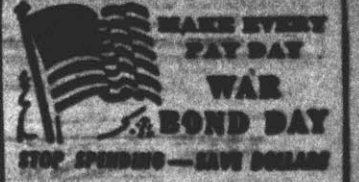

Tobruk Back In British Hands As Rommel Flees Without Giving Battle

Rommel Believed To Be Making Last Desperate Effort To Reach Tripoli; Nazis Put Torch To Tobruk Before Abandoning It To Their Pursuers

(By The Associated Press) Cairo, Nov. 13.—Tobruk, abandoned by the Nazis in their headlong flight to stay ahead of their pursuers, was reoccupied by the British today amid the first indication that the Axis may be yielding the last of North Africa without a struggle.

Hot on Rommel's heels, the eighth army picked up Axis stragglers in the El Adem area, just inland from the Mediterranean south of Tobruk, and Allied planes hounded the retreating road transports beyond Tobruk and sinking several supply-laden barges moving westward in the Mediterranean.

Allied air forces had a field day yesterday. Not one enemy fighter protected the enemy truck column, leaving the American and British fliers a clear field to do heavy damage.

Despite the vast scope of their air operations, including the assault on the transport planes and damage to a southbound schooner in the central Mediterranean, only one Allied plane was missing.

Air scouts said the enemy still was moving westward from Tobruk as fast as his transport could carry him.

Much of his remaining stores apparently were left in Tobruk, deserters and deserted weapons. RAF raiders bombed the port Wednesday night they saw more than 100 fires, many in clusters and brilliant white like burning explosives.

(The Germans acknowledged that they had set the torch thoroughly to all they had left at Tobruk, but that an undisclosed amount of artillery and armored equipment was saved for "later on" where Rommel has decided on a last stand.)

With Tobruk, a vital and normally defensible position, already in British hands there was no indication where Nazi Field Marshal Erwin Rommel might try—if at all—to halt his retreat.

The British already have pushed him back 300 miles from the El Alamein line and virtually with each mile his manpower and armored strength have dwindled under ceaseless land and air attack.

British headquarters announced that the eighth army had occupied Bardia, 236 miles west of El Alamein and about 15 miles deep in Libya from the Egyptian border, and that Allied planes were hammering at Rommel's transport near Tobruk.

Then, indicative of the furious pace of the chase across the African desert, a special communiqué soon after made the terse announcement:

"Tobruk is reported in our hands this morning."

This was the second time it had fallen to the British.

Now that Rommel has lost what might have been an Axis African Dunkerque, the next place British observers believe he might make a stand is at El Agheila, on the Gulf of Sirte.

There he would have the advantage of defending a narrow passage—as the British had at El Alamein. But even if they depleted forces to stop there, they still would be 450 miles from Tripoli, and Lieut. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's forces on the opposite side of Tunisia already are nearer than Rommel's.

If he could reach Tripoli first, Rommel still might lack air and (Continued on page three)

ASKS PROBE OF MAAS' CHARGE

Rep. Vincent Calls For Full Investigation

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Accusing Representative Maas (R-Minn.) of having "rendered aid and comfort to the enemy" in a speech broadcast last night, Representative Vincent (D-Ky.) called today for a Congressional investigation of Maas' "serious charges."

In a letter to chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of the naval affairs committee, the Kentuckian said he was astounded by some of the statements made by Maas, who charged "lack of organization in the armed forces."

"If his speech had been dictated in Berlin or Tokyo," Vincent wrote, "it could not have been more effective in breaking down the morale of our people."

Rep. Martin of Massachusetts, the minority leader in the House, called for immediate action by Congress to remedy the situation described by Maas.

Recently back from a four-month duty of Pacific forces fighting fronts, Maas declared the nation's armed forces still lacked unity of command, and contended that official reports of our "defeats and disasters" had been played down and twisted.

In a radio address, he said "we are still losing the war in the Pacific," but declared that the United States had the resources, the manpower, the production and ingenuity necessary to defeat Japan. He added:

"So far, however, we have lacked the organization and failed to concentrate our energies and forces. We are fighting dozens of separate wars all over the world. They are not coordinated and are not all part of one over-all plan to defeat our enemies."

