Americans Win Second Victory In Gulf Of Kula

Jap Cruiser and Three Destroyers Sunk; Two Other Destroyers Probably Sunk; Japs Reported Losing Fight For Munda; Airmen Blast Rabaul Again

Allied Headquarters in the Southwest Pacific, July 13. — (AP) — A Japanese cruiser and three destroyers were sent to the bottom of the Kula Gulf—graveyard of at least nine other enemy warships—by guns of the United States Navy in a battle which began last night.

Two other enemy destroyers probably were sunk and enemy losses may be even greater when all reports are in. The battle still was in progress, it was indicated at time preliminary reports were received today by Gen. Douglas MacArthur from Admiral William F. Halsey.

But already Japan has expended between 13 and 17 cruisers and destroyers in two battles in the central Solomons while trying to hold apart the jaws of a mantrap which American jungle fighters are clamping on the enemy air base of Munda, on New Georgia Island.

Both battles in the Kula Gulf, which is 15 miles long and eight miles across at its widest part, occurred as units of the Japanese navy, moving down from the northern Solomons, encountered United States war vessels blockading New Georgia's coastline along the gulf. In the first battle July 5-6, loss of the cruiser U. S. S. Helena was acknowledged. Available reports on the second battle mentioned no United States losses.

Today's action-packed account from Gen. MacArthur showed Japanese everywhere losing the fight for Munda—on New Georgia, in the air above it and in the seas offshore.

Ten miles northeast of it, a Japanese ground force of considerable strength was trapped at Enogai inlet and wiped out. Munda has been cut off from its supply port on the Kula gulf by a barricade bristling with guns thrown across the connecting jungle track. East of it, American jungle fighters are less than 20 miles away.

American warplanes pounded anew yesterday at Munda; at its supply depot across the Kula gulf at Vila on Kolombangara Island; at its source of air support in the northern Solomons, Kahili airbase on Bougainville Island; and at the nearest air base with several fields, Rabaul, on New Britain.

Over Rabaul, an air and shipping fortress of the enemy which may be the ultimate objective of the present Pacific drive of the Allies in the Solomons and New Guinea, American Liberators cruised for nearly three hours in the latest night raid, dropping more than 25 tons of bombs.

SAYS HITLER IS NOW IN CHARGE

Fuehrer Reported In Control Of Drive In Russia

London, July 13.—(AP)—A foreign diplomatic source who usually is reliable asserted today that Adolf Hitler was reported to have assumed control of the German offensive in the Kursk bulge and broadened it into an expensive gamble for a breakthrough against the advice of his generals.

There was no confirmation of the report.

This source, who would not permit his name to be used but who said he had dependable contacts inside Europe, said Marshal Guderian von Kluge's attack launched July 5 originally was designed as a defensive move to forestall what appeared to be preparations for a heavy assault by the Russians.

He asserted that Hitler, noting early successes even though the cost was high, decided the German attack should be developed and took control three days after the operation.

Robbers Kill Two Norfolk Policemen

Norfolk, Va., July 13.—(AP)—Two Norfolk policemen were killed in a gun battle with robbers early today when they answered a call to a drug store which was being looted.

Officer F. A. Davis was killed instantly and Policeman R. F. Dunn, who worked with him in a police radio car, died at 8:05 a. m. in a hospital. The men were found outside the pharmacy, 749 Granby street, their revolvers empty, on the ground near where they had fallen.

The policemen had answered a call shortly before 5 a. m.

Other officers who went to the scene after the shooting found the store had been entered through a side window and the cash register rifled. A business establishment across the street had also been entered.

Force of Nazi Assault Shifted To Southern End Of 200 Mile Front

Moscow, July 13.—(AP)—Field Marshal Guderian von Kluge threw the entire weight of his armored columns into a furious attack today against the southern end of the 200-mile Orel-Kursk-Belgorod front in an action designed to enlarge the Belgorod wedge and blast a major beach in the Russian lines.

Dropping all efforts to break through on the northern end of the salient, von Kluge fell back on the old Nazi power-house play, but the thick Red defenses remained impenetrable, although fighting became so violent that even tanks of the opposing forces broke into hand-to-hand fighting on one occasion.

A German communiqué broadcast by the Berlin radio and recorded by the Associated Press, claimed that the Nazi armored forces with the support of the German air force had gained further ground in the area just north of Belgorod and had smashed strong enemy counterattacks on other sectors of the front. The Russians suffered "heaviest losses," the German communiqué said, including a total of 400 tanks and 123 aircraft.

The tremendous success of the Red armies was indicated by an announcement today that the Germans have "despaired" of breaking through on the Orel-Kursk sector, after suffering immense losses in one of the most determined attacks they have launched since the nine-day offensive started. Today, the Russians said, German forces on this sector have been considerably reduced in size and are being used merely to consolidate their present positions.

While the Russian midnight communiqué reported that German attacks were somewhat weaker in the northern area around Orel, the Soviet army newspaper Red Star said the struggle around Belgorod was daily becoming "more acute," with the Nazis hurling wave after wave of 60-ton Tiger tanks into the fray in an attempt to widen a wedge they drove into the defenses last week.

A few details are now trickling through about the fighting of the past few days around Belgorod. After breaking through into Russian positions, von Kluge's columns attempted to exploit the wedge by launching numerous attacks in different directions, front line dispatches said.

When these failed the Nazis were reluctant to have buttressed their own lines under cover of darkness, quickly erecting defenses and tank barriers to forestall a Russian flank attack. The German columns then turned north and attempted a breakthrough.

North Carolina's Schools Crippled

J. H. Rose, Superintendent of City Schools, commenting on the fact that in today's mail he received a request from the United States Department of Justice for girl high school graduates to go to work for the federal government at a beginning salary of \$1,752 a year, said: "This salary is more than \$300 a year in excess of what a teacher in North Carolina can get after four years in college setting an A. B. degree, with one year more for a master's degree plus nine years of successful teaching. The highest salary the State of North Carolina will pay next year to any classroom teacher will be a little bit more than \$1,400."

Mr. Rose said "this is one of the reasons why school officials are going to have a difficult time keeping schools up to a high standard. The salaries which the federal government pays do not attract teachers from the North and Middle and Far West because the salary schedule there is higher than these government salaries. But here in the South these government agencies are able to raid the schools and leave school officials wondering what is the way out."

Raids On Kiska

Washington, July 13.—(AP)—The navy announced today that army bombers had carried out three attacks on Japanese installations on Kiska Island in the Aleutians Monday, but poor weather prevented observation of results.

Kiska has been bombarded by naval forces three times this month and has been bombed more than a dozen times. The naval forces apparently have been used to pour explosives into the enemy positions when fog and bad weather prevented heavier aerial action.

TURIN, ITALY POUNDED BY RAF BOMBERS

Points In France Also Attacked Last Night, New Sweeps Over Channel Today

London, July 13.—(AP)—Home-based bombers of the RAF struck a heavy blow at Turin in northern Italy last night in operations co-ordinated with the Allied invasion of Sicily, the British announced today.

