Russian Counterattacks Have Dislodged Nazis Along Belgorod Border

Soviet And Nazi Tanks Exchange Spectacular Blows In Renewed Slugging; Russians Cut German Lines Near Orel; Red Air Activity Increases

Moscow, July 15.—(AP)—The Red army has halted the attacking Germans everywhere in the Belgorod sector and have dislodged them from several positions with local counter-attacks which are gaining momentum daily, dispatches from the Russian front said today.

The Germans meanwhile have discontinued their attacks altogether on the other end of the Kursk salient, where they tried in vain to breach the Orel sector.

At the same time the Red air force resumed its night operations

London, July 15.—(AP)—A special Russian communiqué announced tonight that the Red army had gone over to the offensive against Orel, 200 miles south of Moscow, and advanced 12 to 15 miles on a 25-mile front north of Orel and captured over 50 populated places.

The communiqué, broadcast from Moscow and recorded by the Soviet newspaper, said a second drive upon Orel from the east resulted in an advance of 12 to 15 miles on an 18-mile front and the capture of 60 inhabited facilities.

Two thousand Germans were captured east of Orel and 12,000 killed, the announcement said.

Captured booty included 40 tanks, 210 guns and 187 mortars, the announcement said, and 109 tanks, 47 guns and 294 planes were destroyed.

with a fierce attack on the Orel railway junction.

The German Thursday communiqué said numerous attacks and counter-attacks were repulsed in continued heavy fighting on the Orel and Belgorod sectors, but made no claim of any Nazi advances.

Pravda said one of the great battles on the Belgorod sector was fought along a Russian-held highway. The battle lasted for three days the paper reported, with the Germans constantly attempting to push through to the north. After only minute progress the Nazis consolidated.

Pacific Supply Problem Solved

Pearl Harbor, T. H., July 15.—(AP)—Problems of supply and reinforcement for America's fighting men in the Pacific have been overcome in large measure, says Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, and with "forces of all out" services coordinating their operations most successfully, the initiative is certain to remain in American hands.

The Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific fleet made his encouraging report yesterday in ceremonies held aboard a submarine to honor members of the fleet's submarine and air personnel for valor and distinguished accomplishment.

"New ships and planes and troops trained and fully equipped for battle now are coming into the Pacific in satisfying numbers to insure our maintaining the initiative," Nimitz said.

Meanwhile our submarines continue their destruction of enemy shipping—shipping Japan can ill afford to lose—much of it within gun range of important Japanese bases.

Urge Farmers Continue Tobacco Control Plan

Raleigh, July 15.—(AP)—A steering committee headed by E. Y. Floyd of the N. C. State College extension division will campaign intensively throughout North Carolina for an affirmative vote on the tobacco quota plan in a referendum July 24.

Rep. John H. Folger, speaking yesterday at a meeting of agricultural and civic leaders of the state, urged that growers vote for continuance of quotas.

He asserted that passage of the quota plan would guarantee a fair price for tobacco next year and would deter farmers from turning away from essential food crops to increase their leaf acreage.

Folger told his hearers that "we cannot afford to open the door to tobacco production to people who think they can go into it successfully but whose efforts will only serve

SEES BITTER FIGHT AHEAD

Patterson Warns That Heavier Casualties To Be Expected

Washington, July 15.—(AP)—The Sicilian campaign is progressing far ahead of schedule, but sharp fighting and heavy casualties must be expected when the imminent battle comes with strong Axis forces on the island, Undersecretary of War Patterson reported today.

He said the current phase of the campaign calls for "consolidation and enlargement of our beachheads, reinforcing and supplying our troops advancing inland in preparation to meet the inevitable counter-attack by mobile forces of the Axis."

Patterson told his press conference that the "good fortune" by which heavy casualties were escaped in the first few days of the campaign "may not be repeated in subsequent operations."

Patterson warned against considering the campaign on Sicily as the opening of a "second front," saying "I would rather think of it as the first step in liberating Europe."

The invasion and ultimate conquest of Sicily, he said, would be a great step toward victory "but it won't be quick or easy. Sicily, after all, is a long way from Berlin and Tokyo."

Turning to the Pacific phase of the global war, he said that other steps toward victory were being taken in advances against the Japanese air base at Munda on New Georgia island in the Solomons but that "enemy resistance is stiffening and heavy fighting may be expected."

