

Further Blows Against Axis Nations Promised By President Roosevelt

Says Definite Times And Places For Other Landings Already Decided Upon; Allies To Show Hitler Holes In "Fortress Europe"; Will Pound Japan Into Dust

Washington, Sept. 17. — (AP)—President Roosevelt said today that "specific and precise" plans have been made for great, new blows at Germany and Japan, including "definite times and places for other landings on the continent for Europe and elsewhere."

In a war review sent to Congress, the commander-in-chief said Hitler has left "vulnerable spots in the wall of the so-called fortress— which we shall point out to him in due time."

But the blunt fact is, he said, that we are a long way from victory in any major theater of the war, and we can be no let down anywhere.

"We face in the Orient, a long and difficult fight," he warned. "We must be prepared for heavy losses in winning that fight. The power of Japan will not collapse until it has been literally pounded into the dust. It would be the utmost folly for us to try to pretend otherwise."

In discussing the European phase of the conflict, Mr. Roosevelt gave a possible hint that the Balkans may be the scene of one new thrust and that in the immediate future, reporting "definite information" of unrest and a growing desire for peace in Rumania, Hungary and Bulgaria, as well as in Finland in northern Europe, he said.

"We hope that these nations will revolt against Nazi domination which commenced in Italy will burst into flame and become a consuming fire."

Perhaps significantly, he did not urge the people of those nations to play any longer the hour of their revolution.

His 6,000-word review fitted all the pieces of current war developments into a single pattern of strategy and he spoke confidently of victory even as he warned that it is yet still distant.

Nonetheless, he said, the time is here to begin planning and even legislation for the demobilization of armed forces to provide their millions of members with greater economic protection and educational opportunities and the seeking of a "fair international relationship" on a permanent basis.

"The policy of the good neighbor has shown success in the hemisphere of the Americas," he said, "that its extension to whole world seems to be the next logical step."

AIRMEN BLAST NAZI TARGETS

Smashing Attack On Railways Leading To Italy

London, Sept. 17. (AP)—A large force of RAF bombers swept deep into southeastern France last night to make a concentrated attack on enemy railway stations at Modane on the French-Italian frontier. It was announced today, and Mosquitoes again hit Berlin.

Big, home-based British Lancasters, striking directly on enemy efforts to rush reinforcements into the Italian battlefront, also made a low level attack on the Antheor viaduct near St. Raphael on the French Riviera route.

At Modane, a French frontier town near the opening of the Mont Cenis tunnel, a "heavy and concentrated attack was made" on the freight yards, it was announced.

"First reports indicate both attacks were effective," the communication said.

Four of the night bombers were reported missing.

In hitting at the Modane area, the British bombers probably disrupted traffic through one of the few remaining railroad channels through the Alps over which the Germans can funnel reinforcements into Italy.

The big Alpine Mont Cenis tunnel, around which Germans and Italians have been reported fighting, is 50 miles northwest of Turin on the rail route to Lyon and Paris.

The British attacks carried the new round-the-clock bombing spurt into the third day. They came immediately after American Flying Fortresses had made one of the heaviest daylight assaults of the war against port installations, docks and airports in the Bay of Biscay area.

On Sept. 6, the RAF bombed Munich, another major railroad tunnel into Italy. Munich is 350 miles northeast of Modane.

Two other major lines, through Gothaard and Simplon tunnels, are closed to military traffic because they go through neutral Switzerland.

Oil Coupons Good Indefinite Period

Raleigh, Sept. 17. (AP)—Boards now are authorized to issue renewal of fuel coupons for periods longer than six months, the Office of Price Administration said today.

Persons who use fuel oil for heating are not affected.

The new amendment provides that ration stamps for domestic cooking and lighting no longer will bear dates of expiration and expiration coupons may be used as long as they last. It also increases the maximum ration allowed for domestic cooking to 30 gallons a month for the first seven persons.

Formerly a maximum of 20 to 30 gallons a month was allowed for the first seven persons.

