AMERICANS MEET NAZI RESISTANCE

AIRMEN STAGE BIGGEST RAID OVER FRANCE

Greatest Formations Of American And British Planes Pound French Ports And Airfields While Amphibious Units Go Through Invasion Rehearsal

London, Sept. 9.—(AP)—With Allied forces swarming into the heart of fallen Italy, the greatest formations of American bombers ever hurled across the channel by daylight pounded today at enemy ports and air fields in northern France, carrying into the eighth consecutive day a terrific aerial offensive which may form the final prelude to invasion from the west.

The unprecedented assault, which was launched in conjunction with the largest invasion exercises ever seen in the channel, climaxed 18 hours of steady pounding of Hitler's Atlantic fortifications during which not a single Allied plane was downed by German air units charged with defending Europe against the long-awaited Allied push.

Enemy naval vessels and coast artillery were among the prime targets of the vast bombardment accompanying the invasion rehearsal which kept the French coastline alight all night with bomb bursts and anti-aircraft fire and rattled windows this morning six miles inland from the English shore.

"It was like the battle of Britain the other way around," said a resident on the Dover-Folkestone road. "The huge combined operations workout started a flurry of rumors that the invasion of France finally was under way, despite an early communique announcing that the maneuvers were only exercises."

American Flying Fortresses and Thunderbolt fighters spearheaded the widespread daylight attacks. First announcements from U. S. headquarters and the British Air Ministry said that American heavy bombers and RAF fighter-bombers struck at air fields and other targets in northern France while fighter squadrons patrolled the channel and swept over France—all with remarkably little opposition.

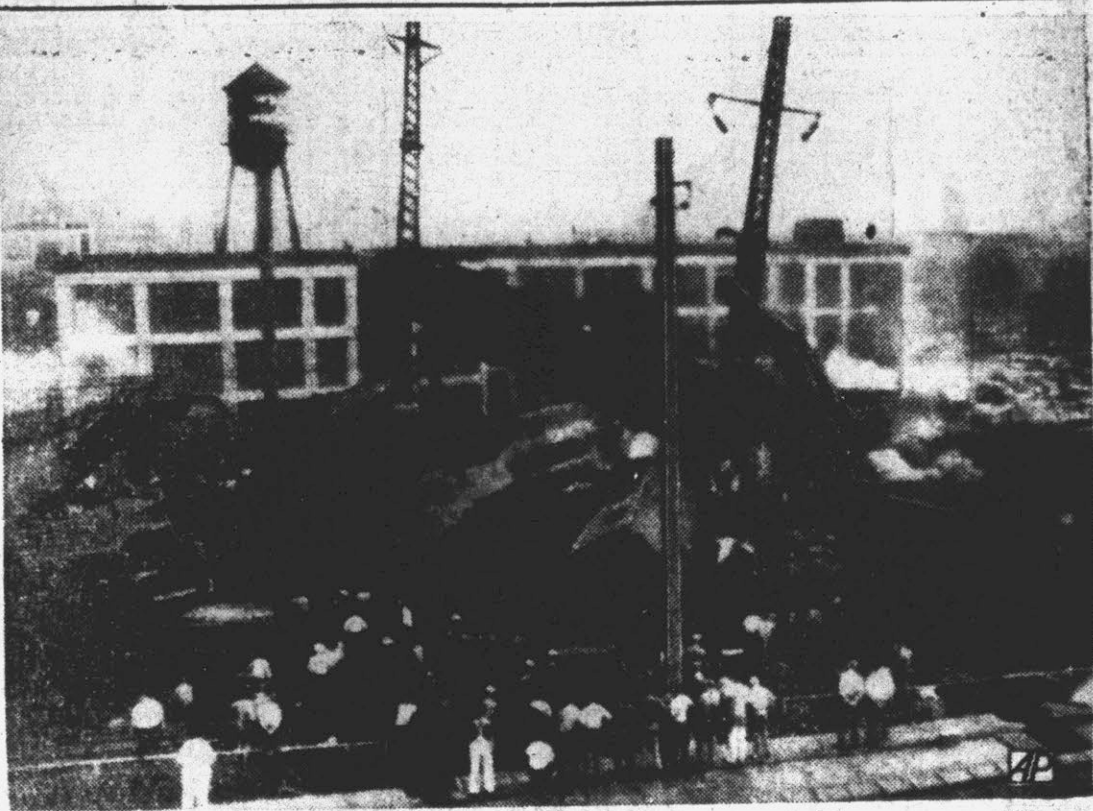
President Urges Public To Purchase More Bonds

