said. Loss of the entire personnel—the Muskeget had a normal complement of about 100 officers and men—also was presumed.

Text of the communique: (about 130). "North Pacific: "On October 6, army 'Liberator' bombers, escorted by 'Alcobra' and 'Lightning' fighters, dropped approximately seven tons of bombs on the area surrounding the sea-plane hangar at Kiska. Eight more tons were dropped on the camp area and fires were started.

"Two cargo ships in the harbor were attacked and one was left on fire and sinking. The radio station was damaged by strafing. One sea-plane was destroyed on the water and another was damaged.

"Reconnaissance over Attu and Agattu on the same date failed to reveal any enemy activity on these islands.

"Atlantic: "The U. S. Coast Guard cutter Muskeget, formerly the S. S. Cornish, of the Eastern Steamship Lines, has been overdue in the Atlantic for some time and must be presumed to be lost.

"The next of kin of the personnel of the Muskeget have been notified.

Schools Do Good Job Cotton Fields

The trustees, principals, teachers and students at the Pitt County schools are manifesting a spirit of patriotism that deserves recognition.

Dr. H. Conley, superintendent of county schools, said today before he went to the Chocoma School for some intensive work and conferences.

"Teachers and students at all of the schools have indicated a willingness to cooperate with farmers in harvesting the cotton and other crops while the good weather prevails. The white and colored schools are doing their part. The County Board of Education at a recent meeting left the matter up to the trustees and principals of the various schools of helping harvest the crops. Some of the schools are closing early to permit the cotton pickers to get in some good work while the sun shines," Conley said.

Reports from other parts of the state indicate that county schools in some sections are closing early to help harvest crops. Public sentiment appears to be against the schools closing for a stated time.

"The bulk of the tobacco crop has been sold, and this will release many farm workers for cotton picking and peanut harvesting," a leading farmer and school official told a Daily Reflector reporter today.

Manpower Draft Bill Introduced In Senate

Washington, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Describing the manpower problem as the most serious question confronting the nation, Senator Taft (R-Ohio) today introduced a bill to create a new Office of Manpower director, with overall authority over recruiting personnel for the armed forces, agriculture, industry and essential civilian occupations.

"It is based on the idea of voluntary recruitment," Taft explained in a statement accompanying his bill. "I do not believe that the time has yet come when we can adopt a system of forced labor in the factories and on the farms."

He proposed abolition of the present War Manpower Commission, and transfer of the whole selective service system and the United States employment service to the new agency.

Earlier 15 farm-state senators petitioned Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey to freeze dairy and livestock workers on the farms for the next three months to prevent "irreparable injury" to food production while a general manpower control program is worked out.

"We are convinced action to halt the drain of manpower from farms cannot be delayed longer without impairing the war effort," they declared in a letter circulated by Senators Ball (R-Minn.) and Brown (D-Mich.).

More Than 100 American Bombers Accompanied by American and Canadian Fighters Aid RAF Bombers And Fighters Blasted Industrial Region Northern France Today

London, Oct. 9.—(AP)—More than 100 United States bombers attacked the industrial Lille region of northern France today in the biggest American bomber and fighter force ever to take the air in the European war theater.

United States Army Air Force headquarters, promising a more detailed announcement later, issued this terse communique.

"More than 100 U. S. A. F. bombers attacked targets in the Lille area this morning.

"Many squadrons of fighters took part in this operation."

A big part of the bombing force, an extraordinary number for a daylight raid, was made up of great, four-motored Flying Fortresses, and the Americans were joined in the assault by the RAF and many squadrons of Allied fighters.

United States fighter planes participated in the raid.

(Until now, the only fighter planes the Americans had been mentioned officially as using in Britain was the British-made Spitfire.)

Single planes of the RAF Bomber Command, striking at Germany

London, Oct. 9.—(AP)—More than 100 United States four-motored bombers—Flying Fortresses and Liberators—joined the RAF Bomber Command in attacking the Lille industrial region of northern France today and shot down five enemy planes.

Four of the U. S. bombers were lost but the crew of one was rescued in the biggest rescue operation in the European theater, United States Army headquarters announced.

Focus of the attack was the Five-Lille steel and locomotive works.

Fliers of the high-altitude bombers said they could see many bursts on the target and a huge spot of flame and smoke rising from it as they wheeled away.

