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Red Artillery Blasts Defending Nazi Forces On High Cliffs Of Kiev

Suburbs Of City On East Bank Of River Already In Soviet Hands; Fall Of Gornel, River Fortification Above Kiev Appears Imminent

Moscow, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Red army guns shelled the Germans on the high cliffs of Kiev from numerous positions in the suburbs of the eastern bank of the Dnieper today.

The Russians were in possession of the entire eastern suburbs of the city, some of which lie less than 100 yards across the river. They were at the railway and highway bridges on the eastern side of the villages of Podnyaki, Predmostnaya Sloboda and Trukhanov island, all in Kiev's front yard.

These are just across the river and actually are not villages but subdivisions of the city.

Russian troops are so close to the city that in many places they are able to rake the cliffs with machine guns, and snipers are busy picking off unwary Germans.

Soviet forces which pushed into the suburbs on the eastern bank of the river are exposed to heavy fire from natural fortifications along the towering west bank where ancient cells of monks hewn into the high cliff afford excellent machine-gun and light gun nests for the Germans.

(The Berlin radio said that Soviet forces were continuing big-scale crossing thrusts along the central Dnieper without revealing the success of the assaults. It added that Russian reinforcements were being thrown against German defenses near Zaporozhe, on the river south of Dnepropetrovsk, and Soviet forces "are still attacking with powerful forces in the Kuban.")

It is not known whether the Germans have destroyed railway and highway bridges spanning the Dnieper at Kiev, and there is no indication whether the Russians intend to storm the city's high cliffs frontally from across the river or flank it by crossings to the north and south.

There were no reports here either that Soviet forces had already crossed the river either directly above or below Kiev.

The fall of Gornel, river fortification above Kiev, appeared imminent as Soviet troops advanced to within 12 miles of the city from the northeast and other columns advanced from the south and east.

Thirty villages lying atwart Gornel's approaches and transformed into outer fortifications have been captured. Red Star, official army organ, said.

Still another Russian column pushing into White Russia above Gornel, in the Mogilev sector, has occupied a number of villages, front line dispatches said.

RUHR VALLEY RAF TARGET

War Industries At Bochum Pounded Last Night

London, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Returning to Germany's great Ruhr concentration of war industry after an interval of a month, a British bomber fleet last night gave the big iron city of Bochum its fifth heavy pounding of this year, it was announced today.

A communique said eight of the bombers were missing.

Other objectives in the Ruhr valley also were hit in the raid, the RAF's third attack against German war targets in the last eight nights. Bochum, last attacked on June 25, is the center of Ruhr coke and steel industry.

A heavy night raid on June 12 devastated 130 acres in the center of the city, which has a population of 320,000. Three large steel works, including branches of the Krupp combine are situated there, as well as many important coke, coal, iron, tin, zinc and chemical works.

One hundred and fifty miles inland from the Dutch coast, Bochum is situated 11 miles west of Dortmund.

The attack represented the third blow this week at the Nazis' great industrial artery, the Dortmund-Ruhr canal.

The Berlin radio, in a broadcast recorded by the Associated Press here, said the RAF bombs dropped during the night "damaged the residential quarters of several towns, particularly in Bochum."

Berlin also broadcast a Stockholm dispatch reporting that foreign airplanes based on southern Sweden, in the night, flying in a southerly direction. What connection this had with the attack on the Ruhr was problematical, unless the British squadrons followed a circle route to avoid the heavy anti-aircraft defenses concentrated along the channel coasts.

Mr. Elks, a native of Pitt county, was a son of the late Louis B. and Nancy Edwards Elks. He spent his entire life in this county. He was a member of the Grimesland Masonic Lodge.

Over The Top

Evansville, Ind., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau announced here today the nation's Third War Loan drive goal of \$15,000,000,000 had been met.

The Secretary, who came here to participate in the launching of an invasion barge at the Evansville shipyards, made the announcement at the launching ceremonies.