Washington, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Axis Italy has fallen. Berlin and Tokyo are surely next, but the task ahead is "bigger and tougher" and Americans should fend off any rocking chair philosophy that the war is won.

In this vein, President Roosevelt touched off the Third War Bond drive for \$15,000,000,000 last night—a drive that was planned weeks ahead and hit by remarkable coincidence almost the exact time of Rome's unconditional surrender.

Anticipating a wave of optimism, the President warned in a radio speech that the "time for celebration" hadn't yet arrived. Moreover, he asserted, he has an idea that the day of final victory will find this nation in a mood of "grim determination that this shall not happen again," rather than in a celebrating

PROSPECT FOR MORE RUBBER

Dewey Predicts More Tires For Civilians

Washington, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Synthetic rubber production is going through an up and down phase that keeps the output bouncing around between 50 and 150 per cent of rated plant capacity.

Col. Bradley N. Dewey, acting rubber director, in his first analysis of the situation since William R. Jeffers resigned as boss of the rubber program, put it this way today.

When the big, new synthetic plants are rolling right, it's not unusual for them to produce 170 per cent of rated capacity. Conversely, a plant's output can drop—and often does—from almost double its planned capacity to next to nothing.

All the plants show these typical peaks and valleys in production. It has been found that the catalysts used in producing chemical rubber must be changed at regular intervals, which slows plant production sharply.

Dewey said the intermittent character of synthetic production would not affect the over-all rubber goals, however.

The outlook for tires for civilians is moderately rosy, Col. Dewey said. The 1943 goal of 5,000,000 synthetic (Continued on Page Four)

Surrender Expected To Free Prisoners

London, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Italy's surrender is expected to mean freedom for approximately 2,000 Americans and 70,000 British and Canadian troops and civilians now held as Italian prisoners of war.

"It can be assumed that the unconditional surrender accepted by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower took into account the immediate release of all prisoners of war and that they will reach Allied hands as soon as conditions allow," the British War Office said today.

High British officials held in Italy include Air Marshal O. T. Boyd and Maj. Gen. Carlton Dewar.

Associated Press war correspondents Larry Allen and Godfrey H. P. Anderson also are prisoners.

Russians Storm Toward Last German Defenses

Nazis Fleeing Toward "Second Wall" Beyond Dnieper River

London, Sept. 9.—(AP)—The Russians in a special order of the day tonight announced the capture of the north Ukraine rail center of Bakhmach, 15 miles west of Khotin and 110 miles east of Kiev.

Bakhmach already had been partly by-passed by the swiftly advancing Russians who had captured several points to the northwest, cutting the railway to Gomel.

Marshal Stalin's order of the day was broadcast by the Moscow radio and recorded here by the Soviet Monitor.

With the great steel center of Stalino and the rich Donets industrial basin safely in their grasp, two victorious Red armies swept forward today on the heels of the demoralized Germans fleeing toward the Dnieper river, their last main line of defense on Russian territory.

Front dispatches placed the Russian troops less than 70 miles from the Dnieper at some points, but the Germans were exposed to a greater immediate danger in the region to the south of Stalino. Here their entire southern flank was now exposed to the terrific pressure of the Russian armored offensive. From Mariupol on the Sea of Azov westward to the Isthmus of Perekop and the gateway to the Crimea.

The entire 600-mile front stretching as far north as Smolensk was ablaze as the mighty Russian war machine plunged ahead to rid Russian soil of the invaders before the (Continued on Page Three)

Six More Jap Vessels Sunk

Washington, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Six more Japanese merchant ships have been sunk by American submarines and four have been damaged in attacks on enemy supply lines, the navy announced today.

