Russians Fight Off Fierce Nazi Attack West Of Kiev

Soviets Say Germans Halted Since Recapture Of Zhitomir; Russians Break Through For New Gains In Dnieper Bend Area.

Moscow, Nov. 22.—(AP)—German positions at Khrivni Rog, key city inside the Dnieper bend, were menaced today by a new Russian offensive thrust apparently designed to divert Nazi forces fiercely attacking in the Korostyshev sector on the northern Ukraine front.

The Russians have scored a new 30-mile advance in the Dnieper bend after breaking through German defenses east of the Dremenchuk-Zbarneska railway.

One spearhead of the drive cut the railway and is advancing 25 miles northwest of Ananienka, while another driving southward has plunged to about 28 miles east of that rail junction which lies about 50 miles southwest of Kremenchuk.

Front line dispatches said the latest Russian assaults south of Kremenchuk, one of the original Soviet bridgeheads on the west bank of the Dnieper, had smashed enemy resistance yesterday and overrun eight Nazi defense bases there, about 3,000 Germans were reported slain and 60 tanks knocked out in the fighting.

The thrust added to the difficulties already confronting the Nazis, but they continued to press their attacks in the Korostyshev area west of Kiev, though they had nothing to show for their efforts but heavy losses in men and machines since recapturing Zhitomir.

A familiar scene thus was once more being enacted, with the Germans attacking with a large concentration of troops, tanks and planes on a narrow sector while the Russians absorbed the blows with widely distributed forces and struck back in other areas.

There was no disposition, however, to minimize the strength of the Soviet assaults at Korostyshev. Soviet dispatches last night frankly said the situation there was serious and the Russians no longer referred to the enemy operations as mere "counter-attacks."

A Russian communiqué said yesterday that in one sector of the Korostyshev area the Germans had launched three consecutive tank attacks which were hurled back by

Eighteen Killed In Plane Crash

Washington, Nov. 22.—(AP)—The death of 18 persons in the crash of a U. S. naval transport plane 30 miles east of Rio de Janeiro was announced by the navy last night.

The victims included 16 navy officers and men, an American civilian engineer and a Brazilian.

The accident occurred last Friday. The announcement here said the transport burned after falling but the cause of the crash was not known. Dispatches from Rio reported the plane was en route to that city from Recife in a fog.

The 17 American victims were buried yesterday at Niteroi, in accordance with local laws.

Speakers Urge Balance Budget And Tax Reforms

Chicago, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Approximately \$19,000,000,000 in taxes is "about all the nation can stand" to meet a potential post-war debt of \$30,000,000,000 in the view of one expert, while others insisted today that the nation's tax structure needs simplification and relief.

In an address to the 36th national tax conference last night, Prof. Fred R. Fairchild of Yale University, predicting the astronomical post-war debt, asserted that the \$19,000,000,000 annual tax bill would be both the minimum and the maximum the nation could bear, considering that "we have to allow another 10 or 11 billions for state and local taxes," or a total of 25 per cent of a national income of \$120,000,000,000.

He urged a balanced budget, and said "I am well aware that there is today a certain school of thought and policy that becomes very impatient over any such analysis as I have just offered you.... The main idea is to formulate the ideal program of what government is to do for us in the immediate future and then let the expense take care of itself.... These.... are supported by the

JAPS PUSH NEW DRIVE IN CHINA

Both Sides Suffer Heavy Losses In Renewed Fighting

Chungking, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Close-quarter combat at the outer defenses of Changteh, key to the provincial capital of Changsha, in which both sides were suffering "great losses," was announced by the Chinese high command today.

Japanese infantry, artillery, cavalry and planes were pounding the Chinese southeast of Tzeli, 30 miles northwest of Changteh, and other Japanese forces were laying siege to Hanchow, 20 miles southeast of Changteh, in an effort to encircle the potential springboard for a fourth great battle for the capital of Hunan province in central China.

