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# Red Armies Cut Down Nazi Escape Corridor In The Kharkov Area

**Russians Approaching Two Remaining Railway Escape Lines; New Drive Toward Bryansk Gain Four To Six Miles; Germans Sustain Heavy Losses**

Moscow, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Red army troops, slogging their way ahead through dogged German resistance south of Kharkov, today were approaching the two remaining railway escape lines supplying the Nazi garrison inside the key Ukraine bastion.

A Soviet communique last night announced the capture of Zymov, 20 miles south of Kharkov, in a "decisive assault" which smashed the enemy's strongest point and killed 1,200 Hitler shock troops. Zymov is less than 10 miles from the Kharkov-Lozova railway, main enemy supply line.

The British radio, in a broadcast recorded by NBC, reported today that Russian forces had moved to within nine miles south of Kharkov. It reported that the Russians had cut only the two remaining escape lines after capturing Zymov, 20 miles south of Kharkov.

A few miles behind lies the Kharkov-Krasnodar spur, which also must be severed before the Russians can close the Kharkov escape corridor, now less than 30 miles wide. The Kharkov-Poltava railway had been cut earlier in the Red offensive.

Northwest and west of Kharkov the Russians also reported overall gains of seven miles which resulted in capture of more than 50 additional towns and villages. Stubbornly contesting every fortified place, the Germans slowly fell back after suffering 2,000 casualties, the communique said.

In the northeastern suburbs of shell-wrecked Kharkov, meanwhile, Soviet shock troops kept up the ceaseless street-to-street battle against reinforced Nazi units which has been going on for the better part of a week.

In the wheeling movement south of Kharkov, which took them across the Donets river to Zmynov, the Soviet battalions were said to have scooped up great quantities of enemy war material, including mortar batteries, machine guns and trucks which the Germans left behind in their hasty retreat.

At the northern end of the 400-mile active front, converging Russian divisions were blasting the approaches to Bryansk from three sides, and Soviet dispatches said 1,500 German dead were counted on the battlefields. North of Bryansk. (Continued on Page Eight)

## Trouble Spreads Throughout Italy

Madrid, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Reports from Italy, brought here during the last three days by passengers arriving in planes and one group which crossed through France, indicate that the Italian army is not only anxious to quit fighting but is now actually disintegrating, with thousands of desertions.

These reports add that strikes were spreading throughout northern Italy and that peace demonstrations which started in the north are now extending through central Italy.

The highways and byways of central and southern Italy, according to one person, were "streaming with Italian deserters." There were so many, this person who left Naples Monday added, that the military police were powerless to halt them. Some, he said, even hoisted and cheered the Germans moving north.

## IS PRECARIOUS

**Sea And Air Forces Take Toll In South Pacific**

Allied Headquarters in the South Pacific Aug. 19.—(AP)—Japan's hour of reckoning in north-eastern New Guinea—left wing of the Allies' South Pacific offensive—has been brought much nearer by air blows too staggering to permit early recovery.

At Wewak, a once potent force of 225 planes were reduced to an impotent 10 in two spectacular raids by our bombers and fighters Tuesday and Wednesday. Japanese fighters and ground crewmen killed exceeded 1,500.

Down the coast 350 miles, the Japanese air base town of Salamaua is largely in ruins from more than 1,000 tons of bombs dropped within the past month by Americans and Australians.

Five miles below Salamaua, in the jungles and on the mountain ridges, Japanese troops are fighting to keep Allied jungle forces from capturing the airfield. Bombed and machinegunned frequently by Allied planes, these troops have need of air support such as was wiped out on the ground at Wewak.

They likewise need the supplies and reinforcements which the Japanese try to sneak down by barges and small boats. Yesterday Allied planes blew up several of these barges near Salamaua.

Today's communique from Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters reported that Allied bombers and fighters went back yesterday to the Wewak area airbases where on Tuesday all but 52 of a fleet of 225 enemy planes were either destroyed or damaged. Thirty of the 52 were shot down.

Then the raiders methodically bombed and strafed the dromes for hours until only 10 of the fleet remained intact.

In the Solomons, below Vella Lavella island which U. S. troops captured last Sunday, American warships Tuesday night intercepted four Japanese destroyers escorting barges believed bound for the enemy's air base of Vila, on Kolombangara. (Continued on Page Five)

## Governor Opposes Labor Day Holiday

Raleigh, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Terming it "particularly unfortunate," Governor Broughton has lodged a protest with the sales committee of the U. S. Tobacco Association against its action in calling a holiday on tobacco markets on Labor Day, September 6.