The raiders encountered bad weather both on the outward and return trips, the announcement said, but the sky was clear over the target area and they unloaded the "usual heavy concentration of bombs" on their objectives.

Taking a different route going and coming, the big bombers flew a round trip of approximately 2,000 miles.

A communiqué, describing the attack as "heavy and concentrated," said 13 bombers of the "strong force" were lost.

The planes were dispersed on the return flight because of the bad weather. The first announcement said the losses were "about normal" for such an operation.

Fighters and fighter-bombers attacked railway and other ground targets in France, Holland and Belgium while the Turin raiders were engaged in the long-range operation.

The raid was described authoritatively as "part of the combined operations now going on in the Mediterranean."

Turin has been raided 28 times since the start of the war, the last time being the night of Feb. 4, when home-based British bombers delivered a heavy and concentrated attack on the city. Three planes were lost in that raid. Turin is the site of important Italian war industries.

An Italian communiqué, broadcast by the Rome radio, reported that 101 persons had been killed and 203 injured in the raid on Turin and acknowledged considerable damage.

The long flight negotiated by the raiders last night was regarded here as particularly remarkable because there were only about six hours of darkness to cover the movement. It was indicated that the homeward route was well to the west of the direct air line.

War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson's speech, hurled at the Axis just before the Allied invasion of Sicily, answers a question which a reader asks: What concrete evidence have we to substantiate claims that the German-Italian combine is short of resources and is on the down grade in production?

Well, there's much such evidence. More than a little support for this is to be seen in the United Nations' triumph in Tunisia and the present manner in which they have invaded Sicily.

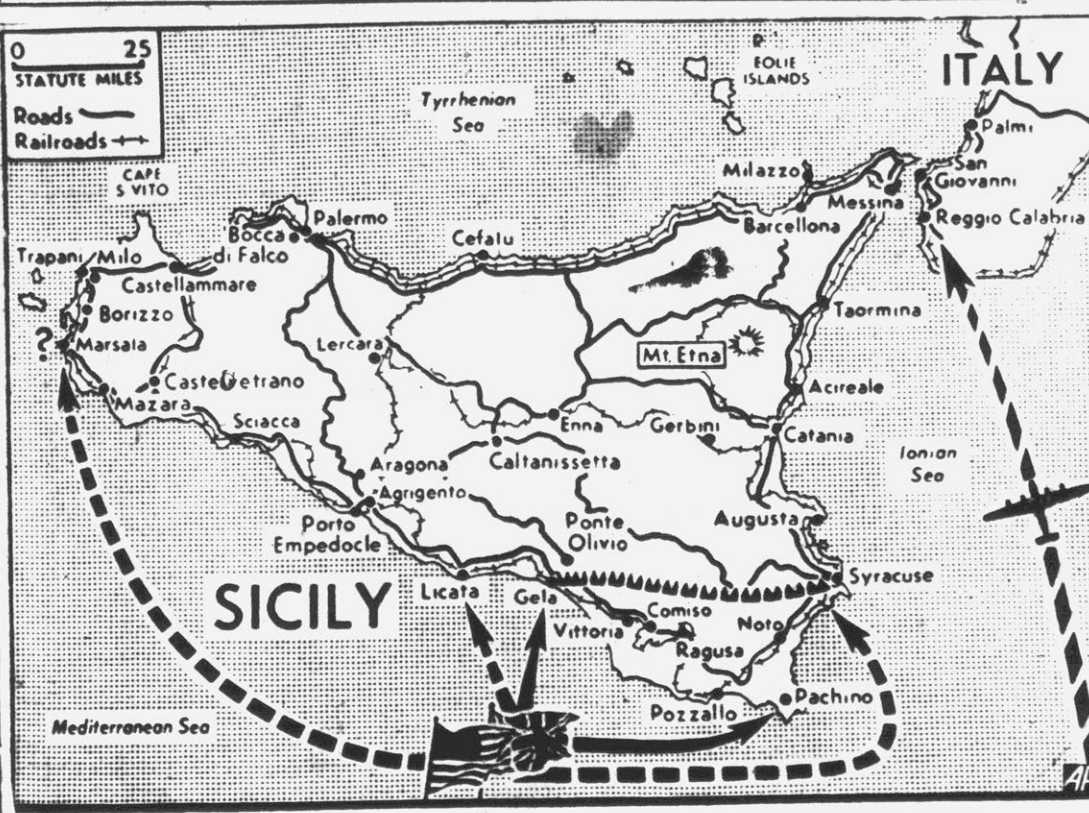
We also have substantiation from Allied secret agents, captured documents, admissions by prisoners of war and calculations by experts.

Mr. Nelson shows us it doesn't matter how much the Axis is producing because the United Nations are doing so much more. We can smother the enemy at the best.

Nelson says that the North American continent alone will outproduce the Axis in munitions this year by nearly two to one. All the United Nations will make three times the Axis output of arms, and next year four times.

Invading Allies Continue Drive Up Sicilian Coast

Allies Capture 11 Major Towns In Sicily



From Allied Headquarters in North Africa comes announcement that Allied forces are smashing forward in co-ordinated land, air and naval assaults on Sicily, and have captured 11 major towns and ports on the island, including Syracuse and Augusta. Other captured towns were listed as Avola, Pachino, Pozzallo, Scoglitti, Gela, Licata, Ispica, Rosolini, and Noto. The solid arrows denote the Allied courses in the Gela and Pachino areas, and the broken arrows indicate the path of the invasion in the Licata, Syracuse and Marsala regions. A German analyst said the Allies were trying to establish a front (broken line) between Gela and Syracuse. Meanwhile, U. S. bombers raided the Ragusa Calabria area. British forces were reported landing on the beaches around Catania today.

REPORTED JAP BASE BOMBED

Knox Silent on Report Of Attack On Paramushiro

Washington, July 13.—(AP)—Secretary Knox declined today to affirm or deny a report that American planes had attacked the Japanese base of Paramushiro, at the northern end of the Kurile Island chain.

A reporter at Knox press conference observed that "we understand that there was an American airplane attack on Paramushiro. Have you heard anything about it, Mr. Secretary?"

"Nothing that I can say," Knox replied.

"Nothing that you can say?" he was asked.

"That's right," Knox replied.

"Nothing that I can talk about?"

"But you don't deny it?" the reporter put in.

"I don't deny it or affirm it," Knox said.

Such an attack would be a logical follow-up of American advances in the Aleutians area and a logical development of the growing air force strength there.

Axis Reinforcements For Sicily Blasted; Ground Forces Receive Air Support

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, July 13.—(AP)—American and British sky fleets blasted enemy troop transports in Sicilian waters and battered supply centers on both sides of the Messina strait yesterday as Allied invasion forces pushed rapidly up Sicily's east coast.

