RUSSIANS HURL GERMANS BACK ON WIDE FRONT

New Drives Have Passed High-Water Mark Of Winter Offensive And Are Pushing Deeper Into Ukraine; Nazi Anchor Position For Dnieper Bend Is Threatened

London, Aug. 26.—(AP) Forging steadily ahead on an ever-widening front, Red army troops today were beyond the high-water mark of their winter counter-offensive after capturing Zenkov, 85 miles northwest of Kharkov.

A Soviet communique, announcing the fall of Zenkov and 60 nearby villages, said savage German counterattacks had failed to halt a Russian surge toward the Dnieper river bend as Red army units streamed through fallen Kharkov, pointing toward Poltava and Lovoaya, 75 miles to the southwest and south, respectively.

Russian forces on the lower Donets, meanwhile, were reported to be widening a breach in the German lines southwest of Voroshilovgrad and penetrating ever deeper into the Donets basin.

Capture of Lovoaya, strongly-fortified Nazi anchor, would sever one of the Germans' main railway supply lines in the important Donets area.

The Germans were throwing everything they had into the battle for the strategic Dnieper bend, the daily Russian communique indicated, even drawing reserves from other sectors of the front.

Only limited Russian gains were recorded on the Bryansk salient to the north, but Red army planes bombed and strafed German troops and supply trains in attacks on Utecha and Novozybkov, east of Gomel.

Soviet bombers also were blasting enemy airdromes and troop concentrations below Kharkov, where ground forces were storming deep into the Donets basin in a drive aimed at turning the German defense line and trapping thousands of enemy troops.

South of Izyum and southwest of Voroshilovgrad, the Soviet war bulletin said, hundreds of Nazi soldiers were slain as they stubbornly contested every mile. Another 600 fell south of Kharkov, while a heavy toll was also exacted as the Germans fell back from Zenkov.

Scores of German tanks and planes were destroyed on this fanlike front, the communique said, adding that "the enemy everywhere is sustaining enormous losses in manpower and equipment."

Capture of Zenkov, a rail city 25 miles southwest of Lebedin, places the advance guard of the Soviet forces 42 miles northwest of Poltava, key German base on the approaches to the Dnieper bend.

Other Red army spearheads were reported within 25 miles of the city, capturing of which would unhinge a huge section of the Dnieper western defense.

The German high command declared 253 more Russian tanks had been destroyed.

Mountbatten Assignment Presages Blow At Japs

Washington, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Sharply-accelerated pressure of Japan from the east, together with a sea-air-land drive to reopen the Burma road, were regarded here today as likely outcomes of the appointment of Lord Louis Mountbatten as supreme Allied commander in southeast Asia.

The doughty Mountbatten, chief of Britain's famed Commandos and cousin of King George VI, is due in Washington today to begin plotting the new war plan. Mountbatten's assignment in Quebec by President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill for crushing Japan.

Bern, Switzerland, Aug. 26.—(AP)—An Italian frontier report to the Zurich newspaper Die Tat said today that a diplomatic mission headed by Count Dino Grandi, former Italian ambassador to Britain, had arrived in Lisbon and that its aim was believed to be armistice negotiations with the Allies.

(The report was entirely unconfirmed and London authorities said they had no knowledge of such a mission and placed no credence in the report.) (Reuters agency of the mission denied that "Italian negotiations with a British delegation for an armistice and possible separate peace are being continued and even speeded up.")

SLIGHT GAINS AT SALAMAUA

Allied Troops Now Within Mile of Jap Airdrome

Allied Headquarters in the Southwest Pacific Aug. 26.—(AP)—American and Australian jungle troops now are within a mile of the Salamaua, New Guinea, airdrome, a spokesman for Gen. Douglas MacArthur disclosed today.

The spokesman said that along the Francisco river, which flows south of the airstrip into Bayern bay, the only Japanese still holding out below the river are at Dot inlet on the coast.

The only semblance of a line held by the enemy begins at the inlet and runs to Nuk Nuk, directly south of the airdrome. Along that line, the enemy has made several counterattacks.