Telegraphing his protest yesterday, the governor urged that the markets be kept open, saying that in view of the "drastic labor shortage" every possible day of work is needed to enable farmers to harvest essential food and feed crops.

## Rome Developments Veiled In Secrecy

Stockholm, Aug. 18.—(Delayed)—(AP)—Swedish correspondents in Rome indicated a major development occurred in Italy today but "no" prevented disclosure of the news in regular dispatches.

There was nothing to indicate what this development might be. In London there was speculation it might involve the fall of Marshal Pietro Badoglio's government but it was only last night that Badoglio addressed the people of Italy and Italy. There also were reports of German and Italian friction as German forces were said to move northward.

## Planes Wreck Jap Position In China

Chungking, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Liberalists of the U. S. 14th Air Force today said a Japanese troop and supply concentration point near Hanoi Tuesday wrecking more than 28 large buildings and many smaller buildings in a shower of fragmentation bombs, a U. S. air communique announced today.

The Liberators also scored direct hits on motor and artillery storage areas, and set two fires in storage dumps.

**SEEK TO AVERT COAL STRIKES**

**More Pay And Penalty Threats May Be Effective**

Washington, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Some government officials expressed hope today that new opportunities for the miners to fatten their pay envelopes on the one hand and stiff penalties for striking on the other may prove to be the pattern for averting another coal strike.

Higher earnings will be possible for most miners when Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes' plan to raise the minimum wage from seven to eight hours soon. While the miners will have to work longer to increase their pay, they will receive, nevertheless, time and a half for the eighth hour.

Penalties will strike at the treasury of the United Mine Workers under the compliance weapon which President Roosevelt handed to the WLB yesterday. The test of this compliance policy is not expected until Ickes restores the mines to private ownership.

When UMW President John L. Lewis and his policy committee announced their unilateral agreement effective until October 31 they said it would "automatically terminate" if the mines were turned back to their owners sooner.

When Lewis laid down those terms he also was defying or ignoring the WLB.

Since then, Congress enacted the war labor disputes act. Also since then, Lewis has recognized the board and appeared before it in support of a proposed contract between the union and Illinois operators. The latest factor with which Lewis must contend is the WLB.

## To Ration Stoves Beginning Aug. 24

Washington, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Nation-wide rationing of new domestic heating and cooking stoves which burn coal, wood, oil or gas will begin August 24, the OPA announced today.

Consumers wanting to obtain a rationed stove must obtain a certificate from their War Price and Rationing Board OPA said and dealers are required to secure the coupon from purchasers starting August 24.

The action was taken to assure distribution of the limited number of new stoves to users needing them most, OPA declared.

## Nazi Government Has Left Berlin

**Hitler's Newspaper Given As Source Of Report By Algiers Radio**

London, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The United Nations radio at Algiers today broadcast a Bern dispatch quoting Adolf Hitler's newspaper Voelkischer Beobachter as saying that "the whole German government has left Berlin."

The broadcast was recorded by the Associated Press.

There was no immediate explanation or confirmation of the report. The statement that the "whole German government" had moved came as a climax to reports the past three or four weeks that some governmental departments were being transferred.

These reports—none of which had any official confirmation—told of great vans being loaded at the doors of Berlin ministries and rolling away—possibly to Vienna, Linz and Breslau.

Neutral reports also have told of the moving of some governmental offices to Vienna shortly after the Germans announced that they were withdrawing non-essential civilians from Berlin.

One Britisher said that if the report is true it undoubtedly is inspired by the fear of a "Hamburg" bombing which in a single night might destroy tons of records and create chaos in the governmental machinery.

There also was the possibility that removal of the government might be a forerunner of an attempt such as that of Rome, to obtain an "open city" status for the Reich capital.

This was regarded as doubtful, however, due to the great concentration of electrical and other factories in the Berlin area and its importance as a transportation center linking the eastern front with western and southern Europe.

## Wallace Praises Free Enterprise

Washington, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Vice President Wallace declared today that his recent criticism of corporations was aimed only at the small minority.

He coupled a blessing for the profit system with an assertion that free enterprise must be preserved in the nation's postwar economic life.