In New Guinea, where General MacArthur's forces are driving toward Salamaua, he said that "the old factory and warehouse employees have gone to other parts of the country and are working at war industry centers. The new workers may never have worked anywhere before under Social Security and will have need to apply for a Social Security Account Number Card if a person expects to work during this coming tobacco season, which will open here next month, he should apply now for a Social Security number so that he will be prepared when the markets open."

Applications may be made by mail or in person.

RAF BOMBERS POUND NAZIS

Axis Railways Blasted; Heavy Air Fighting Today

London, July 15.—(AP)—The German radio, in a broadcast recorded by the Associated Press, said violent aerial fighting had been taking place tonight over northern France and the English channel.

Polkett, Eng., July 15.—(AP)—Great formations of Allied planes, believed to include bombers, streamed across the English channel late today in the direction of northern France.

Observers reported counting a large number of RAF fighters in one escorting formation.

Anti-aircraft gunfire on the continent to the right of Boulogne and more in the direction of Le Touquet could be seen from the English coast.

London, July 15.—(AP)—RAF fighter planes maintained the Allied aerial offensive over western Europe last night with harassing attacks on German's hard-pressed transportation system, the Air Ministry news service announced.

PRODUCTION IS STILL BEHIND

Patterson Says June Supplies Below Schedule

Washington, July 15.—(AP)—June production for the army fell substantially below schedule for the second consecutive month, acting Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson announced today.

"Production for the second six months of the year must be considerably increased over that of the first six months in order to carry out the 1943 timetable of military requirements," he reported.

Approximately three-fifths of over-all army supply requirements for 1943, including aircraft, remained to be met, he said.

The total of planes manufactured in June was only slightly above May and was below schedule, Patterson said. The average weight of planes delivered continued to increase, an indication of increasing production of bombers and other heavier combat types. Last month's production in terms of airframe weight was three per cent higher than in May, and tactical planes were 70 per cent of the total as against 68 per cent of the May production.

The supply of 100 octane gasoline for aircraft is "still tight, and will be for some months to come," Patterson said, but the recent granting of a higher priority rating to this program is expected to accelerate production.

Georgia Markets To Open Season July 27

Tobacco buyers, warehousemen and others will shortly begin their annual migration to the Georgia and Florida tobacco markets.

The Georgia-Florida markets will open the season on July 27. Most of the tobaccoists will leave here the last of the week.

The border markets will open on August 3.

The eastern bright leaf belt markets will open the season on Tuesday, August 24.

Allies Renew Offensive On Japs In New Guinea

Closing In Near Salamaua Base; Japs Claim American Setbacks Near Munda

Allied Headquarters in the Southwest Pacific, July 15.—(AP)—American and Australian troops in the New Guinea theater, keying their attack to the continuing all-American drive against Munda 700 miles to the east, are closing in on Japanese positions in the Mubo area "for decisive action."

This new offensive, announced in a special statement tonight from General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters, was said by an official spokesman to be designed to clear the long-contested Mubo zone of all enemy troops and pin the Japanese back to their lines around Salamaua, on the eastern New Guinea shoreline 12 miles to the north.

As a preliminary success, the Allied forces captured Green Hill one of the key strongpoints in the Mubo defense system, following continued pressure against Japanese positions from both ground and air, the announcement said. In addition, an enemy force of medium size "has been cut off at Mubo."

Allied patrols were reported engaged in intermittent clashes with the Japanese north of Salus lake, which is only seven miles south of Salamaua, the center of enemy strength in New Guinea.

The pattern of extermination now launched by the Allies at Mubo followed closely that already unfolding before the Japanese airbase of Munda, on New Georgia island in the central Solomons.

Both had their precedents in the campaigns of last winter to eliminate the enemy from Buna, New Guinea, and from Guadalcanal. The Munda action, at least, had even greater hopes for quick success.

The Japanese defenders of Buna, who faced a less formidable American air force prolonged the fight with men and supplies, spoke to them at night on coastal barges. The enemy tried the barge method yesterday in the Munda sector, with dire results.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Increased Axis resistance is reported from Sicily today but the incubation of the Allied invasion has proceeded far enough so that we can do no harm by counting that chicken and looking about for other fields to conquer.

