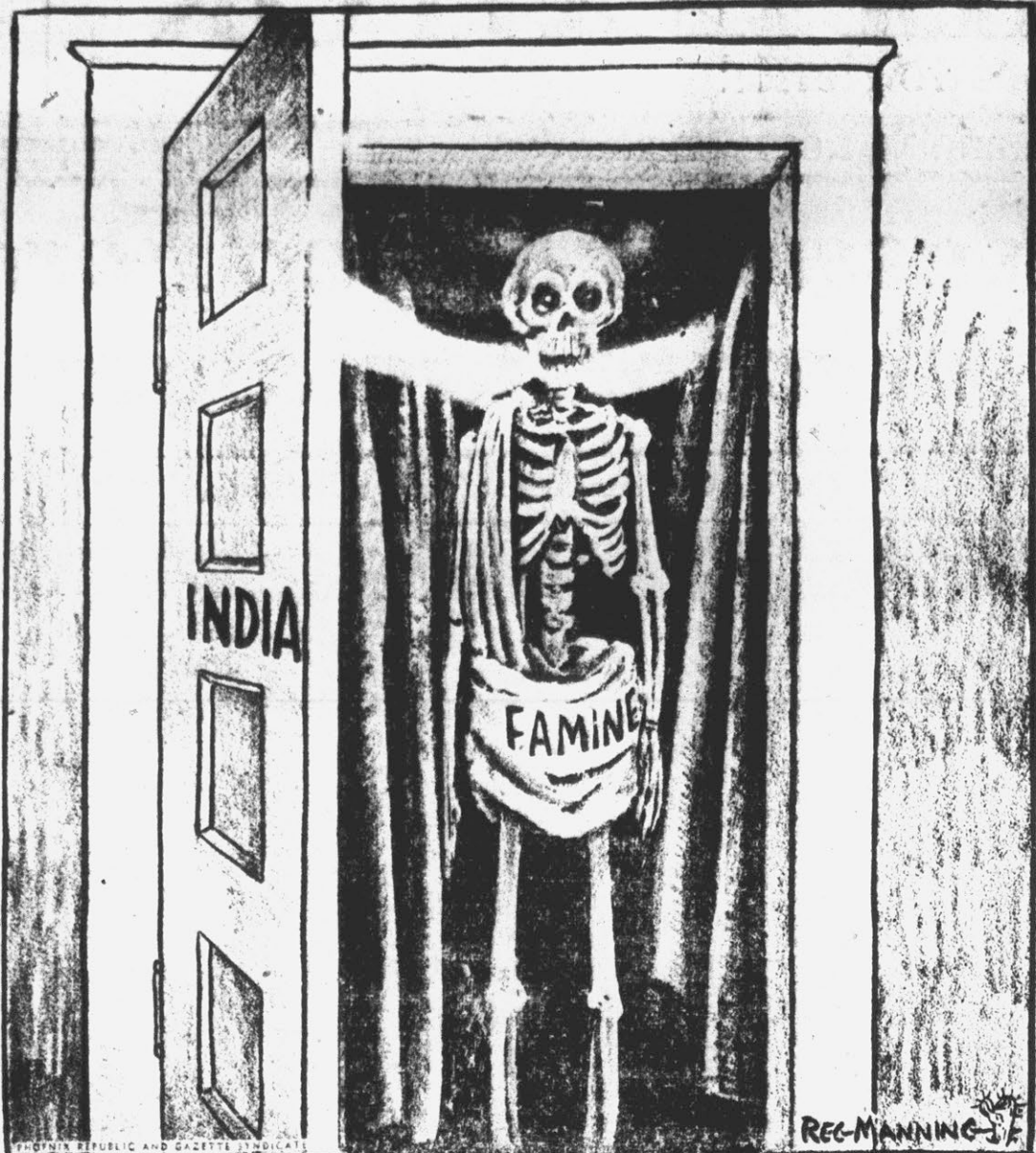

In West Virginia, there were no early reports of any mine crews going back to the pits in 600 commercial operations, although a few non-union mines and some strip mines were turning out some small amounts of coal. A Logan county union spokesman said 10 county locals had sent telegrams to President Roosevelt, Lewis and the War Labor Board stating they would not work until a contract is signed.

Similarly, a survey of mines employing three-fourths of Alabama's 22,000 miners showed no signs of resumption.

The reports generally reflected a lack of any sort of demonstration in the fields, where the Stars and Stripes flew over deserted tipplers.

Typical was the word from Maryland that "the miners just didn't show up."

Indiana still had 7,000 idle, with no evidence of any action pending word from UMW's policy committee. For the second time this year Mr. Roosevelt ordered the mines seized Monday night. He gave licenses authority to work out a contract with the union, provided the terms follow the War Labor Board's rules. The UMW asked wage increases of at least \$1.50 a day. Most of the operators consented to only 89 cents. The WLB suggested -112.