These ten successful attacks raised to 319 the total of Japanese transport, cargo and warships which have been reported sunk or damaged by American submarines since the war started.

This total includes 223 ships definitely listed as sunk.

Ask High Schools To Teach Driving

Raleigh, Sept. 9.—(AP)—An army delegation led by Lieut. Col. John E. Mitty of Camp Lee, Va., recommended today that the State School Board adopt pre-induction driving courses for boys and girls in all high schools.

The army representatives, speaking for the quartermaster general's office, said that the number of men in the army who could not properly drive motor vehicles was astoundingly high, and that in innumerable instances inductees had to be taught the basic principles of handling vehicles.

The recommendations had the backing of Motor Vehicles Commissioner T. Boddie Ward and Ronald Houtt, head of the Safety Division. Houtt recently returned from a driving school at Camp Lee.

The WAR TODAY

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Italy's surrender is a good deal like the Christmas present which we knew we should find in our stocking but which is none the less a matter of much rejoicing.

The capitulation of this first member of the Axis to go under in the Allied flood represents a military triumph but the moral effect may be even greater. This is particularly true of the Balkans, where Axis satellites and the occupied countries are eager to get at Hitler's throat. It will cast a long shadow across the unhappy people of Germany itself.

Many advantages lie in this triumph, but it seems to me that the vital consideration is that it represents the liquidation of Axis power in the whole Mediterranean theater. One thing the Allies have had to keep constantly to the fore in their plans—that control of the Mediterranean was essential for final victory. Had Hitler broken through the Russians into the low Caucasus and Middle East, or had he overrun Egypt, there's no telling what straits he might have driven the United Nations by this time.

The preliminaries to the conquest of Italy are great pages in the history of a global war which undoubtedly is ushering in a new epoch in the progress of mankind.

JAPS SUFFER HEAVY LOSSES IN NEW GUINEA

Allies Slowly Closing Trap Around 20,000 Japs In Lae-Salamaua Area

Allied Headquarters in the Southwest Pacific, Sept. 9.—(AP)—The Japanese air force, staggered by losses approximating 1,000 planes in little over a month in the south and southwest Pacific, is believed depleting its strength in China and Japan to support worsening ground situations in New Guinea and the Solomons.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters said today "the enemy apparently is drawing heavily from its air forces from a succession of recent heavy defeats" such as the destruction of more than 200 planes at Wewak, New Guinea.

Then headquarters added: "As a result, he is becoming weakened and vulnerable to air penetration in other theaters."

New air losses were listed in today's communique which also reported Australian veterans of African campaigns brushing aside Japanese patrols five miles north-east of Lae, New Guinea, and strengthening of Allied paratroop positions seized to the northwest.

Twenty-one Japanese planes definitely were destroyed and nine others probably as the enemy attempted to raid Darwin, Australia, attack Allied positions on New Guinea and resist a heavy American plane raid on Bougainville in the Solomons.

Today's communique reported a continued absence of heavy resistance by the Japanese at Lae but more than 20 miles below it, the Solomons region south of Salamaua there was sharp fighting. Ground troops neared Salamaua maintained their pressure on the enemy at the bottom hinge of a trap belt. (Continued On Page Three)

More Air Raids Against The Japs

New Delhi, Sept. 9.—(AP)—The first break in the stormy monsoon season in three months today enabled American medium bombers to blast at the Japanese-held rail link between Mandalay and Lashio, rail head of the Burma road, a 10th U. S. Airforce announcement said.

The end of the rainy season, which ordinarily lasts from June into September, was expected to be the signal for a general Allied land and aerial offensive to recapture Burma and reopen the Burma road, vital supply route to China.

Clipper Crash Was Accident

Washington, Sept. 9.—(AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Board said today an accidental contact of a wing with the water probably caused the crash of a Pan-American flying boat at Lisbon, Portugal, February 22, in which 19 passengers and five crew members were injured fatally.

The board said there were no signs of fire or explosion in the wreckage and no indications of malicious tampering or sabotage.

Joins Allies

London, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Reuters said in a dispatch from Teheran tonight that Iran has declared war on Germany.