At a point two miles inland, Australian troops are engaged.

Allied Bombers Attack Hongkong

Tokyo reported today 20 Allied bombers and fighters attempted to attack Hongkong yesterday in two separate raids. The broadcast was recorded by the Associated Press.

The radio said a few bombs were dropped from a high altitude by a formation of 13 planes which attacked during the morning and that slight damage was caused. The announcement declared the attackers were "immediately repulsed" by anti-aircraft batteries.

Seven planes which approached the city in the afternoon were "forced to flee," the broadcast declared.

Bridgers Back From Pacific War Zone

Lt. Jg. John David Bridgers, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Bridgers of this city, arrived home last night after 18 months in the Pacific war zone as a navy pilot. During his stay in the war zone he served aboard several carriers and saw action from Henderson Field, Guadalcanal, in dive bombing raids on Munda field, as depicted in Life magazine last April.

He was aboard an escort carrier that accompanied the Hornet on the "Shangri-La" trip from which Maj. Gen. Jimmie Doolittle's bombers took off for their raid on Tokyo in April of last year. Members of the units that took part in this expedition now wear the presidential unit citation.

Early in June of last year, his second carrier, the Yorktown was mortally damaged by enemy action in the battle of Midway. Serving intermittently aboard several other carriers he soon found himself in the South Pacific zone where he served until recently granted a leave to return home.

After a furlough here he will report to Norfolk for assignment to further duty.

Lt. Bridgers volunteered for the air branch of the U. S. Naval Reserve in November 1940 and reported for training on February 13, 1941. He trained at Miami, Jacksonville and Pensacola and received his wings in November of that year. He left Norfolk for the Pacific war zone in February, 1942.

AIR OFFENSIVE AGAINST NAZIS STILL GOES ON

Berlin Raided Again Last Night; Fortresses Smash Points In France

London, Aug. 26.—(AP)—RAF Mosquitoes kept the nerves of Berliners on edge last night with the third raid on the German capital in as many nights.

The air ministry communique said one of last night's raiders was missing. Simultaneously with the new stab at Berlin, other aircraft laid mines in enemy waters, it was announced.

Meanwhile, a dispatch received through Stockholm said the death toll in Berlin during Monday night's bombing, when an estimated, 700 heavy bombers made a smashing attack, would have been enormous if women and children had not been evacuated from the city.

The dispatch, from the Berlin correspondent of Stockholm's Tidningen, said every able-bodied person was mobilized for fire fighting and rescue work.

While keeping Berlin awake, the Mosquitoes put Axis radios to sleep. One after another the transmitters faded until there was a complete blackout of enemy broadcasts for most of the night all the way across Europe.

BBC and two neutral stations had the air to themselves.

Three German airfields and a power station in western France were also raided yesterday by American and British medium bombers without loss.

Berlin broadcast by the German news agency DNB today said Allied "nuisance raiders" again were over northern Germany and had dropped bombs, causing slight damage. The broadcast was recorded by the Associated Press.

U. S. eighth air force marauders concentrated on the power station at Rouen and the Tricouville airfield while RAF Mitchells were bombing the Bernay St. Martin air base and RAF Bostons the one at Beaumont Le Roger.

A joint communique said few enemy fighters were encountered.

An RCAF squadron shot down one of these.

Two British fighters were listed as missing from other patrols over France and Belgium during the day.

It was announced last night that anti-aircraft fire knocked down a Junkers-88 just off a northern Scottish island.

Yesterday was the second successive night of raids.

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Claim Sinking Of U. S. Vessels

A Tokyo broadcast recorded today by the Associated Press asserted that between June 30 and Aug. 25 Japanese forces in the Solomons had sunk nine Allied cruisers and 11 destroyers and destroyed 836 planes. The claims were without Allied confirmation.

The broadcast said that an additional four cruisers, eight destroyers and 74 planes were damaged.

Three Allied landing vessels were declared sunk by naval righter planes in an attack on Allied positions in the Munda area Aug. 24.