Liberators and Flying Fortresses smashed at Messina in Sicily and the twin ferry terminals of Reggio Calabria and San Giovanni on the Italian mainland in heavy day light attacks designed to wreck the main supply route from Axis defense of the invaded island.

RAF torpedo planes struck a heavy blow at Axis naval units trying to reinforce the Sicilian defenses by sea, sinking two merchant ships and damaging two destroyers and two large troop transports in daring attacks the past two days.

Throughout yesterday, Allied fighters and fighter-bombers kept up their assault against enemy troop columns and communication lines on Sicily, destroying large numbers of land troop transports.

An Allied communiqué said 28 enemy planes were shot down over or near Sicily yesterday and the preceding night. The Allies lost 11.

"The Axis has been trying desperately to reinforce Sicily but the attempts have been frustrated to the extent of a considerable number of troops and tons of equipment which have been sent to the bottom of the Mediterranean," said an air force announcement at an Allied command post.

This announcement said the RAF torpedo planes which attacked the enemy destroyers left the vessels "blazing from stem to stern."

Describing the operations of the torpedo planes yesterday, the official announcement said:

"The attacks were of a particularly hazardous nature and were carried out in the narrow strip of water between Corsica and Sardinia X X X. The Beaufighters, often skimming over small islands in the straits, attacked repeatedly and even returned the fire from one of (Continued On Page Six)

Army Camp Blast Kills Seventeen

Elgin Field, Fla., July 13.—(AP)—Two officers and 15 enlisted men were killed at this army air base late yesterday by an accidental explosion, public relations reported today.

Fifty-one others were injured. The extent of their injuries was not disclosed but most of them were believed to have escaped with minor hurts.

Capt. William W. Lance, public relations officer, said cause of the accident had not been determined. The names of the dead were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

OPINIONS BY ATTY GENERAL

McMullan Covers Many Items In Today's Rulings

Raleigh, July 13.—(AP)—Attorney General Harry McMullan held today that a justice of the peace is required to file, on or before Monday of every term of the Superior Court of his county, a report consisting of a list of the names and offenses of all parties tried before him in cases finally disposed of and the papers in each criminal case since the last term of the Superior Court.

"The justice," he ruled, is also required to assess and collect additional costs for the officers' benefit fund and, on or before the first day of each month, to transmit such additional costs with the name of the case in which taxed to the clerk of Superior Court."

The lien of a municipality for ad valorem taxes is not impaired by a foreclosure suit instituted by a county if the municipality is not made a party to the suit. If the municipality is made a party, its lien may be extinguished but the proceeds of the sale will be prorated between the city and county if appropriate pleadings are filed.

Although the state has given consent to the acquisition of exclusive jurisdiction by the United States over land in this state acquired for governmental purposes, the cession of exclusive jurisdiction is not complete under the decision of the United States Supreme Court in Adams vs. United States until jurisdiction is accepted by the United States.

Important Port of Augusta, 19 Miles Above Syracuse, Captured Today; British And American Join Lines Inland; Troops Swarm Ashore Around Catania

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, July 13. — (AP)—Allied invasion forces swept up the east coast of Sicily at a breath-taking pace today, capturing the port of Augusta, 19 miles north of Syracuse, and piling ashore on the beaches near Catania, major city nearly halfway up the coastline to Messina.

British and Canadian troops fought their way into the two strategic communications centers of Ragusa and Palazzola in the southeastern corner of the embattled island, forming a junction with the American troops of Lieut. Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., at Ragusa as the latter pushed steadily northward and eastward from their original landing at Gela.

Again the veteran American troops repelled a fierce counter-attack by Axis forces, destroying a number of enemy tanks and taking prisoners, a headquarters bulletin announced.

Without giving details as to exact sectors, it later was announced that the Allies now have made contact with two regular field divisions of much sterner character than the coastal troops but these failed to offer much greater resistance.

Allied losses in the capture of Augusta were officially described as slight. Port and harbor installations were said to have been undamaged.

Augusta, whose population normally runs between 20,000 and 25,000 persons, is a fine fortified port which has been used as a naval harbor.

Simultaneously with the rapid-fire announcements of Allied successes, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower returned to North Africa from his visit yesterday to United States and Canadian forces on Sicily.

The junction of Canadian and American forces outside Ragusa consolidated an unbroken Allied line. American troops reached the verge of the city from the west slightly before Canadians drove in from the east, it was reported.

Palazzola is 20 miles west of Syracuse and its capture marked the farthest point of advance inland by the invading forces. Ragusa is 12 miles southwest of Palazzola. Both are prizes of great strategic value, being junctions for virtually all the main and secondary highways in southeastern Sicily.

Miss Hooper Gives Lecture.
In the fifth and last of the series of Monday evening lectures given by faculty members of East Carolina Teachers College summer school, Miss Emma Hooper of the department of English, read last night a paper entitled "American Dramatists Write for Democracy," in which she went back to the time of John Milton, who spoke to the English people "odious truth" in behalf of human freedom, and compared his influence on his age to that of contemporary American dramatists in their work for democracy.

Miss Hooper's first example was the dramas of Paul Green, who has assumed the role of a new Shakespeare in such plays as "Abraham's Bosom" and a dramatization of Richard Wright's "Native Son" and has spoken to his people what sometimes appears as odious truth.

Miss Hooper traced the thread of Democracy through the early plays of Elmer Rice that had to do with New York slums, through Stallings and Anderson's "What Price Glory?" which has the abstract and brief chronicle, so to speak, of those days when pacifism was causing upon the imagination of Americans after the first World War, down to Robert Sherwood's "Fertile Forest" which she characterized as a play to show how "civilization is imperiled by materialism, and by fascism let loose upon the world."

Sherwood's more recent "Idiot's Delight" makes war, as the speaker pointed out, the delight of idiots; whereas his "Abe Lincoln in Illinois" will go down as a classic of the common man. In his "There Shall Be No More Wars," Sherwood, she said, taught the reader by his story of decent, civilized people who fight for their freedom against despotism, and the propaganda of the play proved sufficiently popular for the author to spend the box-office receipts rather freely in his continued opposition to Hitler and all Hitler stood for.

Miss Hooper concluded with a critical analysis of such plays as Lillian Hellman's "Watch on the Rhine" and Anderson's "Candle in the Wind" which have something to say for the better type of German and stress America's growing force against Nazism; of Anderson's "Eve of St. Mark," which reflects the democratic life of soldiers at Fort Bragg and pays tribute to American heroism on Bataan; and finally of Thornton Wilder's Pulitzer Prize play "The Skin of Our Teeth," which, by its fantastic pictures of man's struggle through the ages, "helps us," to quote Miss Hooper, "to keep our wits about us in time of war."

