

Marines Repulse Second Attack By Japanese On Flank In The Solomons

Steady Bombing Of Jap Fleet Throws Invasion Plans Off Schedule; 12 Planes Downed; Nine Destroyers, Four Cruisers, Six Transports Sunk or Damaged

Washington, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The Marines on Guadalcanal have repulsed a second small attack by the Japanese on their western flank and have destroyed at least 12 enemy planes in recent days, the Navy announced today.

Persistent Allied air bombardment of a large Japanese war fleet in the southwestern Pacific appeared today to have thrown a long expected Japanese invasion thrust off schedule while giving Americans valuable time to bolster their forces in the Solomons.

Rendezvousing in the northern Solomons about 10 days ago, the enemy warships and transports have been the target for an almost constant rain of Allied aerial bombs as they waited the word to move toward the prized American-held air base on Guadalcanal Island.

The latest attack on the enemy's ship concentration came last night (Australian time) when Allied bombers under Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Australian command dumped 10 tons of explosives on Japanese vessels at Buin, at the southern tip of Bougainville Island.

The nocturnal raid drew strong anti-aircraft fire but all the planes found their targets, MacArthur's command reported, and returned safely to their bases.

Meantime, the Navy disclosed that Japanese troops in the heavy jungle on northern Guadalcanal had attempted to break through the American positions on Oct. 20. The "feeler" was repulsed and the Navy said yesterday there was no "material change in the military situation" there.

An enemy bomber, believed to have been on a reconnaissance mission over the island, was brought down by anti-aircraft fire. United States aircraft continued to seek out and bomb Japanese troops and supply concentrations on Guadalcanal.

The Allies' attacks on the enemy fleet in the Solomons were regarded as emphasizing Secretary of War Stimson's assertion yesterday that the forces of MacArthur and Vice Admiral Robert A. Hornsby, commander in the Solomons, were working in the closest possible cooperation.

Since the heavy Japanese naval concentrations were first observed in the islands a major enemy effort to recapture the air field, seized by (Continued on Page Six)

Ronald Slay, in a recent letter to Prof. and Mrs. A. D. Frank, spoke of such a meeting, saying: "I ran across a boy named Amintano the other day who said he knew you. I think he roomed there a few weeks-end. He was on the line with an automatic rifle across his lap and a drawing board on his knee, drawing pictures as though he were in the Catskill mountains. He's still all right and doing fine. He asked to be remembered to you people."

BRITISH DRIVE IS EXPECTED

British Battle Squadron In Indian Ocean

London, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The presence of a powerful British battle squadron in the Indian ocean, including at least three battleships and the aircraft carrier Illustrious, was disclosed authoritatively today—a sequel to General Sir Archibald P. Wavell's declaration that Burma must be retaken from the Japanese.

The squadron was said to consist of the battleship Warspite, Royal Sovereign and Resolution, presumably in addition to a large force of cruisers and destroyers, all under the command of Admiral Sir James Somerville.

The illustrious one of the most famous ships in the British Navy, is a veteran of many Mediterranean battles and last was reported in a northern British port in April.

Possibility of an Allied drive to throw the Japanese out of Burma has been brought to the fore by current conferences in India among General Wavell, Commander-in-Chief of the British forces there; General Sir Claude Auchinleck, former commander in the middle East who is stillwell, chief of staff of Allied forces in China.

These meetings followed upon a recent inspection tour of the Burma-India frontier by General Wavell and increased aerial reconnaissance along the frontier following the end of the monsoon season.

Wavell has stressed time and again that ever since the Allies were driven from Burma he has been concentrating on regaining that segment of the British empire and the reopening of the Burma road supply line to China.

Stillwell, who bluntly acknowledged that "we took a hell of a beating in Burma," also has asserted that the lost territory could and would be retaken.

Another Relic Goes For Scrap

Washington, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The foretop of the battleship Maine, long displayed as an historic relic at Annapolis, is going on the scrap heap.

The navy announced today that trophies and relics of five wars would be collected at the naval academy to be sold and melted down to provide weapons for the war as part of the nationwide scrap salvage campaign.