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Allied Bombers In More Smashing Raids On Italy

Allies Continue Thrusts At Salamaua

Stockholm, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Three German destroyers sank two Swedish boats in the North Sea off the northwest coast of Denmark last night, the Swedish News Agency reported in a Gothenburg dispatch today.

A foreign office spokesman said that if the attack occurred, the Swedish government would regard it as an "extremely serious" affair and the worst in a series of incidents involving Germany since the sinking of the Swedish submarine Ulven April 16.

Accounts from Gothenburg said 12 Swedish boats were lost their lives when the boats went down under the attack, wreathed in flames. Returning fishermen said the destroyers struck from a range of about 50 yards although the boats were flying the Swedish flag and had blue and gold Swedish insignia painted on the sides.

The fishing craft were operating close together in international waters, it was said.

Sweden ordered cessation of the movement of German troops and supplies by railroad across her neutral soil between Germany and Norway and Finland only this month.

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Captain Folger Home For Visit

Captain Lee H. Folger, arrived yesterday from a government hospital in Atlanta, for a visit with his family here. He is recuperating from severe back and facial injuries received in an airplane crash in the Middle East war zone.

Captain Folger saw more than a year's service in Africa and was attached to Montgomery's British army when it chased Rommel's Afrika Korps from El Alamein, across Libya to Tunisia.

The crash in which Captain Folger was injured occurred on July 7 and shortly thereafter he was flown to Miami where he received treatment in a government hospital before being transferred to Atlanta.

Following his furlough here he will return to the hospital for further treatment. His recovery is expected to require several months.

Hot Weather Comes Back To Greenville

Almost torrid weather yesterday and today contrasted sharply with the cool period of the previous week. Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock the official Airways thermometer registered 73 degrees; at 1 p. m. the mercury had climbed to 94 degrees and last night at 8 o'clock it was 96.4. It was one of the hottest nights of the summer.

The thermometer dropped to 76 degrees at 8 o'clock this morning, but immediately began to rise.

ABC Officers Find Illicit Distillery

Pitt County ABC Officers, assisted by Jim Buck and Roy Harris of Winterville, destroyed a 50-gallon steel drum still with 50-gallons of fermented mash, a 30-gallon cooler, a 15-gallon doubler and one small copper coil. The still was located near the railroad. Officers had watched the distillery since Tuesday afternoon, but the operators never came in.

Lightning Fighters Flying At Tree-Top Level Help To Shatter 11 Airfields In Foggia Area; 26 Axis Planes Shot Down, Others Destroyed On The Ground

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Attacking in three big waves, American Flying Fortresses and Liberators blasted the railway yards and airfields at Foggia in southern Italy yesterday, shooting down 26 enemy planes in combat and destroying many others on the ground, it was announced today.

Paving the way for the assault, which were delivered from bases in both northwest Africa and the Middle East, a force of P-51 Lightning fighters attacked at treetop level, knocking out a large proportion of the enemy's potential fighter strength at Foggia and 10 satellite airdromes.

Liberators from the Middle East then roared in to smash at railway areas and fortresses from the northwest African Air Command followed up to blast enemy airfields with heavy bombs.

The Liberators alone were credited officially with knocking seven German Messerschmitt fighters out of the sky. All the Middle East raiders returned safely to base, a Cairo communique said.

Heavy fighter opposition was encountered by the attackers for the first time in three days.

Fifteen Allied planes in all were missing from the sweeping operations, which were described officially as "one of the most successful surprise air attacks of the war."

It was estimated that 200 to 300 casualties were caused to enemy personnel by the combined strafing and bombing of airfields. Many parked aircraft were reported left ablaze.

The Lightnings caught hundreds of enemy crewmen on the airfields like moving machines. In some instances enemy soldiers, actually throwing rocks and fixed pistols, so did the speedy P-51 fighters sweep over their objectives.

The wrecking crews at Foggia were all-American, but RAF Halifax and Liberator bombers from the Middle East also blasted the railway yards at Crotona on the arc of the Italian boot on Tuesday night, starting many big fires and damaging a nearby chemical works. All these raiders returned safely.

