Nazis Preparing To Make Stand On Italian Front

Forces Being Concentrated To Face American Fifth Army; British Eighth Army Improves Positions; Allied Aircraft Raided Greece Yesterday

With the Fifth Army in Italy, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Determined to hold their Garigliano river line all winter if possible the Germans have concentrated the bulk of their defensive strength along the Fifth army front in a desperate bid to halt the Allied advance on Rome.

This strategy became increasingly clear today as American and British patrols probed the enemy's so-called winter line—a deep series of pillboxes, gun emplacements, trenches and barbed wire entanglements blasted out of the rocky mountains.

For the first time since Allied troops fought their way ashore on the beaches of Salerno the Germans have fallen back while they fortified six positions—and no one has any illusions about the bitter, bloody battles that must be fought before the enemy is dug out of the hills.

The valley running from Cassino to Rome between towering fog-covered mountain masses is the natural road for the army to follow.

And because it is the natural avenue to Rome the German have thrown up their heaviest defenses and massed the greater part of their troops in the vicinity of the Apennines on their left flank standing as a guard against the British Eighth army.

In addition to holding the strong positions on heights commanding the valley the enemy has had a friendly ally in the weather. Steady cold rains have swollen streams and inundated bypasses along the Fifth army's supply line as well as subjected troops to exposure in muddy slit trenches.

But for the first time in a week the skies were clear today and a bright sun shone on the muddy front giving the doughboys and tommy a chance to dry their clothing. Also for the first time in several days the air force had a chance to strike at the enemy.

The strain on the troops has been great and the rugged mountain fighting is underscoring once again the fact that the war is a grim game for tough, resilient youth.

Recipients Must Furnish Points
Boston, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Charitable organizations donating free Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets need not send ration stamps with the purchase price the regional office of Price Administration announced in a statement on regulations covering gifts of rationed foods.

"The store that delivers the basket of rationed foods to the needy family will collect the points at the time of delivery," the statement said.

The OPA said that the system would cause no hardship as a lack of money, rather than a lack of ration points, caused those in distress to seek aid.

George Declares Further Increases Dangerous

Washington, Nov. 18.—(AP)—The treasury had about 100 million dollars in the Treasury Department today that it will be wasting time if it tries to act Congress to pile more taxes on the \$2,142,000,000 proposed in the new revenue bill coming before the House next week.

"It won't be any use for the treasury to ask the committee to raise any substantial additional amount," George told this reporter. "If they want to get \$10,500,000,000 more in the way they have proposed, they'll be coming to a goat's house for wool."

Enough Liquor For All Probe Senator Declares
Washington, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Senator Scrugham (D-Nev.), whose resolution set off the senate's current investigation of liquor supplies, asserted today that there is enough whisky in bonded warehouses to provide every American citizen with more than 12 quarts apiece.

Asserting the rate of withdrawal from warehouses has dropped by half since last year, Scrugham said internal revenue officials told him the bonded stocks stand roughly at 400,000,000 gallons.

There is no way of telling, he added, how much will be sold straight and how much will be blended with neutral spirits and coloring matter for sale under new brand names.

Joint Session Gives Secretary Hull Great Ovation Today

Washington, Nov. 18.—Cast in a hero's role, white-haired 72-year-old Cordell Hull made a triumphant appearance before an unprecedented joint session of Congress today to report that the recent Moscow conference laid the foundation, in his opinion, for a world freed of destructive force of international anarchy.

It was the first time a cabinet member ever addressed Congress. A welcome and tribute paralleled only by the welcomes accorded the President and rulers of other nations was given the onetime Tennessee mule skinner as he entered the chamber.

Washington, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Rep. Beckwith (D-Tex.) said today that the Navy Department had requested the OPA to grant special gasoline allotments up to a maximum of 50 gallons for use by military and naval personnel returning from overseas duty.

The present allotment for all service men on furlough is 5 gallons. Beckwith had recommended to the OPA that this quota be increased to 30 gallons but this proposal was turned down.

SAYS TURKEY TO ENTER WAR AGAINST AXIS

Writer Believes Final Step To Join Allies May Come by Spring

Ankara, Nov. 17.—(Delayed)—(AP)—Turkey is moving toward war with the Axis.

Turkey's sub rosa assistance to Allied armed forces, which closely approximates that which the United States gave Britain in the months before Pearl Harbor, is rapidly carrying the nation toward a war footing.