"Many of these fronts are pressure fronts—that is, undertaken locally to satisfy various of our Allies, but not as part of a well-thought-out general war plan. We are carrying on so many 'second fronts' that we seem to have had little or nothing left with which to carry on our own 'first front' in the Pacific."

"It will make little difference in the end who wins in Europe, we or Hitler, if the Japs win in the Pacific," he said, "for in twenty or thirty years a billion and a half orientals, industrialized, organized, and mobilized by Japan, will overrun a war devastated Europe and, finally, America too."

Nazis Reach Spain
Madrid, Nov. 13.—(AP)—German troops arrived on the Mediterranean shore of France opposite port Bona, Spanish frontier city at 5:30 p.m. yesterday, a Barcelona dispatch said.

Hitler Sends Troops Racing Across France



Alarmed by the Allied offensives in North Africa (2), Adolf Hitler scrapped his armistice with Vichy November 11 and sent German troops hurrying southward across (3) the Mediterranean coast. Meanwhile, he launched Axis paratroopers and air-borne infantry into French Tunisia (3). Italian marines were reported to have occupied Bizerte (black cross), one of the principal ports of Tunisia. Hitler claimed he acted to defend France against Allied attack. He charged that United Nations forces intended to attack Corsica (broken arrow) and then invade France. In the meantime, U. S. forces streaked toward Libya from Algiers (black arrow) to cut off Gen. Rommel's shattered army. Vichy French forces at Casablanca (A) ceased fighting with U. S. forces and asked for an armistice. At the same time, the British Eighth Army continued to pursue Axis remnants across the desert near the Egyptian-Libyan border (B).

NAZIS RENEW DRIVE ON REDS

All Assaults Repelled With Heavy Nazi Losses

Moscow, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Repeated German attacks, which Red Star characterized as the beginning of a new Nazi offensive, were hurled at the defenders of Stalingrad yesterday but the Russians declared today that all the assaults had been repelled with heavy Nazi losses.

The Red army organ said the Germans had thrown overwhelming superior forces into the battle and the midday communiqué of the Soviet Information Bureau described the fighting as fierce.

The bulletin, however, did not label the assaults a full-fledged offensive and the details which it gave were not indicative of a large-scale battle.

"In the Stalingrad area," the communiqué said, "fierce fighting continued. Our troops are firmly defending their positions and repulsing attacks by enemy infantry and tanks."

"In one sector eight Red army men who were defending the flank of their detachment repulsed three German attacks and a fourth attack by an entire company of German infantry. The Germans left 60 dead on the field."

Northwest of the Volga river city Russian troops repulsed an enemy attack and wiped out 150 Nazis, the bulletin added.

The government organ Ivestia reported meanwhile that Russian aviators of the Black Sea fleet had made a damaging surprise raid with paratroopers on a German airbase near Makhop in the Caucasus.

Approximately 80 German planes were said to have been using the airbase as a base to attack Black Sea ports.

In the action in the Caucasus, the Russians reported their artillery had prevented the Germans from effecting a river crossing northeast of Tula, inflicting heavy losses on the enemy. Southeast of Nalchik, where Red Star said the Russians had retaken two settlements, Soviet artillery was credited with smashing four German armored cars, a battery of 105 millimeter guns and a mortar battery.

On the Leningrad front, the Soviet Information Bureau said Russian snipers killed 550 of the enemy in two days, while on the central front 300 more Germans reported killed by artillery fire.

In local fighting on the front northwest of Moscow the Germans were said to have lost 350 men.

Member Rickenbacker Party Is Reported Safe

Rescue Revives Hopes Others Will Be Found

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Hope for the rescue of Captain Eddie Rickenbacker, the famous World War ace who has been missing in the Pacific since October 21, was revived today when the War Department announced the rescue yesterday of a member of the crew of the plane which was last heard from over Hawaiian waters.

Hopefully the War Department said:

"It is believed possible that other survivors may be on life rafts in the same general vicinity."

