Red Cross Canteen Corps.
Feeding in a disaster situation is a highly important responsibility. Safeguarding the health of a community disrupted by disaster, sickness or any emergency involves the provision of adequate and satisfying food.

The groups responsible for mass feeding in emergency must plan, prepare and serve food in large quantities under emergency conditions. Workers must frequently work with very limited supplies and equipment. This is the necessary training which members of the Red Cross Canteen Corps are undergoing now. The Red Cross Canteen Corps is under the direction of Mrs. J. T. Little as County Chairman. One course is being taught now to a group of six who after completion of the course will be members of the Canteen Corps. These workers at present time are making a survey of cafes, churches, and clubs which might be available for stationary canteens should the emergency arise. Paralleling this group of workers are the members of the Canteen Aides Course. This group is taking a ten-hour course. In the 20-hour course, many of the required hours must be worked out in practical training. Both groups are spending time each week as individual workers in the public school cafeterias helping with the actual preparation of the noon-day lunch for the children.

Those who are interested in taking the Canteen Aides Course can take this course without any other requirements. This is a ten-hour course and may be worked off in three weeks. For the Canteen Corps course, the prerequisite is the Corps course, the prerequisite is the Corps course. The Canteen Corps course is the first major course to be offered here by the Red Cross and it will not be long until you see the Canteen Corps workers appearing in uniform designating their unit.

Anyone who is interested in becoming a member of the Canteen Corps should join one of the present Nutrition courses now in progress. We are already answering a worthy cause in that we can help in the school cafeterias, since there has been such a shortage of help. Also it will help to keep the school cafeterias open for the remainder of the school year since WPA is being taken out.

The cooperation of institutional owners has been splendid as the workers have made the rounds filling out necessary information and such cooperation has been greatly appreciated.

A Correspondent's Notebook

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Feb. 21 (delayed) (AP)—Pages from a woman war correspondent's notebook:

There was one comic sight in this war that a number of army privates won't forget—Two colonels, a first lieutenant, a second lieutenant and two women war correspondents standing by a North African roadside trying to thumb a ride to get away from the German advance.

It must be confessed that the appeal of the two women, myself and Inez Robb, of International News Service, flopped, for it was one of the colonels who got the weapons carried and command car in which we all raced over the mountains.

We had reached an evacuation hospital which was revamping itself into a front line hospital when Second Lieut. John E. Whelden, of Newton Center, Mass., learned that the enemy was coming closer and started us back.

A courier auto was to take us and the two colonels, but it broke down. The air force needed everything on wheels but they got us up to a fork in the road at the edge of the airfield.

We stacked our luggage—bedrolls, knapsacks, typewriters, a bomb crater and waited. Truck after truck was hurrying up to the front. Empty trucks hurried back but the soldiers laughed at us.

The few civilian cars which sped past were loaded. Our courier, Lt. Louis Adelman, of Chicago, went up ahead and tried to hire one of the busses coming back. No luck.

But one of the colonels found the weapons carrier and the air force sent a command car which could

be spared for a while. The driver was Corporal Emil Jochim, a farmer, who lives near Lincoln, Neb.

Several hours later we reached a mountain town, spent the night in a villa, and next morning, hopped a ride on a transport, which Lieut. Weldon Johnson, of San Bernardino, Calif., had flown from Dayton, Ohio, across to Britain and then down here. And so we got away from the front.

Yankee ingenuity certainly shows up when American soldiers are faced with doing a job minus the conventional tools.

Take for example the small laundry crew assigned to see to the washing for an evacuation hospital. Their laundry truck hadn't caught up with them. They didn't have an electric washing machine, they did not have even a washing board.

But Sgt. Harry Cole of Tupper Lake, N. Y., a carpenter by trade, took a truck pole and cut it down to four feet, drilled a hole in one end and put through it a crossbar as a handle.

Then, when the mess sergeant wasn't looking, he swiped four metal soup bowls, and nailed one to each arm of the cross to make the suction cups.

He had what he called a "one manpower washing machine."

To make a wringer, he cut down two truck poles, one metal and one wood, to be used as rollers. He built the frame out of scraps of a wooden crate. To supply pressure he used a spring from a wrecked jeep.

He nailed bent parts of a tin can to a board to make a spillway so his sheets wouldn't get tangled up with the crank, which came out of some auto mechanic's toolbox.

terday, and it was not known here how far beyond Allied armored forces had progressed since that time.