State Purchases More War Bonds

Raleigh, Sept. 17. (AP)—The state's quota in the Third War Loan drive was helped by \$12,000,000 today.

State Treasurer Charles M. Johnson bought the bonds with \$10,000,000 in state surplus and \$2,000,000 taken from the teachers and state employment retirement fund.

The purchase will be divided among the counties on the basis of their quotas.

North Carolina now has invested \$30,000,000 in general fund surplus for post-war spending.

Washington, Sept. 17. (AP)—New and vocal opposition to the early drafting of pre-war fathers arose in the house today while members of the Senate Military Committee generally appeared willing to let Gen. George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, have the final say.

Marshall is due to appear before the committee Monday, and indications mounted that many senators will not make up their minds on the Wheeler bill, which would postpone the induction of family heads until after January 1, before hearing his views.

State Sixth In War Loan Drive

Washington, Sept. 17. (AP)—The \$15,000,000,000 Third War Loan headed into its second and toughest half today.

Thursday sales of \$2,620,000,000 worth of bonds swelled the total for the eight-day-old drive to \$7,679,000,000 but brought this admission from National Director Ted Gamble.

"The easiest part of the task is over. From now on it will mean a beating of the bushes to reach the tremendous goal of \$15,000,000,000."

Meanwhile, state rankings based on day-old reports underwent a drastic shake-up, with Rhode Island jumping to the front on the basis of 57 per cent of its \$81,000,000 quota already subscribed.

Following in order among the first ten were Utah with 52 per cent of its \$41,000,000; Delaware, 47 of \$49,000,000; Maine, 43 of \$54,000,000; Minnesota, 42 of \$216,000,000; New York, 41 of \$4,709,000,000; North Carolina, 40 of \$145,000,000; New Hampshire, 36 of \$39,000,000; Ohio, 34 of \$698,000,000; and North Dakota, 32 of \$29,000,000.

Massolini at Cremona. New York, Sept. 17. (AP)—Benito Mussolini and Roberto Farinacci, former Fascist minister of state, are now at Cremona, Italy, which has become the provisional seat of the Fascist government, the German-controlled Vichy radio said today.

Seventeen Dead From Explosion

Blast At Norfolk Naval Air Station Also Injured 257 And Damaged Buildings

Norfolk, Va., Sept. 17. — (AP)—A terrific explosion, believed to have originated from ammunition in transit at the Norfolk Naval Air Station killed approximately 17 persons and injured about 257, fourteen critically, and damaged a number of buildings today.

Naval authorities emphasized that the number of injured was only an estimate and said it would be some time before they could make an accurate tabulation of all persons treated in service and civilian hospitals.

Rear Admiral H. F. Leary, USN, commandant of the Fifth Naval District, said witnesses reported they believed the explosion was caused by ammunition in transit. A board of investigation has already begun to probe the cause of the blast.

The board consists of Captains L. P. Treadwell, USN, C. C. West, USN, and J. R. Tague, USN, and Lt. Brooks, USN, judge advocate.

The Navy's first report said a truck loaded with gasoline had exploded near a hangar, setting fires which badly damaged several buildings at the huge air station.

Dr. C. J. MacDonald, Norfolk city coroner, was called to the station indicating there may have been civilian as well as naval casualties.

Hospitals in Norfolk and Portsmouth sent their ambulances with special crews of doctors and nurses to the scene.

The explosion, described as one of the worst in the history of the Norfolk Naval Air Station, tore away sections of the hangar and flung twisted metal for hundreds of yards. Great sheets of flame poured high into the sky and billows of smoke towered over the damaged buildings.

Witnesses said the steel sides of a building near the damaged hangar were stove in by the force of the blast.

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All Three Beachheads Consolidated Into Continuous Single Front; Fifth Army Strikes Inland Capturing Important Positions; Germans Falling Back

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Sept. 17. — (AP)—The Fifth Army of Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark and the British Eighth Army fused their fronts with establishment of contact between patrols following an amazing northward march of nearly 200 miles from the Italian toe by Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's veterans, Allied headquarters announced today.

