Russians Slashing Ahead Against Crumbling Nazis

Red Armies Storming Across Ukraine Reach Halfway Point Between Stalingrad And Berlin; Capture Of Important Rail Center Regarded As Imminent

Moscow, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Red army troops pushing west from Kiev today were converging rapidly on Zhitomir, strategic junction point of the Germans' last north-south railway communications line short of the pre-war Polish boundary.

Occupation of Radomysl, announced in last night's communiqué, put the spearheads of the Russian First army of the Ukraine less than 30 miles from the vital Korosten-Zhitomir-Berdichev railway and only 25 miles from Zhitomir itself.

Other units of the first army, operating immediately to the south captured Brusilov, 36 miles east of Zhitomir, and Korin, 38 miles southeast of the junction. Berdichev, junction for railways leading to Poland and Rumania, lies 44 miles to the southwest of Korin.

Counting yesterday's gains, the Russians have advanced nearly 60 miles west of Kiev, captured last Saturday, toward the sole railroad giving the Germans a direct connection between their forces at opposite ends of the far-flung front.

Altogether, Gen. Nikolai Vatutin's First army yesterday overran more than 100 towns and villages, in its deepest Soviet drive of the campaign. A Soviet communiqué said, "The capture of the Korosten-Berdichev railway and the consequent splitting of the Nazi Ukraine armies would open the way for a direct advance to the Polish frontier, 60 miles further west."

Other Soviet forces plunged ahead on the Gomel front, 140 miles north of Kiev, the Russian bulletin said, capturing 10,000 Germans. This drive was apparently aimed at Rezhitsa, 25 miles west of German-held Gomel, which has now been bypassed.

War Labor Board Feels Coal Problem Unsolved

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—A majority of the War Labor Board believes another coal crisis is possible and, in effect, pleaded poverty of authority today to deal with it. Industry member of the board addressed themselves directly to Congress in a statement strongly urging immediate consideration of amendments to the War Labor Disputes act "to require responsibility of unions and to provide additional protection for workers, employers and the public against those who misuse the power presently permitted."

Destroyer Lost

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Loss of the destroyer Beatty in the Mediterranean as a result of aerial bombing was announced today by the navy.

The 1,700-ton Beatty went down Nov. 8, but no details were given about the attack by German planes.

The sinking brings to 12 the number of naval vessels lost in the Mediterranean and to 129 all American naval losses since the war started.

The next of kin of the casualties aboard the Beatty have been notified.

The Beatty was the fourth destroyer announced lost this week.

JAPS FOOLED BY MARINES Small Handful Believed By Japs To Be Large Force

Guadalcanal, Nov. 5.—(Delayed)—(AP)—Several hundred sea-borne marine paratroops fooled Japanese forces on Choiseul island in the northern Solomons for more than a week into thinking they were an invasion force of 20,000.

They harried the Japanese, pitched the enemy stronghold on nearby Shortland island into a constant state of uneasiness, and kept the enemy preoccupied while other Allied forces landed on Bougainville island to the north.

The marines slipped into Choiseul on the morning of Oct. 27 and left the night of Nov. 3-4, three days after the landing on Bougainville had been accomplished.

They left behind a puzzled Japanese garrison, 140 men dead and an indefinite but large number of wounded. Nine marines were killed and 16 wounded.

The first detailed account of the marines' diversionary action was recounted by 30-year-old Lt. Col. Victor Krulak, Washington D. C., commander of the marine parachute battalion, who was wounded superficially in the arm and check by an explosive bullet.

The short (5 feet 5) slightly-built officer, said made of the Japs encountered on Choiseul were marines. "They are supposed to be pretty hot," he said. "I had always thought the Japs stayed and fought to the finish, but it was enlightening to me to see them break and run in the most un-Samurai fashion."

"And when they ran, they weren't just crawling; they went at high gear, so fast that we only hit a few on the run."