Lieut. Col. George Macmillan of Memphis, Tenn., executive officer who organized the unique Lightning raid at Foggia and then led it, was awarded personally the Distinguished Flying Cross by Lieut. Gen. Carl Spaatz, commander of the northwest African air force, as he stepped from the plane on his return.

Going the whole distance at an altitude of less than 100 feet, the Lightning pilots said Italians along the route waved and cheered as they

New Government Action Puts Lewis On The Spot

Washington, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Aggressive John L. Lewis is on the defensive.

On successive days the government turned back a batch of 53 mines to their owners, in disregard of his union's terms, and then refused for a second time to approve portal-to-portal pay for the miners.

But the United Mine Workers' president, with a reputation for making and exploiting opportunities, is keeping everybody guessing about his next move.

While Lewis was silent a philosophical acceptance of developments was nevertheless discernible today among his associates. The possibility of a union policy committee meeting soon was given no support, although that has been the usual step when Lewis was planning new exploits.

The statutory status given the War Labor Board, which has once defied the penalties for striking act and the WLB compliance sanctions approved by the President apparently have forced Lewis to re-evaluate his entire strategy. He may await the WLB's decision on the anthracite wage dispute before determining upon his next move.

The interpretation that a turn-back of the mines to private owners

What is a family allowance?

A payment by government check sent to your dependents by the War Department Office of Dependency Benefits each month while you are in the grade of private, private first class, corporal, or sergeant. It is made up of money deducted from your pay and money contributed by the government. It is granted only upon application filed on the official form (WD AGO 625) available at your reception center and at any army camp or post or your local Red Cross chapter office.

How much comes out of your pay each month?

For your wife and children (Class A dependents) total \$22. For dependent parents, brothers, or sisters (Class B dependents) total \$22. For both Class A and Class B dependents \$27.

How much will your dependents get each month?

Here are a few examples: Your wife \$50; your wife and child, \$62; your father and mother only, \$47.

Under what conditions are your children, also your dependent brothers, sisters or grandchildren, eligible?

Only when they are unmarried and under 18 years of age, or of any age if mentally or physically incapacitated.

What documentary evidence is required for your Class A dependents?

1. You must have proof of relationship of your wife, child, or divorced wife to whom alimony is payable.

2. For your wife—certified copy of public or church record; or affidavit of clergyman or magistrate who officiated; or photostatic copy of marriage certificate; or affidavits of two eyewitnesses to ceremony.

3. For your child—certified copy of public or church record of birth; or affidavit from doctor or midwife in attendance at birth; or affidavit of two disinterested persons stating age and parentage of child.

4. For your adopted child—certified copy of court decree providing you to be father of child; or certified copy of court order requiring you to contribute to child's support; or your written statement under oath that you are child's father.

5. For your divorced wife—certified copy of divorce decree or certified copy of separation or maintenance agreement which is still in effect.

What documentary evidence is required for your Class B dependents?

You must prove both relationship and dependency upon you for a substantial portion of their support in the case of your parents, brothers, sister or grandchild. Have two disinterested persons, familiar with your circumstances, fill out the enclosed affidavits before a notary public.

If you wish to provide for dependents more liberally than a family allowance permits—

You must authorize a voluntary Class E allotment of pay in any amount, providing you keep \$10 of your own use. It all comes out of your pay and you may discontinue it at will.

Take all documents required for your family allowance with you, to the reception center at the camp at which you are to report and submit them with your application.

Strikers Vote To Return To Work

Johnsville, Pa., Aug. 26.—(AP)—Thousands of striking workers at Henry Kaiser's Brewster Aeronautical Corporation Johnsville plant voted unanimously at a mass meeting today to return to their jobs on condition that the company agree to a new contract with the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America.

The vote was taken shortly after the fourth Naval District in Philadelphia announced the military arrest of nine more plant guards—bringing to 29 the number in custody. The three-day-old strike was staged in protest against the charges that members of both the union and the coast guard temporary reserve failed to take their oaths.