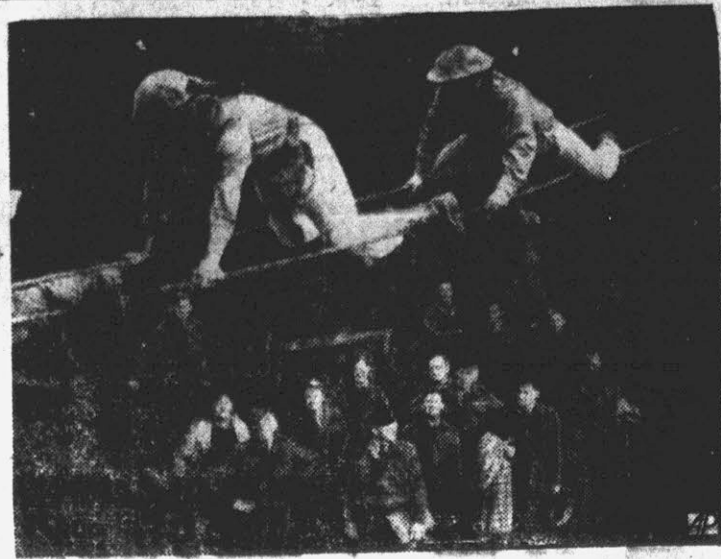
College Students Cooperate
The assistant home agent recently had the pleasure of talking to a group of home economics majors at the college on the joint program in home economics and agriculture, the farm family living program, and the student teaching centers where apprentice teaching in home economics is done.

Not only have these students been studying the program but they have also been getting some actual practice to become able to guide home economics students in reaching a more satisfying family life, and in helping to win the war.

Under the direction of Miss Katharine Holtzclaw, their teacher, they have canned, during extra hours, 50 quart beans, both in tin and glass jars, 5 pints squash, 8 quarts beets and made 8 pints kraut, 4 pints mixed pickles, 6 quarts bread and butter pickles, and 12 glasses jelly. All of the vegetables came from the victory garden raised by students in the department under Miss Holtzclaw's direction.

Plans for the six weeks term in school include the canning of soup mixture, using corn, beans and tomatoes from the garden, making more jelly, and canning chickens which have been raised by Miss Holtzclaw. These students are getting experience in both methods of canning, hot-water bath and pressure canner—also in brining.

Cans While In Summer School.
Mrs. F. F. Hendrix, wife of the county farm agent, while attending summer school to renew her certificate, has found time to continue her program of home canning. She has 100 jars already filled—50 qts. and 50 pts., which include string beans, corn, squash, butter beans, pickles and jam. Her plans include canning soup mixture, butter beans, field peas, tomatoes and to-

mato juice, fruits, apples and apple sauce.

Mrs. Hendrix has found it economical to can hens. From 14 hens she canned 32 pints of chicken meat, 14 pints soup stock, 7 quarts chicken soup. She had an abundant supply of fat left which she uses in baking and vegetable cookery.

URGE FARMERS TO PLANT MORE

Jones Asks Increase 16,000,000 Acres Next Year

Washington, July 13—(AP)—Calling on farmers to mobilize every acre and farming facility for a record harvest next year, Marvin Jones, head of the War Food Administration (WFA) announced today the government in 1944 wants 280,000,000 acres of crops planted and meat, dairy and egg production maintained at high levels.

The projected acreage is an increase of 16,000,000 over that planted for 1943 harvest and Jones explained:

"The program recognizes that demands for food will be imperative for several years and that sound practices must be followed to insure highest possible yields over a period of years."

Included in the program, he said, are measures to assist farmers in carrying out conservation practices and in maintaining maximum productivity of their land.

He promised that considerably more machinery and fertilizer would be available for the 1944 crop. Jones said there was need for more dry beans and peas, soybeans, potatoes and peanuts.

The total slaughter of meat for the next 12 months, Jones said, probably will run 50 per cent above the average for the 1936-40 period. The Administrator also announced that cotton marketing quotas will not be in effect for the 1944 crop because this year's indicated acreage of 21,995,000 is about 8,000,000 acres less than the current marketing quota.

CONTAINER SHORTAGE THREATENS NATION'S FOOD, EXPERT WARNS

New York, July 13.—Tons of vitally needed food will go to waste in the fields unless the salvage and distribution of wooden containers is stepped up appreciably to offset the current shortage, a spokesman for the nation's leading buyer of fresh fruits and vegetables said today.

"From the south as well as other sections of the country come reports of produce losses suffered when wooden crates were not available at the time crops were ready to be harvested," said Harvey A. Baum, head of A & P Food Stores' produce-buying operations. "The shortage is due largely to the diversion of millions of containers to overseas shipment of army food and equipment. The cases and crates that go to war never come back, and are almost impossible to replace on account of a lack of wood and wire and a shortage of labor."

The emergency which threatens essential wartime food can be relieved, Baum said, by cooperation of growers, distributors and retailers in reclaiming used containers. The A & P, along with many other distributors, is already cooperating by salvaging large quantities of containers from stores and returning them to producers for re-use, he added.

In connection with the lumber shortage phase of the problem, Baum explained that many types of wood, such as cypress, ash, pine and others formerly used by box manufacturers, are now going into the production of smokeless powder, rayon for gunpowder sacks and parachutes, containers for shipping ammunition, print and planning papers and many other wartime essentials. There has also been a shift of labor from box-making to war plants.

Some planes were set afire during the attacks on two of Ragusa's three airdromes and one fire in the town could be seen 60 miles away. The raid cost us one Liberator.

In the jungle warfare on the approaches to the Japanese air base of Salamaua, New Guinea, clashes of patrols became more numerous and enemy positions continued to undergo strafing and bombing attacks from our planes. Japanese planes also attempted similar raids on our positions but the communications described them as light and ineffective.

prive defending Axis forces of much of their mobility in their desperate efforts to head off the many-pronged Allied offensive. Ragusa is in the mountains and gives the forces in possession clear control of the surrounding countryside.

The capture of Augusta was preceded by a heavy bombardment from Allied warships, which stood off and lobbed high explosives into the town.

Details of the new landings near Catania were not given immediately but it was assumed they were made by units of the veteran British Eighth Army which originally attacked that side of the island.

Gen. Achilles Davet, commander of the 206th Italian coastal division, was the first ranking enemy officer to be captured since the invasion of Sicily began last Saturday.

Pilots of Allied bombers participating in the furious aerial onslaught against Axis targets reported that the Sicilian straits still were choked with transport and supply ships carrying reinforcements to the British, American and Canadian forces which spearheaded the invasion.

Axis forces which for the second time attempted to slow the American advance from the south were reported to have used tanks of French origin. The counter-attack was known to have been smashed and reports from the front said Patton's men were making "good progress."

Ragusa, where the Americans and Canadians were reported to have made their junction, has a population of 50,000 and is the capital of the province of the same name.