The Eighth Army also made contact with British forces beating up the Italian east coast from Taranto to a communiqué from General Dwight D. Eisenhower's headquarters announced. All three of the Allied beachheads on the west, east and south thereby were welded into a single front.

Linking of the two armies broke the enemy's ring of steel around Gen. Clark's tommies and doughboys and appeared to have ended the critical period of the battle fought against four or more German armored divisions on the bloodstained beaches.

A Berlin broadcast by the International Information Bureau admitted that the Fifth and Eighth armies had made contact and said three Allied convoys totaling 60 ships were now steaming for Salerno.

(The Reuters correspondent with the Fifth Army said enemy troop movements indicated the Germans were beginning to withdraw from the front facing the southern part of the bridgehead.)

Announcement of the contact was made by Allied headquarters shortly after a communiqué had told of Montgomery's capture of Vallo Della Lucania, only 16 miles from Agropoli, at the southern end of the 27-mile front held by the Fifth Army.

At the same time Clark's army struck out from its hard-won shore line and recaptured the mountain village of Albanella, 10 miles inland, smashed three German counterattacks and flattened out several German salients that had been driven into Allied positions.

An Agropoli broadcast by NBC said Montecorvino, 8 1/2 miles inland and 11 miles east of Salerno at the northern end of the bridgehead, also was captured in the re-advance of one of the German attacks.

(London dispatches said seizure of Montecorvino would be one of the most significant Allied victories as the town is understood to be the site of one of the best airfields along the whole lower stretch of Italian west coast. With an airfield in Alwest coast, the German position is (Continued on Page Six)

Tobacco Prices Reach New High

Total sales on the Greenville tobacco market passed the 19 million pound mark at the end of Thursday's sales, according to official figures released by R. C. (Bob) Rankin, sales supervisor.

More than seven million dollars has been paid out during the 18 selling days of the season, the report reveals.

Thursday's sales were 976,662 pounds for \$402,518.65, an average of \$41.21 per hundred pounds. Season's sales through Thursday were 19,399,166 pounds for \$7,184,919.48, an average of \$37.04 per hundred. Last year's average price for the corresponding period was \$32.56.

Blames Manpower Crisis On Government Agencies

Washington, Sept. 17. (AP)—Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) today in the Congressional Record today a report by Bernard M. Baruch asserting that "proper handling of manpower has been made impossible by the failure of government agencies to work as a team with a clearly defined program."

The report, made by Baruch to War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes after a study of the manpower shortage in west coast airplane plants, said "labor priorities" were needed and proposed a "labor budget plan" which subsequently has been ordered into effect in the west coast area.

Asserting that the report is worthy of "prompt and intensive study by all concerned in the manpower problem," Vandenberg told the senate he believed that it is general theme of developing a single over-

all manpower program is carried out "we shall greatly simplify our problem and find it much easier to meet."

Vandenberg, quoted from Baruch's report:

"The time must end when agencies spend their energies battling to build up empires of power. It is time to reassert the fact that there is one federal government—speaking with one voice—not a 'centimouth'."

The Michigan senator pointed out that Baruch had condemned cost-plus-fixed-fee contracts as encouraging the hoarding and poor utilization of workers.

"Under these contracts," the reports said, "the government pays all costs whatever they are. Since the government is footing the bill, there is no incentive for manufacturers to economize in the use of materials."

