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Russian Advance Imperils German Dnieper Positions

Soviet Forces Reach River In Force; Germans Reported Evacuating The Kuban Bridgehead; Reds Within Nine Miles Of Smolensk And Three Miles Of White Russia

Moscow, Sept. 24.—(AP)—The Red army has reached the Dnieper in force, and other Soviet units northwest of Smolensk have reached the village of Tarasenko, only three miles from the border of White Russia, Soviet dispatches said today.

(The German high command said the Russians already were making heavy thrusts in efforts to cross the Dnieper, but declared they were repulsed.)

(Although the German high command failed to bear out the report, the Berlin radio said the Germans also were systematically evacuating heavy equipment, installations and civilians from their bridgehead across the Kerch straits in the Caucasus.)

With the Red Army only nine miles from Smolensk after capturing Lysanovo, the Germans were in immediate danger of losing their central front Citadel, which they have held since the early days of their smash toward Moscow.

A dispatch to the army newspaper Red Star said Russian troops first reached this big objective through Novomoskovsk in the lower Ukraine on the upper elbow of the river in a drive from Poltava. The capture of Novomoskovsk was announced yesterday.

Strong forces of Soviet troops have arrived on the banks of the Dnieper at other points, Red Star said.

As the Russians reached the Dnieper from Novomoskovsk, the Germans threw in everything they had in an attempt to halt the Red Army drive west of Poltava, capture of which was the high spot of yesterday's Russian forward surge.

"The Germans attempted to protect the Poltava district," said the Red Star dispatch, "from whence to some extent they could tie up the operations of our troops who advanced to the Dnieper from the left and right."

As the Red Army reached the great river, the Russian communiqué for the first time announced that Soviet forces were fighting in the direction of "Kremenchuk."

This is a large city on the east bank of the Dnieper 58 miles southwest of Poltava and 62 miles up the (Continued on Page Three)

Fight To Outlaw Draft Of Fathers Abandoned

Washington, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Abandoning the fight to outlaw the father draft, a congressional bloc sought to cushion the impact on the nation's homes today by driving in to uniform what one legislator called "a lost army" of thousands of government workers.

Chairman May (D-Ky.) of the House Military Affairs committee said it would be futile to press for legislation to prohibit the drafting of pre-Pearl Harbor fathers. He announced also that his committee would ask Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey to explain next week why an estimated 300,000 draft-age, non-fathers in the federal employ have not been inducted although no official request was made for their deferment.

COUNTY NEAR BOND QUOTA

Chairman Is Urging Everyone To Buy Bonds Now

In a statement today that Pitt county had already reported \$1,756,000 worth of Third War Loan bond purchases, Chairman J. H. Waldrop said that the county's total quota was probably in sight. He pointed out, however, that some communities had not reached their quota and some individuals had not made purchases. He said that he could not consider the job well done until everyone had done his or her best.

"Are we going to let a few people buy all the war bonds or are all the people going to buy a few bonds?" Mr. Waldrop asked. "We may need these War Bonds to use for cash after the war is over," he added.

"Self preservation is the first law of nature. We all have a duty to God, to country and to ourselves and families. How better can a man fulfill his obligation to himself and family, as well as God and country, than by the purchase of Series E War Bonds at 25 percent interest if carried to maturity."

"The tobacco market has sold \$2,000,000 worth of tobacco this week, all of which has gone into our farmers' pockets first. They should not make the fatal mistake of letting this money get into the hands of a few before investing in War Bonds, but use part of the proceeds of tobacco as it is sold for the purchase of War Bonds for the security of self and family."

"The E bonds may be redeemed in cash at purchase price after 60 days—so that the money is not tied up— (Continued on Page Two)

New Flareup Threatens Italian Ports On Northern Adriatic

London, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Strong Yugoslav guerrilla forces were reported fighting German troops today in the streets of Trieste and threatening Fiume in an apparently coordinated drive against the two Italian ports at the northern end of the Adriatic.

The action was part of a series of new flareups by partisan armies against Nazi occupying forces at scattered points along some 400 miles of the eastern Adriatic shore, all conceivably inaugurated with Allied approval.