Iran, formerly known as Persia, has been cooperating with the Allies for many months, permitting the use of its territory in the sending of lend-lease supplies of Russia.

The country has approximately 12,000,000 inhabitants.

COLE OPPOSES SECRET PACTS

Would Keep Official Commitments Within Statutes

Washington, Sept. 9.—(AP)—A stiff, plain-spoken congressional stand against secret agreements between this nation and foreign powers was proposed by Rep. Cole (R-NY) today as a warning to the world that such pacts will not be binding upon the American people.

In the midst of mounting debate over United States foreign policy after the war, Cole drafted a 54-word, one-sentence measure which would serve notice upon friend and foe alike that no official commitment this government except under specific law. His bill reads:

"No promise, agreement, commitment or undertaking made by any person with any foreign country government or power, shall be binding upon the people of the United States except such as may have been made or be made in accordance with and under authority of law."

Prepare Way For Invasion

Italy Sept. 7.—(AP)—(Delayed)—Two British soldiers who landed in Italy six days ahead of the Eighth army and survived the promise of Italian troops not to fire on the invasion forces, were liberated from prison today by civilian guards.

The former London "bobby" and the former Yorkshire school teacher told this story of the virtual complete breakdown of the Italian army's will to resist.

"If the Eighth army's invasion had been delayed a couple of days longer we could have persuaded the Italians to surrender intact. As it was, any number of Italians wanted to cross the Messina straits and give themselves up in Sicily. It seemed as if all of them were plotting to do that."

COAL PROBLEM TO GET WORSE

Ickes Says War Demands Growing Greater

Washington, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Secretary of Interior Ickes said today the "coal situation in the United States is bad and it's going to get worse," partly because it will be necessary to furnish more coal to the military services to maintain operations in fallen Italy.

Ickes said coal already is being shipped for the use of the army in Italy, to enable it to keep utilities, ships, locomotives, manufacturing plants and other facilities in operation.

These needs, he said, could be met only with coal from England, the United States and South Africa, and he asserted that "we will do our share" although he added, "it will have an adverse effect on the domestic coal situation."

Italian Surrender Puts New Strains On Hitler

Washington, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Allied Forces sweeping through fallen Italy are believed to have one prime military objective—the occupation of air bases from which to destroy Germany's oil sources in Rumania and Hungary.

Bases within easy bombing reach to the great oil center at Ploesti, Rumania, and the lesser fields in Hungary may prove to be the key to Hitler's whole European fortress.

At the same time, military experts here say, the launching of an Italian-based aerial offensive against southern Germany and enemy industrial centers in the occupied countries to the east would place an insupportable strain on Germany's higher defenses and hasten the breakup of the German air force as well as the destruction of vital war plants.

American Fifth Army In Action; Italians Reported To Have Seized Brenner Pass. Gen. Eisenhower Says Operations Going According To Plan

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Sept. 9.—(AP)—A powerful American and British force under U. S. Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark surged ashore in the vicinity of Naples, a third of the way up the Italian boot, at 4 a. m., today.

It was immediately engaged by German forces fighting fiercely in the midst of the chaos of Italy's unconditional surrender, but Allied headquarters announced that operations were going according to plan and that prisoners already had been taken.

(A German broadcast said American formations landed at Anagni, 21 miles south of Naples and on the north side of the Gulf of Salerno, yesterday. The broadcast declared, however, that the Americans had not yet come in contact with German forces.)

At the same time it was announced that waves of flying Fortresses, striking six hours before the armistice with Italy yesterday, had wiped out German military headquarters in Italy with a terrific nap-bomb bombing of Frascati, 13 miles outside Rome.

Official reports said the town, nearly every building of which was occupied by German officers, was leveled. The town, with a population of about 12,000, is famous for its wine.

The landing operations this morning (10 p. m. Wednesday, eastern war time), putting Americans into combat in Italy for the first time, initiated what was likely to prove the grimmest campaign yet fought in the Mediterranean theater.

British Gen. Sir Harold Alexander, who commanded Allied ground forces through the Tunisian and Sicilian campaigns, is directing the new operations of all troops in Italy, it was announced.