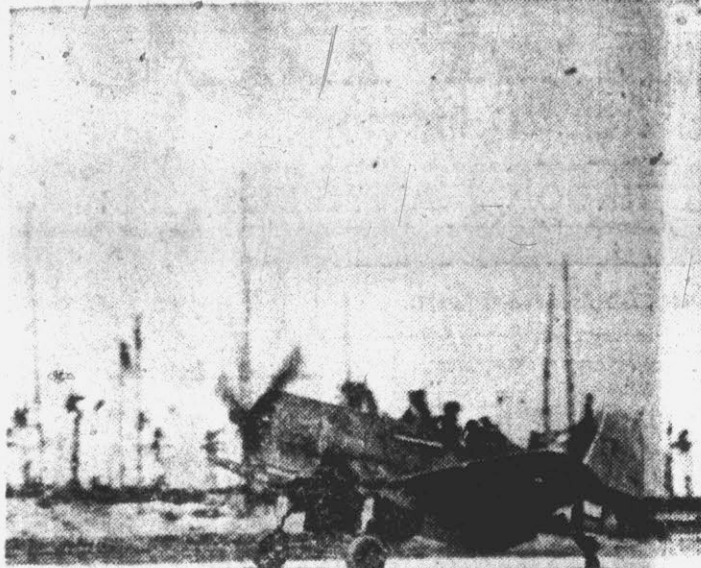

Secretary Knox Visits England

"Apparently they don't like to come out where it is wet," he told a press conference.

Knox said he could not imagine a happier day than this in the light of Italian developments.

"It is a joy to see how thoroughly we (British and Americans) have earned to work together," he said.

During questioning, he repeated a previous assertion that although German U-boats had not yet been defeated, "we have given them a good shelling."

"They'll be back and we'll be ready for them when they come," he said. "They probably will be with us until the end of the war and may be preparing a fresh assault now."

Harlan, Ky., Sept. 17—(AP)—Six coal-smeared miners emerged alive last midnight from tragedy-struck three point mine after a 12-hour entombment caused by an explosion that dealt sudden death to their twelve companions.