Nor did reports from the front give indications how far the Germans might fall back before attempting to make a stand.

But it was clear that Rommel was suffering heavy casualties under a day and night hammering from nearly every type of bomber and fighter in the Allies' armory, either in the Middle East or French North Africa.

RAP Bisley light bombers hammered Gafsa and Sbeitla by night exploding ammunition dumps and starting fires.

Hurricane bombers and American fighters wrecked the roads in the area Tuesday night.

Fighter-bombers attacked motor transport and the landing grounds at Gabes, while both heavy and medium bombers from Libya blasted Gafsa a second time and attacked the Mareth line fortifications in the south.

Flying Fortresses with fighting and Spitfire escorts smashed at the docks at Bizerte by daylight yesterday, and left fire areas in their wake.

Three Allied planes were lost, and at least two enemy planes were shot down, the communiqué said.

Taking advantage of a waning moon which bombers always favor, American Liberator bombers struck at the Italian ports of Naples and Crotone shortly before dawn yesterday. All planes safely returned.

The night was clear and bright, enabling the fliers to observe direct hits on docks and harbor installations and railroad tracks.

Army Fails Approve Rocky Mount Field

Rocky Mount, Feb. 26—City Manager L. B. Aycock stated that the army has agreed to release the Rocky Mount Airport which was leased in June 1942, for a period of 25 years.

The rent previously agreed upon was \$1 a year. Aycock was notified of the decision by the Atlanta procurement office of the army after he had made an effort to get the lease back on the advice of the board of aldermen.

The city has spent about \$75,000 on the airport and federal government has used approximately \$700,000 on the runways and field. The airport has two runways 4,000 feet long, and it is expected that it will be used only by commercial planes in the future.

Aycock stated that he had been informed by army officials that the field did not come up to the new specifications set by the government.

Two army engineers who inspected the field several weeks ago reported that there was little chance at the present time of making the changes necessary to fit the field for army use. J. L. Horne, Jr., is chairman of the airport commission.

GIVE FACTS ON USE OF CARDS

N. C. Congressmen Are 'Reasonable' Drivers

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26—(AP)—The existence of a super-special rationing board to handle congressmen's needs, as announced by the Office of Price Administration Wednesday night, was news to at least two North Carolina lawmakers, and many said they had left their automobiles back home.

Rep. Bulwinkle and Cooley said they did not know a special board existed to handle congressmen's rations of gasoline and tires.

"For the last two years my car has been in a garage in North Carolina," Bulwinkle said, adding that he used taxis for official business when he couldn't thumb a ride.

Cooley said he obtained his initial "C" card from his regular board and that the existence of a special board was news to him.

A survey of the North Carolina delegation revealed that:

Rep. Bonner uses street cars and buses most of the time, has a "C" card for his car, which he drives about once a week to "keep it in condition."

Rep. Barden has an "A" card, but his car is in North Carolina. He said he uses street cars.

Rep. Doughton gets along on an "A" card, and his car stays in the senate garage most of the time, his aides reported.

Rep. Weaver has an "A" card. His car is in North Carolina.

Rep. Morrison has an "A" card and uses his car occasionally, aides said.

Rep. Folger reports he left his car in North Carolina, as did Reps. Durham and Clark.

Rep. Burgin's car is in dead storage outside Washington.