Yugoslav sources here said Slovene irregulars struck some 25 miles into Italy from the Yugoslavian border and penetrated Trieste, with oppressed inhabitants of that former Italian naval base joining their ranks to attack the Nazi garrison.

These same sources reported other Slovene formations had occupied Idria, Italian mountain town four miles east of the Yugoslav border and 28 miles northeast of Trieste, while farther to the east in northwestern Yugoslavia heavy fighting was said to be in progress along a 50-mile front between Bistrica (Festitz) and Lubiana.

The British Broadcasting Corporation quoting a broadcast by the Algerians radio, said that Fiume was being shelled by Partisan artillery set up in Susak, a mile and a half away across the frontier.

In a broadcast heard by the Associated Press, however, the Budapest radio quoted a Zagreb dispatch to the effect that the Germans had captured Susak.

The Partisans reported engaged around Trieste and Fiume apparently were operating under command of the Montenegrin guerrilla chieftain Josip Broz, formerly known as "Tito," but the forces of Gen. Draja Mihailovic were said to be fighting further south in the interior.

News of the fighting recalled recent Cairo dispatches indicating that Allied senior officers had gone to Yugoslavia to attempt to coordinate the activities of "Tito" and Mihailovic. (Continued on Page Two)

ALLIES POUND JAP GARRISON IN NEW GUINEA

Allied Headquarters in the Southwest Pacific, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Australian artillery pounded the Japanese today in the New Guinea coastal base of Finschhafen, arching shells over frontline patrols which have beaten down rapidly fading enemy resistance to reach the edge of an airfield two miles north of their objective.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur thus confronted the Japanese with the threatened loss of their third air base since September 12 in a jungle sector where the enemy already has expended more than 12,000 men.

Opposition Around Finschhafen Airfield Being Smashed By Artillery

Today MacArthur permitted release of the first details of the amphibious operation against Finschhafen, only 70 over-water miles southwest of New Britain, a key position of the Japanese.

Australians began landing on a beach six miles north of Finschhafen at dawn Wednesday, six days after the fall of Lae and 10 days after the capture of Salamaua.

American warships bombarded enemy positions beyond the beachhead. Bombers dropped 21 tons of explosives on Finschhafen. Attack planes fired 48,000 rounds of ammunition.

Eighty-five miles northeast, the Japanese air units at Cape Gloucester, New Britain, were prevented from interfering. For four hours there, big American bombers blasted with 73 tons of bombs and 15,000 rounds of bullets.

Not until mid-morning did any Japanese planes appear. Two were shot down from high altitude. At noon, as the ships were withdrawing, between 20 and 30 Japanese bombers arrived with an escort of upwards of 40 fighters.

The warships filled the sky with puffs of anti-aircraft fire. American fighters piled into the enemy formations. Forty Japanese planes were downed for certain. Five more were believed destroyed. Only three Allied planes were lost and the pilot of one was saved.

Not a ship was damaged by the enemy. Not a passenger was injured. Headquarters emphasized that in today's communiqué.

Slate Hearings On Tax Measure

Washington, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Chairman Doughton (D-NC) announced today the House Ways and Means committee would open public hearings Monday, October 4 on new general revenue legislation, in response to the administration's request for additional billions to finance the war.

The committee, he said, "will be given over to the problems of raising additional revenue needed to finance the war." The treasury has asked for \$12,000,000,000 in addition to the present annual collection rate of \$38,000,000,000, but some members of congress have expressed doubt that anything like that amount could be raised without undue hardships on taxpayers.

Doughton stressed that the committee would give "careful consideration" to the "simplification of making tax returns."

Mannheim and Ludwigshafen, which have a combined population of about 350,000, are the site of important war industries and an important communications center constituting the second largest inland port in Europe.

It was the 59th attack upon the cities, which last were subjected to a devastating RAF raid on the night of Sept. 5.

Darmstadt, about 15 miles south of Frankfurt and about 28 miles north of Mannheim-Ludwigshafen, also hit Wednesday. Today's operation, being the site of large iron foundries.

