Russian Forces Rolling
Forward In Drive To Cut
Off Germans In Crimea

**Soviets Drive Within
23 Miles Of Krivoi
Rog; Three Fourths
Of Important City Of
Melitopol In Russian
Hands; Nazi Lines
Reported Disinte-
grated**

London, Oct. 22.—(AP)

The Red army threw tested veterans of the battle of Stalingrad into its bold drive to isolate some half a million Germans in the Crimea and the Dnieper bend today. A Reuters dispatch placed the Russian vanguards only 18 miles from Krivoi Rog, iron ore city in the bend.

The Germans themselves acknowledged in their daily communiqué that Soviet attacks are boiling over into additional sectors, adding these assaults were particularly strong north of the Sea of Azov.

A Russian landing effort on the east coast of the Crimea also was reported in the German communiqué, which said the attempt was made with weak forces yesterday and was repelled.

The Reuters dispatch reporting the new advance toward Krivoi Rog said "the German air force no longer has enough fighter planes to prevent the attacks of the Soviet air force."

At Melitopol, the Red army gained more ground and now commands three quarters of the city area. The Germans consider Melitopol the key to the Crimea and are fighting desperately for it and flinging reinforcements into the struggle.

A dispatch to the Russian newspaper Izvestia said Melitopol was ablaze and the beautiful orchard country around it ruined by the machines of war.

A Moscow broadcast depicted German resistance at Melitopol as "showing signs of giving way after well over a week of battle." German positions north of Krivoi Rog have lost all semblance of a line and the Nazis are fighting hastily improvised actions from first point and then another, dispatches asserted.

German broadcasts said German naval forces were bombarding Soviet positions on the north coast of the Sea of Azov in an effort to help a "decisive" offensive toward the throat of the Crimea.

The Swiss radio reported that Dnepropetrovsk at the Dnieper bend was now completely encircled by Russian forces.

According to the best information available in London, two German armies in the Melitopol area and the Crimea were threatened. (Continued on Page Four)

BOMBERS RAID
NAZI TARGETS

**American Raiders
Blast Air Base
In France**

London, Oct. 22.—(AP)—American Marauder bombers, supported by Allied fighters, raided the Nazi air base at Evreux-Fauville, France, today as a quick daylight follow-up to raids on western Germany last night by RAF Mosquitoes.

While the Allies thus kept their day-night offensive rolling against Germany and occupied territories, Nazi raiders made hit-run attacks on London for the sixth successive night, causing some casualties and damage.

The Marauders, on their fourth operation of the month following a two-week lull because of bad weather, encountered not a single enemy fighter and made the raid on the airport 45 miles west of Paris without loss, it was announced.

Today's blow at Evreux-Fauville hinted a resumption of the extensive Allied aerial campaign against the Nazis' northwestern airbases which has ranged from Nantes on around the channel coasts to the German border.

About 50 fields have been bombed and re-bombed in some 100 attacks during the last two months in the campaign to whittle down Germany's fighter forces and permit unimpeded, large-scale bomber attacks.

Reveal Plan To
Kidnap Hitler

London, Oct. 22.—(AP)—The German high command today published details of an alleged plan by Marshal Pietro Badoglio to kidnap Hitler as well as Mussolini.

The plan was said to have been discovered among captured military documents.

The announcement was made by Berlin radio in a broadcast recorded by Reuters.

The kidnap plot story by DNR Nazi news agency said "documents" supplied by the German high command to the Voelkischer Beobachter, chief Nazi party newspaper, revealed the plot in which King Victor Emmanuel as well as Badoglio planned to deliver both Hitler and Mussolini to the Allies.

"Badoglio requested the Italian military attaché in Berlin to call on the fuhrer at his headquarters and ask him in the name of the king to come to Italy to discuss with the king and Badoglio, government measures to intensify resistance against the common enemy," DNB said, quoting these "documents."

"The invitation was refused coolly. It came at a time when the handing over of the Duce was decided and sealed."

"Today it is known," DNB continued, "that the king and Badoglio arranged with the fuhrer to place into his hands the fuhrer as well as the Duce."

Operating Group Arrived This Morning
Work On Extension
Of Field To Get
Under Way Soon

The old saying "The Marines have landed and have the situation in hand" is literally true at the county-city airport just across the river from this city, for a contingent of Marines from the Cherry Point air base arrived here this morning to officially take over the airport as a Marine air training and flying base.

