Nazis Destroy Great Dam In Effort To Stop Reds

Capture of Zaporozhe Threatens German Forces In The Crimea; Outer Defenses Of Kiev Reported Crumbling; Fall Of Gomel Into Russian Hands Is Imminent

London, Oct. 15.—(AP) The waters of the great Dnieper dam—the largest in Europe—were sent rolling over the Russian countryside once more by German troops, the Berlin radio reported today in acknowledging their flight from Zaporozhe, their long-held southern key base and guardian fortress of the Crimea.

Meanwhile the outer defenses of Kiev, besieged capital of the Ukraine were falling today before the powerful Russian surge across the Dnieper river.

Russian troops have cut behind the Germans defending the city and the Red army has established its headquarters on the west side of the Dnieper.

News that the \$10,000,000 Dneprostroy had been blown up by the enemy indicated that they had succeeded in repairing it after the Russians destroyed its usefulness themselves, when falling back from the Dnieper in 1941 in what was called the greatest piece of self-sabotage of all time.

The gigantic dam is situated at the lower end of the Dnieper rapids, about 100 miles north of Zaporozhe and was considered one of the outstanding industrial achievements of the Soviet regime. Its waters generated power for the whole industrial area of the Ukraine and it has been said that "whoever controls the dam controls the whole southern Russian industry."

By blowing up the great dam, the Germans evidently hoped to prevent the Russian advance westward and to prevent the entrapment of German forces in the Crimea, believed to number more than 100,000 troops. There was no confirmation of the dam's destruction from Moscow and it was not known whether the Russians would be able to transport their armies across the newly-flooded terrain to close the Crimean escape corridors.

The great dam was frequently called the Dneprostroy dam, although it lies some 40 miles south of that Dnieper river city.

German dynamite was unable, however, to spoil the real Russian victory of the Zaporozhe bridgehead which the Soviet army's last German hope of protecting the railway to the Crimea through Melitopol from the north and of checking the Russian offensive in the south.

Meanwhile Melitopol, about 120 miles south of Zaporozhe, has been isolated by other Soviet columns and its fall was expected hourly, the Russian communists indicated. Threat of a double-pronged Russian offensive hung over the Crimea. The Red army was pouring (Continued on Page Six)

DEPLORES ACT OF ARGENTINA

President Says Suspension Jewish Press Repugnant

Washington, Oct. 15.—(AP)—President Roosevelt sharply rebuked Argentina today for suspending publication of Jewish newspapers, terming this action in line with characteristics of Nazi doctrine.

It was the second time within recent weeks that this government has reproved the only American nation still maintaining diplomatic relations with the Axis.

Secretary of State Hull previously sent a strongly-worded message turning down an Argentine request for lend-lease assistance.

Mr. Roosevelt said in a statement to a press-radio conference that primarily the suspension of Jewish newspapers concerned the Argentine government and people, but he added:

"I cannot forbear to give expression to my own feeling of apprehension at the taking in this hemisphere of action obviously anti-Semitic in nature and of a character so closely identified with the most repugnant features of Nazi doctrine."

"I believe that this feeling is shared by the people of the United States and by the people of the other American republics. In this connection I recall that one of the resolutions adopted at their international conference of American states at Lima in 1933 set forth that 'any persecution on account of racial or religious motives which makes it impossible for a group of human beings to live decently, is contrary to the political and juridical systems of America.'"

A cable from Buenos Aires Wednesday said all Jewish newspapers printed in Argentina had been suspended. This includes the principal Jewish newspapers of Argentina. The dispatch said Jewish newspapers printed in Spanish had not up to that time been affected. No reason was assigned for the suspension.

Montevideo, Uruguay, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Argentina, beset by new troubles arising from her foreign policy, remained outwardly calm today although there were some signs of nervousness in Buenos Aires, travelers who arrived from that city said.