"An hour ago, I had word from the treasury in Washington that at 11 o'clock this morning we met and passed our national goal of \$15,000,000,000," Morgenthau said, "we still have two days to go."

DESTROY JAP AMMUNITION Blast Dump At We-wak; Aussies Near Finschhafen

Allied Headquarters in the Southwest Pacific, Sept. 30.—(AP)—A huge store of ammunition which the Japanese painstakingly had transported overseas for use against Gen. MacArthur's advancing New Guinea troops was exploded Tuesday at We-wak by Liberator bombers in the greatest pyrotechnic display ever seen in the Southwest Pacific.

This new blow, following by a day the destruction of more than 60 enemy planes and seven ships at We-wak, was reported today in a communique which also announced that hard fighting Australians are inching through bitter Japanese resistance to within 600 yards of the main jetty of Finschhafen.

The Japanese utilized 40 fighter planes and concentrated batteries of anti-aircraft guns in an effort to prevent further destruction at We-wak, where approximately 500 of their aircraft have been wiped out in little more than a month.

But the raiders shot down eight interceptors, added 145 tons of bombs to the 106 tons dropped on Monday and departed intact while smoke from the munitions blast covered the whole We-wak peninsula. The fighting caliber of the opposing pilots led returning fliers to believe they were crack navy airmen rushed in from Rabaul.

New Ruling About Tires In Effect

Effective October 1, the mileage requirements for Grade I tires will be raised from 241 to 601 miles per month. Anyone with gasoline allotment from 90 to 600 miles per month is now eligible for Grade III tires only. Anyone with gasoline allotment in excess of 601 miles per month is eligible for Grade I tires.

This change is necessary at this time to cope with demands to be made upon stocks of new passenger tires which are at the low point forecast by the Office of the Rubber Director early this year.

Citation For Submarine Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The U. S. submarine Guddeon sunk 19 Japanese ships, including one submarine, and damaged three other ships in eight war patrols in the Pacific, the Navy reported today in announcing award of a presidential unit citation to the ship.

Yugoslav Guerrillas Push Germans Back In Italy

London, Sept. 30.—(AP)—A patriotic communique broadcast today from somewhere in Yugoslavia said that guerrilla forces had forced German troops to retreat "at many places" near the northeastern Italian city of Gorizia and at Ljubljana, in Yugoslavia.

The war bulletin recorded here by Reuters, made no mention of how far the irregulars had swept past Gorizia, 25 miles west of the Yugoslav border and 30 miles northwest of Trieste, but the London daily mail, quoting German radio accounts, said the guerrillas had penetrated 100 miles into northern Italy to the Venice area.

This account declared that fighting was in progress along a 125 mile front between Venice and Trieste to the northeast and northward toward the Austrian border in the Dolomite foothills.

The newspaper quoted a Berlin radio spokesman as saying that the entire area was "unsafe" and that German troops movements possibly, only in convoys. Roads, bridges and railways were said to have been blasted.

South along the eastern shore of the Adriatic, the Germans were said to be rushing additional forces to strengthen the battered troops which recaptured the port of Split after 15 days of fighting.

The Yugoslav fighting "without a doubt, is preliminary to major events in the Balkans which may lead to a junction of the Allied and Soviet armies," the Daily Telegraph said.

Meanwhile, the arrival in Cairo of young King Peter of Yugoslavia was viewed in London as the likely forerunner of an Allied move to bring about a unification of the two Yugoslav guerrilla armies which together are estimated to total around (Continued on Page Five)

The WAR TODAY AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The Balkan thorn is being pressed deeper into Hitler's side by the progress of the Allies in the conquest of Italy.

One of Hitler's chief reasons for defending Italy is to protect his hold on the Balkans, across the Adriatic. Each day of success on the Italian peninsula adds to the Allied ability to rake the Balkans from the air, and it also is bound to increase German fears of invasion.

The situation in this cockpit of southeastern Europe is a terrible menace to the right flank of Hitler's battle-front in Russia.