Allied communiques never disclosed the size of the Choiseul landing party but Krulak said the Jap radio reported its size as 20,000 troops and evidently the Japs on the island accepted that estimate.

Fire Chief Gardner Warns Against Fire

"Householders who plan to burn grass on their premises should be careful to avoid the fire spreading," said Fire Chief George Gardner today. "Those who plan to burn grass should notify the fire department. We will cooperate with them to avoid fire spreading," he said. The fire chief also warned against grass fires during a wind. He recommended checking of heating appliances and stoves, placing hot ashes in covered metal cans and warned against allowing rubbish to accumulate. "Do this for safety's sake and to help in the war effort," Gardner said.

THANKSGIVING IS PROCLAIMED

President Asks For 'Thanks To God' For Blessings

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, who once experimented with an earlier Thanksgiving day—on which many states declined to go along—today proclaimed the traditional last Thursday, November 25, as the day "for expressing our thanks to God for his blessings" in 1943.

These, he said, have been many, including the biggest food-crop year in American history.

"God's help to us has been great in his year of march toward world-wide liberty. In brotherhood with warriors of other United Nations our gallant men have won victories, have freed our homes from fear, have made tyranny tremble, and have laid the foundation for freedom of life in a world which will be free."

"Our forges and hearths and mills have wrought well; and our weapons have not failed. Our farmers, victory gardeners, and crop volunteers have gathered and stored a heavy harvest in the barns and bins and cellars. Our total food production for the year is the greatest in the annals of our country."

"For all these things we are devoutly thankful, knowing also that so great mercies exact from us the greatest measure of sacrifice and service."

"Now, therefore, I, Franklin D. Roosevelt, president of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, November 25, 1943, as a day for expressing our thanks to God for his blessings. November having been set aside as 'food fights for freedom' month, it is fitting that Thanksgiving day be made the month by a high resolve on the part of all to produce and save food and to 'share and play square' with food."

"May we on Thanksgiving Day and on every day express our gratitude and zealously seek individuals as well as a nation. May each of us dedicate his utmost efforts to speeding the victory, which will bring new opportunities for peace and new opportunities for peace and new opportunities for peace."

New Three-Way Assault On Japs Being Planned

Reports Indicate Important Actions In Pacific May Begin Before Long

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Signs from the South Pacific today pointed toward an imminent assault against the Japanese from three quarters—all aimed in the general direction of Tokyo.

American forces are in the final stage of preparations for a coordinated drive to slash off the southern and richest half of the enemy's empire and at the same time gain new footholds for further strides toward the Japanese mainland.

Allied leaders have been massing their striking power in two areas for months. One of these potential theaters is the central Pacific, under command of Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, the other is the India-Burma area under Britain's Commando expert Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten.

Informed belief here is that Nimitz and Mountbatten will launch their forces into action in coordination with major operations by General Douglas MacArthur in the South. This would put maximum pressure on the Japanese from three directions.

Some American authorities even believe the Japanese may be compelled to relinquish a few of their island positions without a fight as they gave up Kiska in the North Pacific, unless they are willing to leave some of their garrisons in the Marshall and Gilbert islands to die of starvation after their supply lines are cut.

American strategists have no intention of taking all the numerous positions which the Japanese hold there. The plan rather is to capture certain key islands with airbase facilities.

In studying the current news in preparation for writing this column I often feel like just setting down some of the medley of impressions which one gets from the daily history of mankind—and today we'll mix it up.

What first—the war or the murder case in British Nassau? All right. I'll concede the mystery story. Chief Justice Sir Oscar Bedford Daily declared in charging the jury: "No man in the empire, even in time of war, can be found guilty except on verdict of a jury."

Impression: That law applies in America, too. One of the things this war is being fought for is to sustain such rights. You have that driven home when you recall Hitler's savage threat in his Munich beer-hall last week: "What happened in 1918 will not happen a second time. When many thousands must fall in battle, I will not hesitate to put a few hundreds of criminals (people advancing peace) to death at home."