Days after the plane disappeared Secretary of War Stimson still had held hope of Rickenbacker's rescue, commenting that the flier was "an exception to ordinary rules."

The rescue immediately intensified search of the vast ocean areas south of Honolulu where Rickenbacker's plane disappeared October 21, when the World War flying ace went en route to the South Pacific to survey army air forces for Secretary of War Stimson and Lieut. Gen. Henry H. Arnold, air force chief.

The War Department said in announcing Capt. Cherry's rescue that in the unidentified area of the South Pacific where he was found "an intensive search of the area is being made by surface vessels and long-range planes."

Cherry was pilot of the Rickenbacker plane. It was last heard from on October 21 in a message picked up by an island station southwest of Honolulu saying sufficient gasoline remained for only about one hour's flight.

An intense search was started by aircraft and naval vessels, and army planes en route to the Southwest Pacific fighting front were directed to the area.

The WAR TODAY

It has taken the British Eighth Army less than five months to reverse the disaster of Tobruk. Last June 22 the fall of that already legendary fortress to Rommel's armored columns was announced.

The Army of the Nile, leaving some 35,000 prisoners in enemy hands, was fleeing toward Alexandria. Mussolini had his uniforms furnished for a triumphal entry into Cairo.

But the Eighth Army, under new command, calling on its own courage and fortitude, reinforced by fresh British units and aided by the United States Marines, was displayed at the Greenville High School today. Misses Mary and Helen Snedeker, the colonel's daughters, exhibited the battle-worn flag to the students.

Colonel Snedeker has been on overseas duty in the South Pacific since shortly after the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor.

Two U.S. Vessels Damaged By Japs

Thirty Jap Planes Shot Down In Action Yesterday Off Solomons

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The destruction of 30 enemy planes which attacked a formation of American surface ships bombarding Japanese shore positions on Guadalcanal island in the Solomons November 12 was announced today by the navy.

The U. S. heavy cruiser San Francisco was damaged when a burning, disabled Japanese plane crashed on her deck, killing 30 of her crew, the navy said. The destroyer Buchanan was hit by a five-inch shell from a Japanese shore battery, it added, and five of her crew were killed.

The Solomon action, the navy said, began with the bombardment of enemy shore positions west of the American airbase on Guadalcanal at dawn Thursday (late Wednesday here). The heavy fire from the United States ships silenced some of the enemy artillery and started large fires.

The bombardment was interrupted in mid-afternoon when 23 Japanese torpedo bombers, escorted by eight Zero fighters attacked the American ships.

The damage to the San Francisco by the crash of the Japanese plane was described by the navy as slight. The extent of the damage to the destroyer Buchanan was not mentioned, but the navy said these two were the only American ships damaged in the action.

The formal Christmas shopping season will get under way in Greenville on Friday November 27 when Santa Claus will pay his first visit of the season to this city at 7 o'clock that night. It is pointed out, however, that stores are permitted to use lighting decorations for their fronts and windows provided occupants of the premises are available to turn out same promptly in case of an air raid alarm.

Raeder At Toulon
London, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Reports reached London tonight that Grand Admiral Erich Raeder, Commander in Chief of German Naval Forces, was in Toulon, the French Naval base on the Mediterranean.

Raeder's presence there was believed connected with the uncertain status of the port, which the Germans said yesterday they were not occupying, trusting the French navy to defend it "against any aggressor."

Axis Ships Flee Bengali
London, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Reuters said today it had recorded a broadcast by the Rabat radio reporting that "Axis ships have left Bengali, probably after evacuating the port."

(Rabat is now in American hands; it is not known definitely who operates the radio station there.)

Bengali is 230 miles air line west of Tobruk.

Nogues Joins Darlan
London, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The German-controlled Vichy radio said today Gen. Auguste Nogues, former commander general of Morocco, had joined Admiral Jean Darlan in Allied councils in AEF-occupied Algiers.

Gov't Rests In Treason Trial

Chicago Couples Are Charged With Aiding Nazis

Chicago, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The defense rested its case in the treason trial of six German-Americans today without putting a witness on the stand.

