ALLIES SEIZE OFFENSIVE AT SALERNO

Russian Forces Capture Novorossisk Naval Base

East German Railway Escape Route From Crimea Threatened; Vanguard Of Russian Forces Only 50 Miles From Nazi Defenses Along The Dnieper

London, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Novorossisk, the Black Sea naval base in the German bridgehead of the Caucasus, fell to the Russians today after a five-day battle between Soviet land, sea and air forces and more than four German divisions, while Red army troops driving westward between Bryansk and Nexhin captured Novgorod-Seversk, 80 miles from the White Russian border.

The capture of the two important but widely separated points on the far-flung Russian front was announced by Premier Joseph Stalin in separate orders of the day, broadcast by the Moscow radio and recorded here by the Soviet Monitor.

To take Novgorod-Seversk, the central front Soviet forces of army Gen. Constantine Rokossovsky forced the Dnieper river and battered down the defenses which the Germans had prepared on the western bank.

Russian troops in the northern Caucasus cooperated with units of the Black Sea fleet in the combined land and sea operation. The vital port was taken by storm today after five days of fierce fighting during which the Russians routed three German divisions, a Rumanian division and detachments of German marines, Marshal Stalin announced.

Battering their way across the central Ukraine plains toward the vital Dnieper river defense wall, approximately 70 miles to the west, Red army columns which captured Nexhin yesterday apparently were aiming their main thrust today against the Kiev-Poltava-Lozovaya railway, severance of which would isolate German armies to the north and south.

Capture of Nexhin, a main bastion of Nazi defenses before the Dnieper barrier, already has cut all but one rail link between the enemy forces operating in the central and southern sectors of the Ukraine. If the Red army spearhead can plant themselves astride the Kiev-Poltava-Lozovaya line before the autumn rains make large-scale military operations impossible, the Germans in the south would face the possibility of another defeat as that suffered at Stalingrad.

Military Heads Declare Father Draft Necessary

Washington, Sept. 16.—(AP)—The Navy needs to draft 533,000 men to meet its manpower requirements for the last four months of this year, Rear Admiral Randall Jacobs, naval personnel chief, today told the Senate military committee, which is studying the necessity for drafting fathers.

This means selective service will be called upon to furnish upward of a million men by Dec. 31, since army spokesmen testified yesterday that inductions will vary from 145,000 to 175,000 a month for the rest of 1943 to build up an army of 7,700,000 men.

SIX INDICTED IN WAR FRAUD

Massachusetts Congressman Headed Contract Racket

Washington, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Representative James M. Curley (D-Mass.) and five others were indicted by federal grand jury here today on 21 counts charging violation of the mail fraud statute in connection with operation of an alleged government war contract brokerage racket.

Another defendant is Donald Wakefield Smith of Washington and Pittsburgh, a former member of the National Labor Relations board.

All six defendants were described as officers and directors of engineering firms, with offices in Washington, Chicago and Boston. Curley, long prominent in Democratic politics, is a former governor of Massachusetts and former mayor of Boston. He is a member of the Democratic National Committee.

The indictment alleged that between June 20, 1941, and February 20, 1942, the defendants "falsely and fraudulently represented themselves as being experienced and competent consulting engineers with special facilities and qualifications for obtaining war contracts from the government but that they had little or no experience in this field and 'could not and did not produce any of the services for which they were paid'."

The indictment alleges that retainers fees of as much as \$9,000 were accepted from clients and contracts were entered into calling for (Continued on Page Two)

Allies Tighten Death Trap On Japs At Lae

Japs Put Up Stiff Resistance As Allies Smash Outer Defenses

Allied Headquarters in the Southwest Pacific, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Backing the Japanese into a death trap where they are forced to fight, Allied jungle troops have battered through pillboxes, trenches and machinegun nests with the aid of artillery and planes to bring nearer the fall of the big air base of Lae, New Guinea.

East of Lae, Australians are only two miles from the center of the coastal town and are about to overrun the prized Malahang airfield. On the west, where the intricate defenses were breached after hours of fighting, another force in the Markham valley is only five miles away.

To the south, Americans and Australians who annihilated most of a Japanese garrison in capturing the airfield and harbor town of Salamaua left behind patrols to hunt down the surviving stragglers and moved in force more than half way along the 18 miles of jungle trail separating the two Huon Gulf bases.