Sixty Big Bombers Lost In Attack On Germany

Important War Plants At Schweinfurt Smashed; 104 Nazi Planes Downed In Fierce Battle

London, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Photographs revealed today that the giant Nazi ball-bearing factory at Schweinfurt was obliterated by the terrific American heavy bomber assault that cost the Eighth airforce 60 bombers and precipitated perhaps the greatest battle in aerial warfare.

At least 104 German fighters were downed by the Fortress sharpshooters and their Thunderbolt escorts in the attack yesterday. Two U. S. fighters failed also to return from the two-hour battle that raged all the way from Europe's coast to the target and back again.

The reconnaissance photographs revealed that Schweinfurt's plants, where probably 50 per cent of the Nazi war-vital roller bearings are produced, were wiped out by the precision-pattern crews who were told in advance that a successful blasting of the target might shorten the war by six months.

The fact that the Germans threw up "everything in the book" in defense of that vital industrial center indicated that they too considered the factories of the highest importance to the war effort.

"Without the slightest hesitation, I would say our boys encountered the stiffest and fiercest fighter opposition in the history of aerial warfare," an Eighth airforce spokesman said.

"What we did to the Germans yesterday will be felt severely—and soon."

The number of Fortresses that participated in the raid was not disclosed, but it was described officially as "large."

The Muscovites have let it be known the initial item on the agenda isn't to be political but military. They insist that first there must be agreement about the business of winning the war, which includes the "second front" that the Soviet has demanded.

This has the formidable backing of the situation which the Red offensive is creating. It enables the Soviet to reiterate the theme that the time for the Allies to slam Hitler with everything they have is when he's rocking on his heels.

In advancing arguments to substantiate this stand Moscow can even call on the authoritative German periodical, Das Schwarze Korps, which is published by Gestapo Chief Himmler. This paper dares tell the people of the Reich that the Nazi retreat in Russia has resulted in "a tremendous loss of political prestige for Germany—a loss which now

troubles many of us."

Some would say that pure coincidence accounts for the unprecedented deluge and deep mud (theoretically an almost impossible feat) just as the representatives of the big three are due to begin their delicate task. Be that as it may, we can at least agree that the Russians may well consider they have dealt themselves a most useful hand.

However, the Allies also have new and striking successes, which are huge contributions to the United war effort, to lay on the table. These include Italy's declaration of war against her former German ally, Portugal's grant of an invaluable base in the Azores, the steady northward grind of American and British armies on the Italian peninsula and the crippling of Hitler's industrial war effort by the fiercest aerial bombardment the war has produced.

Since all these things seem bound to enter the debate at an early stage, it's good to know that the such experienced diplomats as Cordell Hull, Anthony Eden and Vyacheslav Molotov. We are encouraged to believe, also that there is a (Continued on Page Four)

NAZIS LOSING WAR IN THE AIR

Says Allied Airpower Will Crush Enemy By Spring

A U. S. Bombardment Headquarters in England, Oct. 15.—(AP)—German war industry will be so smashed by spring as the result of Allied aerial pounding that the Nazis won't be able to fight effectively any longer on land or sea or in the air, Brig. Gen. Curtis E. May, commander of the U. S. heavy bombardment division, declared today.

"The winter holds no hope for Germany," the 36-year-old veteran of a year of European air battles said in an interview. By spring the Allies will have destroyed enough German war industry that they cannot fight effectively any more.

"The enemy will be pounded as frequently as strength is available. The more Flying Fortresses we have here the shorter the war is going to be. And the more fighters we have to protect the fortresses the smaller the losses will be."

The Germans are shooting the works on their last hope, the new fighter planes. It is not much of a hope, the general said, "and once they run out of airplanes and supplies they are done."

He contended that yesterday's bombing of the Schweinfurt ball-bearing plant, where an estimated 50 per cent of Germany's roller bearings were produced, virtually put out of commission 50 per cent of the enemy's war production.

"What other method of warfare could be used to destroy that much war effort with a loss of 600 men?" he asked.

