NAZIS PUT UP STIFF FIGHT NEAR KHARKOV

Difficult Terrain Slows Russian Drives On Kharkov And Bryansk; Fierce German Counterattacks Checked; Red Airmen Smash Nazi Supply Bases

Moscow, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Difficult going in terrain naturally lending itself to defense was reported slowing down the Red army today as it pressed twin drives on the Nazi bastions of Bryansk and Kharkov.

Front line dispatches to the Soviet army organ Red Star reported that Russian troops on the central front were encountering "considerable difficulties and enormous strain" as they battled their way through forests and swamps and across numerous small rivers toward Bryansk.

The nature of the country, the dispatches said, offered many advantages to the Nazi defenders. On the Kharkov front in the Ukraine, some 240 miles south of Bryansk, Russian troops were said to be encountering stiff resistance in attempts to overcome German defenses based on hills forming a natural line around the city.

Action in this sector was sharpening in the face of mounting German counterattacks, while the Red army air force pounded heavily at bases in the enemy rear in an endeavor to cripple supply routes.

A fierce battle was reported in one area of the front east of Bryansk where Soviet troops were said to have attacked enemy positions based on four villages. The terrain was such, front line dispatches said, that neither side was able to use tanks and infantrymen squeezed it out at close quarters.

Fresh German battalions were reportedly hurled into the fray but were unable to hold off the charging Red army, which methodically cleared one village after the other and threw the Nazis back into a new line the Russians said.

The German air force, meanwhile, was reported striking repeatedly but unsuccessfully at the Soviet communication lines. From dawn to dusk the Russians said, German bombers accompanied by fighters made thrust after thrust only to be repelled by Soviet airmen.

Russian stormtroops retaliated with a continuous bombardment of the German positions at Bryansk and further west.

Fire School Here September 15-16

In a letter to fire companies, Chief George Gardner explained that the program at the first drill school will be designed to fit in with the needs and problems of the fire departments in this part of the state and I feel that by attending you will gain much valuable information to carry back to your department and community. During one of the sessions there will be an open forum for any discussions or questions that you care to bring with you.

For firemen who live a distance too great to return home overnight, arrangements have been made for them at the Service Men's Center in Greenville at a cost of 50 cents per night.

New Food Subsidy Plan Will Be Announced Soon

Washington, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Ranking officials predicted today that the administration's new cost of living subsidy plan will be in operation before Congress returns next month but it will be necessary for the lawmakers to provide the wherewithal.

Because existing subsidies were spared the congressional axe only through a presidential veto, the expectation had grown here that the administration would sidestep further subsidies without an okay by Congress.

FEW FATHERS TO BE CALLED

Only Those In Non-Deferrable Jobs May Be Taken

Washington, Aug. 20.—(AP)—War Manpower Commission spokesmen today saw a "strong possibility" that the only pre-Pearl Harbor draftees to face induction under the October draft quota of about 312,000 will be those in non-deferrable jobs.

They repeated, however, that there had been no change in plans to begin on October 1 the induction of the pre-war father class—those whose children were born before last Sept. 15.

The officials said they had absolutely no confirmation of rumors that there would be any reduction in the previously announced goal of 10,800,000 men and women in the armed forces by the end of 1943. Instead, they said, there were indications that the total might mount even higher, in view of figures released this week by Navy Secretary Knox. Knox estimated the navy, coast guard and marines would have 2,861,000 in uniform by January 1, while the army has set its sights on 8,200,000.

The drafting of fathers faces a frontal assault in both houses when Congress convenes Sept. 14 after its summer recess. Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) has announced he will press for immediate action on his bill to bar the induction of fathers during the remainder of this year, while Chairman May (D-Ky.) of the House Military Committee said he would introduce legislation at once to bar the taking of fathers and possibly providing for the discharge of fathers now in uniform.

Japs In Burma Blasted Again

New Delhi, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Medium bombers of the tenth U. S. Air Force attacked Japanese communications centers in sweeps over central Burma yesterday, a U. S. army headquarters communique announced today, while RAF Moslems blasted the enemy-occupied town of Mawlaik, north of Kalaie.