There seems to be a widespread expectation here at home that the next major venture of the beautifully synchronized United Nations fighting machine will be occupation of the Italian mainland. Indeed, a Madrid dispatch this morning says the Germans believe this will be the program if experience in Sicily leads the Allies to think Italy is ripe for the plucking. The Nazis are said to be rushing preparation of defenses in northern Italy.

A drive into Italy could happen, of course, but so could one or more of several other things. As a matter of fact, this uncertainty in itself represents a tactical triumph for the Allies. They've so cleverly mixed the pieces of the big-saw puzzle of invasion that the Axis has been wholly unable to fit it together thus far. Even after it was perfectly clear that Sicily was to be one of the first points of attack, Berlin and Rome were fooled as to the exact time and place of landing.

Allied Invasion Forces Push Deeper Into Sicily

ALLIED AIRMEN BLAST MESSINA

Sicilian Supply Port Under Constant Bombing

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, July 15.—(AP)—The full weight of the Allies' overwhelming air power was turned against Messina when hundreds of medium and heavy bombers struck one of the war's heaviest blows yesterday and the night before against that guardian of the strategic water jump between Sicily and Italy.

Other Allied airmen dealt punishing blows to enemy communications throughout Sicily, destroying a large number of vehicles, while Allied fighters put up a tight screen over the battle area and knocked down three of the small number of enemy planes they encountered.

At the same time, torpedo-carrying planes operating over the Tyrrhenian sea blew up one enemy tanker, set fire to another and left a merchant ship in a sinking condition.

It was announced officially that Allied planes now are operating from bases recently captured by the invasion forces in Sicily.

More than 200 Flying Fortresses, Mitchells and Marauders were thrown against Messina, the main entry point for Axis supplies from the continent, in yesterday's devastating daylight attack. They encountered intense barrages of anti-aircraft fire but plowed through the curtain of steel to rain explosives on their targets.

The crews said it was difficult to observe the results because of billowing clouds of smoke which rose as the bombs exploded.

"It was a lot better than our first attack on this target, thanks to the superiority we've gained in the air," said Sgt. Kenneth C. Thompson of Ventura, Calif. "The Lightnings that escorted us deserve a lot of credit."

The importance of Messina is increasing hourly as Axis ground resistance stiffens in Sicily. With the Allies firmly in control of both the air and sea, this city which is only a short ferry ride from the Italian mainland is virtually the only available port through which the enemy can bring in reinforcements and supplies.

NEW CODE FOR STORES ISSUED

Nelson Lays Down Plan For Selling Practices

Washington, July 15.—(AP)—A wartime code of selling practices, aimed at discouraging excess buying and thus heading off the rationing of clothes, was laid down for textile dealers today by War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson.

The declaration of policy dooms for the duration all "scarcity" advertising and such remarks by store clerks as "you had better buy several of these—we may not get any more."

Even the time-honored price comparison appeal—"our price \$6.95, regularly \$8.95"—must be eliminated from advertising unless the sale is a genuine clearance, and the word "sale" must be shunned. The only permitted price comparison is with the government ceiling.

The code was worked out with representative of large and small retailers by Arthur D. Whiteside.

Says Sicily One Of Many Fronts

Washington, July 15.—(AP)—The Allied invasion of Sicily is only "the first of many fronts in the campaign of Europe," Director Elmer Davis of the Office of War Information (OWI) said today.

Davis, leaving for New York from where he will depart shortly for London and possibly North Africa, said he believed Allied commanders "expected more opposition on the beaches than they got," but cautioned that tough fighting undoubtedly lies ahead.

Davis said he was going to London to inspect the OWI office there and he did not know how long he would stay. He said he might go on to North Africa "if it develops that I can do any good there," but would not take up the airplane space otherwise.

OPPOSE DRAFT OF MANPOWER

Reynolds Predicts Measure Will Be Defeated

Washington, July 15.—(AP)—Opposition to compulsory manpower legislation under present conditions was expressed today by chairman Reynolds (D-N.C.) of the Senate Military committee who declared the army is growing to a size where its drain on civilian workers ought to halt soon.