The drive at Hanchow, along the western shore of Tungting lake, threatened to cut Changteh's highway communications with Changsha, and lay open the way to a coordinated thrust from Yochow, east of the lake, where the Japanese are said to have sent 10,000 troop reinforcements.

The Chinese said they were counter-attacking at several points, including on Lihshien (Lichow) 45 miles north of Changteh to the rear of the Japanese, and had surrounded and annihilated a large number of the invaders in the mountains southwest of the Yangtze port of Ichang, on the flank of the present drive.

The Chinese, attacking Ichang from points north of the Yangtze, inflicted several hundred casualties, the communiqué said, and retook several points on the outskirts of Kingmen, 50 miles northeast of Ichang.

Changteh, 100 miles southeast of the Yangtze river port of Ichang and 85 miles west of the lake, would provide the Japanese with a potential springboard for a thrust of Changsha, which is 100 miles to the southeast.

Brig. Gen. Edgar Glenn, chief of staff of the U. S. 14th air force, describing the Tungting lake sector as "area No. 1 in importance," said that "we are giving all support possible to the Chinese troops trying to repel the advance on Changteh, which is the corridor of approach to Chungking."

Rep. Steagall Dies Suddenly

Washington, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Henry B. Steagall (D-Ala.), chairman of the House Banking committee, died unexpectedly today.

Steagall was the leader of the battle in the house against the Administration's food subsidy program.

He was born in Colton in Dale county, Ala., May 19, 1873, served in the Alabama legislature, and had represented the Third Alabama district for almost 3 years.

Steagall had been instrumental in shaping many of the country's wartime economic controls, helping draft the first and second price control acts.

His death, however, came while he was actively leading a bitter fight against an administration price control project. He had taken an important part in limiting farm state price controls, helping to secure the passage of the first and second price control acts.

Measures sponsored by the Alabama created the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, the United States Housing Authority, the commodity Credit Corporation, and the Emergency Price Control Administration.

Berlin Reports Fall Of Samos

London, Nov. 22.—(AP)—A German broadcast said it had just been announced in Berlin that the island of Samos capitulated to German forces this morning. Samos is the next to the last Aegean island that had been held by the Allies.

Castellorosso, easternmost of the Dodecanese, is still believed in Allied hands.

Samos, a Greek island just north of the Dodecanese and near the Turkish coast, had been under German attack at least since Saturday, according to Ankara radio broadcasts.

The Germans obviously hinting that the British were making attempts to withdraw from the island, said yesterday that the first refugees from the island had arrived in Turkey.

Leros, 20 miles south of Samos, fell to the Germans November 16 after an air war and sea-borne invasion launched by the Germans to checkmate infiltration of their "iron ring" of stepping stone bases protecting the eastern flank of the Balkan peninsula. The Germans previously had regained Cos in the Dodecanese and claimed to have recaptured four other small islands in the group.

Dogs Aid Marines On Jap Hunt

Promised Offensive In Central Pacific Begins

U. S. Forces Batter Dug-In Jap Defenses On Makin And Tarawa Islands In Gilbert Group

Pearl Harbor, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Talk of a central Pacific drive has flared into fierce action—thrusts by American marines and soldiers on Makin and Tarawa in the Gilberts where they are fighting doggedly for a spearhead aimed at the heart of Japan's sea power.

On the low, sandy shores where natural protection is scant for the attacker and defender alike, the Americans punched out several beachheads against strong resistance at Tarawa, the enemy's key air base in the Gilberts where they met moderate opposition.

Their landing, scored by naval units which laid down aerial and surface bombardments, the Americans apparently ran into no Japanese sea forces although the strategic importance of the Gilberts may well draw the enemy's fleet into battle yet.

For 1,600 statute miles to the west lies the heavily fortified Turk islands, the heavy link to the Nipponese sea power—and to the north the Marshalls where the enemy holds powerful air bases at Joluit and Wotje.