A resolution ending the walkout and the union, Aircraft Local 365, called for another strike vote after a 30-day "cooling off" period provided by the Connally-Smith anti-strike law.

ship automatically meant a strike is unofficially disclaimed in UMW circles. The policy committee's statement in June directed the miners to return to work until Oct. 31, with the proviso that this arrangement would "automatically terminate" if the government relinquished its custody of the mines before then. UMW sources now say this was a reservation, not a threat, and furthermore they emphasize that it was an official policy committee statement and not a personal commitment by Lewis. They say, in effect, that no general work stoppage is contemplated, at least for the present.

The WLB's refusal to approve partial-to-partial pay of \$1.25 a day in a proposed agreement between the United Mine Workers and the Illinois Coal Operators Association pointed up the board's reasoning on the underground travel pay question.

Chairman William H. Davis told a press conference that the \$1.25 was a "hidden" wage increase that was "not very well hidden," he said. No wage increase was due the miners under the wage stabilization policy.

ground, military observers found basis for speculation that a direct blow by air and sea may be aimed in the near future at the vital port of Rangoon, even as the offensive down the Arakan coast is continued with stepped-up intensity.

Success in reopening the Burma road would serve the double objective of getting more supplies in to the Chinese forces of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, and as a route for bringing in fuel for Allied planes and bombers for a close-up attack on Japan from Chinese bases.

Increased Allied use of Chinese air bases might well compel Japan to pull in a substantial part of her air forces defending her outlying island empire, and thereby ease the tough northward drive confronting General Douglas MacArthur.

Upon his arrival here, Mountbatten will find a special mission from his homeland which came to study "maximum British cooperation with the United States in future operations against Japan" with the specific of laying "the logistical foundation" for Britain's contribution in that objective.

Presumably members of that mission will sit in with Mountbatten as he discusses with high-ranking American officers the details of his new assignment.

Mountbatten will command American and Chinese as well as British, Canadian and Indian forces. One factor probably taken into consideration in his appointment is that the preponderance of his troops are British and Principally natives.

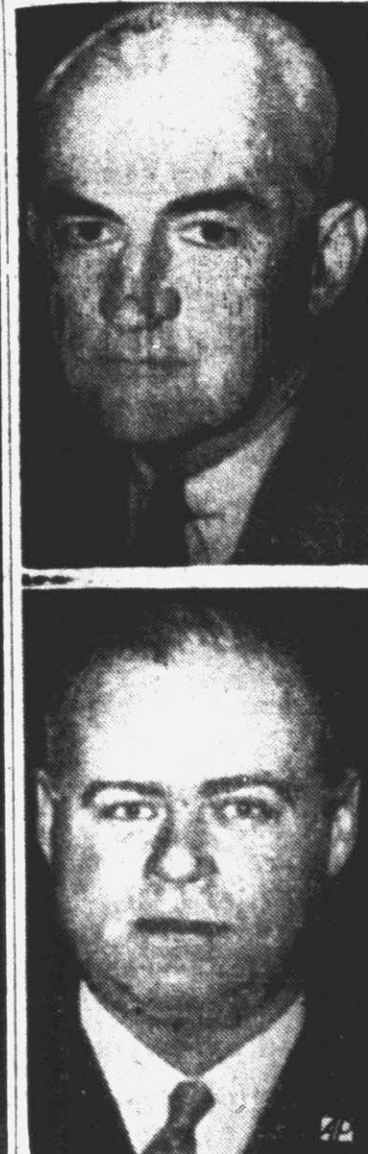

NOT WORDS BUT ACTS
Gladstone once said: "Don't let
your religion spoil your morality."

Some people do. This was what
the little girl had in mind when
she prayed, "God, make all the bad
people good and all the good people
nice." Nothing hurts religion so
much as to have people of great religious
pretensions constantly belie those
pretensions by unkindness, ill-temper, and avarice. The church
official who has to be watched in a
business deal, or the woman, supposedly
pious, who is eager to accede
to evil rumor about her
neighbors, do the cause of religion
incalculable harm.

But the people who above all
allow their religion to spoil their
morality are those who emphasize
certain aspects of their faith and
neglect other aspects. Generally,
they emphasize creeds, church
attendance, devotion to religious
customs, and neglect kindness, love,
tolerance, understanding, and justice.
Worst of all, they consider
themselves blameless because they
hold fast to the letter. Nothing is
more dreadful than the person who
holds fast to the letter of religious
truth and violates its spirit.