Reynolds predicted in an interview that sponsors of the Austin law to compulsory manpower demand action on the measure soon after Congress returns from its summer recess, but he said there would be a strenuous fight to squelch it. The bill would make both men and women subject to compulsory civilian service, if that became necessary.

"I would have to think a long time before I would vote to draft workers, to break up families and to send men and women to work in different parts of the country from where they live," Reynolds said. There is a great difference, he added, in drafting men for military service and in compelling them to work for another who profits from

Bowles May Be OPA General Manager

Hartford, Conn., July 15.—(AP)—Douglas J. Bennett, chief information officer for the State OPA said he had learned that Chester Bowles, 42-year-old director of the Connecticut Office of Price Administration, had been offered the general manager's post of the National OPA by Director Prentiss M. Brown.

Bowles, now on a sailing boat cruise of waters off the Massachusetts coast and unavailable immediately, probably would have complete control under Brown, of OPA operations, Bennett said.

Bennett said "neither Mr. Brown nor I have been able to make contact with him."

The report came on the heels of yesterday's resignation by Lou R. Maxon, Deputy OPA Administrator, who had asked for the general manager's post.

Time Grows Short For Drive To Retake Kiska

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—The navy reported today that an American light warship bombarded Japanese defense positions on Kiska island Wednesday, making the fourth surface attack on the enemy base in an eight-day period. Enemy guns did not reply.

Kiska was shelled previously on July 6, July 9, and July 11. The attacks were the first by surface craft since August 1942, and might presage an amphibious assault designed to crush the strong Japanese garrison on Kiska and restore the island to American control.

Heavy Nazi Counterattacks Hurdled Back By British Near Catania; Axis Expected To Make Main Stand On Catania Plains; New Gains By Americans

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, July 15.—(AP)—The jaws of an Allied clamp have taken a deeper bite on eastern Sicily after a furious battle in which the British Eighth Army hurled back a powerful counter-attack by Nazi armored forces, headquarters reports said today.

The greatest advance was scored by a combined American, Canadian and British force in the center where a gain of six or seven miles was made in the Ragusa-Vizzini sector on a line parallel with the British east coast push.

Led by Lieut. Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., Americans on the west flank dug into difficult mountains, marking up a gain of about four miles, capturing another important airfield and taking important heights.

Another Italian general, commanding the 54th Napoli division, surrendered his staff south of Vizzini. Vizzini is about 25 miles west and slightly south of captured Augusta, and about the same distance northeast of Gela.

Hurling himself forward against sterner resistance, the British Eighth Army of Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery drove to the town of Brucoli, four miles north of the port of Augusta after weathering a crisis yesterday in which the German armored forces mounted a powerful counter-attack and nearly reached the harbor at one time.

A British brigade in the strategic harbor city, under Allied domination since Monday evening, was isolated temporarily by the furious enemy thrust, but the British coun-

Crop Prospects In Section Promising

Conditions in the farming sections of Pitt County are different this year. Prospects for bumper crops are more promising than in years. Crops in the fields are thriving in a way that will produce for farmers substantial reward for their labors when the harvest is in. Tobacco is putting on weight to the satisfaction of the growers. It now appears that the corn crop will yield more bushels this year than in a long time, and this is in contrast to the dry season last year when the corn crop in some areas was a near failure. Beans and peas and other crops promise bountiful yields. Gardens have thrived in the almost incessant period of showers. Much of the garden crop is being canned and preserved. Very little is coming to the local market.

Mayor Bruce Suter, J. E. Winslow, businessmen and farmers, who were in Raleigh to attend a tobacco referendum meeting yesterday, reported after their ride through the country that crop prospects are excellent. They saw and heard about some fields of tobacco that had flopped, but there is always a bad spot in crops and a bad year in farming. Curing of the tobacco crop is getting into full swing. Early curings show exceptionally good color and a heavy leaf, farmers report. Every available person on farms is busy. They are out there working hard. The farmers who had bad luck with potatoes are now thinking of the tobacco harvest and they have a pretty good idea that the average price to be paid when the market opens is going to be satisfactory and profitable.

year weather conditions make it essential that operations begin as soon as possible.

than 400,000 pounds of high explosives on the battered port, a U. S. army air force communiqué said today.