United States bombing losses have been increasing in numbers recently, he continued, but the percentage considering the forces employed, has remained almost constant at less than five per cent.

The fact that the Germans are using rocket-gunned planes of every type—some of them obsolescent—"may be a measure of desperation," he said.

No Excuse Loafing During This War

The U. S. Employment office here reports a heavy demand for all kinds of workers—men and women, white and colored—for war projects and jobs in all lines of business and domestic service. Any person not working can easily get any one of a dozen jobs by applying at the employment office. There are more jobs than there are workers to fill them.

Within a few days a hundred or more workers will be laid off in the tobacco industry, but there are all kinds of jobs waiting for them. A man or woman who gets out of a job and applies for unemployment compensation in a hope of loafing and receiving part pay is going to be disappointed. It now appears.

"If the business and other people will cooperate with the employment office much free pay for loafers can be avoided," Robert F. Pease, manager of the employment office, said today. "The old days when people could hire workers for a few dollars a week are gone."

"If householders and business places will let us with any jobs they have available we will offer them to those applying for unemployment compensation. There is no excuse for anybody loafing now. It is safe to say that those who refuse to accept jobs will not be allowed to register for compensation."

With the tobacco season nearing the end there will be many persons temporarily out of a job, but there are jobs waiting for them here and on war work.

MAKE PROTEST TO PORTUGAL

Guerrillas Score New Victories Over Nazis

Fifth Army Pouring Across River Into Newly Won Bridgeheads; Seven Nazi Divisions Face Annihilation Or Retreat; New Gains Scored By British Eighth Army

Allied Headquarters, Algiers, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The main forces of the Allied Fifth army poured across the Volturno river into newly won bridgeheads today, and dispatches from Lt. General Mark W. Clark's battle headquarters said the British and Americans were throwing the enemy back along the entire front from the west coast to the mountain backbone of Italy.

The message telling of decisive gains all along the front in the course of furious and bloody fighting was received after an Allied headquarters communique had disclosed that British infantry and tanks had landed from British vessels on the north side of the Volturno's mouth early Wednesday simultaneously with a frontal assault across the stream by American and British infantry and engineers.

Rolling up the enemy's coastal anchor, this amphibious force quickly dug in positions along a canal, while British naval guns belched steel into the strong German defensive positions behind the coastal railroad line on high ground four miles north of the river.

While the British destroyers, Laforet and Lookout, and the Netherlands gunboat, Flores, hurled tons of explosives into the hills, a terrific fight raged along the coast. The Germans obviously had been uneasy over the possibility of such a landing—the first amphibious operation undertaken by the Fifth army since its original arrival on the Salerno beaches—and had concentrated huge artillery groups in the dominating heights and in the lower ground.

Meanwhile the American troops stormed the heights northeast of Capua in the face of deadly German resistance and consolidated their hold on the high ground screening the all-important Capua bridgeheads where the major body of the Fifth army was steaming into the offensive.

(A German broadcast said today the Allies had "superior infantry and tank forces on both sides of Capua.")

At almost all points north of the river, reports from Clark's headquarters said, the Germans were counter-attacking sharply and bitterly, time after time, employing tanks in desperate efforts to retard or dislodge the Allies at key points.

An official dispatch from Clark's headquarters at 10:35 a. m., today declared, "The Fifth army continues (Continued on Page Six)

To Oppose Tariff On Natural Rubber

Washington, Oct. 15.—(AP)—President Roosevelt advocated today that in the postwar world, any effort to impose a high tariff on natural rubber be opposed in order to assure cheap and plentiful tires for American cars.

This view, he told a press-radio conference, had been expressed in exchanging toasts last night at a stag dinner given at the White House for President Lescot of Haiti.

Mr. Roosevelt said at the dinner that he hoped that "when I am out of the White House the Congress won't put the kind of tariff on rubber for American automobile tires just to keep some synthetic plants going." The President said that would mean every man in the United States who owned a car would have to pay 50 per cent more for his rubber.

and Teachers which was held at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, Greensboro, from June 28 to July 1.