The Japanese, tricked by Gen. Douglas MacArthur's strategy into believing the main Allied push would be made below Salamaua, have offered scarcely any opposition until now to pincer forces which landed from the sea above Lae Sept. 4 and from transport planes behind Lae Sept. 5.

Suggests Creation Of Food Committee

Chicago, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Creation by Congress of an independent committee on the nation's war food program, like the Baruch Rubber Committee, was suggested today at the opening of the National Food Conference by Wheeler McMillen of Philadelphia, editor of the Farm Journal. McMillen was the first of several speakers, including food industry authorities and a half dozen U. S. senators, invited by Chairman Frank Gannett, Rochester, N. Y., publisher, who called the conference, he said, at the request of agricultural officials of 16 states.

"After nearly two years of war, the nation finds itself without visible evidence of a consistent food policy," McMillen said in an address prepared for delivery to the conference.

ALLIES RESUME AIR OFFENSIVE AGAINST NAZIS

Nine Day Lull Broken With Series of Raids Over France And Germany

London, Sept. 16.—(AP)—American Flying Fortresses, following up an inaugural dusk raid on Hitler's Europe and probably the Allies' biggest night assault on the continent, bombed naval installations at Nantes in France today in their second foray in two days.

An official announcement of the raid on Nantes, big French industrial center at the mouth of the river Loire, said fortresses were escorted by American Thunderbolts.

In the mammoth operation last night the Fortresses, joined by Liberator and Marauders, plastered Nazi airfields and aircraft plants in France, in their first after-dusk assault, while RAF planes hit Berlin anew and stabbed at one of Hitler's important rubber factories at Montlucon, only 43 miles from Vichy.

It was the first attack on Berlin since the pre-dawn hours of Sept. 4 and presumably was carried out by the RAF's swift Mosquito bombers which pummeled the German capital between the saturation attacks by fleets of four-engined craft.

Other RAF bombers struck at additional targets in northwest Germany, the Air Ministry announced.

Montlucon, only 43 miles northwest of Vichy, was the principal target of the night-flying formations which concentrated on a factory supplying much needed tires for Hitler's war machine.

The Vichy radio said the town of Chateaufort, also, was attacked, but the British announcement made no mention of this.

Last night's raid, first since the Sept. 6 attack on Munich, followed by a few hours the first after-dusk assault by a combined force of American Flying Fortresses, Liberators and Marauders which raided the Paris area. Here the Hispano-Suiza and Caudron-Renault aircraft plants and a ball bearing works were the main targets.

At the same time German air raiders subjected suburban London to one of its severest bombings in months.

The raid on Paris marked the first time that Fortresses, Liberators and Marauders had joined in the same operation in the European theater and the first time they had gone out and come home after dusk.

Brig. Gen. Frederick L. Anderson, commander of the U. S. Eighth air force bomber command, pronounced the experiment a success and presaging the possibility that they would soon team up with the RAF in bombing Europe by night.

Last night's operations cost the RAF eight bombers and two fighters, the air ministry said. One enemy plane was shot down.

Although clouds made it difficult to see the results of the bombing at Montlucon, the communique said first reports indicated that the attack was effective.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

One of the finest services Fuehrer Hitler could render the Allies is his revival of the fallen and dishonored Fascist regime under the control—or so the Nazis say—of its old master, Mussolini.

The United Nations had carried out their aim of smashing Fascism. The collapse of the incompetent and corrupt government exposed the Fascist rule to the world for exactly what it was—a dictatorship of gangsters who not only waged cowardly war on small and weak countries, and against their grievously wounded neighbor, but made themselves and their mistresses rich by plundering their own people.

Why is Hitler thus exhibiting Fascism in its nakedness and so taking the chance of weakening his own dictatorship? Well, there are several reasons, "all of them understandable. In the first place he is, of course, playing for time, and so is trying to fool the world for a brief period into the idea that Fascism really isn't dead at all but is still a potent influence and a tower of strength to the Axis.

The highest is particularly anxious to convey this impression to the Balkans. He is trying frantically to prevent further disaffection among his Balkan satellites, whose allegiance to the Axis has been due in considerable measure to reassurance his home front that all is still well in the Axis camp. And he figures that his ruse may produce some discouragement for Allied peoples.

Gives Information About Truck Tires

Eligible truck operators who hold tire rationing certificates but who are unable to locate within their county the proper tires may apply to their nearest Motor Transport District Office of the Office of Defense Transportation for assistance, the ODT announced today.