Details of the help which already is being given naturally cannot be disclosed, but this correspondent is convinced that what was only friendly neutrality a few months ago is rapidly approaching genuine co-operation.

That this cooperation may grow into Turkish participation in the war on an all-out scale is recognized by the Turkish government, which is making its plans for that eventuality.

"This is the broadest indication of Turkey's new attitude to come direct from Ankara through a censorship which, so far as it concerns Turkey's foreign relations, has been one of the most cautious and rigid in Europe. King's findings are supported by information supplied by a man in London with authoritative connections, who cannot be identified. He said two weeks ago that outright Turkish participation in the war, qualified though it might be, was in the cards.

Real war may not become Turkey's lot for several months.

A few weeks ago I was convinced that Turkey would not enter the war before spring, but now I am convinced she will be in the war by spring. I have reached this conclusion despite the fact there has been no visible effort by the government to prepare the public for approaching participation in war. The man in the street is still convinced that Turkey will not enter the war soon.

Actual war likely will not come until this necessary preparation has been taken.

The new Turkish position naturally stems from the Moscow conference of foreign secretaries and subsequent Cairo talks between Anthony Eden, British foreign secretary, and Numan Menemencioğlu, Turkish minister of foreign affairs.

One unsubstantiated but logical explanation of the Cairo talks is that Eden told Menemencioğlu that Soviet Russia wanted Turkey as an active war participant to protect the Russian flank and as a guarantee of Turkey's adherence to the (Continued On Page Four)

Roving Allied Bombers Strike At Jap Shipping

Japs Still Can Muster Formidable Fleet Despite Losses

(By The Associated Press)
Sea-roving Allied bombers now are ranging along more than 2,000 miles of Japan's supply-strained outpost defenses in the south and central Pacific from northeastern New Guinea to the Marshalls to deal mounting blows at the enemy's ships and bases.

Latest advances embraced the probable sinking of a 2,500-ton enemy ship off New Guinea, a 6,000-ton vessel off New Britain, the dropping of 40 tons of bombs on an airfield on Bougainville, and harbor and hangar fires set during the third raids in as many days on the Marshalls and Gilberts.

Those Marshall and Gilbert raids presently catch the eye. For they are being made from undisclosed bases by land-based army Liberators of the seventh air force, which has headquarters in Hawaii. But Hawaii is more than 2,000 miles removed from the raiding scene. Bombers to the Marshalls and Gilberts are the Ellice Islands to the southwest where American air bases recently have been acquired at Nanumea and Funafuti.

Although Japan has air bases in the Marshalls and Gilberts, Admiral Chester W. Nimitz reported no enemy interception encountered by the Liberators which struck Monday at Jaluit and Mili in the Marshalls and Makin in the Gilberts. On the preceding Saturday and Sunday, the Liberators had bombed Mili in the (Continued on Page Five)

AIRMEN BLAST NORWAY AGAIN

Today's Attack Followed Night Raids On Germany

London, Nov. 18.—(AP)—American Liberators bombers ranged far over Norway again today, blasting at Hitler's far northern war industry only a few hours after a heavy RAF assault on the German chemical center of Ludwigshafen.

It was the second time in three days American bombers had blasted at the section of German war industry hitherto relatively free of aerial poundings.

A power station at Ruken, about 20 miles west of Oslo, and a Molybdenum mine at Knasen were blasted Tuesday.

Today's targets were not identified immediately.

Last night's RAF attack on the German Rhineland city was carried out along with a raid on Berlin, hit by Mosquitos for the third time in seven days, and other attacks on unidentified targets in western Germany.

One bomber was lost during the night's operations, as compared with 12 heavy craft lost by the RAF the last time Ludwigshafen was (Continued on Page Five)

Reds Withdraw Near Zhitomir But Make Gains At Gomel and In Dnieper Bend; Moscow Views Retreat As Minor Maneuver To Prevent Encirclement

Moscow, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Confronted with stiff counterattacks, adverse weather conditions and difficult terrain, the Red army has given up ground in the Ukraine for the first time since it began its successful offensive four months ago.

The withdrawal was executed yesterday in the Zhitomir-Korostyshev sector at the tip of the Red army's salient west of Kiev, and came on the eve of the first anniversary of the launching of the great Soviet counter-offensive at Stalingrad on Nov. 18, 1942.