(In Washington, Secretary of War Stimson said troops attacking the landing near Naples included units of the American Fifth army which had been commanded by Gen. Clark in North Africa. The Fifth army, as a whole never has been in action.)

The opening of the new Italian front in the Naples area promised the seizure of Naples, Italy's second greatest port, and also put the Germans in southern Italy under pressure from two directions as the British Eighth army under Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery continued to drive up the tortuous Italian toe.

While other Allied forces executed a second landing early Wednesday at Vibo Valentia on the Gulf of Eufemia, 30 miles north of Palermo, the Eighth army, it was announced, was continuing its advance. (Continued on Page Two)

nounced, swept forward until it held the road running across the peninsula from Locri to Gioia. This gave the Allies complete possession of about 40 miles of the length of the toe.

Here the Allies were being steadily reinforced.

The German plan apparently was to fight a stubborn delaying action in southern Italy as long as possible until their main defense line is reached in the mountains south of the Po valley.

Northern Italy appeared to be under German domination. Although Italian armed forces were under orders not to fight the Allies, reports had not yet made clear whether all Italian units were abandoning the fight. German broadcasts announced that a new fascist government had been formed—apparently a sort of German-Italian puppet government-in-exile to hold Italians in the fight.

(Great confusion was created by radio reports from the Germans who in an early morning broadcast quoted an official spokesman as declaring that German troops had occupied all central and northern Italy.

(Two hours later, however, a Berlin broadcast said Italian troops had occupied Brenner pass leading into Germany, and admitted that Italian forces were turning on the Germans in clashes in many places throughout the peninsula.

(The Germans declared the new fascist government in Berlin had

(Stefani also broadcast "another rumor that the British fleet is off the port of Genoa, and it is said that German forces have occupied the heights of San Giuliano and also the barracks of Turia. German lorries full of troops are passing at full speed through the streets."

(Swiss radio reports said Allied planes in hundreds were descending on newly obtained Italian airfields.

"Aside from the landings in the Naples area, rumors of Allied landings all along the western coast of the Italian peninsula.

(Reports reaching Madrid, said United Nations troops were at Ostia, port of Rome, and also at Leghorn, important port and naval base, 160 miles north of Rome.

(Stockholm newspapers said the Allies were attacking on bridgeheads at two other places on both sides of Rome, at Civitavecchia, 40 miles north of the capital, and at Gaeta, 75 miles to the south of the capital. These reports said landing attempts also were under way at Genoa.

(Illustrating the apparent confusion inside Italy, Madrid reports said battles had taken place between Germans and Italians throughout the Po region, and that Italian army leaders had rushed troops to leading airports in the Milan region to hold the bases against German seizure.

(The Germans claimed that Italian troops in Greece had been ordered to surrender their arms and go to the coast to await further German orders.)

Events in Italy were moving at a dizzy speed since the kingdom's capitulation was announced yesterday, as the Allies rushed men and guns to the peninsula in a race against German forces.

British and American warships added to the assaults by bombardments of the Germans along the coasts.

Hitler apparently had reached a decision as announced by the Berlin radio, to throw the German army into a full-scale defense of Italy.

Thousands of German troops, including some of the best, had been pouring into Italy in recent weeks in anticipation of an Italian surrender.

Hard-pressed as was the Reich on the Russian front, Hitler apparently was straining every resource to prevent a breakthrough on the south.

As a consequence the Allied forces in the Mediterranean under Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower were presented with a gargantuan task that may speed up a decision of the whole European war.