THE FARMERS DON'T LIKE IT

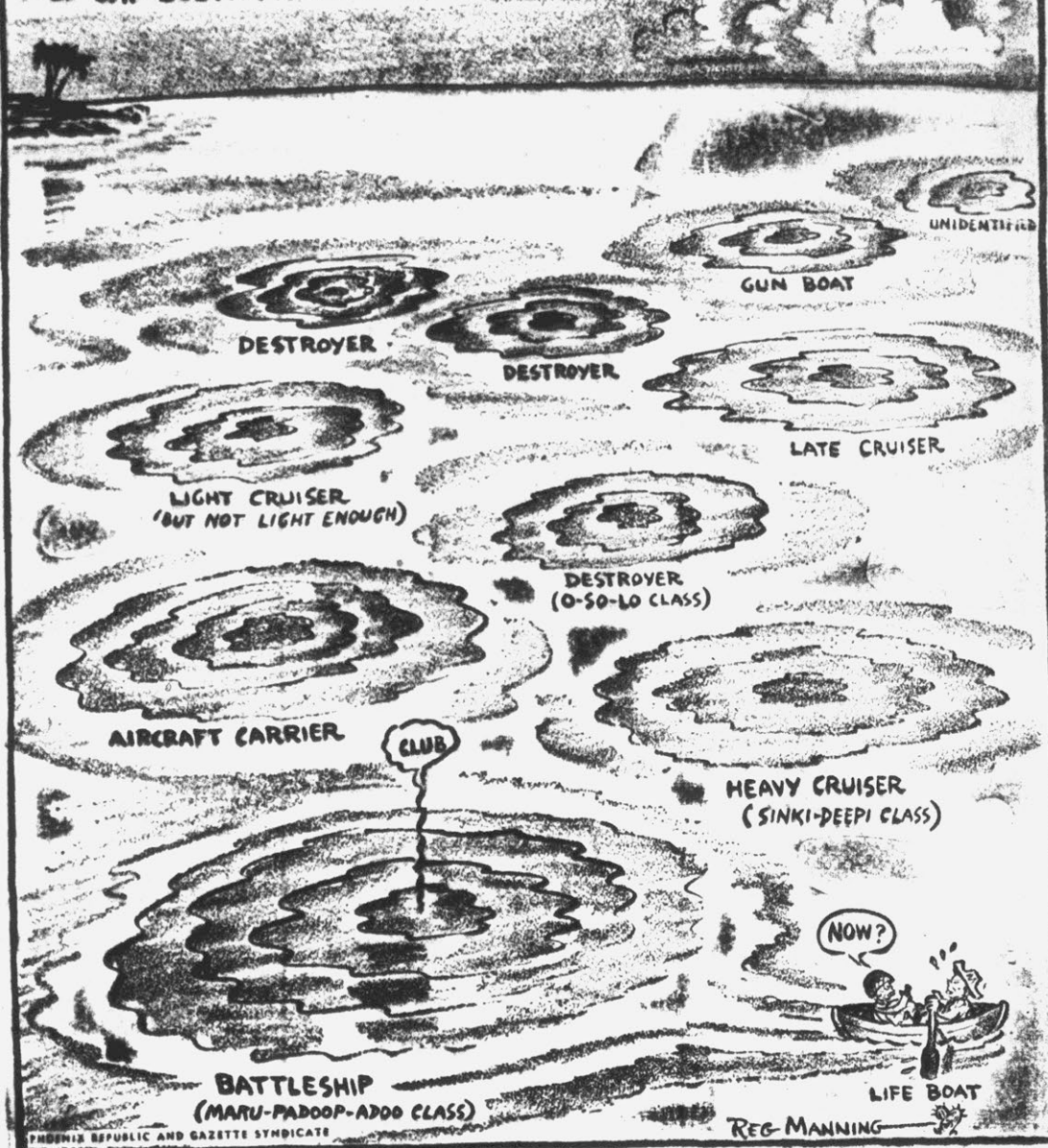
News from Washington
today that Marvin Jones,
War Food Administrator,
will urge farmers to grow an
additional 16,000,000 acres
of food and feeds next year
to take care of the needs of
the nation and its allies prob-
ably will not be so pleasing
to our farmers who are at
this time smarting under
losses sustained through an
increased potato crop, a part
of which rotted in the fields
or was plowed under, and
with those farmers around
Wilmington, where 60 car-
loads of carrots are reported
rotting because the govern-
ment made no provision to
buy them or secure markets
for them after requesting
the increased production.

No doubt many of our
farmers will feel the same
way as W. D. Reynolds,
Robeson county farm agent,
as expressed in the follow-
ing report on the potato sit-
uation submitted by him to
State Agriculture Commis-
sioner W. Kerr Scott:

1. The seed were very high and
scarce, yet the farmers planted all
they could get, because Uncle Sam
asked them to.
2. The seasons were bad; the frost
bit the potatoes three times. "No
fault of the farmer or Government."
3. Potatoes not very scarce just
before our markets opened. Prices
were reported as high as \$15 per
hundred.
4. As soon as our potatoes were
dug, the OPA put a ceiling on them.
Under the setup the farmer could
get \$2.70 per hundred, yet the man
across the street retailing them
could get \$7 per hundred. This dif-
ference was explained by the OPA
in effect as follows: The farmer only
had to buy high-price seed and fer-
tilizer, work hard, long hours with
a shortage of labor, taking a gamble
on weather conditions to harvest
them and pack them in very ex-
pensive bags, then sell them for
\$2.70 per hundred, while the mer-
chant friend was allowed \$7 be-
cause he had to take the risk of
tying his money up for as long as

three or four days at the time while
the farmer had to tie his up five
months at a time.
5. Then the potatoes were frozen
in North Carolina.
6. Then the Government put a
floor under them.
7. Then the market and the floor
fell out; there was no market or
floor.
8. Now the freeze is lifted and
the potatoes are thawed out.
9. Now we must have a "Hot
Potato" — "Too hot to handle," and
nobody seems to want to handle
them.
10. As the summary goes, they
were costly seeds, potatoes were
scarce and then plentiful. They
were high and then low, we had
a ceiling and a floor, but no floor now,
they were frozen and then thawed,
they were wanted and then despised,
they got mighty cold, now mighty
hot; so, now we suggest that the
name be changed from "spud" to
"worry wart."

WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

(Second of two articles on
implications of Wallace-Jones
speech.)

Washington — If the "Good
Neighbor Policy" is ever unified and
placed under one head, it undoubt-
edly will have the backing of both
political parties and either Demo-
crats or Republicans could pick a
man of experience now in the gov-
ernment to head it.

As Vice President Henry A. Wal-
lace recently pointed out, the "Good
Neighbor Policy" was started under
President Hoover's Republican
administration. It has been, how-

ever, a chick mostly of New Deal
hatching.
Wallace, himself, has ruffled his
feathers whenever it has been
threatened and there is more than
passing suspicion here that RFC
Director Jesse Jones' activities be-
low the border have been the chief
cause of the Wallace-Jones scrap.

Until now, Wallace, considered an
unlikely running mate again if the
President coheses to enter the
dash for a fourth term, has been
tagged as the only real candidate
for (1) head of new overall Latin-
American affairs bureau or depart-
ment, or (2) roving ambassador to
all of sister republics in this hemi-
sphere. Whether this latest tuckus
in the administration ranks will
damage or strengthen his chances
for that post depends on the out-
come.