Wallace called in newsmen to declare that a recent speech in Detroit, in which he accused some big corporations of monopolistic practices, had been "misunderstood and misinterpreted" as a general attack on the corporate form of business organization.

Declaring such an implication definitely was not his intent, he said: "Ninety-five to 98 per cent of the corporations are harmless or beneficial, and suffer just as much from the small minority as any other group in the population."

And for that 95 to 98 per cent, Wallace expressed this wish: "God bless 'em if they can make profits."

The corporate form of organization, he declared, "is essential in a democratic country like the United States for efficient carrying on, not only of large scale business, but also many types of small business."

Hull Leaves For Quebec

Washington, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull will leave Washington this afternoon for Quebec to participate in the Allied conference there.

The secretary told his press conference he would be accompanied by James C. Dunn, political adviser to the secretary of state, and by his secretary George W. Renchard.

British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden arrived in Quebec yesterday.

## AIR OFFENSIVE STILL GOES ON

**Allied Planes Sweep Across Channel Again Today**

London, Aug. 19.—(AP)—American two-engine Marauder bombers attacked enemy air fields at Poix and Amiens-Glisy in France today, and RAF Mitchells struck Poix later, a joint British-American communique announced tonight.

"Bombing results were good at both targets," said the bulletin, which added that RAF, Dominion and Allied Spitfires escorted the medium bombers on the raids. Other Spitfires and Typhoons made supporting sweeps over northern France.

The American Marauders destroyed one enemy plane while the fighters brought down six. Half a dozen fighters were reported missing from the day's operations.

Coastal observers reported seeing large formations of bombers and fighters roar over the English channel during the forenoon.

RAF fighter-bombers carried out sweeps over France and the low countries last night, destroying a German patrol boat, off Ostend, bombing the Poix airport and shooting up eight railway locomotives, it was announced today.

One of the raiders was listed as missing.

There were no reports of bombings last night by the RAF's heavy bombers, which apparently were grounded by bad weather over the continent after 72 hours of unprecedented and almost continuous activity by both British and American airmen.

## Bigger Air Losses Are Signs Of Increased Might

Washington, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The mounting losses of Allied heavy bombers over Europe the Army Air Forces said today are paradoxically a sign of increasing Allied air might.

They mean, said officers that Britain and America are sending ever greater aerial armies to blast Germany and German-occupied Europe. Numerical losses are higher but the rate of losses is not.

The comment was apropos of reports that large numbers of planes failed to return from recent raids. For instance, the RAF reported 41 bombers and one fighter lost in Tuesday night's sweep against Berlin and Peenemunde, the U. S. 8th Air Force reported 36 heavy bombers, one fighter-bomber and five fighters missing in its attacks on Regensburg and Schweinfurt, and two planes were lost from the Ar-

**Bridges And Power Installations Along Coast 20 Miles North Of Sicily Shelled; Airplanes Blast Italy And Sardinia; Guns Duel Across Strait**

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Aug. 19.—(AP)—American warships shelled the Italian mainland yesterday for the first time, developing violent explosions at Gioia Tauro and Palmi, and Allied air fleets deprived beaten Axis troops of respite by pounding communications throughout southern Italy, it was announced today.

"United States naval forces which had been supporting the advance of the U. S. Seventh Army in Sicily have taken up shelling military objectives on the Italian mainland now that the island has fallen," a communique said.

Specific targets of the first thrust were bridges and power installations at Gioia Tauro and Palmi, on the Gulf of Gioia 20 miles north of Messina.

Light bombers and fighter bombers carried out attacks on roads and railways which might be employed by the remnants of German and Italian forces which escaped from Sicily, getting the tracks and destroying enemy vehicles.

"Medium bombers attacked bridges at Angitola and roads and rail communications at Poggi Di Staletti," it was announced.

Ground activity was "limited to occasional exchanges of artillery fire across the Strait of Messina," headquarters announced.

Fighter-bombers left a small Axis naval vessel in a sinking condition off southern Sardinia and medium bombers sank an enemy merchant craft in the Gulf of Genoa, just north of the Gulf of Bonifacio.

The Bizerte area was again attacked by enemy aircraft last night," a serial communique said. "Six enemy bombers were shot down. Two enemy aircraft were destroyed on the night of August 17. In addition to those already reported."

From all operations, three Allied aircraft are missing, the bulletin said.