The small contingent that arrived today under command of Lieutenant A. W. Martin, is the operating group that will have charge of the field.

They brought with them the necessary equipment to take care of night landings, first aid units and other facilities for handling the planes. These are but the forerunners of 600 men and 50 to 60 officers who will arrive here just as soon as plans for taking care of them are completed.

Colonel C. F. Schilt, commanding officer of the Cherry Point base, told a Reflector representative today that full use of the field would be made by his department and that just as soon as arrangements can be completed a minimum of two squadrons (36 planes) and 600 men with 50 to 60 officers will be on duty here. The operation of the field here will be under direct supervision of the Cherry Point base, of which it is an auxiliary. Until the arrival of the planes and men to be stationed here, Col. Schilt said, the field would be used for what was termed "bounce drills" with planes from Cherry Point flying to this city to undergo take-off and landing training and then return to the base at Cherry Point.

The local airport contains approximately 700 acres and consists of three 4,000-foot paved runways with all necessary taxi-strips and landing areas. The extension of two of the runways to 5,000 feet has already been approved and the construction work is expected to get (Continued on Page Four)

Information to this effect from authentic sources, the broadcast declared, was confirmed by a recent decree issued by the mayor of Haguenau directing that the 500 prisoners who escaped must immediately be reported to the nearest police station.

The nature of Eden's talk with Stalin yesterday, like those in the conference council chamber at Spiridonovka palace, was not disclosed, but it presumably was connected with the three-power deliberations on military, political and economic cooperation during and after the war.

FIGHT WAY OUT

**Battling Desperately
To Escape En-
circlement**

Allied Headquarters in the Southwest Pacific, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Imperiled by Australian forces on two sides, Japanese soldiers in the jungle northwest of Finschhafen are battling savagely in an attempt to reach the New Guinea coast, an Allied spokesman said today.

These Japanese presently are not trying to recapture Finschhafen, the spokesman explained, although their objective on the coast is only a few miles north of that air base.

Australians of the Ninth Division, experienced in battles both in North Africa and on New Guinea, have thrown back frontal attacks but the Japanese have achieved some progress by night infiltrations of small patrols.

The latest fighting reported was in the vicinity of the enemy-occupied village of Katika.

"The dispatch said the Japanese were 'attempting to save forces by making contact with the shoreline' but did not elaborate. Should these troops have in mind a flight from there, apparently they either would have to risk Allied air attacks by taking barges to New Britain or to Madang on up the New Guinea coast. Flight by land along the coast to Madang might offer another possibility."

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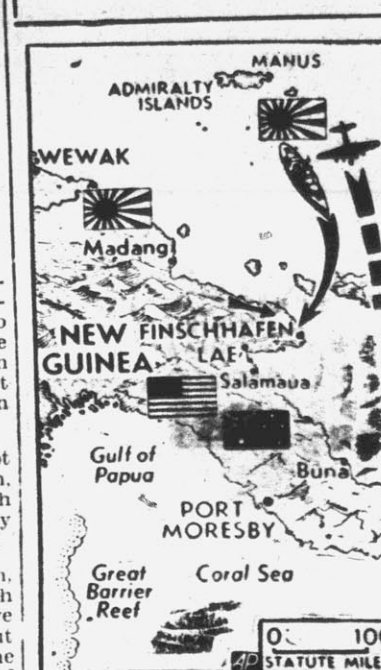
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Attacks Repulsed

NEW VICTORIES
BY GUERRILLAS

**Nazis Routed From
Iron Mine; Island
and Ships Seized**

London, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Strong partisan forces have stormed into the Bosanska Dubica in north central Yugoslavia and also have captured the Lyubija iron mine, second largest in Europe, a Yugoslav liberation army communiqué announced today.

The communiqué, broadcast by the Free Yugoslav radio and recorded by the Associated Press, said these important victories were achieved by storm units of the eleventh brigade of the fifth Yugoslav corps commanded by Milosh Shelegovic.

Storming of Bosanska Dubica, the bulletin declared, was accomplished after the guerrillas, in a surprise attack, blew up a bridge over the Una river. They captured 120 Nazi prisoners, 360 rifles and other war material.