One Liberator was missing from the raid. The communiqué said the bombers encountered no fighter plane opposition but that anti-aircraft fire over Messina was severe. Great destruction was caused among port and transportation facilities, the report said, direct hits being scored on freight yards and on railway tracks.

The communiqué said a great explosion among naval oil storage tanks was followed by a huge fire, with flames rising high in the air. Numerous other explosions were reported over a wide area between Messina's central railway station and the roundhouse. Railway workshops and a power station also were pounded.

A British Middle East communiqué said that the Liberators also swung across Messina strait to hit San Giovanni on the Italian mainland, scoring hits on railway and harbor installations. It said British Wellingtons attacked an Axis vessel off the coast of Greece Tuesday night, but that results were not observed.

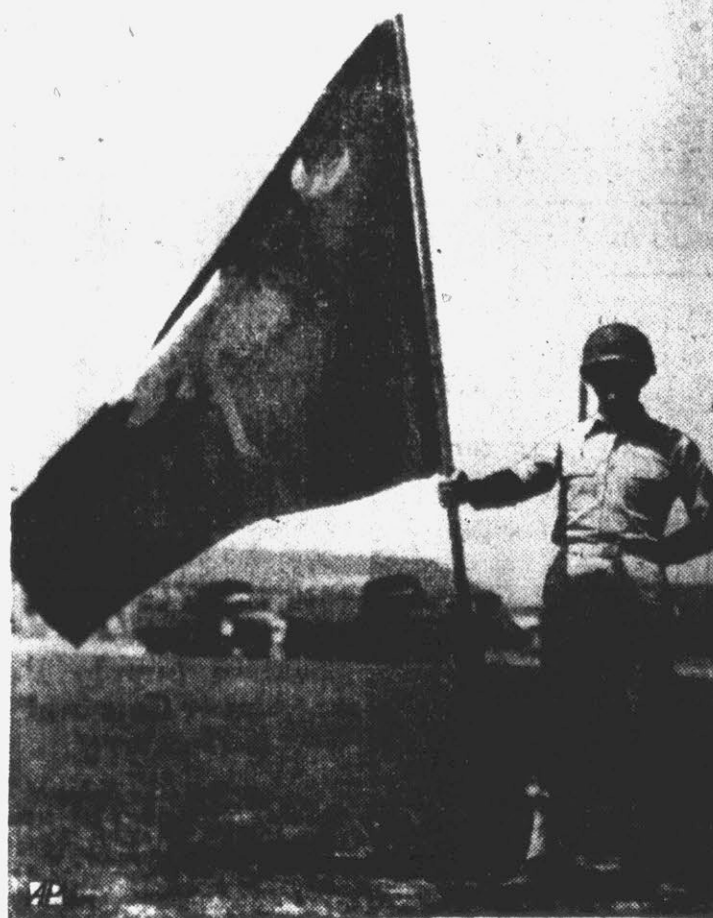

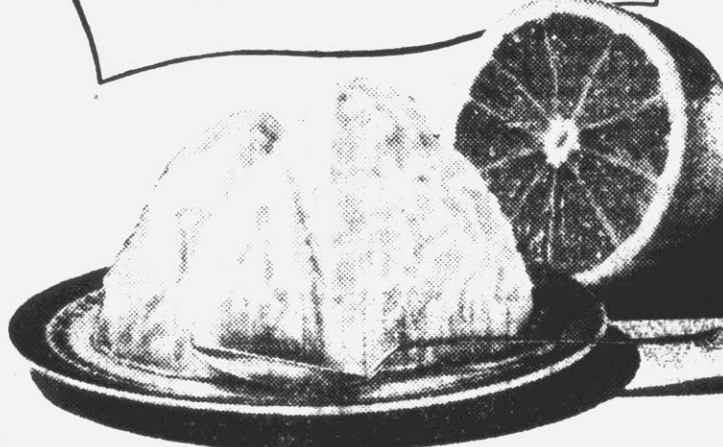

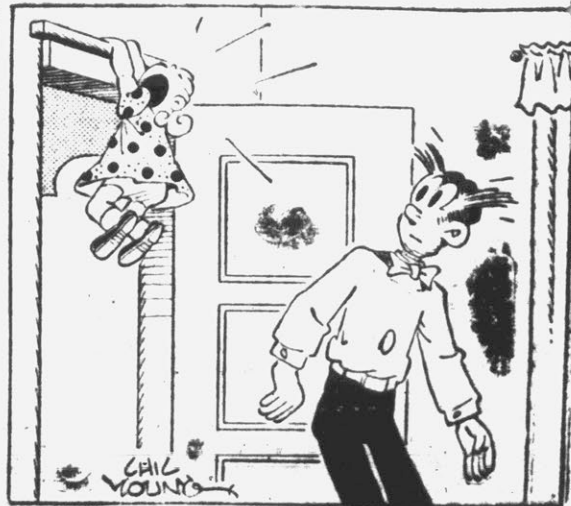

ter-attacked and drove on to Brucoli.

Today's communique from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's headquarters said the British gained "some miles" yesterday and that Augusta was now firmly in Allied hands.

Military sources said the battle at Augusta began at dawn when the German tanks hit the British line and broke through temporarily. But Montgomery immediately reformed his lines and by noon not only had knocked the Germans back but had taken Brucoli and Melilli, six miles to the southwest, as well.

This concerted assault by enemy forces in which the crack German armored Hermann Goering division took part indicated that the Italian and German commanders had shifted the bulk of their forces from positions confronting the Americans in order to block the British path up the east coast.

The Goering outfit previously had received a bad mauling at the hands of the Americans.

Consequently, heavier opposition is expected along the route of the Eighth army, and the latest developments indicated that the Axis commanders have firmly decided to commit their main forces in battle to hold the British and Canadians below Catania, 35 miles up the coast from Augusta.

Italian divisions, too, were reported making a more determined show of resistance.

However, new waves of British and American parachute and glider-borne troops had carried out what the communique called successful operations, and it was disclosed that units of the French army which are now operating in the battle zone are Goums, the terror-inspiring pig-tailed warriors who fought so effectively along the Mediterranean coast in Tunisia.