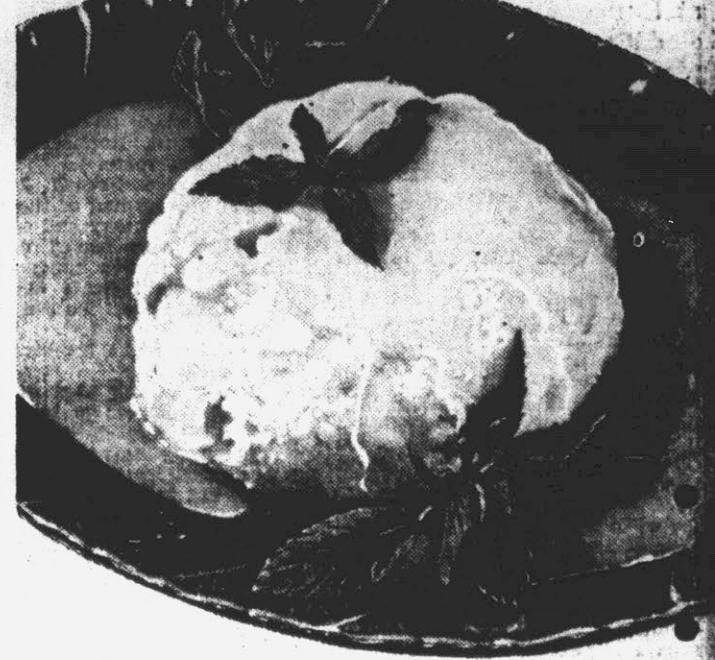

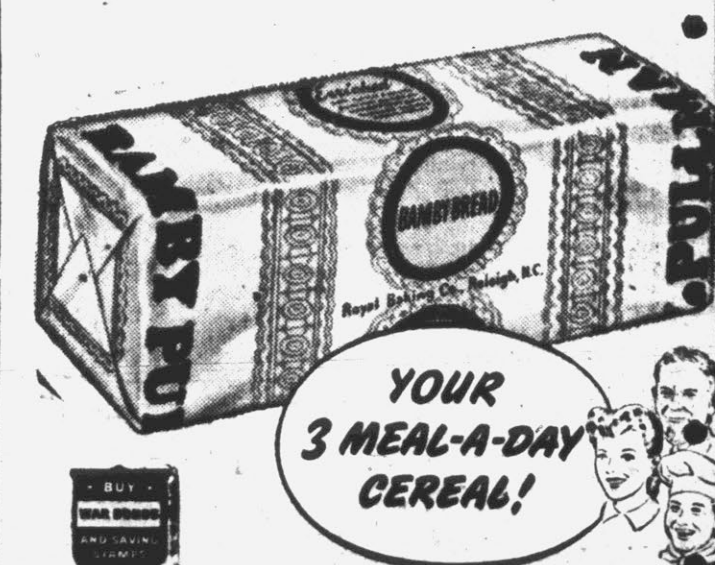

FIRE SCHOOL BIG SUCCESS

Representatives 19 Cities Attend Two-day Meeting Here

The Eastern Carolina regional school for firemen held at the tinges fire tower here Wednesday and Thursday was an outstanding success. State Fire Marshall Sherwood Brockwell of Raleigh said today. Nineteen towns and cities were represented by 62 firemen and fire officials. This was gratifying in view of the fact that only 76 attended the first state-wide fire school held one time ago. Fifty-two of the 62 men attending the Greenville school participated in the practice work on the five-story brick fire tower. The tower would be a credit to a city of 100,000 population, Brockwell stated. He complimented the officials and Fire Chief George Gardner for the success of the school.

Instructors at the regional fire school were John L. Miller of Concord, secretary, and Charles L. Burke of Salisbury, president of the N. C. Firemen's Association; Chief Frank W. Bennett of Durham, former president of the State and

Southeastern Firemen's Association, analyzing what has been accomplished on the fighting fronts and on the production front at home and to predicting powerful new thrusts at the foe, including fresh invasions of Hitler's European stronghold.

He gave a four-prong summation of the war in telling Congress that "we are still a long, long way from ultimate victory in any major theater of the war."

These were his points:

First, despite substantial victories in the Mediterranean, "we face a hard, costly fight up through Italy, and a major task of organizing positions before they can be taken advantage of."

Second, from bases in Britain, "we must be sure that we have assembled the strength to strike not just in one direction, but in many directions—by land and sea and in the air—with overwhelming forces and equipment."

Third, the Russian armies still have a long way to go to get into Germany itself, despite their magnificent counter-offensive.

Fourth, the Japanese remain firmly established on an enormous front from the Kuriles islands in the north to the Solomons in the south and Burma and China in the east, and to break through their defensive ring "we must hit them and hit them hard, not merely at one point but at many points and we must keep on hitting them."

But the bombers wreaked still more damage. In 15 minutes they concentrated 66 tons of bombs on the Wewak and Baram airdromes. Direct hits destroyed 10 grounded bombers and started many fires among numerous other parked aircraft.

Close to 450 Japanese planes have been shot down or destroyed at Wewak in the past six weeks, but MacArthur's communiqué today said they downed 39, probably 40. The fighters accounted for nine definite and one probable.

The smashing Wewak victory won the Allied airmen high praise from General MacArthur.

"Although almost invariably outnumbered, the Fifth Air Force in moments of crisis has never failed me," he said.

"Swift and sure in attack, tenacious and determined in defense, it has proved itself the ideal weapon of war. Its deadly efficiency has never been surpassed."

South Pacific Headquarters, Sept. 17—(AP)—Two hundred and fifty bombers, escorted by fighters, pounded Japanese airdromes in the northern Solomons last Tuesday. A spokesman for Admiral William F. Halsey said today.

Liberators, Avengers, and Dauntless bombers participated in a series of dawn-to-dusk raids.

The intensified air offensive against the northern Solomons, the heaviest in several months, was reminiscent of the persistent air attacks launched against Munda just before the New Georgia invasion.