The Red forces thundering southward from Kiev are a hundred miles or so from the Rumanian frontier. That border is Hitler's lid which is keeping all hell from breaking loose in the Balkans. Impression: The moment the

NEW TAX BILL GOES TO HOUSE

Provides One Fifth of Amount Treasury Sought

NEW TAX BILL—42.

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Given a new slogan by Chairman Doughton (D-NC)—"You can shear a sheep every year but you can skin him but once"—the Ways and Means committee headed toward the house floor today with a \$2,142,900,000 tax bill.

Rep. Clark (R-Kans), committee member, predicted "the house and the country" would accept this second wartime revenue measure, which is about one-fifth the \$10,500,000,000 asked by the administration.

It would provide new federal revenue to supplement the approximately \$3,000,000,000 collected under present tax laws.

The bill, formally approved by the committee last night, calls principally for higher postal rates, higher excises on so-called luxuries—liquor, horse racing, amusements, furs, jewelry, lipstick and other consumer items—and an increase in the wartime levy on corporation "excess profits."

It alters but little the taxes on individual incomes and makes no change in the normal and surtax levies on corporate earnings.

The 20 per cent withholding rate against the taxable portions of wages and salaries would remain the same. There is no retail sales tax plan, and present rates on estates and gifts would be undisturbed.

Here is how the new tax bill affects individual incomes:

1. Repeals victory tax.
2. Increases the normal tax rate from 6 per cent to 10.
3. Retains present personal exemptions and credits for dependents.
4. Adopts a readjusted surtax schedule calculated to help facilitate merger of the victory and income levies.
5. Suspends for the duration the earned income credit.
6. Requires married persons filing separate returns to take a single person's exemption.
7. Provides that the tax shall not be less than 3 per cent of the net income in excess of a personal exemption of \$500 for a single person, \$700 for married persons and \$100 for each dependent.
8. Retains existing over-all tax limit of 90 per cent on the largest incomes.

Count Freed Of Murder Charge

Nassau, Bahamas, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Alfred De Marigny is a free man today and the mystery which surrounds the slaying of Sir Harcourt Oakes is more baffling than ever.

A Bahamas supreme court jury decided by a nine to three vote last night that it was not the hands of some De Marigny who beat the aged multi-millionaire on the head last July 3 and set fire to his bedroom in an apparent effort to hide the crime.

But in acquitting the husband of Oakes' daughter Nancy, jurors recommended that he be deported—a suggestion which apparently has no legal standing. The 12 picked men were unanimous in saying that they did not want him in this colony.

Once the "not guilty" verdict was announced to cheering spectators who jammed the tiny courtroom, police officials again were confronted by an unruly killing with clues which have grown cold in the four months De Marigny was under arrest on a murder charge.

Germans Attack Island Of Leros

Cairo, Nov. 12.—(AP)—German sea forces attacked the British-held Dodecanese island of Leros this morning, gaining footholds "at some points," British Middle East communiqué announced today.

Other landing attempts were repulsed and several German landing craft were destroyed or damaged, the announcement continued.

Indicating that spirited battles are under way at the point where the Nazis succeeded in landing, the statement said that "Italian forces are fighting side by side with the British."

Leros lies just north of Cos, which was wrested from the British by a German sea and air-borne force several weeks ago.

STEAM ENGINE FOR AIRPLANE

Inventor Says Motor Would Revolutionize Flying

Chicago, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Steam engines for aircraft, burning unprocessed fuel oil and requiring less space than internal combustion gas engines, could be put into large scale production for military purposes in nine months, says a Chicago inventor.

Louis C. Trotsky, who says he has flown 800 hours in a steam driven plane, described the operations yesterday at a joint meeting of the Society of American Military Engineers with the Chicago Engineers' club.

He said he uses a piston-type engine and a boiler of thin tubing and his burner "is a combination of an automobile carburetor and a paint spray gun." It will use almost any fuel, he told the Engineers, from crude oil to lard. A head of steam giving 600 horse power can be built up in one minute, 20 seconds in a cold boiler.