The retreat followed a series of heavy Nazi counter-attacks south-east of Zhitomir and in the Pastov sector, in which masses of tanks and infantry were used in an attempt to slice off the bulge in the Soviet front. A Russian communique said the drive cost the Germans 1,500 casualties and 80 tanks and troop carriers.

(Advices from London said the Germans were reported to have thrown at least 150,000 troops into the Zhitomir counter-assault.)

The depth of the withdrawal was not given in the Russian communique, which confined itself to the laconic report that the Red army under enemy pressure, was abandoning several settlements.

Moscow military observers, however, believed the withdrawal was a maneuver to prevent encirclement of a comparatively small advance guard.

Boggy ground impeded troop movements and low visibility restricted aerial activity, front advisers said.

While the tip and left flank of the Kiev salient sagged slightly under the heavy enemy pressure, other Red army forces pushed forward on the right flank toward the strategic rail junction city of Korosten to the north.

The Russians captured the towns of Narodichi, 28 miles northeast of Korosten, and Chernobyl, 50 miles east of Narodichi near the junction of the Pripiet and Dnieper rivers. The German garrison in Korosten was thus threatened from the south. (Continued on Page Four)

Nazis Attack Samos Island

London, Nov. 18.—(AP)—The Germans, quickly switching their attack from Leros, have begun an aerial assault on Samos, last of the Aegean islands in Allied hands, the Berlin radio announced today.

The broadcast said German bombers and dive-bombers dropped bombs of all calibers on military targets on Samos, a Greek island less than 20 miles north of Leros, which capitulated Tuesday.

London morning newspapers sharply criticized the loss of Leros, with the Herald urging a full official explanation.

"We shall gain nothing by glossing it over," said the Herald.

All the editorials were filled with questions and stressed that the fall of the island to German attacking forces, announced yesterday, constituted a political setback to the Allies in Turkey and the Balkans. (Continued on Page Four)

Acquire Additional Land For Air Field

At a joint meeting of the Port Commissioners and the Greenville Board of Aldermen at the court house last night, resolutions were passed authorizing condemnation proceedings to be instituted to acquire three and seven-tenths acres of land owned by J. A. Phillips, needed to extend the third runway at the county-city airport to a 3,000 feet.

They passed resolutions authorizing the purchase of eight and two-tenths acres of land from J. H. Blount and G. V. Smith for \$175 an acre needed for the runway extension and to buy several acres of land from Charles Tyson and then exchange it with the State Highway and Public Works Commission for some land now occupied by the person camp.

The additional land necessary to complete the third runway to 3,000 feet is about 16.9 acres.

Subsidies And Inflation Hold Capital Spotlight

(By The Associated Press)
Washington, Nov. 18.—The row over food subsidies blew the whole question of inflation wide open on Capitol Hill today.

The situation is this: 1. The House and Senate apparently are agreed—at least they talk that way—to banning subsidies—government payments to producers intended to hold down retail food costs.

2. Each branch expects President Roosevelt to veto the measure that contains the subsidy prohibition and high spokesmen agree they do not have enough votes to override that veto.

3. Meanwhile, the subsidy question is being seized upon by both sides as a prime argument over inflation. Administration backers say that without subsidies prices will go up and inflation will be here. Opponents argue that the subsidies themselves are inflationary.

There appeared but little doubt that the House would pass next Monday a twin-pronged measure to give the Commodity Credit Corporation a new lease on life but to prohibit use of government funds for subsidies.

As two days of general debate on the measure opened, evidence piled up that both subsidy foes and supporters would deal with the subject as just one element in the national economy, and discuss wages as well as prices, crop production, stabilization, and pending demands for more pay.

Meanwhile the Senate Agriculture Committee wound up three days of testimony on anti-subsidy legislation with several members predicting eventual passage of the subsidy ban.

Senator Lucas (D-Ill.) usually an administration supporter, said he still hoped a compromise could be worked out under which a time limitation, rather than a complete prohibition would be placed on subsidies.

R. Conway's night group.

There were 26 workers on Tuesday night who made a total of 1114 dressings. This record inspired the Wednesday night group of 27 who were determined to beat the wonderful Tuesday night achievement. They succeeded in topping the Tuesday record by making 1203 dressings.

These busy professional women in two nights have made as many dressings as all the Greenville Housewives have made in three full days, working mornings and afternoons.