Mrs. Robeson opened her remarks by telling about the wonderful fellowship which was enjoyed during the four days. She mentioned the personalities who were present and who conducted the study groups. Health of the children was the keynote of all meetings.

Mrs. Robeson stated that the educational highlights of the institute were presented by Dr. Clyde A. Erwin and Prof. Guy B. Phillips. Dr. Erwin gave ten points as the "next steps" for North Carolina. They were: raise the compulsory attendance law to 16 years; codify the public school laws; provide for supervisors; increase salaries of school personnel; provide pre-school educational facilities; reduce teacher load; provide more intensive inservice training; plan for a post-war school building program; revise the standards for accreditation of both elementary and high schools; and to secure federal aid.

Mrs. Robeson quoted Dr. Phillips as saying "Make the teachers feel that they are human beings. Pay them twelve months of the year. Let them work eleven months and give them a month's vacation."

Mrs. Robeson closed her report by urging the members of the Third Street School P. T. A. to attend the institute next year.

After an informal social hour, the meeting adjourned.—Reported.

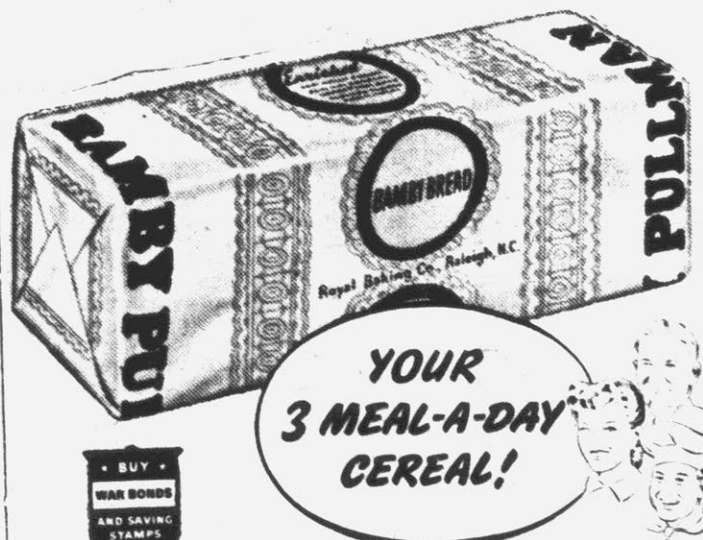

A PROBLEM TO PONDER

On September 9, 1914, the Prussian guard swept through the right wing of Marshal Foch's army. The courageous French general wired headquarters as follows: "My center gives way; my right recedes; the situation is excellent. I shall attack." Foch knew that the Germans, as they made their onslaught, had come upon huge stores of champagne. Quickly pulling his troops together, he arranged his defense in such way that the Germans were put to great disadvantage. Then he hurled his forces through the gap which the Germans had thought was discovered that hundreds of German officers who should have been alert at the crucial moment had stopped to drink champagne. The opportunity of the war had faded in a few hours. Foch counter-attacked, and the German hope of capturing Paris was ended for good.

This is only a picture on a large canvas of what is sketched hundreds of times in pathetic little minutes. Victory is frequently stopped just short of triumph because men linger to indulge themselves and particularly to indulge themselves as did the Germans on this occasion. Through the ages some of the finest men of each generation have been overwhelmed and defeated by liquor. Nothing sweeps away the foundations of life more quickly than intemperance. Empires as well as individuals bear witness to its power to ravage.

Thoughtful American everywhere are pondering with anxiety this problem which looms large on the horizon of the future.

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WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington—Over at Agriculture, they are reading a national campaign to make the soybean a staple article in the U. S. diet.

The reason is that like peanuts (which also are being pushed) soybeans are full of fats and vitamins and agricultural experts have no doubt that eventually they will become one of America's important food products. The object of the coming campaign is to make soybeans just that now while they are a valuable substitute for foods that are short.