This information will in turn be transmitted daily to the Office of the Rubber Director, who will endeavor to arrange for the proper redistribution of tires so that all the certificates can be honored as quickly as possible after issuance.

This procedure was decided upon, the ODT stated, after some truck operators reported they were unable to obtain critically needed tires and as a result had to keep vehicles out of operation.

In some cases, it was reported, important war freight was delayed for this reason. It is hoped that the new arrangement will help essential operators to obtain prompt relief, the ODT stated.

Gen. Clark Declares Bridgeheads Now Secure And Not One Foot of Ground Will Be Given Up; Montgomery's Forces Are Rushing Toward Juncture With Fifth Army

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Sept. 16.—

(AP)—Sweating British and American soldiers of the Fifth Army have lashed out at the Germans, driving them back from the Salerno bridgehead and have clinched their foothold in Italy, Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark announced today.

Gen. Clark launched his offensive this morning on the eighth day of the biggest battle yet fought in the Mediterranean, and threw the German armored forces back between the junction of the rivers Sele and Calore north of Oltavilla in the central sector of the 27-mile front.

Simultaneously, Gen. Clark, in an order of the day to his troops, declared "our bridgehead is secure. Additional troops are landing every day and we are here to stay. Not one foot of ground will be given up."

Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's Eighth army, racing northward toward, but 39 miles from the southern anchor of the Fifth army's front, was mentioned by Clark, who said "a matter of hours its presence will be felt by the enemy."

A military spokesman said the Germans were in flight in the Salerno sector for the first time since the original landings eight days ago and that this morning's assault was "the first serious offensive thrust we have been able to make since getting on the beaches."

Reinforcements pouring into the bridgehead during the past 48 hours made the drive possible, he said. While the terrific fight raged back and forth under the thunder of 16-inch guns from British battleships and the artillery of lesser warships, Allied navy might poured a flood of reinforcements into the area.

Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's Fifth army, composed equally of British and Americans, was now the largest Allied force engaged in a single battle since the Mediterranean war started, and it was supported again yesterday by more than 2,000 sorties flown by the powerful northwestern African air force and separate raids by Middle East heavy bombers.

Speculation That Japs May Attack Reds Soon

Washington, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Speculation about a Japanese attack on Soviet Russia revived here today with unconfirmed reports from Chungking that a border clash—the first reported in some time—has occurred along the Mongolian frontier.

The Chungking report said the incident occurred north of Pailingmiao, a Japanese-controlled Inner Mongolian desert settlement below the border of Outer Mongolia, which is an autonomous republic dominated by Soviet Russia.

Meanwhile, other Australians had slipped ahead into Vernon's plantation, hoping to catch the Japanese as they retreated. But the surviving Japanese, instead of taking the valley road to Lae, fled into jungle-clad hills, leaving behind more than 100 dead, many machineguns and much ammunition.

From east and west, Allied artillery is pouring shells into Lae. Japanese artillery is returning the fire. Enemy resistance is reported stiffening along the line of advance.

Ahead of the Markham valley force, a path was blasted by Mitchell medium bombers through enemy defenses.

Draft Violator Gets Three Years

Spartanburg, S. C., Sept. 16.—(AP)—Harley Clifford Price of Drayton, a member of the Jehovah's Witnesses religious sect who was convicted in federal court here of violation of the National Selective Service act, this morning was sentenced by Judge C. C. Wyche to serve three years in a federal prison. Judge Wyche took under advise-

ment the motion for a new trial on behalf of Fred Richard Bailey of Union county. Also a member of Jehovah's Witnesses, who was charged with evasion charge.

Mrs. Britt Suing Insurance Company

Hearing of the suit of Mrs. Russell D. Britt of Ayden against the Aetna Life Insurance Company involving a policy on her late husband's life with a double indemnity clause in it, was begun this morning. A jury was secured shortly after court convened. Judge J. Paul Frizzelle of Snow Hill is presiding.

According to papers in the case, Russell D. Britt, while working in his father-in-law's store at Ayden, was accidentally killed April 2, 1942, while cleaning a gun. He had a 32-ga. policy with the Aetna Life Insurance Company that had a double indemnity clause providing for payment of an extra \$2,000 in case of accidental death. The company paid Britt's widow the face value of the policy (\$2,000) and declined to pay double indemnity, claiming that the shooting of Britt was not accidental, but intentional. There was no witness to the tragedy, it was said. A coroner's jury recorded the shooting as accidental.