Since the workroom re-opened on October 11, production has increased steadily, last week's output totaling 13,558 surgical dressings. However there is an enormous balance of work to be done. We have 90,136 dressings which should be made before January, 1941. The workroom will close for Christmas holidays when the college closes, which leaves us only about three weeks to work.

If you have ever made these dressings, or if you would like to learn to make them, please plan to give every hour possible to this work before the workroom closes for Christmas.

WHAT IS THE CHURCH DOING?

By Henry P. Van Dusen

Van Dusen in his little book "What Is the Church Doing?" speaks of "encouraging word concerning the Church Universal which our world needs just now. He portrays the inner strength to be found in the church which is not discernible to the careless minded."

He finds a note of prophetic encouragement in three realms: the first of which is among the Churches of Captivity. Under this title he refers to the churches in the lands that have been overrun by the military conquerors. Some might think that these churches have had their vital powers extinguished. Such is not the case, at least in a substantial minority. There is a small group of clergy and laity who have not bowed the knee to Baal or bowed the knee to the conqueror. They are the churches of "Resistance, Revival and Revolution."

Among the various churches in captivity there is a comradeship which is enheartening for the future unity of Christendom. The membership has not succumbed to hatred and vengeance, but they do possess a determination to remain true to Christian conscience and conviction, regardless of price. Included in the group are those who have consistently opposed the military in many countries have been persecuted, often concentration and death, but in many cases it has been strong enough to make the conquerors repent.

Another source of encouragement is found in the youngest Christians.

"ian Churches" by which he means the mission churches. He asserts that the two most significant religious facts of the 20th century are World Missions and World Unity. Before 1939 tens of thousands of missionaries were working in over 100 major areas of the world's surface in over 6,000 centers.

With the disruption of Christian forces due to the war he makes this most interesting statement that not one missionary has been recalled due to lack of support. "Mutual helpfulness across denominational lines and working through the International Missionary Council these missionaries have been enabled to remain at their posts of service except where they have been driven out by the invaders or by national authorities as in Japan. The union of Christian peoples in missionary areas is one of the good results ensuing from the war."

Still another encouraging sign about the church universal is its world-wide-mindedness in recent years. Most of the larger communications have been global minded due to their own membership being in all these countries. In recent years we have seen the growth of inter-denominational organizations like the Y. M. C. A. around the world. Great causes like missions, religious education, peace, have been espoused by the Christians around the earth. Five great ecumenical conferences have been held within three decades. Jerusalem, Edinburgh, Lausanne, Oxford, and Moscow. All this has brought visible result in the organization of the World Council of Churches. And, too, many of the branches of the broken Body of Christ. His Church, are now making rapprochements.

It is the contention of the author that this world-wide-minded Church will make definite contributions to the postwar world by helping to establish a "just and lasting peace." The Church will provide leadership for this Herculean task and also the bases upon which the peace may be secured. It is prepared as no other institution in that it has been experimenting in world fellowship and has exemplified this universal relationship in its own life.

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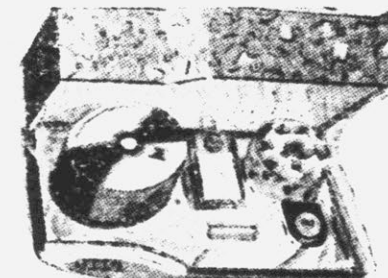

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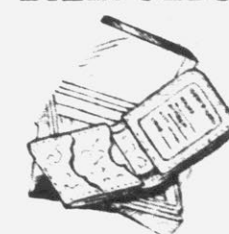

FLIRTING WITH CATASTROPHE

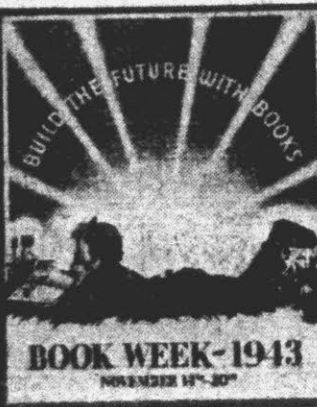
Anger can degenerate into a terrible vice. God intends it to be a moral instrument for men to use to the pulling down of the strongholds of evil. A person who cannot control his temper is spiritually sick; and frequently mentally so.

Beethoven tells how he once became so angry at a fellow musician that in a rage he flung himself upon the floor. "I fell on my hands," he writes, "and when I got up I found I was deaf. The doctors said afterward I had permanently injured the nerves of my ears."