Further to the south units of the 12th Dalmatian division planted the partisan banner on the island of Sipanj, near Dubrovnik, the Yugoslavs said, capturing the German man-of-war ship "Kupari," two (Continued on Page Six)

"Real American women are meeting the challenge of total war with the same courageous determination that pioneer women showed when this country was a rough, frontier wilderness," said Lt. Mary H. Wilson of the Women's Army Corps in Greenville today.

"The army is calling for the enrollment of women to perform scores of non-combatant military duties so that more soldiers can go to the front. Woman power behind the lines adds strength to the man power in the front lines.

"The only requirements are: Good health, being between the ages of 20 and 50, having no dependents and a desire to serve our beloved country," Lt. Wilson added.

"There are just three steps to WAC enlistment—the mental alertness test, the physical examination, and the interview. The physical examination given by an army doctor is the same kind of thorough check-up a family physician would give. A nurse is always in attendance."

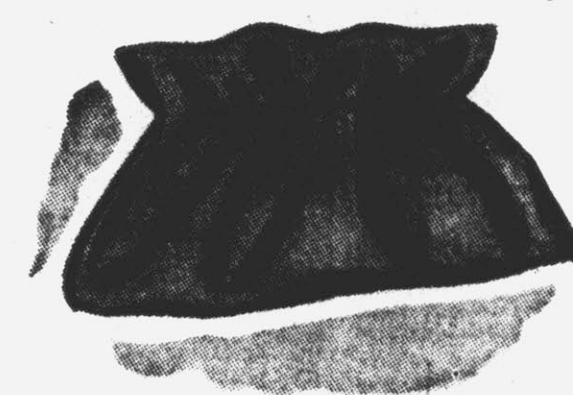

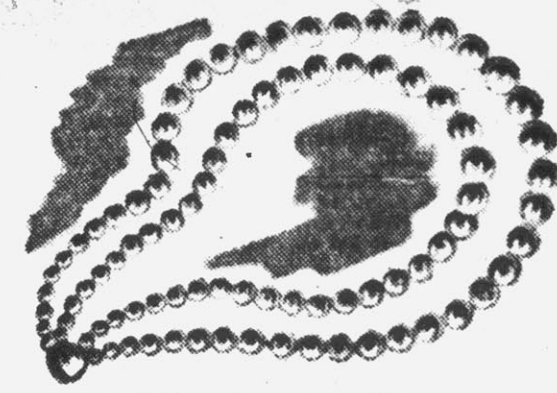

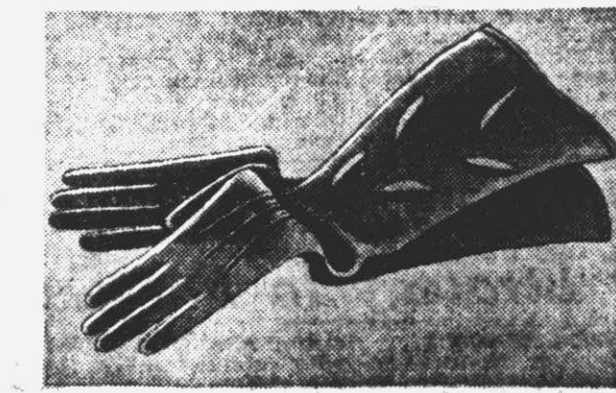

Stores here are already displaying Christmas merchandise. Toys and novelties will be scarce during the coming holiday season, but there is pronounced suggestion for selecting useful gifts for Christmas.