The Germans are believed to have concentrated considerable strength including tanks and artillery, at the town of Lentini, 13 miles south of Catania and at a road junction where the Catania plain begins.

Hard fighting can be expected before the capture of Lentini takes place, it was said. This center of resistance is about five miles from the coast.

(An NBC correspondent, in a radio report from a British cruiser off eastern Sicily, said the British had captured both Lentini and nearby Carlini.

(Another bombardment of Catania from the sea, after an earlier shelling the previous dawn, was carried out last night, he said, and an Italian armored train which pushed south of Catania was forced to withdraw by naval artillery.

"It was expected that Allied troops would be hammering the gates of Catania during the night if not actually entering the city," he said. His report was dated Wednesday evening.

(The Allied bombardment sent up a solid wall of flame and smoke along 20 miles of the Sicilian coast, he added, and four and six-inch guns were wrenched from their shore emplacements.)

The Americans went forward from the western horn of the Allied front through hilly and difficult country to a strategic area protecting the British flank and at the same time threatening the enemy's rear if he offers battle on the Catania plain.

Capture of Vizzini would give the forces of Gen. Patton control of the first important east-west road north of the coastal network of communications.

Niscomi, was threatening Caltagirone, about 15 miles west of Vizzini.

It was announced that American amphibious jeeps and amphibious two-ton trucks mounting two machineguns are among the new weapons being used in the push.

Some of the Italian prisoners complained that they had had numerous casualties caused by running into their own minefields.

While the ground forces plugged away, aiming to isolate the island and its defenders as they did the African corps in Tunisia, the overwhelming might of Allied airpower was thrown into a drive for the same objective.

The following air and seaplane bases were now included in Allied captures:

Pachino, Biscari, Gela-Forcella, Ponte Olivo, Licata, Syracuse, Comiso and Pozzallo.

In addition one of the Eighth Army's dagger thrusts was aimed at Gerbini and its several surrounding fields on the Catania plains where upon which the Axis has depended heavily for air support in eastern Sicily.