The Fuehrer's fears of invasion of the Balkans doesn't necessarily mean that the Allies have decided on such an operation. They are in the enviable position of being under no pressure at this time to undertake it, whereas the Nazi chief is compelled to maintain an army in that theater to guard against invasion and to keep the lid on the unpredictable Balkan peoples.

Not only are all his small satellites—Bulgaria, Rumania and Hungary—trying to break away from him, but the occupied countries are snuffing him hip and thigh.

JAPS HAVE NEW FIGHTER PLANE

New "Super-Zero" More Formidable Than Predecessor

Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The Japanese have come up with a new fighter plane more formidable than the Zero. Senator Brewster (R-Me.) disclosed today, and the United States may have to send more "big league" battlers to cope with them.

Brewster, one of three senators just back from a 42,000-mile swing over the world's battlefronts in an army plane, told an interviewer that the new "Super-Zero" apparently was just getting into production because only a few had been sighted.

But those few, he indicated, have "eaten tough." He said the ratio of American victories over losses, which ran as high as 4 to 1, has begun to drop.

On every front line airfield the touring senators were told "we want more planes."

Pilots with experience in various theaters of combat generally rate the air over France as "major league" area because of the high quality of the enemy's equipment and the undeniable skill of German pilots.

Until the appearance of the new Japanese model, Brewster said, U. S. fighters in the far Pacific considered quantity more important than quality. Now, however, they are urged stepped-up speed, climb and maneuverability in their own ships.

Brewster said it was conceded everywhere that American bombers are the world's best, and one of his fellow travelers, Senator Russell (D-Ga.) went further, declaring: "There isn't any doubt that our latest model planes of all types are as good or better than anything any other nation has."

Looking beyond to a postwar age of vastly increased aerial commerce, both Brewster and Senator Mead (D-NY) expressed determination that American fliers shall have the right to use bases built by the United States on foreign soil under the lend-lease agreements. Outside of a few in the western hemisphere constructed as a result of the swap of 50 destroyers to Great Britain, they said no foreign base will be open to American planes six months after the end of the war unless steps are taken now.

Important Meeting Here October 12th

Marvin K. Blount of Greenville, temporary area chairman of the North Carolina Industrial Salvage committee, has called a meeting of industrial plant owners and managers at the City Hall here on Tuesday night, October 12 at 8 o'clock. An interesting and informative program will be presented, which included motion pictures emphasizing the importance of continuing to salvage scrap metals for war work.

Speakers will include Army and Marine officers. Eight similar meetings will be held in the state—four in the east and four in the west.

The Industrial Salvage Branch of the War Production Board is urging the need for scrap metals. Under its direction a state industrial salvage committee was set up, with eight area chairmen: Mr. Blount, congressional district, is temporary area chairman. His territory includes 17 counties, Pitt, Wilson, Nash, Edgecombe, Martin, Halifax, Beaufort, Craven, Lenoir, Greene, Chowan, Wayne, Hertford and Pasquotank. He will appoint county chairmen at the meeting to be held in Greenville on October 12, who in turn, will name salvage managers for each industrial plant in the area to recover scrap metal.

"The industrial scrap metals salvage drive is separate from the general salvage campaigns carried on in the state," Chairman Blount stated. "The acute metal shortage requires an intensive hunt in all industrial plants for discarded machinery, implements and other metals. At the area meeting here it is our purpose to explain the urgent war needs for metals, set up county committees and get to work to start moving scrap metals to the foundries," he added.

ANNOUNCE LIST OF CASUALTIES

Army Casualties Are Placed At 85,000 Navy 30,000

Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP)—War casualties of the nation's armed forces have reached approximately 115,000.

Secretary of War Stimson disclosed today that army casualties to date total about 85,000 while figures announced by the Navy Department placed naval casualties at 30,162.

The navy total included 11,256 dead, 5,305 wounded, 8,456 missing and 4,143 taken prisoner.

The army total, Stimson told a press conference, included the period from December 7, 1941, through casualties at Salerno, and up to and including September 15.