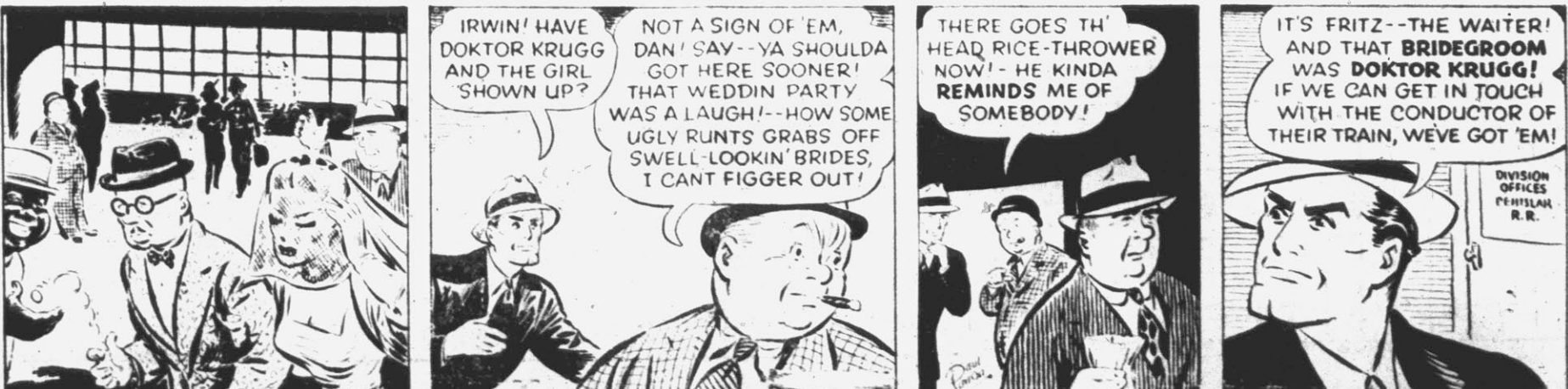

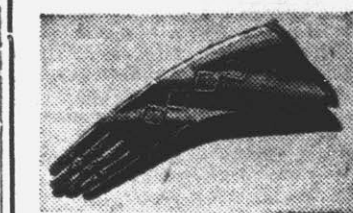

SUCCESS OFTEN CLOSE AT HAND

We have often read stories of how something very precious was found where the searcher least expected to find it. Several of the greatest paintings in the world have been found hidden beneath coats of whitewash and paint. One of the great masterpieces of Rembrandt was found amid a heterogeneous lot of rubbish in an old picture shop in London. A large diamond was picked up by a collector in Paris who purchased it from a man with a pushcart. The peddler thought it was only a cheap crystal. The greatest diamond in the world was discovered amid circumstances which indicated that its value was not known to the people who originally possessed it.

Always under such circumstances it takes the practiced eye and appreciative mind to see value where other people see none. Our Lord spoke of people who have eyes see not, and having ears, hear not. A man who recently trained a group of Egyptian laborers and made them first-class mechanics, declared that you could teach anything to anybody in the world who has bright eyes; the heavy-eyed can learn nothing.

There are opportunities round about us—in every village, on every countryside, in the city streets—precious things waiting to be picked up and used. We do not have to seek fortune in the far corners of the earth. Our "aerics of diamonds" are often closer than we suspect.

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WHY NOT 49 STATES NOW?

(Industrial News Review)
There has been loose talk about the poor administration of the affairs of our island territory of Puerto Rico by the United States government. There are interests that would like to see the United States surrender its sovereignty over Puerto Rico.

One sure way to destroy friendship and trust between the island and the United States, is a campaign to convince Puerto Ricans that they are being badly treated by their fellow citizens on the mainland, and should be free of United States citizenship.

President Roosevelt, in his recent recommendation of increased self government for Puerto Rico, said "There is no question of Puerto Ricans' ability now to administer their own internal affairs and to assume the attendant responsibilities."

That being the case, why should Puerto Rico not now be admitted to the union as the 49th state? Approximately 99 per cent of her people are citizens of the United States, and more than half of them are natural-born citizens of the United States. Our constitution permits overseas states to enter the union, and both the Democratic and Republican parties have recommended statehood for Puerto Rico. Loss to our country of that island, the Hawaii of the Caribbean, would greatly weaken our defenses against a foreign enemy.

WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington—One of the most thrilling stories of medicine in the war is how Lieut. Col. Arthur P. Fischer and a gallant crew of a battered Flying Fortress flew 2,000-000 cinchona seeds off crumbling Bataan to bring quinine back to the Western Hemisphere.

How Lieutenant Colonel Fischer, himself wracked with malaria, literally snatched those seeds under fire from Jap guns blasting the cinchona nurseries he had once supervised on Mindanao; how he ran a gauntlet of zeros in a wheezing Fortress with one motor conked out to get them to Australia and then took them across the Nip-infested Pacific to San Francisco, is an exciting chapter in war history. But it wouldn't mean a thing more than a gallant wasted effort if it weren't for the chapter being written right now in Glendale, Md.

Over in Glendale is what is known as the Department of Agriculture's plant introduction garden. It is presided over by B. Y. Morrison, who has a title three lines long, but whose chief duty is to see what important plants can be developed for use in this hemisphere. If ever a mother hen had a favorite brood of chicks, the Mindanao cinchona seeds are Morrison's.