The fourth strike in the soft coal fields this year meanwhile crippled war industries and prompted letters to forbid dealers to deliver coal to any home which has more than a 10-days' supply. Deliveries were limited to one ton.

Krivoi Rog defensive ring and penetrated in fog to the center of the city of 20,000. All were destroyed, the correspondent asserted. Several other tanks tried vainly to get into the suburbs, the report added.

Nikolayev, at the mouth of the Bug river 35 miles west of Kherson, and the southern anchor of the Bug river defense system toward which the Germans are fleeing, seemingly was the next major objective of the fighting Soviet army in its great drive to collapse the entire Nazi southern flank. With a peacetime population of 170,000 Nikolayev recently was reported headquarters for the German southern front.

Other Soviet forces fanning out to the north stormed the strategic Dnieper river bridgehead of Kakhovka and seized Gornostayevka, 15 miles to the northeast, where thousands of Nazis were reported killed or drowned in futile attempts to halt the Soviet onslaught.

Capture of the Black Sea port of Skadovsk, 40 miles southeast of Kherson, further narrowed German aisles of escape from the Crimea by cutting the Russians' control of a large part of the north coast. Karkinit bay opposite the northwestern Crimean coast. It also posed a direct flanking threat to Kherson and Nikolayev, as well as rendering the position of any German troops south of Kakhovka untenable.

Other spearheads of Gen. Fedor Tobuchin's fourth Ukraine army captured Kolanachak, 20 miles north-west of Perekop and Bolshayan Mavachki, 30 miles east of Kherson, Moscow announced.

The Russian communiqué termed the German defeat in this sector a rout, and credited the Red army air

force with playing a large part. "Large numbers" of prisoners were being rounded up, the bulletin said.

Southwest of Dnepropetrovsk, bitter fighting in the Dnieper bend salient cost the Germans approximately 1,900 killed, Moscow said.

Another 800 were reported slain in action around the iron city of Krivoi Rog, where the reinforced German garrison is still holding open an escape path for Germans inside the river loop.

New Jersey—Former Senator Walter Edge, Republican, defeated Vincent J. Murphy, Newark's Democratic mayor, for the governorship despite a better than 100,000 majority for Murphy piled up in the Hague-dominated Jersey City area.

Pennsylvania—Acting Mayor Bernard Samuel, Philadelphia, Republican, was elected to a regular term in that office over the Democratic candidate, William C. Bullitt, former ambassador to Russia and to France, for whom President Roosevelt had spoken a good word. The state continued Republican.

Kentucky—This normally Democratic state produced a real horse race for governor with Republican Simeon Willis trailing Democrat J. Lyter Donaldson by only a few thousand votes with hundreds of districts uncounted.

Harrison Spangler, Republican national chairman, saw in these returns a death blow to any fourth term movement for Mr. Roosevelt, "he rebuffed the New Deal."

"Next November," he added, "these same voters will turn to a Republican President and a Republican congress to get our country back on the American road."

Hanley's majority in the New York contest—far greater than Dewey himself was able to pile up last year against a split field—was considered a more than ordinary tribute to the governor. The Republicans fought the campaign on Dewey's record as executive.

One immediate assumption was that Dewey's stock would rise considerably in the 1944 GOP presidential convention though he has insisted that he intends to serve out his full term in Albany, which has two years more to run. There has been some talk in the party of drafting him.

Dewey's organization got in some surprise licks in New York City. The Democrats carried the city as usual but only by a fraction of the majority they generally hurl against the upstate Republican vote.

Edge's election in New Jersey gives the GOP a majority of the governorships for the first time since 1928. With his inauguration in January, the party will have 25 of the 48 state executives. This would put the Republicans in control of every populous state outside the "solid south" except Indiana.

While other factors also were involved, it appeared that organized labor was set back in two of the important contests. Murphy, defeated by Edge, had union backing dating from his tenure as an official of New Jersey's American Federation of Labor. In Detroit, labor's candidate for mayor, Frank Fitzgerald, rolled up an early lead, then slid to the trailing position behind Mayor Edward J. Jeffries who was on his way toward a third term. The election was nonpartisan.

Detroit's recent race riots were an issue in the campaign and Fitzgerald, conceding his defeat, touched on the subject by saying he would continue to strive to "serve the city in the interest of peace, safety and goodwill."

The GOP retained two congressional seats vacated by party members. In New York's 32nd district, Edwin C. Fuller won over Democrat Norman F. Ward, as successor to the late Rep. Francis D. Cushman. With some returns yet to be counted,

Republican D. Emmert Brumbaugh had an apparently safe lead over Democrat Edna Marsden in the 23rd Pennsylvania district. This vacancy was created by the resignation of Rep. James E. Van Zandt.