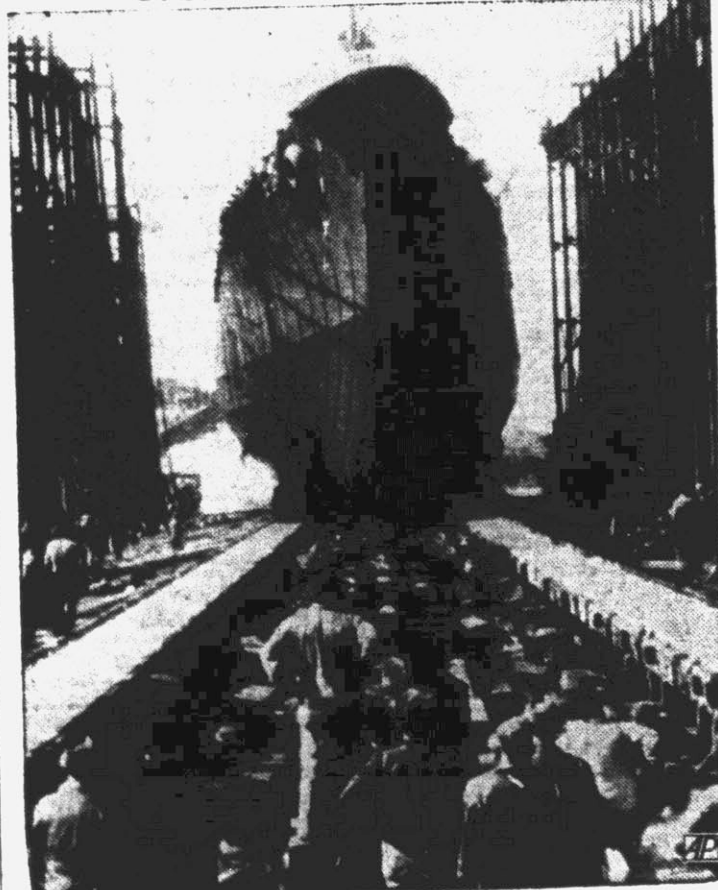
Rep. Kerr has no car in Washington.

O. P. A. Provides Overlap Period

RALEIGH, Feb. 26—To aid consumers who may run out of ration stamps for processed foods before the first ration period expires, the Office of Price Administration has provided a 7-day overlap period—the last week of March—during which time consumers may spend both their first period and their second period stamps.

Stamps A, B and C are valid for the first period and may be used from March 1 through March 31. Stamps for the second period may be used from March 25 through March 31. Stamps for the second period may be used from March 25 through April 30. During the overlapping period of March 25 through March 31 stamps for both March and April may be used. After March 31, however, stamps A, B, and C will not be valid.

Vitamins and Minerals

Vitamins and minerals from your own backyard to help your country's wartime food situation and your family's health. This is the Victory Garden story for 1943 in brief from the Bureau of Home Economics, Agriculture Research Administration U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This is the year when growing your own vegetables is not only pleasant and profitable but a patriotic duty as well. Many more gardens and gardeners are needed this year if Americans are to have food to keep them fit.

The plain fact is that you will not be able to buy as much of certain fresh vegetables and fruits as usual because they won't be on the market to buy. As for canned goods, Uncle Sam has already figured on taking half of the vegetables commercially canned in 1943. So Americans are going to need all the food they can grow on six million farms and 12 or even 15 million backyards and vacant lots. There is no danger of producing too much.

Every home gardener can see that at least one family has the vitamin and minerals vegetables can supply. So if you have the right ground, plan to put it to use for feeding your family.

Plan to have plenty of green and yellow vegetables and tomatoes; to keep a fresh supply coming all summer and as late as possible. Just a few weeks after planting the garden can supply greens of various kinds, lettuce, onions and radishes. A little later snap beans will come along, and then tomatoes, fresh from the vines.

"Cooking greens"—turnips, beet, mustard, collards, kale or spinach—and salad greens—lettuce, green cabbage and chard are important for vitamin A, vitamin C, iron and some are important for calcium. And greens are the most successful vegetables for spring and fall gardens.

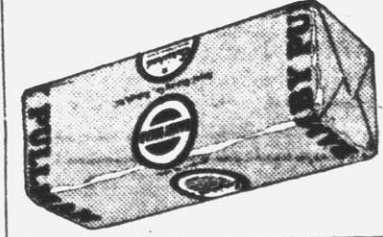

for his family and all the other families of America.

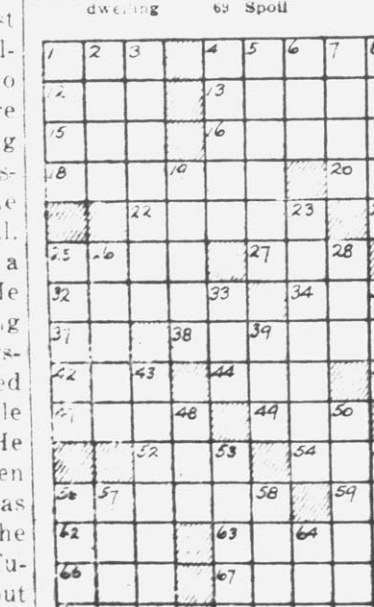

WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington—An imaginative young newspaper man from his home state dubbed him "the Oregon political colossus." The boys here call him "the biggest man in Congress" and "the man all Washington looks up to." Several call him "Mr. Six-Foot-Six."