All available space in the nurseries has been turned over to the growing seedlings from Fischer's stock pile. There still are hundreds of thousands of perishable seeds on hand which have been nursed along for all these months and are still to be planted.

Almost every day, new seeds are going into the nursery soil. But more important is that more

than 110,000 seedlings have been shipped to Peru, Ecuador, El Salvador, Nicaragua and Puerto Rico. In addition, more than a quarter of million seedlings are maturing toward the transplantation stage at Glendale.

The seeds brought in by Colonel Fischer are the Ledgeriana type, with a high alkaloid content, developed after years of experimentation by the British and Dutch in the South Pacific from seeds originally "stolen" from South America by the British. As a matter of fact it was by bribery that Fischer persuaded a sea captain to smuggle the seeds out of Java for his original experiments at Mindanao.

If you think this is a lot of fuss to make about Western Hemisphere quinine which won't be importantly productive before 1946 or '47, think again. It has been proved that Ledgeriana Cinchona can be grown in the Western Hemisphere more cheaply than in the South Pacific—that is more cheaply to us at least.

The medical laboratories have produced two synthetics but nothing has been found so effective in combating the dread results of malaria as quinine. War demands are tremendous, but postwar demands may be even more so. It is estimated now that China alone, within a few years, will need a large percentage of the world's supply if it is to stop the disease there. In India, there are more than 3,000,000 deaths annually from malaria.

The three national groups sat around the conference table for four hours yesterday, as on the previous day. It was said there was "very full and frank" discussion of the first topics on the agenda.

It was suggested again that the talks were of a military nature, for the American and British military advisers—U. S. Maj. Gen. John R. Deane and British Lt. Gen. Sir Hastings Ismay—were called in for the second straight day.

Moscow newspapers continued to give prominence to news of the conference. One Russian military commentator, Col. Nikolai Akimov, also touched anew on the subject of an Allied attack on western Europe.

"The Red army's recent successes," he said, "have made the situation more favorable than ever for an invasion of Europe by British and American troops."

Before yesterday's conference, W. Averell Harriman paid a separate call on Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov at the Kremlin to present his respects as the new U.

These were the reconstituted Sixth Army, destroyed at Stalingrad, which was now being lifted fighting in the Melitopol area north of the Sea of Azov, and the 17th Army which once garrisoned the Kuban peninsula in the Caucasus but which now has been withdrawn into the Crimea and farther north.

Between the Pinsk marshes and the Sea of Azov, the Germans were said to have between 70 and 90 divisions.

Besides the sixth and 17th armies, the Germans also were believed to have an SS armored corps somewhere between the Pinsk marshes and the Sea of Azov. In this area the Gross Deutschland, Totenkopf, and Reich divisions which comprised the main striking force in the unsuccessful counterattack at Kharkov last spring.

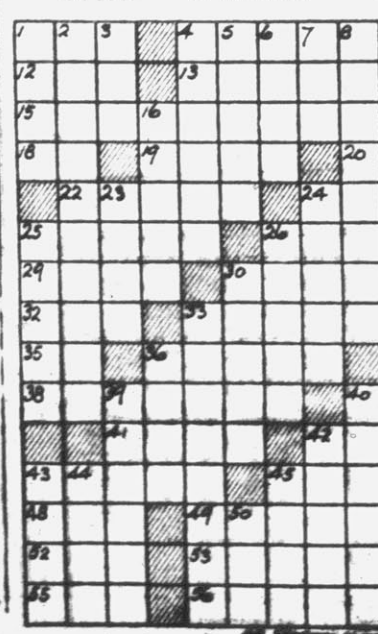

Warhawks and Kittyhawks sweeping up and down the east coast, fired some barges 38 miles north of Pescara, and RAF Wellingtons topped off the aerial barrage by a bomb cascade in a railway 20 miles north of that town. Meanwhile, Airacobras and Beaufighters protecting an Allied convoy off the north African coast yesterday shot down four German bombers.