Judge Albion Dunn of Greenville is counsel for Mrs. Britt. J. B. James of Greenville and James N. Smith of the law firm, Royall, Gosney and Smith of Goldsboro, are representing the insurance company.

Late yesterday the jury in the case of Mrs. Dessie Mayo Hart of Ayden, against Eugene Hart in her suit for maintenance and support of herself and two children, returned a verdict in favor of Mrs. Hart. Judge Frizzelle is expected to sign the judgment against Hart tomorrow morning. Hart secured a divorce from his wife in Reno, Nevada. She had at the same time instituted proceedings against him for abandonment and non-support.

Truck Deliveries Are Restricted

Washington, Sept. 16 (AP)—Restrictions on motor truck deliveries, in effect in the gasoline-starved northeastern states since last spring, will be extended to the entire nation Monday, Oct. 11.

Joseph B. Eastman, director of the ODT, said the action "is the best means of safeguarding the public's interest."

The order, announced yesterday, bans retail deliveries of packages weighing less than five pounds or measuring 60 inches or less in length and girth combined; prohibits Sunday deliveries except for ice, milk, cream; and restricts to once a week retail delivery of alcoholic beverages, tobacco, confectioneries, soft drinks, ice cream, magazines and flowers.

Bread and bakery products, meat, poultry, eggs, fruits, vegetables and fish may be delivered only three times a week. Laundries, dry cleaners and tailors are held to two trips.

lined the struggle for the second night day and hurried hundreds of tons of explosives upon the German positions with earth-shaking results.

With unchallengeable control of the sea, the Allies exploited the advantage to the utmost by moving their mobile naval batteries up close to the blackened, smoking beaches and hurling tons of screaming steel to the teeth of the Germans. The British battleships *Valiant* and *Aspirite* with their 16-inch rifles lined in the bombardment.

Gen. Clark toured the fiery arena, seeing begrimed Tommies and tough boys with his presence at the advanced positions where he told troops that every soldier must push to the last and that there must be no withdrawals.

Casualties in this seven-day battle have been the heaviest of any in the Mediterranean fighting.

At least four German divisions had been identified in the action against the 27-mile front, and more were being brought up. It was probable that as many as five had been employed in the all-out effort to break the Allied grip.

The magnitude and fierceness of the battle undoubtedly was draining German strength even more rapidly than Marshal Erwin Rommel's effort in Africa.

Gen. Montgomery's dust-stained trousers were meeting no opposition the dash that had carried them more than 15 miles in the last 24 hours.

Although Gen. Wright D. Eisenhower's headquarters communiques said the Fifth army had strengthened its hold on its bridgehead and was being reinforced and supplied, it was not considered likely that a critical phase would pass until it had been joined by the Eighth army to form a great united force.

Meanwhile, the communiques have been further to report of the British force which landed at Salerno and sliced off the Italian heel with the capture of Brindisi and was in a flanking drive on the east side of the peninsula. These troops were believed to be fanning out through the lower backbone of the peninsula, however.

The shifting nature of the hard-fought engagement was indicated by earlier field reports that the Germans had been forced to make a limited withdrawal from the wedge they had driven at the center of the Allied bridgehead near Eboli and, apparently spent, were digging in in the higher ground, and by later reports that the German attack still was on the increase.

(A DNB broadcast from Berlin said German troops had stormed Salerno, at the mouth of the Sele river, indicating a claim to the splitting of the Allied front. Seven American tanks were destroyed and 700 prisoners taken, the broadcast declared.)

(The German communiques made no such claim, but declared "landing heads were further narrow.")

"When storming Atavilla, Americans lost numerous dead and prisoners," the communiques said, adding that the German air force destroyed an 8,000-ton transport

and damaged 11 more ships of the landing fleet.

(The German International Information Bureau in a propaganda broadcast asserted that Allied shipping losses in the Gulf of Salerno from September 8, the first day of operations, until Tuesday totaled four cruisers, two destroyers, 20 merchantmen and 15 landing boats, sunk, and eight cruisers, five destroyers, 99 transports tankers and freighters damaged.)

The Germans were rushing all available troops to the front despite the terrific Allied air bombardment which was blanketing the whole area with bombs, and they were seizing Italian guns and munitions to throw into the fray.

Americans and British, on the other hand, were using some of the most daring tactics of the war and accepting "suicide" assignments as a matter of course, headquarters reports said.