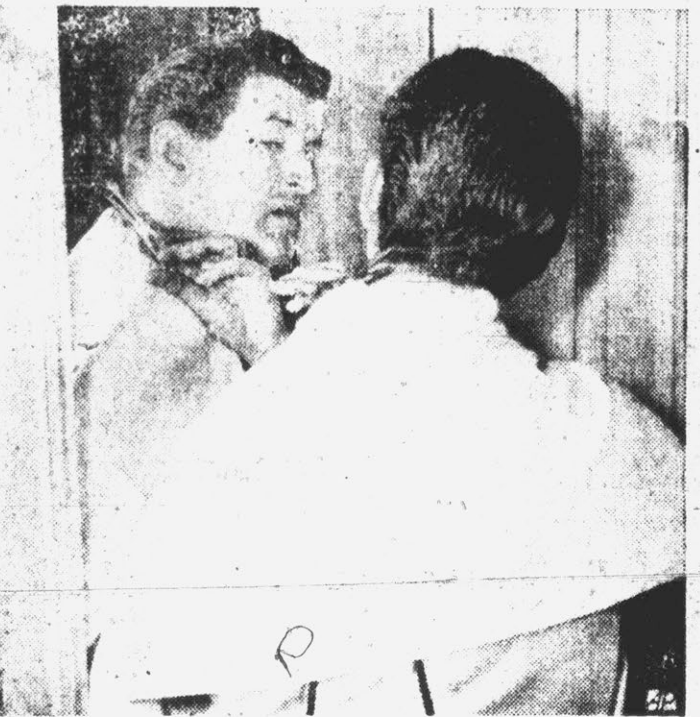

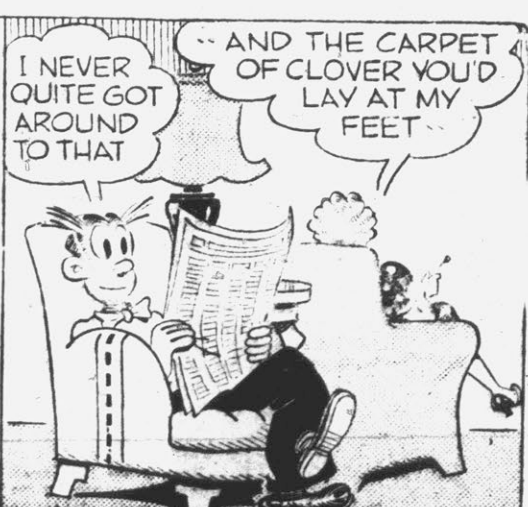
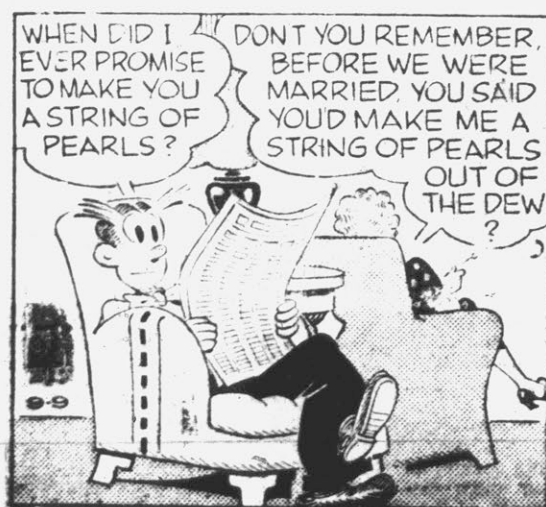

Adoglio Sends 11 Regrets To Adolf

New York, Sept. 9.—(AP)—A Rome broadcast disclosed today that Pietro Adoglio sent a telegram to Adolf Hitler in Berlin yesterday, telling him that Italy was not to ask the Allies for an armistice, "to avoid total ruin."

One cannot ask the people to fight when all legitimate hope—I do not say of victory, even of resistance—has vanished," Adoglio's message said.

Similar telegrams were sent to German diplomatic missions in London, Budapest, Bucharest, Sofia, and Bratislava, the broadcast said, so that they "might inform the governments to which they are accredited" of Italy's reasons for seeking an armistice.

The broadcast was recorded by U. S. Foreign Broadcast Intelligence service.

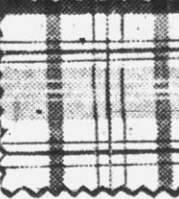

A legend has come down from antiquity regarding Thales, the Greek thinker, who has often been called the father of philosophy. He is said to have died as the result of falling into a cistern, and the accident occurred as he was walking along explaining the movements of the planets to an old woman.