Trotsky explained that a steam plane will take off in one-third the distance of a gasoline plane and it will "climb at angles unthought of in gas planes," and the higher the altitude, the faster the climb. As brakes are not needed, he explained, a plane ahead of you, dead in your sights.

He said the steam engine is noiseless and vibrationless, and is inaudible 200 feet above the ground. He told the Engineers he has an engine. (Continued on Page Two)

MacArthur And Halsey Give Lie To Jap Claims

Southwest Pacific Allied Headquarters, Nov. 12.—(AP)—General MacArthur and Admiral Halsey gave the lie today to Japanese claims of sinking battleships, cruisers, carriers, destroyers and destroyers during the current Allied drive in the northern Solomons toward Rabaul.

Not one Allied warship has gone down, the two leaders said through their spokesmen.

U. S. Fifth Army Makes Mile Advance And Captures Commanding Slope Of Mt. Camino; British Eighth Army Exchanges Artillery Blows With Germans

Allied Headquarters, Algiers, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Extremely bad weather and difficult terrain in front of the Germans' winter defense line slowed the Allied drive in Italy to limited gains. Allied headquarters announced today.

A one-mile advance by Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's Americans of the Fifth army and the capture of one more commanding feature on the slopes of Mount Camino near Mignano at the western end of the Allied line were announced. Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's Eighth army engaged in sharp patrol skirmishing near Acquafredda in the central sector and exchanged artillery fire with the Germans across the Sangro river in the east.

A sharp German counter-attack at Calabritto near Mignano was beaten back by Clark's Fifth army and prisoners were taken.

"A powerful German counter-attack" succeeded in taking a hill position and a village south of Mignano in Italy, the German communiqué said today.

"American troops west of the Volturno, despite heavy losses, are continuing for days their unsuccessful attacks on our hill positions," said the communiqué.

With little change in the past 24 hours along the whole length of the front, Allied air forces opened a new offensive on the enemy lines of the fortresses of Europe. Liberators of the 15th air force reached across the Alps into southern France for two smashing blows at railways and war industries at Annecy and near Cannes in cooperation with similar assaults by the RAF in Britain. RAF Wellingtons struck by night at the freight yards at Prato near Florence.

The Liberators were unescorted and all returned safely.

Despite the slow Allied march, the Germans apparently had little hope of holding Gaeta very long. Aerial reconnaissance showed they had blown up the oil tanks at that west coast port nine miles behind the present lines.

Reconnaissance also brought back evidence that they had carried out new demolitions at Targhena, sinking two more ships in Targhena harbor. (Continued on Page Two)

The great scientist Agassiz learned that Cuvier was preparing a work on the same plan as his own, and he realized that if Cuvier's work should be published before his, all his work would be in vain. While Agassiz was thinking about this and greatly lamenting his ill fortune, Cuvier—who was much older than Agassiz—sent for his younger contemporary and went over with him in detail all the material he had collected for his book.

Then Cuvier said: "I have examined your material, Agassiz. I know your scientific method well, and it is so excellent and your work so much further advanced than mine that I deem it no more than right to put my material at your disposal, hoping that you will be eminently successful in your efforts."

We do not know just what really Agassiz made of this generous offer on the part of his colleague Cuvier, but we do know that Agassiz reached great scientific fame and no doing, but we may be sure that God marks them and singles them out for His loving favor.

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Request Seizure Of Textile Mills

Fall River, Mass., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Claiming that 11,000 textile employees would no longer do for mill employers, representatives of the U. S. Textile Workers Union of America (CIO) said today they had broken off contract negotiations in a labor dispute and wired President Roosevelt that the government should assume control of the plants.

At the same time the union invoked the terms of the Smith-Connally act for the second time and notified the Secretary of Labor, the War Labor Board and the National Relations Board that a labor dispute existed in negotiations for a new contract.