Every possible use of soybeans will be propagated and emphasis will be laid on their value as "meat extenders" in meat loaf and sausage and in soups and stews.

Behind this campaign is a story. The dislocations and shortages in food products are resulting in a change in the American diet and not all of it for the better.

It should be stressed now that there is no question of maintaining the nutritive level. The problem is to direct this change in diet into healthful channels.

For example, the butter shortage which is likely to get worse has resulted in a marked decrease in the consumption of bread. Considering that serious, since bread still is the staff of life, Agriculture department experts prevailed upon OPA to lower the point value of margarine as butter point values were upped. But the consumption of bread continued to curve down.

The food experts are trying other means to increase consumption. The production of sandwich spreads, peanut butter, jams and jellies is being stepped up.

Similar is the fact that whole milk shortages in some sections have caused a considerable decline in the consumption of cereals.

Here is a survey of the food outlook as agriculture officials see it. Meat, pork, beef and veal will be more plentiful for some months but if the war drags on another year, feed shortages may cut the meat supply below any levels experienced so far. The supply of fresh frozen, and canned fish is only about two-thirds of peace time. Poultry and eggs are at record production and consumption levels.

Fresh vegetables have been plentiful, but only those housewives who canned their Victory gardens will be able to load the tables with canned

vegetables this winter. There will be plenty of potatoes.

As a result of these forced changes in eating habits, food experts predict some marked postwar changes in the American diet. The nation has had its introduction to quick-frozen and dehydrated foods and apparently likes them. The same will be true of soybeans, say the experts, once the nation as a whole is made aware of their nutritional value.

Fresh indication of this is seen in the agreement to accept Marshal Badoglio's government, on the basis that after the war the Italian people shall be free to choose whatever form of democratic government they want. This means that the old form of government won't be imposed on the Italian people against their will and that the big three will keep hands off when Italy is ready to make its choice. That's mighty important, for Russia and the Anglo-American allies have been fearful of each other's possible political activities among the European nations.

If the military situation does come up for first consideration it will put a somewhat peculiar complexion on the conference, since the business of foreign ministers obviously isn't military affairs. Still, they have had to consider the broad issues of war many times in their own cabinets, and with advice from their respective capitals could deal with the broad principles of the war effort.

Perhaps it would be best if the issue of the second front and the military effort should come up at once, as the Soviet desires. It strikes me that this probably is the most important problem of the moment, and that once this is solved it will be possible to iron out other differences.

ed like a big red brick.

In an interview published this week in stars and stripes, Maj. Gen. William E. Kepner, chief of the Eighth Air Force fighter command, said the Germans were using a greater number of twin-engine craft to carry their rocket apparatus.

The German overseas radio, in a broadcast recorded by the ministry of information, admitted that considerable damage was done to Schweinfurt's residential section yesterday.

Other German broadcasts, declaring that "flying commanders which set out early this morning are constantly finding more wreckage" said 125 American aircraft were shot down. Fourteen German fighters were lost, it was said.

Five four-engine American bombers made forced landings near Munich, it was added in the broadcast which declared "great confusion" was caused among the Fortress formations by "new smoke screen rockets" of the German defense which caused some bombers to collide in the artificial fog.

The American fliers declared their bombs were concentrated on the target and described the raid as one of their best jobs yet.

rallied two German military trains in Visoko and Hilde, near Sarajevo. Patriot bands went after Nazi-dominated railway lines in eastern Bosnia, and destroyed many miles of track around the towns of Bosanski Novi and Bihać on the Una river, the communique said. Two

bridges were blown up, while further east, near Pejedor, a "very long, important railway bridge" was destroyed, together with two and one-half miles of track, the bulletin asserted. Between Bihać and Vrtoc 48 Germans were reported killed and many others wounded in a sharp clash with the patriots.