New England also yielded some interesting mayoral campaigns. For the first time since 1933, Hartford, Conn., elected a Republican mayor, William H. Mortenson. Bridgeport gave Socialist Jasper McLevy his sixth term.

Party leaders were confounded in the New York State Supreme Court contest. Thomas A. Aurelio, attacked by District Attorney Frank S. Hogan as having been supported by a big time slot machine operator, appeared the winner even though both major parties had repudiated him.

The election was routine in Virginia and Mississippi. Democrats continue in as expected in local contests.

positions, the Germans would have to pull back across the Garigliano to the high Aurunci mountains behind Minturno, 14 miles from the present battle area. There is every indication, however, that the Nazis will fight a slow, stubborn rearguard action before relinquishing any part of the Garigliano valley.

Severe and bloody fighting marked the Fifth army gains. Nazi tanks went into action in the upper Volturno area, but failed to dent the salient the Americans thrust into enemy lines there.

The Canadians and British crossing the Trigno also met heavy opposition, but this was countered by effective use of British artillery.

In their fresh stab capturing Pratella and Gallo, the Americans also chased the enemy from the important mountain town of Vairano and the little villages of Prata, Pratella, Sarnita, Ciarpella, Corvella, Greci, Pozzo and Mrazanella. They also won a valuable crossing at Scafa Di Vairano over the upper Volturno.

Wiener Neustadt, near Vienna, received the heaviest Allied aerial blow from a Mediterranean base since the Salerno landing operations.

Allied headquarters at Algiers declared yesterday's assault on the principal factory manufacturing Messerschmitt airplanes has caused such havoc that it was doubtful the

plant ever would produce planes again.

One of the greatest aerial battles of the war took place in the Wiener Neustadt area in southeastern Germany as Nazi fighters in great force rose to intercept the American Fortresses and Liberators.

Full results are not yet known, but Allied headquarters said at least 30 of the 75 to 100 enemy fighters were shot down and that six American bombers were lost.

While the heavy bombers of the 15th air force were hammering Wiener Neustadt, other planes of the old 12th U. S. air force and of the Royal Air Force hit German objectives in Italy.

American Raiders bombed ships and docks at Civitavecchia, 40 miles northwest of Rome, as well as railways in the area; American Mitchells attacked railway yards at Ancona on the Adriatic coast; RAF Wellingtons bombed the Fiano Romano air field near Rome; and RAF Bombers dropped bombs on motor trucks in the Isernia area.

The total score for this biggest day in the new air campaign by the Allies in the Mediterranean was 37 enemy planes destroyed in the air against the loss of six Allied aircraft.

Photographs taken during the bombing of the Messerschmitt works showed a heavy concentration of direct hits on factory buildings, some of which were leveled to the ground, and other plants adjacent to the Messerschmitt establishment also were hit.

Pilots returned with stories of buildings collapsing in huge clouds of smoke and with great tongues of flame enveloping the plant, which was devoted to assembly of the speedy fighter plane that the Nazis have made their chief defense against growing Allied air power.

Headquarters added that complete reports were awaited on the results of the battle, but that the landing force to control Bougainville's west coast.

It also was disclosed that, after the naval battle, Japanese planes attacked the Allied warships and caused minor damage before they were driven off. Thus the Japanese demonstrated ability to get air opposition into the sector despite the bombing out of its air bases on Bougainville.

Headquarters today added no details on the ground operations on Bougainville but reported steady progress of forces which earlier invaded Treasury and Choiseul islands to the south and southeast. The Treasury Japs have been driven into the jungles. On Choiseul, the American forces have advanced four miles from their beachhead on the southwest coast. Supported by bombers and fighter planes, they defeated enemy forces in a clash at Sangaila, former barge depot.

Today's communiqué reported that an 8,000-ton enemy fighter-transport was sunk Monday by a Liberator off Kavieng, New Ireland. The C. I. said the four decks above the waterline and appeared to be carrying troops.

Headquarters also reported the sinking of a three-decker transport off Buika on Bougainville's northern tip during the air attacks which smashed enemy air bases there.

ervoir of their newly conquered territories; meanwhile they are reported to be constructing a series of defense lines for a "last man" battle for the Japanese empire.

Through censorship and international walls these things are discernible:

1. The Japanese are anticipating a big Allied land smash against Burma.

2. Japanese militarists are still holding sizable and presumably crack forces in Manchuria to protect the rear against Russia and are probably maintaining other key units in the Netherlands East Indies and Malaya.

3. They are exploiting to the limit of their abilities raw materials which are all being diverted to war production and in which considerable forced labor is being used.