If it has, or if the Republicans
should take over, there still is young
Nelson A. Rockefeller, coordinator
of the Office of Inter-American Af-
fairs. Rockefeller has never had
much truck with definite political
party alignments, but his family is
an traditionally Republican as it is
Baptist.

When Rockefeller was called in
by the President to take over the
"cultural and educational phases"
of the good neighbor policy, he
wasn't taken very seriously in polit-
ical, diplomatic, or Latin American
circles.

Rockefeller and his CIAA office
have made a few errors but they
have been the errors of enthusiasm,
youth and inexperience. Aside from
a few grumpy remarks tossed in
that direction in the early days by
the bewildered State Department,
the young man from Manhattan
and his agency have never had any
row with anybody — not even Con-
gress — and that, in these times, is
a record for the record.

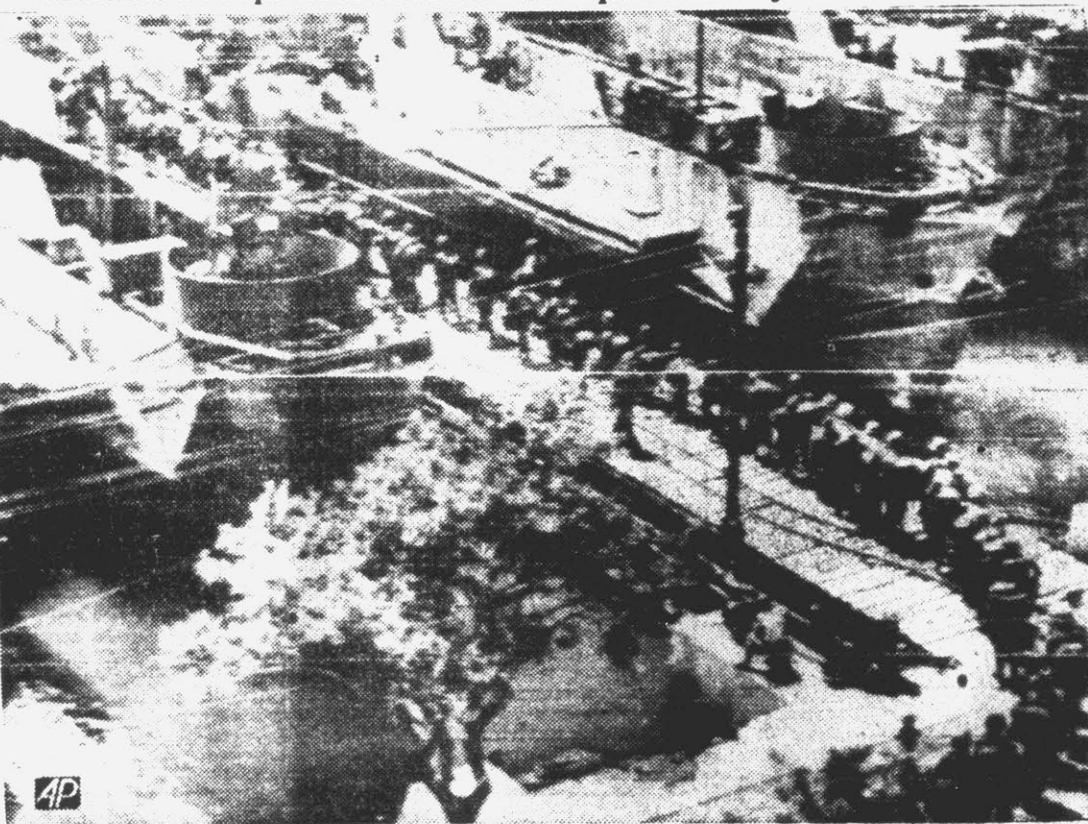
The trouble with Latin American
relations today is mostly one of ov-
erlapping agencies and although it

has never been aired, it is no secret
in those agencies having anything
to do with it that nearly all the
complaints coming from the Rio
Grande to Cape Horn have been
that too many cooks were cooling
the soup.

When nine government agencies
get to operating in one field, it's
likely to be plowed under before it's
plowed up. That's why observers
here are arguing that the unifor-
mity of all bureaus dealing with
Latin-American affairs is a certain-
ty — by legislative action — if the
President doesn't beat Congress to
it.

by which strikes may be called in

The measure flatly bans strikes

period instead."

Roosevelt Signs Big Money Bills

Washington, July 13. — (AP) —
President Roosevelt has signed the
last of 20 supply bills totalling ap-
proximately \$115,000,000,000 passed
by Congress before it started its
summer recess last week.
Largest of the six final measures
approved yesterday was the \$2,911-
697,224 bill carrying funds for 18
war agencies for the fiscal year that
started July 1.

Others signed were the \$848,295-
883 agriculture bill; the \$104,608,921
Interior Department measure; the
\$1,137,167,010 Labor-Federal Secur-
ity bill; a \$253,256,179 deficiency
measure and the controversial \$143-
430,591 urgent deficiency bill pro-
viding for the dismissal of three
federal workers held by the House
Appropriations Committee to be un-
fit for public office.

State Will Use War Prisoners

Raleigh, July 13. — (AP) — Several
thousand war prisoners will be sta-
tioned in North Carolina in the near
future and will be assigned to
"farms and other outdoor labor,"
Gov. Broughton said today.

The governor made the announce-
ment after a conference with Dean
I. O. Schaub of the N. C. State Col-
lege Extension Service; Harry Cold-
well, head of the State Farm Labor
Commission; and representatives of
the military.

The prisoners, probably Italians,
will be sent first to Camp Butler,
the governor said he believed, and
later assigned to areas in which
critical labor shortages have been
certified. Assignments will be made
upon the basis of agreements be-
tween the military, farm officials
and the farm labor organizations
in the counties needing additional
labor.

Owners of farms on which the
prisoners are employed will make
payment for services, the subsis-
tence, guarding and related duties
being performed by the army, he
said.

Issue State Guard Khaki Uniforms

Capt. Jasper L. Jones, command-
ing officer of the Greenville com-
pany of the North Carolina State
Guard, today ordered all members
of the militia company to be pre-
sent at the armory for the regular
drill tonight at 8 o'clock. New khaki
uniforms will be issued to the offi-
cers and men.

The State Guard is now equipped
with rifles, shotguns, tommy guns,
plenty of ammunition, tear gas and
other necessary military equipment,
including steel helmets, to take
care of any emergency until the
regular army could arrive on the
scene. The company is subject to
call for emergency duty over a large
area of Eastern Carolina.

All-Star Game Scheduled For Shibe Park Tonight

Complete Sell-out Indicated For Game, With Receipts Of Some \$70,000

Philadelphia, July 13 — (AP) — They're putting on baseball's all-star midsummer night's dream game tonight, but the way it shapes up, it looks like the St. Louis Cardinals against the "military secret" from the American league.