Fresh phrases or old, they convey the idea. Lowell Stockman of Pendleton, Ore., certainly is the most striking new member of Congress. He really is six-foot-six and weighs 270 pounds. And within Stockman's huge frame is something typical of the new Congress, a healthy something that makes a lot of us here in Washington sure that the day of the old machine politician is passing.

In his place, the voters, slowly but surely, are sending good, solid, serious citizens to represent them—men not hide-bound to the political party under whose banner they are working, men who don't talk a lot or make any ranting speeches, but do considerable debating with themselves before they cast their votes.

Perhaps telling you a little about Rep. Lowell Stockman of Oregon's second district will make any point. Stockman is a northwestern wheat farmer. He was born 42 years ago on the same wheat ranch he runs today. He decided to go to the agricultural college and become a farmer, although his parents had retired and moved the 23 miles into Pendleton and there were family

arguments against his ambition. When he was only a shade over 21, he started on a shoestring, tilling the family's 450 acres. Twenty years later he has an enviable record of farm pioneering behind him. He was one of the first men in the northwest to ship bulk wheat instead of using the costlier, more tedious bagging process; and one of the first to buy combine machines, tractors, etc.

Last year, as he explains it, "after 20 years farming had sort of lost its glamor," he turned to politics. In his district there was virtually a legend that Rep. Walter Pierce could never be defeated. Stockman won the Republican nomination and started his own brand of campaigning. He visited every town in his district, starting at one end of Main street and working his way to the other. His friendly smile and his greeting: "Tim Lowell Stockman of Pendleton. I want to make your acquaintance," is now a classic in eastern Oregon. When the votes were in, Stockman had the election 3-to-2 over the veteran Pierce.

Stockman made only one campaign speech. He called his opponent "a fine old man." He talked about carrying out the President's war program, cutting down on government bureaus, and working out some kind of a worldwide set-up after the war to keep the peace. In Washington, Stockman lives quietly with his pretty ex-Pendleton school teacher wife and three children. He works quietly, too. "It has never been my forte," he says, "to take the long look. I just work my way through."

land would have a free conscience in resuming her imperialistic rule over India.

"In this way we should have a definite answer to the victory's query: 'To whom shall we transfer power? The people are quarreling. How can you trust India not to make a threat with Japan?'

"That would be safeguarded by the pledge of the Indian leaders in advance that India would fight fully for the Allied cause. We would pledge that India would follow the same policy as the war council. The British commander-in-chief would have to remain in control of actual war operations in India.

"Indeed, there should be an Allied council to aid the new Indian government. This council should be composed of representatives of Britain, America, China and Russia.

"In due course a constituent assembly would have to draw up a constitution, x x x. Let us start our new constitution first as Indians. Let us work it for ten years, and then we can decide what further to do about it. I envisage a government and a constitution when in many respects would follow those of the United States of America."

Sir Tej Bahadur Sapru, one of India's foremost liberal minds, told me:

"I'm absolutely certain that the whole controversy could be solved amicably and without bitterness. I'm sure that if India is given a practical choice she will remain as a member of a common family of nations and retain her political relations with England.

"You can't keep 400,000,000 in the same condition they have been. Indians aren't the only people who have had differences of opinion. What about South Africa and Canada? We shall improve with experience."

It is even possible that the failure of his lunge will hasten his end. Those tanks left beyond the Kassarine Pass may be sorely needed when Alexander's first and Eighth armies really apply the pressure.

Navy Announces Raids In Pacific

Washington, Feb. 26 (AP)—American aerial attacks on Japanese positions in both the Solomon and Aleutian Islands were reported today by the navy which said fires were started during one raid in the Solomons.

The raid on Kiska was the latest in a series of attacks delivered against the Japanese base in the North Pacific with increasing frequency in recent weeks. Some authorities here considered it significant that no enemy resistance was reported.

In the aerial actions in the south Pacific, the targets of the American air force were in both the strongly held northwestern sector of the Solomons and in the central and more lightly held section. Vila, where the fires were started, is in the Munda area only 190 nautical miles northwest of Guadalcanal air field.