In broad open daylight, bombed objectives in the upper Rhineland this morning, the Air Ministry announced.

"This morning single aircraft of the Bomber Command, one of which is missing, bombed objectives in the upper Rhineland," said a communique.

"Yesterday afternoon Beaufighters of the Coastal Command destroyed one Junkers-88 over the Bay of Biscay."

The fortress bombers and escorting fighters—many of which were Spitfires and Hurricanes flown by United States pilots—roared out to what was believed to have been the largest daylight operation of its kind in the war.

Information For Fuel Oil Users

The State OPA has announced 3 steps which every fuel oil consumer should take to assure receipt of a fuel oil ration book.

The steps are: If you did not have an inventory of the fuel oil in your storage tank taken October 1, do so now. Estimate your inventory on October 1 from the present reading. This information will be required on a fuel oil ration application form which must be filled out and ready to turn in when you register.

The second step is to secure a certification of your last year's purchases of fuel oil from your local dealer. If you have in the past obtained fuel oil from a regular dealer, he will probably mail to you your application with a certification of purchases from October 1 of last year. Applicants may also be obtained at the local office of the Pitt County War Price and Rationing Board after October 15.

The third step is to measure the floor area of each room in your house to be heated. Do not include recreation room, closets, halls, basements, garages, or porches. Room area figure will be required on your fuel oil ration application.

All fuel oil and kerosene has been on a coupon basis since October 1. Dealers should require signed statements from consumers promising to redeem statements with coupons totaling amounts of purchases when coupon books are received.

SEEK NATIONAL LOTTERY PLAN

Sponsors Would Use Plan To Finance The War

By WILLIAM F. ARBOGAST
Washington, Oct. 9 (AP)—Based on the contention that a nation that uses a lottery to draft its men for war shouldn't object to the same method for helping to finance it, a drive for national lottery law was under way today on Capitol Hill.

Representatives Knutson (R-Minn.) and Sabath (D-Ill.), authors of legislation to raise money through government-sponsored lotteries, said need for revenue had revived chances of favorable consideration for their bills.

Knutson said he would press for inclusion of his proposal in any new tax bill the Treasury Department requests. Secretary Morgenthau has indicated he would ask congress to raise an additional \$6,000,000,000 as soon as the present bill is disposed of.

"It's either a sales tax or a lottery," said Knutson, adding he believed the people would prefer the lottery. A lottery, he said, would raise just as much money and give taxpayers a chance to get some back.

Knutson estimated his plan would yield around \$1,000,000,000 a year. The proceeds would be used to help finance the war. After the war, they would be used to increase old-age pension payments.

There would be more than 140,000 monthly winners under the Knutson system, the prizes being distributed as follows for each \$100,000,000 of gross receipts: First prize, \$100,000; four \$50,000 prizes, eight \$25,000 awards, fifty \$10,000 prizes, one hundred \$5,000 returns, 1,000 awards of \$1,000 each; 10,000 of \$500 each; 30,000 of \$250 each, and 100,000 of \$100 each.

There would be more winners under the proposal offered by Sabath. For every billion \$1 tickets sold, there would be 2,223,832 winning tickets. They would split \$125,000,000 in cash and \$250,000,000 in 20-year war loan certificates.

Top prize under the Sabath plan would be \$62,500. The highest certificate award would be \$125,000. Everyone who bought a ticket would get something back, one-eighth of the gross amount of the sales being distributed among holders of non-winning tickets in the form of loan certificates.

Naula, Vera Cruz State, Mexico, Oct. 9 (AP)—President Manuel Avila Camacho predicted today the war would end in victory for the United Nations early in 1944.

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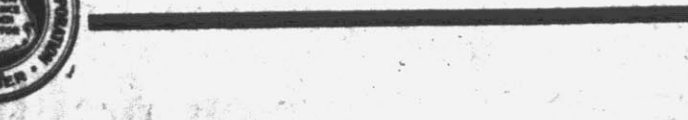

Washington—When Congress gets around to voting medals for this war, it ought to give one out for one of its own—Senator Prentiss M. Brown of St. Ignace, Mich. Senator Brown, turning his back

on personal interests—perhaps his very political future—picked up the administration's sword and carried it through what threatened to be the most bitter legislative fight since World War II started. Sen. Brown was author and sponsor of the administration-approved anti-inflation bill.