Still weak in the air, the Germans were unable to meet the Allied air armadas thrown over the bridgehead. The Allies lost four planes yesterday while shooting down five of the enemy.

Lt. Gen. Carl A. Spaatz' air headquarters said the heavy bomb tonnage deluged the Germans in the Salerno area was "vastly greater than any previous effort in the Mediterranean," including even the

1,200 tons dropped on Rome in the first raid on the Italian capital, and far outdoing the huge Pantelaria effort.

The big air assault was meeting almost no resistance, with the flares reporting very little anti-aircraft fire over the battle area.

Night bombers swept slightly away from the battle sector last night and attacked roads in the Terra Annunziata, or Pompei, area. Twenty-eight additional small units of the Italian navy were said to have arrived at Palermo, Sicily.

The Middle East air force, giving a helping hand again in the attacks on the enemy in Italy, bombarded railway and highway communications at Potenza, 50 miles east of the Salerno battlefield, in raids Tuesday night and yesterday, a Cairo announcement said.

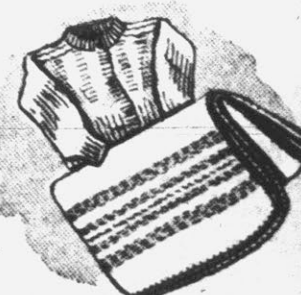

We ALL NEED TOLERANCE

People who desire to be known by the undisturbed prominence they give to some single feature of their faith are imperfect in direct proportion to the distinctness of their peculiarities. The power of the Christian gospel lies in its simplicity and human sympathy and not in the appeal of any of its special doctrines. The spirit of Christ is the greatest thing in Christian faith, and he who has that is a Christian. In like manner, he who does not have it is not a Christian. The Lord will not be interested in judgment day in certain peculiar ideas we have had which separated us from our brethren, but in the devotion we have to the beliefs that are common to all branches of the Christian Church.

A well-known writer said some years ago, "I do not want the walls of separation between different orders of Christians to be destroyed, but only lowered that we may shake hands a little easier over them."

It is an idea worth turning over in the mind. There will always be differences of opinion among men, because everyone approaches truth from the standpoint of his personal experience, and every man's experience is different from that of every other man. But there is no reason why these differences should separate us and make one intolerant of the other. Nothing displays a man's bad taste and meanness more than a disposition to be intolerant of another man's religious beliefs and practices.

Let us put great emphasis on the things which unite men of faith everywhere, but let us always be willing to recognize the right of all men to hold widely differing opinions on non-essentials.

WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Mackinac Island, Mich.—What is a "conference?" Having been through the Republican Postwar Advisory Council "conference" here, I think I can explain. Mechanically it's dull as dish-water. The surface operations can be brushed off in a few words. There's a general council meeting. The address of welcome is made by Host Gov. Harry F. Kelly of Michigan. He says all polite things. The opening speech is made by ex-officio chairman of the council and Republican National Committee chairman, Harrison E. Spangler. He also says right things.

A motion is made and passed that the chairman appoint committees completely unimpaired. Mr. Spangler pulls the list of committee appointments from his pocket. There are two over-all "temporary" committees who are supposed to bring in a report. There are eight permanent committees supposed to chop out a few plans for foundation of the 1944 Republican platform.

Much to nobody's amazement, Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg is appointed chairman of the "foreign policy and international relations" committee, and Sen. Robert A. Taft is appointed chairman of the post-war home front committee.

The opening session adjourns and the committees and subcommittees go into huddles. Forty-eight hours later they are back with reports which are adopted unanimously and with only a few "for-the-record" speeches from the floor. By these tokens a generous portion of the Republican party is committed in

to foreign policy and domestic relations program at least until such time as the national convention elects a nominee and lays down its full platform.

Don't get me wrong. That's just the surface stuff. Behind those dull measured scenes is enough political drama to fill a score of columns. There's the story of how Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York made the most "sensational" declaration of foreign policy at the conference and then was completely skipped over when the committee was named.

There's the mystery of how those committees were named before anyone knew in what manner they would be designated. There's the simple fact that in the foreign relations resolution, the most important paragraph was lifted bodily from the Vandenberg-White resolution introduced months ago in the Senate.

There's a secret about what happened to a proposal in the original "homefront" resolution to declare that organized labor should be made to recognize its responsibilities as fully as organized or unorganized management.

A dozen other little volcanoes blew their tops behind closed doors. And what finally came forth was sufficiently satisfactory that no one felt called upon to protest openly.