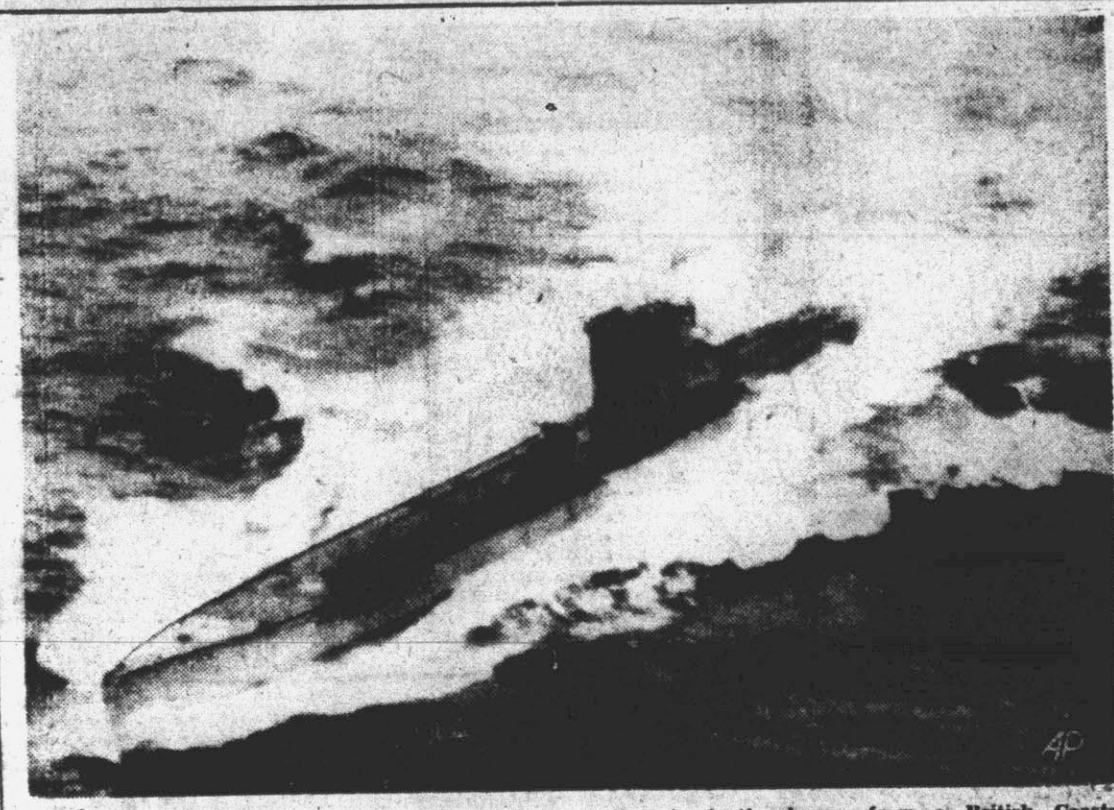
The great withdrawal of Hitlerian forces on the Russian front has taken on so much of the nature of a rout as to rank with Dunkerque as one of the pivotal crises of the whole war.

What started out as a planned withdrawal has deteriorated rapidly under the pile-driver blows of the Red forces. The German high command is now faced with the problem of whether the Nazi armies can reach their prepared defenses west of the Dnieper river and avert a major disaster. If they do achieve that trick, they still must look back on one of the most costly retreats of history, both in men and material.

The Red armies are almost at the line of the Dnieper at several points. They're just about where they were two years ago when Hitler was smashing them back with arrogant assurance.

Damaged U-Boat Heads For Home After Attack



This U-boat, down by the stern as the result of an attack by depth charges from a British Coastal Command Hudson bomber, heads back toward Germany after being damaged while prowling Allied convoys. CONTINUE AIR WAR ON NAZIS

Germany Attacked Last Night; France Hit Today

London, Sept. 24.—(AP)—The RAF's heavy bombers struck at Germany last night for the second successive night and the Berlin radio reported today that the twin towns of Mannheim and Ludwigshafen at the junction of the Rhine and Neckar rivers had been attacked.

The German broadcast, recorded by the Associated Press, said that Darmstadt and Aachen also had been bombed.

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Says Germany Has Not Felt Oil Shortage Yet

Believes No German Plane Has Been Grounded By Lack Of Fuel

Washington, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Destruction of Axis oil and gasoline production centers probably have been exaggerated, said one official. Even the Ploesti raid, striking at the Rumanian production which supplies much of Germany's fuel, would have little immediate effect on the Luftwaffe's operations, although its ultimate result could be disastrous.