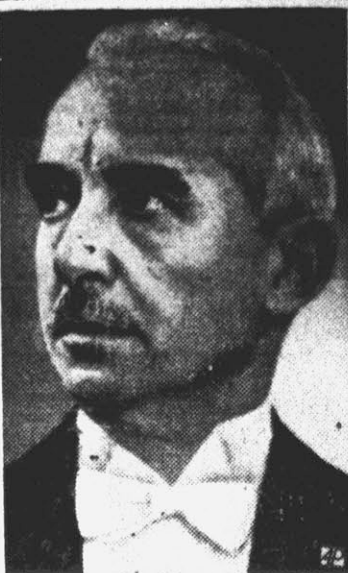

Also approved were bills to revise the workmen's compensation act, to raise benefits and to allow compensation of \$21 weekly instead of \$18; to provide for absentee voting by members of the armed forces; and to prohibit detective agencies from collecting accounts.

(Continued From Page One) that power submarines. Many other tools of war also are produced there.

An important junction for rail lines from the Ruhr and Berlin, it also lies on railways leading into Italy.

The Belgian news agency, quoting a Belgian refugee from Germany, reported today that a two-ton bomb dropped in a recent raid on the Prussian city of Duisburg trapped 2,000 miners in a coal pit. It was not brought out whether all the miners perished.

Clarifying a defensive phase of the cross-channel aerial warfare which has puzzled residents of Britain's south coast, the RAF reported today that although the British radio plane location system was better than Germany's it was not entirely reliable against raids at low levels.

Indicating the Nazi attacks will persist, authorities said all the latest German fighters had been equipped to carry light bombs in swift forays below the level of effective radio location.

Nevertheless, the British have been more successful than the Germans in defeating the low-level raiders. British figures show that one out of every eight German raiders have been destroyed this winter.

Compared to loss of approximately one plane in 25 by the RAF on sustained daylight attacks deep into enemy-occupied territory.

Raiding over the searchlight-flooded harbor for two hours, allied fliers scored four hits on an 8,000-ton vessel, believed to be a seaplane tender, and saw bombs explode near three cargo ships.

Other planes attacked the town of Rabaul and the Vunakanau airbase, and strafed enemy flying fields at Gasmata and Cape Gloucester, New Britain.

On the Burma front, RAF planes flying from India carried on their steady offensive against the Japanese, shooting up enemy river craft, railway trains and towns.

Fresh reports on the Japanese attempt to raid U. S. air bases yesterday in Assam, India, disclosed that American fighters positively or probably destroyed 29 planes and that only one of the total 46 enemy aircraft were sighted heading back for home.

American planes also ranged over Burma, completely destroying a Japanese camp, damaging another and attacking other targets.

Chungking, Feb. 26 (AP)—The Japanese have thrown tanks and planes into their offensive in central Hupeh province west of Hankow and with their ground forces increased to more than 10,000 men, have pressed the fighting in which both sides lost heavily, the Chinese high command said today.

The battle was said still to be in progress after three days near Pao-tien-shu. The Japanese were said to have used more than 29 planes in air attacks on the Chinese positions.

President Making Bid for Harmony

Washington, Feb. 26 (AP)—New members of Congress who took their seats only last month assumed a dominant role today when it became known that President Roosevelt has invited them to a get-acquainted session at the White House.

News of the President's unusual invitation came simultaneously with the organization today of some 40 "freshmen" Democrats who are banding together around a lunch-con table to "make a contribution to the thinking of the administration."

The group of House Democrats, while disclaiming any intention of forming a "bloc" to promote any particular legislation, said today were determined to obtain some recognition in formulation of Democratic House policies.

Publicly the House groups made no threats, but privately some said there was such a thing as resorting to "absenteeism" on administration roll calls if the leadership showed an inclination to ignore them. With a majority of only 13, any organized "absenteeism" by Democrats would give the Republicans voting control of the House.

Greenville's Good Town, Officer Says

"We hope that construction of the airport at Greenville will proceed with all speed, in line with efficiency, and that it will shortly be available for use as a Marine base for air training," the commanding officer at the Marine Base at New River told June H. Rose, assistant director of State Civilian Defense, last night.

Rose was at the Marine base in official capacity to board a plane and fly over Greenville and other parts of this area to observe last night's practice blackout. The trip to Greenville was not made because of foggy weather near the coast. All planes except the fighters and observers were grounded temporarily.

"We want to get to work at Greenville. The city officials and others have been wonderfully cooperative with us and I base this on what we have learned from the men who have visited Greenville and from official reports of those who have been there on official business," the Marine officer told Rose.