The American communique said a large number of freight cars, repair sheds and storage buildings were demolished at Thazi junction. At Myintwin, a warehouse was left in flames from direct hits, while more than 30 cars in the railroad yards were smashed. At Nya-U, a "double line of freight cars was covered by bombs."

There were no losses either in planes or personnel in either the British or American operations.

Before the war, more than 30 nations had sent accredited representatives to the Vatican.

Roosevelt And Churchill Mapping Global Strategy

British Spokesman Says Japan Must Reap The Price Of Her Treachery

Quebec, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The imminent arrival this afternoon of Secretary of State Cordell Hull pointed up today the political angles of the Quebec war council and speculation that a conference emissary might go to Moscow.

Anthony Eden, British foreign secretary, who has been here several days, has been mentioned frequently as a likely messenger to carry word of the results of the Quebec meeting to the Soviet capital.

Hull and Eden will dine tonight with President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill, but the absence of Russian representation indicated that decisions which would seal the political future of post-war Europe were unlikely.

Thus the top men in the U. S. State Department and the British Foreign Office would appear to be more concerned with immediate political aspects of the war in Europe and those which will develop as soon as invasions of the continent liberate more Axis-occupied lands.

They involve questions of rehabilitation, government and administration, and of whether the Allies will set up their own military controls or turn governmental functions over to nations of freed territories.

While the President and Churchill talked in the Quebec capital over their war maps and strategy plans, Stephen Early told reporters that when the President leaves here early next week and goes to Ottawa, the Canadian capital, he will not return later to this conference city.

There was a strong, official indication that tremendous new operations against Japan as well as German-occupied Europe were in the making.

Brendan Bracken, British Minister of Information, supplied it. He was the first high participant in the war councils to give any inkling of what was going on behind the guarded portals of Quebec's Citadel, where President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill are mapping strategy which may settle the fate of the world.

"These plans," Bracken told a press conference last night, "are to bomb and burn and, needless to say, in every way available to us, the people."

Goebbels Promises New Secret Weapon

London, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Paul Joseph Goebbels, Hitler's propaganda chief, promised the German people today a new secret weapon may soon give them relief from Allied air raids.

The new weapon against aerial war imposed upon us by the enemy is under construction," he wrote in his weekly article in the propaganda publication Das Reich. "Day and night innumerable busy hands are engaged in its completion."

The text was broadcast by the German radio and recorded by the Associated Press. The article was entitled "The Realities of War."

Greenville Man In Sicily Safe

OWNERS GET MINES BACK

Government Gives Up Control Of Five Mines

Washington, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The government today restored five coal mines to private ownership with the explanation that "government possession of these mines is not necessary to insure uninterrupted wartime coal production."

None of the five mines had a contract with the United Mine workers. Consequently the action by Secretary of the Interior Ickes did not challenge the UMW policy, stated June 23, that John L. Lewis miners would work only as long as government operation continued.

The action was the first step toward returning the mines to their owners since passage of the Smith-Connally anti-strike act.

None of the five mines had experienced strikes.

Ickes said applications for terminating government possession and control of additional mines are under consideration. He is surveying the "production efficiency" of mines in which strikes have occurred, principally mines using UMW labor.

"Preliminary to determining applicability of the provisions of the Smith-Connally anti-strike act relating to the termination of government possession and control over the mines."

Ickes has operated some 3,700 of the nation's major mining properties since May 1, when the first of three general strikes by John L. Lewis miners broke out.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

One of the most interesting pieces of news to come out of Germany since the war began—and it is one of the most important, if true—is the report that the whole Nazi government has abandoned Berlin.

While this is unconfirmed, it does come on the heels of the evacuation of a million residents of the threatened capital. Maybe Hitler's infallible intuition has enabled him to read the Allied program which has been set forth at Quebec by British Minister of Information Brendan Bracken thus pointedly:

"These plans are to bomb and burn and, needless to say, in every way available to us, the people responsible for creating this war."

For any normal government, which of course the Nazi regime is not—desertion of the national capital is like abandonment of ship at sea. It's an act that denotes defeat.

During the height of the terrible aerial blitz which London endured in 1940-41, when the British ship of state was wallowing in mountainous seas, the square-jawed Churchill and his cabinet stuck to the bridge.