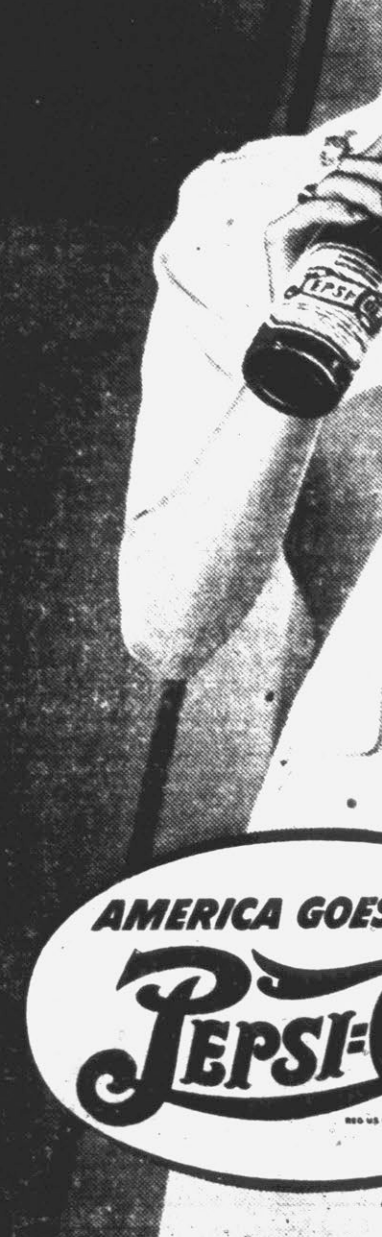

NEWSOM KICKS AGAINST DEAL WITH ST. LOUIS

Bobo Says He Has 'Dirty Deal,' And Won't Play With Browns

By JUDSON BAILEY

Fireworks still are popping among the Brooklyn Dodgers and that loud noise you heard last night was Louis Norman (Bobo) Newsom exploding as he was bounced out of the Brooklyn baseball parlor.

The latest repercussions from the Dodgers' family feud were a statement by Branch Rickey, president of the club, that he would support Manager Leo Durocher to the limit and an announcement that Newsom, the cause celebre of last week's rebellion, had been traded to the St. Louis Browns for a pair of antiquated southpaws, Fritz Ostermuller and Archie McKain.

Newsom, never at a loss for words, roared in defiance: "I don't want to play in St. Louis. I won't play in St. Louis and I'm not going to report."

"I got the dirtiest deal any ball player ever got. I've been the goat all the way through this thing. I guess I'll have to quit and I will quit before reporting to St. Louis. I heard about this only yesterday afternoon and I offered to buy my release from the Brooklyn club, but was refused."

Whether or not the boisterous Bobo goes through with his threat remains to be seen. Changing uniforms is no novelty to him for even before today he was the most traded pitcher in the big leagues and in 13 seasons in the National and American leagues had played variously with Brooklyn, the Chicago Cubs, Boston Red Sox, Detroit Tigers, Washington Senators and St. Louis Browns. In fact, during his long career he had been with the Browns, Brooklyn and Washington twice each.

Newsom, if he reports, should help the Browns. He won 20 games for them in both 1938 and 1939 and in 1940 he won 21 and lost only five in leading Detroit to the American league pennant.

His pitching this year has been the most consistent of any of the Dodger hurlers and his present record of nine victories and four defeats is one of the best in the National league. Although the Dodgers need southpaws, Ostermuller and McKain, both veterans now relegated to relief roles, cannot be expected to match Newsom's work.

But Rickey felt that either Durocher or Newsom would have to go as the result of the insurrection of the players last Saturday, when they revolted because Newsom had been suspended for what the manager later termed "general insubordination" and more specifically described as refusal to follow pitching instructions.

Rickey said he would not have let Durocher resign, even if the manager had wanted to, and that he was right in disciplining Newsom. "No coaches, players, or anybody else can tell a manager how to run his ball club," he asserted, and added, "I will continue to give him my loyal support."

Just how the players, who revolted over a three-day suspension for Newsom, would react to the banishment of their star pitcher was a problem which puzzled some observers.

In any case the blow-up apparently has blasted any Brooklyn hopes of winning the National league pennant and it was enough to make even the stoutest Dodgers take to a sick bed. Literally it did, because Rickey was confined to his bedroom all day yesterday by an attack of indigestion.

The confusion among the dodgers may make it difficult for some fans to concentrate on the pennant races again immediately, but nevertheless the major leagues were to resume their schedule today after a three-day intermission for the all-star show. Three contests were on tap in each circuit, with five of the six games being slated at night.