Bright with prospects of continued Allied successes, this was the pattern of developments:

1. American assault troops leading the new British first army were expected to cross the Tunisian frontier today, coming within 400 air miles of the great Libyan port of Tripoli, with little prospect of any resistance in Tunisia that they cannot handle.

2. Racing for safety, Rommel abandoned the historic siege port of Tobruk to the British this morning, too hard-pressed to put up a fight, with only 600 air miles of desert trail between him and Tripoli.

3. French North Africa was adjusting quickly to its new role as a vast American-British offensive base, and the German-controlled Vichy radio said Gen. Auguste Nogues, former French commissioner general of Morocco, had joined Admiral Jean Darlan in Allied councils at AEF-occupied Algiers.

4. An Allied spokesman declared here that "considerable numbers" of the German 1940 Armistice Commission in North Africa had been captured by the United States forces and presumably were considered prisoners of war.

5. Field Marshal Jan Christian Smuts, premier of the Union of South Africa, declared that the spectacular British-American campaign made possible a great Allied offensive year in 1943 which might end the war in 1944.

Italian Morale Lower In Face Of Invasion Threat

Washington, Nov. 13.—Faced with its first threat of invasion in the war, Italy is looking to its defenses against American and British troops, radio reports today indicated.

The obvious apprehension among the Fascists was considered significant by those acquainted with Italy because an Allied invasion still is believed here to be a long way off.

Italian morale, meanwhile, almost certainly has reached a new low as the first effect of Allied occupation of French North Africa. This statement is backed by the Fascist propaganda ministry's broadcasts to the people.

As overheard by American listeners, the Rome radio is exhorting Italians to cease their trembling. Pope Pius XII has called on Italians to hold fast.

Since the RAF bombed Sardinia Tuesday, the radio has been appealing to the patriotism of that island 175 miles south of Corsica. The broadcasts have featured the national anthem of Sardinia, whose King Vittorio Emanuele II became the first king of unified Italy in 1861.

Similar attempts to inspire the Sicilians and Neapolitans were made when their areas were bombed by the RAF last year. The Fascist leaders know that even if the Gariboldians do not fall into panic under the bombardment, they are highly individualistic and independent island people whose loyalty to Rome (Continued On Page Four)

'Teen Age Draft Bill In Hands Of The President

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The 'teen age draft bill awaited President Roosevelt's signature today. Prompt approval would mean that some 18 and 19-year-olds may be called to the Army by Christmas.

About 800,000 youngsters out of a total of approximately 1,500,000 available 18 and 19-year-olds are expected to be called up this winter, deferring the same number of married men and men with families. Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey has estimated that his selective service organization will "lose" possibly 500,000 of the 1,500,000 to the Army, Navy and Marine Corps through voluntary enlistment.

The group liable to service takes in all youths who had passed their 18th birthdays on the last registration date, June 30.

The Senate debated nearly five hours yesterday before adopting the recommendations of a joint Senate-House conference committee which eliminated an amendment requiring 12 months pre-combat training.

A half dozen Senators reiterated their objections to knocking out the training clause, but only a few scattered nays were heard when the report was adopted on a voice vote.

Under the bill, high school students of 18 or 19 who are called up during the last half of the school year may, on application, receive deferment until the end of the semester. In addition, registrants who have passed their 45th birthdays (Continued on page three)

Lang then faced his wife in the room and killed her. He disappeared temporarily, then gave up.

The convicted man won some sympathy in court when witnesses testified that he was not himself some time, that continued re-velation of his wife being with David Pitts made him a nervous wreck.

Lang was convicted of the murder of his wife and being twice sentenced to die in the gas chamber. The first case of the kind tried in the state prison was the memory of members of the court and officials.

SEEK CHANGE IN WORK WEEK

Senator Would Suspend 40Hr. Week
For Duration

By JACK BELL
Washington, Nov. 12—(AP)—Demands for suspension of the 40-hour week rose to a new pitch in Congress today amid charges that the nation's labor resources were not being used efficiently.

Senator Byrd (D-W.Va.) told reporters he believed the problem of speeding supplies to a large American expeditionary force in North Africa had tremendously increased the need of obtaining the maximum production he felt could be reached only by lengthening the work week.