The Americans landed Saturday. Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, commander-in-chief of the Pacific fleet, announced it 24 hours later in a communiqué which also said "fighting continues."

The Makin landings presumably were made on Butaritari, largest island of the atoll. Approximately ten miles long and a thousand yards wide, it is shaped much like a man's leg and foot. Butaritari probably has seaplane facilities in an excellent anchorage surrounded by coral reefs; a radio station, three wharves and a stone pier.

The Tarawa landings probably were made on Betio island which has an excellent triangular airfield long enough for medium bombers. Supporting the marines, many of

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, our commander in chief of the Pacific fleet, meant ago he announced to the world at large: "Our time has come to strike; henceforth we propose to give the Jap no rest anywhere."

He wasn't slow in implementing this challenge. Our great bombers started ranging the Gilbert and Marshall islands, with devastating results, and today the United States Marines and Army units are ashore on Makin and Tarawa atolls in the Gilbert group—our first invasion north of the equator—engaged in heavy battles with the Japs.

The ultimate objective of this new offensive is capture of the island of Truk, Japan's great naval and air base, close to 1,500 miles west of the Gilbert and Marshall islands. At this base the Japs maintain the biggest sea-unit outside Nipponese home waters.

Reduction of Truk likely will mean the biggest naval engagement of the war. A clash with the Mikado's fleet is something we have been seeking for a considerable time now, but the Japs have avoided it. As we close in on them, however, their alternative is to fight or to run away and thereby permit us to crisscross the main defensive ring southeast of Japan.

This new offensive in the Gilberts undoubtedly will be coordinated with the attack on Rabaul, another strategic Jap naval and air base, on the northern tip of New Britain. If we are successful in both these ventures, we shall have severed the Japanese defenses in this whole area and moved our own bases well forward toward Turk and Japan itself.

Of course, this is just the beginning of an offensive which has far to go, and we shouldn't expect it to achieve all its objectives in the immediate future. However, it is timely and heartening to see our forces in the Pacific, and especially our navy, reach that point of strength where we can carry the war to the enemy without cessation.

From now on our offensive in the Pacific may be expected to swell steadily until it reaches its climax.

BIG THREE TO CONFER SOON

Postwar Structure for Germany To Be Discussed

London, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Allied construction of a post-war political and economic structure for Germany is expected to be speeded up as a result of the meeting of President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Joseph Stalin which, according to reports from America, is believed to be imminent.

Following a preliminary exchange of views by the three chiefs of state, this problem, involving peace-enforcement and control of German industry, is likely to be submitted to the new European advisory commission in London for joint study. The problem is likely to be referred to the commission as too complex for a snap judgment.

The partition of Germany into several states with decentralized industries has been proposed in various quarters, but this solution appears to have gained little support among advisers of the three governments.

Consequently, the London commission is expected to search for substitute measures.

Root of the problem is the Allied intention to disarm Germany and prevent the use of her industries for the manufacture of warplanes, tanks and guns in the future. With some system of control implied in any such project, the American, British and presumably the Soviet governments have been studying various possibilities which they are guarding against premature disclosure until they can settle on one.

No decision in favor of any single plan has been reached by any of the three governments so far as can be learned.

NEW BLOWS IN SOUTH PACIFIC

Jap Base At Gasmata Blasted; Ground Forces Advance

Southwest Pacific Allied Headquarters, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Gasmata, Japanese air and supply base on New Britain, reeled today under its heaviest bombing of the war while the armed pressure of tree-crushing tanks, new in this jungle theater.

American bombers dropped 138 tons of explosives Saturday morning on Gasmata, on New Britain's south central coast, scoring accurately on the target area and leaving a heavy pall of smoke over the entire sector as they completed their mission without interception.