The National league boss, Billy the kid southworth, is going to "stand or get flattened" with a powerhouse starting set headed by five members of his world champion Cardinals cast, including his right-hand rifle-baller, Mort Cooper. But, Yankee manager Joe McCarthy, after looking over his American league squad, has come up with something which bears a striking resemblance to double talk in braile.

As a matter of fact, from the way the American leaguers, notably Marse Joe, have been making pronouncements merry-go-round style, the only thing the junior circuit campaigners appear at all sure about is that the game will be played at Shibe park at 9 p. m. (E.W.T.) It's going to be quite a taffy pull, too, because for the first time in the 11-year history of this later-league lawn party, the S.R.O. sign will be out. All signs now point to a sell-out of some 33,000 cash customers and a gate of about \$70,000 for the bat and ball fund.

Of course, by the time all the nooses are counted, even McCarthy will know who's going to start for the American league. But when he announced his lineup, he not only didn't know his starting elbower — although the general guess was that it would be Ernie (Tiny) Bonham of the Yanks — but he was also at a loss about his catcher; he wasn't sure about his outfield, and the only thing definite about his infield was that there would be one.

Marse Joe had his mind made up only about his center-fielder, who will be Vhet Laabs, the homer-hammerer of the St. Louis Browns; His shortstop, who will be fence-busting Vern Stephens, also of the Browns; and his third-sacker, who will be Ken Keltner, the Cleveland Indians' long-ball belter. Keltner was a pinch. He was the only third-baseman named on the squad.

The way Long-Jaw Joe was hemming and hawing, the mystery of the American league's starting elbower made the sixty-four-dollar question look like an I. Q. test for six-year-olds, but to the grandstand managers there didn't appear to be any argument at all. Since Spud Chandler, the Yanks' No. 1 thrower, heaved a full nine innings Sunday, they pointed out, there just wasn't any other able flinger McCarthy could go to except his own sturdy right-hander, Bonham, provided Tiny's trick knee isn't acting up.

The California curver has won eight against three losses this season, while Cooper has posted 11 wins against five setbacks and has chalked up four white-hot jobs. The National leaguers, generally, were as cocky as the town bully as they surveyed what appeared to be their first real edge in both pitching and power in the 11 years of the series, and they pooh-poohed the toss-up betting odds, which the local bookmaking gentlemen were quoting as 10 to 11 and take your pick.

The senior circuit squad lost Howie Pollet, the Cards' crink lefty, to the Army overnight, and Ace Adams, the New York Giants' relief specialist was named to the squad in his place. However, Cooper is backed up by the Pittsburgh star Truett Sewell, Claude Passeau of the Cubs, and Max Lanier the Card Southpaw.

In fact, the American league maintained its margin in only one of its specialties — the home run. The eight likely opening trunpurs for the junior circuit have hit the jackpot 47 times this season, headed by the even dozen Stephens has