It was filled with political dynamite. It drew the fire of the powerful farm bloc, of which Senator Brown ordinarily is a member, and in which are many of his closest friends and associates. At its inception, there was no way of telling what repercussions it would have among the farm votes.

And Senator Brown, from the farm section of Michigan, the peninsula country, is facing reelection in November. His Republican opposition is Detroit's popular crusader against the rackets, Homer Ferguson. Senator Brown will need every farm vote he can get if he is to win. If he gave his personal interests a thought, it was not apparent in what he did or in what he said. He brought the administration anti-inflation bill to the floor of the Senate. And he opened the debate on it in one of the most sincere and moving speeches that has been made in the Capitol chambers in months.

That Senator Brown knew what he was doing was apparent only in his solemn intensity throughout that speech. He faced the snarls of his friends. He pleaded in an atmosphere of tension that he could not help but feel. He took his colleagues by the collar and shook

them and begged them to see the light.

It is said that no congressman's vote is ever changed by a speech. That is probably true. The legislative machinery just doesn't work that way. But the spadework that Senator Brown did in that address undoubtedly bore some fruit in the 80-60 vote by which the bill was finally passed.

In that long Thursday afternoon session, Brown didn't smile once. Even after adjournment, his face was clouded until in the halls a weather-beaten man walked up to him and grasped his hand. "Senator, I'm a farmer, an Indiana corn and hog farmer, and by God I'm for you." It was then that Brown smiled.

Brown came to the Senate in 1936. He had served two terms in the House, before he ran for the Senate. He had been the Mackinac county prosecutor for 12 years. He had interests in banking and lake shipping.

Both in the House and Senate, he has been a quiet, genial fellow, given to hard work (he's a member of the committee and chairman of the committee on claims).

The anti-inflation measure is undoubtedly the most important piece of legislation he has sponsored. His handling of it proved his years here haven't been wasted.

Doctor Goebbels' propaganda machine that the attempt to take Stalingrad is about to be abandoned.

The evidence is that the Japanese have abandoned two of the three far western Aleutian islands they seized last June as a sideshow to their disastrous dash across the international dateline toward Midway and Hawaii. Our fliers report no signs of life on Attu and Agattu; it appears that only on Kiska a battered Japanese garrison is trying to dig itself underground in the hopes of remaining and justifying the Tokyo government's boast its forces hold North American territory.

In China, still the main battleground for the Japanese, conquests have evaporated. There probably is some justification for Tokyo's claim that the retreats in China were according to plan and to permit new dispositions of Japanese forces, but the fact remains that territory and railway lines won at the cost of thousands of casualties and months of valuable time have been yielded to the Chinese and their American allies.

Something like 30,000 square miles overrun by the Japanese in northern Kiangsi, western and southern Chekiang and southern Kwangtung provinces early in the summer have been recaptured by the Chinese. At the southern extremity of the Pacific front, U. S. Marines have slashed into the farthest fringes of the Japanese area of conquest and wrested from the Japs in the Solomons beachheads and islets tiny in extent but of importance strategically. In New Guinea, the Australians, commanded by MacArthur and supported by American air forces, have compelled the invaders to abandon gains south of the Owen Stanley mountains and turned their landing at Milne Bay into a fiasco. Against these setbacks in the active war zones Japan has no offsetting gains in other theaters. If we assume time fights against her, her enemies have gained valuable months.

Since Midway the Japanese fleet, so far as we know, has not ventured from its western Pacific bases. Japanese armies that marched through Burma to the borders of India have been quiescent for months, while

six months ago the Japanese threat to India was accounted one of the gravest dangers to the United Nations, now there is growing discussion of the prospects of an Allied drive into Burma to reopen the main avenue of aid to China.

On the Siberian frontier, not yet a battlefield but an area never neglected in calculations of the high commands, there has been no evidence of change and many strategists believe danger of Japanese invasion of Russia is on the wane, especially since Hitler ran into that stone wall at Stalingrad.

Thus the picture is one of a predatory power turned from conquest to defense, in which the objective is to hold what has been snatched rather than reach out for more. It seems well that the record will show the late summer of 1942 to have been the turning point as far as Japan is concerned.