Bitter clashes also were reported near Ilirsk, Bistrica, Ljubljana and Ajdubia in Slovenia, while around Bakar Karlovac and Gospić only fighting of local importance was noted.

Rommel's appointment as chief of Nazi operations in Yugoslavia was announced by radio Berlin last night. An earlier Swiss report said he had been given command of all Nazi-occupied Italy, with Field Marshal Gen. Albert Kesselring being "recalled" from his command of southern Italy after a quarrel with Rommel.

There was no indication that Rommel would personally take over the Balkan command. It was indicated he would probably act in a supervisory capacity, with Field Marshal Baron Maximilian Von Weichs, recently named Balkan commander-in-chief, in active command.

come in effect taxed under this most vicious type of tax legislation. High income groups that spend only a portion of their income for food, clothing, or other necessities are to have just that small percentage taxed, whereas the rest of their income may be continued to be amassed for further concentration of wealth in their hands.

"In peacetime a sales tax is vicious enough, but in war time, when we are trying to assure our war workers of sufficient funds to maintain themselves, the proposed sales tax would be the equivalent of a military defeat.

"A sales tax is an imposition of a national wage cut bearing most heavily on the low income groups. Such a tax would be a violation of the obligation given by this government to the working people of America that wages and prices are to be stabilized as of their relationship which prevailed on September 15, 1942."

Murray urged congress to consider now the so-called Murray-Dingell social security bill, extending both the coverage and benefits for unemployment compensation, old-age security, disability and health insurance.

The CIO president opened the counter offensive against the sales tax shortly after proponents had begun to claim enough strength to pass the levy—probably at 5 per cent, without exemptions.

Fifth army headquarters said both tanks and tank destroyers - big high velocity anti-tank guns on self-propelled mounts - were joining the infantry in the furious drive across the flatlands crisscrossed by small, still flooded watercourses north of the Volturno and into the heights beyond which rise to 4,000 feet.

Engineers were throwing "every sort of bridge" across the Volturno for this flood of men and material, although the assault forces east of Capua were able to wade the stream almost at will.

The German ability to rush reinforcements from north of Rome was curtailed, meanwhile, by flying Fortresses which smashed the important rail junction of Terni, 50 miles north of Rome, in central Italy.

The freight yards at Terni, junction of two electric rail lines and a steam line, were spouting flames and columns of smoke as the fortresses completed their runs. The anti-aircraft fire was light but 35 Messerschmitts and Pocke-Wulfs gave battle and two of these were shot down. This was the second heavy raid on Terni, the first having been Aug. 11.

Liberators as well as Fortresses attacked Adriatic coastal railways leading to the Eighth army's front. Warhawks and fighter-bombers also hammered trains north of Pescara, destroying three lines of trucks.

Argos, on the Grecian Peloponnese, felt the fury of the mounting aerial attack when American Mitchells escorted by Lightnings blasted

the airfield again. Bombs pitted the runways and fell among 27 parked planes. On the way home the Lightnings intercepted 10 to 15 Messerschmitts and shot down two. The surprising weakness of the enemy in the air was apparent over the entire battle area, and only two Allied planes were lost. They accounted for a total of four enemy planes.

masses of men and tanks into the Dnieper flatlands, just north of the Sea of Azov, both above and below Melitopol. Other Soviet forces were reported converging on the western tip of the Taman peninsula in the Caucasus, preparatory to launching a powerful amphibious attack on the Crimea, across the two-mile-wide Kerch strait.

There was no indication however, that the German 17th army was preparing to withdraw from its precarious position in the Crimea. On the contrary, the Germans apparently intended to try to hold the peninsula at all costs.

The threat to the Crimea was not the only disaster facing the battered German armies. Far to the north, a Russian communique said, Red army tank corps have forced a new breach in the German lines above Smolensk. Kiev and have smashed three Nazi divisions on the west bank of the Dnieper in fighting on both flanks of the Ukrainian capital.

Gomel, another German defense base on the edge of lower White Russia, also faced imminent capture by Soviet forces.