Hence all the sweetness and light when the final session brought those unanimous adoptions.

(Continued From Page One) . . . rupt war production by inducing essential single men from war industries.

That was the gist of the argument presented to the military committee yesterday by Lieut. Gen. Joseph T. McNarney, deputy chief of staff and Undersecretary of War Robert

Patterson. Admiral Ernest J. King, commander in chief of the fleet, sent Chairman Reynolds (D-N.C.) a statement declaring there could be no decrease in the number of men to be furnished to the armed forces "without serious detriment not only to planned operations but to operations that are now under way or in process of mounting." He added that troop needs for 1944 necessarily would increase over 1943.

The committee will hear Monday from Gen. George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, on the latter's return from a trip to Mexico. Wheeler said his views had not been changed by the testimony of the military leaders, adding that they had "said almost the same thing when the matter of farm deferments was being considered."

Nevertheless, he conceded that the military opposition would make it more difficult to get the bill passed.

Reynolds told reports that McNarney had testified at a closed session that Canada had 682,000 men in its armed force out of a population of 11 million, and that the British Isles were furnishing 4,000,000 men, or about 10 per cent of their population.

(Continued From Page One) . . . stabbings at Berlin and northwest Germany. RAF fighter squadrons attacked enemy air fields and transport targets in intruder operations over France.

There was no indication that the Berlin raid, apparently carried out by light Mosquito bombers, was anything like the saturation attacks with loads of 1,000 tons of explosives the last of which was made against the German capital Sept. 4.

The burst of widespread activity in the past 24 hours ended a lull in the extensive Allied air activities against western Europe which followed the climax of an eight-day non-stop offensive against the continent a week ago.

The rubber factory at Montlucon is one of the two largest plants in France. It receives raw materials from Germany.

The city is a railroad junction on the line connecting northwest France with the seaport of Marseilles and another line joining the manufacturing center of Lyon with Bordeaux. In addition to the tire factory, it has large steel works making tanks and guns and chemical and glass factories.

Axis radio reports indicated that the American bombers delivered a real blasting to the Paris area yesterday evening. A Vichy broadcast recorded by the Associated Press said "over 400 yards of the Avenue de Versailles are a mass of ruins." A Berlin broadcast, claiming that seven of the American bombers were shot down, said the attackers knocked out the electric power supply in several districts of the city. It admitted "considerable damage" and said casualties were "believed to be very large."

The dusk bombing of Paris was regarded as a significant expansion of the scope of the U. S. Eighth Air Force's operations from British bases. It means, air officers pointed out, that a time-strip of several hours has been added to the planes' potential operating time at both sunset and sunrise, as dawn-bombing presents similar problems. the fall of Nezhin in another order
of the day, termed it "the most
important center of the Germans'
defense on the road to Kiev."

The Germans left 3,000 dead on
the Nezhin battlefield, many pris-
oners were captured and large quan-
tities of war material were abandon-
ed as the Nazis fled to the west
with Russian troops in close pur-
suit, a Moscow communiqué said.
Capture of the Nazi base eliminates
a Russian advance of nearly 200
miles in 40 days.

Wednesday's fighting cost the
Germans in all more than 8,000
dead and they surrendered more
than 200 towns and villages as they
fell back before the relentless Red
army sweep. The Russians said.
There was no indication anywhere
that the enemy would halt short
of the Dnieper river, which they
have built into a formidable defense
barrier.

Although the capture of Nezhin
spotlighted yesterday's Russian ad-
vance, the Soviet forces to the south
were not idle. Driving toward the
great bend in the Dnieper, Moscow
said, they captured Gulai Pole and
Pokrovskoye, both 50 miles from
the Dnieper river city
which also is an important point
on the one railway line leading to
Melltopol and the Crimea.

Cutting of this line would jeop-
ardize another large segment of
German forces which are garrison-
ing the Crimean peninsula and the
Tamsenk area across the Kerch
strait.

There was still an announcement
by the Russian high command of
the capture of Bryansk in the
north.

FAVOR YANKS TO WIN SERIES

Odds 12 to 20 Against
New York, And 13
To 10 Against St.
Louis

The New York Yankees are riding the crest of an eight-game winning streak, matching their longest previous victory string of the season, but the team is just coasting. Ignoring the fact that the campaign has two weeks to run and they haven't clinched the pennant yet, the Yankees simply are taking their day to day business in stride and concentrating on the world series.