It is possible that history will allot to the Marines at Guadalcanal a niche comparable to that of the Marines at Belleau Wood—a few heroic men who formed the vanguard that turned back a tide of military success at its flood. But it would be dangerous to assume the Japanese will be a less formidable enemy than hitherto. Most authorities agree he will fight as fanatically to hold the spots he has taken for his emperor as he fought to win them and that destruction of the Japanese military machine may well prove the most costly of all tasks confronting the United Nations.

per, said masses of infantry led by 30 tanks finally achieved a break through Soviet lines in a workers' settlement and occupied two streets. Red Star said the Nazis were trying to break through to the Volga and cut the Red army in two, but declared the defenders were battling valiantly.

Describing the fight nearer the heart of the city, Red army headquarters announced: "Soviet troops repulsed four enemy attacks, destroyed two tanks and wiped out about a company of German infantry."

On the salient northwest of Stalingrad, where Marshal Timoshenko's relief offensive has been striking along a 40-mile front between the Volga and the Don rivers, the Russians announced a fresh penetration of Nazi fortifications.

"One detachment broke into enemy trenches, killed about 100 Germans in hand-to-hand fighting, and captured four machine-guns, three mortars and an anti-tank gun," the Soviet command said.

Soviet dispatches pictured the city as an inferno of flame and smoke, but indicated that the Nazis were still far from fulfilling Hitler's boast the metropolis was doomed.

Warns Londoners.

London, Oct. 9 (AP)—A warning that London may undergo bombings which would make the terrible assaults of April 16 and May 10, 1941, seem "mere picnics" was given today by Sir Ernest Gowers, London regional commissioner at the presentation of awards in civil defense rescue service competition.

A British Post, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Eleven hundred and eight repatriated Britons, including Sir Robert Leslie Craigie, British ambassador to Tokyo when Japan opened her war against Britain and the United States, arrived here today from Japan and China in two steamships.