The casualties at Salerno, where the Allied beachhead was established in Italy and now is expanding. (Continued on Page Two)

Cox Resigns As Committee Head

Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Rep. Cox (D-Ga.), who has been engaged in a bitter feud with members of the Federal Communications Commission in his capacity as head of a special committee to investigate FCC, today resigned the chairmanship of the committee.

Cox announced his resignation to the House after conferring with Speaker Rayburn. His resignation had been demanded in a petition filed on May 13 with Rayburn by Clifford Durr, a member of the FCC, who charged that Cox was unfit to conduct the investigation because of a connection with an Albany, Ga., radio station which had business pending before the commission.

Paroled Maggie Blackwell, convicted last April in Pitt county for larceny and sentenced to two years in prison was among 10 prisoners paroled by Governor Broughton today.

Stockholm Quotes Berlin Report That City Has Been Evacuated; British Ships Bombard Port; Fifth Army Closing In From Two Directions

Stockholm, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The Germans have evacuated Naples after destroying harbor installations, a Berlin dispatch to the newspaper Aftonbladet said today.

"Communist revolt," and sabotage on a big scale were partly forcing the evacuation, the Germans said.

The military spokesman in Berlin said the "rebels" were cooperating with Allied troops south of Naples, and adding that because of the nearness of the Allies and "the risk of new Allied landings in Naples itself German war chiefs consider it far too risky to keep troops in the city."

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The American Fifth army rolled across the coastal plain at the foot of Vesuvius today toward the towers of smoke and flame that marked the city of Naples, Italy's second greatest port.

(The German-controlled Fascist radio announced in mid-afternoon today that "at this moment the British fleet is bombarding Naples." There was no confirmation of the report from any quarter.)

Overrunning Pompeii, the modern town of 4,000 people built on the ashes of its ancient namesake, that was destroyed in 79 A.D. by troops of Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark drove to the southern slopes of 3,900-foot Vesuvius and began the last stages of their approach around the base of the volcano.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's communique announced the capture of both Pompeii, 10 miles along the coast from Naples, and Mercato San Severino, 22 miles southeast of the big port which has been shaken and swept for a week by the explosions and fires set by German demolition crews, and ridden by vengeful machine-gun squads reported to have excited a reign of terror among the people.

But it was probable that the troops were much closer than disclosed by the communique which usually contains no information of operations later than 6 p. m. of the (Continued on Page Three)

Hearing of the deed case was scheduled for trial this week, but will be postponed.

totalled 3,500 killed, wounded and missing.

Stimson gave this breakdown for the war casualties, not including Salerno:
Killed, 10,682; wounded, 26,666; missing, 23,743; taken prisoner, 20,451.

Since the landings in Sicily on July 10 American casualties in the Mediterranean theater of operations up to the Salerno campaign amounted to 1,455 killed, 5,231 wounded and 1,736 missing, Stimson said. Nearly all of the casualties resulted from the Sicilian operation, although some were the result of air action and some included previously unreported figures.

Stimson said that of the 26,666 soldiers wounded in the war to date 10,975 have either returned to duty or been discharged from hospitals. He said that it was "gratifying to note that the Salerno casualties were less than we feared."

LEAF AUCTION SYSTEM BEST

Expert Discusses Tobacco Selling Plan In Business Journal

Chicago, Sept. 30—(AP)—America's tobacco auction system has four principal weaknesses, P. D. Converse says in a copyrighted article written for the Journal of Business of the University of Chicago and Business Administration at the University of Illinois, said he believed difficulties in grading, small lot sales, speed of the sales and the small number of buyers worked to the detriment of the auctions.

Converse said long experience had proved the auction to be the best method of selling tobacco, "yet on the other side it is said that prices vary widely not only from year to year, but on the same quality of leaf in the same market on the same day and that the buyers control prices to the disadvantage of the growers."