In addition to the Maine's foretop, the historic trophies being scrapped include a British twenty-four pounder gun from a ship captured by Commodore Thomas MacDonough at the battle of Lake Champlain, two torpedoes from the German gunboat Geier, the first German ship interned by the United States in the First World War, the searchlight and gun taken from Spanish cruisers in 1898; and 242 engraved brass destroyer nameplates.

The Navy said the Academy scrap collection was expected to yield 462,000 pounds of iron and steel and 41,000 pounds of brass and bronze.

To Hold First Aid Classes For Firemen

A Red Cross class in first aid will begin at the Greenville Fire Department tonight at 7:45. A certified Red Cross instructor will teach.

Classes will be held on Fridays and Mondays for civilian defense auxiliary firemen and those who wish to volunteer in the auxiliary fire corps, Chief George Gardner announced.

A ruling by the State Civilian Defense Council requires all civilian defense workers to take the course in first aid in order that they might save a life or help the sick and injured in any war time emergency.

Coffee Rationing May Begin By End Of Year

New York, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The widespread coffee scarcity had processors hunting today for substitutes with almost the same of a household hunting the stores for a pound of coffee.

You may be asked to mix a little toasted bran with your coffee to make it go farther, but roasters hope it won't be necessary.

They're trying to find a good substitute, or "extender," just in case.

CIVIL COURT HERE MONDAY

Fourteen Divorce Cases Set; Jury List Announced

When Judge W. C. (Buck) Harris of Raleigh convenes a week's civil term of Superior Court here next Monday morning at 10 o'clock he will be confronted with 14 petitions for divorce.

It is singularly interesting to report that of the 14 petitioners for divorce at this term of court in Greenville ten of them are husbands and only four are wives. Until about a year ago the general rule of divorces under the two-year separation law were applied for by wives.

Husbands now predominate among the petitioners for divorces granted in court here during this year, the record shows. Charges of infidelity etc., are seldom used in suits for divorce. The granting of a divorce by a jury in "the old days," as a local attorney said to a reporter today, was something of a sensation and a scandal. There were not so many aggrieved parties to marital contracts then who were willing to wait five years for a divorce.

"Times have changed and so have the people," said "Judge" Frank Harrington, who has been clerk of the Superior Court many years.

Nazis Suffer Losses In Russia As Winter Begins

Red Positions At Stalingrad Reported Strengthened

On the Soviet front today Adolf Hitler's armies suffered jarring new setbacks in the 60-day-old siege of Stalingrad as the Russians announced they had broken up a tanked Nazi assault in a northwest factory district, captured a major position in the Don-Volga corridor and seized the initiative inside the city.

It was the fourth day since the last Soviet retreat. German field headquarters acknowledged that the Red armies were counterattacking at Stalingrad and sought to distract attention from that bloody graveyard of Nazi battle in the same general vicinity, southeast of Novorossiisk, and killed 150 others in the successful defense of a height.

The Russians further reported they had smashed a Nazi wedge which briefly imperiled their first-line defenses in the Mosdok sector gateway to the Grozny oil fields, in the central Caucasus.

By all accounts, the picture was brightening rapidly for the defenders of Stalingrad as winter's first snowstorm swirled across the steppes.

The WAR TODAY

London, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Sir Stafford Cripps, leader of the House of Commons and member of the War Cabinet who last spring made an ineffectual attempt to persuade Indian factions to accept the British government's offer of dominion status, has given me an interview turning new light on this dispute which involves the independence of close to 400,000,000 people.

Sir Stafford says the key to the situation is Mohandas K. Gandhi's persistent support of the policy of non-violence.

The point made is that it is impossible for Gandhi's personal adherents to participate in any government, no matter what its nature, which wages war. This England, which is in the midst of a life and death struggle, is asked to countenance an Indian government that not only would not fight, but might even insist on making peace with Britain's enemies.

"I don't believe that Gandhi, who wasn't present when the decision was taken, was personally responsible for the rejection of the government's proposal," Sir Stafford added.