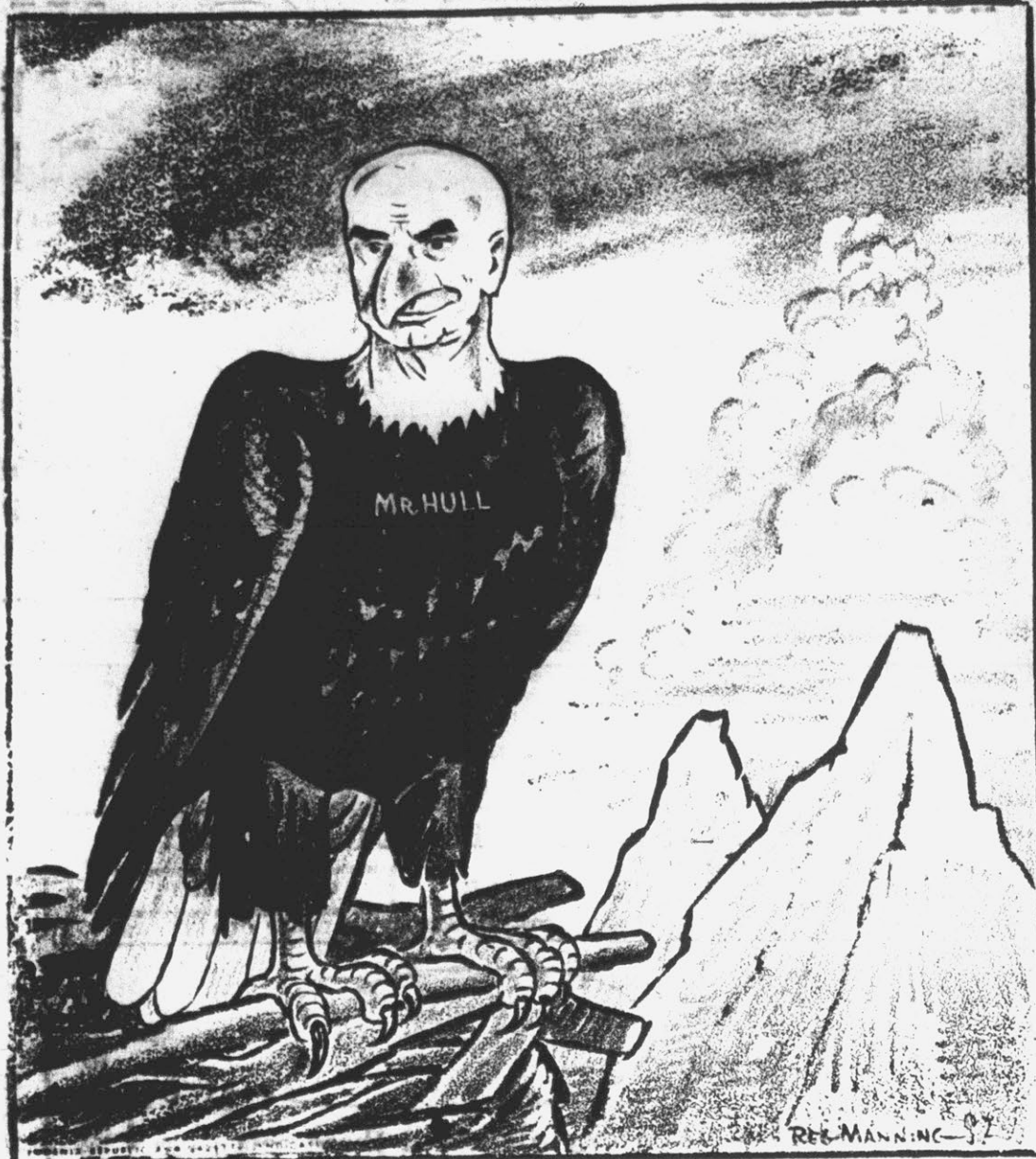

Washington—Within the next few months, maybe only weeks, the great air story of this war is going

to be written into the record. In military, naval and aviation circles here, they are positive of it. Let's examine some reasons:

1. Military experts here say definitely that you will hear of bombings by American air forces almost any week now. While some say that this is a result of the Moscow conference, there are indications this plan has been underway for quite a while.