JAPS HANG ON TENACIOUSLY TO FOOTHOLDS

Allied Forces Close Within Three Miles Of Salamaua Air-drome On New Guinea

Allied Headquarters in the South Pacific, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Japan's supply line has been cut in the Solomon and sorely strained in New Guinea—the right and left flanks of the Allies' Pacific drive—but the resourceful enemy still has a precarious foothold on New Georgia and clings to Salamaua.

Reports in today's communique from both ends of the 750 mile battle are emphasize clearly the jungle character of the Pacific war and the determination of the Japanese to make the most of the topography.

The communique told of American jungle troops in the Solomons going after pockets of enemy resistance Thursday on atolls and islets only a mile or so west of the Munda airfield on New Guinea which was wrested from the Japanese August 5. On August 15, the Americans occupied Vella Lavella island, 45 miles northwest of Munda, and the communique announcing its capture pointedly explained that the Japanese sea supply line to both New Georgia and Kolombangara had been severed.

Despite that, the Japanese have remained on small isles near Munda, even shelling the field making necessary the liquidation campaign which today's communique disclosed. They also are hanging on at Batoko Harbor.

In the northeastern New Guinea fighting zone, the communique reported consolidation of American and Australian positions on ridges five miles southwest of Salamaua. That is within three miles of the airfield, the primary objective.

The Allies have been within five miles of Salamaua since prolonged Japanese resistance was overcome in Mubo seven miles further south in mid-July.

Salamaua, an isthmus town which the Japanese have held since early in 1942, is in ruins, pounded by more than 1,000 tons of bombs within a month. Its garrison is supplied largely by barge and today's communique, as have so many others, told of barges being blasted to bits by Allied bombers in New Guinea and New Britain waters.

Gas Cut Restored.

Atlanta, Aug. 20.—(AP)—A 25 per cent reduction in the August gasoline quota for distributors of 17 eastern seaboard states, imposed on August 18, has been rescinded "as of August 19," F. J. Parks, representative of the Office of Petroleum Administration in the southeast, announced today.

Atlantic Beach Bridge Damaged

The bridge connecting Morehead City with Atlantic Beach was damaged early yesterday morning when a barge ran into it.

Highway officers said they do not know when the bridge will be repaired for use by motorists and asked persons planning to visit Atlantic Beach to get in touch with the Highway Commission before attempting the trip.

London, Aug. 20.—(AP)—First British Mosquito bombers again attacked targets in Berlin last night while fighters struck at airfields and railway targets on the continent, it was announced today.

The night raids followed blows by Allied planes, including American Flying Fortresses, at four of Germany's most important air bases in Holland and France yesterday. A joint British-American communique disclosed 50 enemy aircraft were shot down yesterday.

Intruders last night attacked railway and airport targets in France and Belgium.

DANES HINDER NAZI EFFORT

Denmark Swept By Wave Of Organized Sabotage

Stockholm, Aug. 20.—(AP)—A determined, country-wide campaign of sabotage apparently aimed at destroying land and sea transport facilities used by the Nazis to supply their forces in Norway, was reported by travelers arriving here from Denmark today.

Danish patriots, the travelers said, are systematically wrecking Danish factories producing German war materials as well as railroads and harbor installations which have become increasingly important to the Germans since they can no longer ship men and supplies across Sweden to Norway.

At the same time representatives of the five major Danish political parties were called into extraordinary session in Copenhagen, apparently to consider changes in the government's policy toward Nazi occupation of Denmark.

Possibility of a switch in government was mentioned.

Uphold Conviction On Treason Charge

New York, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The United States Circuit Court of Appeals upheld unanimously today the conviction of Anthony Cramer, 43, German-born Yorkville mechanic for treason in aiding two of the eight Nazi saboteurs landed by submarine in the United States in June 1942.

Cramer was sentenced last December to 30 years in prison and fined \$10,000 by Federal Judge Henry W. Goddard, who would not impose the death penalty asked by the government because he felt "no real proof" had been shown that Cramer knew of the Germans' mission to destroy the American aluminum industry.

The saboteurs whom Cramer was accused of aiding were Werner Thiel and Edward John Kerling. They, with four companions subsequently were executed after a trial in Washington.