URGES ACTION ON DRAFT BILL

President Asks That No Restrictions Be Included

Washington, Oct. 23.—(AP)—President Roosevelt urged today Senate approval of pending legislation to draft 18 and 19 year old men without any restrictive amendments.

In a letter read on the floor by Senator Gurney (R-S.D.) author of the selective service bill, the President said that complicated administrative duties involved in the handling of a large number of men in the army made it imperative that no restrictions be placed on the use of the youthful draftees after they were inducted.

Gurney read the President's letter while the Senate was considering an amendment proposed by Senator Norris (Ind-Neb.) which would require that selectees under 19 years old be granted a year's furlough before they were sent into combat.

Sen. Johnson (R-Calif.) told his colleagues today he was opposed to "calling of children to fight our battles" in the first open Senate opposition to legislation for drafting 18 and 19-year-olds.

The white-haired Californian, a pre-war, Huxford, opponent of the administration's foreign policies, declared that passage of the legislation meant that many children were going to be sent to death in foreign parts of the world.

Asserting that no man wanted more to win the war than he, Johnson said he could not stand idly by and see a generation decimated. He had no doubt, he said, that the 18 and 19 year olds were ready to fight.

Hevin, gently nudged aside the prohibition issue, administration leaders trained their fire today on a series of other amendments that threatened to delay enactment of the lower draft age bill.

Chief among these was a demand that 18 and 19 year olds men be kept out of combat troops until they had undergone six months or a year's military training.

The wet-dry issue evaporated for the time being yesterday when the Senate voted 49 to 25 to send back to its military committee an amendment by Senator Lee (D-Ola.) which would have banned the sale of alcoholic drinks from military areas.

Lee, 50 year old ordained Baptist minister once known as the "boy orator" from Oklahoma, was dismissed. (Continued on Page Two)

Says Better Implements Of War Now Being Made

Washington, Oct. 23.—(AP)—President Roosevelt disclosed today that the administration, in the light of battle experience, was cutting down on the volume of tanks and planes so far as their number is concerned, to emphasize greater power and strength.

Production of tanks, he said, is falling short of the 45,000 goal set for 1942, yet the same amount of steel is going into these land fighters.

Similarly, the chief executive told a press conference, the goal of 60,000 planes this year would not be reached, but that there was greater emphasis on hitting power and range.

Daylight Raids

London, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The swift-striking new Mosquito and heavier Wellington bombers of the RAF struck in daylight today against targets in Germany and occupied Holland, the British announced tonight.

An authoritative statement said that Spitfires and United States-built Mustangs also made low-level attacks on objectives in northern France.

Such attacks have become a part of the daylight bombing pattern of the RAF. Silence of the German-controlled Hilversum radio in the Netherlands from 1:30 to 3:15 p. m. earlier had indicated that Allied raiders were over the continent in daylight.

The Hilversum transmitters were silent yesterday while the RAF was attacking the Ruhr and northwest Germany.

There will be prizes for bonds of \$25 denomination and up. Tobacco auctioneers Bill and Wayland Sermons, will chant the bids. Mayor Bruce Sugg will open the sale, John B. Webb, Jr., T. Y. Walker and a committee in charge of the sale.

Leo Lopacinski of Chicago, private first class in the United States Marines, who killed 36 Japanese soldiers in the jungle at Tulagi, in the Solomon Islands in the South Pacific before he was wounded by an exploding bomb, will be there with his message, "You buy the War Bonds and we will deliver the bombs and bullets." Visitors interested in winning the war are expected here from all over Pitt and from a number of other counties. War Bond Auction Day will be "homcoming day" for the farmers of Pitt county who have practically harvested all of their crops except peanuts.

Excess Tires Over Five Be Turned In

All passenger-car owners must turn in to the government all tires in excess of five per car in connection with the national gasoline rationing. This order became effective October 15th and all idle tires must be turned in by November 15th.

An idle tire is considered as any new or used passenger-type tire (even if it needs repair) in excess of five tires per vehicle. Tires beyond repair are idle and should be turned in.