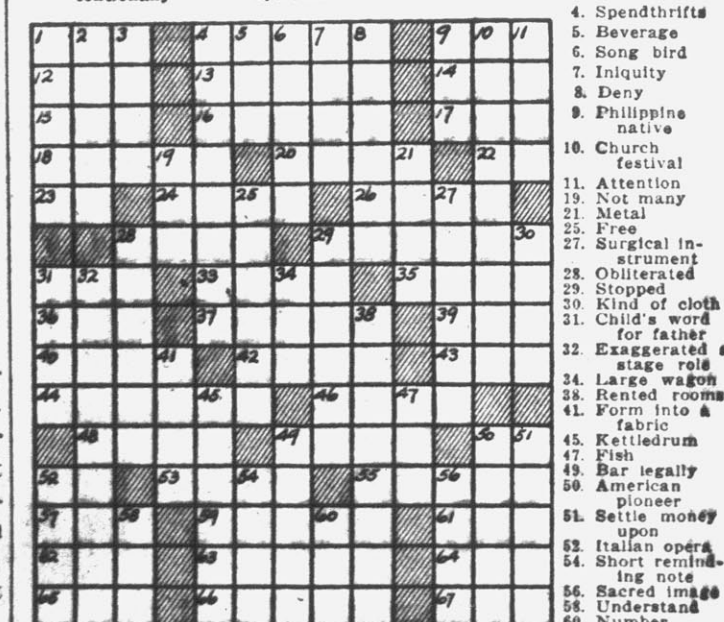

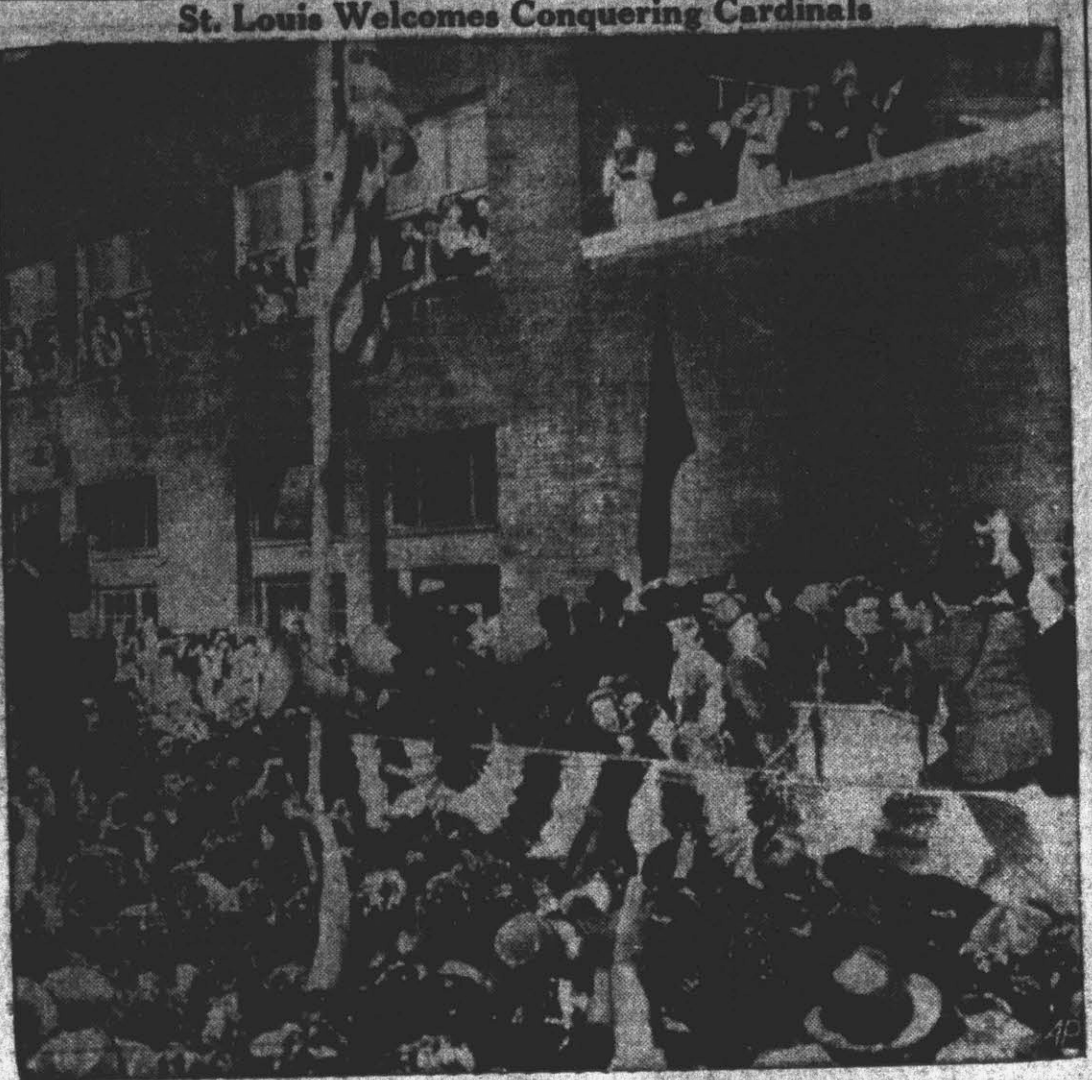

AIRMEN BLAST JAPS IN BURMA

Railroads, Bridges And Barracks Destroyed

New Delhi, India, Oct. 9 (AP)—AEP bombers destroyed a bridge to cut a Burmese railway last week-end and attacked barracks, river craft and other military facilities of the Japanese in Northern Burma and the adjoining Chinese province of Yunnan, a U. S. Army Air Force communiqué said today. Explosive loosed from a low level by India-based planes were reported to have completely shattered the bridge, south of Mogaung on a line that terminates at Myitkyina. "In addition to destruction of the bridges," the communiqué said, "a number of railroad cars and 600 feet of track were damaged." Japanese barracks southeast of Loiwing, Yunnan province city which was once the site of a Chinese aircraft factory, and the invaders' landing field at Loiwing were among other targets of the offensive. Seven direct hits were declared scored on the airfield runway. Two attacks were made on a large suspension bridge across a Yunnan province gorge 10 miles south of Tengkia, but it was reported that they "failed to destroy the objective." A transport plane of the Indo-China Ferry Command, which flies supplies to China over the mountains of India and northern Burma, was listed as missing with its crew. "Indications are that its loss was due to extremely bad weather and not to enemy action" the bulletin said.