Norwegians Executed

London, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The Norwegian Telegraph Agency said today that eight Norwegians had been executed by the Germans at Tromsø on Oct. 4 following their conviction on charges of "espionage and assisting espionage for the benefit of an enemy country."

Fourteen more, including three women, were given sentences ranging from six to 15 years, the agency said.

Four Nazi Ships Sunk

A Southern Italian Port, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Self-styled "Adriatic Rats" of the British navy wiped out a blockade-running German gasoline convoy of four ships early today some 600 yards off the Albanian coast.

The ships, one large and three small were hugging the Nazi-dominated coast and headed south toward Corfu when intercepted by destroyers.

Nazi Report Sinkings

London, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The German high command said today, without Allied confirmation, that a bombing and torpedo attack on an Allied convoy off Oran, French North Africa, resulted in the sinking of four freighters totaling 29,000 tons, and two destroyers. Eleven other freighters and two other destroyers were damaged, the communiqué declared.

Higher Corn Yield

Raleigh, Nov. 12.—(AP)—A record corn yield of 22.5 bushels an acre is in prospect for North Carolina, the crop reporting service of the State Department of Agriculture announced today. This figure is two bushels higher than last year's yield.

Bern, Switzerland, Nov. 12.—(AP)—An underground in the true sense of the word, whose members dart from Rome's gloomy catacombs to assassinate and kidnap the German invaders, was described today by eye-witnesses recently returned from the Italian capital.

Interviewed by the Tribune De Lausanne, the travelers said Nazi authorities were doing their utmost to run down the patriots who strike swiftly in the darkness and then disappear into the endless labyrinth.

Describing Rome today, the article said the only automobiles running are those of the German army. Windows and doors of most stores are sealed because there is little in the city to sell.

French Train Derailed

London, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The Lyons-Paris express was derailed yesterday by an unbolting rail and three coaches, the engine and tender were overturned, the Vichy radio said today. The engineer was the only casualty, the broadcast said.

There was no indication whether saboteurs were to blame.

Miners Back At Work

Pittsburgh, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Soft coal production in Pennsylvania returned to virtually normal today after an Armistice Day work stoppage shut down 75 per cent of the field. Only eight mines employing about 4,500 of the state's 110,000 diggers were idle today.

The Berlin radio said the Russians everywhere were employing "numerically superior" forces in an effort to "force a turning point of the entire war."

(Capt. Ludwig Sertorius, German military expert, in a broadcast recorded by the Associated Press, said it was evident that in order to maintain the pace of the offensive, now in its fifth month, Russia was "squeezing the manpower reserves of even those who credited Stalin with a maximum of brutality and ruthlessness."

He asserted that the Russians have imported "vast numbers of Chinese coolies to release Soviet workers for military service."

over travel time figures when the time comes for restoration of private operation of the mines.

"Until," they said, an accurate and comprehensive travel time study has been made it will be impossible to determine whether the future terms will be the same as those now in effect. If it should be found, as a result of a travel time study, that terms less favorable to the miners than those now in effect must be laid down with respect to some or all portions of the industry, another issue of compliance may be presented which will determine finally whether or not the present powers of government are adequate to deal with recalcitrant unions.

There was a hint that the board might have to abandon a single average travel time figure for the whole industry. Complaints have already come in from mines suffering from the use of the 45-minute average. The Inland Steel company telegraphed Secretary Ickes that at its Wheelwright, Ky., mine the average travel time is about 94 minutes, 49 minutes above the average. This would mean a 49-minute shortening of the 3-hour period for which miners are paid to produce coal.

The opinion said the negotiation

of an agreement during a strike, contrary to "sound public policy" but, the majority, in approving the agreement, concluded that "the damage had already been done."