On New Guinea, as on Bougainville to the east, resistance both on the ground and in the air was described by Gen. Douglas MacArthur as strong, but Australian troops, supported by Matilda light tanks, which seem more at home on soggy jungle, were putting a squeeze on

Number Die In Ship Collision

Lewes, Del., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Charred bodies of four seamen were brought ashore today as Coast guard cutters searched the fog-bound North Atlantic for survivors of a collision of two tankers—the Altair and the Bostonian—58 miles off the coast early yesterday.

The fourth naval district said an undetermined number of men were missing, with most feared dead, but 39 survivors already have been landed here.

The Altair caught fire after the crash, about 2 a. m. in dense fog. The Navy said a tug had her in tow and the flames were under control. The other, although damaged, reached an unidentified Atlantic port under its own power.

Guerrillas Hurl Back Nazi Attack

London, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Yugoslav guerrillas have smashed an assault by combined German and Bulgarian forces against the Serbian town of Krenje and have driven the Nazis out of two villages in Bosnia, headquarters of Gen. Josip Broz "Tito" announced today.

The thrust against Krenje was launched after reinforced German divisions apparently were checked everywhere over the week-end, a strong drive in the Sarajevo-Travnik sector reportedly having been stopped and attempts to extend beachheads in the Adriatic islands of Krk and Cherso also having been halted.

Delay Action On Food Subsidy And Tax Bill

Washington, Nov. 22.—(AP)—A powerful coalition's plan to seek quick house passage of a measure outlawing the administration's subsidy program, marked time today as a result of the death of Rep. Ditter (R-Pa.) in a plane crash.

Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) announced the house would suspend business for 24 hours in tribute to the Pennsylvania lawmaker killed yesterday when a navy craft in which he was traveling fell near Columbia, Pa.

The decision delayed by one day the showdown on the subsidy bill, and the scheduled start of debate on the new tax bill.

The subsidy vote had been in prospect for this afternoon.

As labor groups, coal mine operators and coalition forces teamed up on capitol hill this prospect developed.

1. Passage by the house appeared certain of a measure extending the CCC but banning food subsidies.

2. Debate starts Wednesday or Thursday on the second wartime revenue measure calling for \$2,140,000,000, approximately one-fifth the amount the administration sought to draw off the taxpayers' income and apply to the cost of the war.

3. A bi-partisan bloc of legislators appeared strong enough to force a showdown soon on its move to strip OPA of coal and oil price controls and turn them over to Interior Secretary Harold Ickes who has gone on record for increases for both.

4. Tax-troubled lawmakers turned with new intensity to their review of war appropriations as a result of the army's voluntary decision to return \$13,000,000,000 in unneeded funds.

With the subsidy war capturing top-billing for the day, Secretary of the Navy Knox, War Production Chief Donald Nelson and OPA Administrator Chester Bowles came out over the week-end, warning of a coalition of House Republicans and farm state Democrats stood firm against offers of a compromise and administration supporters, conceding privately that the bill would be passed swiftly, frankly bailed their hopes on arousing the consumer public behind an anti-subsidy veto.

Montgomery's Men Take Two More Towns In Wheeling Movement For New Offensive Against Germans' Winter Line

Allied Headquarters, Algiers, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Plunging forward four miles in the mountainous central sector of Italy, Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's Eighth army has seized two more towns overlooking an additional stretch of the main road to Rome and moved into position from which to launch a full-blown offensive against the enemy's winter defenses. Allied headquarters said today.

San Pietro Avellana, 10 miles due west of Agnone and only five miles east of an important junction of highways leading to the Italian capital, was scooped up along with Vastagardi, to the southwest of San Pietro Avellana, in the Montgomery advance which was made despite heavy rains drenching the entire battlefield.

Falling back before the onslaught, the Germans were firing the towns of Alfedena and Castel Di Sangro in apparent determination to leave no shelter when they are forced to give up those places.

Alfedena is three miles west of a fork in the central road to Rome and Castel Di Sangro is two miles northeast of the fork on the branch leading to the Rome-Pescara highway.