While "wrecking crews" of the northwest African air forces chased Axis forces across southern Italy, Middle East squadrons maintained their offensive over the eastern Mediterranean.

Alexis shipping and harbor installations of three Greek islands, Zakre, Melos and Syros were attacked by RAF Sea Hurricanes and Wellington bombers both Tuesday and Tuesday night, a Cairo communique said. (Continued on Page Eight)

## Says Mediterranean Front Will Be OK

Moscow, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The Soviet naval commentator Ivan Yermashev wrote in the newspaper Red Fleet today that the route across the Mediterranean "appears to be the best route to the continent" for opening a second front in Europe.

The newspaper made an implied appeal for an assault that would draw sixty or more German divisions from the Russian front. Previously Russian newspapers have indicated only a smash from England directly across the channel would meet Soviet needs.

Yermashev said "Italy can not be counted at all as a factor at sea between the forces of the Allies and the continent." He said the Axis did not have sufficient surplus power "to parry the blow from the outside."

"The decision is up to the Allied command and any decision taken by the enemy cannot make any difference," he wrote.

**IT PAYS TO BE CAREFUL.**  
If the man in charge of the ground crew of an airplane ever puts his O. K. sign on a plane which is later discovered not to be entirely O. K., that employee is out of a job for good. He never gets a second chance. He can only make one mistake. This policy is based on the realization that one little mistake or oversight may cause the death of scores of people. It doesn't do to give men a second chance when one little mistake could do such damage as this.

It would be a terrible thing of course if standards as severe as this were applied to everything we do. And yet, how much trouble would be saved in every walk of life if we and others would be just a little more careful. There is probably not an industrial plant anywhere which could not increase its output 10 to 20 per cent if its employees would exercise a little more care. Try, for instance, in every way to cut down waste of time and material. The squandering of public money and the inefficiency of many government agencies is an open scandal in almost every country in the world. It always has been. It probably always will be.

Nothing pays better dividends than careful attention to detail. Genius is the capacity to be careful. The difference between the immortals in science, literature, music, etc., and the thousands of their contemporaries now forgotten is largely the difference between men who took much care and men who took little.

## WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

Washington — A secret decoder "plumber" to you and me got a contract from the War Department to install 40 heaters in the senate boxes that surround the White House. State Department and other government buildings here.

He had come to work on the order when, much to his amazement it was changed. Instead of placing the heaters in the senate boxes, the order was changed to install heaters in the Army sergeant's quarters. "Fort heaters for dog-houses," the colonel to whom it went was

too soon out of civilian life to be aware of Army slang. He killed the requisition with the indignation postscript: "I can see no reason for spending taxpayers' money on cod-ding dogs."

Probably the worst pun that ever came out of OPA is this one. There being no ceiling price on snuff, the dippers will have to pay through the nose for the duration.

And one of the big laughs here today is the worry in some pretty high places that the Russians will reach Berlin before the British-American armies do.

The reasons for the laughs are four-fold: (1) That only some months ago the big question was: Can the Russians hold out until we get there?

(2) That if the Russians do get there first the British and Americans will be sitting at the right and left of the peace table and the man presiding will be "Papa" Josef Stalin, whom less than a few years ago both nations had tagged as No. 3 man on the "Liquidation List." (3) That it is a lot further to Berlin from Kharkov and Bryansk than it is from the Straits of Messina or the Channel coasts, which may become a "third front" any day now. And (4) That if the "blood-thirsty" Russians really do start knocking on Germany's front door, the war-wise Huns will open the back door to let the "humanitarian" Allied Nations armies in first.

Lend-Lease has had its ups and downs. But from now on, Washington observers are predicting freely, it won't have such easy going. The principal reason: U. S. industry is getting plenty worried about post-war competition. Why industrialists ask would American taxpayers pour out billions to strengthen foreign industries which will be competitive in post-war world trade?

It probably will take a five-foot shelf of books and several post-war years of world trade realities to answer that question. Nevertheless,

the leaf rooms of some of the present-day warehouses here. The market has expanded until today there is more than 2,000,000 square feet of floor space devoted to tobacco.

During the past quarter-century, the Greenville market sold nearly 1,250,000,000 pounds—and for this tobacco the local warehousemen paid out more than a quarter-billion dollars.