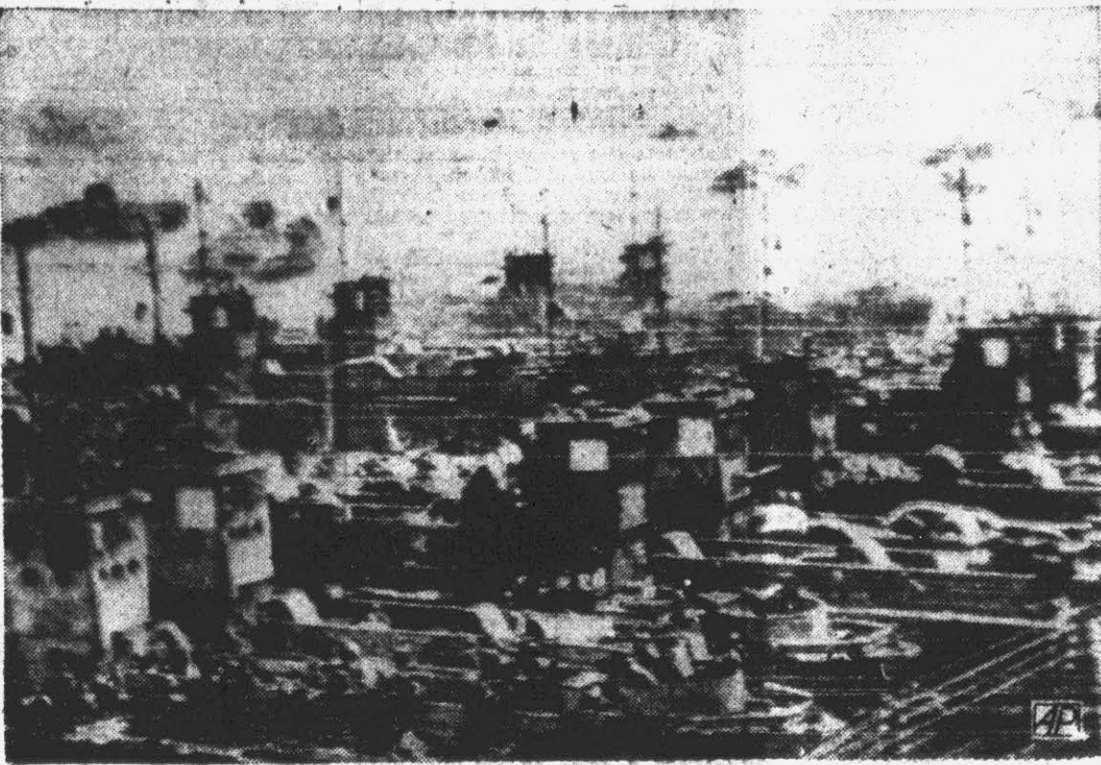

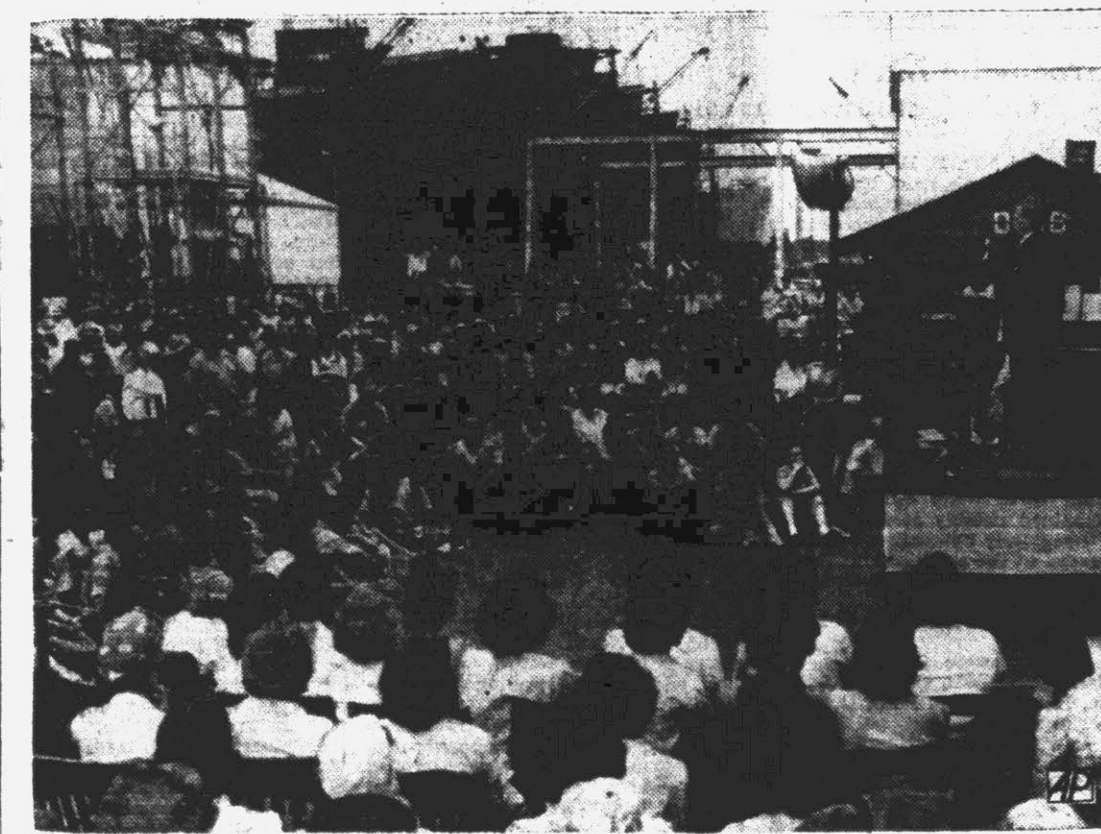

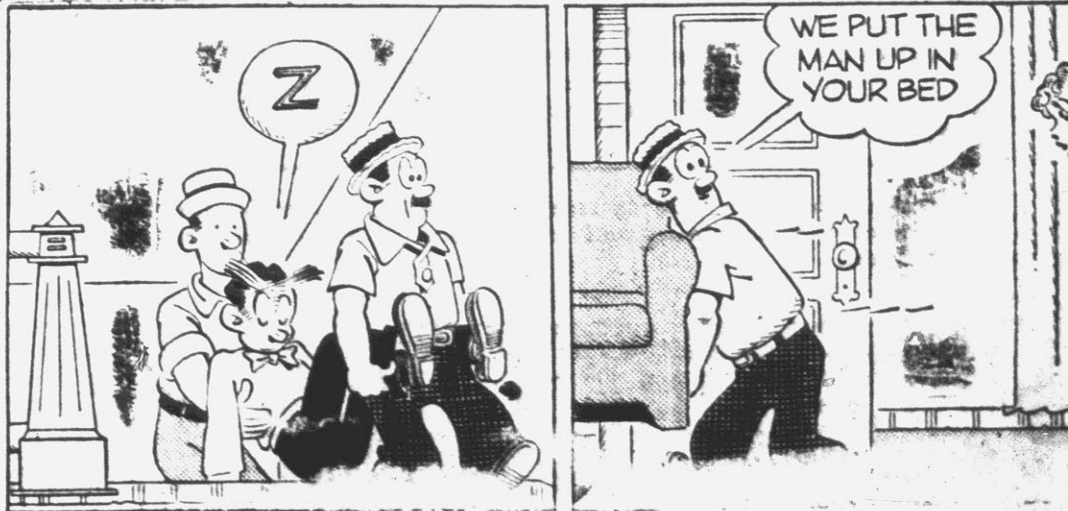

diction has been accepted by the United States. Ordinarily acceptance of exclusive jurisdiction by the United States would be indicated by the filing of a notice of declaration in the governor's office.

The informant said that Kluge and other generals argued that the expenditure of men and material in such a local thrust would leave the Nazi army dangerously vulnerable should the Russians suddenly mount an offensive elsewhere, particularly if it is being contained, as the Russians now are claiming.

Hitler, however, according to the informant, was reported to have insisted on the strongest possible effort being made in an effort to re-establish his own prestige as a strategist as well as to improve the German army's position.

Hitler is using upwards of 30 divisions, including 15 armored, which is believed to be approximately one-half of all the German mechanized divisions on the eastern front, the source reported. He said that many troops have been drawn from Field Marshal von Manstein's army farther south, and that the army generals are already gravely worried over the weakening of their strategic reserves.

The Germans were reported to have originally set June 16 as the date for a limited offensive, pivoting on the Orel salient, and which was to represent their main 1943 offensive, in contrast with the attack from the Baltic sea to the Black sea in June, 1941, and that from the Ukraine to the Caucasus in 1942. This, the informant said, was postponed because Field Marshal von Bock discovered what he felt was a serious shortage of front-line supplies.

Bock's obstinacy against the arguments of such generals as Lieut. Gen. Eberhard Wehrmoldt resulted, according to the informant, in a conflict that promoted Hitler's influence and gave the fuhrer the opportunity to assume command of the Kursk bulge operations on the basis of the initial advances of the Kluge attack, which it was recalled, the Germans at first insisted was not a real offensive.

American base on Amchitka island in the Aleutians and only 630 nautical miles southwest of the newly conquered island of Attu. Long range American bombers could hit the base from either of those places, provided base facilities were available.

A navy communique yesterday disclosed that a group of army Liberator and Mitchell heavy and medium bombers and Navy Catalina patrol bombers successfully attacked four Japanese cargo ships 280 miles southwest of Holtz Bay, Attu Island. This put the attack on a direct line between Amchitka and Paramushiro and almost midway between the two bases.

the two damaged destroyers with their cannon.

"The attack was so devastating that the destroyer was left blazing with no chance for survival. The convoy was a precious prize.

"Two large troop ships had been spotted hugging the coast of Corsica. The leader of one flight of Beaufighters, wing commander N. B. Harvey, whose home is at Cairo, attacked the bigger two-funnelled troopship from such close range he could plainly see enemy soldiers crowded on the decks.

"His torpedo headed straight for the target. A few minutes later pilot officer L. T. Garland, an Ulsterman, attacked the smaller ship and probably hit it."

The preceding day the torpedo planes made their first attack on two vessels off eastern Sardinia and within six minutes a merchant ship

had at least three jagged torpedo holes in it. An hour later a second merchant ship was attacked with similar results.

Another attack was made at the same time on another convoy sailing toward Sicily from Naples, escorted by destroyers. One merchant ship and two destroyers were hit and a British pilot said: "It's unlikely that either the freighter or one destroyer reached harbor. They both were listing and smoking when we left."

A German broadcast recorded by the Associated Press said that bombs had dropped at four places in Switzerland, but caused no casualties. One British plane, it broadcast said, crashed near Bouvet on Lake Geneva, killing the crew of four.

Even before the night raiders had returned, formations of Allied aircraft were seen setting out across the English channel in the direction of northern France to continue the offensive against Europe by daylight.

Some were heard returning an hour later from the direction of Boulogne.