Converse said the advantages of auction selling to the growers are: an economical method of selling, competitive bidding by buyers who have an opportunity to inspect each basket, the presence of speculators who bid on baskets undervalued by factory and export buyers and the light of the farmer to reject bids and have the tobacco resold until

he is satisfied with the price, and this without additional expense. "The chief advantage of the auction to the buyers seems to be the fact that it is public and that each buyer can make sure that his competitors pay as much as he does. This means that small buyers can buy at as low prices as large buyers. At private sale a manufacturer is not certain that he is buying at the same price as his competitors."

Continuing, the author then presented arguments against the auction system. One of them he listed as high buying cost and another, wide variations in prices paid to farmers for the same quality of tobacco during the season and even on the same day.

Declaring that perhaps the fundamental difficulty is that of grading tobacco, he asks "is fairly accurate grading possible?"

He said men in the trade disagree but the fact remains that the manufacturers and dealers "do grade" their tobacco, and this with relatively low paid labor.

Germans Reported

The Cairo radio said the Fifth army was rapidly invading the city from the south and southeast.

(The German communiqué, broadcast from Berlin, said that harbor installations had been destroyed in an effort to prevent Allied landings, and that "very severe measures were taken against communist riots while here flaring up.")

While Clark's army continued its unbroken advance, Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's Eighth army along the Adriatic continued to

consolidate the newly won air bases at Foggia, only 160 miles from Rome and branched out to reach Manfredonia on the east in a 20-mile advance from Zappone.

The weather turned from rain and win to warm as General Sherman tanks of the Fifth army rolled past Zappone to the outskirts of Torre Annunziata, beating down rearward opposition and pressing on despite extensive minefields and demolitions which had ruined roads and bridges.

The bulk of the German defenders apparently had fled into Naples and then on to the north, according to an airforce announcement which told of bombarding Nazi truck columns to the northeast of the city.

The fierce rush of Gen. Clark's troops through the mountain ring had cost dearly, however.

A military spokesman announced that British divisions of the Fifth army suffered 5,211 casualties from Sept. 9, the beginning of the battle of Salerno, to Sept. 30. This was a high proportion of casualties considering the number of troops involved.

(The War Department announced last Saturday that American casualties at Salerno, up to Sept. 15, totaled 3,497.)

The capture of Torre Annunziata would place the Fifth army nine miles from Naples along the flat plain bordering the gulf.

Capturing Mercato San Severino the Allies continued to develop their flanking movement against the city. The town is eight miles northeast of Nocera, capture of which was announced yesterday, and about 12 miles southwest of Avellino, the communications center east of Naples. The capture of Naples will

complement perfectly the earlier seizure of the Foggia air center. Meanwhile, the slow pressure against the Germans promised to give to the Allies soon the substantial island base of Corsica. From there and from Sardinia they can threaten the seaward flank of the enemy.

After being grounded several days by bad weather Allied air forces yesterday attacked rail and highway bridges heavily within a 25-mile radius, east, northeast and north of Naples.

The approaches to the bottleneck bridge at Castelvenere on the Naples-Benevento road were ripped up in one of these forays.

The Middle East airforce announced new bombings of enemy airdromes in Greece and Rhodes, and said the Germans struck at the British-occupied island of Coo in the Dodecanese yesterday. Medium bombers of the North African airforce took to the air and raided escape routes that German forces must use in withdrawing before the advancing Allied forces.

The communiqué said road junctions were hit around Cancelli, 13 miles northeast of Naples, near Amoreli, 27 miles to the northeast, and around Piano.

Fighters and fighter-bombers also swept over the Benevento battle area, 32 miles northeast of Naples toward the center of the peninsula, attacking targets that presented themselves.

A night flight to Formia, along the coast 43 miles northwest of Naples, was the deepest penetration into enemy territory.