Our Lord expressed himself in
this regard when he declared, "Not
everyone that saith unto me Lord,
shall enter into the kingdom of
heaven, but he that doeth the will
of my Father, who is in heaven."

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THE RUSSIAN PROBLEM

(Scottish Rite News)

As the war progresses, the
political problems growing
out of our military victories
become more and more urgent,
and tied in with these is
the attitude of Russia.

As Germany becomes
aware of ultimate defeat as
the armed might of the United
Nations is asserted on sea,
land and in the air, it is going
to resort as never before,
to the old trick of trying to
drive a wedge between Russia
and its Allies.

The second front is one of
the questions that is acute
because of the difference in
its definition as between the
United States and Great
Britain on the one hand and
Russia on the other. The
latter undoubtedly regards
a second front as embodying
a direct attack from England
across the English Channel,
on the northern coast of
France.

The United States and
Great Britain realize the
value of such an attack, if
it can be made successfully
and without too great a sacrifice
of men and materials. But
the value of the campaign
in North Africa and Sicily
cannot be justly minimized,
for it has opened the
Mediterranean to our
transports and the saving of
8,000 miles additional distance,
formerly consumed in going
around the Cape of Good
Hope, has released thousands
of tons of sorely needed
shipping for other sectors.
And once the armies of the
Allies are entrenched in
Italy, our airmen will be that
much closer to the big industrial
plants in southern Germany.

The problem of Poland
and the Balkans is one that
has brought differences of
opinion. Dr. Eduard Benes,
President of the Czechoslovak
Government in Exile,
recently stated that his Government
preferred to follow
the leadership of Russia in
this matter. There has been
a good deal of talk about a
"cordon sanitaire" which
would ring Russia on its
western boundaries with a
group of small and hostile
nations. To this Russia objects.

Russia also is reported to
be concerned over President
Roosevelt's secret negotiations
with the Vatican, his
solicitude for Otto of Hapsburg
and Spain's Franco, his
hesitancy about recognizing
the French National Committee,
and as to what the
United States and Great
Britain propose to do in
Italy.

Another subject of difference
of opinion concerns
Germany itself. Through
the National Committee of
Free Germany, Russia indirectly
expressed the view
that it does not desire to
destroy Germany nor all mili-

tary force in Germany, as it
considers such a course
would be "inadvisable from
the point of view of the future."

Both the British and
American Governments take
an opposite view. They
mean to destroy every last
part of Germany's armed
might so that Germany cannot
again threaten their
safety or disturb the peace
of the world.

Russia has already lost
upward of five million citizens
killed. Had its armies
not held at Stalingrad, Hitler
today would probably be
the undisputed master of
Europe. By reason of the
size of the sacrifice and its
success, Russia feels that it
is entitled to be given respectful
and serious attention
by the Allies and, no
doubt, the British and American
publics realize the justice
of Russia's contention
in regard to this. News reports
state that President
Roosevelt and Prime Minister
Churchill are in full
agreement in according Russia
the complete cooperation
that it is due.