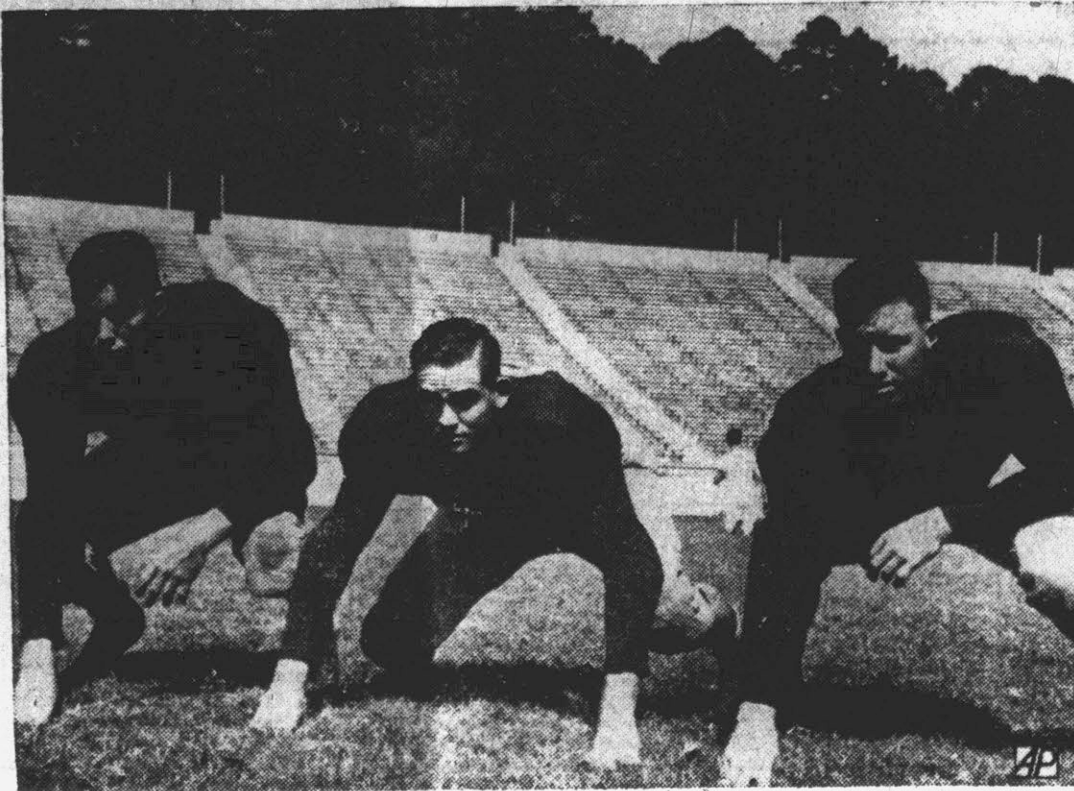

a secondary line along the Mediterranean coast, and this has been reported extensively sabotaged.

The official announcement did not elaborate on the Berlin attack by the Mosquitoes, but it was evidently another of the nerve-jangling jobs at which the speed craft have become masters.

The Mosquitoes also struck at the German capital the previous night. The German radio declared the RAF flew over northern Germany last night in what was described as "nuisance raids," but the broadcast added paradoxically that 20 of the attacking planes were shot down.

Berlin reported Marshal Petain had visited Mauthausen to inspect the damage caused by the RAF in its heavy raid Wednesday night on the Dunlop rubber factory there.

Yesterday's Flying Fortress attack was a multiple blow at Axis interference with Allied shipping.

From the Cognac airfield, four-engine Focke-Wulfs, Dornier and Junkers 99's fly out in wide arcs attacking Allied convoys, tipping off submarines, and tangling with anti-submarine patrol planes.

(Continued from Page One) led hands there the scope and effectiveness of fighter plane protection for Gen. Clark's base of operations would be greatly extended. Gen. Eisenhower's communique said the Germans' efforts to reduce the Allied bridgehead "have weakened considerably" that air and naval support of the land fighters continued to be heavy and effective, and repeated Gen. Clark's declaration of yesterday that the Salerno position was now "firmly established."