If this is true, the importance can't be overestimated. In spite of Russia's great ground offensive, it hasn't had the bomber strength to disrupt communications and production in eastern Germany. If such a bomber force can be established there in mid-winter, it may be the bundle of straws that breaks the Nazis' back on the eastern front.

2. The appointment of Lt. Gen. Carl A. Spaatz as chief of the new all-American air forces in the Mediterranean. Even before this announcement was made, Spaatz's new 15th Air Force had started battering Weimerstadt and the Messerschmitt assembly plant there. It was probably this raid that forced the army high command to reveal just what he had been doing. This marked the beginning of whiplash bombings. Implied is the fact that the United Nations is now ready to match bombings from England with bombings from the South.

3. In spite of England's winter weather, there will be terrific raids from the British Isles in coming months. United Nations air forces have now, it is said, so combined their skills that they can take off in Britain's fogs prepared to do either precision or pattern bombing.

4. In the Pacific, in spite of months of lack of concentration, air victories have been outstanding. These victories, it is said here, are proof that once we settled down to the real business of knocking the Japs out of the air, our successes will stagger the Nips.

There are many other factors:

The losses of German and Japanese planes, the damage to German industry (some reports are that one-third of the Nazis' vital oil industry already has been knocked out, for example); the increase in American plane production over losses (American plane production has increased more than seven times since we got into the war and British production has tripled in the same period); Japan's production is only slightly ahead of her losses.

Some months ago I wrote that the blueprint for a separate air force was on the President's desk. Since then this has been verified in half a dozen ways, but the President, in a letter to Congress, made it pretty clear that the steps would be taken gradually.

General Spaatz's new appointment is just one more step in that direction. As the new airpower makes itself important this winter, there will be others. By the time this war is over, maybe before, the separate air force will be an accomplished fact. The object now is

in which she agreed to fight if war broke out in the Mediterranean sea. Turkey showed signs of growing sympathy for the Allied cause soon after the British and American landings in French North Africa a year ago.

British engineers are reported to have been engaged in supervising the construction of airfields in Turkey for many months, presumably under the terms of the alliance. The British also have been under contract to deliver important war materials to Turkey for her 1,000,000-man army.

Strategically, Turkey's territory is a natural bridgehead into the Balkans and southeastern Europe. She controls the Dardanelles, the water link between the Mediterranean and the Black sea.

east and north but fought stubbornly to hold that valuable communications and supply center, dispatches said.

The worth of the Kiev bridgehead, however, left the Red army with ample space to adjust its positions and to strike out anew from internal lines against the scattered German opposition.

On the lower White Russian front to the north, Soviet columns were fighting their way through the suburbs of Rechitsa, strongly fortified city on the west bank of the Dnieper, the communists said, and had caused ground on the east bank of the river north of Gomel, tightening their grip on that beleaguered stronghold. A new Soviet drive was also reported under way near Orsha, Dnieper river city 70 miles southwest of Smolensk, and the junction point for the Leningrad-Odessa, Moscow-Warsaw railway lines.

The Russians also were attacking in the southern Ukraine, continuing their drive to clear out the Dnieper bend. Here 1,000 German were reported killed. Several important towns were captured in a thrust toward Krivoi Rog, the war bulletin said.

said, to a world freed of "spheres of influence for alliances for balance of power or any other of the special arrangements through which, in the unhappy past, the nations strove to safeguard their security or to promote their interests."
"We of today," said Hull, "shall be judged in the future by the manner in which we meet the unprecedented responsibilities that rest upon us not alone in winning the war, but also in making certain that the opportunities of future peace and security shall not be lost."
"As an American, I am proud of the breadth and height of vision and statesmanship which have moved you, ladies and gentlemen, in each house of the Congress to adopt, by overwhelming non-partisan majorities, resolutions in favor of our country's participation in an efficient system of international cooperation for the maintenance of peace and security."
He said the United Nations are on the offensive and that "our enemies are suffering defeat after defeat."
But victory, he added, will be hastened only as the United Nations continue to press their advantage without the slightest relaxation or deviation.
"It has never been my fortune to attend an international conference at which there was greater determination on the part of all the participants to move forward in a spirit of mutual understanding and confidence."
He said the Moscow conference "is believed to have been an important step in the direction both of shortening the war and of making provision for the future."
It is increasingly clear, he continued, that the time is nearing when more and more of the territory held by the enemy will be wrested from his grasp, "and when Germany and its remaining satellites will have to go the way of Fascist Italy."
The Secretary of State said the Moscow discussions were concerned with many of the new problems which would arise out of such developments.
"Important agreements were reached but there were no secret agreements, and none was expected."