Drunk Must Gather Scrap Or Go To Jail

In Recorder's Court today when Jasper Oakley, white, was found guilty of being drunk and an habitual offender in the court, Judge J. W. H. Roberts sentenced him to 30 days on the roads, sentence to be suspended provided Oakley reports to the court on October 23 and prove that he has collected 500 or more pounds of scrap metal or rubber for the community salvage pile. WAR RUMORS HELPING AXIS

Says Americans Giving Hitler Free Propaganda

Boston, Oct. 9 (AP)—A "flood of vicious rumors" is circulating throughout the United States and aiding the Axis, Robert H. Knapp of the propaganda research division, Massachusetts committee on public safety, reported today.

A nation-wide analysis of false stories heard in cocktail lounges, across bars, in barber shops and over back fences, he said, showed that:

"The most effective propaganda that Hitler has in America today is getting free. "It is the flood of rumors which are being spread by Americans, rumors directed against our Allies, our government, and minorities in our country."

He said the commonest types were:

- "Anti-administration, 21.3 per cent; anti-Army and Navy, 19.4; anti-semitic, 9.3; fear rumors, Army and Navy, 7.9; anti-British, 7.3; fifth column rumors, 6.9; unrevealed enemy action, 5.7; atrocity stories, 4.1; anti-Negro, 3.1; anti-busines, 2.3; anti-Red Cross, 2.2; "Pipedreams," 2.0; anti-labor, 1.9; "Anti-Russian rumors constitute 0.6 per cent of all rumors, a surprisingly low figure," he added.

Japs Come . . .

On the basis of the navy's last report on Guadalcanal operations, naval and military circles still expected the Japanese would attempt again to recapture the airbase taken by the Marines more than two months ago. In New Guinea, Australian ground forces worked their way without opposition to the Owen Stanley mountain passage, doorway from Japanese bases on the north shore of the island to the Allied base of Port Moresby to the south. Australian protection of the pass freed Allied air forces to attack an enemy ship at Koepang in Dutch Timor opposite northwestern Australia and a Japanese transport at Salumaki. Japanese-held areas at Kokoda and Buna in New Guinea also were strafed and bombed. Growing cooperation of the Allied forces in the battle of the Pacific was indicated by announcement of Navy Minister Angus MacDonald in Ottawa last night that five Canadian warships had aided the United States forces in occupying the Andromeda group of islands in the Aleutians.

Observers on the coast—who saw sky-filling squadrons over a wide area—reported that one bomber force alone numbered more than 100 planes. A bright sun shone and visibility was excellent over the Dover straits as the United Nations planes shuttled to and fro throughout the morning. The operation was first observed early when squadrons of Spitfires returned from the direction of Calais and Cape Gris Nez on the French side. Large formations of fighters soon were fanning out toward the French and Belgian coasts. The largest formation of United States bombers yet seen in Britain, with a big escort of Spitfires and Hurricanes, dived over the channel past Ramsgate. Still later, glistering United States fighters, dived back from the direction of Dieppe, dived out of the sun toward Folkestone. Canadian fighter squadrons were understood to have formed a part of the fortress' convoy.

Expecting Frost.

Farmers and others may expect frost any night now, since cockle-burs are full grown and ripe, a farmer who is something of a weather prognosticator, said today. Frost never hurts the cocklebur crop—it grows on and on to bother farmers in the fields until they have harvested their crops and are through, he said.

Berlin, (From German Broadcasts), Oct. 9.—(AP)—An Istanbul dispatch reported today the arrival of Franz Von Papen, German ambassador to Turkey, after 20 days' absence from the country. Von Papen has been in Hungary.

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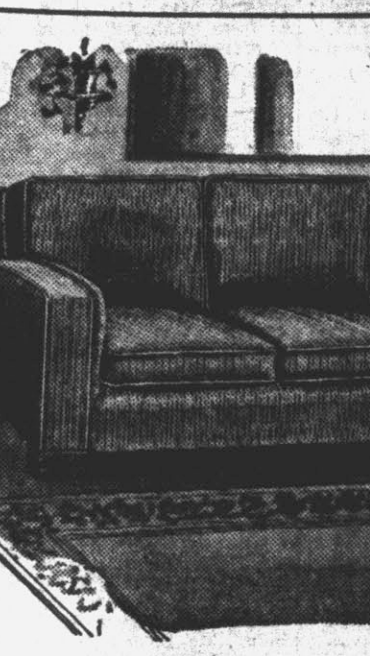