Of many a person it has been said that he threw his life away on people who did not deserve it. As a matter of fact, the only people who throw their lives away are those who live them selfishly. If a man spends his life pandering only to his appetites, sponging off the efforts of others, or making himself prosperous by the shrewd use of his wits, he has indeed thrown his life away. He was meant for greater things than these. But he spends his life pointing people to the stars, leading them to see something above themselves, then no matter how inconsequential these people may be, the man who does this has not thrown his life away. David Livingston, dying for the naked savages of Africa, or Father Damien for the lepers of the southwest Pacific, or John G. Paton for the natives of the New Hebrides, if these men did not throw their lives away, they died pointing out the stars of idealism and Christian faith to hordes of people whom the world would call inconsequential.

But they did not die in vain. We can be sure that endeavor of this kind is never in vain.

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LET'S DO OUR PART

American forces are today locked in battle with the Germans on the European continent in a struggle that must last until the Axis is defeated and Berlin and Tokyo are in Allied hands. As pictured by President Roosevelt in his address to the nation last night, the task ahead is "bigger and tougher" and our men cannot achieve victory unless they have the necessary weapons and materials with which to fight.

In order to continue to provide the necessities to carry the war to a successful conclusion our nation today launched the Third War Loan campaign to raise FIFTY BILLION DOLLARS. Every man, woman and child is urged to go the limit in purchasing the bonds and in aiding in the drive in every possible manner.

It was wonderful news yesterday when we received the announcement that Italy had surrendered, but it will be still more wonderful when the announcement can come that we have won complete victory over our enemies and the fighting is at an end. Until that day comes our men in the armed forces cannot let-up in their efforts for a single day or even a single minute, and certainly there is no reason why we should think that those of us on the home front have the right to let-up in our own part in the war effort.

WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

(Second of four articles on the Peacetime Future of World War II Veterans.)

Washington — Except for laws providing benefits and rehabilitation for disabled veterans, the only "guarantee" for the veterans of World War II on the status books today is Section 8 of the Selective Service Act — the so-called job security clause.

It provides:

- (1) That if a veteran applies to his employer within 40 days after his discharge from the service, that employer must restore the man or woman, for the women in all services are included, to his old job at his old pay, "or one of like seniority, status and pay, unless the employer's circumstances have so changed as to make it impossible or unreasonable to do so."
- (2) The employer must maintain insurance and other benefits for an employee in the service in accordance with terms prevailing at the time of his departure.
- (3) An employee so rehired cannot be fired without cause for one year.
- (4) And if the employer fails to do so, he can be compelled by the courts and forced to compensate "for any loss of wages or benefits" from the time the veteran made application for the job.

The basic part of the Selective Service Act, it is administered by

the Reemployment Division of Selective Service.

Section 8 has been described variously as ambiguous, impractical, unenforceable and as full of holes as Hamburg. Certain it is that is a celebration of intent—but a powerful one—rather than an attempt by Congress to set up an ironclad statute to put the veterans back in civilian life just where they left off. Such an attempt would be more impractical than Section 8.

The important thing is that Section 8 is working. Men are being discharged from the armed services at the rate of about 7,000 a week (more than 500,000 already have been mustered out) and while men are still going into the services at many times that number, it has provided a fair sampling.

Selective Service says as yet it has had no report that court action has been invoked to enforce Section 8.

In most cases where difficulties have arisen, a compromise between the veteran and his former employer has been worked out by reemployment members of the local boards.

It is obvious that many employers who will have shut up shop or changed their businesses will have no jobs for the men they formerly employed. It is also obvious that if the men have been rendered unfit to perform the tasks they formerly did, the employer is not bound to reinstate them in their old jobs at the same pay.

There are other things on the fire for these men and women. As one observer here put it, "It's becoming more apparent every day that if there are just 11,000,000 jobs in the country when the men come home, those who will get them will be the 11,000,000 veterans."

Fighting Men To See World Series

Chicago, Sept. 9.—(AP)—American fighting men all over the world are going to see baseball's World Series this year.

They will see it in a two-reel, 22-minute sound film that will be distributed to all foreign bases. Lew Fonseca, promotional director of the American League and producer of its annual motion pictures, said today.