Thus remarkable growth of the market is a result of cooperation by all local tobacco interests and the excellence of Greenville's tobacco warehousemen, buyers, and packers. The market reflects great credit on the fathers of J. S. Ficklen, W. T. Lipscomb, Gus E. Forbes, O. J. Joyner Jr. and other pioneer tobaccoists who gave Greenville such a fine start—and it likewise reflects similar credit on the present array of tobaccoists who have followed in the footsteps of those pioneers.

"All is in readiness for the opening" is the word in Greenville tobacco circles as the beginning of sales in the Bright Belt nears. The sales will start on the morning of Tuesday, August 24.

The same warehousemen who were on the market last year—and for a long string of years—will be on hand to greet the farmers.

Gus E. Forbes and O. J. Joyner again will operate "The Victory," which up to last year was known as "Gorman's." The change in name was made in keeping with the times.

The Smith and Sugg firm again will operate their No. 1 warehouse with both morning and afternoon sales. Their No. 2 warehouse was turned over to the government for storage purposes last year, and the firm transferred all its selling to the No. 1 house. The use of their No. 2 house for storing was part of a program which Greenville warehousemen attended to help the government solve its storage problem—the storage company houses in the local market take care of approximately 20,000,000 pounds of tobacco to be bought for export. A portion of each warehouse is made available as it is needed, but these all ways will be plenty of room for the sale of tobacco.

"Cipri," Simon, Mike, Harvey Ward and Doc Lister are at the Centre Brick Warehouse again; Blues Cannon and Will B. Moore, who for many years have teamed up, will operate the Dixie Warehouse, and at the Barn Warehouse, the operators are R. E. "Dick" Rogers, H. R. "Red" Rogers and Ed Harris.

R. V. "Rube" Keel and James T. Keel are on the job again as operators of Keel's Warehouse. W. Z. Morton is at Morton's Warehouse and again he has a couple of able co-workers, C. H. "Hugh" McGowan still is the head at McGowan's Warehouse and Harry G. Jett again is associated with him.

"If you need 1,000 planes to accomplish your job and your production is 1,000 planes a day, then you can lose 1,000 planes to reach the objective."

"Are Britain and America able to replace their losses? The answer to that is obvious, they are replacing them, and also increasing the size of their forces."

More important is the morale of the men living and fighting the bombers. No one said the armistice had determined the point at which the loss ratio begins to affect the morale of the crews—unless it was the Germans in their "blitz" against Britain.

The air forces assume that at some point the crews would lose their confidence, possibly even their willingness to start out, but it's just an assumption. Much more important to morale, say officers, is knowing that the assignment is carried out regardless of losses.

"It's simple in a place like Sicily, where the results are obvious to everyone," said one airman.

"In western Europe, the results are not so obvious, but just the same the men know the job is being done, and their morale is extremely high."

And anyhow, he added, the whole question is academic, because despite the numerically greater losses, the rate has not increased.

# WILL GERMAN FLEET FIGHT

## British Itch For A Chance To Battle The Tirpitz

With the British Home Fleet—  
(By Mail)—All the world remem-  
bers the spectacular pursuit of  
May, 1941, when the giant German  
battleship Bismarck burst into the  
Atlantic, sank the British battle  
cruiser Hood and in turn was sent  
to her doom in swift revenge.

Today another prize, the powerful  
Tirpitz, sister ship of the Bismarck,  
litters elusively before the eyes of  
Admiral Sir Bruce Fraser's home  
fleet, which has the irksome task  
of pinning down the German flagship  
and other warships in harbors  
where they are concealed.

Will the Tirpitz try to break out?  
That is the chief question in the  
minds of naval experts who direct  
the home fleet. Some believe she  
may attempt it. Others contend the  
Germans know such a venture  
would be suicide. They insist she  
will remain in hiding as long as the  
home fleet stands on guard.

That is the view of a famous  
British admiral commanding a  
cruiser squadron who recently re-  
ceived this correspondent aboard his  
flagship.

He predicted the Tirpitz or any  
other German ship would have as  
much chance of survival "as a dog  
in a meat grinder" if she tried to  
break out.

One thing appears certain. If the  
Tirpitz or any other German war-  
ships appear in the open, they will  
become quarries in a sea and air

chase such as these waters never  
before have seen. It is hard to imag-  
ine how they could escape disaster.  
It would be a great advantage to  
the Germans to be able to harass  
British sea power in these strate-  
gic waters. But no matter what the  
provocation, the Germans rarely  
come out. So the home fleet waits,  
itching for a fight, and goes about  
its business virtually unmolested.