4. The controlled press is preparing the people of Asia for long, defensive battles ahead.

Morale in Japan appears to be unshaken, although some unrest is reported in other parts of the empire. The militarists and gendarmerie are enforcing compliance with vigorous measures, while an extensive propaganda campaign is attempting to sell the idea of protecting Asia against British-American "imperialism."

My impression is that Japanese land forces will fight most desperately for the Netherlands East Indies and Malaya, whose raw materials are vital, and the strategic areas of central and north China and Manchuria, from where the Allies could threaten Japan's vital industrial areas from the air.

The controlled press is now directing attention to the prospective Burma campaign under the guise of thunderous anti-India propaganda.

Meanwhile travelers say that French Indo-China—the sole section of east Asia that is not completely Japanese-dominated—is becoming one of Japan's major military bases.

The Shanghai press is widely publicizing the Burmese army said to total 100,000 and the Thai army, whose numbers are unreported. The extent of the training, equipment and loyalty of these troops is not clear, but apparently all may be utilized if the Allies attack Burma. Newspaper pictures of Bose's Indian "volunteers" show groups of flabby, elderly watchmen and laborers—apparently no policemen—assembled in small, unsoldierly squads.

There are indications that the Japanese consider Burma a flank for which they will certainly fight, but loss of which will not be considered vital.

The best information is that 650,000 Japanese troops are still in Manchuria as a bulwark against Russia and to prevent any use of Siberia by the United States. There is no evidence at present that either Russia or Japan intends to start trouble in that vital area because a policy of neutrality best serves the purposes of both countries. It is believed that there may be more than 1,000,000 Japanese troops in Manchuria, North China and Korea.

All available evidence tends to show that Japanese lines in China are thinly held and that the war there is virtually stalemated. Newspapers merely report a continuation of "mopping up" operations.

Some reports are that the Japanese have only 94,000 troops in the Philippines, which apparently is considered another flank of the main strategic areas.

Even assuming there are sizable contingents in the Solomons, in Japan proper and in Burma this means there are still extensive units elsewhere. The most likely guess is that the strongest and best equipped forces are in the Netherlands East Indies and Malaya, in "last ditch" positions to protect vital resources.

The Japanese press also is meagerly covering the Solomons campaign, with some intimations that things are not going too well. There is no explanation, however, of the strategic importance of the operations in that area.

The Japanese assert that Japan

has now acquired almost all the raw materials she needs for her war effort. The Japanese are attempting to exploit these in full, using all obtainable for war production. Big weaknesses, however, are shortages of high octane gasoline and high grade lubricating oil, neither of which is obtainable in the Netherlands East Indies.

Moreover, there are indications that the inevitable breakdown of virtually irreplaceable machinery in vital factories may be underway or will be soon.

One of the major bottlenecks facing Japan's war effort is machine tools.

Japan's communication lines appear to have been disrupted recently but it is not known what effect this has had on the interchange of raw materials. The people themselves are receiving none of the rubber, cotton, tin or sugar which Japanese propagandists say is being withdrawn from the southern areas.

Meanwhile the press has been reiterating that it will be a long and difficult war, at the same time lauding the fighting superiority of the Japanese. As an example of the current propaganda tone the press announced the withdrawal from Guadalcanal as a "great strategic success, our troops having accomplished their mission on that island."

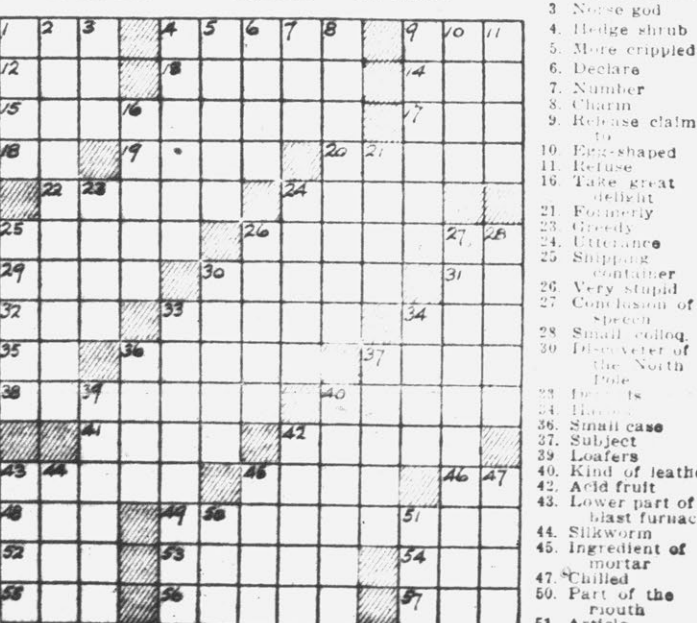