As for the assumption that the feeble air opposition encountered by the British and Americans in the Salerno-Naples area could be attributed to a shortage of fuel for the German air force, this official said a much more reasonable conclusion is that the Germans must keep their planes employed elsewhere—particularly to defend their cities and production centers against the bombing offensive from Britain.

Give Facts On Stove Rationing

The Pitt County War Price and Rationing Board today announced regulations governing the rationing of the need for a stove is the first and prime consideration for the granting of a certificate.

The announcement further states that stoves which can be repaired must be repaired. The board also urged those having stoves which are not needed to advertise them for sale. A purchaser of such stoves is not required to have a certificate. Provided the stove has been used at least 60 days. A purchaser of a used stove, if he has previously applied for a certificate, should notify the board so that his application may be removed from the files.

Records in the board's office show a total of 532 applications for certificates on hand, of which 354 are for wood and coal heaters; nine for oil heaters; 93 for wood and coal cook stoves and 71 for oil cook stoves, while the quota for the month is only 46 coal and wood heaters; 11 oil heaters; 36 wood and coal cook stoves and 36 oil cook stoves. Of this quota only 5 wood and coal heaters, 2 oil heaters, 2 wood and coal cook stoves, and 4 oil cook stoves remain to be allotted. From these records it is seen that it is impossible to grant a certificate of purchase to all who have made application, and for that reason the board earnestly urges that only those who are compelled to buy a stove now, make application.

The urgency of the need and the condition of the stove on hand are the prime consideration of the board, so don't apply if it is at all possible to repair the stove on hand, or if the need can be delayed, the board implores.

Progress Is Slow In Drive on Naples; Allied Planes Smash Nazi Aircraft Attempting Evacuation Of Corsica; Torpedo Boats in Daring Raid On Albanian Port

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Sept. 24.—(AP)—The Fifth Army launched a full-scale offensive against German mountain positions guarding the route to Naples, it was announced today, while Allied motor torpedo boats stabbed into Valona harbor on the coast of Albania and sank two enemy vessels.

The onslaught by Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's American and British soldiers from their hard-won Salerno positions was accompanied by an intensification of the blockade of the waning German position on the island of Corsica. There, 3,000 German soldiers and 1,000 transport formations engaged in evacuating the enemy forces and shot down seven of the planes.

The communiqué from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's Headquarters said the Fifth Army had captured Oliveto Citra, 24 miles east of Salerno, while Matera, 34 miles northwest of Taranto, had been captured on the British front.

An official announcement said Altamura, 42 miles northwest of Taranto and 10 miles north of Matera, also had been captured.

The drive against Naples, Italy's second greatest port, was launched after a period of consolidation of the Allied springboard and while the Germans were reported engaged in large-scale demolitions, apparently with the idea of making the harbor installations useless when the Allies occupy the city.

(The Allied-controlled Palermo radio, in a broadcast reported today to the Office of War Information, said Italians escaping from Naples reported residents of the city were battling Germans in the streets, firing at the enemy from the windows of their homes or using stones if without firearms.)

(Citizens who rebel are shot without any inquiry by the German officials," the broadcast said. "Numerous Italian officers and soldiers have also been shot on grounds of non-cooperation.")

Driving northward into strongly defended saw-toothed positions, Clark's troops encountered heavy artillery and mortar opposition, as well as minefields, and a spokesman said they were making slow progress.

Claim Sinking Of Allied Ships

London, Sept. 24.—(AP)—The Berlin radio reported today that German submarines had made a surprise attack on a heavily escorted Allied convoy en route to America, sinking 12 destroyers and nine merchant ships totaling 45,000 tons.

The German broadcast, which was unconfirmed by any Allied source, but it recalled Prime Minister Churchill's statement in the House of Commons Tuesday that an Allied convoy was at that moment under attack.

Churchill made his statement in disclosing that the Allies had not lost a single ship to enemy submarines in the North Atlantic in the four months ending September 13—a fact that later was confirmed officially by the German radio.

In addition to the vessels which the German broadcast today they had sunk, they listed three destroyers as damaged and probably sunk and two other merchant vessels as hit.