Yet there is always a chance—for  
the British it is a glimmering hope  
—that the German surface fleet  
may start something. The home  
fleet is and always must be alert  
and prepared.

There is also the thought that  
any Allied invasion of the continent  
along the North Sea or Atlantic  
coasts would galvanize the German  
navy into action. It is hard to be-  
lieve the German naval chief of  
staff would allow his ships to remain  
passive as the Italian fleet has done.  
If Allied troops moved against the  
Nazi-occupied shores of Norway,  
the Lowlands or France.

Still, history has shown that in-  
ferior fleets often would rather die  
in bed than in battle.

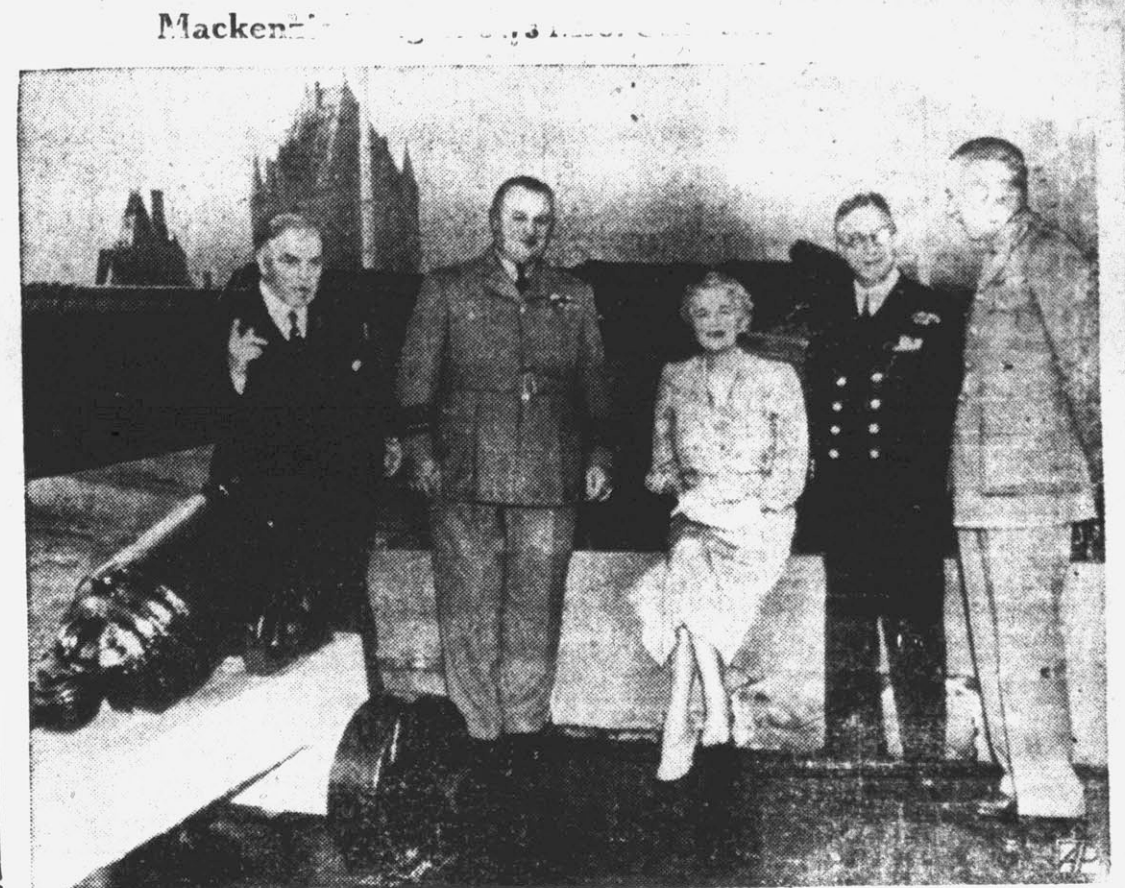

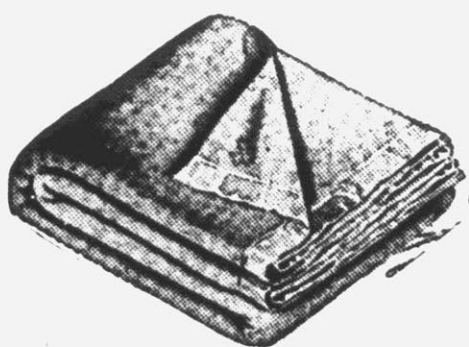

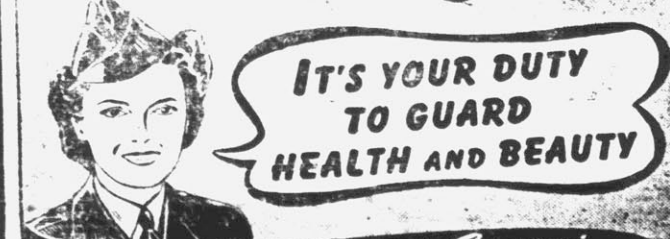

The Brooklyn Dodgers dropped both ends of a double-header to the Chicago Cubs 7-5 and 15-6.

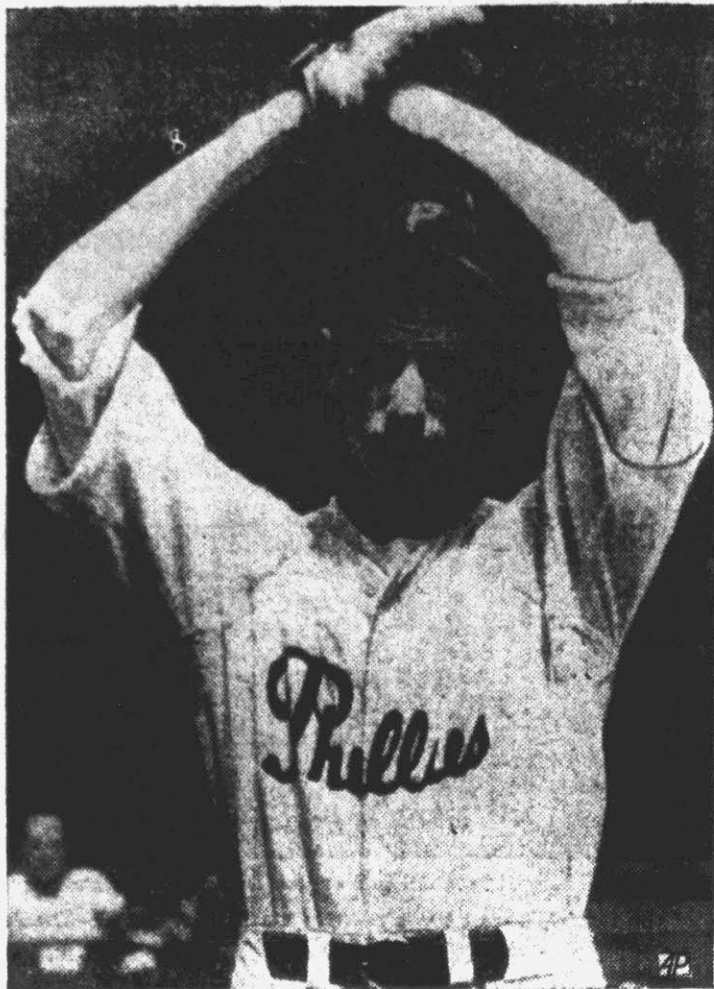
The St. Louis Cardinals divided a mid-day double-header at Philadelphia, winning the first game 6-0 and dropping the second 6-3.

## TUNGSTEN IS FOUND IN N. C.

### Engineer Tells of Big Deposit in Vance County

Rocky Mount, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Robert W. Redwine, industrial engineer for the State Department of Conservation and Development, told the Rotary club here today that a deposit of tungsten—possibly the largest in the western hemisphere—had been discovered in Vance county.

Describing tungsten as the "No. 1 strategic war material" Redwine said the greater part of the metal now being used in this country was being flown in by cargo planes.

The engineer made his disclosure of the reported finding of this rare metal in an address discussing the survey of the state's mineral resources recently made by the Herman A. Brassett Engineering Company of New York.

The Brassett survey showed, he said, that North Carolina had an important quantity of coal and iron ores as well as other strategic materials besides tungsten, including molybdenum, a rare metal found in Halifax county, and mica, which is used, Redwine said, in ev-

ery American plane taking part in the war effort.

He reminded his hearers that congress had recently allotted \$340,000 for surveying the mineral resources of this state.