Filming of the 1943 series—virtually a cinch to be a rematch of New York's Yankees and the champion St. Louis Cardinals—will be undertaken by the American League in cooperation with the War and Navy Departments and two sponsors, Fonseca said. Sponsors are the Hillier & Bradsby Company of Louisville, bat manufacturers, and A. G. Spalding & Bros.

The announcement came as an overseas tour by an all-star major league squad also was being considered. Fonseca declared that "100 prints of the film will be earmarked for immediate distribution to foreign bases in all parts of the world. Another 100 prints will be sent to army, navy, marine and coast guard bases in this country—but the first shipment goes to our fighting men overseas."

"Highlights of the play-by-play will be shown, with close-ups of star players and plays, and shots of several high baseball executives."

The War and Navy Departments, Fonseca said, not only gave their enthusiastic endorsement, but also are providing the necessary film priority and permission to use cameramen who have been doing special army and navy work.

Cole, a member of the House Naval committee, emphasized that he was not against American participation in world affairs, that, to the contrary, Americans now must "look beyond our coastline." "But," he asserted, "we should take steps now to avoid having some foreign government announce to us after the war that a representative of the United States had made certain promises or commitments which it had accepted in good faith."

He maintained however, that such documents as the Atlantic Charter—one which he described as a "laudable expression of desire that might be distorted by some country into a positive agreement"—could not have the effect of force until ratified by Congress.

them out of France and all other captive countries; and we must strike them on their own soil from all directions."

The Italian "denouement" consummated plans made at Casablanca last January, said Mr. Roosevelt, and he and Prime Minister Churchill have made "new well-considered plans for the future."

"But throughout these conferences we have never lost sight of the fact that this war will become bigger and tougher," he said, "rather than easier during the long months

to come." Declaring the stupendous job involves staggering costs, he said "we can not afford to be niggardly with any of our resources."

Americans will be satisfied to give our troops only the best and the most in munitions and "our dominating power" comes from the voluntary bond purchases and the taxes paid by the civilian population, said the president. Expensive in money, the war can to some extent be kept to a "minimum cost in lives" by an outpouring of even greater financial effort.

The enemy will surely be watching the outcome of the bond drive, the President asserted, for "every

dollar that you invest is your personal message to defiance to our common enemies — to the ruthless savages of Germany and Japan."

The first and second war loans—which raised \$13,000,000,000 and \$18,000,000,000 respectively — "helped pay the staggering bill for the Italian conquest," said Treasury Secretary Morgenthau, introducing the President.

Screen stars opened the drive with personal appearances at a celebration on the Washington Monument grounds earlier in the day. They joined later with other artists in an hour's radio show which included the President's speech.

counting on an internal German collapse and their plans, so far as known, are based even on the possibility that Germany may still retain some limited offensive power next spring. Their view apparently is that victory now appears certain by the Winter of 1944 with the remote but nevertheless real possibility of a German collapse in the Winter immediately ahead.

The surrender of Italy puts new strains on German military strength at several points. The Italians had an estimated three or four divisions in southern France and 18 to 20 in

the Balkans.

The garrison duty they did must be taken over by Nazi and possibly affiliated troops. There have been reports that Bulgarians had relieved Italians in Yugoslavia and to some extent in Greece. But the situation is such now that the Nazi high command may not place too much confidence in the will-to-fight of the Bulgarians.

The fate of the Italian fleet, like the fate of the Italian divisions abroad, is in the balance. If the Germans learned or guessed what was coming, they probably made some effort to seize such Italian warships as were in upper Adriatic ports. Unless these ships cleared out

in the five day period between the signing of the armistice Friday and its disclosure yesterday, the Allies had little chance of gaining control of all of Italy's three modern and four old battleships, three battered heavy cruisers, three aircraft carriers (last reported under construction) and other vessels.

From the Allied point of view, the main element in the Mediterranean situation now is that heavy forces such as Britain's Mediterranean fleet are no longer needed in great strength and may be released for service elsewhere. Their transfer to Indian waters for the expected assault on Burma this fall would not be surprising.