The Allied forces were approaching the fork from two directions, from the southeast on the road from Rionero, and from the west in the direction of Agnone, which the Eighth army took Saturday after ironing out an eight-mile deep enemy salient.

The new gains, putting the left wing of the Eighth army within two miles of the upper Sangro river, were scored as Allied headquarters announced that Gen. Sir Harold Alexander's ground forces in Italy had been reinforced by the recent arrival of a large number of Canadians. There was no mention (Continued on Page Four)

At a meeting of the North Carolina War Finance Committee in Raleigh recently arrangements were made to perfect organizations in various counties preparatory to the Fourth War Bond Drive for \$14,000,000,000, which begins January 18. State War Finance Chairman G. H. Leback presided.

Ernest Duff of Greenville continues as area chairman. W. H. Woolard, president of the Guaranty Bank and Trust Company, continues as chairman for Region 1, comprised by 16 counties. J. Herbert Waldrop, cashier of the Guaranty Bank and Trust Company, continues as chairman for Region 2, comprised by 14 counties.

The Treasury Department has announced that E. F. and G. War Bonds will be offered. In addition to 2 1/2 per cent bonds, to be due in 1959, but callable in 1956, known as 12 to 15 year bonds, and 2 1/2 per cent bonds, due from 1965-1970, and 4 per cent certificates of indebtedness, due one year from date, Region Chairman Woolard stated.

The Fourth War Bond Drive will be for 14 billion dollars.

Pitt county's quota is expected to be about \$1,900,000. The region's quota in the last drive was \$2,100,000 and \$2,800,000 of War Bonds was sold.

IS RELIGION A THEORY?

An English Methodist, Lord Melbourn, returned from church one Sunday morning fuming with rage at the preacher. "He is one of those pestiferous fellows," said Melbourn, "who supposes that religion has to do with a man's private life." This reminds us of the man who once remarked that he belonged to a certain church because it didn't interfere with his politics or his religion. Many people succeed, in keeping their religion in one section of their minds and their mode of living in another. Sometimes these people are hypocrites—that is, people who are playing a part. More often, however, they are not hypocrites at all, but just people whose perverted philosophy of life permits them without any distress of mind to hold religion purely as a theory. Many such people are quite sincere in their religious professions and seem to get a certain comfort out of their faith. But what they do not get is the very thing Jesus intended that men should get, namely, a motive for living, an unchangeable standard of moral conduct, and a bright, unselfish purpose for their every-day acts.

If religion is only a theory, then men have wasted money in building churches and cathedrals and are continuing to waste money in their support of them. But if religion is a way of life, then no expenditure of money or energy is great if it holds the claims of their religion insistently before the minds and hearts of men.

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WASHINGTON IN WARTIME

Washington—When (and observers here insist that is the word, not "if") Finland gets out of this war, none will be happier than the Legion of Washington friends of Finnish Minister Hjalmar Procopé (pronounced proe-coe-pay).

Few diplomats have had a more difficult situation to cope with here than Envoy Procopé. None has carried it off with greater skill. Three years and more ago, little bleeding Finland had the sympathy of the United States and a lot of the rest of the world in her one-sided struggle against the Russian invasion. Millions of dollars were poured into Finnish relief funds and \$20,000,000 of lend-lease was earmarked for Finland aid. In those days Finland was fighting an enemy allied with Germany.

Then came changes in this crazy global war and Finland, again in the scrap, was discovered battling on the side of the hated Nazis against our great ally—Russia.

It is tribute to the rare diplomacy of Procopé that not only has there been no outright severance of diplomatic relations between this country and Finland but that he and his attractive wife, Bronia, born Margaret Shaw, have continued to be two of the most socially popular members of the diplomatic set.

Procopé is 54, but in spite of graying hair looks as if he were in his early forties. He is tall, straight slim and handsome. If he could be compared to anyone on the international scene, it would be Anthony Eden for he was the "boy wonder" in Finland's foreign affairs. He entered the Finnish parliament in 1918 and two years later when he was only 31, was named Minister of Commerce and Industry. He served a stint at the League of Nations and by 1928 was considered as the League as then constituted was a failure.