In their clubhouse before the games the players are autographing baseballs by the dozens and striving to round up series tickets for their friends. Also before the games Charley Keller and Nick Etten, the heavy armament of the bombers, are taking special batting practice to get ready for the big test with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Yesterday Keller hit for 30 minutes before most of the players were on the field and then, when the tussle with the Philadelphia Athletics got under way, he hit his 27th home run with two aboard in the first inning. The Yankees won 7-3.

About the time this was going on James J. Carroll, St. Louis betting commissioner and nationally known odds-maker, disclosed that he had established the Yankees as overwhelming favorites in the series, quoting 12 to 20 against New York and 13 to 10 against St. Louis.

The Red Birds, although idle, moved within three games of clinching the National League pennant when weather forced cancellation of the second-place Brooklyn Dodgers' final game with Boston.

In the only senior circuit activity of the day the Phillies divided a doubleheader with the New York Giants. Jack Kraus pitched four-hit ball as the Phils won the first 1-0 but the Giants batted the second game 6-3. The double bill started at 11 a. m., less than ten hours after the completion of the Philadelphia game of the previous night, and drew only 903 paying customers.

Washington strengthened its hold on second place in the American league by shutting out the Boston Red Sox 5-0. While Cleveland dropped another decision to the St. Louis Browns 4-2. Detroit downed the Chicago White Sox 8-2.

Eure Says Service Men Entitled Vote

Raleigh, Sept. 16—(AP)—Secretary of State Thad Eure says that North Carolina service men over 21 years of age may vote next year in both the Democratic primary and in the general election under the state's election laws.

Eure said in letters to 1,200 service men in all parts of the world who have applied for absentee ballots under the federal war ballot act that the federal law applied only to federal candidates and to general elections. He added, however, that state law permits absentee voting in both primaries and general elections for any candidate, by service men registered in their home counties or precincts.

Those unregistered, he said, may register by proxy.

Epidemics Sweep Jap-Held Areas

Washington, Sept. 16—(AP)—Cholera and the plague are marching against the Japanese in the southwest Pacific.

Data compiled by the Netherlands Information Bureau here disclosed today that typhoid, malaria, dysentery and other epidemic diseases are waging guerrilla warfare against the empire-builders from Nippon. Not only bubonic plague (the black death of the middle ages) but the more deadly and more infectious pneumonic plague has been spreading. In one village a fourth of the population was reported to have died of pneumonic plague in the course of two weeks.

Frost Cuts Canada Tobacco Production

A heavy frost seriously damaged the Canadian tobacco crop last Saturday, said J. R. Purser of the Ayden community, who returned today from Tilsonburg, Province of Ontario, Canada. He said the farmers expected to produce 85 per cent of last year's crop, but of better quality. The frost damage cut this about 25 per cent.

The pre-season estimate of the Canadian crop was 55,000,000 pounds of tobacco. The frost reduced the crop to about 35,000,000 or 40,000,000 pounds, Canadian papers stated.

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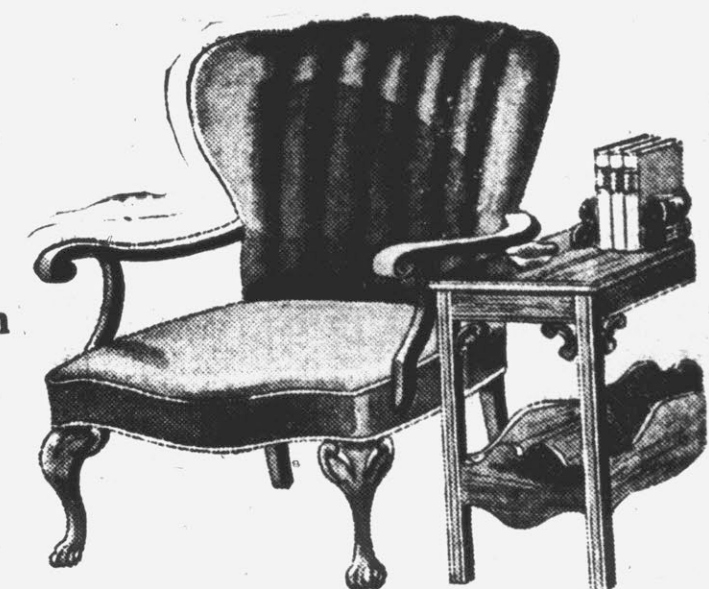