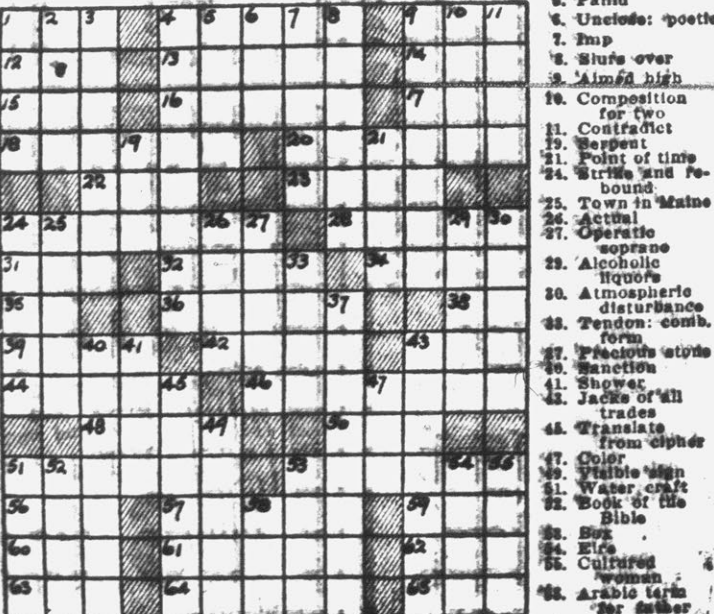

WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington—The capital in wartime.

Some of the big guns have been
blasting away recently at the State
Department, with consequent rumors
that our oldest statesman, Secretary
Cordell Hull is about to
shake up his staff.

Take such rumors with a handful
of salt. If the venerable Mr. Hull
shakes up his staff, it won't be because
of sniping from outside or inside
the government.

Secretary Hull is the only true
log-cabin statesman left in the government
today and while that hasn't
much to do with it, he occupies
the unique position in President
Roosevelt's cabinet of having
the complete confidence of the Congress.

Some of his theories (reciprocal
trade treaties, to mention the most
outstanding) have come in for Congressional
criticism, but that hasn't
weakened his standing, and in the
long run, he has gotten almost
everything from "the Hill" he has
asked for.

That gives him a margin of safety
that few in the government enjoy
and while there's no doubt that
some of the blasts have been partially,
at least, justifiable, there also
are a good many accomplishments
to which the State Department
can point with pride.

Some of the faults that exist lie
in the fact that the State Department,
even perhaps more than the
Army and Navy, is composed of "career
men" which has resulted in
political cliques within cliques.
These factions, while not necessarily
shirking their obligations to the

YANKS CLING TO LEAGUE FLAG

Cards Already Conceded Winners In National League

(Associated Press Sports Writer.) The mathematical lock hasn't been turned yet, but the New York Yankees have just closed the door on another American League pennant, their seventh in eight years. The St. Louis Cardinals have been conceded the National League flag for a couple of weeks or longer, but up until yesterday the diehards refused to admit the American League race was over. The Yankees had been inconsistent and the Washington Senators had been persistent.

Now there no longer is any reason to doubt that the Yankees will be the best team when the World Series opens in a little more than a month. They finished their last western trip with a bang (it was that door slamming) by drubbing the Detroit Tigers in both ends of a doubleheader 7-5 and 5-1.

This performance gave them a record of having won 12 consecutive series, a feat not equaled even by the great Yankee clubs of the past, and sent them home with a 101-2 game lead to friendly Yankee Stadium where they have won 26 out of 52 games this season.

Rudy York took personal issue with the Yankees in their final games, hitting a home run in each half of the bill to bring his total for the season to 28 and his record for the month to 15. He now needs to hit four in his next four games to surpass the record of 18 he set in the month of August, 1937.

In the other American League contests Cleveland beat the Boston Red Sox twice 8-3 and 4-1, the St. Louis Browns whipped Washington 7-4 and the Philadelphia Athletics resumed their losing habits by folding before the Chicago White Sox 4-0 as Jake Wade pitched four-hit ball and Luke Appling drove in three runs with three hits.

Vernon Kennedy pitched seventh-inning ball and Ray Pate a six-hitter to account for the Cleveland conquests with Jeff Heath chiming in with two home runs in the second game, boosting his home run production to eight in eight days.

Bobo Newsom was knocked out at St. Louis again, but the Browns won anyway on good relief pitching by Nelson Poffner. In the National League the St. Louis Cardinals completed their last eastern trip with their second straight shutout of the Boston Braves 2-0 as Lefty Harry Brechen allowed five singles. He had a scoreless pitching battle with Nate Andrews until the ninth, when Brechen himself doubled in one run and scored the other.