He came to the United States as minister in 1938 and was immediately one of the most popular of the diplomatic set. In 1939, he was divorced, and within a day the Capital's flutter girls marked him as Washington's most eligible. A little over a year later, he put an end to that by his marriage to Miss Shaw.

but it goes all out for social activities—small parties where no embarrassments are likely to arise. Supreme court justices, cabinet officials, state department executives, members of Congress, and well-known members of the press are frequent guests.

Procopé never nusses an opportunity to stress that his country is not an "ally" of any dictator nation but only continuing its resistance against the same aggressors it was fighting when American dollars and American sympathy were so plentiful. However, Procopé never makes his own opportunities and never embarrasses his guests by making an issue of it.

As for the possibility of Finland's withdrawal from the war he's too astute even to discuss it, but it's no secret that every time rumors come from Russia, Stockholm, Switzerland or London that it is imminent, there's many a happy toast drunk at the legation on Wyoming avenue.

Dr. Haney Speaks At Vespers. At the YWCA-YMCA vesper service Sunday night, Rev. H. G. Haney, pastor of the Eighth Street Christian Church, spoke on "The Kingdom of Religion Our Age Wants." Sylvia Greene of Roduco presided and introduced the speaker.

Taking his theme from Heb. 13:8 Dr. Haney said that Christ may be the same always, but that ideas of Him differ through the ages. "Man is incurably religious," he declared, "and wherever there is a group of people, they will have some kind of religion; but the kind of religion differs from group to group and from age to age."

Dr. Haney expressed the belief that what man wants is more significant than what he does, then raised the question of what the present age wants in a religion.

One of the things it does not want, he said, is a narrow, sectarian denominationalism. This he illustrated by incidents showing how people of all denominations are worshipping together in brotherhood.

Nor does this generation want to give up the idea that religion is life, abundant life.

It does want the profession of religion to square with the life one lives. Because people today fear to be hypocrites, he said, they often are not willing to admit that they are religious as they are. One thing this age demands is harmony between life and profession. Then it demands also that service ensue from faith.

Finally, he said, this age wants Jesus Christ to be the central figure in its religion. The primary religious question today is, after all, what do you think of Christ?

MEDICAL AUXILIARY HOLDS FALL MEETING

The Pitt County Medical Auxiliary held its fall meeting at the Proctor Hotel on Friday, November 19, at one o'clock.

Mrs. W. I. Wooten, president, very graciously entertained at a lovely luncheon. A short business session followed, after which Mrs. Wooten introduced Miss King, a member of the Red Cross nursing service, who spoke on the critical nursing situation in the hospitals due to the ever-increasing numbers of nurses who are being called to the armed services. She said that forty-three of the forty-five hospitals in North Carolina are using nurses' aids and that but for this there is a possibility that some of them might have had to close. The situation is sure to become more acute with the prolongation of the war and to meet this emergency a nursing program is being instituted in Greenville whereby the women of this community between the ages of 18 and 50 may volunteer their services and receive the necessary training to become Red Cross Nursing Aides.

Mrs. Wooten then reviewed the Wagner-Murray bill which proposes to take away from all of us the right and the privilege of choosing our own doctors and places the medical care for the sick in the hands of politicians. She advised us to acquaint ourselves with the vital issues contained in this bill and to make every effort to see that those about us become conscious of the dangers of socialized medicine.

Mrs. K. B. Pace, president of the state auxiliary, was then presented and gave a very interesting talk concerning the work of the auxiliary in maintaining two beds, one at the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Sanatorium, N. C., and the other at the Western North Carolina Tuberculosis Hospital at Black Mountain. A motion was made by Mrs. N. T. Ennett that the Pitt county auxiliary request the state organization

to also maintain a bed at the new sanatorium at Wilson.