A headquarters spokesman, summarizing the two weeks campaign that began with Gen. Montgomery's landing on the Italian toe Sept. 3, said the Allies now have occupied three entire provinces of southern Italy, grabbed the three valuable ports of Taranto, Brindisi and Bari, and gained possession of a large number of excellent air bases, particularly in Apulia province where there are paved runways on which the heaviest bombers can operate at all times.

British troops from Taranto remained in contact with the Germans at Gioia del Colle, midway between Taranto and Bari, where units of the first German parachute division have been reported.

Today's communique also announced a series of continued heavy bombings of road and transport targets by both the Northwest African and Middle East air forces, striking both day and night, at Potenza in the middle of the Appennines range.

These blows, indicating that the Germans still were in that locality, were aimed at targets about 55 miles north of the Gulf of Taranto. In a final desperate attempt at splitting Clark's army before the Eighth Army's arrival, the Germans threw crack assault troops and tanks into three furious attacks yesterday.

One was against the town of Salerno and two others were in the vicinity of Montecorvino. In knocking back these attacks, the Allies took a substantial number of prisoners, including a battalion commander at Montecorvino. Five enemy tanks were knocked out at the latter place, also.

As a result of the attacks Clark's troops seized high ground south of the Calore river from which German guns had commanded southern

portions of the bridgehead.

A message from the battlefield said "we are beating off everything the Germans are able to put in. The morale and fighting spirit of Fifth Army troops could not be better. It has been tough going, but we are over the hump and things are going our way."

Terminating Clark's now successful landing as "most significant," an Allied headquarters spokesman said it proved "we can land a big army and strike hard in a defended area in the fortress of Europe. With German troops in close proximity who knew we were coming, the Fifth Army landed and fought under conditions which the Germans always said would enable them to resist any invasion of the mainland—conditions upon which they based their superman claims."

The spokesman said the Fifth Army's landing and the sturdy fight in the face of heavy German armored forces compelled the Germans to withdraw from the southern provinces and enabled the Eighth Army to advance without resistance.

With the weakening of German resistance in the Salerno area, the German air force was less in evidence. Allied bombers and fighters over the battle area and rear zones reported only slight ground fire, and were able to destroy only one German plane while losing only two.

Not a single German fighter was encountered yesterday by Allied bombers, and German air attacks were limited to sneak raids by two to four planes which directed their efforts chiefly against shipping.

With the German drive to wipe out the bridgehead finally smashed, the big bombers of Maj. Gen. James H. Doolittle's strategic air force turned their attention to road and rail communications north of Naples. Caserta, Benevento, Capua and Isernia, Mignano and Formia all were bombed in that area.

(The United Nations radio at Algiers said in a broadcast heard by the Associated Press in London that Allied fighters now are taking off from the attic of Salerno from a captured airfield not far from the scene. It was not identified.)

The speed with which the Soviet columns were eating up German-held positions east of the Dnieper encouraged the belief they might

reach the river within the next few days, launch a drive against the White Russian frontier, 80 miles west of Novgorod-Severski, force a German retreat from the Caucasian bridgehead above captured Novorossisk, and complete the investment of the citadel of Bryansk.

The Germans fought for Novgorod-Severski with bloody tenacity, but the Red army troops blasted their way across the wide Desna river southwest of Bryansk and drove the enemy in heading retreat, the Moscow bulletin reported. More than 1,500 Nazi dead were counted in this assault. The storming of Loozovaya and Romny, the north-west, accounted for another 1,100, including a German regimental commander, while additional thousands fell before fierce Russian thrusts on other sectors, the communique said.

Novorossisk capitulated to Soviet infantry, sailors and airmen after a five day battle in which 50,000 Axis troops—three German divisions, one Rumanian Alpine division and detachments of Nazi marines, were reported routed. The Axis forces were smashed only after fierce street fighting in the heart of the seaport.