SEVERAL DIE IN EXPLOSION

Four Known Dead; Eight Others Reported Missing

Kearny, N. J., Aug. 20.—(AP)—Recovery of another body from the smoldering ruins brought to four today the known toll of dead in the explosion and fire which demolished a three-story brick and concrete building of the Congoleum-Nauri, Inc., plant.

Bert M. Fay, Harrison undertaker, said the body had been taken to his morgue and that a family was attempting to establish identification. A report that workmen burrowing through the tons of debris had sighted three others, one believed to be a woman, could not be confirmed.

Ten persons injured eight critically, are in hospitals. The blast late yesterday afternoon rocked a 10-mile area in the heart of war-busy northern New Jersey and broke windows in homes and stores within a mile radius of the sprawling leonoleum products plant on the banks of the Passaic river.

Fire which sprouted out from the blasted No. 2 building wrecked two other structures before the flames were brought under control last night.

The building just blew skyward in a cloud of wreckage and then fell back to the earth in pieces," was one worker's description of the blast.

Worse Than Dead.

Southport, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Coroner W. E. Bell was motoring along when suddenly he came upon a wreck.

A car had turned over. A man's legs were visible but the body was hidden inside.

The coroner hurried to the scene and inquired of the partly hidden man: "Was anybody killed?"

"No," came a muffled answer from down in the car. "But, my God, I'm losing all my gas."

Emanuele Urges Sicily Remain True To Italy

London, Aug. 20.—(AP)—King Vittorio Emanuele told Sicilians in a proclamation broadcast by the Rome radio today that the present isolation of Sicily from the rest of Italy "will not last for long" and he made no mention of continued prosecution of the war.

A later broadcast by Rome radio indicated the King was trying to forestall a separatist movement rather than to imply that peace was in the offing.

Stepping Stones To Italy Taken By U. S. Naval Expedition; Twenty-Four-Hour Storm Of Bombs And Shellfire Rocks Axis Defenders In Southern Italy

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Aug. 20.—(AP)—U. S. naval forces have seized the islands of Lipari and Stromboli to control the sea area between Sicily and lower Italy, headquarters announced today, as Allied air and sea power tore great new gaps in Italy's vital railway system.

Stupendous air assaults shattered the industrial and railway city of Foggia, across the peninsula from Naples and 20 miles inland from the Adriatic sea, in one of the heaviest raids of the Mediterranean war. Fortresses, Liberators, Wellingtons and their escorts knocked down 34 enemy fighters in battles there.

Occupation of volcanic Lipari and Stromboli Tuesday morning put the entire Aeolian island group in Allied hands. Stromboli is only 37 miles from Cape Vaticano on the Italian mainland, and Lipari is 35 miles northwest of Messina in Sicily.

British warships teamed with air power in the hammer blows to disrupt Italy's rail system—a key of Italian defense—pumping tons of shells into Scalo on the west coast of the Calabrian peninsula.

Wave upon wave of heavy British and American bombers concentrated upon Foggia, struck industrial communications, smashed the railroad yards, and wrecked what was considered one of the most important targets in Sicily.

U. S. Liberators from the Middle East joined in the day and night attacks on the city, 100 miles southeast of Rome.

Medium bombers blasted at Sapri and Salerno, south of Naples, covering railroad yards with interlocking patterns of bombs, and fighter-bombers went after the important communications point at Caltanissetta, on the sole of Italy's boot.

They shot down five more Axis fighters, and destruction of still another during the night brought the Allies bag for the period to 40.

Seven Allied planes were lost during all activities.

Lipari and Stromboli are the two main islands of seven in the Aeolian group. They may serve as important stepping stones toward the Italian boot. Control of the islands deprives the Axis of their use as observation points of Allied air and sea movements.

The islands, apparently have no facilities for shipping except the smallest kind, however, and there is no evidence that air fields have been built upon them. Lipari has been built upon them. (Continued on Page Eight)

To Seek Increase In Price Ceiling

Raleigh, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Governor Broughton said today that a Virginia-North Carolina delegation would go to Washington next Wednesday to try to get the Office of Price Administration to raise the tobacco ceiling to a minimum of 47 cents. The ceiling is now 41 cents.