This appropriation, he said, was due largely to an advertisement of the state's possibilities published under the sponsorship of the advertising committee of the Department of Conservation and Development, which is headed by Josh L. Horne, Rocky Mount publisher.

**Navy Casualty List.**  
Washington, Aug. 19—(AP)—The Navy announced today 38 casualties, including 7 dead, 2 wounded and 29 missing. In addition, one man previously listed as missing now is reported dead, and one who had been reported wounded now is listed as missing.

This brings to 28,666 the total of navy, marine corps and coast guard casualties reported to next of kin since December 7, 1941. The grand total includes 9,860 dead, 5,032 wounded, 9,623 missing and 4,151 prisoners of war.

asked, on the Spas Denenski sector, an advantageous point was stormed and here another 1,000 Nazis were slain in short but fierce fighting, the war bulletin said.

American airmen said targets in southern Italy were becoming increasingly scarce and one hungry pack of Warhawks left the center of the battle area to bomb and strafe Gormosa in southern Sardinia where they found the two-masted naval vessel and hit it with bombs.

Lt. James H. Jones of Dublin, Tex., one of the pilots credited with downing the vessel said, "I saw my bullets striking the mast. They cut into it like a saw and presently it toppled over onto the deck. When we left the flames were pouring from the ship."

Ship-bombing Mitchell added the merchantman to their list of Italian ships bagged already well over 300—when they sighted it off the western coast of the mainland. It was hit repeatedly and suddenly broke in two, the returning pilots said.

"We hit her square with one bomb," reported Lt. Edgar Dorman, of North Philadelphia, Pa., "then we turned back for a low-level attack. She seemed to twitch and turn

Suddenly she went under."  
Palmi and Gioia Tauro are situated on the western side of the mainland where the Gulf of Gioia makes a deep dent in the coast. Palmi is the larger municipality and is nearer Messina than Gioia Tauro. While the American Seventh Army was advancing along the northern coast of Sicily, U. S. warships frequently lent support by smashing enemy concentrations and installations ahead of the troops, but they never before had attacked the mainland of Italy.

British naval forces, however, have bombarded Italy on several occasions.

The heavy toll inflicted upon Axis forces during their brief defense of Sicily was emphasized in headquarters announcements.

It was stated that the entire Italian sixth army was destroyed during the campaign, at least half of the soldiers donning civilian clothes and deserting, filtering back into the villages and hill areas of Sicily. More than 130,000 Italians were captured, killed or wounded.

Officers said the Germans lost two complete divisions, killed, wounded or captured, and a large amount of heavy equipment including an unestimated number of 6-ton Tiger tanks, many of which were seized intact and were capable of being put into immediate operation. This makes a total of five armies Italy has lost since the beginning of the war. The First, Fifth and Tenth were destroyed during the African fighting. The Eighth disintegrated in Russia.

The sixth army originally was composed of two corps comprising 300,000 men with 1,700 guns and 150 tanks. (Presumably, both man-

power and material had been cut appreciably in previous campaigning and by desertions of troops who donned mufti in Sicily).

Appearance of the warships off the western edge of the Italian tide increased the heavy volume of fire already being poured into Italian communications and fixed installations by powerful armadas of Allied bombers.

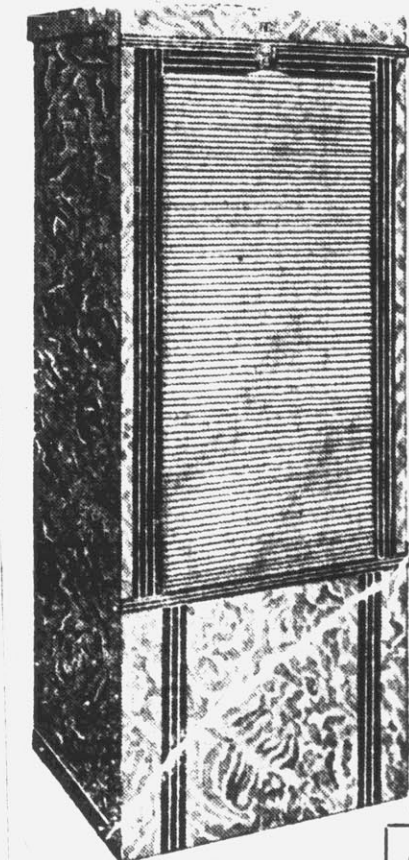

By mutual agreement the DIXIE and CENTRE BRICK will not be connected as in the past.