Tires may not be disposed of except to the government. They should be delivered to the nearest Railway Express Office where receipt will be given for all tires turned in. Your government will send you a check, or war bonds and stamps, shortly after the tires have been inspected at the warehouse for official determination of its value.

Tires bought and stored must be surrendered. You should keep your best tires and sell the government all other tires. Failure to turn in tires will mean that the privilege of using gasoline in any passenger car will be denied that person failing to comply with this request.

AIRMEN BLAST JAPS IN CHINA

Score Hits On Mining Area Near Manchuria

Chungking, Oct. 23.—(AP)—United States army bombers, striking far north in China, caused "serious damage" with many high explosive and incendiary hits on the Lintai mine installations in Hopeh province, a communiqué from Lieut. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's headquarters announced today.

All the American planes returned to their bases, it said.

The communiqué said: "On the afternoon of October 21 United States army air force bombers carried out a most successful attack on the Lintai mine installations (Kailan mining administration near Ky Yuen, Hopeh).

"Both high explosive and incendiary bombs were dropped and many direct hits were observed in the target area, causing serious damage to installations. All American planes returned to their bases."

Hopeh province is one of China's remotest, bordering on Japanese-occupied Manchuria, and its coal deposits are in the northern hilly region. The mines of the Kailan Mining Administration are the largest, having had a pre-war capacity of 14,000 tons a day. In peace time it was exported from the treaty port of Chinwangtao, linked by rail with Tientsin, and then one of the most important coaling ports in the Far East.

GIVE WARNING TO JAPANESE

Threats Of Terrorism Not To Deter Allies

New Delhi, India, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The Japanese announcement of intentions to court-martial American "bomb-japs" pilots brought an immediate Japanese language broadcast from the British in India today asserting that "no threats of this sort will have the slightest effect on Allied war strategy nor will Allied pilots take any notice of terrorist methods."

The broadcast demanded that the Japanese supply the location of schools and hospitals so they can be avoided by bomber crews.

It recalled that Japan had bombed China's cities relentlessly and that the Japanese had requested the evacuation of Nanking preparatory to bombing of the now-occupied capital of China.

"On this analogy," the broadcast continued, "the Allies now have every right, because of the Japanese example, to demand the evacuation of all civilians from Tokyo, Osaka, Nagoya, Kobe and other big cities."

"If any stay behind and are killed by Allied bombs, the fault would be theirs alone. This, at least, is the reasoning of the Japanese army and navy ministries."

Newspaper Scrap Drive Big Success

Charlotte, N. C., Oct. 23.—So tremendous was the volume of scrap metal collected during the recent newspaper salvage drive that some time will be required to move it from the yards of scrap dealers to the steel mills, Henry G. Taylor, district chief of the automobile graveyard section of the War Production Board, asserted today.

While salvaged materials should be stockpiled and marked with a sign stating "This is a United States Salvage Bank," he declared. This step will let the public know that the junk is not being neglected or added.

Scrap metal collected during the drive must be divided into four classifications, sorted to size and cleaned, Mr. Taylor continued.

This accounts, he said, for the time taken to move the metal.

"Both the newspapers and the general public are to be congratulated," he continued, "on the splendid job they did in bringing to the surface so many million pounds of scrap metal. Every pound of scrap salvaged during the campaign means two pounds of new steel which can be used for the manufacture of military and naval equipment."

"In other words, the newspapers and the public did twice as good a job as they thought they did."