Both Broughton and Gov. Colgate Darden of Virginia will accompany the agricultural leaders. In the North Carolina delegation will be W. Kerr Scott, state commissioner of agriculture; Harry W. Caldwell, master of the State Grange; J. E. Winslow of Greenville, president of the State Farm Bureau Federation; Rep. Clarence Stone of Rockingham; Senator J. Con Lanier of Greenville, and a number of tobacco growers and warehousemen.

Broughton said that the Virginia delegation would seek primarily to raise the ceiling price for the old belt markets, which open later, but that North Carolinians would work in the interest of raising the ceiling for the earlier belts also.

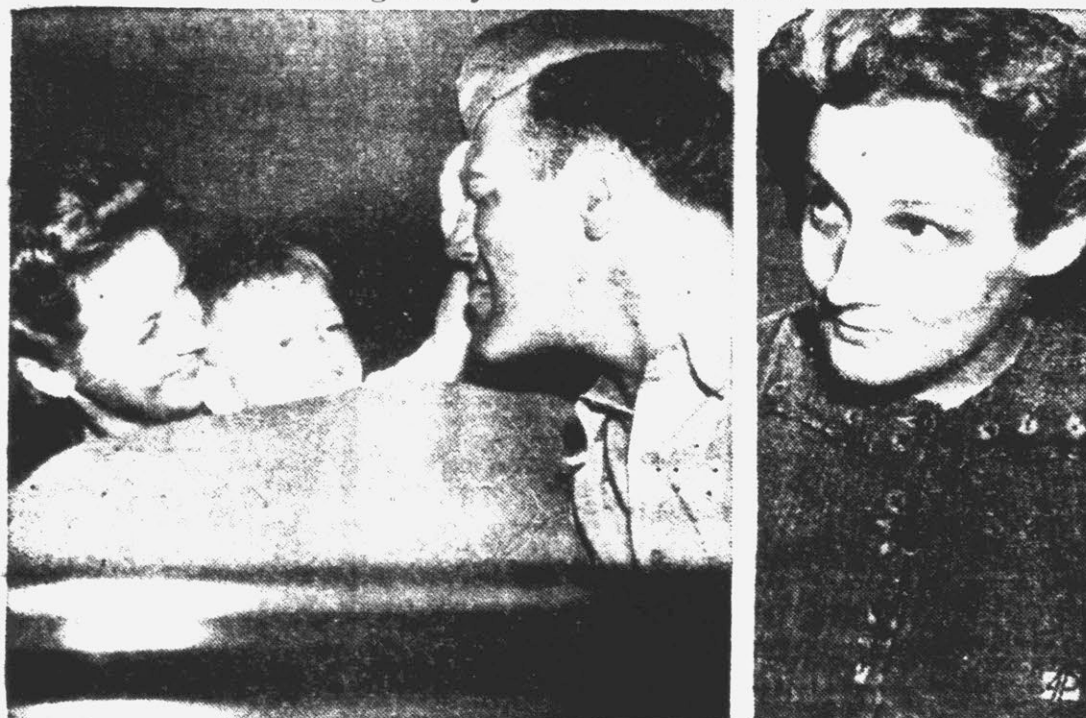

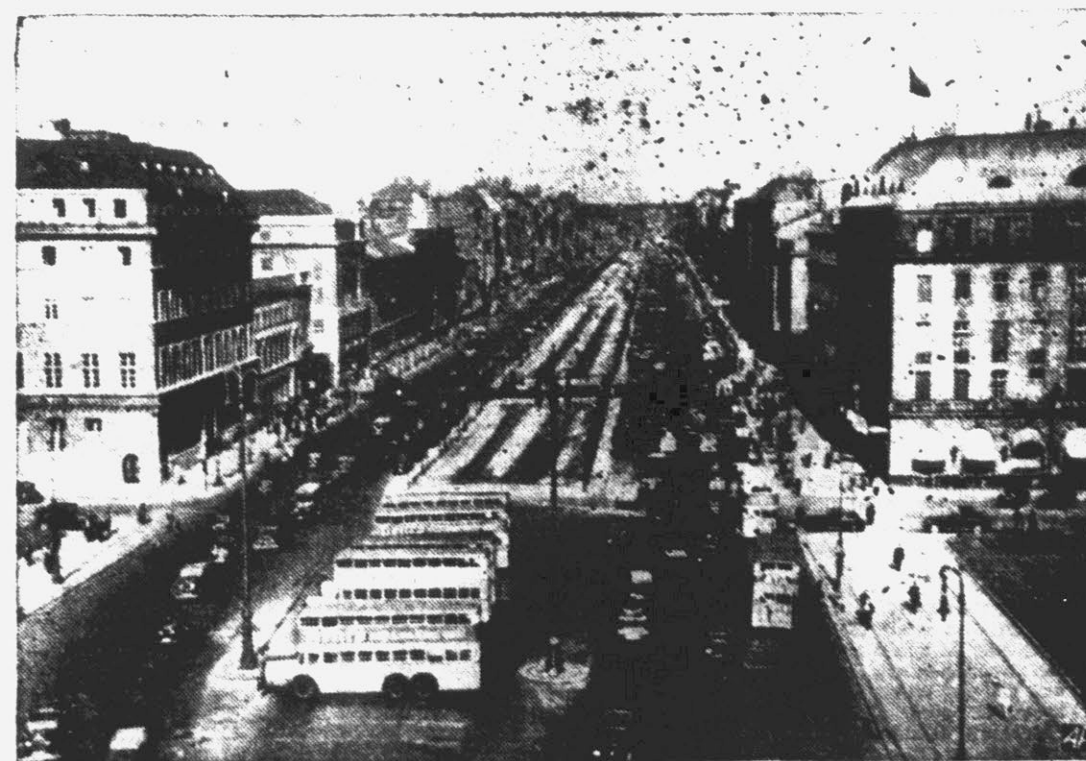

WE NEED A SPIRITUAL OFFENSIVE

A group of chaplains were talking together and someone had said that the trouble with the church is that it is too much on the defensive. Everyone seemed to agree that the thing the church needs above all else is to launch an offensive against the evils which started the war and which, from the beginning of time, have plagued the life of man.

"Yes," said one of the chaplains with a grin. "I've made a resolution. I've resolved that when I get back to my church again I'm going to be more offensive than I've ever been before."

Pick out the periods in the history of the church when the church has been popular and you will observe the periods when it has contributed less than its usual quota of usefulness to the world. Note the times when men have hated the church and have gone after its adherents with fagot and sword, and you will see evidence of spiritual health and vigor in all its enterprises. A healthy church is always waging war against evil. When the church makes peace and sits back complacently with its hands folded, declaring that the world is a pretty good place after all, you have only to lift a few lids and open a few doors to be choked with the fumes of brimstone.

What the world needs above all else today and always is a church which a considerable portion of the world's population hates and decries. When the squaking gets really loud, you can be sure that someone is getting hurt.

