Warns Hardest Fighting Ahead

Boston, Sept. 6.—(AU)—Warfare of increasing intensity and bitterness was forecast by Rear Admiral C. H. Woodward today in a Labor Day address in which he declared that American public opinion had drifted dangerously in the direction of overconfidence.

The United Nations' progress in the war to date "has been slow and painful," he asserted, declaring that "none of our victories has been final victories. They are only stepping stones to our real objectives."

He called upon his hearers to "notice how little territory we have regained in the past year. Note how long it took us to recapture the ground, compared to the territorial advances made by the Germans and Japs when they were on the march."

"The toughest battles are ahead," he stated. "The going will get tougher and tougher as we crash through the outer fringes of the Axis defenses and attack their main bastions."

He said that men and women on American production lines must remember that the immediate enemies are the men and women on the enemy's production lines.

Staffs Confer With Guerillas

London, Sept. 6.—(AP)—British and Greek staff officers, traveling by secret routes in one of the most daring exploits of the entire war, have conferred with Greek guerilla and patriot leaders in the heart of Axis-held Balkan territory and perfected plans for a unified command and the supply of war materials.

The officers left Cairo for the rendezvous with 600 leaders representing more than 50,000 patriot fighters and in a three-day conference arranged a long-term policy to match the battle plans of the Allied Middle East command.

It has been estimated that there are about 150,000 guerilla troops actively fighting the Axis in the Balkans, including some British, Australian and New Zealand troops whose escape was cut off in the Greek and Cretan campaigns. They are said to have fled to the mountains where they joined local patriot units.

The Germans have already admitted the possibility of British aid to the guerillas. They have reported that British planes have used secret airfields in Greece and that submarines have landed arms, munitions, radios, medicine and some food at various places along the coast.

It is estimated here that the German garrisons in France at the present time total about 500,000 men.

Field Marshal General Karl Rudolf von Rundstedt, 67-year-old German commander-in-chief in western Europe, who led the Nazis into Poland and carried out the breakthrough at Sedan in France in 1940, has his headquarters at Montpelier, where he is said to be directing the anti-invasion preparations.

It is believed that an Allied landing in southern France, however, would draw quick support from some 200,000 Frenchmen who already are armed and waiting for the word to strike.

Bern, Switzerland, Sept. 6.—(AP)—The Italian paper La Stampa of Turin was quoted in dispatches from the Swiss frontier today as reporting that Count Galeazzo Ciano, son-in-law of Benito Mussolini, was arrested Saturday after being persuaded to give himself up at the Argentine legation.

La Stampa said the Argentine minister, Manuel E. Malbran, was surprised when the former Italian foreign minister appeared and asked for sanctuary for himself and family.

SENATORS WIN OVER YANKEES

Cardinals Split With Cincinnati In Sunday Games

Sunday was a big day for the Washington Senators. They not only spoiled the New York Yankees' bid to tie the Major League record of winning 14 consecutive series but gained the distinction of being the first club to sweep a doubleheader at the Yankee stadium this year. In addition they regained second place.

An inside the park eighth inning homer by Rookie Charley Roberts — his first in the big leagues — gave Washington and Dutch Leonard a 3 to 2 victory over the Yanks in the first game. The Senators took the nightcap, 5 to 1, behind the four-hit pitching of Bobo Newsom and Milt Haefner coupled with a three-run homer by Sherrard Robertson in the eighth.

Newsom retired after the fifth because of a stomach disorder but received credit for the win, his second against six defeats since being waived out of the National League.

The double defeat, which split the four-game series, cost the Yanks an opportunity to equal the record of the 1912 Giants who won 14 consecutive series.

The pace-setting St. Louis Cardinals retained a 14 1-2 game lead in the national league by exchanging shutouts with Cincinnati. Mort Cooper won his 19th game with a four-hit masterpiece in the opener, 1 to 0.

Bucky Walters wielded the White-wash brush for the Reds in the tiepiece, giving up only six hits for a 4 to 0 shutout.

The Brooklyn Dodgers climbed within half a game of the second place Reds by beating the Giants, 5 to 1.

The Phillies' ended their eight-game losing streak by taking a doubleheader from the Boston Braves, 2 to 1 and 5 to 1.

Tommy Bridges, veteran Detroit right-hander, blanked the St. Louis Browns in eight of nine innings. Unfortunately from his standpoint, Chet Laabs clouted one of his curves for a three-run double in the fifth inning to give the Browns a 3 to 2 victory.

Dick Siebert batted in five runs with a perfect day at bat as the Philadelphia Athletics beat the Boston Red Sox, 7 to 5.

Despite Bill Nicholson's 22nd homer of the year and Mickey Livingston's second roundtripper in two days, the Chicago Cubs dropped a 12-inning 5-to-4 decision to Pittsburgh.

The Chicago White Sox got back into the thick of the fight for a first division berth by sweeping a twin bill from Cleveland, 2 to 1 and 4 to 3.

Sports Roundup

Forest Hills, N. Y., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Ever stop to think how much there is in cold cash behind a strictly amateur event like the national tennis championships? ... You might if you had spent a week at the West Side Tennis club watching the players run and slide across several acres of the kind of turf you wish you could grow in your own front yard. ... The club occupies some 12 1/2 acres of city property that would be worth plenty as apartment house sites. It has America's only stadium built solely for tennis, a nifty clubhouse, of course, and more than 50 courts, 22 of them covered with the fine turf that is required for championship play. ... It's a long way from the re-treaded cow pasture where you used to knock a worn-out ball around with a loosely strung bat and call it tennis.

Basic Requirements
Roughly speaking, if you can speak roughly in such surroundings, the tournament site represents a half-million dollar investment and it does a business of more than \$40,000 a year aside from the income from the championships. ... The ivy-covered stadium cost about \$275,000 when it was built in 1923 and it was just about paid for during the life of two ten-year contracts with the United States Lawn Tennis Association, so the rest of the layout is the club's responsibility. ... West Side officers are pretty proud of the fact that the 700-odd members only have to pay about \$65 a year for all this; that nearly 150 members in the armed forces don't have to pay any dues, and that they're operating in the black this year without expending a cent of tournament profits.

Conservative, That's All
This year's six-day championship tournament looks like small potatoes compared with years when the gates ran higher than \$100,000, but officials figure they can't do much worse than in 1942. ... Then they optimistically agree to cut in a war charity for a percentage of the receipts. ... After the expenses were paid and the charity received \$9,500, the club and USLTA split what was left—\$8.65 each. ... This year the posters merely read "armed forces will benefit by donation of tennis equipment."