Asserting that the average work week in war industries appears to be only about 42 hours, Byrd said he thought the length of the war could be cut considerably by stretching this to 48.

Byrd stressed that he was not advocating the abolition of over-time pay in war industries, believing that wage rates could be readjusted to maintain the present pay levels.

Agreeing generally, Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said he thought it might be well to suspend the premium over-time pay provisions of the 40-hour week for essential civilian industries while the labor already was becoming short and employers could not afford to pay wage increases because of price ceilings on their products.

Tangier, Nov. 12—(Delayed)—(AP)—Twenty-nine Axis nationals fleeing French Morocco upon the arrival of Allied armed forces reached Spanish Morocco last night. The Japanese consul at Casablanca was among the refugees. In all there were 14 Germans, six Italians and nine Japanese, men and women.

Explosion Kills Nazis
London, Nov. 12—(AP)—The Moscow radio reported today that five German soldiers were killed when the truck in which they were leading a column of Nazi troops southward into formerly unoccupied France was blown up by a mine.

Raid Brazilian Embassy
Rio De Janeiro, Nov. 12—The Germans were disclosed today to have raided the Brazilian embassy in Vichy and the French embassy here promptly sent Brazil's foreign office word of its sympathy and "profound disapproval of that offense."

Massacre
London, Nov. 12—(AP)—A thousand and seven of them women and children between the ages of 12 and 17, were executed last Sept. 29 at a single town—Vukovar on the Danube river northwest of Belgrade—the Yugoslav information bureau reported today.

It said 318 others were put to death at the same time in other communities nearby.

Twenty-five other persons in Nazi-occupied lands were reported by Allied governments in London to have been executed for espionage.

Asks French Join Allies
Washington, Nov. 12—(AP)—Soldiers of France have been invited by Gen. John J. Pershing, leader of the armies in France in 1917, to join

the ranks of the Allied nations so their country "will once more be free."

His invitation was extended through a letter to President Roosevelt in which Pershing, who holds the rank of General of the armies, declared "the Axis has met its fate" and faces "final inevitable defeat."

First in Algiers
Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Nov. 12—(AP)—The first American soldier to enter Algiers probably was Marvin H. Anderson, strapping, pleasant-faced ranger of 5529 38th Ave., South Minneapolis.

Anderson came ashore at Sidi Ferruch, engaged briefly in his bloodless occupation, and then at 5 a. m. Sunday was detailed to drive two pro-Allied French officers into Algiers.

While his mates were fighting west of the city Anderson caught up on his sleep, ate well and surveyed the city from a window. Monday morning he tired of this life of luxury and, taking advantage of the armistice, rejoined his unit.

"The Germans ran away, leaving us," their spokesman said. "We did not even fire a shot. We are glad to be out of the war."

extremely light."

Observers here estimated that an American assault force which landed yesterday at Bone, 60 miles west of the Tunisian border, should cross that frontier easily today, leading the way for Lieut. Gen. K. A. N. Anderson's British first army.

The Berlin radio broadcast a Vichy communique which said that United States planes had bombed the Tunis airport. The Vichy radio said Tunis had alarms last night.

Another alert was reported sounded in Tunis at noon, but a Vichy broadcast said there was no bombing.

A spokesman at the Allied headquarters said he did not know definitely that the destruction of Axis planes carrying Germans north from Tunisia meant a precipitous Axis exit from the protectorate, but "I hope it does mean that."

The Germans had little choice, however. These seemed no way by air or sea that they could reinforce the few thousand men they rushed to Tunisia sufficiently to check the Allied onrush.

Some sources speculated that the Germans shot down might have been demolition experts sent into Tunisia for the sole purpose of attempting to wreck airdrome installations which might be useful to the Allies.

Another possibility was that the planes might have carried reinforcements to Tunisia which were ordered back without landing when it was realized that a stand there would be futile.

The Axis already has paid considerably for its attempt to interfere with the northwest African operations. An Allied spokesman said that Allied counter-action to German air attacks against the North African expedition had been extremely effective, and that "between 40 and 50 per cent of their air effort has been destroyed."