One Allied aircraft failed to return during the day. No German

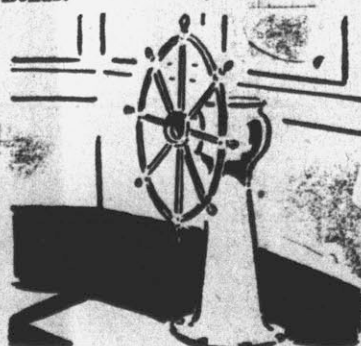

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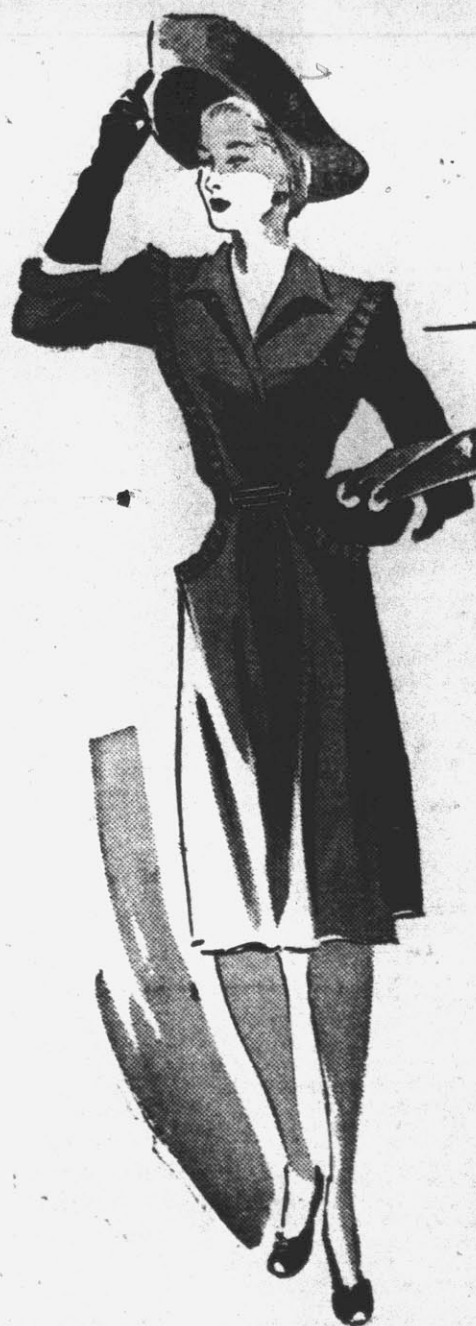

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Strength FOR THE DAY

PRIVILEGE INVOLVES RESPONSIBILITY

"Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." is a gracious one indeed. But people very often fail to realize that the invitation has an obligation attached. The remainder of the declaration is, "Take my yoke upon you and learn of me, for I am meek and lowly of heart, and ye shall find rest unto your souls, for my yoke is easy and my burden is light."

The promise is the promise of rest, but it is a rest which comes in the midst of burden bearing. We get our rest as we assume the yokes which God puts upon us—as we carry our burdens. Very often we are prone to believe that rest comes from an absence of responsibility. We need a certain amount of such rest in our lives, and God sees that we get it. But the rest which really counts, the contentment which is really deep, is that which wells up through burdening circumstances which fill the mind and heart when one is bent down by the weight of a heavy yoke.

The Lord never makes a promise to anyone that He will conduct him through life on flowery beds of ease. The truth of the matter is that life is not built along such lines. It involves a tremendous amount of conflict, trouble, and burden-bearing. Our peace and spiritual rest come not by the removal of these burdens but by the flowing of a deep sense of adequacy into our lives in spite of these burdens.

Nowhere is it so true as in the spiritual world that privilege involves responsibility.

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WILL THE PEOPLE LEARN?

In an article in the Reader's Digest for September, Hutton W. Sumners, congressman from Texas, asks: "Why is it... that... representative government is withering before our eyes?"

He shows that while our whole political system is based on the principle of local self government, the people themselves are destroying that system by their continual demands for Federal intervention in the problems of every community and class, and by the ever-growing practices of passing these problems to Washington. Congress, not being able to handle such an impossible burden, creates bureaus and bureaucrats.