COMMON SENSE NEEDED IN RATION PROGRAM

Among other dumb rulings in connection with rationing is the stove allotment for this county, which for the entire month is just about what one store would sell in one fair business week during any fall. While there are enough stoves on hand among Pitt County dealers to take care of all needed purchases, the allotment for the month is set at 46 wood and coal heaters. Under such monthly allotments a lot of people who need stoves now must wait months to make their purchases, regardless of how cold the weather gets and regardless of how many stoves are in the warehouses.

In view of the fact that stove purchasing is a seasonal matter in this community and that most purchases are made in the early fall preparatory to cold

weather, it seems to us that the sensible procedure would have been to ration them on a seasonal rather than a monthly basis, if rationing was necessary at all.

We don't blame local ration authorities for the situation because their job is to carry out orders from higher-up, but it does seem to us that more common sense could be used by those who make the orders.

WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

Washington—Credit for successfully steering us through world affairs or blame for ineptitude will come to the Department of State, not on the basis of what has happened to date but what happens from now on.

The State Department building, flanking the White House on the west, is a relic of the last century. It's a gray, towering rococo fire-trap. It's the oldest-fashioned government building in Washington and the department it houses was the same way when we were plunging into war.

None of our government structure, our Army, Navy, or State Department was totally prepared for global war.

When President Roosevelt started looking around for men and agencies on which to place the responsibilities of our relationship with foreign nations in this struggle, he bypassed the State Department al-

most completely. The Board of Economic Warfare, many phases of lend-lease, the Office of Coordinator of Inter-American Affairs, foreign relief and rehabilitation, part of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, foreign propaganda (now under OWI), and several other activities all normally would have been State Department activities.

The hidebound structure of the State Department couldn't possibly be stretched to include these activities. New agencies had to be set up outside, with Secretary of State Hull and his staff never employing more than certain advisory and veto powers.

That sort of a blow-up was coming seemed inevitable to many observers, but that it was coming within the department wasn't quite so clear. The differences between Secretary Hull and his long-time undersecretary, Sumner Welles, were fundamental. Primarily they are the differences between a long-cabin statesman who has given the best part of his life to purely domestic affairs and a polished graduate of Groton and Harvard who has devoted his entire career to the brook-coated diplomacy which is State Department tradition.

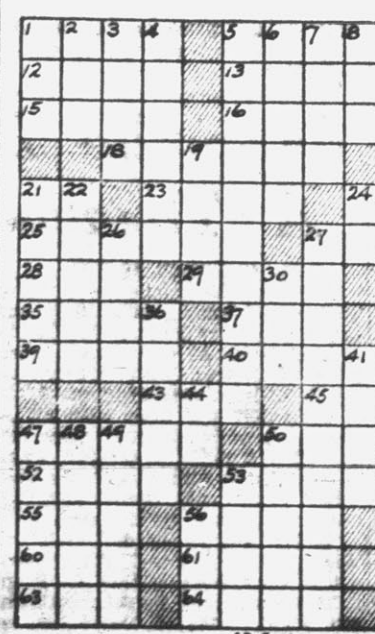
Nor was there ever any doubt when the showdown came which man would have to go. To sacrifice and court the enmity of a man who commands the public and Congressional respect that Secretary Hull does would have been an unthinkable Administration error. It is, perhaps, unfortunate that either had to go. It's well known here that Roosevelt and Welles were closer than the President ever was with his Secretary of State. They think alike, with minds tutored in the same schools and same society. It's a foregone conclusion that the President will at least urge Welles to undertake some important task for him.

That, however, is mostly water under the bridge. The point is, can

"When I assumed the responsibility as chairman of the War Finance Committee for Region One, comprising 16 counties in Eastern Carolina, I naturally turned to my fellow bankers for help. On the whole, I have received fine cooperation. My observation has been that those bankers whose banks are prospering and growing have been of greatest help to me. One of the outstanding bankers is my good friend, Joe Wainston, cashier of the Bank of Farmville.