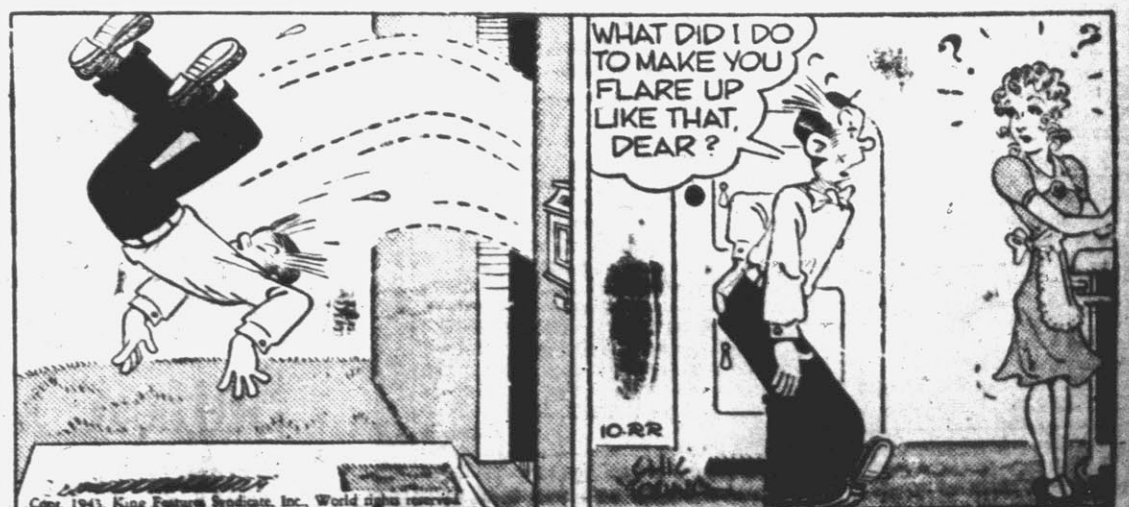

Copper Penny Coming Back

Washington, Oct. 22—(AP)—The copper penny is coming back from the war.

Mint Director Nellie Tayloe Ross announced today that beginning Jan. 1 production of the old copper-hued one cent pieces will be resumed through the use of expended small calibre shell casings.

No effort will be made, however, to recall the much criticized numismatic steel pennies that have been pouring from the mints since early in the year. With more than a half-billion already in circulation, they will continue to be mined up to Dec. 31 in order to meet an unprecedented penny demand. After that date, no more of this type will be made.

Benefit Gasoline Dealers.
Washington, Oct. 22—(AP)—Gasoline dealers and distributors "stuck" with out-of-date coupons will be granted relief by local rationing boards if they can show they were unable to redeem the coupons on time, the OPA said today. Previously dealers could not replace the gallonage represented by out-of-date coupons.

The ancient town of Senj, a small Croat fishing port at the foot of the Velebit mountains midway between Trieste and Zara, was attacked by a heavy formation of German dive bombers and completely destroyed, the Yugoslav war bulletin said, adding that "a majority of the inhabitants (approximately 1,000) were killed."

Charlotte, Oct. 22—(AP)—In 1938 North Carolina had one-eighth of a book per capita in its public libraries while today there is a third of a book—or about 1,250,000 volumes.

These figures were presented to the biennial meeting of the North Carolina Library Association here yesterday by Dr. Leonard Power of New York.

Death Toll In India
New Delhi, Oct. 22—(AP)—Of 10,020 starving persons admitted to Calcutta hospitals between August 16 and October 13th, 2,995 died, the British-owned Statesman said yesterday in reporting on the scope of the Indian famine. The figures are over and above those persons found dead on the streets and do not include deaths in the whole of Bengal on which no official or other estimates are available.

ers in the Norfolk area. Adams' headquarters will be in Raleigh.

Grading in other sections of the state will be handled by James L. Hedrick, stationed in Winston-Salem, and J. T. Kilroy, stationed in Charlotte. The far western division will be covered by the Greenville, S. C., grading headquarters.

Embrey said that local meats will be graded on the same basis, grade for grade, as meats from Chicago, Kansas City and other meat growing areas. The OPA will set the prices of meats according to grades in an effort to effect a savings and to stabilize prices, Embrey said.

All meats—beef, veal and lamb—cut or broken, for retail sale will be graded. The official grading

mark will extend over the entire
length of the carcass. In the future only graded meats will be sold in markets.

Walter A. Cavanaugh, Raleigh district OPA price officer, said that federal grading of meats in North Carolina "means that meats will be stabilized for quality and price. And there's not a question about the savings to the housewife under the new action."

Embrey said at the conference that North Carolina has the "goods to become one of the best cattle areas in the nation."

The German planes dropped flares over several sections of the city, but bombs fell only in outlying districts.