The bureaucrats "issue what are called 'directives,' which actually have the force of law. One bureaucrat in the Securities & Exchange Commission said recently: 'We do make the law. This order supersedes any laws opposed to it.'"

"By making the units of state government financially dependent on the Federal government, that government is acquiring the power to control the units of state government. When this is fully consummated, the sovereignty of state governments will be liquidated."

"The men who are trying to drive us toward government by bureaucracy understand this. The chief adviser of the National Resources Planning Board, recently abolished by Con-

gress, prophesied crisply:

"Congress will surrender to the Administration the power to tax... Congress will appropriate huge sums of money, will surrender its power of directing when and how the money will be spent. Other extraordinary powers, such as to effect great social reforms, will be delegated to the Administration, which will retain most, if not all, of its wartime powers."

"The remedy—and only remedy—is to send all these non-Federal functions back where they belong: to the state and local communities, where they can be handled upon a scale within the comprehension of the limited mind of man."

"National socialism may be described as government by bureaucracy. If we think Hitler's system is better than ours, we should have the honesty to say so instead of copying while we denounce it."

WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington — Is it possible that the man who straightened out our rubber muddle is going to straighten out our manpower muddle, too?

I mean the veteran Bernard M. Baruch, who is holding more conferences on the benches of Lafayette Park these autumn days than ever he holds in his office.

Recently, the war Cabinet's dean of advisors has laid it out on the line in two red-tape slashing declarations. In one he told Congress either to give Gen. George C. Marshall everything he asks in the way of manpower or fire him. This is very much in line with Baruch's idea of occupational deferments first and dependency deferments second. But even more than the statements of General Marshall and other military and Selective Service leaders, it put Congress on the spot by making the father-draft vote a vote of confidence of our military leaders.

His second and more extensive statement of manpower policy was a report to War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes, recommending ways and means of breaking the manpower bottleneck in West Coast airplane factories.

The important thing is that if this Baruch plan is successful, it will become a blueprint for the entire country and would forestall national service legislation which almost everyone agrees is a necessary evil if other efforts fail.

In view of this, some of the salient points of the Baruch plan are well worth recording. Most important is the suggested system of labor priorities, which would take out of the hands of the individual employer the right to hire, fire or hoard employees, and

of the hands of the worker the right to work whether he chooses. The Baruch plan suggests that WPA determine, on a basis of production needs, what factories should fire and which might even have to turn loose some workers they now have.

However, Washington would only determine the factory priority ratings. The actual details would be worked out by local committees, for Baruch is an apostle of decentralization.

Baruch also would have a more positive policy on essential labor deferments and suggests even returning to essential industries men now in service. He opposes the system of temporary deferments all of which are supposed to expire the last of November.

He suggests that some part-time schooling system be worked out to give back to industry at least a portion of the more than 1,000,000 youngsters who have been contributing to the war production effort but who now are returning to school.

He wants all war production communities to wage a real battle against labor turnover (more than 100 per cent in some areas) by improving housing, transportation, day nurseries for the children of working mothers, a maximum enforcement of price and rent ceilings, adjusted shopping and personal service schedules.

He favors wage incentives but thinks they should be determined locally, not by a blanket policy. He wants a re-examination of the farm labor deferments to be sure farms don't become hideaways for unessential workers.

And he prefers a change in the costly cost-plus system of letting contracts—a system that many others also feel opens the door to waste, extravagance and labor hoarding.

(Continued from Page One) considered indispensable and to buy from Washington desk duty and commissioned officer in that same draft category.

Actually many fathers already are in the draft line.

Draft headquarters says some Pearl Harbor dads were inducted for these reasons:

1. They were men whose occupations were listed as "non-deferred."

2. They were farmers who abandoned farming—a violation of the Tydings amendment and answerable by induction.

3. Their children were not financially dependent on them. Many other fathers volunteered.

Now, dependency of self ceases to be a ground for deferment, and in preparation for this, pre-Pearl Harbor dads between 18 and 38 who are not making a substantial contribution to the war effort in their work are being put in a class in the order of their draft numbers.