Gangsters Escape



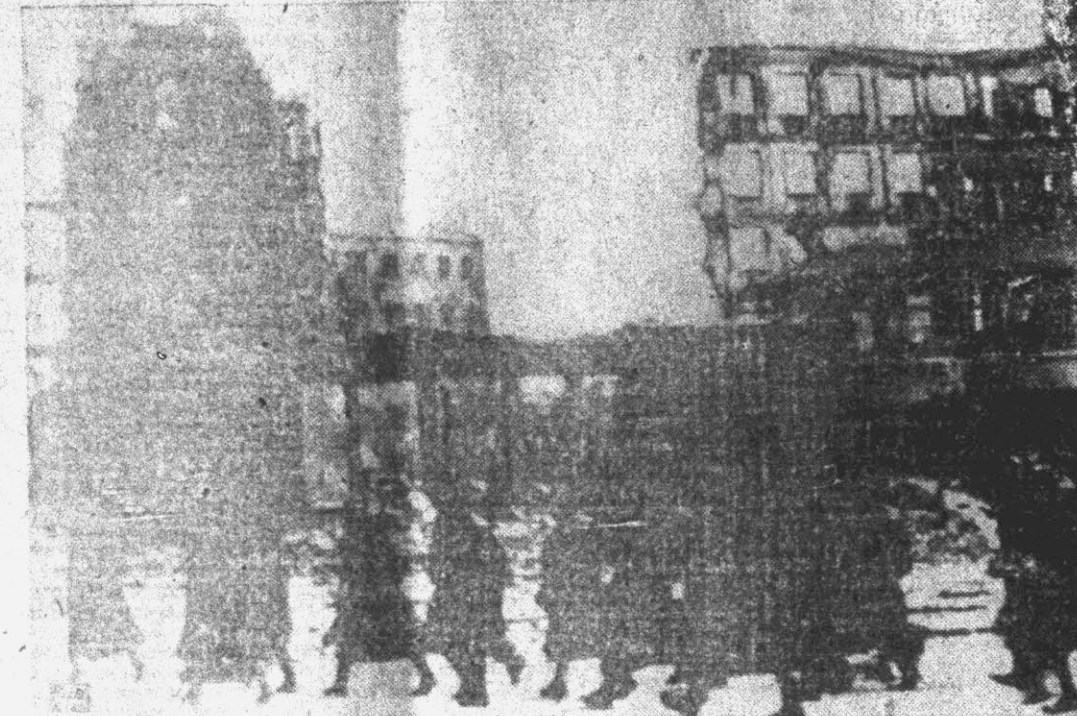

Italian General Prisoner In India

Somewhere in Northern India, Oct. 23.—(AP)—General Annibale "Electric Whiskers" Bergonzoli, who commanded Ethiopian and Spanish civil war campaigns with a bag of gum-drops in his hands and who was captured by the British in Libya in 1941, is among 30 Italian generals now being held at a war prison camp in India.

The dapper little general with the bristling beard and the handlebar mustaches was famous for his appetite as well as his military exploits. Instead of the machine-gun most Italian commanders carried in the back of their cars, Bergonzoli always traveled with a larger well stocked with choice canned foods and wines.

Army, Navy Game To Be at Annapolis

Annapolis, Md., Oct. 23 (AP)—The Army-Navy football game, a victim of its own popularity, has been shunted from Philadelphia's Marmarth Stadium to the Naval Academy's 22,000-seat arena as a war economy measure by President Roosevelt.

In a season during which other gridiron contests have shown a drastic falling off in attendance, the battle of the two service elevens was expected to draw its customary 100,000 spectators and the president last night ordered the transfer to save tires and gasoline and to keep the railroads open for more important travel.

The White House statement which accompanied the announcement warned that tickets for the classic event "only to residents of Annapolis—not to outsiders" and hinted that the game might be the last meeting of the two for the duration of the war by saying that "the game was scheduled before war was declared and its cancellation at this late date undoubtedly would cause great disappointment."

Annapolis, capital of Maryland, had a population of slightly more than 13,000 in 1940 and is believed near 16,000 now. Last year at Philadelphia 98,324 persons watched Navy defeat the Army, 14 to 6.

The White House statement warned specifically against persons living in Baltimore and Washington obtaining pasteborders for the game and said that only such members of the student body and officials of the U. S. Military Academy as were needed for the contest would be permitted to travel to Annapolis.

Last year 42 special trains were needed to move the civilian spectators to Philadelphia and 14 additional trains brought the Cadets from the two competing institutions.