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THEY SHOULD HAVE IT

Word comes from Raleigh that North Carolina and Virginia tobacco growers will continue their fight to get the OPA to increase the flue-cured tobacco price ceiling. When the ceiling of 41 cents was set sometime ago by the OPA no difference was made between the marketing of graded and ungraded leaf, with the result that ungraded and ungraded tobacco on the Georgia markets sold at the ceiling price. It costs several cents a pound to grade and tie tobacco and the growers are justified in their demands that they be permitted a higher ceiling for tobacco marketed under this method. The 47 cents ceiling asked by the growers is not too much and their request should be granted by the OPA.

Too Many Shadows



WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington — The blueprint for a separate air force has been drawn. I have this information from sources which there is no reason to doubt. While these sources would not go into details, it is limited that the blueprint might not lead immediately, perhaps not even until after World War II, to a unified department of national defense with equal chiefs of staff for the Army, air and sea forces, but that it would elevate the air force to equal status with the Army chief of staff and commander in chief of the United States fleet.

The reasons given for the delay thus far in establishing a separate air force are:

- (1) That until comparatively recent months the United States air force didn't have the experience, personnel, or even equipment to assume its responsibilities as the third great independent cog in our war machine and that the powers that be wouldn't permit its formation until it could stand on its own feet.
- (2) That the change wouldn't be made (and may not yet) until it's positive that it will in no way disrupt the effectiveness with which the air forces have been operating.
- (3) That for psychological reasons and the morale of all services involved it has been thought best not to make the change while civilian controversies rage over its potential faults and benefits. (And there have been very few hails in this critical storm.)