Each board is supposed to induct fathers only after they have exhausted the supply of childless men, post-Pearl Harbor fathers, those whose jobs are on the published "non-deferred" list, and fathers who have quit farming in violation of the law.

These states expect to begin the father draft in October: Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Georgia, Idaho, Illinois (not including Chicago), Kansas, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New York (not including New York City), North Carolina, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

Allied officers are said to be attached to the headquarters of both Gen. Draja Mihailovic, the Yugoslav minister of war, and the rival guerrilla leader, Jossip Broz ("General Tito").

These Allied representatives, it is said in London, are unable to bring about a common understanding between the two leaders. Yugoslavs here said there have been no recent reports of action by Mihailovic's forces, centered in southern Yugoslavia.

These same sources said "Tito" recently has renewed an old-standing accusation that Mihailovic openly collaborated with the Germans.

Gmillos Gavrilovic, Yugoslav embassy counselor, said in London that the Nazis, tacitly admitting the fierceness of the fighting in northeastern Italy, had directed their forces to take no more prisoners.

"German war criminals must answer individually if they flout the rules of war and slaughter prisoners of a duly constructed army," the government spokesman warned.

Some indication of this repressed irritation at British activities was given by Chairman Russell (D-Ga) when he told a press conference yesterday that the news of American military activities was being played down by British news services and the British radio.

From accounts they read in Egypt, Russell said it appeared that United States troops were not doing any of the fighting in Sicily. He told reporters later he had made a study of English news and radio broadcasts and found that when the Royal Air Force made a sortie, it always was mentioned by name, but when American bombers went into action the results were always attributed to "Allied air forces."

Similarly, Senator Brewster (R-Me) said he thought the time had come to obtain more oil from the British holdings in the Persian Gulf area instead of continuing the heavy drain on American supplies.

"I was told that the British refinery at Abadan, Iran, which they say is the largest in the world, could increase its output 40 per cent," Brewster said. "I hope that we can get a greater proportion of our oil there instead of drawing so heavily on our diminishing supplies."

"If that goes on and we have another war in ten or fifteen years,

we may have to go out with a tin dipper and ask somebody for oil."

Other views expressed by the returning senators were:

The war in the Pacific may not end before 1945, but Germany might collapse at any time, due to loss of oil territory in Russia, reverses in the Mediterranean, and failure of the submarine to establish an Atlantic blockade.

Plans should be worked out now for moving into Germany—after the collapse—to control the civil population and prevent chaotic conditions.

Our army and navy are developing into the toughest fighting machine the world has ever seen.

In the Pacific, army and navy are working in closest cooperation, but the area needs additional men and supplies.

The American people have not been given enough information about the seamy side of some of the American fighting.

Service men overseas asked most frequently—when do we go home? What delays our mail? What about a job after the war? Are we going to be allowed to vote while overseas?

Folks at home still don't appreciate how dangerous Japan is. (The senators heard in the Far East that Japan is building 1,000 planes a month instead of 500, as generally believed, and has doubled her ship-building capacity.)

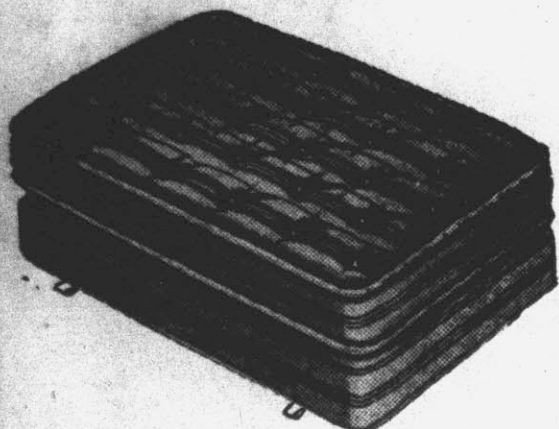