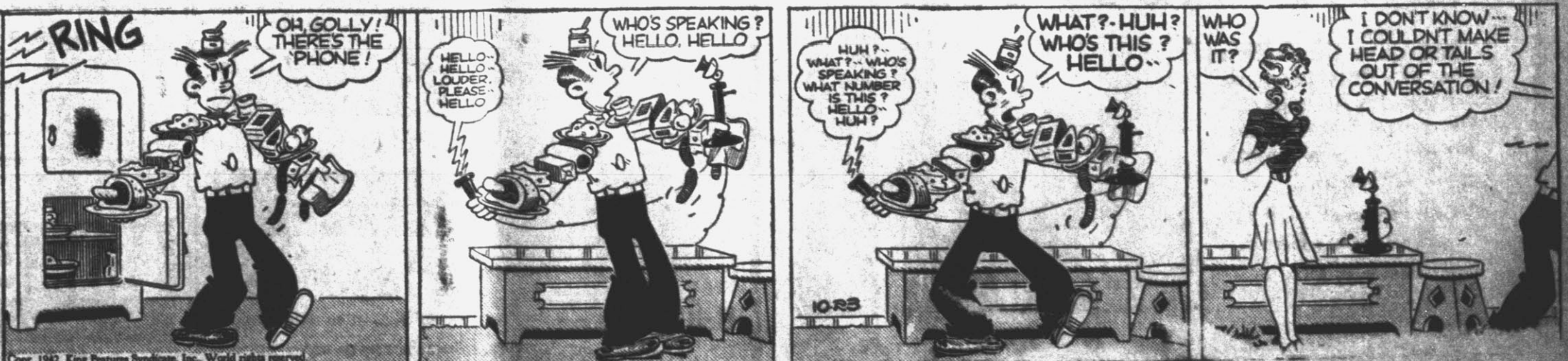

TO USE FORCE ON THE FRENCH

Workers Decline To Report To The Nazis

Vichy, Oct. 23—(AP)—The threat of force was invoked by German occupation authorities in Paris as they stepped up their efforts today to recruit skilled French workers for labor in Germany's war industries.

Issuance of the threat by the German commander for Greater Paris followed the non-appearance of a group of workers directed to appear at a railway station yesterday for transportation to the Reich.

Another batch of workers immediately was ordered to report today, along with the warning that those who failed to heed the instructions would "expose themselves to forceful measures."

The warning came as Pierre Laval—who told his countrymen earlier this week that they must go freely to Germany to fulfill her demands for 150,000 workers—returned to Vichy from talks with German officials in Paris.

Laval at once went into conference with Jacques Baraud, who is in charge of French-German economic relations, Marshal Petain and Fernand de Brinon, Vichy ambassadors, to Paris.

Admiral Jean Darlan, chief of the Vichy government's armed forces, remained meanwhile in Dakar, completing an inspection of the strengthened defenses of that West African port.

Yesterday Darlan broadcast a message from Petain to residents of the colony warning them they faced a "new menace" but assuring them it would be adequately met.

(Foreign sources in Bern suggested that Darlan's message was more window dressing intended to impress the Germans with the idea that no Nazi forces are needed in West Africa. The persistence with which the Axis press has insisted that Dakar is in danger of attack has been regarded in many United Nations quarters as propaganda to induce the French to let the Germans use Dakar as a base.)

SHIP DAMAGED AT BALTIMORE

Fire Sweeps Through Hospital Of U. S. Vessel

Baltimore, Oct. 23—(AP)—Fire swept through the hospital area of a United States ship undergoing repairs here early today, and the vessel was left listing "very slightly" from tons of water poured on the blaze.

Identity of the ship was not disclosed by the army, and cause of the blaze, confined to one compartment, was not officially announced.

Firemen and guards, however, said the blaze was believed to have been started in a pile of mattresses by sparks or flames from a welder's torch.

The ship was being repaired at the key highway yards of the Bethlehem Steel Company.

The vessel was said to be in no danger of capsizing, and workmen immediately began to pump out the water, which pocketed on the port side. No estimate of the damage was announced.

The fire was discovered about 1 a. m., and the blaze was fought by company and city firemen. Three alarms were sounded. Dense clouds of smoke hampered firemen, and forced some of them to don gas masks.