It has been said with some

amusement, in Army circles at least, that while these controversies have been blowing over the land, the Army actually has been inching closer to the separate air force idea until now, in effect, it already fits the blueprint.

Gen. Henry H. Arnold, commanding general of the Army air forces, although still technically under the command of General George C. Marshall, chief of staff, is a full member of the combined chiefs of staff of United States and Great Britain. The other U. S. members of this vital war board are General Marshall, Admiral Ernest J. King and Admiral William D. Leahy.

Arnold, being a full general, outranks both commanding officers of the other two Army commands — ground forces and special services.

In addition, the U. S. air forces based in the Mediterranean and in Great Britain already have adopted the independent Royal Air Force plan for establishing tactical air force commands, which bomb enemy war installations far behind the fighting lines.

The greatest resistance to a separate air force has come from the Pacific it is said, where Navy brass have been unbending in their opposition to any change in the present set-up.

Such resistance, even from minority groups, has been known before to result in blueprints being allowed to gather dust here until they become obsolete. It might happen in this case yet.

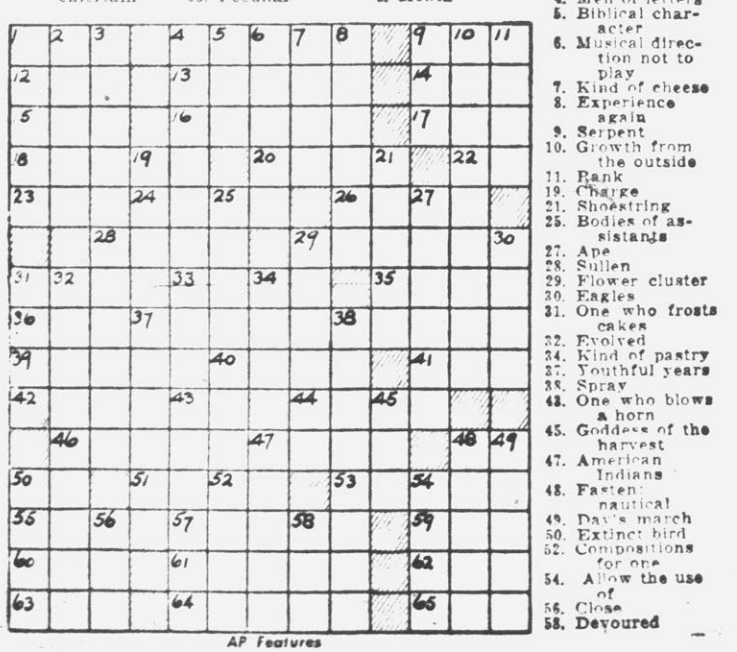

meaning direct subsidies, government purchase and resale-at-loss operations, and other devices.

The idea is for the government to buy all or nearly all of a crop at a handsome price, to encourage maximum, farm production, and then to resell it to the trade at a price that won't break the consumer's back.

While admittedly a variation of direct subsidies, this has what many officials regard as special advantages.

Take potatoes as an example. The government not only wants to hold down the price but wants to regulate consumption to prevent temporary shortages such as occurred this spring when some regions ran out before the new crop came in.

If the government bought the whole crop in the first place, it could control the resale so as to stretch the supply until next year's crop comes in.

By buying the whole crop, it is also believed the government would be able to eliminate black markets.

"Italians of Sicily, your King is near to you."

"I have faith in a better future. I know that you are faithful to me and to my reigning house. We are now cut off one from the other. But this will not last for long. The future will bring a reward for your sufferings."

The King pointedly stressed Sicily's fealty to the monarch in general and the House of Savoy in particular. He spoke of Italy as wounded and predicted the "certain resurrection of your country, generous and strong."

Earlier, the Rome radio accused the Allies of indiscriminately bombing Italian towns and said no official reply has been received by the Badoglio government's recent action in declaring Rome an open city.

"On the contrary," said the broadcast, which was recorded by the Associated Press, "British-American propaganda is trying to be funny, to ignore the noble reasons which inspired this declaration and to depict it as a 'pre-arranged maneuver'."