It takes the spirit to bind people together into a vital union. We can dovetail pieces of wood together and make an article of furniture, but we cannot dovetail pieces of wood together and make a tree. The tree is bound together by an inner vital life. In the same way we can point to a group of people and say that because they have the same name, live in the same house, and acknowledge the same fore-
bears they are of one family. Yet there may be no more unity among these people than there is among a handful of marbles in a boy's pocket. It takes a spirit of loyalty and love to make any group of people a family.
We can gather people together and call them a nation, yet if they are not baptized by one spirit into one body, they will never have enough national feeling to with-stand an enemy or promote their own essential welfare. We can gather people together and call them a religious congregation, but if they are not truly bound one to another by the spirit which makes a church really a church, then they are far from being a congregation in any true sense of the term.
In civil life we call this spirit morale. In religion we call it the Spirit—spelled with a capital letter. And it takes this Spirit to bind separate individuals together into one body.

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AN APPALLING SITUATION

(Industrial News Review)

Groups or individuals who seek transitory gain during the present conflict, are a decided threat to the ultimate outcome and to the peace.

Representatives of organized labor are frankly striving to bulwark their groups against post-war conditions, at the expense of present war production. Regardless of consequences, they demand and have been getting ever-increasing wages on the theory that they have a "right" to keep fully abreast of the rising cost of living. They are accumulating, in the name of the unions, gigantic tax-exempt reserves. They are accountable to no one for the disposition of these funds. The money can be used for the direct benefit of the rank-and-file members—or it can be used in the evil ramifications of bureaucratic politics. Many labor organizers deliberately intend to put labor, and more specifically themselves, in the saddle after the war. To put it bluntly, if they have their way, no man returning from the Army will be able to get a job until he has joined and paid heavy tribute to a union boss.

In the meantime, the rest of America stands by, faced with paralyzing taxes, a steadily falling standard of living, and lengthening casualty lists from the front. Men with dependents are being or soon will be drafted into the Army by the mil-

is no thought of the stand-ard of living for dependents they leave behind. In most cases, the government al-lows hardly enough for food, let alone anything for cloth-ing and shelter. There is nothing left but charity for the families of men who are fighting and dying to save our basic liberties—yes, even the right of the highest paid laborer in the world here at home, to strike. What an ap-palling situation!

might never under blows of an un-popular war.
This is not to say that Italians are ready for revolt, although a re-bellion might develop from inva-sion.

Reports reaching government cir-cles in Washington tell merely of a little more deterioration in mo-rale since we left Rome last May. The same suppressed animosity to-ward the Germans and the same friendly feeling toward Americans. German infantry reinforcements may be expected to drain further the barely sufficient Italian food supplies.

Presumably any Allied invasion forces would try first to take the islands, Sicily, Sardinia and Corsi-ca, that form unsinkable "aircraft carriers" for the Italian and Ger-man air forces on the invasion route.

The capture of Bizerte in Tunisia would give the Americans and Brit-ish warships a splendid naval base. That base is only 150 miles from Sicily, and 300 miles from southern Italy, where military experts say the invasion most likely would be attempted.

When the Greeks had turned back the Italian invasion in 1940, Musso-lini called Greece the Carthage of Fascist Italy and promised to break its back, a job that the Germans eventually had to do for him. Ironi-cally, the eventual invasion of Italy that breaks the back of Fascist Italy may come from the site of the real Carthage, which is Tunisi-sia.

Register For Fuel Oil Or Do Without

Every person who uses fuel oil or kerosene oil must register promptly. It was announced today. There are no exceptions, whether the oil is used for cooking, heating or anything else. The registration for fuel oil and kerosene is for a three-month period. Registration in Greenville and Farmville will be on Saturday. County schools that have not held

registrations for fuel oil and kerosene will shortly announce dates. Dealers in fuel oil and kerosene must also register now. Dealers and suppliers, when they register, will receive customer application blanks for distribution. Registrations are made at the schools. A drastic reduction in fuel oil and kerosene supplies will become effective. In the meantime coupon credits will be continued by individual dealers until the rationing program is put into full effect.