"In the War Bond drive last April our region had a quota of \$3,500,000; Pitt county's quota was \$900,000. That looked like a big job, but Pitt county people bought \$1,300,000 worth of bonds. In the present drive this region of the state has a quota of \$7,600,000; Pitt county's quota is \$2,100,000. Pitt county people have already bought more than \$1,756,000 worth of bonds and we still have about \$344,000 to go," Woolard said. "In order to do this it will be necessary for our substantial citizens to subscribe for a substantial amount, and the women and children cannot do this selling War Stamps and a few bonds. I have every reason to believe our people will meet this wartime challenge and we expect the county's quota to be oversubscribed. "We are not asked to donate, but to invest our money in the safest securities in the world. It is a privilege to buy War Bonds—not a sacrifice. The men in uniform are making the sacrifices in the battle lines, and we cannot afford to let them down," the Greenville banker said in conclusion.

be possible to put at least 50,000 of them in uniform this year, with the others being ready early next year."

"This lost army of government workers is big enough to furnish all the men needed, without taking fathers," commented Rep. Harless (R-Ind.), a member of the Costello committee. "For the life of me I cannot understand how they have remained out of the service so long."

By putting uniforms "on this lost army of federal workers and carefully sifting the 4-Fs" the army can be supplied all it needs, said Harless.

The Indiana said War Department figures given the committee showed that more than 60 per cent of the unmarried workers in the air forces depot at Middletown, Pa., have been deferred for dependency. He said the situation "is difficult to understand."

In the senate a bill by Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) to postpone until January 1 the induction of pre-Pearl Harbor family heads is expected to go back to the Military Committee next week for further study of the manpower question.

An administration poll showed today that Wheeler apparently could count on less than 20 votes and the war were indications that even he privately had abandoned hope of obtaining action at this time. Arrangements were being made for a motion to be lodged—probably Tuesday when the senate is scheduled to debate the question—to recommit the bill to the committee which approved it by an 11 to 4 vote last summer. Since then a majority of members appeared to have changed their minds because of the solid opposition registered by army and navy heads.

Public hearings on the Wheeler bill ended yesterday after Bernard M. Baruch, special advisor to the president, reiterated that Gen. George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, ought to be given all the manpower he requests, including fathers.

has been able to advance 30 miles northward because of Gen. Clark's operations."

(The German communiqué broadcast from Berlin said strong forces had attacked at Salerno and the Contursi to the southeast. It declared the Contursi attack was repelled but admitted that the attack still was in progress in the Salerno area.)

Allied bombers last night ranged into northern Italy to Pisa and attacked the railway yards and airfield, the air command announced.

The daring motorboat foray to the Albanian shore marked up an Allied move in a new direction against the German forces in southeastern and southern Europe.

A naval announcement said the larger of the two vessels sunk was laden with ammunition. Shore batteries opened fire on the torpedo boats during their retirement, causing some damage to one vessel, but all returned to base without casualties, the announcement said.

The naval announcement said Allied vessels are still pouring reinforcements into the Salerno area and added that the Eighth army is being supplied across the straits of Messina.

In the air, Allied aircraft still was striking heavily at enemy troop movements and concentrations back of the Salerno battle area. Medium bombers hit at roads and road junctions around Cancelli and in the area of Capua.

Fighters and fighter bombers patrolled the Avellino and Benevento areas, smashing at motor transports, gun positions and bridges.

The air force said the German evacuation of Corsica, island birthplace of Napoleon which is slightly over 100 miles south of the French coast, was going on day and night.

This was the third time since May that the Germans were on the run by air and sea. The first time was from Tunisia and the second from Sicily. In all cases their air transport losses were extremely heavy.

It was disclosed, meanwhile, that two French cruisers, including the Jeanne D'Arc which formerly was based at Martinique in the west Indies, six destroyers and three submarines had assisted in taking French forces to the island to chase out the Germans.

Only Two Pairs Shoes Per Year

Washington, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Take it easy with the brogans, boys. It's going to be a longer time between pairs.

Six months was the period set by the OPA last night for stretching the next new-shoe ration stamp, which becomes valid Nov. 1.

Heretofore, it's been four months between coupons.

Principal cause, OPA explained, is a critical shortage of leather due to heavy demands for military and industrial uses and for shoe repairing. The manpower shortage is a contributing factor.

Present production estimates indicate, OPA said, that the new stamp will have to last until May 1, but of the outlook should improve sufficiently, the period will be shortened. A definite announcement was promised as soon as studies underway are completed.

the first game, but the Tribe took