Southwest Pacific Allied Headquarters, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Battered and bested in every action since the early phases of the first Solomon campaign, the Japanese navy could still oppose any major move in the western Pacific with a formidable battle fleet.

A tabulation of published Allied claims covering all major war theaters in the Pacific reveals 10 Japanese warships have been sunk and 155 damaged.
In December, 1941, Japan was known to have approximately 200 vessels in these categories in service or nearly completed. While at first glance Japan would appear to have no fleet at all, numerically her losses have been primarily cruisers and destroyers—warships that can be most quickly replaced.
Despite heavy and unbalancing Jap losses, an analysis of all available information, both before and since Pearl Harbor, leads to the conclusion—which doesn't necessarily reflect official opinion—that the third greatest sea power could face a showdown today with a battle fleet which would compare with what she had in December, 1941. Like this:

Aircraft carriers—Numerically about equal but definitely inferior in battle potential because of the loss of her best carriers in the Midway, Coral sea and Solomons actions last year, forcing her to rely on slower less battleworthy converted ships.

Heavy cruisers—Strength reduced about one-third.

Light cruisers—Recent construction has not equalized war losses but has increased speed and horsepower.

Destroyers—Shrinkage from 35 to 50 per cent.

Seaplane carrier—Approximately the same.

At the outbreak of the war Japan had ten battleships in service and three, or possibly four, under construction. The Japanese naval program between 1937 and 1940 provided for building four additional "armored ships." These have been variously described as battle cruisers, aircraft carriers and heavy cruisers. The last description is probably correct.
Japan started the war with nine, possibly eleven, aircraft carriers, of which seven were first class vessels. She also had nine large seaplane carriers in addition to a number of smaller ships described as tenders.

Despite adverse conditions, the Germans mounted several counterattacks on the eastern end of the Italian battle line but all were repulsed by the British Eighth army. Many rivers near the front swept out of their banks.

Chungking, Nov. 18 — (AP) — Unabated fighting on the central China front, with heavy casualties on both sides, was announced tonight by the high command. The communiqué said the Chinese repulsed a Japanese counterattack northeast of Yochow.

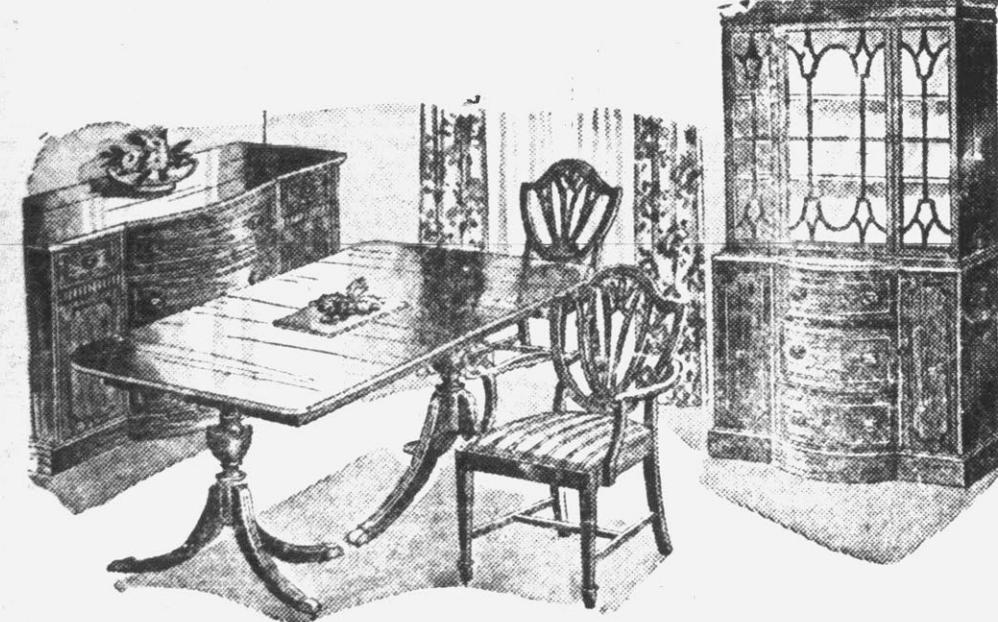