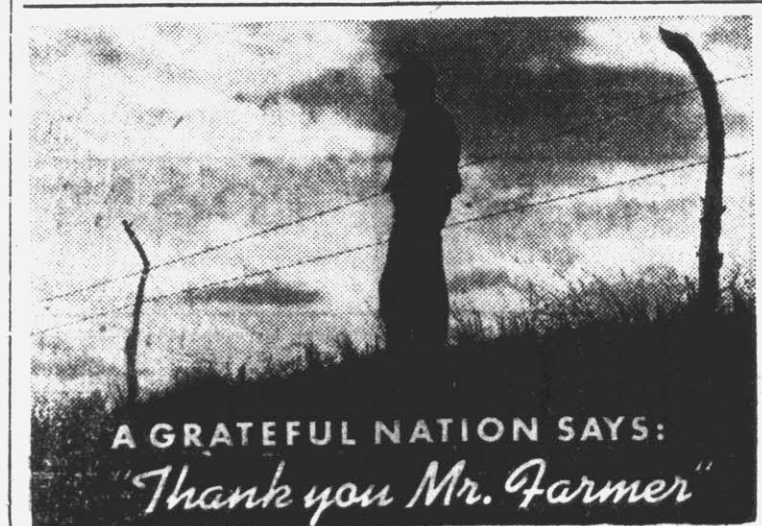
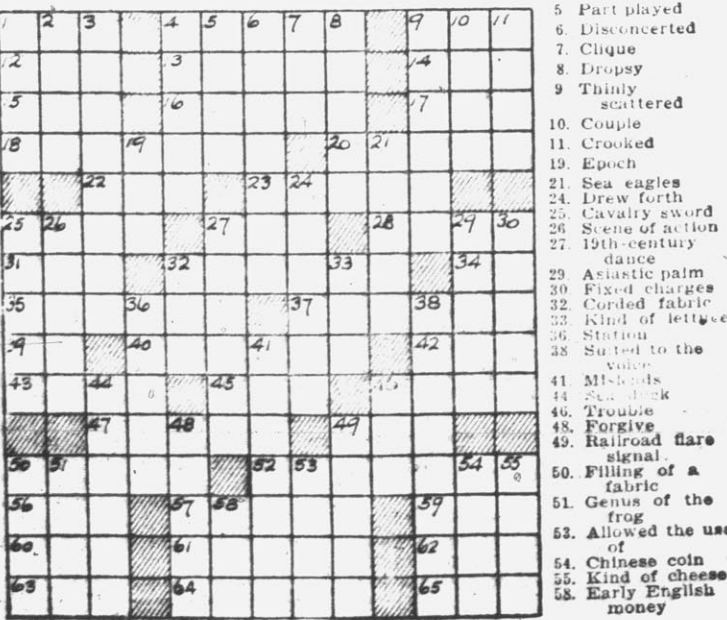

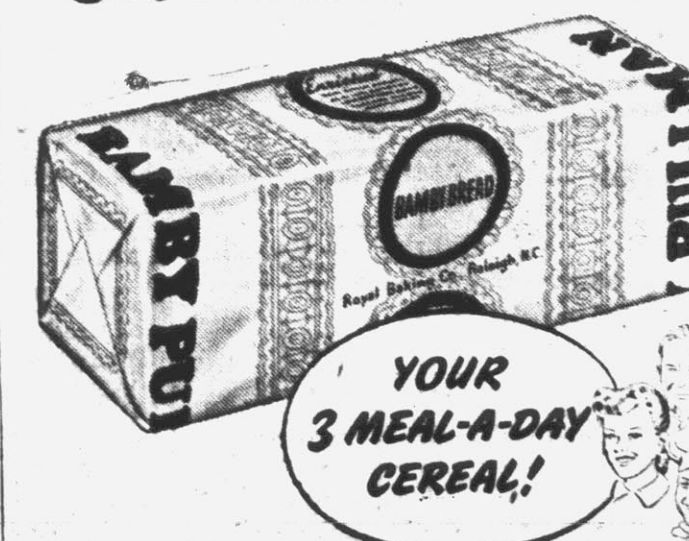