It was the champions' 15th straight success against the Braves. The Brooklyn Dodgers stopped the Pittsburgh Pirates 6-4 in the only other game in the senior circuit, scoring five times in the third inning through errors by Max Butcher and Elbie Fletcher. The Pirates, however, provided most of the fun for the fans. In the fourth inning Vince DiMaggio argued with Umpire George Barr and was banished. Al Lopez stood at home plate and clapped his hands loud for Barr, and found that the umpire didn't like applause. Lopez, too, was thumbed off the field and in the next inning Barr cleared half a dozen other Pirate players out of the dugout because of their jibes.

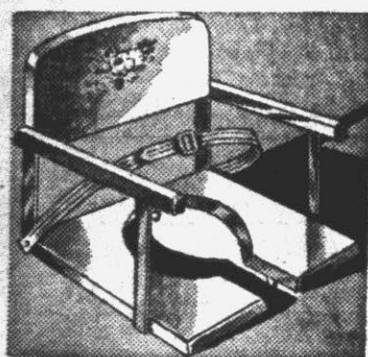

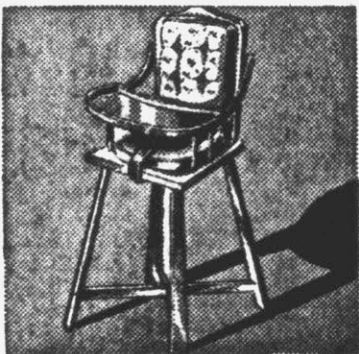

HIDDEN HUNGER - HEALTH'S WORST ENEMY

"But," you say, "hunger is practically unknown in the United States today." Yes, everyone has enough to eat so that he doesn't feel hungry, but does he have the right kind of food? It depends upon how wisely he selects his food, whether all of the needed minerals, vitamins and proteins are supplied in sufficient amounts to keep him in top-notch condition. It is well to remember always that a person may be overweight and physically satisfied with the meals eaten and still suffer from "hidden hunger" if enough of these vital nutrients are not eaten every day.

MENU 1 A SUPER-DUPER
One has only to look at the chart above which one of my associates, a graduate dietitian, prepared for me to see how many more minerals and vitamins one menu may furnish than another. As you can see, both menus supply the same number of calories, yet Menu 1 is far superior to Menu 2 in protein, minerals and vitamins.

Menu 1 contains many foods noted for their high food value - Wilson's B-V is high in iron and riboflavin; pork liver is rich in iron, niacin, Vitamin A, and complete proteins, and furnishes considerable amounts of thiamin and riboflavin as well - and so on down the whole menu. So altogether, this menu is a super-duper in food value, yet is moderate in cost.

Apportion Food Throughout Day
Nutritionists usually advise dividing the day's food into 3 1/4 to 4 1/4 for breakfast, 1 1/4 for lunch or supper and the remainder for dinner. Although this is ideal, few people eat as large a breakfast as dinner. Granted they did eat 1/4 of the day's requirements for both breakfast and lunch, Menu 2 would still be inadequate for dinner since less than a third of the day's requirements are furnished of calcium, phosphorus, iron, thiamin (Vitamin B1), riboflavin (Vitamin B2) and niacin.

NO CALORIES WITHOUT VITAMINS
A good rule to follow in selecting food is - "no calories without vitamins." If we eat large amounts of fat and starchy foods, we are likely to satisfy our "hollow hunger" before we have consumed enough proteins, minerals and vitamins. Always remember that the more carbohydrates we eat the more of the Vitamin-B complex we need. More about that another week. Sincerely George Rector

The traffic had gone on three years. The submarine Ulven was sunk with a crew of 33 during spring maneuvers off Marstrand in the Kattegat, and divers who inspected the hull reported May 21 she apparently was destroyed by a mine.

Sweden was at the time awaiting Berlin's reply to her protests that Nazi mines had been found in Swedish territorial waters.

Other incidents have involved both ships and planes.

Three other Swedish fishing boats which were said to have eluded attack made the report of the latest sinkings when they returned to Goeteborg today.

The Goeteborg newspaper Handels Tidningen, said the fishermen reported that the German destroyers opened point-blank fire after a salvo of warning shots. They approached the fishing fleet from the direction of Denmark where the Germans have been nervously expecting a possible Allied invasion attempt.
